

Former finance minister, others referred to court

Further to the statement issued by the Public Prosecution on May 6, 2021, regarding the arrest of the former Minister of Finance Ali Sharif al-Emadi and the conduct of an investigation against him about crimes raised in reports related to the public office:

The Public Prosecution indicated that the necessary investigations in this case have been completed by interrogating the accused, hearing witnesses, and examining the technical reports. Since evidence extracted from the case documents proved that the accused committed the crimes ascribed to them, the attorney-general issued an order to refer the accused to the Criminal Court to try them for the crimes bribery, appropriation of public money, abuse of office, abuse of power, damage to public money and money laundering. The Crescent Sighting Committee at the Ministry of Endowments (Awgaf) and Islamic Affairs has called upon Muslims in Qatar to sight the new crescent (hilal) of the blessed month of Ramadan on Tuesday evening, Sha'ban 29, 1444 AH, according to the Qatari calendar, corresponding to March 21, 2023. The committee has said whoever witnesses the crescent should head to the headquarters of the Awqaf ministry, located in Al Dafna (Towers) to report his testimony. The committee will meet immediately after the Maghreb prayer. (QNA)

UBS to take over Credit Suisse

UBS agreed to buy rival Swiss bank Credit Suisse for 3bn Swiss francs (\$3.23bn) in stock and agreed to assume up to 5bn francs (\$5.4bn) in losses, in a shotgun merger engineered by Swiss authorities to avoid more market-shaking turmoil in global banking. The deal includes 100bn Swiss francs (\$108bn) in liquidity assistance for UBS and Credit Suisse from the Swiss central bank. To enable UBS to take over Credit Suisse, the federal government is providing a loss guarantee of a maximum of 9bn Swiss francs for a clearly defined part of the portfolio, the government said.

Groundbreaking TEDinArabic Summit concludes in Doha

• Arabic stories and experiences are making their mark on the world, summit told

the curtain has come down on the first TEDinArabic Summit – held in Doha through a partnership between Qatar Foundation (QF) and TED – with its audience hearing how having a platform for ideas and experiences to be shared in Arabic is making an impact on the

Under the theme 'The Butterfly Effect', the two-day summit saw more than 3,000 attendees listen to talks in Arabic by TED speakers, participate in interactive workshops, and experience the event's Arabic stations and social spaces – all with the aim of amplifying ideas in Arabic.

The closing session of the summit – attended by HE Sheikha Hind bint Hamad al-Thani, Vice-Chairperson and Chief Executive of Qatar Foundation – saw Algerian journalist Amal Arrab tell the audience: "This summit has brought us together for two days in which we have felt the impact of ideas and experiences expressed through Arab voices."

"Most importantly, our stories and experiences may differ in their features, but they are similar in their impact, no matter how small that impact may seem to our eyes," she said. "There is no doubt that they are making a great change to the world around

In a discussion with Arrab during the closing session, Olympic swimmer and UNHCR Goodwill ambassador Yusra Mardini spoke about how

the ability of refugees to be self-reliant can be enhanced.

In 2015, she fled Syria during the country's revolution, reaching Greece by sea after travelling through Lebanon and Turkiye – with her, her sister, and two others swimming to push the boat to safety with 20 other people aboard when its engine failed.

Mardini later competed at the 2016 Olympic Games as a member of the Refugee Olympic Team, has written her memoirs, and created a foundation that allows refugees and at-risk young people to pursue their passions.

She told the TEDinArabic Summit: "Being a refugee is not a choice or an expectation. But we can choose to live our lives as refugees, to surrender and let our circumstances define us, or we can choose to fight for our dreams and

use our experiences to inspire others."

Speakers on the second day of the summit included Dr Ali al-Rashid, a Qatari engineer, researcher and expert in the field of artificial intelligence (AI) and cybersecurity, who recounted how his experiences at the beginning of his career changed his view of the development of AI, and the possibility that it might come to dominate human intelligence.

"Atthe beginning of processors."

"At the beginning of my career journey, on an airport project, I used to read people's faces, and I believed that the eye is the window to the soul," he said. "On the other hand, the process of passenger-checking was one of the most annoying issues to travellers due to overcrowding, so I started thinking about how I could find a solution to this problem." It was also announced that the organisation would hold the second highlevel forum in Kazakhstan from June 6-8 under the chairmanship of Oatar.

