Lebanese central bank chief under probe

European investigators questioned witnesses for eight hours in Beirut yesterday as part of a probe into Lebanon's central bank governor Riad Salemeh and his brother. Investigators from France, Germany and Luxembourg began hearing witnesses Monday as part of the case of suspected financial misconduct including possible money laundering and embezzlement. The long-serving central bank chief is among top officials widely blamed for monetary policies that have led to a Lebanese economic crisis that the World Bank has dubbed one of the worst globally in modern history.

India set to become the most populous nation

The world's population may have shot up beyond eight billion for the first time recently, but some countries including the most populous, China, are seeing their populations shrink. And the decline is set to continue as factors including rising living costs, more women entering the workforce and having children later mean people in some countries are having fewer babies. China's population shrank last year for the first time in more than six decades, official data showed yesterday, and it is expected to be overtaken by India this year as the most populous nation.

Thunberg detained at German mine protest

Swedish climate activist Greta

45 dead, 20 missing as Ukraine ends search

Rescuers called off the search yesterday for victims of the Russian missile strike in the city of Dnipro with 20 people still missing and funerals being held in the griefstricken Ukrainian city. Ukrainian authorities said the Russian strike in the eastern city of Dnipro at the weekend killed at least 45 people including six children. The toll made Saturday's strike one of the deadliest attacks since Russian President Vladimir Putin invaded Ukraine nearly 11 months ago. Page 11

Reef sharks and rays risk extinction

Nearly two thirds of the sharks and rays that live among the world's corals are threatened with extinction, according to new research published yesterday, with a warning this could further imperil precious reefs. Coral reefs, which harbour at least a quarter of all marine animals and plants, are gravely menaced by an array of human threats, including overfishing, pollution and climate change. Shark and ray species - from apex predators to filter feeders - play an important role in these delicate ecosystems that "cannot be filled by other species", said Samantha Sherman, of Simon Fraser University in Canada and the wildlife group TRAFFIC International.

German tanks for Ukraine in sight

Ukraine came a step closer yesterday to winning the fleet of modern battle tanks it hopes could turn the course of the war against Russia, after the West's big holdout Germany said this would be the first item on its new defence minister's agenda. In Dnipro, authorities called an end to the search for survivors in the ruins of an apartment building destroyed during Russian missile attacks on Saturday.

Qatar delegation to highlight country's World Cup legacy, energy role at WEF

E the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Mohamed bin Abdulrahman al-Thani will preside over a highlevel Qatari delegation in the 53rd World Economic Forum (WEF) annual meeting, which is being held from January 16-20, in Davos, Switzerland.

This year's forum is held under the theme 'Co-operation in a Fragmented World' with the participation of a number of ministers of economy and commerce, ministers of finance, economic leaders, executive directors, corporate CEOs, entrepreneurs, social influencers, experts, and academics.

The forum's agenda includes a number of plenary sessions on various topics ranging from geopolitical crises, globalisation, development, economic innovation, green technologies, and efforts to promote diversity. It will also witness a large number of private meetings, as well as seminars, lectures, and interviews that focus on finding solutions to problems and challenges facing the world and ways to increase cooperation between the public and private sectors to confront them.

In recent years, Qatar has made these global issues a priority, investing in new technologies and participating in international forums such as the World Economic Forum, which is a strategic partner of the Doha Forum to promote new ideas and ways of co-operation.

and Minister of Foreign Affairs will participate in a discussion session on geopolitical changes in the world, where he will emphasise the role of Qatar as a reliable international partner in the fields of development, international peace, and security.

The delegation will also review Qatar's efforts to diversify its economy, enhance the attractiveness of its business environment, and underline its global role in energy security and its FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022 legacy. The delegation will also discuss the most prominent regional and international challenges and ways to enhance multilateral convertion to address them

This year's forum is the first to be held as usual in mid-January since the emergence of the Covid-19 pandemic.

In an interview with CNBC Middle East on the sidelines of the World Economic Forum in Davos, HE Mohamed bin Abdulrahman al-Thani said Qatar would stand with Afghan women as they continue to face irrational restrictions by the Taliban-led administration.

Doha News quoted the minister as saying in the interview that Qatar has been reaching out to the interim government to understand the rationale behind the restrictive policies towards women and girls.

The top diplomat said Doha cannot see such policies rationalised from either a religious or cultural perspective, and confirmed his country is currently involved in consultations with other Muslim nations to "deal" with the situation.

Speaking at a panel at the WEF,

HE Sheikh Mohamed expressed his disappointment over the Taliban's decision while stressing the need to maintain dialogue, Doha News said.

"We've been trying even to reach out to Kandahar and to have a dialogue with them, until

Protest against pension plan



Protesters take part in a torch-lit march called by the CGT workers' union to protest the French government's pensions reform plan, on the Canebiere in Marseille, southeastern France, yesterday. France is to face strikes across different sectors on January 19 (tomorrow), as workers join a nationwide strike against a widely unpopular pension reform plan. The suggested changes, still to be debated in parliament, would raise the retirement age from 62 to 64 and increase contributions required for a full pension. Most trains will be cancelled in France tomorrow, with flights also affected and Paris' subway heavily disrupted, as part of a nationwide strike against the government's plan to make people work longer before they can retire. Opinion polls show a vast majority of French oppose the planned reform, which would see the retirement age pushed from 62 to 64, and Thursday will be a test of whether this can transform into a major headache for the government. Unions have called workers to massively walk out of their job on Jan 19 and take to the streets across France.

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Cooler days ahead as Met forecasts drop in temperature from today







A noticeable drop in temperatures is expected in the country from today until Saturday (January 21), the Qatar Met department has said. This is due to the effect of northwesterly winds on the country, the department said in a tweet. The maximum temperature is expected to range from 18-21C during the day and the minimum from 12-16C at night in different places, dropping further in some southern and external areas, the forecast states. The detailed forecast for today says strong winds are expected in most areas as well as offshore, where high seas are also likely. It will be partly cloudy both inshore and offshore, and cold conditions are also expected. Northwesterly winds will blow at speeds reaching 35 knots offshore and 30 knots inshore, with the sea level rising to 12ft. A minimum temperature of 11C is likely in Abu Samra today, while Doha is expected to see a low of 14C and high of 20C. This will mark a significant drop in temperatures compared to the past few days. For instance, Doha (airport area) recorded a high of 28C and a low of 19C yesterday, 24C and 18C on Monday, and 22C and 19C on Sunday. Doha and other parts of the country experienced windy and dusty conditions yesterday, along with a drop in visibility in some areas, especially in the evening, according to updates by the Met department. CRA conducts benchmark study on prices of retail telecom services

The Communications Regulatory Authority (CRA) has conducted a benchmarking study on the prices of retail telecom services in Qatar, comparing the averages in the Gulf Co-operation Council (GCC) and the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), with the objective of monitoring the state of the telecommunications mar-

The study is based on the Arab Regulators Network of Telecommunications (AR-EGNET) study and the five OECD price baskets: fixed voice, fixed broadband, mobile voice and data, mobile broadband, and leased lines.

The study's main findings are that prices for telecom services in Qatar are typically below or on par with the GCC average, while typically above the OECD average.

It also shows that since 2017 prices for fixed broadband and mobile voice and data services in Qatar have decreased, while هیئة تنظیم | Communications الاتـــــــــالات Regulatory Authority دولـة قطر State of Qatar دولـة

prices for fixed voice, mobile broadband, and leased lines services have largely remained static.

To develop the necessary regulatory instruments, the CRA conducts studies and monitors the state of the telecom market in Qatar in comparison with similar markets at the regional and international levels.

This helps the CRA regulate the telecom sector towards its development for the benefit of both the service providers and telecom consumers.

The prices for seasonal flowers can be very low and cheap, encouraging some to buy many of these in different colours to decorate their home gardens.

