HMC warns against  
e-cigarette smoking

Dr Ahmad al-Mulla, Senior Consultant, Disease Control and Director of Hamad Medical Corporation (HMC)'s Tobacco Control Centre, a World Health Organisation Collaborating Centre, has warned against 'electronic smoking' such as e-cigarettes and e-hookahs.

These items are illegal to market and sell in Qatar under Law No 10 issued in 2016. Dr al-Mulla said smoke coming out of electronic cigarette smoking contains toxic and chemical substances that may cause harm to users.

"Electronic cigarette smoking is not an alternative way to quit smoking, has no scientific references and is not approved as a smoking cessation aid by the US Food and Drug Administration," Dr al-Mulla said. "Allowing electronic cigarette smoking in some countries resulted in negative consequences such as an increased prevalence of smoking in the community especially among younger age groups."

HMC's Tobacco Control Centre continues to monitor global studies and research on this type of smoking as well as experiences in other countries. According to Dr al-Mulla, studies conducted by the Tobacco Control Centre at HMC, the prevalence of electronic cigarette use among tobacco users in Qatar is around 11%.

Dr Jamal Ba Suhai, tobacco cessation specialist said that users thought electronic cigarette smoking is either a safe alternative to traditional smoking or an easier way to quit smoking.

"However in our experience, users suffered from many problems, including increased consumption. This is because electronic cigarettes

are easier to use and enable a higher intake of toxic nicotine and other chemical substances," Dr Ba Suhai said.

Electronic cigarette smokers also complained of many problems such as infections in the mouth, gum, teeth, respiratory tract and pains in the heart and chest.

"The possibility of severe lung infection associated with this kind of smoking is high as well as nicotine acute poisoning in children and lithium battery explosions," he said. "Some used electronic smoking to add other addictive substances which led to deaths in some younger smokers according to the United States Centers for Disease Control."

Dr Ba Suhai advised people who wish to quit smoking to seek help at HMC's Tobacco Control Centre to receive medications that are proven to be safe as well as counselling and support from the highly trained team.

'Qatar's economy can withstand any recession'

The Qatari economy can withstand any expected recession in the West, whose impact would extend to other parts of the world, President of the US-Qatari Business Council (USQBC) Scott Taylor has affirmed. Taylor said that with suitable energy prices and a dynamic economy, Qatar is strong enough to withstand the recession that may occur, which also provides a huge opportunity to invest in companies, real estate, or other investments.

Speaking to Qatar News Agency (QNA), he said Qatari investors will be able to invest capital and reap profits through low-cost deals that will bring them a lot of returns when the world gets out of the potential recess.

Taylor pointed out: "Clearly the LNG expansion is not only a massive driver of the economy for this country, but also for business between the United States and Qatar as well.

The president of USQBC said that there are a lot

of lessons learned in this World Cup that benefit Mexico, Canada, and the United States — the host countries of the 2026 World Cup.

Taylor said: "I think one of the biggest things that we can learn from Qatar is the fact that you illustrated and showcased your culture so well surrounding the World Cup and we could certainly learn from you and learn from that and those conversations are ongoing."

# Georgetown initiative wins two Telly Awards

An innovative teaching tool using virtual reality that was developed by instructors at Qatar Foundation (QF) partner Georgetown University in Qatar (GU-Q) for a course titled *The Sociological Imagination in the 21st Century* has been recognised with two prestigious awards from the international television and video industry.

Garnering Telly Awards in both the immersive and mixed reality categories, an educational 360° virtual reality (VR) documentary produced by course instructor Dr Christine

Schiwietz and academic librarian Robert Laws transported students to the university’s Washington, DC, campus to explore social justice.

“Our vision aspired to leverage the capabilities of VR to create an immersive teaching and learning experience for students at Georgetown’s Qatar campus,” said Dr Schiwietz. “We wanted them to feel more connected to this important initiative despite the geographical distance to the DC campus.”

“Virtual reality takes ‘global’ experiential learning to a whole new level,” she added.

The innovative educational approach of VR storytelling required capturing original footage using a 360° camera, mixed with interviews with scholars, historical artefacts from the Georgetown University archives in DC, music from famous African-American composers, video footage of Washington, DC, and narration.

The resulting footage was viewed through virtual reality headsets.

Students were then able to explore the narrative scenes, to feel like they were actually there in person and connect

their virtual experience to the traditional reading materials assigned in class.

Technical support for the project was provided by Laws, who said: “We embraced the emerging technologies of virtual and mixed reality and produced a final film that immersed students into the locations and debates surrounding the important issue of social justice.”

“Students gained important digital literacy skills through this experience and for many it was the first time they used a VR headset for an educational purpose,” he added.

Dr Schiwietz and Laws say they hope to explore and expand on the use of virtual reality in future projects and immersive storytelling as part of the university’s commitment to promoting social justice through education.

Established in 1979, the Telly Awards are judged by the Telly Awards Judging Council, an industry body of more than 200 leading experts, including personnel from advertising agencies, production companies and major television networks, reflective of the multiscreen industry.

## Youths learn game coding at workshop held by Studio 5/6

Young learners from Qatar have learned the foundations of coding during an experiential tech workshop held by Studio 5/6 - a Fab Lab established by the Ministry of Communications and Information Technology - as part of the Doha Learning Days festival organised by Qatar Foundation (QF)’s global education think tank WISE.

During the interactive workshop, Grade 5 students from SEK International School programmed and created their own arcade games using written codes, which they then installed - with the help of Studio 5/6 tech instructors - in physical game consoles to practically test and try all their features.

Highlighting the importance of learning coding skills, Sabine El Kahi, a project manager at Studio 5/6, which is participating in Doha Learning Days for the second time, said: “At the beginning of the tech revolution, we were bombarded with final products that were so cool to have and play with. And we ended up becoming a community where technology is sold to us to consume.”

“By teaching youth how to code and build the products they wish to have, we are introducing technology in that case as a tool to develop their own solutions,” she said. “In this way, we move from consumer behaviour to being more productive societies.”

“Coding also teaches analytical skills, troubleshooting and critical thinking while students collaborate, support each other and communicate,” El Kahi added. “All these skills are important for us to live as humans together to solve the daily challenges we have, either in technology or not.”