The announcements were made during a press conference by the Director of the Food Security Department at the Ministry of Municipality and Chairman of the Executive Council of IOFS, Dr Masoud Jarallah al-Marri and

n hosting of the event comes after Qatar's interaction with the IOFS and its various e arms, especially as it took the initiative to join and ratify the statute of the IOFS in 2016 and chairs its executive council represented by the Ministry of Municipality. This membership reflects the Islamic states' trust in the significant role played by Qatar in the Islamic world.

Dr al-Marri added that the Doha meetings would witness the launch of a fund for financing projects to enable member states to use their capabilities, enhance and rationalise the management of their resources, co-ordinate among states at the level of government, facilitate the process of communication between them, and overcome difficulties and help in the fields of food security to face challenges and emergencies.

The Director of the Food Security Department at the Ministry of Municipality and Chairman of the Executive Council

of IOFS indicated that global food security faces several challenges, whether environmental or geopolitical, which require co-ordinating the efforts and setting programme and strategies that would lead to an Islamic Organisation that is capable of addressing all crises.

He pointed out that the International Islamic Food Processing Association (IFPA) is one of the leading programmes of the organisation, which it relies on to achieve food security by promoting Islamic products and increasing intra-industry trade. The IFPA provides consultations for the products' owners to compete with other producers from outside the organisation, thus creating job opportunities and income for business owners. **To Page 4**

The Collaborating Centre initiative is designed to bring benefits to both parties, including more visibility of key projects and programmes, enabling improved opportunities to exchange information and develop technical co-operation with other international institutions as well as facilitate better access to funding for research and programme development.

Dr Hanadi al-Hamad, national lead, Healthy Ageing in Qatar and chairperson of the Department of Geriatrics and Long-Term Care at HMC, is

designated as the head of the Collaborating Centre.

WHO Collaborating Centres are institutions designated by the director-general to carry out activities in support of the organisation's programmes. Currently, there are over 800 WHO Collaborating Centres in some 80 member states working with WHO on areas such as nursing, occupational health, communicable diseases, nutrition, mental health, chronic diseases and health technolo-

HE Dr Hanan Mohamed al-Kuwari, Minister of Public Health, praised this unique co-operation between Oatar. represented by the Ministry of Public Health and WHO, which is the third Collaborating Centre, which confirms the strong focus and commitment to local healthcare.



GANHRI annual meeting approves statute amendments

The Annual Meeting of the Global Alliance of National Human Rights Institutions (GANHRI), taking place in Geneva, approved the proposed amendments to the Alliance's statute, with the aim of enhancing the accuracy and rigour of the accreditation process.

The meeting decided that all National Human Rights Institutions (NHRIs) accredited with (A Status) and (B Status) be subject to special review, or the suspension of the accreditation classification if their circumstances changed in ways that may affect their continued compliance with the Paris Principles, in addition to providing the sub-committee on accreditation with the ability to recommend the cancellation

of NHRI's accreditation classification, when it is not possible to continue to consider them as institutions operating in accordance with the Paris Principles.

In her opening speech to the General Assembly, HE Chairperson of the National Human Rights Committee (NHRC) and President of the Global Alliance of National Human Rights Institutions (GANHRI) Maryam bint Abdullah al-Attivah called on national institutions to enhance co-operation and solidarity to respond to the human rights challenges facing the world, adding that wars and conflicts do not end, and violence and discrimination continue.

Al-Attiyah added during GANHRI's Annual Meeting that

despite the severity of these challenges, it is time for hope, as 2023 marks the 30th anniversary of the United Nations General Assembly's adoption of the Paris Principles, establishing NHRIs' framework to remain independent and effective all around the world. Al-Attiyah said coinciding with this year as well is the 30th anniversary of the establishment of GANHRI, created with the mission of establishing, supporting, and strengthening NHRIs, and to make their voice heard worldwide.

She added that proof of GAN-HRI's impressive success, is the fact that it started off with 12 members in 1993, only to include 120 NHRIs members today.

Al-Attiyah stressed that there

were in the past 30 years, countless examples of NHRIs' strong impact on promoting justice and

accountability, redressing victims of human rights violations, in addition to their significant contributions to law, policies, and practices that support human rights. She pointed out the need for national institutions to draw inspiration from the 75th anniversary of the adoption of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which laid down a common framework in all regions. Al-Attiyah said that one of the issues mentioned in GAN-HRI's five-year strategic plan is the exchange of knowledge on ways to prevent torture and illtreatment in places of detention.