The prices of tree seedlings vary according to their types and sizes; for instance, the price of lemon tree seedlings could range from QR50 to as high as QR150, depending on the size of the tree, while an orange tree seedling ranges from QR80-150.

Media Majlis exhibition explores evolution of Arab drama

he Media Majlis at Northwestern University in Qatar (NU-Q) explores the growing popularity of Ramadan television drama culture in the Arabworld and the forces shaping it in its new interactive exhibition for spring 2023, The World is Watching Musalsalat.

The exhibition, which opens today (Jan 18) discusses how the business of musalsalat, (which is Arabic for serialised television dramas made for and shown during Ramadan), has changed over the past two decades, and its impact on viewers, writers, composers, costume designers, directors, and producers. Data on advertising during musalsalat is also examined, with opportunities for visitors to give their feedback on how they consume this type of media.

"From the first Ramadan drama series in 1978 to the era of videoon-demand in the 1990s and online streaming today, dramas continue to be watched, debated, and dissected by millions, especially during the primetime television Ramadan season," said Pamela Erskine-Loftus, director of The Media Majlis.

"The World is Watching Musalsalat looks at forces contributing to the rise of Ramadan serial television dramas and how they are shaping local cultures across the region."

Shahnawaz Zali, manager of digital content at The Media Majlis at NU-Q, said the exhibition has been designed to immerse visitors in the various elements shaping the serialised drama landscape in the Arab world. "As musalsalat evolve into a global cultural force, the exhibition engages visitors in an immersive experience that exposes them to the forces making up this lucrative industry and the many political and financial stakes that often go undiscussed



when talking about Arab drama."

An interactive installation in the north zone of the exhibition introduces audiences to historical visual content from the region

on the development of musalsalat. Visitors engaging with the installation learn about the key players who shaped the development of the industry, first in Egypt, Syria, and Kuwait and later in Saudi Arabia and the UAE after the satellite television boom of the 1990s.

Another installation, The Streaming Age, allows visitors to examine the rise in international streaming services such as Netflix and Shahid in the 2010s and their effects on promoting Arab culture. Other installations in the exhibition explore how the growing popularity of dubbed Ramadan dramas from Latin America, Turkey, Korea, and India, have shaped Arab viewers' attitudes toward ideas of love, family life, and other social issues.

In highlighting the impact of the exhibition, Marwan M Kraidy, dean and CEO of NU-Q, explained how it will help encourage academic and research exploration into one of the most significant contemporary media developments in the region.

"Today streeming platforms

"Today streaming platforms have rejuvenated drama production, circulation, and consumption around the world. Arab musalsalat now have to contend with Turkish, Korean, and Latin American serialised drama. From NU-Q, a community of scholar-teacher-learners focused on evidence-based storytelling on the Global South. The World is Watching Musalasalat will inspire faculty and student researchers all over the world to conduct further inquiry into the fast-changing landscapes of patterns and trends in the creation of, production, and consumption of musalsalat and their encounters with global television trends."

The Media Majlis is open Saturday-Wednesday from 10am-5pm. The current exhibition will run until May 13, 2023.

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Palestinian fighter shot dead

sraeli soldiers shot dead a Palestinian man yesterday after he allegedly fired at troops in the occupied West Bank, medical and military of-

The Palestinian health ministry said Hamdi Abu Dayyeh, 40, was killed "by Israeli occupation bullets" in the southern town of

An AFP photographer saw the body of a man beside a military tower at the northern entrance to the town, before it was covered by soldiers.

A Palestinian woman said she was in a car with her family when gunfire erupted.

"We were on the road, people were moving around normally...the army kept firing, we got down under the seats," said Umm Amir Taqatqa, a resident

of nearby Beit Fajjar. The Halhul shooting raises the toll of Palestinians killed this month in the West Bank to 15, including civilians and fighters, according to an AFP tally.

The majority have been killed by Israeli forces, which have occupied the West Bank since the 1967 Six-Day War. A surge in violence in 2022 made it the deadliest year in the West Bank since United Nations records began in

At least 26 Israelis and 200 Palestinians were killed across Israel and the Palestinian territories last year, according to AFP figures. The majority of the fatalities were in the West Bank, while 49 Palestinians were killed in a three-day conflict in Gaza.

Tunisia president's former top aide jailed in absentia

unisian President Kais Saied's former chief of staff was sentenced in absentia yesterday to prison over audio recordings critical of him, local media reported.

Nadia Akacha had been a key aide to Saied until she quit in January last year, citing "fundamental differences of opinion" over the national interest.

Some three months later, 11 audio recordings appeared online featuring a woman, purportedly Akacha, relating details from private meetings since the president's July 2021 power grab.

In some, the woman criticised the president and staff members or shared gossip about his inlaws. Akacha has denied being describing them as fakes aiming

to undermine her former boss. Yesterday, a Tunis court sentenced Akacha in absentia to 14 months in jail, local media reported, adding that the sentence was in relation to a suit filed by the president's sister-in-law.

Prosecutors had opened an investigation in May to determine the recordings' authenticity.

Akacha left the country after her resignation. Tunisian media have reported she has since been living in France.

A constitutional lawyer like the president, she was appointed as Saied's legal adviser in late 2019 before becoming his chief of staff in January 2020, travelling widely with him domestically and abroad. Her departure was a blow to Saied six months after he suspended parliament and sacked the government in a shock move against the political system that had emerged from the country's 2011 revolt.

Many Tunisians initially ers have accused him of seeking to reinstall an autocracy in the birthplace of the Arab Spring

Iran hails thaw in Turkiye's ties with Syria

Iran vesterday hailed the resumption of the first direct ministerial talks between Ankara and Damascus since the outbreak of the Syria civil war more than a decade ago, AFP reported from Ankara. Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan refused to recognise

the Syrian leader's rule previously. But Damascus ally Russia managed to arrange the first direct meeting between the Syrian and Turkish defence ministers since 2011 in Moscow

in December. More meetings are tentatively being planned for the coming weeks aimed at paving the way for a landmark peace summit

"We are very pleased by the fact that relations between Damascus and Ankara are undergoing change." "We believe any positive development in relations between Ankara and Damascus will benefit our region and our countries," the Iranian foreign minister said.

Medical shortages add to suffering of cancer patients

li Jabri cradles his sobbing son Ayoub ahead of chemotherapy treatment at Yemen's largest cancer hospital in the capital Sanaa where an eight-year war has led to shortages in life-saving medi-

cine and equipment.

The 12-year-old is one of 81,000 patients registered with the National Oncology Center (NOC) from across Yemen seeking free treatment, which has increasingly been limited by shrinking funds and restrictions on flow of goods in the import-reliant country.

"He is getting worse," said Jabri breaking down in tears as he stood by the bed where Ayoub, who began treatment for neck cancer three years ago, received an intravenous drip.

"The hospital gives the medicines they have but the expensive medicines you have to go and buy them outside...we can't afford these medicines," Jabri said, pleading for help from well-wishers to send his son abroad for treatment.

The NOC in Sanaa is funded by the de facto Houthi authorities in North Yemen.

The internationally recognised government finances two parallel centres in the south where it is based after being ousted by the Houthis from Sanaa in 2014. Jabri, a father of six, ekes out a living as a daily farm hand in the western province of Hodeidah and is able to take his son to Sanaa thanks to charity Al Shafaqa Foundation which is housing and feeding them during the

The foundation is funded by local, Gulf Arab and international charities as well as local businesses. The conflict between a military coalition that intervened in Yemen against the Houthis in 2015 has devastated the economy and basic services including healthcare and left 80% of the popula-

cess treatment abroad. He said the centre listed some 130 cancer drugs as crucial but that only around 50% are available. "Many suppliers are reluctant to submit bids for medicines due to the...lengthy transportation process and the risks and high cost of transportation. tation," he said. NOC's radiotherapy unit has two machines, one of which no longer works. Patient Belal Abdulaziz said he sometimes spends the entire day waiting for his five-minute session. "Why should I wait all day while I am sick?", he said.

