

HE the Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Mohamed bin Abdulrahman bin Jassim al-Thani received yesterday a phone call from High Representative of the European Union for Foreign Affairs and Security Policy Josep Borrell. At the outset of the call, Borrell congratulated HE Sheikh Mohamed on his appointment as prime minister, wishing him continued success in his new post. They discussed aspects of co-operation between Qatar and the European Union, as well as a number of regional issues, including developments in Palestine and the Iranian nuclear file. (QNA)

Annual report on Islamic philanthropy launched

The UN Refugee Agency (UNHCR), launched its fifth annual report on Islamic philanthropy yesterday during an event held in partnership with HE Sheikh Thani bin Abdullah al-Thani, UNHCRs Eminent Advocate, at the Center for Conflict and Humanitarian Studies in Doha. The event included a presentation of the report's top findings, which indicated that UNHCR was able to help more than 1.5mn people in 2022, bringing the total refugees and internally displaced persons benefiting from the Zakat and Sadagah contributions received by the Refugee Zakat Fund, to more than 6mn people in 26 countries since its

Macron win on pension bill risks fuelling anger

President Emmanuel Macron's move to shun the National Assembly and push through an unpopular pension system overhaul without a vote in the lower house may secure a reform he says is needed for France's finances. But it may end up a Pyrrhic victory. By using special constitutional powers instead of risking lawmakers rejecting the reform, Macron has given ammunition to the opposition and to trade union leaders who cast the reform as undemocratic. It could also play into the far-right's hands.

US senate acts to end Iraq war authorisation

Almost exactly 20 years after US forces invaded Iraq to remove Saddam Hussein from power, the US Senate moved yesterday to revoke the law that authorised then-president George W Bush to launch the war. Senators from both parties strongly supported cancelling the 2002 authorisation. The same bill also revokes the 1991 AUMF that empowered Bush's father president George HW Bush to attack Iraq after Saddam's forces invaded Kuwait. The 2002 AUMF has been mostly moribund.

US banking system sound, says Yellen

The US banking system remains sound and Americans can feel confident that their deposits will be there when needed, Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen said yesterday, although she denied that recent emergency actions following two large bank failures means that a blanket government guarantee now existed for all deposits. "A bank only gets that treatment (quaranteed deposits)," she said. Her comment meant that tens of billions in uninsured deposits at Silicon Valley and Signature (banks) were not lost.

GSF throws light on post-Covid challenges

Qatar lauded for hostage negotiation support

¬he Global Security Forum (GSF) 2023 closed in Doha yesterday after three days of powerful insights into the threats facing and prospects for securing a safer world. During its final day, GSF 2023's invited gathering of ministers, government officials, law enforcers, security agency heads, academia, media, and private sector leaders heard alerts and optimism impacting the post-Covid world and the prospects for technology and space advancement.

Ambassador Roger Carstens, US Special Presidential Envoy for Hostage Affairs, explained that the process of securing the release of hostages and repatriating them requires negotiation and co-ordination between the Hostage Affairs Office, hostages' families and all relevant state and non-state actors. The ambassador urged increased public awareness to deter citizens from returning to detainer countries. He acknowledged a concerning rise in wrongful detainment by state actors and said that the Levinson Act was a step in the right direction. Ambassador Carstens explained that his office prioritises the needs of hostage and detainee families and strives to support and keep them informed throughout the process, allowing media engagement if

President & Founder of the James W. Foley Legacy Foundation, Diane Foley – the mother of journalist Jim Foley, who lost his life as a hostage expressed appreciation for the Levinson Act, which defines wrongful detention criteria and the need for partnerships and co-operation with state actors, media, and other relevant parties. "We must work together on this," she said. "We need more research, we need to really have evidence-based strategies to deal with this problem," she added. Foley concluded by expressing appreciation for Qatar and its negotiation leadership.

During a panel discussion on Afghanistan's current challenges and future prospects, Fawzia Koofi, the Afghan Parliament's Former Second Deputy Speaker and leading women's rights activist, said the Taliban's ideology is unchanged and its lack of governance still prevents Afghanis from writing their own narrative. Koofi said that the Taliban feel threatened by Daesh and that the only way to bring change to Afghanistan is by continuing civil resistance led by women, leveraging Taliban's fragmentation, and achieving international consensus. Microsoft applies AI powers to 'copilot' Excel, Outlook

icrosoft pressed on with its AI revolution yesterday, announcing that it would apply the powers behind ChatGPT to its iconic Excel, Word and Outlook programmes.

The Redmond, Washington giant has been swiftly adopting language-based AI, showing less caution than its rivals de-

spite early problems such as chatbots giving disturbing responses or blatantly inaccurate information.

Microsoft's latest chatbot, called Copilot, will put ChatGPT-like abilities to work in offices, churning out meeting transcripts, calendar entries or PowerPoint slides almost instantane-

The thrust of the new release is that generative AI, the term for ChatGPT style capabilities, will function as an assistant for users of Microsoft's popular workplace software and not unilaterally take over office tasks.

"You could say we've been using AI on autopilot and with this next generation of AI, we



are moving from autopilot to copilot," Microsoft CEO Satya Nadella said at a virtual release event.

First open to select business customers for testing, AI will offer a draft in these applications, speeding up content creation and freeing up workers' time, Microsoft said.

The Redmond-based company, outpacing peers through investments in ChatGPT's creator OpenAI, also showcased a new "business chat" experience that can pull data and perform tasks across applications on a user's written com-

"We believe this next generation of AI will unlock a new wave of productivity growth," Satya Nadella, Microsoft's chief executive,



"I can only commend the work that was done. There were many lessons learned and now we are in discussions with future hosts who want to discuss our experience and see how it can be applied to their own events."

The success of Qatar's FIFA World Cup - the first staging of the tournament in the Middle East and Arab world - speaks volumes for the power of football, he added.

With more than 225 artworks and 300 archival documents from 36 collections in 16 cities worldwide, it highlights Beirut's pivotal role in elaborating a new vision for modernity through a politically engaged art where everything seemed possible.

In recognising the complex links between the past and Beirut's current struggles, the exhibition questions the romanticising narrative of the so-called "Golden Age" that ultimately led to the outbreak of the Lebanese Civil War in 1975. Showcasing the city's unparalleled cosmopolitanism, the exhibition traces the complex entanglement of art and culture within the divergent trans-regional antagonisms of that highly charged period.

Beirut and the Golden Sixties: A Manifesto of Fragility presents the work of many internationally-known figures in the art scene, such as Etel Adnan, Huguette Caland, Paul Guiragossian, Saloua Raouda Choucair, and Shafic Abboud, as well as various renowned artists working in the region, such as Adel Saghir, Cici

Sursock, Nadia Saikali, and Rafic Charaf, among others.