In addition, the GANHRI Annual Meeting included listening to reports from the four regional networks of NHRIs, key partners in the United Nations, the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner

for Human Rights (OHCHR), the United Nations Development Programme and GAN-HRI's sub-committee on accreditation.

The Alliance's Annual Meeting discussed ways to enhance the process of accreditation, and proposed changes to the statutes of GANHRI.

Al-Attiyah also revealed that GANHRI's 14th International Conference will be held later this year, and said that it will be co-hosted by the NHRI's of Denmark and Ukraine. She said the conference is important for members and partners alike, with the theme of NHRIs' role in preventing and responding to torture and ill-treatment. (QNA)

Qatar appeals for effective measures against Islamophobia

atar has called for effective measures to combat Islamophobia and all forms of intolerance, by everyone, regardless of their religion or background.

This came in Qatar's statement delivered by Second Secretary at Qatar's Permanent Mission to the United Nations Office in Geneva Mohamed al-Buainain, during an event organised on the sidelines of the 52nd Regular Session of Human Rights Council in Geneva, to celebrate the International Day to Combat Islamophobia.

Al-Buainain indicated that Islamophobia is not a new phenomenon, but it has been on the rise in recent years, fuelled by ignorance, prejudices and deliberate misinformation, and manifested in various forms such as verbal abuse, discrimination, physical attacks, and even the burning of the Holy

The Holy Qur'an has a special place in the hearts and minds of Muslims, as it is a source of guidance and inspiration, the statement said, stressing that watching it burn is very painful and unacceptable.

The statement emphasised the need to condemn acts of hatred and disrespect towards Muslims in the strongest possible terms, and take action to combat them. Regardless of our religion or background, we are all responsible to stand up against Islamophobia and all forms of blind fanaticism, the statement said, adding that people must also educate themselves, pro-

mote interfaith dialogue, and work towards building bridges of understand-

ing and respect. Al-Buainain pointed out that Islamophobia does not only affect Muslims, but also undermines the values of justice, equality and human rights that everyone cherishes, stressing that work must be done to create a world that accepts diversity, in which everyone is treated with dignity and respect. On the occasion of the International Day to Combat Islamophobia, Second Secretary at Oatar's Permanent Mission to the United Nations Office in Geneva Mohamed al-Buainain called for pledging solidarity with Muslim brothers and sisters, and to work for a world in which all people can live in peace and harmony. Ministry conducts parent survey on schools' quality

he School Evaluation Department at the Evaluation Affairs Sector of the Ministry of Education and Higher Education (MoEHE) has begun implementing a parental opinion poll for the academic year 2022-2023, which the department implements annually for all public and private schools and kindergartens.

This year's survey targets all parents from kindergarten to secondary


Parents can participate and answer the the survey questions by entering the link published on the ministry's website or through the survey link sent to them by the student's school via text message on their mobile phone number or any other means.

The guardian has to click on the survey link and insert the QID number. Then the answer is directed to survey questions that will last no more than five minutes.

The number of guardians targeted for this year is 125,524 parents in schools. Kindergartens are also targeted.

The survey includes questions about the extent of the guardian's satisfaction with the level of quality of their children's schools and the quality of education, such as the school's communication with them, duties and evaluations, the efficiency of teachers, the curricula taught in the school and the role of the school in promoting national identity, educational and moral

values among students. The School Evaluation Department called on all parents to participate in the survey. (QNA)

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Qatar to host sixth IOFS General Assembly in October

Dr Masoud Jarallah al-Marri reviewed the arrangements related to hosting the event and the importance of the organisation's role to improve the situation of food security in the countries of the Organisation of Islamic Co-operation (OIC).

He noted that the General Assembly of the IOFS would be attended by the ministers of agriculture and specialists in food security issues from 57 Islamic countries, in addition to officials from more than 25 international organisations specialised in food security.

The number of participants is expected to exceed 250. The organisation's General Assembly is seen as a platform for exchanging and co-ordinating joint efforts among Islamic countries to strengthen food security.

