Swiatek to headline Qatar TotalEnergies Open

he Qatar TotalEnergies Open will return with a bang with nine out of the world's top ten players confirmed to participate in the 2023 edition to be held at the Khalifa International Tennis and Squash Complex in Doha from February 13 to 18.

Of the world's top ten superstars, only the World No. 6 Maria Sakkari of Greece is unlikely to be in action in the \$780,637 total prize-money event.

The World No. 1 and defending champion Iga Swiatek of Poland leads the star cast of 56 players for the singles and 28 pairs for the doubles events of the 21st edition of the WTA 500 tournament.

Swiatek defeated Estonia's Anett Kontaveit in straight sets last year to lift the Golden Falcon trophy for the first time in her career in Doha.

The 21-year-old Warsaw-born player, who went on to add two Grand Slams (French Open and US Open) to her trophy cabinet after the victory in Doha, besides wins at Indian Wells, Miami, Stuttgart, Rome, and San Diego; in what was her best year so far on the tour, will be joined by super stars including Ons Jabeur, Jessica Peluga, Caroline Garcia, Aryna Sabalenka, Coco Gauff, Daria Kasatkina, Veronika Kudermetova, and Belinda Bencic to give tennis fans in Qatar and the

For World No. 2 Ons Jabeur, the highest-ranked African and Arab tennis player in WTA and ATP history, a victory in Doha will not only cement her legendary status in the region, but will also ensure the tournament has an Arabian or African winner for the first time in its history – a record many people are looking forward to.

region a treat of a lifetime.

The 28-year-old Tunisian narrowly missed out twice on having a Grand Slam crown on her head last year, having suffered disappointing defeats at Wimbledon and at the US Open.

While all eyes will be on the top-ten stars as the favourites, two-time winner Petra Kvitova will also be waiting in the wings with the expectation of making history of her own as the first player to lift the coveted trophy

Of the four lucky players who have been two-time champions in Doha, namely Anastasia Myskina, Maria Sharapova, Victoria Azarenka, and Petra Kvitova, only the 32-year-old Kvitova and Belarussian Azarenka remain in contention to break the record and make history.

While Kvitova is one of the confirmed players for the main draw. Azarenka, on the other hand, is on the alternate players list at this year's edition.

Tournament Director Saad al-Mohannadi said: "It is a great privilege to have almost all the top players confirmed for the Qatar TotalEnergies Open once

again. Their desire to be a part of this tournament is a further confirmation of the reputation it has garnered over the years, the recognition of the organisation, and the maximum attention to detail everyone involved in the tournament has always put into

"We appreciate TotalEnergies, the title sponsor, and all our other supporters for their commitments over the years in always making this tournament a great

"This year's edition is unique in that it is the first major tournament to be hosted by Qatar after the grand success of the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022. We believe the world will witness an amazing event just like they did at Qatar 2022 and we can't wait to host the stars," he added.

The Oatar TotalEnergies Open 2023 is the 21st edition of the annual tennis tournament that has grown to become one of the main signature events on the Qatar sporting calendar.

Nketiah last-minute winner sees Arsenal go past United

HAALAND SCORES FOUR HAT-TRICKS IN 19 PREMIER LEAGUE APPEARANCES AS MANCHESTER CITY TAME WOLVES

Nketiah's last minute winner earned Arsenal a thrilling 3-2 victory over Manchester United to move five points clear at the top of the Premier League yesterday after Erling Haaland's hat-trick fired Manchester City to a 3-0 victory over Wolves.

The Gunners remain on course for a first title in 19 years with a game in hand over City.

"That's really significant. It's something we can be proud of but we have to stay humble," Saka told Sky Sports of Arsenal's

"It's only halfway through the season and things can change very quickly. But if we keep playing like we have then we'll be in a good place at the end of the season. We just have to keep it up."

Mikel Arteta's men were forced to come from behind at the Emirates after Marcus Rashford's thunderous strike opened the scoring with his ninth goal since the World Cup break.

Arsenal levelled within seven minutes as Nketiah's powerful header rounded off a brilliant

Bukayo Saka's long-range effort that arrowed into the bottom corner put the home side in front early in the second half.