The exhibition also features a newly commissioned multimedia installation by Joana Hadjithomas and Khalil Joreige about the devastating 2020 explosion in Beirut, shedding new light on the transformative effects of violence on art and artistic production and the power of poetry in opposition to chaos.

HE Sheikha Al Mavassa said: "One of the many functions of art is to recollect or reimagine a home that has been lost. One of the many functions of an art museum is to create a new home, if only a temporary one, where people who are scattered can come together for a moment, pause, and reflect. Mathaf: Arab Museum of Modern Art is such a home. Zeina Arida, director of Mathaf said: "We are thrilled to present Beirut and the Golden Sixties: A Manifesto of Fragility, a unique presentation of Beirut's history from 1958 through 1975. This exhibition paves the way to a series of exhibitions at Mathaf, which would connect artistic production to communities. I foresee Mathaf as an inclusive space, where its unique collection would always be more and more accessible to the local and international audience.

The exhibition features artists who are part of Mathaf Collection, which adds eight works from its collection and several archival documents that bring an additional understanding of the artist's practices. We look forward to welcoming the public to delve into the events that changes the history of Beirut."

Meanwhile, Hekmat Karzai, Chairman of the Center for Conflict and Peace Studies and Afghanistan's former Deputy Foreign Minister, identified a sole focus of the international community on Ukraine, but argued it gives Afghans the opportunity to advance to a stage where they're able to effectively interface with the Taliban and exclude third parties from the conversation. He highlighted the need to rationalise funds entering Afghanistan and ensuring that it reaches the people, rather than funding Taliban soldiers.

Panellists agreed that women's right to education remains a top priority and that an inclusive government is necessary for a brighter future for Afghanistan.

In a fireside chat on the role of sports in bringing people together, HE Hassan al-Thawadi, Secretary-General of the Supreme Committee for Delivery and Legacy for the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022, said that the tournament created unique bonding experiences and a platform for nations to celebrate their cultures to-

The output he said, spoke volumes about the power of sports in creating global unity and in breaking down stereotypes about the Arab World.

Mada wins ESCWA digital Arabic content award

Technology Center Qatar 'Mada' won the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia (ESCWA) Award for Arabic Digital Content for the year 2023 for its Unified Arabic Braille Portal, the first initiative in the world to provide eightpoint Braille tables in Arabic.

Mada Center was honoured with the award during the Arab Forum for Sustainable Development (AFSD) 2023, which was held in Beirut from March 14 to 16, under the slogan "Solutions and Action".

The centre's participation in the award comes in line with its role in improving the ecosystem for persons with disabilities to be ICT accessible and to achieve independence, unlock their potential, enhance their capabilities, improve their quality of life, and empower them in various aspects of their lives within the framework of the 2030 Sustainable Development Goals.

To promote its role as the leading centre for innovation in the field of ICT access in Arabic in the region and the world, and within the framework of the Mada Innovation Program, Mada Center launched in 2020, for the first time in the Arab world, the Unified Arabic Braille Portal, which provides a comprehensive and integrated reference for

the blind in the Arab world. The portal aims to enrich Arabic digital content in line with the latest international trends and best practices that are consistent with the 2030 Sustainable Development Goals.

It is worth noting that the Unified Arabic Braille portal is the first of its kind in the world of innovation and in the Arab world, where the first computerised Arabic Braille table with eight dots was developed to support Braille abbreviations in the fields of mathematics and science, and to take advantage of the multiple advantages of this table, such as writing or reading single symbol in one cell and supporting some computer symbols. This table is a significant addition and a quantum leap that will help users of Braille displays and speaking computer programs to have a smoother use

of the Braille method. The new tables were published in 2021 and the entire library was introduced as an open-source resource for use by screen displays. It is also available in Arabic and accessible for everyone to use, especially the blind and blind-deaf people, experts, teachers, students, software developers, assistive technology manufacturers, and those who want to learn the Braille system.

Katara to host symposium on Theatre Day

Seminar discusses multiple facets of 'discourse on Qatar World Cup'

The Arab Center for Research and Policy Studies (ACRPS) - Gulf and Arabian Peninsula Studies Unit convened a seminar on 'The Discourse on the Qatar 2022 World Cup: Power, Politics, and Aspiration? During the first day's four panels and nine papers, leading experts presented their research on the topic.

Abdulrahman Researcher al-Baker made the opening remarks, and addressed the Arab Center's attempt to keep up with the cultural debates invoked by the Qatar World Cup, which represented a fascinating vehicle for the flow of symbols, values, and meanings. In an attempt to understand why a small state sought to host the World Cup, al-Baker explained that the main framework through which the event was dealt with is based on two conceptualisations, "soft power" and "national branding".

The actual organisation of the tournament, however, far exceeded these two frameworks, according to al-Baker. In the first panel, "2022 Qatar World Cup and Questions of Cultural Relativism", Hans Hognestad, Professor of Sociology of Sport at University of South-Eastern Norway, opened the panel with "Qatar 2022: Fan Ontologies, Soft Power, and Questions of Cultural Relativism", a paper coauthored with Richard Giulianotti, Professor of Sociology at Loughborough University.

Hognestad and Giulianotti discussed these issues with reference to theories of (neo-) Orientalism, cultural relativism, and constructivism in international



relations, drawing on fieldwork and interviews conducted in Oatar and elsewhere. Next, Joel Rookwood, Lecturer in Sport Management at University College Dublin, presented his paper "Building Soft Power and Avoiding Soft Disempowerment Through Football Mega-Events: Addressing Multiculturalism and Global Culture in Qatar", through which he demonstrated the ways in which Qatar's hosting of the World Cup was framed as an attempt to influence international audiences and build soft power.

In the second panel, "2022 Qatar World Cup in the Critical Discourse", Marc Owen Jones, Associate Professor of Middle East Studies at Hamad bin Khalifa University, gave a paper "Reductionism and Orientalism: Ten Years of Media Representation of Qatar's World Cup in the British Press". Jones analysed newspaper headlines mentioning Qatar and Russia since 2010 to create a typology of themes and agendasetting related to Qatar 2022.

Then, Mohamed El-Fatih Hamdi, Assistant Professor at Qatar University, and Hichem Akoubache, Professor at the Department of Mass Communication at Qatar University, referred in their paper "The Campaign against the Qatar World Cup: An Analysis of the French Media Dismedia rhetoric surrounding the event while identifying the motives behind such propagandistic and hostile discourse against Qatar, seeking to understand why the French media spread doubts about Qatar's ability to organise this international spectacle.