IOFS Director General Prof Yerlan Baidaulet, highlighted the great role of Qatar in the activities of the organisation, especially in the field of agriculture and animal production and Doha's contributions to resolving many issues facing the region and the world.

Baidaulet pointed out that the organisation deals with 57 member states of the organisation, which are mostly concerned with achieving food security, while 28 face the risk of hunger, malnutrition and natural disasters, which affect their food situation and security.

He added that the Islamic market is large and 80% of Halal food is imported from non-Islamic countries. Therefore, the organisation is working to develop supply chains, strengthen the capabilities of farmers, support small farms with consultations, and the provision of cheap and effective technology to face water scarcity and climate changes, he said.

The director general of the organisation stated that the sixth General Assembly of the IOFS will discuss a number of important issues, including the challenges of food security, support for businessmen and governments to deal with social and economic conditions, implementation of animal farm projects, provision of bread, development of supply chains, provision of agricultural technology and the need to attract international companies and

centres specialised in the fields of food security, reviewing the status quo and implementing the 10-year strategy, supporting the private sector, and reviewing the organisation's annual report. During the press conference, it was also announced that the organisation will hold the second high-level forum, which will be held from June 6 to 8, 2023, in Astana, capital of Kazakhstan, under the chairmanship of Qatar and with the participation of representatives of more than 23 member states. With more than 1,000 participants, the second edition of the forum will be an opportunity to confirm FAO's commitment to assisting member states in ensuring sustainable food

The forum aims to create a unique, dynamic and unprecedented platform for multi-stakeholder dialogue, with a focus on exchanging advanced agricultural technologies, advancing science and research in order to adapt agriculture to marginal environments, promoting the concept of smart agriculture, transforming food supplies and value chains, and facilitating strategic partnerships for business opportunities. investments in agriculture, and youth empowerment for sustainable food systems. On June 6, 2023, IOFS will hold a youth biotechnology forum titled 'Biotechnology for Food Security and Climate Resilience' where future food security experts, agro-entrepreneurs, farmers, IT professionals and students from the agriculture sector will hold working sessions and discussions on pressing challenges in agriculture from a modern perspective.

Young people's interest in this economic sector will, in the long term, help strengthen rural development and

national and regional food systems.

The main part of the IOFS high-level Forum on Food Security will be held on June 7, 2023, and will focus on three main sectors: food safety, advanced technologies and innovations. The important part of the forum on trade and investment will also be held within the Astana International Forum from June 8-9. It will serve as a platform for eminent delegates from governments, international organisations, businesses and academia, to address the four major global challenges including foreign

policy, security, sustainability, energy, climate, economics and finance.

During the meetings of the Fifth General Assembly of the Islamic Organisation for Food Security on October 11, 2022, Qatar, represented by the Ministry of Municipality, was elected Chair of the Executive Council of the organisation due to the great role it plays in the framework of joint work with the countries of the Organisation of Islamic Co-operation to advance the issues of the Islamic nation

Qatar has made great efforts in the field of achieving food security, within the realisation of the Qatar National Vision 2030, to achieve sustainable development as part of the national programme for food security, which contributes to making the Qatar National Vision 2030 a reality.

These efforts have contributed to Qatar's advanced ranks in recent years in the global food security index, which confirms that work in implementing the national strategy for food security is progressing according to plan.

The Islamic Organisation for Food Security is a specialised institution affiliated with the Organisation of Islamic Co-operation which was established in 2013.

The first meeting of the General Assembly was held in 2016. The organisation attaches importance to food security for all countries of the Islamic world and its reflection on the social, economic and political aspects.

The main objectives of the organisation include providing expertise and technical knowledge to member countries in various aspects of sustainable agriculture, rural development, food security and biotechnology, assessing and monitoring the food security situation in member countries to be able to identify emergency situations, providing social safety nets and humanitarian assistance through food security reserves through co-ordinating, formulating and implementing common agricultural policies such as sharing and transferring appropriate tech-nology and public food management systems, addressing problems such as desertification, deforestation, erosion and salinity, and mobilising, managing financial and agricultural resources to enhance food security. Lusail University launches two master programmes in tie-up with UN agencies

s part of Lusail University's expansion of academic programmes at the master's level, the university yesterday launched master programmes in International Criminal Justice and in International Affairs and Public Policy. The first is in collaboration with the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) while the second is in collaboration with the United Nations Institute for Training and Research (UNITAR).