Speaking about on how the informal learning setting benefits students, Zaid Abusini, an edu-tech engineer at Studio 5/6 and the instructor of the workshop, said: “When children are engaged in a learning activity outside the classroom, it takes them out of their routine and comfort zone.”

“It offers them a challenge that makes them start to ask questions, investigate, and even compete, which all gives dopamine to the mind,” he added.

At the end of the workshop, students competed against each other using the games they had created.

“I’m so happy I had the chance to attend the coding workshop, as it allowed me to understand more about coding and using new tools, which will help me develop the Lego exhibition I’m currently working on at school,” said student Zaid Hossam Samara.

Another participant, Khaled Badr, was mostly inspired by the fun and interactive setup of the workshop, saying: “In a classroom, we usually do research and tasks by ourselves. What I liked in this workshop is how we got to learn something new, while communicating with each other.”

This year’s edition of Doha Learning Days centred around youth empowerment and featured interactive workshops and practice-based informal learning activities focusing on career development, financial literacy, tech skills, well-being and the arts.

## MoECC stresses importance of preserving local environment

The Ministry of Environment and Climate Change (MoECC) has stressed the need to preserve the local environment by keeping it clean and protected, in line with the civilised conduct that characterises the Qatari people.

## Nigeria tests voter accreditation ahead of this month’s elections

Nigeria’s electoral commission yesterday staged mock biometric accreditation for voters ahead of this month’s presidential and parliamentary elections. Nigerians go to the polls on February 25 to elect a successor to President Muhammadu Buhari who steps down after the maximum constitutionally-permissible two terms in office. State governors and lawmakers will be elected two weeks later. Nigeria, Africa’s most populous nation and biggest economy, has a long history of electoral malpractice, fraud and violence. Buhari, a 79-year-old former general, has promised free and fair elections. To promote fairness, credibility and transparency of the electoral process, the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) introduced a voter accreditation system at 2015 and

2019 polls. But the system was plagued with shortcomings. Yesterday, INEC held a mock voter accreditation process in selected polling stations nationwide to test the system’s operation. In Lagos, the commercial capital and Nigeria’s largest city, the exercise was staged in a handful of polling stations. Excited voters presented their poll cards and had their bio-

metrics taken by INEC officials who said they hoped the test would improve preparations for the general elections. Former Lagos governor Bola Ahmed Tinubu of the ruling All Progressives Congress, ex-vice president Atiku Abubakar of the main opposition Peoples Democratic Party and ex-governor of southeastern Anambra state Peter Obi of Labour Party are the frontrunners.

# Iran criticises N-watchdog chief after centrifuge report

Iran slammed UN nuclear watchdog chief Rafael Grossi after the agency raised concerns over covert changes to equipment at its Fordo uranium enrichment plant, state media said yesterday. The criticism of Grossi comes after the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) director-general said he plans to visit Tehran in February for talks on getting it to increase co-operation over its activities, amid stalled negotiations to revive a landmark deal over Iran’s nuclear programme.

The IAEA said in a confidential report seen by AFP on Wednesday that Iran had substantially modified an interconnection between two centrifuge clusters enriching uranium to up to 60% at Fordo Fuel Enrichment Plant (FFEP), without giving prior notice. Iran said later an inspector had “inadvertently” reported the changes, and that Grossi had issued the report despite the matter being resolved – a response that the United States and its allies criticised as “inadequate”. “We gave a letter to the agency that an inspector...made a mistake and gave an incorrect report,” Mohamed Eslami, the

head of the Atomic Energy Organisation of Iran, was quoted as saying by state news agency IRNA. “But yet again the director-general of the agency released this issue to the media,” he said, labelling it “unprofessional and unacceptable” behaviour. “We hope that this practice will not be continued...because this is not acceptable for his reputation and the agency.” The IAEA had said that during an unannounced Fordo inspection on January 21 it found “two IR-6 centrifuge cascades...were interconnected in a way that was substantially different from the mode of operation declared by Iran to the

agency”. Since late last year, the two cascades had been used to produce uranium enriched to up to 60%, the report to member states added. In the report, Grossi expressed concern that Iran had “implemented a substantial change in the design information of FFEP in relation to the production of high enriched uranium without informing the agency in advance”. In a statement on Friday, the United States, Britain, France and Germany said Iran’s response to the report was “inadequate”. “Iranian claims that this action was carried out in error are inadequate,” they said. “We judge Iran’s actions

based on the impartial and objective reports of the IAEA, not Iran’s purported intent.” Grossi told the European Parliament on January 24 that he plans to visit Tehran this month “for a much-needed political dialogue, or reestablishment thereof, with Iran”. The IAEA chief noted the “big, big impasse” on the Iran nuclear deal, formally known as the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action. The deal with world powers collapsed after the United States withdrew from it in 2018 under former president Donald Trump. Negotiations that started in April 2021 to revive the agreement have since stalled.

## Pope meets victims of war on South Sudan peace pilgrimage

Pope Francis yesterday urged South Sudan’s leaders to restore “dignity” to the millions of their countrymen affected by conflict, renewing a forceful appeal for peace in the strife-torn nation. On the second day of his visit to South Sudan, a nation that has been at war for around half its existence, Francis heard from children who have spent much of their lives on the run from violence. The 86-year-old pontiff has been pushing South Sudan’s leaders to heal divisions for the sake of a nation traumatised by the legacy of a five-year civil war that left 380,000 people dead. A ceasefire was struck, but peace has eluded the world’s newest nation, and Francis, who tried to broker peace between the rival parties, finds South Sudan beset with violence and despair. Yesterday, Francis told a gathering in Juba of hundreds of people displaced by conflict that they deserved a better future. “Sadly, in this war-torn country, being a displaced person or a refugee has become a common and collective experience,” he said. “I want to renew my forceful and heartfelt appeal to end all conflict and to resume the peace process in a serious way, so that violence can end and people can return to living in dignity.” There are 2.2mn internally displaced people (IDPs) living in South Sudan, and another 2mn outside the country. It is the worst refugee cri-