The Houthi movement blames the coalition and the sea and air blockade for the shortage of medical and other supplies such as fuel. The movement has faced criticism from humanitarian organisations for impeding humanitarian movement.

Militants launch deadly attack on Somali military base

1 Shebaab launched a deadly attack on a Somali military base yesterday, just a day after the government claimed a "historic victory" over the militants with the capture of a strategic

coastal town. There were conflicting reports about the death toll after the fighters stormed the camp in the town of Hawadley north of the capital Mogadishu.

Army chief Odowaa Yusuf Rage said on national radio that five soldiers including a senior officer had died in the attack claimed by the Al Qaeda-allied militant group.

A clan militia commander near Hawadley, which lies in the central Hirshabelle state, said 11 soldiers had died.

The militants detonated a car packed with explosives outside the camp 60 kilomegunmen stormed the compound, witnesses and security officials said.

Al Shebaab, which controls swathes of countryside in Somalia, claimed responsibility for the attack via its communication channels. In recent months, the army

and local clan militias have retaken chunks of territory from the militants in Galmudug and Hirshabelle states in an operation backed by US air strikes and an African Union force. But despite the gains, Al

Shebaab has demonstrated the ability to strike back with lethal force against civilian and military targets. The Hawadley base had only

been recaptured from Al Shebaab in October last year by the Somali National Army (SNA) and allied militias.

Prime Minister Hamza Abdi Barre on Monday proclaimed a "historic victory" over Al Shebaab after the army took Haradhere in central Galmudug state without a fight.

"The brave members of the national armed forces...have destroyed the enemy of the nation and liberated the strategic port town of Haradhere," he said in a statement.

Haradhere had been a key supply route for Al Shebaab for both people and goods after it seized the port in 2010, dislodging local militias and pirates. Yesterday's attack "demonstrates Al Shebaab's continued ability to produce explosive devices and deploy them within Hirshabelle state, where the offensive originally began", said International Crisis Group's senior analyst for eastern Africa, Omar Mah-

"The group has mounted a number of similar assaults recently, likely an attempt to distract the government by attacking multiple locations," he said in a message. On Satura roadside bombing claimed by Al Shebaab in central Somalia, police said.

Earlier this month, 19 people were killed in twin car bombings in Mahas, a town in Hiran district in Hirshabelle.

Rage said the army had repelled the assault in Hawadley and was pursuing the militants who got away. "Five members of the army were martyred, including a senior military officer," he said, adding that the army had killed 21 Al Shebaab fighters.

Ahmed Mohamud, an SNA military commander in the nearby town of Balcad, said more than 10 people had died, but added that it was not clear how many were soldiers and that the toll was provisional. He said the army was "in full control" of the area.

President Hassan Sheikh Mohamud had declared "allout war" on the militants after taking office in May last year.

Police demolish trader stalls in Congo capital ahead of Pope visit

efore dawn, sanitary police armed with crowbars and a bulldozer set about demolishing makeshift trader stalls crowding downtown streets in the capital of Democratic Republic of Congo ahead of a four-day visit by Pope Francis starting Jan 31.

Officials say Kinshasa, a vast impoverished city of 17mn people, is getting a facelift not just to honour the Pope but to make its streets and pavements more tidy and orderly even after he's gone home.

But evicted small traders protest that their livelihoods are being destroyed in the process.

"The clean-up we are doing just now is not only because the Pope is coming," George Ya Lala, Kinshasa city coordinator for the campaign said, add-

ing the operation would continue even after the Pope went home.

Asked for comment on the evictions of traders, the Apostolic Nunciature,

Vatican's diplomatic representation in Kinshasa, told Reuters in a text message that it was not aware of the cleanup operations and had no part in them.

It said the Vatican had only requested that preparations for Francis' visit be done "in the most sober way. We obviously want the reception sites to be able to accommodate the greatest number of faithful in a secure way and for roads to be secure."

Standing to one side with a swollen face after he fell while scuffling with police in an unsuccessful effort to save his wares, telephone accessories seller David Mbemba, 19, said he had lost around 100,500 Congolese francs (\$50) worth of goods.

Other sellers like Jean Mbuyu said they had lost everything because they had no prior warning of the clean-up. Ya Lala disputed this, saying traders had been warned several times to relocate before the police moved in, leaving a chaotic trail of wreckage as they

smashed stall after stall, with crowds of traders, family and friends watching in dismay. The livelihoods of many families in

Congo depend on the so-called informal sector of the economy - street stalls, kiosks and hawkers selling a cornucopia of items including food and other basic household goods.

"I am a widow. I have to pay my rent, school fees of my children...I will now starve to death," said Marth Kayunga, a vendor in the informal market on one of the side streets off Lumumba Boulevard targeted by the sanitary police brigade.

"We knew this operation was to clean up Lumumba Boulevard ahead of the Pope's visit that we are all waiting for," said Jesus, a hardware shop owner who gave only his first name.

"We are surprised the police are coming into the smaller streets because they told us they were just going to remove debris from the main avenue. It's not fair," he said, adding that his shop was also torn down. A spokesperson for the police said

But Catholic Church priest Father Victor Ntambwe said authorities could have planned better and longer for the occasion. "Did we have to wait for the Pope's visit to do something like this? I'm not sure that we needed to wait for the Pope's arrival to start clearing the avenues and chase away street sellers,"

Ntambwe said.

Japanese firm defends Van Gogh artwork ownership after lawsuit

Iapanese company has defended its ownership of Van Gogh's 'Sunflowers', obtained at auction in 1987, after the family of its former owner filed a US lawsuit demanding its

The artwork - one of five original versions of the famous still life - was purchased by the predecessor of insurance firm Sompo Holdings at Christie's in London for \$40mn, making it briefly the world's most expensive painting.

It has been on display in Tokyo at Sompo's art museum for

35 years, but recently became the subject of a legal battle centred on a previous sale in Germany prior to World War II.

The family of the painting's former owner, Jewish banker Paul von Mendelsohn-Bar-tholdy, filed a lawsuit in Illinois last month demanding the return of the artwork and hundreds of millions of dollars in damages. They say Sompo's predecessor, Yasuda Fire & Marine Insurance, acquired the painting "in reckless disregard of its provenance, including Mendelssohn-Bartholdy's forced sale of the painting in

Nazi Germany in 1934". "Sompo Holdings wrongfully has employed the Painting to reap billions of dollars of unjust enrichment through a sophisticated branding strategy," the lawsuit said.

"Defendants have commercially exploited as a corporate emblem what they long have all but known was a Nazi-tainted artwork."

But Sompo Holdings defended its ownership of the painting in a statement to AFP on Tuesday, saying it "categorically rejects the complaint's allegations of wrongdoing".

The company "intends to vigorously defend its ownership rights in 'Sunflowers'", Sompo

It is not the only artwork that the heirs want returned. They have filed similar lawsuits elsewhere, and in 2020, the National Gallery of Art in Washington, DC returned a Picasso drawing to the

At the height of Japan's bubble economy in the 1980s and 90s, rich business people rushed to buy paintings as investments. Paper tycoon Ryoei Saito also bought a Van Gogh -'Portrait of Dr Gachet' - in 1990 for \$82.5mn. Saito famously sparked outrage when he said he would have his expensive canvases put in his coffin and cremated with him when he died. He later recanted.

'Alarming' rise in Rohingya refugees lost at sea, says UN

The UN decried Tuesday the "alarming" rise in the number of Rohingya refugees lost at sea fleeing their Myanmar homeland or Bangladesh last year, warning more would die without concerted action. More than 3,500 Rohingya attempted sea crossings in 2022, representing a huge increase on the year before, when some 700 people made similar journeys, said UNHCR, the United Nations' refugee agency.