The Master Programme in International Criminal Justice is the culmination of a strategic partnership with UNODC aimed at enhancing crime prevention through education for sustainable, peaceful and inclusive communities. Lusail University's objectives and willingness to raise awareness on the prevention of organised crime, corruption and terrorism in accordance with existing international conventions, standards and norms have coincided with UNODC's efforts and contributions to national and international efforts to prevent and combat crime through many approaches. These include the promotion of human well-being through educational measures.

through educational measures.

While addressing a press conference at the university, Professor Nitham Hindi, President of Lusail University, said that the objectives of the International Criminal Justice Master programme is helping students develop the tools and skills in drafting plans, legislation and writing reports. The programmes will prepare students to acquire the legal skills in criminal justice, cross-border crimes and counter-terrorism

initiatives in a complex international context while encouraging analytical, critical and creative thinking skills, and providing the student with an extensive theoretical and practical knowledge in the area of criminal justice and human rights. "It will also increase awareness of professional ethics and social values to underline the impact of crime on international relations," he said.

The International Criminal Justice Master Programme is based on promoting community awareness of crimes as a sustainable development goal that Qatar is pursuing. The programme was also an effective response to the contents of the Doha Declaration 2015, which emphasised the importance of education as a tool for crime prevention and urged support for the rule of law. The programme also reflects the goals of the Education for Justice Initiative E4J which is supported by Qatar and seeks to transfer knowledge and achieve a deeper understanding of rule of law is-

The programme will have an English and Arabic track. It's also benchmarked with international programmes and the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime oversight. It's a two-year programme consisting of 36 credit hours distributed over four semesters. The programme has four concentrations. These are combating money laundering and terrorism financing, anti-corruption, human trafficking and migrant smuggling and cybercrime.

Prof Nitham said that the programme learning outcomes are "to demonstrate in-depth knowledge of the principles of organised and international crime, and to participate in the planning and drafting laws and legislations, to write academic

research and legal reports, in addition to demonstrate knowledge of human rights, the rule of law, and the principle of justice, as well as knowledge of the court appeal processes related to international crime within national and international courts, and to determine areas of crossborder crime and its international jurisdiction."

This high-quality programme will provide an opportunity for all students with a bachelor's degree in various disciplines to study criminal justice. It is also designed in line with the laws applicable in the State of Qatar and focuses on applied legal studies and practical and experimental programmes in order to refine the student's skills and prepare him for the labour market.

The Master of Arts in International Affairs and Public Policy programme is offered by Lusail University in co-operation with its strategic partner UNITAR. This programme comes in response to the high demand in Qatar and the region for a Master of Arts in International Affairs and Public Policy. It addresses

the needs of the workforce in the domestic, regional and international labour market, especially as the field of international affairs and public policy becomes increasingly important with the growth of the world and its interdependence through trade and business. It's also an interesting topic with a heavy focus on the economy, culture, education and political science and examining its impact on society. This unique programme addresses two critical areas: international affairs with its various issues and public policy with its decisions that create the outcomes of the political system.

The programme has many advantages, as faculty members serving in the programme have significant experience in teaching and international work and they are well-known and qualified. The programme will be made available with two tracks with first in Arabic and second in English. The programme aims at engaging students to work collaboratively with international experts in multidisciplinary and multicultural contexts, develop students' competence in deal-

ing with challenges through the design public policies and their implications at global, regional and national levels, enhance students' technical, analytical and research skills to contribute to the generation of knowledge in the fields of international affairs, public policy and diplomacy, demonstrate to students the philosophies, theories and principles as well as key issues and concepts in international affairs and international relation.

Prof Nitham said the master programme in International Affairs and Public Policy is the first and only programme in the Middle East in cooperation with UNITAR. "The programme will begin in August 2023 (Fall semester 2023). This comes as part of Lusail University's strategic plan. The programme is characterised by the fact that it supports the Qatar National Vision 2030 while stressing the need for an educational system that rises to the level of distinguished international educational systems and provides citizens with what meets their needs and the needs of the Qatari society and includes educational curricula

and training programmes that respond to the needs of the current and future labour market. It's also based on an analysis of the needs of the local labour market and has high quality in terms of the teaching and learning process, indicators of quality assurance and international accreditation, and is taught by a specialised group of faculty members," he said.