sis in Africa. Those displaced in South Sudan live in overcrowded, squalid and underfunded camps under the protection of the United Nations, too fearful to venture out, or with nowhere left to return. Francis said there was “no room for further delay” in achieving peace for all in South Sudan, with children being born every day in these camps. “They have no memory of what it means to have a home; they are losing their connection with their native land, their roots and their traditions,” he said, describing them as “the seed of a new South Sudan”. “The future cannot lie in refugee camps,” he said to applause. John Wiyual, who has lived at a sprawling IDP camp outside Juba since 2014, said he did not trust government assurances that the country was safe. “They say there is peace – but there is killing in all states,” the 42-year-old said. “The Pope can listen to us. We are citizens, and we need peace.” Around 50,000 people turned up for a joint prayer yesterday evening by Francis, the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, who are also on the trip. The Pope will wrap up his trip today with a mass expected to be joined by thousands of people at the John Garang mausoleum – built in honour of South Sudan’s rebel hero who died in 2005. At his first event yesterday, the wheelchair-bound Pope met South Sudan’s religious leaders, who work with the poor and marginalised and are deeply respected in the devout country.

## Two killed in attack on Ethiopian church

Two young Orthodox Christians were killed in an attack on a church in southern Ethiopia yesterday, according to a report by a religious media outlet. The incident comes against a backdrop of tensions in the ancient Ethiopian Orthodox Tewahedo Church after rebel bishops created their own synod in Oromia, the country’s most populous region. Abune Henok, Archbishop of Addis Ababa Diocese, described the attack in the city of Shashamene as “shameful and

heartwrenching”, according to the Church-affiliated Tewahedo Media Center (TMC). It said two people had been killed, and another four had sustained heavy injuries, accusing security forces of carrying out the assault in the Oromia city that lies about 250 kilometres south of Addis Ababa. It was not possible to independently verify the report. Abune Henok called on the authorities in Oromia, also the largest geographic region in Ethiopia, to stop the “persecution” of Orthodox Christians, according to the TMC. The unity of the Church is under threat after the move by the rebel clergy last month.

## Ethiopia govt says sending funds to cash-strapped Tigray

The Ethiopian government said yesterday it is sending the equivalent of more than \$90mn to Tigray’s capital as it starts to restore banking services to the war-battered region. The announcement by Ethiopian Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed’s national security adviser Redwan Hussein came a day after a landmark meeting between government and Tigrayan officials to discuss the status of the peace process. “As per the decision passed by PM Abiy, National Bank has begun sending \$bn Birr to Mekele to be dispensed starting Monday,” Redwan said on Twitter. Redwan also said that as of yesterday, the national carrier Ethiopian Airlines was increasing its flights to the region to five a day from three. On Friday, Abiy held his first face-to-face meeting with leaders of the Tigray People’s Liberation Front (TPLF) since a peace deal was agreed in November to end two years of devastating conflict in northern Ethiopia. Under the terms of the pact,

the TPLF agreed to disarm and re-establish the authority of the federal government in return for the restoration of access to Tigray, which was largely cut off from the outside world during the war. Since the deal, there has been some resumption of aid deliveries to Tigray, which has long faced dire shortages of food, fuel, cash and medicines. The war that erupted in November 2020 has displaced more than 2mn people and left millions more in need of humanitarian aid, while the US has put the number of dead at as many as 500,000.

# East African leaders hold summit on DR Congo unrest

East African leaders were holding a regional summit in Burundi yesterday to discuss ways of calming the raging conflict in eastern DR Congo. The talks are hosted by the seven-nation East Africa Community, which is leading mediation efforts to end the fighting in the restive east of the giant central African nation. A resurgent rebel group known as the M23 has taken swathes of land in the mineral-rich region and is still advancing despite a peace roadmap reached in the Angolan capital in July last year. Among those at the meeting in the lakeside economic hub of Bujumbura are Congo-

lese President Felix Tshisekedi and President Paul Kagame of Rwanda, which is accused of backing M23 in a conflict that has exacerbated regional tensions. EAC chair and Burundi President Evariste Ndayishimiye said on Twitter the meeting would evaluate the situation with “a view of coming up with decisions that will ameliorate the security situation & facilitate the restoration of peace and security in eastern DRC”. The Congolese presidency said the Luanda roadmap demanded the “effective and definitive withdrawal” of M23 and Rwanda Defence Force troops from occupied zones before January 15. “The terrorist troops from M23 have never left these zones, on the contrary the M23 and its allies have expanded their areas of occupation,” it

said on Facebook. Kagame is on his first visit to Burundi since 2013, with relations long frayed between the Great Lakes neighbours. The EAC meeting is taking place shortly after a visit by Pope Francis to Kinshasa, where he met victims of the conflict and condemned the “inhuman violence” and “brutal atrocities” taking place. Militias have plagued the mineral-rich region for decades, many of them a legacy of regional wars that flared during the 1990s and the early 2000s. Since November 2021, the M23 has seized chunks of territory in the east and come within kilometres of its main commercial hub Goma. The EAC decided to create a military force to pacify eastern Congo last year, with the first

troops arriving in Goma in November. The DRC’s accusations that Rwanda is backing the M23 has been supported by UN experts, the United States and other Western countries but Kigali denies the charge. Tensions between the two countries were inflamed last week when Rwandan forces opened fire at a Congolese fighter jet they said had violated Rwandan airspace. Kinshasa described it as an attack that amounted to “an act of war”. The summit also signals a possible rapprochement between Burundi and Rwanda, with their two leaders greeting each other warmly in Bujumbura. In 2020, Kagame urged the then newly-elected Ndayishimiye to reset diplomatic ties but his overture was rejected as “hypocritical”.

In a statement ahead of the EAC summit, Kenya’s President William Ruto said the international community needed to act to protect Congo’s resources, a key source of the myriad conflicts. “The moment is long overdue for the international community to most vigilantly audit industrial supply chains and make sure that global production and consumption honour Congolese resource sovereignty and do not profit out of conflict and human suffering,” he said. The DRC is awash with minerals and precious stones, from gold, diamonds and coltan to tin, copper and cobalt. But the decades of war and chronic mismanagement means that little of the enormous wealth trickles down to the population of some 100mn people.

## Asean chair Indonesia to intensify talks on code for South China Sea

Indonesia plans to intensify talks with China and other Southeast Asian countries to finalise a code of conduct (COC) for the disputed South China Sea, its foreign minister said yesterday, amid escalating tensions in the strategic waterway.