This time United bounced straight back when Lisandro Martinez, who had been a target for Arsenal before arriving at Old Trafford in July, headed in a loose ball from a corner.

Erik ten Hag's men were penned inside their own box for much of the final quarter as the post denied Saka a second and

Arsenal's pressure finally got its reward when Nketiah flicked home Martin Odegaard's shot and the goal survived a VAR check for offside.

A first defeat in 11 games realistically ends any hope of United's first title in a decade as they slip 11 points behind Arsenal in fourth, having played a game

Haaland's fourth hat-trick in 19 Premier League appearances had briefly cut Arsenal's lead at the top to two points as Pep Guardiola got the reaction he wanted from the defending champions.

Guardiola questioned his players hunger to retain the title after Thursday's 4-2 win over Tottenham.

Haaland is the one major difference to Guardiola's previous title-winning sides in England and the Norwegian silenced any doubts over whether City are a stronger force without a recognised striker.

The 22-year-old's scoring rate has slowed marginally in recent weeks, but his header from Kevin De Bruyne's cross moved him level with the 23 league

goals that saw Mohamed Salah and Son Heung-min share the Golden Boot with last season.

Haaland then took his tally to 30 goals in all competitions from the penalty spot early in the second half after Ilkay Gundogan had been upended by Ruben Neves.

Wolves then gifted Haaland his hat-trick four minutes later as goalkeeper Jose Sa presented the ball to Riyad Mahrez, who unselfishly squared for his teammate to roll into an unguarded

"The numbers are incredible," said Guardiola.

France's Perez holds on to claim Abu Dhabi title

51-year-old Padraig Harrington finished solo in fourth place at 16 under par

ctor Perez endured nail-biting drama over the closing stretch of the Abu Dhabi Championship, before edging a one-shot

The 30-year-old Frenchman holed out his bunker shot on the par-3 17th hole in remarkable fashion to get to 19-under, before visiting the fairway bunker and making a bogey on the par-5 18th hole at Yas Links Abu Dhabi.

Perez finally closed with a six-under par 66 for an overall total of 18-under par

Australia's Min Woo Lee paid the price of a bogey on the 17th hole when he He almost holed out his third shot for an eagle on the 18th which could have forced

However, his ball rolled back towards the pin and stopped agonisingly close. The birdie saw him finish on 68 and in tied-second place alongside Sweden's Sebastian Soderberg (67).

Ireland's 51-year-old Padraig Harrington, who was trying to become the oldest winner on the European Tour, was in solo fourth place at 16-under par. He started his round with a bogey, but made seven birdies in his round after that.

The win was Perez's third on the tour in 91 starts and moves him to the top of the European Tour rankings with 1,335 points. He is likely to climb to 60th place in the world, up from 117th.

"It feels fantastic," said an emotional Perez.

"I thought you always need a bit of fortune and there's always the deciding shots coming down the stretch that can make or break. To hole that bunker shot on 17 is probably going to be a highlight.

"I was just trying to fly the ball all the way to the hole and if it came up a bit heavy, it was probably going to release down to the hole and probably have an 8-footer for par. I was expecting Sebastian to hole his putt for birdie.

"In my head, I was going best case scenario, probably one ahead or tied going into the last hole, but I come up with a two-shot lead, which is always massive.

"The other person is going to have to do something great and you're going to have to do something poor to lose a twoshot lead.

"I almost did, but thankfully, a six was enough."

Italy's Francesco Molinari (71) and Sweden's Alex Noren (68) were tied for the fifth place at 14-under.

The European Tour next moves down the road to Dubai for the Dubai Desert Classic, a second Rolex Series event in successive weeks. World number one Rory McIlroy is scheduled to play the tournament at Emirates Golf Club.

Vine wins Tour Down Under after finishing second to Yates in final stage

ustralia's Jay Vine claimed his first World Tour victory in the Tour Down Under yesterday, with Britain's Simon Yates winning a thrilling uphill battle to take the race's final stage.