"UNHCR has recorded an alarming rise in the death toll. At least 348 individuals died or went missing at sea in 2022, making it one of the deadliest years since 2014," spokeswoman Shabia Mantoo told reporters in Geneva. She said that 3,040 Rohingya who attempted to flee by sea disembarked last year, primarily in Myanmar, Malaysia, Indonesia and Bangladesh. Nearly 45% of those who did so were women and children.

"Most boats departed from Myanmar and Bangladesh, highlighting the growing sense of desperation amongst Rohingva in those two countries." disembarked report that they Mantoo said calls by UNHCR to search of safety.

Vietnam president resigns amid major anti-graft purge

ietnam President Nguyen Xuan Phuc has resigned, state media said yesterday, after days of rumours he was about to be sacked as part of a major anti-corruption drive that has seen several ministers fired.

The sudden departure is a highly unusual move in communist Vietnam, where political changes are normally carefully orchestrated, with an emphasis on cautious stability. Only one other Communist Party president has ever stepped down, and that was for health reasons.

"The resignation of President Nguyen Xuan Phuc is an unof the party," said Nguyen Khac Giang, research fellow at the Vietnam Centre for Economic and Strategic Studies (VESS). State media said the Communist Party had ruled he was responsible for wrongdoing by senior ministers under him during his 2016-2021 stint as prime minister, before he became president.

Two deputy prime ministers were sacked this month in an anti-corruption purge that has led to the arrest of dozens of officials, with many of the graft allegations relating to deals done as part of Vietnam's Covid

pandemic response. Phuc "took political responsibility as leader when several officials, including two deputy prime ministers and three ministers committed violations and shortcomings, very serious consequences", state news agency VNA said, quoting the party central committee's official statement. Earlier this month, the country's National Assembly removed Pham Binh Minh and Vu Duc Dam from their positions as deputy prime min-

Minh was a minister of foreign affairs while Dam was in charge of the country's handling of the Covid-19 pandemic. At least 100 officials and businesspeople, including Dam's assistant, have been arrested in connection with a scandal involving the distribution of Covid-19 testing kits. Thirty-seven people - many of them senior diplomats and police - have also been arrested in an investigation over the reing the pandemic. After closing its borders to slow the spread of the coronavirus, Vietnam organised nearly 800 charter flights to bring citizens home from 60 countries and territories.

But travellers faced complicated procedures while paying exorbitant airfares and quarantine fees to get back to Vietnam. Phuc. 68, was elevated to the largely ceremonial role of president in April 2021 after winning plaudits for the country's broadly successful handling of the pan-

Authoritarian Vietnam is run

by the Communist Party and officially led by the party general secretary, president and prime minister, with key decisions made by the politburo, which now numbers 16.

Le Hong Hiep, a fellow at the ISEAS-Yusof Ishak Institute in Singapore, said Phuc's resignation may also be linked to political infighting. "It's mainly related to corruption investigations but we cannot rule out the possibility that his political rivals also wanted to remove him from his position for political reasons," he told AFP. Communist Party leader Nguyen Phu Trong, the architect of what is Vietnam's largestever anti-corruption drive, is due to step down in 2026.

"Some politicians will try to get the (top) prize, and because of - in this case Mr Phuc is one of them - they may want to remove him to clear the way for the other candidate to get the top job."

Among the candidates to replace Phuc is To Lam, the current minister of public security, said Hiep, adding that the change would likely not have significant consequences for the direction of the country.

"In Vietnam, policies are made collectively by the politburo so I don't think his departure will lead to major policy changes or any problems with the political

Taiwan to allow women into reservist training for first time

Taiwan's military announced plans yesterday to include women in its reservist training for the first time this year, as the island tries to bolster its forces. Self-ruled, democratic Taiwan

lives under the constant fear of a Chinese invasion, as Beijing claims the island a part of its territory to be taken one day, by force if necessary. China's claims have intensified in recent years under President Xi Jinping, and Russia's invasion of Ukraine has further deepened worries in Taiwan that Beijing might move similarly.

Taipei's defence ministry said it would allow around 200 discharged female soldiers to enrol in voluntary reservist trainings from the second quarter

of this year, as part of efforts to boost the overall back-up force. "This is the first year to include women in the reservists training so this year will be a trial programme," said Major General Yu Wen-cheng from the ministry's All-Out Defence Mobilisation Agency. "We will plan the training capacities according to the number of applicants.'

China's population shrinks for first time in more than 60 years

hina's population shrank last year for the first time in more than six decades, official data showed yesterday, as the birth rate slows in the face of mounting financial pressures and shifting social attitudes.

The world's most populous country is facing a looming demographic crisis as its workforce ages, which analysts warn could stymie economic growth and pile pressure on strained public coffers.

Analysts point to the soaring cost of living - as well as a growing number of women in the workforce and seeking higher education - as reasons behind the slowdown. "Who dares to have kids?" a Shanghai resident in his 30s said yesterday. "The unemployment rate is so high, Covid destroyed everything, there's nothing we can do. Next vear we'll have declining growth again." The mainland Chinese population stood at around 1.411.750.000 at the end of 2022. the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) reported, a decrease of 850,000 from the end of the previous year.

The number of births was

9.56mn, the NBS said, while the number of deaths stood at 10.41mn. The last time China's population declined was in the early 1960s, when the country was battling the worst famine in its modern history, a result of the disastrous Mao Zedong agricultural policy known as the Great Leap Forward. China ended its strict one-child policy

- imposed in the 1980s owing to fears of overpopulation - in 2016 and began allowing couples to have three children in 2021. But that has failed to reverse the demographic decline for a country that has long relied on its vast workforce as a driver of economic growth. "The population will likely trend down from here in coming years," Zhiwei Zhang of Pinpoint Asset Management said. "China cannot rely on the demographic dividend as a structural driver for economic growth," he added. "Economic growth will have to depend more on productivity growth, which is driven by government policies."

The one-child policy meant Chinese people got used to smaller families, Xiujian Peng, a researcher at Australia's University of Victoria, told AFP. And for those who were only children as a result of the policy, "there's a lot of pressure when it comes to tak-

ing care of your parents and improving your quality of life in the future", a young woman in Beijing told AFP. For those who do have children, balancing work and child-rearing can be an impossible task.

"For many women, having a child means that they have to give up on a lot of things they wanted to do," Nancy, a 32-year-old ecommerce worker, explained.

News of the population decline quickly trended on China's heavily censored internet. "Without children, the state and the nation have no future," one comment on the Twitter-like Weibo service read. "Having children is also a social

responsibility," another comment from a well-known "patriotic" influencer read. But others again pointed to the difficulties of raising children in modern China. "I love my mother, I will not be a mother," said one. "No one reflects on why we do not want to have (children) and do not want to get married," another said.

Independent demographer He Yafu also pointed to "the decline in the number of women of childbearing age, which fell by five million per year between 2016 and 2021" - a consequence of the ageing of the population as a reason for the low birth rate. Many local authorities have already launched measures to encourage couples to have children.

The southern megacity of Shenzhen, for example, now offers birth bonuses of up to 10,000 yuan (around \$1,500) and pays allowances until the child is three

But analysts argue much more needs to be done. "A comprehensive policy package that covers childbirth, parenting, and education is needed to reduce the cost of child-raising," researcher Peng told AFP. "Women's job insecurity after giving birth should be addressed particularly."

The Chinese population could decline each year by 1.1% on average, according to a study by the Shanghai Academy of Social Sciences that was updated last year and shared with AFP. China could have only 587mn inhabitants in 2100, less than half of today, according to the most pessimistic projections of that team of demographers. And India is set to dethrone China this year as the most populous country in the world, according to the United Nations. "A declining and ageing population will be a real concern for China," Peng said.

"It will have a profound impact on China's economy from the present through to 2100."