The third panel "2022 Qatar World Cup from Various Positionalities" included three speakers. Laurent Bonnefoy, Researcher at the French National Centre for Scientific Research explored "Qatar 2022: Competing Narratives in Europe and in the Arab World" the antagonistic debates and narratives in the media and among decision makers before and after the 2022 World Cup. Bonnefoy analysed how these debates cannot be understood merely as opposition between the North and South and stressed a number of internal fault-lines linked to multiculturalism, Islam, and gender.

Abdulrahman Helali, Associate Professor at the Qur'an and Sunnah Program of Qatar University's College of Sharia and Islamic Studies, presented a paper on "Oatar 2022 in Religious Discourse" to trace and analyse the religious discourse that accompanied the World Cup, which some used as an opportunity for proselytisation and advocacy.

Bouchra Zagagh, Professor of Pedagogical Sociology at the Centre Régional des Métiers de l'Education et de la Formation, presented a paper titled "Qatar 2022 from the Perspective of Arab Digital Networkers", and used the netnography method to examine how Arab digital networkers interacted with the Qatar World Cup and the accompanying forms of the art of presence, whether in the digital space, on-site (at the stadiums), or the hybrid independent space.

In the fourth and final panel "2022 Oatar World Cup and International Relations Revisited", Simon Chadwick, Professor of Sport and Geopolitical Economy at Skema Business School, showed how the 2022 FIFA World Cup epitomised the emergence of a new paradigm, sport as geopolitical economy, in his paper "Discourse on the Qatar World Cup: Sport's New Geopolitical Economy".

Jan Busse, Senior Researcher at the Institute of Political Science of the University of the Bundeswehr Munich, concluded the panel with his paper "Regional Power Play: Shifting Political Dynamics in the Middle East and North Africa in the Context of Qatar's World Cup." He departed from the premise that football and politics are inevitably interrelated, arguing that the Qatar World Cup is closely linked to multiple regional political dynamics in the Middle East and North Africa (Mena). Accordingly, based on a practical-theoretical understanding of diplomacy which has gained prominence within International Relations, he addressed the intricacies of regional power politics and how they played out in the context of the World Cup.

UNHCR launches 5th annual report on Islamic philanthropy

he UN Refugee Agency (UNHCR) launched its fifth annual report on Islamic philanthropy yesterday during a forum held in partnership with HE Sheikh Thani bin Abdullah bin Thani al-Thani, UNHCR's Eminent Advocate, at the Centre for Conflict and Humanitarian Studies in Doha.

through the UNHCR," he said. "The UNHCR is able to provide human-



The report also noted that during 2022, the UNHCR obtained several additional fatwas to endorse the Refugee Zakat Fund, bringing the total number of fatwas and endorsements issued by prominent Islamic scholars and institutions from around the world to 16.

The fatwas and endorsements enhance the UNHCR's access to and distribution of Zakat to eligible refugee and displaced persons, through the Fund.

Prominent scholar Professor Dr Sheikh Ali al-Qaradaghi participated in the event and expressed his support for the Shariah compliance of the Refugee Zakat Fund, as a measure that restores confidence in Islamic philanthropy programmes through the United Nations.

WCM-Q pre-medical students explore biomechanics, sports medicine

group of 50 Weill Cornell Medicine-Qatar (WCM-Q) pre-medical students recently visited Aspetar hospital to learn about the application of biomechanics in sports medicine.

The one-day trip was a unique opportunity for students to see firsthand how physics principles are used in the treatment and prevention of sportsrelated injuries.

The students toured different departments within the hospital, including the movement and assessment analysis laboratory and hydropathy pools, the altitude dormitory and climate chamber, the podiatry and virtual reality departments, the motion capture lab, and the medical imaging department. At each department the students learnt about the specific tools and technologies used to diagnose and treat athletes.

Before the tour of the facility, Dr Khalid Alkhelaifi, orthopaedic surgeon at Aspetar and a WCM-Q alumnus of the inaugural class, inspired the students by sharing his journey. He spoke about the challenges and rewards of his career in sports medicine. Dr Alkhelaifi pursued his pre-medical education and medical degree at



WCM-Q and later furthered his studies in Canada and US.

Enthusiastically describing the trip, student Alyaa Altamimi said: "It was amazing to see how the physics concepts I have been learning in class can be applied directly to medicine. Seeing the technology and equipment used in sports medicine brought the concepts to life for me. Moreover, the tour made me realise that sports medicine is diverse, and one can venture in one of its specialties. I am also inspired to see a WCM-Q alumnus living his dream career, which motivates me to continue working hard to become a physician."

Dr Mohamed Yousef, professor of physics at WCM-O said: "With the enormous technological discoveries that are reshaping medicine, it is crucial for future doctors to have a deep understanding of the physics principles involved in treatment and diagnosis."

Aspetar is one of the affiliates of WCM-Q. Such visits help the medical students to broaden their knowledge of sports medicine and science while discovering their specialty of interest.





Israeli raid in West Bank kills four: Palestinian ministry

Israeli forces yesterday killed four Palestinians including a teenager in the occupied West Bank, the Palestinian health ministry said, the latest deadly raid on Jenin. The Palestinian health ministry said 23 others had been wounded in the raid. It identified those killed as Omar Awadin, 16, Luay al-Zughair, 37, Nidal Khazim, 28 and Youssef Shreem, 29. Mahmoud al-Saadi of the Palestinian Red Crescent in Jenin said "an Israeli undercover unit stormed the city centre's Abu Bakr street". The raid comes days before a planned meeting between Palestinian and Israeli officials in Sharm el-Sheikh for talks aimed at reducing tensions ahead of the holy month of Ramadan.

Current Indo Pacific friction 'alarming': top US admiral

The current friction in the Indo Pacific is alarming and "trending in the wrong direction", but the US presence was not an effort to contain or invite conflict with China, a senior US admiral said yesterday. Admiral John Aquilino, Commander of the US Indo-Pacific Command, said an "AUKUS" partnership between Australia, Britain and the US to provide Australia with nuclear-powered submarines was to boost its defence capability. "As good partners, US and the UK will go ahead and assist in the ability for Australia to defend themselves," he said after giving a lecture in Singapore, answering a question from the audience.

India to buy \$8.5bn worth of military equipment

India yesterday approved purchases of missiles, helicopters, artillery guns and electronic warfare systems worth \$8.5bn as it sought to add more teeth to its military. The Defence Acquisition Council), the top government body for capital acquisition approvals for the Indian military, approved the orders worth Rs705bn (\$8.52bn) for all its services, the defence ministry said. All orders would be placed with Indian companies keeping with a push by the government to boost domestic defence manufacturing. The list of purchases approved included 200 additional BrahMos missiles, 50 utility helicopters and electronic warfare systems for the navy.