Regarding the admission criteria, Fatma al-Mesleh, Vice-President for Student Affairs, said the candidate must have a bachelor's degree from a university accredited by the Ministry of Education and Higher Education of Qatar with a GPA of at least 2.0/4.0 (C) or equivalent in case of at least three years' practical experience after and should pass the personal interview with the admissions committee.

The application for the two master's programmes can be submitted online at the university's website with all personal and academic data, experience certificates and a curriculum vitae.

Al-Mesleh said the applications are transferred to the Interview committee, noting that the application is open until April 27, and the interviews will be held from April 30 to May 30, while admission decisions will be announced on June 7 and studies will begin on August 20.

Dr Moulay Hicham Idrissi, Dean of the College of Law, said the master's programme in criminal justice, which is the first in the region, aims to meet the need of Qatar to promote the principles of international criminal justice and the rule of law at the educational level. "As the programme is considered an actual response to the contents of the 2015 Doha Declaration,

which emphasised the importance of education as a tool to prevent crime and support the rule of law," he said noting that this programme embodies the goals of the "Education for Justice" initiative, which is supported by Qatar in an effort to impart knowledge and achieve a deeper understanding of issues related to the rule of law.

Dr Ramzi Nasser, Dean of the College of Education and Arts, said the Master of Arts programme in International Affairs and Public Policy is important because it focuses on studying the impact of economics, culture, education and political science on society. He added that the programme aims to provide students with theories, philosophies and concepts in international affairs and relations, in addition to improving their technical, analytical and research skills.

Lusail University is witnessing remarkable development since it opened its doors for the first time in September 2020. In addition to being the first national private university in the State of Qatar, the university has been known for being responsive to the needs of the workforce, in addition to the success of the current high-quality academic programmes, which witnessed the enrolment of about 2,000 students full-time student since opening in fall 2020 and is known for its ability to maintain high academic standards. 

QRCS, KRCS enhance healthcare services for refugees, local community in Bangladesh

joint delegation from the Qatar Red Crescent So-Qatar Keu Orescent Collective (QRCS) and Kuwaiti Red Crescent Society (KRCS) has launched a project to support District Sadar Hospital in Bangladesh.

With funding from the KRCS, the project is carried out by the ORCS's representation mission in Bangladesh, in co-ordination with the Bangladesh Red Crescent Society (BDRCS).

The project involves the procurement of 100 medical beds with all collaterals to support several departments of the hospital, especially the Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology (Ob-Gen), to double its capac-

ity.
The hospital's warehouse has also received non-medical consumables, such as sterilisation and cleaning materials/tools, bedsheets, blankets, mosquito nets and other supplies that last for one year, with the aim of upgrading hygiene and reducing infection, a press statement

The hospital offers primary and secondary healthcare services in diverse specialties for a community of 48,000 refugees and locals in Cox's Bazar dis-

The joint delegation handed over the in-kind donation to the hospital's management, supervised the installation and operation of medical beds, and assessed their impact on medical care for inpatients.

The delegation also held a meeting with the hospital's management to discuss the development process and how to best utilise the materials for the benefit of patients and meet the

hospital's ongoing needs.

Abdullah Fouda, donor relations expert at the QRCS, noted that the project came under the strategic partnership with KRCS that has resulted in joint humanitarian projects to support vulnerable people in many countries, including Bangla-

In particular, he said, they are about to complete a \$3mn project to improve shelter conditions and healthcare for the benefit of more than 1,200 refugee families.

This project involves the construction of adequate housing



units, as well as multiple freeof-charge healthcare services at camp clinics, such as medical examinations, treatment, and community outreach activities.

Abdelmounaim Mhindate. head of the QRCS mission in Bangladesh, said the project monitoring and evaluation visits, and meetings with patients and health officials, showed the great impact of the project.

Former Taiwan president Ma to visit China in landmark trip

ormer Taiwan president Ma Ying-jeou will visit China this month his 100 this month, his office said yesterday, the first time a former or current Taiwanese leader has visited since the defeated Republic of China government fled to the island in 1949.

The trip will be at a time of heightened tensions between Beijing and Taipei as China keeps up its military and political pressure to try and get democraticallyelected Taiwan to accept Chinese sovereignty.