Yates (Team Jayco-AlUla) gave one final lung-busting effort to overtake Vine at the Mount Lofty finish for his first-ever victory in Australia, denying Vine from winning a stage at this year's

Vine (UAE Team Emirates) capped an outstanding week after keeping close to his only serious rival for the ochre leader's jersey in the hard slog up to the finish, sealing his win in the final general classification. Vine won the World Tour TDU

at his first attempt and contin-

ued his rise to prominence in world professional cycling after winning two stages at the Vuelta a Espana last year. "It's incredible to stand here wearing this winner's jersey,"

Vine said. was first-class, the team were incredible with their support all week, and I am so happy to be able to finish it off today. It's so

satisfying." Vine described a "hectic" race, where the team "had to be on our toes all day".

Yates, the 2018 Vuelta a Espana winner, rolled the dice with 1.7km to go, and Ben O'Connor (AG2R Citroen Team) and Vine tacked on the end of the threeman breakaway in the dash to the

Yates was forced to do all the work with one kilometre left and made another concerted effort to get away before Vine set sail for the stage win, only to be collared near the line by the dogged Englishman.

Yates said his team had come to the race "with a lot of ambition".

"We didn't walk away with the overall, but we can be really happy with the stage. 'Second overall was the best

I could do, today was our last chance and we took it... Jay Vine is a massive talent and I'm sure that won't be the last we see of

Yates pulled back four seconds on Vine in the final stage to finish 11 seconds behind overall, with Spain's Pello Bilbao (Bahrain Victorious) third on 27 seconds.

American Magnus Sheffield (Ineos Grenadiers) finished in the lead bunch to secure fourth overall, 57 seconds down, and came away from a consistent week as the winner of the Young Rider's jersey classification.

Spain's Rahm shares PGA American Express lead with rookie Thompson

orld number four Jon Rahm, chasing his second US PGA Tour title in as many weeks, shares the lead with rookie Davis Thompson heading into the final round of the American Express Tournament.

Fourth-ranked Spaniard Rahm sounded supremely confident after firing an eagle and six birdies on Saturday in a seven-under par 65 to pull level with overnight leader Thompson on 23-under

193 at La Quinta, California. Thompson, a former amateur standout at the University of Georgia and a winner on the Korn Ferry developmental tour, carded a five-under par 67 to keep himself squarely in the hunt for a first PGA Tour title.

"Nothing but positive. That's all I can say," said former US Open champion Rahm, who won this title in 2018.

"Ball striking felt amazing. Hit a lot of great shots out there off the tee. Giving myself a lot of opportunities with the irons. Took

advantage of quite a few of them." Even some difficulties on the greens coming in - most notably a three-putt bogey at the par-three 17th - didn't dampen Rahm's confidence, although he said he knew another low score would be needed on the Stadium Course, where the final round will be held after the first three rounds were spread over three Rahm, who opened 2023 with a come-from-behind victory in the Tournament of Champions in Hawaii this month, walked off the 18th with the lead, even though he couldn't get a 12-foot birdie putt to drop at the last.

He had expected Thompson, who piled up a US tour recordequalling five eagles over the first two rounds - to regain the top

But the 23-year-old American, who had five birdies in his first 12 holes but dropped out of a tie for the lead with a bogey at the 14th, found only one more birdie coming in - rolling in a four-footer at the 16th at the Stadium Course.

"I was really proud with how I stayed patient," Thompson said after the third round.

"I didn't really force anything.

Made a bad bogey on 14, but came back and birdied 16, so it was a good way to finish."

Thompson acknowledged he was still getting used to the three-course format, which requires studying more courses and has the cut come after 54 holes. "It's definitely different," he

"I just try to have an aggressive mindset and try to go hit some good shots."

Thompson said he was looking forward to going up against Rahm, testing the nerves he has already honed in junior golf, amateurs and on the Korn Ferry

"Now it's on one of the biggest stages," he said.

The leading duo were four strokes clear of JT Poston and South African Christian Bezuidenhout. Bezuidenhout had 10 birdies in his 10-under 62 and Poston carded a six-under 66 to join him on 197.

Another four players shared fifth on 198.

That included American Harry Higgs, who had 12 birdies and a double-bogey in his 62 on the Nicklaus Tournament course.

Second-ranked champion Scottie Scheffler, who could finish as low as solo ninth and still supplant Rory McIlroy atop the world rankings, carded a six-under par 66 that left him tied for tied for ninth on 17-under 199.