Two police officers shot dead in western Canada

Two police officers were shot dead in the line of duty early yesterday in Edmonton in Canada's western Alberta province, officials said. Prime Minister Justin Trudeau offered condolences to the families and colleagues of the officers, who local media reported were responding to a domestic call. "Every day, police officers put themselves in harm's way to keep people safe. The news that two @EdmontonPolice officers have been killed in the line of duty reminds us of that reality," Trudeau tweeted. Staff Sergeant Michael Elliott, former head of the Edmonton Police Association, said the officers were "killed near Inglewood," a residential neighbourhood in the north central part of the city.

ANNOUNCEMENT UK bans TikTok on government devices

The UK yesterday announced a security ban on the Chinese-owned video app TikTok on government devices, in line with action by the European Union and the US. "We will do so with immediate effect," Cabinet Office minister Oliver Dowden told parliament. Western authorities have been taking an increasingly firm approach to the app, owned by the firm Bytedance, citing fears that user data could be used or abused by Chinese officials. Dowden said that experts had conducted a risk assessment of third-party apps in relation to sensitive government data. As part of the measures, government devices will only be allowed to access apps on a pre-approved list.

Anger as French govt pushes through pension reform without vote

rench Prime Minister Elisabeth Borne used a special procedure to push an unpopular pensions bill through the National Assembly without a vote yesterday, amid shouts from left-wing lawmakers brandishing placards against the reform.

The move, using the socalled article 49:3 of the constitution, will ensure the bill raising the retirement age by two years to 64 is adopted after weeks of protests and fractious debate.

But it also shows President Emmanuel Macron and his government failed to garner enough of a majority in parliament, in a blow to the centrist president and his ability to win support from other parties for further reforms.

Borne was greeted by boos as she arrived in the National Assembly, the lower house of parliament, to announce the special procedure yesterday.

The session was suspended for two minutes after left-wing lawmakers singing the national anthem prevented Borne from speaking.

Some held placards reading "No to 64 years". When the session resumed, Borne took the floor but her speech was largely drowned out by boos and chants from opposition members of parliament and shouts of "resignation," in rare chaotic scenes in the French parliament.

"We cannot gamble on the future of our pensions, this reform is necessary," Borne told lawmakers, to explain why she was using the 49:3 procedure.

Macron and his government say raising the retirement age is necessary to get the pension system out of the red by the end of the decade.

Far-right leader Marine Le Pen said Borne should resign. "This last-minute resort to 49:3 is an extraordinary sign of weakness," she said, adding: "She must go."

The senate, upper house, had given the green light to the bill in the morning, as expected, thanks to support from senators from the conservative Les Republicains (LR). But the afternoon vote in the National Assembly would have been a different matter.

There, LR lawmakers were split on the issue.

According to a source present at a last-minute meeting at the Elysee, Macron told Borne and others he had wanted to go for a vote.

"But I consider that the financial, economic risks (of the bill being voted down) are too big," he said, adding that was why he backed the move to skip the vote.

Resorting to the measure is likely to further enrage unions, protesters and left-wing opposition parties that say the pension overhaul is unfair and unnecessary.

"This government is not worthy of our Fifth Republic, of French democracy," Fabien Roussel, head of the French Communist Party said.

Socialist Party head Olivier Faure said earlier yesterday that such a move could unleash "an uncontrollable anger" after weeks of rolling strikes and protests.

Le Pen's National Rally and the left-wing France Insoumise (France Unbowed) said they would request a vote of no confidence in the government.

However that is unlikely to pass as most conservative lawmakers would likely not back it.

"By resorting to 49:3, the government demonstrates that it does not have a majority to approve the two-year post-ponement of the legal retirement age," Laurent Berger, the leader of CFDT, France's main union, said on Twitter, urging authorities to "listen to the workers."

US releases video of Russia jet 'intercepting' US drone

he Pentagon yesterday released a de-classified video showing a Russian military jet intercept a US drone downed over the Black Sea two days ago, rare footage that highlights the risks of a direct clash between the world's leading nuclear powers.

The US has said Tuesday's incident shows Russia is behaving irresponsibly in international airspace, while Moscow accuses Washington of trying to escalate tensions near Crimea, the Ukrainian peninsula it forcibly annexed

in 2014. Meanwhile, on the battlefield in eastern Ukraine, Kyiv's forces continued to withstand Russian assaults on the now-ruined city of Bakhmut.

Reuters reporters heard a constant rumble of artillery on all sides at about 1.5km from the frontline.

"Sometimes we see groups of seven people (Russian soldiers). We strike, three fall and the rest continue to advance," said Marian, 21, a member of Ukraine's 80th Air Assault Brigade, at a mortar position, describing his experiences along the front.

The brigade fired seven mortars from that position, while small

arms fire could also be heard in the distance. The release of the Pentagon video came a day after US and Russian defence ministers and military chiefs held phone conversations over the incident that saw the MQ-9 Reaper drone crash into the sea while on a reconnaissance mission in international airspace. In the roughly 40-second video, a Russian Su-27 fighter jet comes very close to the US drone and dumps what US

American aircraft as it flew over the Black Sea.

Russia has denied any collision and said the drone crashed after making "sharp manoeuvres"; having "provocatively" flown close to Russian air space near Crimea. General Mark Milley, chairman of the US Joint Chiefs of Staff said on Wednesday it was clear that the intercept and harassment of the drone by Russian jets was inten-

tional, but it was unclear whether

Russian Defence Minister Sergei Shoigu told US Defence Secretary Lloyd Austin that US drone flights near Crimea's coast "were provocative in nature" and could lead to "an escalation... in the Black Sea zone," a ministry statement said. Russia, the statement said, has "no interest" in escalation "but will in future react in due proportion" and the two countries should "act with a maximum of responsibility", including by having military lines of communication in a crisis.

Pakistan ex-PM Khan's plea to suspend arrest warrant rejected

Pakistani court yesterday rejected former prime minister Imran Khan's plea to suspend an arrest warrant issued against him, stoking fears of a renewed confrontation between his supporters and security forces.

On Tuesday and Wednesday, hundreds of Khan's supporters, armed with batons, iron-rods and sling-shots, had surrounded his home in Lahore and fought pitched battles with security forces attempting to arrest him.

Yesterday's rejection of Khan's bid to have the arrest warrant suspended came hours after a higher court had ordered police to postpone the operation to arrest the former cricket star until today, bringing a temporary lull in the stand-off.

The arrest warrant was issued by a court in Islamabad when

Khan failed to appear before it over charges that he unlawfully sold state gifts given to him by foreign dignitaries when he was prime minister from 2018 to 2022. Khan denies the charges.