Ma, who remains a senior member of Taiwan's Kuomintang (KMT) opposition party, held a landmark meeting with Chinese President Xi Jinping in Singapore

in late 2015, shortly before current Taiwan President Tsai Ing-wen was elected. Ma's office said that he would visit China from March 27 to April 7 and go to the cities of Nanjing, Wuhan, Changsha, Chongqing and Shanghai.

He will meet students and visit sites connected to World War II and China's conflict with Japan as well as those related to the 1911 revolution which overthrew the

last Chinese emperor and ushered in the Republic of China, his office said. The Republic of China remains Taiwan's official name.

It did not say if he would meet any Chinese officials or leaders, including whether he would meet

The KMT, which traditionally favours close ties with China but strongly denies being pro-Beijing, has been stepping up its engagement with China since both China and Taiwan eased Covid-related travel restrictions.

Last month the KMT's deputy chairman Andrew Hsia visited Beijing and met with senior Communist Party leader Wang Huning. Taiwan's ruling Democratic Progressive Party (DPP) seized on Hsia's China trip to attack the KMT for being too close to Beijing and wanting to sell out Taiwan, and criticised Hsia for going to "pay court to the communists".

The KMT says it is important to keep lines of communication open with China, especially given the current tensions.

China has rebuffed repeated calls from Tsai for talks, believing her to be a separatist.

She says only Taiwan's people can decide their future and rejects China's sovereignty claims.

Meanwhile, China's embassy in Britain yesterday condemned a visit this week by British lawmakers to Taiwan, saying they were insisting on visiting the island

despite China's strong opposition. Taiwan's presidential office said the group of six lawmakers from the British-Taiwanese All-Party Parliamentary Group would meet President Tsai Ing-wen in Taipei

No pledge made to help US defend Taiwan in sub deal: Australia

ustralia "absolutely" did not promise to support the US in any military conflict over Taiwan in return for a deal to acquire US nuclear-powered attack submarines. Australia's Defence Minister Richard Marles said yesterday.

Australia, the US and Britain unveiled the multi-decade AUKUS project on Monday. Canberra is to buy the US Virginiaclass military submarines, with Britain and Australia eventually producing and operating a new submarine class, SSN-AUKUS.


Australia's centre-left Labor government says the A\$368bn (\$246bn) deal is necessary given China's military buildup in the region, which it has labelled the largest since World War II.

Asked whether Australia had given the US any commitment to help during a conflict over Taiwan in return for access to the submarines, Marles told ABC television: "Of course not, and nor was one sought". He said there was "absolutely not" a quid pro quo obligation on Australia from the deal. China views democratically governed Taiwan as its own territory and has never renounced the option of force to take the island back.

President Joe Biden has said the event of "an unprecedented attack" by China.

Under the AUKUS deal, which Asian allies welcomed but which Beijing has called an act of nuclear proliferation, the US will sell Australia three subs, built by General Dynamics, in the early 2030s, with an option for Australia to buy two more.

Australian Trade Minister Don Farrell said yesterday he was confident a scheduled visit to China to meet his counterpart Wang Wentao would go ahead, despite AUKUS. Farrell said last month the meeting was a signal that Australia-China relations were thawing.

Pyongyang fires ballistic missile as US-S Korea drills continue

Torth Korea fired a shortrange ballistic missile yesterday, Seoul's military said, the fourth show of force in a week as South Korea and the US stage major military

Seoul and Washington have ramped up defence co-operation in the face of growing military and nuclear threats from the North, which has conducted a series of increasingly provocative banned weapons tests in recent

South Korea and the US are in the middle of 11 days of joint drills known as Freedom Shield, their largest in five years.

North Korea views all such exercises as rehearsals for invasion and has repeatedly warned it would take "overwhelming" action in response.

"Our military detected one short-range ballistic missile fired from around the Tongchang-ri area in North Pyongan province the East Sea," South Korea's joint chiefs of staff (JCS) said, referring to the body of water also known as the Sea of Japan.

The missile flew 800kms and was under analysis by US and South Korean intelligence, the JCS said in a statement, calling the launch "a serious provocation" that violated UN sanctions.