Various factors turn Chinese off parenting

Weary parents in China say the difficulties of juggling work and childcare in a costly and ultra-competitive society with little help from the state are at the root of the country's dwindling birth rate. Beijing reported yesterday that the population shrank last year for the first time in over half a century, deepening a demographic crisis that experts warn could stymie economic growth and pile pressure on public coffers. Local authorities across China have unveiled a series of measures to encourage child-bearing, including monthly stipends of several hundred yuan for new parents and one-off "birth bonuses". But those already with kids told AFP that balancing work in China's cut-throat corporate world with a desire to give their offspring the best in life was dissuading many from having multiple children. "Many households find it extremely difficult to raise one child and can't handle it very well," said Wenjing, a parenting blogger in her late 30s who decried "flimsy" government support. With the pandemic, a lot of households really suffered financially. Under these hard circumstances, many people decided not to have any more kids," she said.

"I think whatever policies released now will be very insubstantial." China ended its draconian one-child policy in 2016 and then in 2021 allowed couples to have up to three children.

Major cities including Beijing and Shanghai have extended maternity leave to up to 158 days, while health authorities last year rolled out guidelines requiring local governments to provide nurseries, albeit for a fee. But many obstacles remain, with no breastfeeding facilities at most workplaces and unmarried women barred from freezing their eggs. A place in a private kindergarten can cost anywhere between 5,000 yuan (\$740) and 20,000 yuan a month in Beijing, according to the Asia Society Policy Institute. Many urban youth also live far from their extended families, cutting off a traditional source of childcare. For Nancy, a young Beijing mother in her early 30s who works in e-commerce, managing work and childcare is a Herculean task. "I can't balance it at all." she told AFP, "If you want to breastfeed the child then you basically have to give up work," she said. "But because of our situation, we cannot give up our jobs." Social expectations about how children should be raised also play a role, she said, with ambitious parents keen to make sure their kids get the best. Women were often forced to choose between the ideal of what good parenting means in modern China and having a career.

UK train drivers announce strike next month in co-ordinated move

London

Thousands of British train drivers will stage a fresh two-day walkout next month over a pay dispute, the country's main transport workers' unions announced yesterday in a co-ordinated move that will cause

further disruption to travel.

The ASLEF union said that roughly 12,500 train drivers will participate in strikes planned for February 1 and 3 after rejecting a pay offer, while the RMT union said that a few hundred of its members at 14 rail operators will be taking industrial action on the same

Railway employees have been strik-

ing regularly since last summer as they seek better pay to cope with rising prices.

Their last round of action during the Christmas holiday season impacted sales at some hospitality firms.

With Britain facing its most serious period of industrial unrest in decades, teachers and 100,000 other public sector workers, including border force

staff, are also due to walk out on February 1 in pay disputes.

Earlier this month, rail industry body the Rail Delivery Group (RDG) said it had offered ASLEF an improved pay offer in exchange for reforms to how the railways are run.

ASLEF general secretary Mick Whelan said yesterday that the proposal was "not and could not ever be acceptable".

"They want to rip up our terms and conditions in return for a real-terms pay cut," he said, adding that the union was willing to engage in further discus-

A spokesperson for the Rail Delivery Group said it was disappointing the offer had not been put to the union's

"Rather than announcing further

unnecessary strikes, we ask ASLEF to recognise the very real financial challenge the industry is facing and work with us to deliver a better railway with a strong long-term future," the spokes-

RMT, which has more than 80,000 members in various transport sectors, also said it will continue its talks with rail operators.

California rainstorm death toll rises to 20

S President Joe Biden will travel to flood-hit areas of California tomorrow, the White House said, as the country's most populous state cleans up from a devastating and lethal series of storms.

Biden will tour storm-hit communities, "survey recovery efforts, and assess what additional federal support is needed". the White House said in a statement on Monday.

Nine successive storms have rolled in from the Pacific Ocean, hitting California and other western regions in three weeks of extreme weather that has cost

The president had already issued an emergency declaration on January 8 to free up federal aid and then on Saturday authorised disaster assistance for Merced, Sacramento and Santa Cruz counties.

The White House has yet to reveal the areas Biden will visit.

A report from the National Weather Service (NWS) for the Bay Area said more than 18" (45cm) of rain have fallen on San Francisco since December 26.

"It's the wettest 22-day period since January 14, 1862," the NWS office said in a tweet.

In the Central Valley, the fertile region that produces 40% of US fruits, Modesto reported more than 1" of rain on Monday, beating an old record set in 1950, and Stockton had 1.2" of rain, surpassing a record set there in 1973, the NWS office in Sacramento tweeted.

The relentless winter storms have largely passed over the state and are now hitting Rocky Mountain and Great Plains states.

An NWS short-range fore-cast said "heavy snowfall" was expected in mountainous parts of Colorado, New Mexico and Utah "through Tuesday before advancing east into the Central Plains" today.

While California is seeing some relief, a new storm system looms off Washington state to the north.

"There will be a new storm system arriving across the Pacific Northwest by Tuesday night and advancing inland by Wednesday," the NWS forecast said. "This will bring a new surge of Pacific moisture and a round of heavy rainfall for especially the coastal ranges and the foothills of the Cascades."

While damaging, the storms also helped mitigate a historic drought, as much of the state has already received half or more its average annual rainfall.

However, with more than two months to go in the rainy season, officials are urging Californians to continue conserving water.

The US Drought Monitor still shows almost the entire state under moderate or severe

drought conditions. Reservoir levels were still below average for this time of year, officials said.

Hundreds of London cops face sacking

undreds of officers in London are likely be sacked for sexual and domestic abuse offences, Britain's most senior police officer said yesterday as he sought to regain public trust after an officer admitted being a serial rapist.

London's Metropolitan Police ("the Met"), which has been rocked by scandals in recent years, was plunged into further crisis after David Carrick, 48, admitted carrying out 24 counts of rape over almost two decades while serving as a police officer while his colleagues missed chances to stop him.

The case follows a series of revelations of serious wrongdoing at the force, Britain's biggest with more than 43,000 officers and staff and responsibility for leading the country's response to terrorism and issues such as extradition.

London Commissioner Mark Rowley, brought in four months ago to lead the clean-up, said that investigations are underway into about 800 officers over 1,000 sexual and domestic abuse

Many jobs will be lost as part of the process, he said.

"I've got tens of thousands of fantastic men and women, but I've got hundreds who shouldn't be here. I'm going to sort it out," Rowley told the BBC yesterday. "We're systematically reviewing every member of police staff and police officer who we have any historic flags against, for being involved in incidents involving domestic abuse or sexual vio-

Public confidence in the Met has been hit by revelations of its culture of corruption, racism and misogyny.

In recent years, one officer was jailed for the rape and murder of a woman that he abducted as she walked home and the courts then ruled heavy-handed policing at a vigil in her honour was un-

A serving officer was convicted of being a member of a neo-Nazi group, two more were jailed for sharing pictures from a crime scene after the murder of two sisters, while an inquiry into one unit found discussions about beating women, with one officer messaging a female colleague to say that he would rape her.

The interior minister, Suella Braverman, told parliament that she was encouraged by the Met's action so far.

"There is still some way to go to ensure that the force can command the trust of the people that it serves," she said. "It is vital that the Metropolitan Police and other forces double down on their efforts to root out corrupt officers. This may mean more shocking cases come to light in the short term."

The Met has been the subject of an independent review since 2021, with initial findings concluding "radical" reform was needed in relation to dealing with allegations of misconduct against officers.

The case of Carrick, one of Britain's most prolific sex offenders who pleaded guilty to 24 counts of rape between 2003

and 2020, prompted questions about the failure to spot what he was doing.

He had previously come to police attention over nine incidents including accusations of harassment, assault and rape between 2000 and 2021 but was not charged with any offence.