The Election Commission of Pakistan had found him guilty and barred Khan from holding public office for one parliamentary term.

office for one parliamentary term. Khan, 70, had filed an appeal with the Islamabad court to suspend the warrant, submitting an undertaking that he would appear

before it voluntarily on Saturday. But the court said such an undertaking was insufficient, given Khan's previous conduct.

"It is concluded that the application is not justified by law as well as fact, which is hereby rejected," said the Islamabad court's order.

The violence in Khan's Lahore neighbourhood, in which protesters torched police vehicles, a water-cannon truck and scores of cars and motorcycles and hurled petrol bombs at security forces

firing tear gas and rubber bullets, raised fears of a new political stand-off in Pakistan, which is already grappling with an economic crisis.

The trouble subsided after the Lahore high court halted the police operation.

Police said they would seek

Police said they would seek further directions from the high court today.

Provincial information minister Amir Mir said there were militants among Khan's supporters outside his house.

"We have received credible reports that militants were amongst the people who attacked police," he told a news conference. "One of them has served eight years in prison." Khan's aide Shafqat Mehmood dismissed that as a "fabricated story, based on lies".

Although there were no police outside Khan's home yesterday, witnesses said supporters armed with batons, bamboo sticks, iron rods and cutters had set up pickets and barricades.

Foxconn 'wins AirPod order, plans \$200mn factory in India'

manufacturer Foxconn has won an order to make AirPods for Apple Inc and plans to build a factory in India to produce the wireless earphones, two people with direct knowledge of the matter said. The deal will see Foxconn, the world's largest contract electronics maker and assembler of around 70% of all iPhones, become an AirPod supplier for the first time and underlines efforts by the key Apple supplier to further diversify production away from China. AirPods are currently made by a range of Chinese suppliers. One source said Foxconn will invest more than \$200mn in the new India AirPod plant in the southern Indian state of Telangana. It wasn't immediately clear how much the AirPod order would be worth. The person. who requested anonymity as the matter was not public yet, said Foxconn officials had debated internally for months about whether to assemble AirPods due to relatively lower profit margins on making the

device, but ultimately opted to go ahead with the deal to "reinforce engagement" with Apple. "That way, we are more likely to get orders for their new products," the person said. The decision to set up production in India was requested by Apple, according to the source. Foxconn vies with Taiwanese rivals such as Wistron Corporation and Pegatron Corporation to win more orders from Apple, the world's most valuable company. A subsidiary, Foxconn Interconnect Technology, plans to start construction of a manufacturing facility in Telangana in the second half of this year and begin production by the end of 2024 at the earliest, the person said. Shares in the Foxconn unit jumped nearly 9% after Reuters first reported the news, reversing an earlier loss of 2.2% A second person with direct knowledge of the matter, who also declined to be identified as the matter was not yet public, said the Foxconn subsidiary will make AirPods in India without providing further details.

Some US banks facing stock rout may need to seek partners

Some US regional banks are under pressure after the collapse of two lenders within days, with industry executives and advisers saying they could be forced to seek saviors if a rout in their stocks doesn't let up.

US regulators announced extraordinary measures on Sunday following the collapse of SVB Financial Group and Signature Bank, offering a safety net to banks pressured by fleeing depositors. On Monday, President Joe Biden vowed to take action to ensure the safety of the banking system.

But the intervention did little to prop up the banks' shares, which slumped on Monday, posing a major impediment to growing their businesses and getting funding.

"If this continues to escalate you will have a liquidity drain from the mid to small banks," said David Ellison, a portfolio manager at Hennessy Funds, which had a position in Signature Bank.

Raising private capital could help inspire confidence again in their stocks. Possible outcomes for under-pressure regional banks could see a stronger rival take over a weaker, or cash infusions from investors such as private equity, the industry sources said

Over the weekend, some private equity firms had studied the possibility of an investment in banks whose shares plummeted such as First Republic Bank and PacWest Bancorp, according to two industry sources with knowledge of the matter. They did not go ahead as the investors wanted to see what the government would do to alleviate pressure on the banking sector, the sources

With the emergency measures in place, those possibilities could be revived in the coming days.

First Republic declined comment. PacWest did not immediately respond to a request for comment after business hours.

One banking source said investors looking at banks that saw sharp declines in their share prices may want to wait a few days before they consider deals or cash infusions.

At that point, bank targets may be persuaded to do deals not because they need the liquidity, but to show they

have the backings of large institutional investors.

There could be other ways for banks to try to shore up confidence, too, First Republic, for example, secured additional

confidence, too. First Republic, for example, secured additional financing from JPMorgan Chase & Co, although that did not keep its stock from falling on Monday.

Investors voted with their feet on Monday, putting bank stocks

under pressure around the world. The KBW regional banking index fell 5.4% and the S&P 500 banking index dropped 6% in a chaotic day when several banks saw multiple trading halts because of the size of the moves.

Weighing on sentiment was the federal government's

Weighing on sentiment was the federal government's statement that shareholders and certain unsecured debtholders would not be protected — something that might give investors in the banks pause.

"This is not a bailout. So investors think it's a relative gamble staying around owning regional banks before knowing what will change in regulation," said Brian Levitt, global market strategist for Invesco.

There are also other hurdles to deals. The Biden administration has taken a tough stance on deals over antitrust concerns and it is not clear whether they would be receptive to rescue transactions

Still, investors may find deals in the battered sector. Regional bank stocks are "an incredible bargain now," billionaire investor Bill Ackman said on Twitter on Monday.

"There's value in these banks, they are not all alike," said Michael Farr, chief executive of investment advisory firm Farr, Miller & Washington who owns banks stocks including PNC and Truist. "You do your homework and see where real value exists." — Reuters



Analysts say a wider transport overhaul is needed

bus service has saved cash — and

pollution.

A small fleet of fully electric buses started operating in the country's financial capital in January as part of a government drive to cut worsening air pollution produced by vehicles and industry, power plants and brick kilns, as well as the burning of solid waste.

"The electric bus service has not only decreased my weekly travelling costs, but also helped (with) my ... health problems," the 50-year-old journalist said by phone, noting that he had suffered back pain while riding his motorcycle to work.

However, Kamran said there were not enough e-buses — only 10 of the initial fleet of 50 are currently running — and that he sometimes had to wait 45 minutes to catch one of them.

Urban air pollution is a major and longstanding problem across Pakistan, with the country ranking third worldwide out of 118 nations for worst air quality in 2021, according to IQAir, a Swiss pollution technology company.

a Swiss pollution technology company Bad-quality air is a leading cause of death in the South Asian nation of about 224 million people, resulting in an estimated 236,000 premature deaths in 2019, the latest Global Burden of Disease (GBD) study says.

number of vehicles on the roads there were 30.7mn in Pakistan in 2020, up from 9.6mn in 2011 — cities such as Peshawar and Karachi have announced plans to promote greener transport.