Foreign Minister Retno Marsudi was speaking in Jakarta at the close of a meeting between foreign ministers from the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (Asean), the 10-member regional bloc chaired by Indonesia this year.

“Asean’s outlook on the Indo-Pacific was central to the discussion,” she said. “We also discussed about the COC, the commitment of members to conclude the negotiation of the COC as soon as possible.”

Negotiations on the COC – a proposed framework to help tackle territorial and maritime disputes in the waterway – have stalled for years as some members states prioritised bilateral ties with China over a regional consensus.

Indonesia is preparing to host a round of negotiations on the COC this year, the first taking place in March, the foreign minister said.

China claims jurisdiction over almost the entire South China Sea based on its U-shaped “nine-dash line”, a boundary found to have no legal basis by the Permanent Court of Arbitration in the Hague in 2016.

Earlier this week, the Philippines granted the United States greater access to its military bases, in part due to Beijing’s extensive claims in the resource-rich maritime area.

Asean members – the Philippines, Vietnam, Malaysia and Brunei – all have overlapping claims with China in the strategic waterway.

Indonesia is not an official claimant but has faced pushback from China over its exploration of oil and gas reserves in the North Natuna Sea.

Last month the country sent a warship to the area to monitor a lingering Chinese coast guard vessel.

“New approaches” would be explored by all Asean member states and Chinese counterparts to make progress on the COC, Sidharto R Suryodipuro, director of Asean co-operation at Indonesia’s foreign ministry, said on the sidelines of the event.

“What’s important is that all agree that this should be an outlook that is implementable and in accordance with international law,” he said.

## Asean urges Myanmar junta to implement peace plan

Southeast Asian ministers at the end of two-day talks in Indonesia yesterday urged Myanmar’s junta to implement a five-point peace plan agreed two years ago to create a path towards ending the country’s political crisis. Indonesia – Southeast Asia’s biggest economy – is the chair of the 10-member Association of Southeast Asian Nations (Asean) for 2023 and will host the bloc’s annual leaders’ meetings later this year.

However, the ministerial meeting in Jakarta has been overshadowed by the situation in Myanmar, which has been in turmoil since the army seized power in February 2021.

Indonesian Foreign Minister Retno Marsudi said Jakarta proposed an implementation plan to Asean members for the “five-point consensus” (5PC) agreed with the junta in April 2021 that called for an end to violence and dialogue between the military and rebels.

“Broad support was received from all member states to this plan,” she told reporters at the end of talks, without providing details of when and how they hoped the agreement would be implemented.

“This plan is very important for Asean, in particular the chair, as a guidance to address the situation in Myanmar in a united manner,” Marsudi said. “It shows a strong unity of Asean members to implement the 5PC.” – **AFP**

# US media, politicians using balloon incident ‘as pretext to smear China’

## US says second Chinese balloon detected over Latin America

Beijing said yesterday that US media and politicians had taken advantage of US allegations that China flew a balloon – what Beijing calls a “civilian airship” – over the northwest United States as “a pretext to attack and smear China”.

The discovery of the balloon prompted US Secretary of State Antony Blinken on Friday to cancel a rare planned trip to Beijing.

Moments before the decision to scrap the visit – aimed at easing tensions between the two countries – China issued a rare statement of regret and blamed winds for pushing the “civilian airship” into US airspace.

Yesterday China’s foreign ministry released another statement addressing Blinken’s announcement.

“China ... never violated the territory and airspace of any sovereign country,” it said. “Some politicians and media in the United States used the (balloon) incident as a pretext to attack and smear China.”

The ministry said maintaining communication channels at all levels is

important, “especially in dealing with some unexpected situations in a calm and reliable manner”.

The statement further added with regards to Blinken’s trip, which was to have begun today and had been widely publicised in the United States: “As a matter of fact, neither China nor the United States has announced any visit. It is the United States’ own decision to release the relevant information and we respect that.”

The Chinese balloon was tracked flying across the United States in what Washington called a “clear violation” of US sovereignty.

Military leaders considered shooting down the high-altitude balloon on Wednesday but eventually recommended against this to President Joe Biden because of the safety risk from debris, officials said.

The Pentagon said on Friday that another Chinese balloon was observed over Latin America, without saying where exactly.

“We are seeing reports of a balloon transiting Latin America. We now assess (that) it is another surveillance balloon,” Pentagon spokesman Brigadier-General Patrick Ryder said.

White House spokesperson Karine

Jean-Pierre said Biden was briefed on Tuesday about the balloon flight over the United States and there was an administration “consensus that it was not appropriate to travel to the People’s Republic of China at this time”.

China expressed regret that an “airship” used for civilian meteorological and other scientific purposes had strayed into US airspace.

Jean-Pierre said the US administration was aware of China’s statement “but the presence of this balloon in our airspace, it is a clear violation of our sovereignty as well as international law. It is unacceptable this occurred”.

On Friday, Ryder, the Pentagon spokesman, said the balloon had changed course and was floating eastward about 60,000’ (18,300m) above the central United States and demonstrating a capability to manoeuvre.

He said that it would likely be over the country for a few more days.

Commercial forecaster AccuWeather said the balloon would potentially leave the United States and move over the Atlantic this weekend.

The Pentagon’s disclosure about the balloon’s manoeuvrability directly challenges China’s assertion about it being blown off course.

At a news conference with South Korea’s visiting foreign minister on Friday, Blinken said he had told Wang Yi, director of China’s Central Commission for

Foreign Affairs, that the incident on the eve of his trip was an “irresponsible act” by China, but Washington remained committed to engagement and he would visit when conditions allowed.

Blinken said he would not put a date on when he might go to China and the focus was on resolving the current incident.

“The first step is ... getting the surveillance asset out of our air space,” he said, adding that Washington would maintain open lines of communication with China.

According to Chinese state news agency Xinhua, Wang said yesterday that he and Blinken discussed the incident “in a calm and professional manner”.

“China is a responsible country and has always strictly abided by international law,” Xinhua quoted Wang as telling Blinken.

“We do not accept any groundless speculation and hype,” he said, calling both sides to “avoid misjudgments and manage divergence”.