Carrick had used his position of power to control and intimidate his victims. telling them that no one would believe their word against that of a serving of-

A day after Carrick's admission, Met Assistant Commissioner Louisa Rolfe said that his case was "sickening and horrific" and had "far-reaching conse-

quences" for policing. "I truly hope to never see its like again," she told an internal disciplinary hearing.

Carrick had been suspended from his job in an armed unit protecting MPs and foreign diplomats since the allegations came to light in late 2021.

Police misconduct hearings are typically held after the conclusion of criminal proceedings against an officer.

However, Carrick's was fast-tracked after his guilty pleas and, unusually, opened to the media given the unprecedented nature of his crimes.

Lawyer Hywel Jenkins, representing Met Police Commissioner Rowley, called Carrick's crimes "heinous, targeted and deliberate".

They have had a "catastrophic" impact on his victims and their families, while also undermining confidence in the police service, he added.

"The public of Greater London expect police officers to uphold the law and protect women from violence," said Rolfe. "PC (police constable) Carrick did the opposite."

Carrick, a former soldier who did not attend the hearing and had no legal representation, was sacked for gross mis-

He will be sentenced in court over two days from February 6.

Two official reports into the Met and other forces in England and Wales concluded that background checks are lax and there is a culture of impunity.

ix people including a six-month-old baby cradled in the arms of her 17-year-old mother were shot dead at a home in California's main agricultural valley on Monday in what authorities called a targeted attack and "horrific massacre".

Tulare County Sheriff Mike Boudreaux linked the killings to the illegal drug trade, saying that deputies had conducted a drugrelated search warrant at the same home last week.

"We believe this was a message being sent," Boudreaux believe that this was a targeted

Two suspects remained at large, he said.

Police said they believed two people attacked the home around 3.30am on Monday, firing multiple shots.

A neighbour called the police, who arrived seven minutes later to find dead and dying people both inside and outside the home.

One victim was alive and wounded when authorities arrived but later died at a hospital, Boudreaux said.

The attacks occurred in Goshen, a farm community of 5,400 people about midway between Los Angeles and San Francisco. The bodies of the infant and

17-year-old mother were located in a ditch outside the home, Boudreaux later told the Los Angeles Times.

Both had gunshot wounds to the head.

Several others were shot in the head, including an elderly

Two women survived by hiding in a trailer on the property.

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Europe avoids energy breakdown, but faces challenges galore

In Europe, mild temperatures, more diversified supplies and efforts to cut consumption have eased much of the pressure unleashed when Russia attacked its neighbour almost a year ago.

If Russia intended to paralyse Europe's energy system by slashing exports of gas to the continent, it hasn't worked for now. Gas inventories are far higher than the last five years' average and prices have recently traded below pre-war levels.

Russia has been one of the world's biggest exporters of gas, and Europe was its top customer. Russian gas used to be attractive to Europe because it was usually cheaper, easy to transport and almost always available.

As coal and nuclear plants across the bloc were shuttered in recent

years, Germany and some other countries became even more reliant on the giant pipelines carrying gas from Siberia. In fact, even before Russia launched its invasion of Ukraine in February 2022, Europe's energy system was under strain. Demand

lockdowns and a long, harsh winter boosted demand for heating.
The result: power prices more than tripled in the second half of
2021. By September 2022, Russia had halted all supplies through a
key pipeline to Germany. The euro tumbled as investors priced in the
expected hit to Europe's economy.

Firstly, by consuming less. As electricity and gas prices rose to at least four times above historical norms, home and business owners cut their energy use to make bills affordable.

The crisis entrenched what French officials called "energy sobriety," with Morgan Stanley forecasting that Europe's gas usage would be about 16% below its five-year average throughout 2023.

Norway supplanted Russia as the region's biggest gas supplier, with exports gaining 8% in 2022.

Looking ahead, the more favourable energy situation is making economists more bullish.

Goldman Sachs and Bank of America recently dropped expectations that the eurozone will suffer a winter recession, saying lower gas prices will probably quicken the retreat in inflation.

Such views were bolstered by data last week showing that Germany's economy probably avoided a contraction in the final three months of 2022.

Despite all the positive cues, the crisis may not be coming to an end. $\,$

Europe got hit by roughly \$1tn (calculated by Bloomberg from market data) from surging energy costs in the fallout of Russia's war in Ukraine, and the deepest crisis in decades is only getting started. After this winter, the region will have to refill gas reserves with little to no deliveries from Russia, intensifying competition for tankers of the fuel.

Even with more facilities to import liquefied natural gas coming online, the market is expected to remain tight until 2026, when additional production capacity from the US to Qatar becomes

The European Union will have to reduce its energy needs to avoid running out of gas next winter, according to the International Energy Agency.

IEA executive director Fatih Birol said that while the EU has made "significant" progress on reducing its reliance on Russian gas, "it is not yet out of danger".

European officials have for long talked about the need to reduce this dependency. But since both sides benefited, and gas delivered by pipeline was often cheaper than other energy sources, little action was taken.

As a matter of fact, Europe's energy policies for long have taken cheap Russian gas for granted. If anything, Europe should learn from its experiences to shape a sustainable energy security policy.

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
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Strengthening S Korea's new strategic posture

Yoon Suk-yeol wants to position it as a pivotal player in maintaining international order

he geopolitical terrain in Northeast Asia is shifting, and, fortunately, the region's two great democracies, Japan and South Korea, are moving in a similar direction. If prudent, strategic leadership prevails in both Tokyo and Seoul, the two countries' historical enmity may finally be consigned to the past, and security across the Indo-Pacific region will be enhanced.

The catalyst for reducing the bilateral diplomatic friction – a problem that dates to the pre-World War II era – was Yoon Suk-yeol's (no relation) inauguration as president of the Republic of Korea last May. With Yoon's arrival in the presidential office, the pursuit of a chimerical "balance" in relations with China and the United States – previously a central focus of South Korea's foreign policy – has given way to a more clear-eyed assessment of the country's security needs.

Russia's invasion of Ukraine was a rude awakening for Yoon, and for many South Koreans across the political spectrum. With China and others effectively backing Russian President Vladimir, the war has called into question the entire international security architecture. Add the mounting North Korean nuclear threat, the intensifying Sino-American rivalry, and the risk that China will mimic Russia's invasion with a similar move against Taiwan, and Yoon had more than enough evidence that South Korean

national security requires closer ties with both the US and Japan.

But while the US and Japan have assumed a more prominent position in the minds of South Korean strategists, Yoon's government has not turned its back on relations with China. On the contrary, his administration remains focused on limiting tensions and securing China's assistance in reining in North Korea's wayward leader, Kim Jong-un. But, unlike his predecessor, Moon Jae-in, Yoon does not think that South Korea needs to create a false sense of distance from the US in order to foster ties with Chinese President Xi Jinping.

For Yoon, recognising South Korea's new national-security needs has meant embracing a more active and outward-looking diplomatic posture. He wants to position South Korea as a pivotal player in maintaining the international order, rather than as a small regional power concerned only with relations on the Korean Peninsula.

One problem for Yoon, whose margin of victory over his more left-wing opponent was just 0.74%, is the level of domestic political support for a major foreign-policy shift.

Given South Korea's winner-takes-all political system, in which presidents are limited to a single five-year term, many worry that any major foreign-policy changes could be summarily reversed as soon as 2027. With the next presidential election not due until then, Yoon has time to secure such a consensus if he works hard at it.

So, as significant as South Korea's strategic reorientation under Yoon

appears to be, it will remain on shaky ground without more formal institutionalisation, both in South Korea and among its allies, particularly Japan and the US. That is why Yoon's government, instead of waiting for Japan to make the first move (as is typical of South Korean diplomacy), has been reaching out and seeking to revive the warm ties that typified the relationship between South Korean President Kim Dae-jung and Japanese Prime Minister Keiz Obuchi from 1998-2000.