Karachi's 50 e-buses can each carry at least 70 passengers and travel 240km on a single charge.

The fleet, which cost \$15mn, was funded through a public-private partnership, with a transport company purchasing the buses and operating them for eight years before the Sindh provincial government takes over as owner.

The government is now in talks with the Asian Development Bank, seeking a loan of about \$30mn to purchase an additional 100 buses, according to Abdul Haleem Shaikh, secretary of Sindh's transport and mass transit department.

"We want to provide people with emission-free, comfortable and luxury buses along with trained staff to discourage them from using their smoke-emitting cars and motorbikes," he said.

Yet environmental and urban experts have questioned whether the small number of electric buses will have a significant impact, and called for a much wider and more meaningful transport overhaul.

Consecutive climate disasters — from heatwaves to forest fires — have struck Pakistan in the last few years, and the country is still recovering from unprecedented floods in 2022.

But air pollution remains one of the country's main environmental concerns, with at least 40% of dirty air in Pakistan produced by vehicles, the country's climate change ministry has said

In November 2019, Pakistan's government set a target to bring a half million electric motorcycles and rickshaws, along with more than 100,000 electric cars, buses and

trucks, into the transportation system within five years. The current overall number on the roads is unknown.

Pakistan has a longer-term goal of ensuring that a third of all cars and trucks and half of motorcycles and buses sold by 2030 are electric, and has generally vowed to ramp up its efforts to cut greenhouse gas emissions in the years leading up to that date.

In the northwestern city of Peshawar, the provincial government is taking old buses off the road and replacing them with diesel-electric hybrid models as part of a new public transport system.

And in Karachi, in a push separate from the 50 new e-buses, the government has been rolling out a network of 250 vehicles fuelled by bio-methane produced from water buffalo manure.

Yet the bus initiatives in Karachi — both newer and older — have been criticised by some analysts, who say they do not do enough to lower pollution.

A better focus would have been reducing the total number of cars and motorcycles on the roads, and creating more public awareness about the impact of air pollution, said Mohamed Toheed, associate director at the Karachi Urban Lab of the Institute of Business Administration.

"A commuter that uses his own smoke-emitting vehicle or bike to get to his workplace does not understand what cruelty he is committing with the environment," he said.

Yasir Husain of the Darya Lab,

Yasır Husain of the Darya Lab, a consultancy firm dealing with environmental issues, said at least 1,500 rather than 150 e-buses would be needed to have any impact in reducing emissions in Karachi.

"The government also should provide soft loans through easy financing to promote the use of e-bikes, and e-rickshaws," said Husain, who is also the founder of Green Pakistan Coalition, an advocacy group.

Shaikh, the transport secretary, acknowledged that the 150 new electric buses would not do much to reduce air pollution in isolation, but pointed to the bio-methane vehicles and also highlighted the 29 traditional bus routes covering the city.

He said Pakistan's current economic crisis and the financial toll of the 2022 flooding would not hinder the rollout of more e-buses, as such funding would come from international lenders.

Bhevish Kumar, a 24-year-old entrepreneur, said he had been taking the new e-buses to attend business meetings but was sceptical that the limited fleet would really do much to clean Karachi's choking air.

"There is need for its expansion and more penetration of e-bus services into the city's transport system to ensure that people do not burn ... fuel in their vehicles," he said. — Thomson Reuters Foundation

ophet Muhammad, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, deserves special rights, which are due only to the final Prophet and Messenger. These rights have been enjoined upon us by Allah and are part of safeguarding the perfect religion of Islam. Unfortunately many Muslims today have become confused with regard to these rights and have innovated practices that have no basis in Islam. The Prophet himself knew that such practices would happen and warned against them, "Beware of newly invented matters (in religion that is) for every invented matter (in religion) is a cursed innovation which leads astray." (Tirmithi and Abu Dawud)

So as Muslims we must stick to giving our Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, his rights as commanded by Allah and stay away from the innovations that either ignore these rights or take them to extremes.

Allah sent Muhammad, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, to all of mankind, with the divine message of la ilaha illallah (there is no deity worthy of worship except Allah). He brought glad tidings of Paradise to the believers and warning of the punishment of Hellfire to the disbelievers. He called to tawheed, the belief that Allah is the sole Creator and Lord of the universe, and therefore He alone should be worshipped. Believing in Allah is also believing in His Messenger.

To believe in him

There is no doubt that the first of our Prophet's rights is to believe in him and to believe in the message he was sent with. Allah says, "Believe in Allah and His Messenger and the light which He sent down." (64:8) Qadhi Eyadh said in his famous and important book about the rights of the Prophet, Ash-Shifaa, that, "Belief in the Prophet Muhammad is therefore an obligation for every individual. Belief is not complete without it and Islam is only valid with it."

Allah has linked belief in Him with belief in His Messenger. They are inseparable. This is what shahadah, the declaration of faith, means. Even if a person follows other prophets like Musa and Eesa, alaihemas salam, he is not a believer until he completely follows the teachings of Muhammad. Abu Hurairah, radhiallahu 'anhu, reported that the Messenger of Allah said: "I was commanded to fight people until they testify that there is no god but Allah and believe in me and what I have brought. When they do that, their blood and property are (they owe). Their reckoning is with Allah." (Bukhari and Muslim)

Believing in the Prophet, therefore, is about living according to his guidance. It is much more than just mere recognition of the fact that he is a prophet. Allah says, "When the hypocrites come to you, they say, 'We testify that you are the Messenger of Allah' and Allah knows that you are His Messenger and Allah testifies that the hypocrites are liars." (63:1)

At the time of the Prophet Muhammad, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, the Jews who lived in Arabia had been waiting for the promised Prophet that they knew of from their scriptures. But when Muhammad came they rejected him out of arrogance because he was not a Jew. Many of the rabbis, however, recognised that he was a Prophet but did not accept him or believe in him. Allah says about them, "Those to whom We gave the scriptures recognise him as they recognise their sons. But verily, a party of them conceal the truth while they know it."



Ibn Ishaq reports in his biography of the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, that Safiya bint Huyayy said, "I was the favourite child of my father and my Uncle Abu Yasir. When I was present they took no notice of their other children. When the apostle was staying in Quba with the brother 'Amr ibn 'Auf, the two went to see him before daybreak and did not return until after nightfall, weary, worn out, drooping and feeble. I went up to them in childish pleasure as I always did, and they were so sunk in gloom that they took no notice of me. I heard my uncle say to my father, 'Is he the one? Do you recognise him?' Can you be sure?' 'Yes!' 'And what do you feel about him?' 'By God I shall be his

enemy as long as I live!"" Believing in something is more than just recognising that it exists. Satan, as explained in the Qur'an, recognises that Allah exists yet he is the worst of the disbelievers.