The Republican chairman of the House of Representatives Foreign Affairs Committee, Michael McCaul, meanwhile said that the balloon should never have been allowed in US airspace and could have been shot down over water.

The postponing of Blinken’s trip, which had been agreed to in November

by Biden and Chinese President Xi Jinping, is a blow to those who saw it as an overdue opportunity to stabilise an increasingly fractious relationship.

The last visit by a US secretary of state was in 2017.

China is keen for a stable US relationship so it can focus on its economy, battered by the now-abandoned zero-Covid-19 policy and neglected by foreign investors alarmed by what they see as a return of state intervention in the market.

In recent months Chinese leader Xi has met world leaders, seeking to re-establish ties and settle disagreements.

The Pentagon’s Ryder told reporters on Thursday that the balloon was at an altitude well above commercial air traffic and did not present a military or physical threat to people on the ground.

One US official added that it was assessed to have “limited additive value from an intelligence collection perspective”.

Another official said on Thursday the flight path would carry the balloon over a number of sensitive sites, but did not give details.

Malmstrom Air Force Base in Montana is home to 150 intercontinental ballistic missile silos.

China has often complained about surveillance by the United States, including its deployment of ships or planes near Chinese military exercises.

## Shark kills teenager in Western Australia

A shark killed a 16-year-old girl yesterday after she apparently jumped into a river in Western Australia to swim near a pod of dolphins, officials said.

The girl was bitten by an unknown species of shark during an outing with friends on the Swan River in the Perth suburb of North Fremantle, state government and police officials said.

She was pulled from the water but died from her injuries at the scene after efforts to revive her failed, said Paul Robinson, acting police inspector for the Fremantle district.

“It’s very early on, what we’re being advised is that she was with friends on the river,” he told a news conference. “They were on jet skis. Possibly a pod of dolphins were being seen nearby and the young female jumped in to swim nearby the dolphins.”

Describing it as a “very, very traumatic incident”, Robinson said the family of the girl, who was from Perth, was “absolutely devastated by the news”.

Experts had advised that it was unusual for sharks to be found in that part of the river, he said.

The state government warned people to take “additional caution” in the Swan River since a 13-year-old boy was killed in January 1923 in the Perth suburb of Claremont, according to reports at the time and a database run by Taronga Conservation Society.

It was the first fatal shark attack in the Swan River since a 13-year-old boy was killed in January 1923 in the Perth suburb of Claremont, according to reports at the time and a database run by Taronga Conservation Society.

during Easter Sunday services in 2019 killed 279 people.

Rights groups say that up to 40,000 civilians were killed in the final weeks of the decades-long civil war during an army assault that crushed the remnants of the Tamil Tigers leadership.

Sri Lanka has resisted international calls for a probe into war crimes allegations and later governments have been accused of abetting continued discrimination against the island’s Tamil minority.

Kalansooriya said Sri Lanka had yet to heal the wounds from the long conflict and its political leaders had failed to bring reconciliation.

“We needed a Mandela in Sri Lanka,” he said, “but what happened in the aftermath was entirely different.”

## Sri Lanka weighs ‘failures’ on independence milestone

Sri Lanka marked 75 years since independence with a sombre military parade yesterday, as its president urged reflection on past “errors and failures” at a time of national crisis.

Since the 1948 end of British rule, the island nation has spent much of its history at war with itself, including a decades-long Tamil separatist rebellion that claimed up to 100,000 lives and two deadly communist insurgencies.

Its 22mn people are also still reeling from the hardships triggered by an unprecedented economic collapse last year that brought months of food and fuel shortages.

President Ranil Wickremesinghe, who took office last July at the peak of the resulting political unrest, said that yesterday’s anniversary came at “an extremely critical and challenging time”.

“It presents an opportunity for us not only to review our strengths and gains as a nation but also to rectify our errors and failures,” he said in a statement.

Wickremesinghe, flanked by top military brass, watched the hour-long procession of soldiers and army vehicles along a seafront promenade in the capital Colombo, inaugurated by ceremonial artillery fire but boycotted by opposition parties.

For several months last year the boulevard was the site of a protest encampment erected by Sri Lankans outraged over the island’s economic calamity and

mismanagement by its leaders.

The protest movement peaked in July when a massive crowd stormed the residence of Wickremesinghe’s predecessor and chased him into temporary exile, from where he issued his resignation.

Wickremesinghe ordered security forces to dismantle the camp hours after he was sworn into office and has since set about repairing Sri Lanka’s ruined finances.

His government has hiked taxes and is negotiating with international creditors including India and China to clear the way for an urgently needed International Monetary Fund (IMF) bailout.

“I am confident that even at this juncture we will pool our energies ... to rise up from the current economic abyss

and build back stronger,” Wickremesinghe’s statement said.

However, the impact of the crisis is still being acutely felt, with Wickremesinghe saying last week that the economy had contracted by up to 11% in 2022.

“Sri Lanka is a bankrupt nation, so we have to start from zero now,” political analyst Ranga Kalansooriya told AFP ahead of the independence anniversary.

The economic collapse is the latest of several calamities that have pockmarked Sri Lanka’s history since independence.

Nearly 31,000 people were killed when the 2004 Boxing Day tsunami struck the tropical nation’s coastline.

# Fed may resort to few more hikes before interest rate hold

The US central bank Federal Reserve delivered a 25bps or 0.25% expected interest rate hike on February 1, but the debate has now turned to when Fed will stop rate hikes.

Many economists say the global financial system is closer to see the end of the tightening cycle, but there will likely be an extended pause in policy before rates are cut next year.

Fed Chair Jerome Powell, however noted more evidence of ebbing inflation was needed before the tightening cycle could see an end.

The rate hikes imposed by the Fed since March last year have now totalled 4.5 percentage points, with the policy rate now in a range between 4.50% and 4.75%, the highest since 2007.

That is reflected in an array of consumer borrowing costs from home mortgages to car loans around the world.

In announcing its latest policy decision, the US central bank scaled back to a quarter-percentage-point rate increase after a year of larger hikes and swept aside in its statement the long list of reasons, from war to the pandemic, that were driving prices

And when asked about the easing in conditions in financial markets – which could make it hard for the central bank to curb high inflation – he didn't sound particularly alarmed.