American Dylan Wu joined the group of six on 199 with an 11-under par 61 that featured 11 birdies on the Nicklaus course.

Top seed Swiatek crashes out as Tsitsipas survives

Major winners Rybakina, Ostapenko, Azarenka advance; Gauff leaves in tears after defeat while Pegula gets through

op seed Iga Swiatek was bundled out of the Australian Open fourth round yesterday, with title threat Coco Gauff also exiting in tears, as a pair of underestimated Grand Slam champions tore open the women's draw.

Third seed Stefanos Tsitsipas avoided a similar fate by claiming a thrilling 6-4 6-4 3-6 4-6 6-3 win over Italian Jannik Sinner and keep his dreams of a maiden Grand Slam title alive.

"It was a long match. I feel like I've spent a century on this court," Tsitsipas said of the contest, which lasted just over four hours. "It was a ripper, as they say here. I can feel my face burning from the effort today."

World number one Swiatek was sent packing by Elena Rybakina in the early match at Rod Laver Arena, the Pole falling 6-4 6-4 to the Kazak Wimbledon winner who started her tournament in the Melbourne Park wilderness of Court 13.

Rybakina shrugged off the scheduling snub before the fourth round showdown but used it as fuel in her first appearance on centre court as a tightly wound Swiatek slowly unravelled. "I felt the pressure, and I felt that I don't want to lose instead of I want to win," said Swiatek, who dominated last season with two Grand Slam wins.

"I felt like I took a step back in terms of how I approach these tournaments, and I maybe wanted it a little bit too hard."

The result means this year's Australian Open will be the first Grand Slam tournament in the open era where the top two seeds in both the men's and women's singles draws have lost prior to the quarter-finals.

Rybakina, the 22nd seed, might have expected to face Gauff in the quarter-finals but the muchhyped American teenager was upset 7-5 6-3 by Jelena Ostapenko, the forgotten Grand Slam winner of women's tennis.

The 2017 French Open champion thrashed 30 winners past Gauff on Margaret Court Arena, her last two sealing the match in style to leave the 18-year-old in tears at her post-match media conference.

"I feel like it was rough," Gauff told reporters, before breaking down with emotion. "When you play a player like her and she plays really well, it's like, you know, there's nothing you can

The win secured a first Aus-

tralian Open quarter-final for hard-hitting Ostapenko, as well as the first at a major since her run to the Wimbledon semi-finals in 2018.

Latvia's first - and only -

Grand Slam champion stunned the world when she hoisted the trophy at Roland Garros as an unseeded 20-year-old.

She has had mostly lean years since but never doubted she would return to the spotlight

"My life changed a lot (after the 2017 French Open), so I needed a few years to really get used to what happened because I was really young," she said.

"I always knew and believed in my game. If I play well, I can beat almost anyone."

At a tournament fast running out of star power, unheralded Czech Jiri Lehecka landed another blow for the lesser lights as he toppled Canadian sixth seed Felix Auger-Aliassime 4-6 6-3 7-6(2) 7-6(3) in the men's tournament.

The 21-year-old next plays Tsitsipas, seeking revenge for a loss to the Greek in the Rotterdam semi-finals last year.

"He'll know what my strengths "He'll feel I can get him under

pressure," Lehecka said.

While Lehecka was a bolt from the blue, big things have been expected of Sebastian Korda for some time and the young American is finally delivering on expectations at Melbourne Park.

He took another step towards emulating his Australian Openwinning father Petr by booking

his first Grand Slam quarter-final with a 3-6 6-3 6-2 1-6 7-6 (10-7) win over Hubert Hurkacz at Rod Laver Arena.

Korda, whose father won the 1998 title under the Czech flag, showed impressive composure as Polish 10th seed Hurkacz roared back to level the fifth set tiebreak at 7-7 by winning four consecutive points.

Korda held firm, closing it out with a backhand winner to set up a clash with Russian 18th seed Karen Khachanov.

"It feels awesome. I was not feeling too much energy towards the fourth and fifth sets but you guys picked me up," the 29th seed told the crowd.

Khachanov had a much easier passage, hammering Japan's Yoshihito Nishioka 6-0 6-0 7-6(4) at John Cain Arena.

The Russian has now reached the quarter-finals at all four Grand Slams.