To obev him

The second right, which is due to our beloved Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, is that we obey him. Allah says, "O you who believe, obey Allah and His Messenger..." (8:20) Allah has mentioned obedience to the Messenger in connection with obedience to Him. You cannot have one without the other. Obeying the Messenger means, following his commands and staying away from what he has prohibited. Abu Hurairah narrated that the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said: "All of my ummah will enter Paradise except for those who refuse to." They asked, "O Messenger of Allah, who will refuse?" He the Paradise. Whoever disobeys me has refused." (Bukhari)

To follow him

Allah says, "You have a good model in the Messenger of Allah for one who hopes for (the meeting with) Allah and the Last Day." (33:21) Commenting on this verse, Imam Tirmithi said, 'To take the Messenger as a model means to emulate him, follow his Sunnah and avoid opposition to him in either word or action." We should strive to follow his mode of life, his sayings, and doings, his conduct and

We can see from Prophet's companions, the way in which they emulated the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, followed his examples, and modelled their behaviours upon his. This is what it means to follow the Prophet Muhammad. A man from Khalid ibn Asid's family asked Abdullah ibn Umar, "Abu Abdurrahman. We find the 'fear salah' and the 'salah at home' in the Our'an, but we do not find the 'travelling salah." Ibn

Umar said, "My nephew, Allah sent Muhammad, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, to us when we did not know anything. We do as we saw him do-

When Umar, radhiallahu 'anhu, looked at the black stone he said, "You are a stone and can neither help nor harm. If I had not seen the Messenger of Allah kiss you, I would not have kissed you." Then he kissed it. Umar ibn Abdul Aziz said, "The Messenger of Allah made a Sunnah and the people in command after him made Sunnahs. To adopt them is to confirm the Book of Allah and to act on them is to obey Allah and strengthen the deen of Allah. It is not for anyone to change the Sunnah, or alter it, or to look into the opinion of those who oppose it. Whoever follows it, is guided. Whoever seeks help by it, will have victory. Whoever opposes it and follows other than the path of the believers, Allah will entrust him to what he turns to and will roast him in the hellfire, which is a bad ending?

To love him

A Muslim must love the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, truthfully. Allah says, "Say, if your fathers, your sons, your brothers, your wives, your tribe and the possessions you have earned, the commerce you fear may slacken, dwellings you love - if these are dearer to you than Allah and His Messenger and to struggle in His way, then wait until Allah brings His command." (9:245)

The Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said, "None of you will believe until I am more beloved to you than your children, your fathers and all the Prophet, "I love you more than anything except my soul, which is between my two sides." The Prophet replied, "None of you will believe until I am dearer to him than his own soul." Umar said, "By the One who sent down the Book to you, I love you more than my soul which is between my two sides." The Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said, "Now O Umar, now you have it."

Related to this love is nasiha. Nasiha is usually translated as good counsel and sincere conduct. It is "used to designate the desire for what is good for the one who is its object." Linguistically it means purity. The Messenger of Allah said, "The deen is nasiha. The deen is nasiha. The deen is nasiha." They asked, "To whom, Messenger of Allah?" He said, "To Allah and His Book and His Messenger and the imams of the Muslims and the common people." Nasiha to the Messenger of Allah is confirming his Prophethood, obeying him, supporting and protecting him, and following

for the Prophet, I wrote down things

Respect for the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, also includes respecting his family. The Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said, "Recognition of the family of Muhammad is freedom from the fire. Love of the family of Muhammad is crossing over the *Sirat*. Friendship for the family of Muhammad is safety from the fire." He also said about al-Hasan and al-Husayn, his grandsons, "Whoever loves these two and their father and mother will be with me on the day of rising." Abu Bakr said, "Respect Muhammad by respecting the people of his house?

It also includes respecting his companions. Allah says about those who pledged allegiance to the Prophet at al-Hudaybiyah, "Allah was pleased with the believers when they gave allegiance to you under the tree." (48:18) The Prophet said, "Do not curse my companions. If any of you were to spend the weight of (mount) Uhud in gold, it still would not reach the measure of one of them or even one-half of it."

Likewise, it is forbidden to curse the Prophet Muhammad. Allah said, "Those who harm Allah and His Messenger, Allah has cursed them in this world and the next world. He has prepared a humiliating punishment for them." (33:57) The Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said, "Whoever curses a prophet, kill him. Whoever curses my companions, beat

It is also not allowed to even joke about the Prophet or the religion of Islam. Allah said, "If you ask them, they declare, 'We were only talking idly and joking? Say, 'Was it Allah and His ayah and His Messenger that you were mocking?"" (9:65) It is reported that in the course of the campaign of Tabuk, a man came up one day and declared, "We have seen no people with greater appetite, more lying, or more cowardly in battle than the Prophet of Allah and his reciting companions." Awf ibn Malik rose and said, "It is rather you that are a liar. You are a hypocrite, pretending to be a Muslim. I shall tell the Prophet of Allah about you."

Awf then went to the Prophet to inform him but found that revelation had already preceded him. (When the news reached) the man, he mounted on his camel, sought the Prophet of Allah and said, "But we were only joking, trying to pass the time while travelling." Ibn Umar said, "He was clinging to the saddle belt of the Prophet's camel as it ran, his feet and legs being battered by the rough ground and repeating, "But we were only joking." And the Prophet insist-"Joking? Joking with Allah, with His revelation? With His Prophet?"

To judge according to his

The sixth right of the Prophet Muhammad is to judge by him and be pleased with his judgement. Allah said, "If you quarrel over anything, then refer it back to Allah and the Messenger." (4:58) Therefore, it is incumbent upon us to look in the Qur'an and the Hadith of the Messenger of Allah when we have a question about something. We must follow the laws that the Prophet Muhammad, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, brought and judge by them, and rule according to

At the time of the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, when he was once reciting, "They took their rabbis and their monks to be their lords beside Allah, and the messiah, son of Maryam, while they were commanded to worship none but One deity, none has the right to be worshipped but He. Praise and glory be to Him, far above

is He from having the partners they associate." (9:31)

A former Christian, Adi ibn Hatim, said, "O Allah's Messenger. They do not worship them." Allah's Messenger said, "They certainly do. They (ie, the rabbis and monks) made lawful things as unlawful and unlawful things as lawful, and they (ie, Jews and Christians) followed them, and by doing so, they really worshipped them."

We cannot put our own desires above the laws of Allah and that which the Messenger brought. To do so essentially, is to believe that we know better than Allah. Allah is our Creator and He knows us better than we know our ownselves. "Verily, he is the All Knower of what is in the chests." (67:13) He knows what is best for us and He has perfect wisdom and He is Just in all that He decrees. Ruling by other than what Allah revealed is therefore tantamount to disbelief.