Fed officials have been undertaking the most aggressive tightening campaign since the 1980s to quell the strongest inflation in a generation.

The 25 basis-point move they delivered on February 1 was moderation from a half-point hike in December and four jumbo-sized 75 basis point increases prior to that.

Bloomberg Economics said: "Soft inflation data in recent months haven't been convincing enough for the Fed to consider pausing its rate-hike campaign just yet."

By continuing to refer to "ongoing" rate hikes, the Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) is hinting that they expect at least another two 25-basis point hikes, affirming their view of a terminal rate at 5.25.

The Fed's favourite gauge slowed to a year-on-year rate of 5% in December from 7% in June. Bloomberg says policymakers will have at least two more months of inflation data and two more updates on the labour market before they meet again in March, and at least one more month of reports before they meet in May.

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# Preempting a generative Artificial Intel monopoly

Originally a nonprofit, OpenAI is now a for-profit corporation valued at \$29bn. While it has pledged to cap its profits, its loose-fitting structure limits investors' returns to 10,000%

ChatGPT, the new artificial intelligence (AI) chatbot developed by the San Francisco-based research laboratory OpenAI, has taken the world by storm. Already hailed as a milestone in the evolution of so-called large language models (LLMs), the world's most famous generative AI raises important questions about who controls this nascent market and whether these powerful technologies serve the public interest.

OpenAI's release of ChatGPT last November quickly became a global sensation, attracting millions of users and allegedly killing the student essay. It is able to answer questions in conversational English (along with some other languages) and perform other tasks, such as writing computer code.

The answers that ChatGPT provides are fluent and compelling. Despite its facility for language, however, it can sometimes make mistakes or generate factual falsehoods, a phenomenon known among AI researchers as "hallucination."

The fear of fabricated references has recently led several scientific journals to ban or restrict the use of ChatGPT and similar tools in academic papers. But while the chatbot might struggle with fact-checking, it is seemingly less prone to error when it comes to programming and can easily write efficient and elegant code.

For all its flaws, ChatGPT obviously represents a major technological breakthrough, which is why Microsoft recently announced a "multiyear, multibillion-dollar investment" in OpenAI, reportedly amounting to \$10bn, on top of the \$1bn it had already committed to the company. Originally a nonprofit, OpenAI is now a for-profit corporation valued at \$29bn. While it has pledged to cap its profits, its loose-fitting structure limits investors' returns to 10,000%.

ChatGPT is powered by a GPT-3, a powerful LLM trained on vast amounts of text to generate natural-sounding, human-like answers. While it is currently the world's most celebrated generative AI, other Big Tech companies such as Google and Meta have been developing their own versions. While it is still unclear how these chatbots will be monetised, a paid version of ChatGPT is reportedly forthcoming, with OpenAI projecting \$1bn in revenues by 2024.

To be sure, bad actors could abuse these tools for various illicit schemes, such as sophisticated online scams or writing malware. But the technology's prospective applications, from coding to protein discovery, offer cause for optimism. McKinsey, for example, estimates that 50-60% of companies have already incorporated AI-powered tools like chatbots into their operations. By expanding the use of LLMs, companies could improve efficiency and productivity.

But the massive, immensely costly, and rapidly increasing computing power

needed to train and maintain generative AI tools represents a substantial barrier to entry that could lead to market concentration. The potential for monopolisation, together with the risk of abuse, underscores the urgent need for policymakers to consider the implications of this technological breakthrough.

Fortunately, competition authorities in the United States and elsewhere seem to be aware of these risks. The United Kingdom's communications regulator, Ofcom, launched an investigation of the cloud computing market, on which all large AI models rely, late last year, while the US Federal Trade Commission is currently investigating Amazon Web Services (AWS), which, along with Google and Microsoft Azure, dominates the market. These investigations could have far-reaching implications for AI-powered services, which rely on enormous economies of scale.

But it is not clear what, if anything, policymakers should do. On one hand, if regulators do nothing, the generative-AI market could end up dominated by one or two companies, like every digital market before it. On the other hand, the emergence of open-source LLMs, such as the text-to-image tool Stable Diffusion, could ensure that the market remains competitive without further intervention.

Even if for-profit models become dominant, however, open-source competitors could chip away at their market share, just as Mozilla's Firefox did to Google's Chrome browser and Android did to Apple's mobile

operating system, iOS. Then again, cloud computing giants like AWS and Microsoft Azure could also leverage generative AI products to increase their market power.

As was debated at the recent World Economic Forum meeting in Davos, generative AI is too powerful and potentially transformative to leave its fate in the hands of a few dominant companies. But while there is a clear demand for regulatory intervention, the accelerated pace of technological advance leaves governments at a huge disadvantage.

To ensure that the public interest is represented at the technological frontier, the world needs a public alternative to for-profit LLMs. Democratic governments could form a multilateral body that would develop means to prevent fakery, trolling, and other online harms, like a CERN for generative AI. Alternatively, they could establish a publicly-funded competitor with a different business model and incentives to foster competition between the two models.

Whichever path global policymakers choose, standing in place is not an option. It is abundantly clear that leaving it to the market to decide how these powerful technologies are used, and by whom, is a very risky proposition. — Project Syndicate

# From presidential palace to KFC: Bolsonaro’s peculiar exile in the US

He used to preside over Latin America’s largest country and its 214mn people. Now Brazil’s former far-right leader lives in a small Florida town and eats alone in a fast-food restaurant.

Bolsonaro, 67, has found an unusual refuge in the United States, where he arrived in late December, several days before his supporters stormed government buildings in Brasilia in an attempt to overturn the election victory of his rival, leftist Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva.

At home, Bolsonaro is being investigated over his alleged in-

volvement in the unrest, which he denies.

From the lavish presidential palace, Bolsonaro, a political soulmate of former US president Donald Trump, went on to live in a small community of nearly identical houses near the Disney World resort.

In his first six weeks in the United States, Bolsonaro has kept a low profile, staying at the Orlando home of Brazilian former martial arts champion Jose Aldo, making a trip to a local supermarket and being photographed eating fried chicken alone at a KFC fast-food restaurant.