"Obviously, yeah, that gives me some kind of compliments on what I achieve so far, and I'm just happy to do it.

"Hopefully I can continue even further on even bigger things," he

While the high seeds have tumbled, American Jessica Pegula has been rock solid and reached her third consecutive quarter-final at Melbourne Park by beating Czech 20th seed Barbora Krejcikova 7-5 6-2.

Third seed Pegula will face 24th-seeded twice champion Victoria Azarenka, who fought back from a set down to beat Zhu Lin 4-6 6-1 6-4 and end the Chinese star's impressive run.

Zhu, who beat sixth seed Maria Sakkari in the last round, started well and broke the 2012 and 2013 champion in the opening game before allowing her back, only to pull away from 3-3.

With the first set in the bag, world number 87 Zhu then came

Injured hamstring is major headache for Djokovic in De Minaur test



ovak Djokovic is on track for a recordextending 10th Australian Open title but question marks remain over his fitness ahead of today's fourthround clash with Alex de Minaur as his injured left hamstring continues to cause problems.

Fourth seed Djokovic defeated Grigor Dimitrov in straight sets in the third round but fears about the durability of his injured hamstring only grew as the Serbian once again struggled.

All eyes will be on the bandages that drape the left hamstring when the 35-year-old takes on home favourite De Minaur who, like Djokovic, has dropped one set in Melbourne so far.

"It's really difficult to say with Novak exactly what's happening physically. He's getting the job done, he certainly doesn't look like he's (100) percent," seventimes Grand Slam champion John McEnroe told Eurosport.

Asked if De Minaur could cause issues for Djokovic's injured hamstring, McEnroe added: "De Minaur is someone potentially (who could do that) because he relies on speed and grit and making an opponent work. The type of guy that could cause Novak problems if he's not 100 percent."

Before Djokovic takes on De Minaur, fifth seed Andrey Rublev will play Danish teenager Holger Rune as the Russian bids to reach the quarter-finals at the seasonopening major for the second time in three years.

Rublev, 25, believes ninth seed Rune will not be the underdog in their contest, with the Dane a dark horse at the tournament following his Paris Masters final victory over Djokovic in Novem-

In the other matches, Spanish 24th seed Roberto Bautista Agut

will face American Tommy Paul looking to equal his best result in Melbourne, having reached the quarter-finals in 2019, while Ben Shelton will play JJ Wolf in an all-American clash.

Shelton will be competing in the last 16 of a Grand Slam for the first time in his career - a remarkable achievement for the 20-year-old who a year ago was No. 569 in the ATP Rankings and still in college.

In the women's draw, last year's WTA Finals champion Caroline Garcia will bid for her maiden last-eight berth at the tournament when she comes up against Magda Linette, the last remaining Pole after Iga Swiatek and Hubert Hurkacz exited yes-

Big-hitting Belarusian Aryna Sabalenka, seeded fifth, will aim to stretch her undefeated start to the season against Swiss 12th seed Belinda Bencic, who is also in solid form with a seven-match winning streak.

Czech 17-year-old Linda Fruhvirtova, the youngest woman left in the draw, will play Croatian Donna Vekic for a place in the quarter-finals as she looks to maintain her fairytale run, while former world number one Karolina Pliskova takes on Zhang Sh-

orussia Dortmund clinched a 4-3 thriller at home against Augsburg yesterday as Sebastien Haller returned to the team after battling testicular cancer. Dortmund took the lead three times, only

for Augsburg to equalise, exploiting the home side's disorganised defence. Dortmund manager Edin Terzic brought on Jamie Bynoe-Gittens and Gio Reyna in the 70th minute, with both wingers scoring goals to help carry their team to victory.

Speaking after the match, Terzic praised his team's resilience in a "wild, chaotic match. I'm happy we still won the game with all the setbacks... The positive thing is that we fought

Augsburg equalised in stoppage time, Ermedin Demirovic chipping over Dortmund 'keeper Gregor Kobel for his sixth goal of the campaign. Haller came off the bench in the 61st minute to rapturous applause from the home and away fans, his first competitive appearance since May 2022.

With the game drifting towards more dropped points for the home side, Bynoe-Gittens and Reyna were introduced.