To send prayers and salaam

The seventh right that is due to the Prophet Muhammad, sallallaahu ʻalaihi wa sallam, is saying the salah and salaam upon him. Allah says, "Allah sends His salah (blessings, mercy) on the Prophet and His angels too (ask Allah to bless and forgive him). O you who believe, send your salah on him and (you should) greet him with the Islamic way of greeting (ie 'assalamu alaikum)." (33:56) Prophet Muhammad, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said, "Whoever blesses me once, Allah blesses him with 10 salahs and 10 wrong actions fall away from him and he is raised by 10 degrees." And he said, "The nearest people to me on the Day of Rising will be those who have said the most salahs on me."

The Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, taught one way in which to say the salah on him. Abu Humayd as-Saidi said that they said, "Messenger of Allah, how should we pray on you?" He replied, "Say, O Allah, bless Muhammad and his wives and his descendants as You blessed the family of Ibrahim and grant blessing to Muhammad and his wives and descendants as You granted blessing to the family of Ibrahim. You are the Praiseworthy, Glorious?" This is the tashahud, which is said in the sitting of the salah. Another way is to say, ʻsallallaahu ʻalaihi wa sallam' when the Prophet is mentioned.

The meaning of sending salaam upon the Prophet is asking Allah to preserve him from any harm coming to him and it is also a greeting to the Prophet. Abu Hurairah said that the Messenger of Allah said, "Whenever anyone greets me with peace, Allah will return my soul to me so that I can return the greeting." The Prophet also said, "I will hear whoever blesses me grave. II se and blesses me, that is also conveyed

Since Allah has commanded that we send salah and salaams upon the Prophet Muhammad then it is a general obligation and not restricted to a specific time. The obligation is that we must do it at least once. However, saying it more than once is highly recommended and is the Sunnah. Other times include when one is

supplicating to Allah for something. Ibn Mas'ud said, "When one of you wants to ask Allah for something, he should begin by praising and extolling Him as He deserves, and then by blessing the Prophet. Then his supplication is more likely to be accepted." Likewise, during the Aathan, on Friday, when entering the masjid and leaving the masjid, at the funeral salah, and when writing letters, are other highly recommended times. The Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said. "Whoever blesses me in a book or a letter, the angels continue to ask forgiveness for him as long as my name is on it."

Giving gifts strengthens bonds of relations

ift-giving is one of the good manners that maintains and strengthens relations between the giver and the recipient. It is one of the acts that Prophet Muhammad, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam (may Allah exalt his mention), recommended Muslims to do. Al-Bukhari, may Allah have mercy upon him, narrated that 'Aa'isha, may Allah be pleased with her, said: "The Messenger of Allah, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, used to accept gifts and reward people for giving them."

The phrase: "Reward people for giving them," means giving the giver (at a later time) something of equal value at least in return.

This Hadith (narration) indicates that accepting gifts and giving something of equal value (or more) to the giver is the way of the Prophet, sallal-

laahu 'alaihi wa sallam. The Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, enjoined responding in kind to favours, as he said in an authentic

narration: "Whoever does you a favour, respond in kind, and if you cannot find the means of doing so, then keep praying for him until you think that you have responded in kind." [Abu Dawood]

"Whoever does you a favour," means, whoever treats you kindly in word or deed or by gifting you. "Respond in kind," means to treat

"If you cannot find the means of doing so" means if you do not have the

him kindly just as he has treated you

money. "Until you think that you have responded in kind" means, repeatedly supplicate for him until you think that

you have rewarded him his due.

One of the Du'aa' forms that one can say is 'Jazaka Allahu khayran' (may Allah reward you with good). At-Tirmithi, may Allah have mercy upon him, narrated that Usamah Ibn Zayd, may Allah be pleased with him, said: The Messenger of Allah, sallallaahu

'alaihi wa sallam, said: "Whoever has a favour done for him and says 'Jazak Allahu khavran' has done his utmost to thank him." [At-Tirmithi]

"Done his utmost to thank him," means that he has done his utmost to express his gratitude, because he has acknowledged his shortcomings and that he is unable to reward and thank him enough, so he refers the matter to Allah, to reward him in the best manner. It is said that: "If you are unable to give him back in kind, then speak at length thanking him and supplicating for him." [Tuhfat Al-Ahwathi]

The Permanent Committee (a supreme Islamic judicial authority in Saudi Arabia) was asked a similar question) and replied as follows:

"There is nothing wrong with accepting it (an amount of money as a gift), without you (the recipient) longing for that, and you can respond in kind if you are able to with an appropriate gift, or you can supplicate for him, because the Prophet, sallallaahu

'alaihi wa sallam, said: "Whoever does you a favour, respond in kind ... (the abovementioned *Hadith*)." [Fatawa Al-Lajnah Al-Daa'imah]

Difference between charity and gift-giving

Charity is given to the poor and the needy to meet their needs, and is done with the intention of seeking the Pleasure of Allah. Its intention is not limited to a specific person; rather it is given to any poor or needy one.

On the other hand, a gift is not necessarily given to a poor person, rather it may be given to rich or poor; the intention is to show friendship and to honour the recipient.

Both of them - charity and giftgiving - are righteous deeds for which a person will be rewarded (and please his Lord), but which is better?

Ibn Taymiyah, may Allah have mercy upon him, stated that Sadaqah (charity) is that which is given for the sake of Allah as an act of worship, without

intending to give it to a specific person and without seeking anything in return, rather it is given for charitable causes, such as to the needy. A gift is given with the intention of honouring a specific person, either because the recipient is your friend whom you love, or because you want something

Hence, the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, used to accept gifts and reward people for them, so that no one could remind him of their favours, but he did not accept the "refuse" of people that they gave to purify themselves of sins, namely charity. He did not accept charity for this and other reasons.

Once this is understood, then charity is better, but there is a sense in which a gift is better than charity, such as giving a gift to the Messenger of Allah, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, during his lifetime out of love for him. Also, gifts which a person gives to a relative in order to uphold the ties of

kinship or to a brother in Islam may be better than charity.

Based on this, giving to one of your relatives may be better than giving charity, because it is more befitting to uphold the ties of kinship. The same may apply if you give a gift to a friend of yours, because that will strengthen the bonds of love between you. The Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said: "Exchange gifts, as that will lead to increasing your love to one another." [Al-Bukhari]

What the *Hadith* means is that giving gifts may generate and increase

To sum up, gifting vs. giving charity is dependent on the situation but, in principle, spending in charity takes precedence.


Amir crowns Purebred Arabian Camel Festival winners