One must hope that this effort fruit soon. But the strength of the bilateral relationship ultimately depends on the trilateral relationship between Japan, South Korea, and the US, and there are many more things that these three countries could be doing to deepen their ties. Specialists at a trilateral conference organised by the Mansfield Foundation last summer proposed dozens of policy recommendations. For example, meetings of the three countries' defence and foreign ministers ("2+2+2 summits") could be held regularly to build trust, improve policy coordination, and develop more effective responses to shared risks, such as the security threat posed by North Korea.

Joint trust-building initiatives could also be pursued in strategic research and development sectors such as next-generation semiconductors, aerospace technology, 5G and 6G communications, artificial intelligence, and quantum computing. The US National Science Foundation, the Japanese New Energy and Industrial Technology Development Organisation, and the National Research Foundation

of Korea could all co-ordinate their efforts in these domains.

Equally important are deeper peopleto-people ties among the three countries. For example, exchange programmes – especially for young people, media figures, and other "influencers" – could help to create a shared community and build greater public support for a deepening trilateral alliance.

More broadly, South Korea also will need to strengthen its participation in multilateral institutions and networks, so that it can work with other countries to provide international public goods, mitigate supply-chain problems, and address other global issues. Perhaps the most important body that South Korea should seek to join is the group of Indo-Pacific democracies known as the Quad, comprising Australia, Japan, India, and the US.

While Quad members currently lack the political will to expand, the opportunity to tie South Korea to it should not be missed. South Korea should also actively pursue membership in other vital multilateral international networks such as the G7; US President Joe Biden's Indo-Pacific Economic Framework initiative; the proposed Chip 4 Alliance (US, Japan, South Korea, and Taiwan), intended to strengthen control of and access to semiconductor production: and the Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement for Trans-Pacific Partnership, the vast trans-Pacific trading bloc.

Strong, forward-looking South
Korean and Japanese leadership will be
needed to seize these opportunities, and
to mobilise broader regional and global
networks. But, as is often the case, US
leadership is needed to maintain today's
current momentum.

The 2022 US National Security Strategy calls for investment in US national power and alignment with allies and partners to out-compete China and constrain Russia. But the Biden administration does not yet have an effective plan for uniting allies and like-minded countries behind shared security goals.

One reason for this is the traditional US failure to consider the impact of its domestic policies on its foreign-policy interests. For example, France, South Korea, and others have been complaining loudly about being excluded from new US industrial policies (such as the Inflation Reduction Act's tax credits for US-produced electric vehicles).

While Biden has pledged to address these concerns, he must do so quickly. Alliances, after all, are built on trust. And trust will be the essential ingredient in shaping a security alliance worthy of Asia's great democracies.

Boris Pistorius named new **German defence** minister



NEW ROLE: Boris Pistorius

Chancellor Olaf Scholz yesterday picked little-known Boris Pistorius to be Germany's new defence minister, putting him in charge of steering the armed forces through an era of momentous change.

The appointment follows the resignation of Christine Lambrecht at a crucial time for the ministry, with Germany under intense pressure to send battle tanks to Ukraine. Pistorius, 62, who is a member of Scholz's Social Democrats (SPD) and interior minister of Lower Saxony state, is a surprise choice for the post. Much better-known politicians had been thought to be in the running, such as Eva Hoegl, the parliamentary commissioner on the armed forces, and Labour Minister Hubertus Heil But the chancellor insisted Pistorius was the right man for the job at a time when Germany is looking to overhaul and revive its armed forces in response to Russia's invasion of Ukraine. Scholz called Pistorius "an extremely experienced politician" who "has been involved in security policy for years and, with his competence, assertiveness and big heart, is exactly the right person to lead the Bundeswehr (armed forces) through this era of change". Pistorius himself said he found the appointment "very surprising".

However, he pledged to do his utmost to tackle the "new situation that has arisen with the Russian attack on Ukraine". "The troops can rely on me to be there for them whenever necessary. I want to make the Bundeswehr strong for the time that lies ahead of us," he said. The appointment, which will officially take effect tomorrow. ends a streak of three female defence ministers, and upends a promise by Scholz when he became chancellor in 2021 to Pistorius has a huge task ahead of him at a time of sweeping change for the Bundeswehr and just as Germany faces a crunch moment in its policy towards the conflict in

Dairy giant vows to slash planet-warming methane

French food giant Danone said yesterday it would slash planetwarming methane emissions by 30% by 2030, vowing to change the way the cows it uses are raised and milked. Methane is responsible for

roughly 30% of the global rise in temperatures to date. It is released from the oil and gas. waste and agriculture sectors as well as through natural processes

Cattle farming is a major driver, since cows expel methane by burping. Their manure also releases the harmful gas. Agriculture and livestock generate about 40% of the methane linked to human activities, with the rest coming mainly from the gas sector. Danone said yesterday it would seek to cut its methane emissions by using cow breeds that emit less methane, improving cow diets, prolonging their milking periods and capturing emissions from manure to be used for biogas, for example. "We will see how we can improve practices in general on farms," spokeswoman Jeanette Coombs-Lanot told AFP. It said it would reduce emissions by 30% by the end of the decade compared to 2020 levels. The target covers all fresh dairy products, such as voghurt, made from milk that Danone purchases directly from 58,000 dairy farms in 20 countries. The company's milk production accounts for 70% of the firm's methane emissions.

It does not include powdered formula, which it purchases from third-party intermediaries.

Ukraine ends tower-block search with 20 missing

escuers called off the search yesterday for victims of the Russian missile strike in the city of Dnipro with 20 people still missing and funerals being held in the grief-stricken Ukrainian city.

After the carnage, the Ukrainians pressed ahead with talks to obtain more Western weapons, and Ukraine's army chief Valery Zaluzhny met Mark Milley, Chairman of the US Joint Chiefs of Staff, for the first time in person in Poland.

Ukrainian authorities said yesterday the Russian strike in the eastern city of Dnipro at the weekend killed at least 45 people including six children.

The youngest victim was 11 months

old, officials said. One of the bodies recovered from the

rubble yesterday was that of a child. The toll made Saturday's strike one of the deadliest attacks since Russian President Vladimir Putin invaded Ukraine nearly 11 months ago.

The Kremlin denies responsibility for the strike that also injured 79 people, including 16 children.

In Dnipro, several hundred residents gathered to pay their last respects to Ukrainian boxing coach Mykhaylo Ko-

"He gave many a start in life," said Taras Ivanov, whose son trained with coach Korenovsky.

"This loss has affected our family," the father told AFP, calling Korenovsky a "legend." "Everything inside me is shaking."

Artem Biryukov said Korenovsky was like a "second father" to him. "Thanks to him I became who I am now," he said. Ukrainian leader Volodymyr Zelen-

sky reiterated his pledge that everyone who had "caused this terror" would be found and held to account. Municipal workers clearing out the

partially collapsed Soviet-designed housing block removed more than 9,000 tonnes of construction debris and over 40 damaged cars since the rescue work began on Saturday.

At 1pm, emergency services said the search and rescue operations at the site of the rocket attack were completed.

"Twenty people are still missing," the emergency services said.

In Moscow, a few residents laid flowers in the snow in memory of those killed in the weekend strike, at the monument to the famous Ukrainian poet Lesya Ukrainka.

Kyiv has called for more weapons to defend itself, and at the weekend received pledges of British tanks. Yesterday the head of Ukraine's armed forces, Zaluzhny, said he had met Milley, the top US general, for the first time in person in Poland.


"I outlined the urgent needs of the armed forces of Ukraine," he said.

"They discussed the unprovoked and ongoing Russian invasion of Ukraine and exchanged perspectives and assessments," said Joint Staff spokesperson Dave Butler.

"The chairman reaffirmed unwavering support for Ukraine's sovereignty and territorial integrity."