On Friday, the man who until recently commanded huge crowds in his home country, spoke to some 400 supporters

during an event organised by the American conservative organisation Turning Point USA at the Trump National hotel in the city of Doral, near Miami.

It was unclear if Trump himself played any part in organising the event.

**‘More popular than ever’**

The meeting had the vibe of an election rally. Bolsonaro spoke passionately about fulfilling his duties to his country – except that the man dubbed the ‘Trump of the Tropics’ was in Florida, several thousand miles away from his homeland.

“There is no greater satisfaction than that of having fulfilled a duty,” Bolsonaro said of his presidency. He spoke before an

audience dressed in elegant suits and dresses as well as the yellow-and-green shirts of the Brazilian soccer team.

Three days earlier, Bolsonaro spoke in the ballroom of a shopping mall restaurant in Orlando at an event put together by the Brazilian expatriate community in Florida.

Bolsonaro, who had repeatedly cast doubt on Lula’s narrow victory in an October 30 runoff, again questioned his election loss, calling himself “more popular than ever.”

“Many people are still shaken by what happened in the elections.... But we will face this moment and, God willing, we will win together,” he said.

But Bolsonaro added that he

regretted “what some inconsistent people did” during the unrest.

The crowd was welcoming at both Florida events, with supporters hugging and taking selfies with him and cheering him on.

**What next?**

Bolsonaro faces an uncertain future.

After publicly declaring his intention to return to Brazil at the

end of January, Bolsonaro earlier this week applied for a new visa to be able to stay in the United States for six more months.

And one of his sons, Senator Flavio Bolsonaro, suggested last week that the former president had no return date.

“It may be tomorrow, or six months from now, or he may never come back,” he told reporters. On Tuesday, at the Orlando restaurant, Bolsonaro neverthe-

less promised to “remain active in Brazilian politics.” He didn’t elaborate.

Now it remains to be seen whether Bolsonaro maintains a low profile or whether he tries to boost his standing in the United States.

“I’ve always been a huge admirer of the American people – their liberties, their patriotism and their love of the flag,” he told the gathering on Friday.

# Brazil sinks rusting old French aircraft carrier in Atlantic

Brazil sank a decommissioned aircraft carrier in the Atlantic Ocean off its northeast coast, the Brazilian Navy said, despite warnings from environmentalists that the rusting 1960s French-built ship would pollute the sea and the Marine food chain.

The 32,000-tonne carrier had been floating offshore for three months since Türkiye refused it entry to be scrapped there because it was an environmental hazard and the ship was towed back to Brazil.

The carrier was scuttled in a “planned and controlled sinking” late on Friday, the Navy said in a statement, that would “avoid logistical, operational, environmental and economic losses to the Brazilian state,” it said.

The hull of the Sao Paulo was sunk in Brazilian jurisdictional waters 350km off the coast where the sea is 5,000m deep, a location chosen to mitigate the impact on fishing and ecosystems, the Navy said.

Federal public prosecutors and Greenpeace had asked the Brazilian government to stop the sinking, saying it was “toxic” due to dangerous materials, including 9 tonnes of asbestos used in paneling.

“The sinking of the aircraft carrier Sao Paulo throws tons of asbestos, mercury, lead and other highly toxic substances into the seabed,” Greenpeace said in a statement. It accused Brazil’s Navy of neglecting the protection

of the oceans. The Clemenceau-class aircraft carrier served the French Navy for four decades as the Foch, capable of carrying 40 war planes.

Defence expert and former foreign policy congressional staffer Pepe Rezende said the carrier was bought by the Brazilian Navy for just \$12mn in 1998 but needed an \$80mn refit that was never done.

After the carrier was decommissioned, Turkish Marine recycling company Sök Denizcilik Tic Sti bought the hull for \$10.5mn, but had to tow it back across the Atlantic when Turkey barred entry to its shipyard.

Brazil’s Navy said it asked the company to repair the carrier at a Brazilian shipyard, but after an inspection showed it to be taking on water and was at risk of sinking, the Navy banned the ship from entering Brazilian ports. It then decided to sink the Sao Paulo at high sea.

The company’s legal representative in Brazil, Zilan Costa e Silva, said that disposal of the carrier was the Brazilian state’s responsibility under the 1989 Basel Convention on the transboundary movement of hazardous wastes.

Greenpeace said the sinking violated the Basel Convention, the London Convention on the prevention of Marine pollution, and the Stockholm Convention on persistent organic pollutants.

“The Brazilian Navy chose to harm the environment and lose millions of dollars rather than allow public inspection of the ship,” Greenpeace said, calling the sinking the “biggest breach of chemical and waste agreements ever committed by a country.”

# Pakistan blocks Wikipedia over ‘blasphemous content’

Wikipedia was blocked in Pakistan yesterday after authorities censored the website for hosting “blasphemous content” in the latest blow to digital rights in the deeply conservative nation.

Blasphemy is a sensitive issue in Muslim-majority Pakistan, and social media giants Facebook and YouTube have previously been banned for publishing content deemed sacrilegious. The online encyclopedia had been blocked across the country on Friday “after it failed to respond to our repeated correspondence over removal of the blasphemous content and meet the deadline”, Malahat Obaid, a spokesman for the Pakistan Telecommunication Authority, told AFP yesterday.

The PTA had earlier in the week given Wikipedia a 48 hour ultimatum to remove material,

without publically specifying its exact objections. “They did remove some of the material but not all,” Obaid said. “It will remain blocked until they remove all the objectionable material.” An AFP reporter in Pakistan was not able to access the site from a mobile phone yesterday.

The Wikimedia Foundation – the non-profit fund managing Wikipedia – said the block “denies the fifth most populous nation in the world access to the largest free knowledge repository”. “If it continues, it will also deprive everyone access to Pakistan’s knowledge, history, and culture,” a statement said.

Free speech campaigners have highlighted what they say is a pattern of rising government censorship of Pakistan’s printed and electronic media.

“There’s just been a concerted effort to exert greater control over content on the internet,” said digital rights activist Usama Khilji.

“The main purpose is to silence any dissent,” he told AFP.