Germany announced on January 5 that it was following the United States in sending one of the advanced missile defence batteries to Ukraine.

Sharif makes conditional talks offer to India

akistan Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif has made a conditional offer to his Indian counterpart to open talks on all outstanding issues between them, including disputed Kashmir, which he believes could be facilitated by the United Arab Emirates (UAE).

"My message to the Indian leadership and Prime Minister Narendra Modi is let's sit down at the table and have serious and sincere talks to resolve our burning issues, like Kashmir," Sharif said in an interview with Al Arabiya news channel, telecast by Pakistan's state run TV vesterday.

However, a statement issued by Sharif's office after the interview aired added that such talks would only be possible if India restored the autonomous status in the part of Kashmir it rules that was revoked in 2019. "Without India's revocation of this step, negotiations are not possible," it said. The Indian foreign affairs ministry did not immediately respond to a request for comment. New Delhi has ignored such calls from

Pakistan on Kashmir's status in the past. In the interview, Sharif said he had taken up the issue with UAE President Sheikh Mohamed bin Zaved on his recent visit to the Emirates.

"He's a brother of Pakistan. He also has good relations with India. He can play a very impornt role to bring the two countries on the talking table," Sharif said.

The two nuclear powers have fought three wars since independence from British rule in 1947. Two of the wars were over Kashmir, a disputed Himalayan region, which both the nations claim. Each controls half of the region.

The two neighbours came close to war again in 2019, when India launched an air strike inside Pakistan to target what New Delhi said was a militant training facility. Pakistan retaliated with a strike of its own after capturing an Indian air force pilot when his jet crashed, but released him as a gesture of goodwill.

Tensions were again inflamed when India unilaterally revoked the autonomous status of its part of Kashmir later in 2019, which Sharif said resulted in "flagrant" human rights violations.

India has faced a decades-long insurgency in its part of Kashmir which is accuses Pakistan of stoking - an accusation Islamabad denies.

Official talks between the two countries have been suspended since then.

EU takes on US, China over clean tech in Davos

The EU's chief announced ambitious plans yesterday to challenge China and the United States in the race for clean-tech industries, as a battle over green trade emerged at the World Economic Forum (WEF).

European Commission President Ürsula von der Leyen slammed what she described as "aggressive attempts" to convince Europe's clean technology operations to relocate to China through cheap labour and more lenient regulations.

"China heavily subsidies its industry and restricts access to its market for EU companies." she said, warning that the EU tigate such aid that distorts the

"We want to cooperate, we want to work together, climate change needs a global approach, but it has to be a fair approach and a level-playing field," she told the world's global political and business elite at the annual meeting in the Swiss Alpine village of Davos.

She also renewed European concerns over the US Inflation Reduction Act, a climate subsidy package worth around \$370bn, though she said both sides have been working to find "solutions" that could include allowing EU-made electric cars to benefit from the act.

"Our aim should be to avoid disruptions in transatlan-

tic trade and investment. We should work towards ensuring that our respective incentive programmes are fair and mutually reinforcing," she said.

The week-long forum is taking place under the theme of "cooperation in a fragmented world" as the planet faces a perfect storm of crises - Russia's invasion of Ukraine, soaring inflation, the spectre of recession and climate catastrophes.

But tensions between world powers still emerged at the meetings in Davos.

Speaking after Von der Leyen, Chinese Vice-Premier Liu He called for an end to "Cold War mentality" and repeated Beijing's opposition to "unilateralism and protectionism".

At a separate panel discussion, US climate envoy John countri ing about the Inflation Reduction Act should instead try to imitate the United States.

"The reaction of other countries shouldn't be, 'oh my God, you shouldn't be doing that, that's putting us in an unfair position? Do it, too," he said.

"Everybody's got to do the same thing to accelerate this process even more," Kerry added.

Von der Leven announced projects to step up European efforts to build clean energies key to the world's aspirational goal of limiting global warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius.

The plans include a "sovereignty fund" to boost research, innovation and strategic industrial projects in efforts to achieve net-zero emissions.

She also said a "Net Zero Industry Act" would be proposed to focus investment on strategic projects along the entire supply chain.

"Those who develop and manufacture the technology that will be the foundation of tomorrow's economy will have the greatest competitive edge," she said.

"To get ahead of the competition we need to keep investing in strengthening our industrial base and making Europe more investment and innovation friendly," the EU chief added.

But she also called for cooperation between "like-minder partners", from the United States to Ukraine, to form a "critical raw materials club" in order to slash Europe's dependence on China for the rare earths technology such as electric car batteries.

The war in Ukraine remained a key topic of discussion at the

Ukrainian ministers, military leaders, mayors and soldiers form one of the largest national delegations as Kyiv lobbies for more weapons and financial support from the West.

German Chancellor Scholz, who is set to appear in person today in Davos, faced public pressure from his EU partners to authorise the export of German-made Leopard tanks to Ukraine.

"I like to play chess. You have to take the move and others will follow," Lithuanian President Gitanas Nauseda told delegates.

How Italian mafia hunters captured fugitive boss

etrayed by his cancer, Italy's most wanted fugitive, Sicilian mobster Matteo Messina Denaro, has been caught after 30 years on the run. Here's how the mafia hunters tightened the net.

Wiretaps

Investigators looking for mass murderer Messina Denaro had been combing the Sicilian countryside for possible hideouts for years, arresting those believed to be protecting him and slowly reducing the circle of people he could trust.

Members of his family and his friends were then heard on wiretapped conversations discussing the medical problems of an unnamed person who suffered from cancer, as well as eye problems.

Detectives were sure they were talking about Messina Denaro, 60, who was believed to have undergone an eye operation in the 1990s.

"We had unequivocal information that the fugitive had health problems... that he was attending a health facility in order to treat his illness," special operations commander Pasquale Angelosanto told a press conference Monday.

"So we worked to identify... those who had access to treatment for the suspected pathologies," he said.

National database

Investigators knew Messina Denaro would be going under a false identity, but they used a national health system database to search for male patients of the right age and medical his-

"We were narrowing down the list, ticking people off, until we had only a few individuals left," Angelosanto said.

"A few days ago we identified someone who had booked a specialist visit" for Monday" at the Maddalena health facility in

The man had booked in as

Andrea Bonafede, the nephew of a close friend of Messina Denaro's father, Italian media reported.

Bonafede's medical record showed he had been to an ophthalmologist for problems with his left eye, the Open online newspaper said.

He had also undergone two operations for colon cancer, one in 2020 and another in 2022, it said. But when detectives dug further, they found Bonafede appeared to have been in two places at once.

Council surveillance footage from his hometown of Campobello di Mazara on the date in question in 2022 showed the real Bonafede out walking the dog at the moment he was allegedly under the knife.

Special ops

When the man going by the name of Bonafede booked an appointment for Monday at the upscale Palermo clinic, police readied a task force of 150 special ops to capture him.

Footage released by police later showed him arriving with his face barely visible underneath a hat, Covid-19 mask and tinted glasses.

Once he had checked in at the clinic they locked down the surrounding area and began checking the identity of everyone present.

Unaware of the closing net, the so-called Bonafede, dressed in his brown leather jacket with a fleece lining, lined up for the centre's obligatory Covid-19 nose swab, before heading back outside, perhaps to get a coffee, the Corriere della Sera said.

He likely realised then what was going on.

When asked "who are you?" by a law enforcement officer, the Cosa Nostra boss replied:

"You know who I am. Matteo Messina Denaro".

The doctor

Palermo's chief prosecutor Paolo Guido said Messina Denaro may have been undergoing treatment for serious illnesses, but he "appeared to be in good health. He didn't look

fragile or in difficulty to us". He may thank his doctor Alfonso Tumbarello, who is now being investigated by police.

He had been treating Messina Denaro as Bonafede, despite having been the real Bonafede's doctor for years, according to the Messaggero daily.