# Fire at Odesa power substation leaves port city’s grid on brink

A fire broke out at an overloaded electrical substation in the Ukrainian port city of Odesa yesterday, leaving nearly 500,000 people without power in a new blow to the country’s ailing energy grid that has been hammered by Russian strikes for months.

Officials warned that repairs could take weeks. The government said it would appeal to Turkey for help and ordered the energy ministry’s stocks of high-power generators to be sent to the city.

The CEO of the state grid operator, Volodymyr Kudrytsky, said critical equipment that had already been damaged several times by Russian missile strikes burst into flames when it could no longer “withstand the load”.

“(The equipment) has been struck so many times that its state leaves much to be desired,” Kudrytsky told a briefing in Odesa, a city on the Black Sea.

He any further Russian missile or drone attacks could make the situation even worse.

“We will do everything we can for the improvement of the power supply situation to take days rather than weeks,” he said.

Since October, Moscow has waged a campaign of massive missile attacks on energy infrastructure. Moscow says the strikes aim to reduce Ukraine’s ability to fight; Kyiv says they have no military purpose and are intended to hurt civilians.

“The situation is difficult, the scale of the accident is significant, it is impossible to quickly restore power supply,” Prime Minister Denys Shmyhal wrote on Telegram.

Odesa regional governor Maksym Marchenko said practically all of the city had lost power after the incident, and that as of Saturday afternoon about 500,000 people faced outages.

That figure represents about half of Odesa’s pre-war population of one million, when it was Ukraine’s third largest city.

“Today’s power supply (availability) allows to supply the city and the district about 40 or 45%, but if we factor in critical infrastructure, then of course very little is left for ordinary citizens,” Kudrytsky said.

# 5 die in Austria, Switzerland avalanches

Avalanches in Austria and Switzerland have left five people dead, leading officials to warn on Saturday of the risks posed by particularly unstable snow cover.

Three of those killed were visiting Austria’s Alpine regions.

“One winter sports enthusiast was killed in an avalanche in Kaltenbach,” a police spokesman told AFP, without giving further details of the accident in the small Alpine village.

Austrian news agency APA reported that the victim was a 17-year-old New Zealander who was skiing off-piste. On Friday, a 32-year-old Chinese man, who was also said to be skiing away from the designated routes, died in an avalanche in the resort of Soelden.

A third victim was found dead yesterday after being reported missing the previous day. APA reported that the man, in his 50s, had died in the Kleinwalsertal valley on Austria’s border with Germany.

In Switzerland, two off-piste skiers were killed by an avalanche yesterday morning in the southeastern canton of Graubunden, the cantonal police said. A third member of the group was caught up in the flow of snow but managed to escape unharmed, local police said in a statement.

# Endangered Monarch butterflies face perilous storm

As devastating storms pounded California, nature lovers feared for endangered Monarch butterflies that winter there as part of a seemingly magical migration pattern. The colourfully winged insects that travel vast distances over the course of generations have been closely watched in the US state since they neared extinction just three years ago.

As the sun rose one January morning, volunteers began counting Monarch butterflies, finding them clustered atop cypress and eucalyptus trees in various sites along the California coast.

The butterflies huddled in clusters of gray colonies until one spread its wings to reveal the orange spots for which they are known.

The sight provided a bit of reassurance for Stephanie Turcotte Edenholm, who counted more than a thousand Monarchs at a sanctuary in the California coastal town of Pacific Grove. The educator spent much of the morning explaining the lives of the butterflies to young school students. They got to watch as dozens of butterflies took flight, believing – mistakenly – that the mild temperature signaled the end of winter.

“It’s too early for them to get so agitated, they’re using up their fat reserves,” Edenholm fretted.

She worried, too, that they would mate and the females would fly off in search of milkweed plants to lay eggs on. Milkweed is all that baby caterpillars eat once the eggs hatch, but it was too early in winter for the plants to be growing.

Volunteers counted more than 330,000 “western Monarch” butterflies at the end of November, according to the Xerces Society conservation group.

**Pesticides and climate change**

That number came as a relief compared to the 2,000 butterflies counted at the end of 2020, and an encouraging step up from the 250,000 or so butterflies tallied in 2021.

But the ranks of butterflies were far from the millions observed in the 1980s, due to threats including habitat loss, pesticides and climate change, according to Xerces.

The Monarch was added last year to the International Union for Conservation of Nature’s Red List of threatened species and Xerces has asked the US Fish and Wildlife Service to place Monarchs on its endangered list.

Such a designation would help Monarch defenders fight real estate developers out to raze trees or build on terrain needed by migrating butterflies.

The question of whether to protect Monarchs is a philosophical one, since the insects are known more for incredible migrations than being crucial for pollinating crops or flowers,

according to Xerces biologist Emma Pelton. “We wouldn’t lose human crops or wild plants in particular if the Monarchs disappeared,” Pelton said.

But the world would lose butterflies “that perform a really incredible migration, and that people are very attached to, emotionally and culturally, throughout North America.”

Some species of Monarchs travel thousands of miles, from Canada to Mexico, while the lifespan of any single butterfly is typically measured in weeks.

**‘Magical’**

Bill Henry remembers a childhood here filled with butterflies.

“It was kind of a magical thing to be immersed in the abundance of the natural world,” said Henry, now director of Groundswell Coastal Ecology group in Santa Cruz, not far from Pacific Grove.

“It paints a picture, it’s something that dreams are made out of.”

Flourishing Monarchs are also a sign of enough milkweed and habitat along the long migration corridor, Henry said.

“Milkweed is linked to healthy landscapes, and it’s linked to healthy floodplains, which means that our rivers are doing well,” he told AFP.

“It also means that there aren’t a lot of impasses to their migration, such as swaths where the pesticides that kill them are being used.”

In 2020, the near absence of Monarchs on the west Coast was a rallying cry for nature lovers, from gardeners who planted milkweed to hobbyists who raised butterflies in their homes despite the practice being illegal due.

But finding the right balance to protect nature has challenges. For example, Monarchs love water-guzzling eucalyptus trees that are not native to drought-prone California.

Clearing vegetation or trees to reduce the risk of wildfires can eliminate butterfly habitats. Monarchs being gone from our world would “suck too much,” said Santa Cruz teenager Brody Robbins, who skipped school to photograph butterflies “way cooler than Civil War classes.”