"Our military will maintain a solid readiness posture based on its ability to overwhelmingly respond to any provocation by North Korea, while carrying out intensive and thorough combined exercises and drills," it

Tokyo also confirmed the

launch, with deputy defence minister Toshiro Ino telling reporters Japan had "lodged a vehement protest to and strongly condemned (North Korea) through our embassy in Beijing".

"North Korea's behaviour threatens international peace and security, and is unacceptable," Ino added. The US military's Indo-Pa-

cific Command condemned the launch, saying it highlighted "the destabilising impact" of North Korea's banned weapons programmes. South Korea's defence minis-

try said hours after the launch it had staged joint air drills with the US featuring at least one US B-1B long-range bomber. The drills also involved South

Korean F-35A stealth fighter jets and US F-16 fighters and took place as part of the Freedom Shield exercise. The exercise had "greatly en-

hanced the allies' interoperability...and wartime capabilities". the ministry said in a statement.

The latest launch came a day after North Korean state media orted that more than 800 000 young North Koreans had volunteered to join the army to fight "US imperialists".

The young volunteers were determined to "mercilessly wipe out the war maniacs" and joined the army to "defend the country", the Korean Central News Agency (KCNA) said. On Thursday, Pyongyang test-

fired its largest and most powerful intercontinental ballistic missile, the Hwasong-17, its second ICBM test this year.

It described the launch as a

yesterday, saying "North Korea's reckless behaviour demands a swift and unified response by the international community, including further significant measures by the UNSC".

The UN Security Council is expected to hold an emergency meeting today over the ICBM launch at the request of the US and Japan, Yonhap news agency reported.

In a statement carried by KCNA yesterday, the North's foreign ministry "strongly" warned the US and other countries about including "legitimate self-defensive countermeasures of the DPRK for the discussion of the UNSC."

DPRK is the acronym of North Korea's official name.

In a separate statement, the foreign ministry also slammed the US ambassador to the UN Linda Thomas-Greenfield over a recent UN meeting over the North's human rights abuses.

"If the US is so worried about the 'human rights situation' in the DPRK, it should explain why it is so obsessed with the implementation of the most unethical sanctions," the statement said, warning the moves will result in "irreversible security instability" for the US.

Analysts previously said North Korea would likely use the drills as an excuse to carry out more missile launches and perhaps even a nuclear test.

The ICBM launch followed two short-range ballistic missiles on Tuesday and two strategic cruise missiles fired from a submarine last Sunday.

The recent flurry of aggression by Pyongyang has pushed Seoul and Tokyo to mend fences over historical disputes and try to boost security co-operation.

India police arrests 78 in hunt for Sikh separatist

manhunt for a radical Sikh preacher in India entered its second day yesterday, after authorities shut mobile Internet in the whole of Punjab state and arrested 78 of his supporters.

Amritpal Singh rose to prominence in recent months demanding the creation of Khalistan, a separate Sikh homeland, and with his hardline interpretation of Sikhism at rallies in rural pockets of the northern state of some 30mn people.

Last month Singh, 30, and his supporters armed with swords, knives and guns raided a police station after one of his aides was arrested for alleged assault and attempted kidnapping.

The brazen daytime raid in the outskirts of Amritsar left several police injured and heaped pressure on authorities to act against

After the operation began on

Saturday, Punjab police tweeted late in the day that 78 had been arrested in the "mega crackdown". But Singh himself was not thought to be among them.

Yesterday, there was a major police presence across Punjab, especially in rural pockets and around Singh's village of Jallupur Khera, local media reported. The police said that its "man-

hunt" was ongoing and the overall "situation is under control, citizens (are) requested to not believe in rumours".

Local media reports said that the Punjab government ordered the mobile Internet shutdown to be in place until noon (0630GMT) today.

It was worried that social media could be used to spread rumours and misinformation which could spark street vio-

Indian authorities frequently shut down mobile Internet services, particularly in the restive northern region of Kashmir.

Punjab – with about 58% Sikhs and 39% Hindus – was rocked by a violent separatist movement for Khalistan in the 1980s and early 1990s when thousands of people died.

The violence peaked in 1984 after a botched raid against a few hundred radical separatists, some of them armed, inside the Golden Temple headed by the hardline Jarnail Singh Bhindran-

This led to the assassination of India's prime minister Indira Gandhi by her Sikh security guards a few months later, which in turn sparked anti-Sikh riots in Delhi and elsewhere that left several thousand more people dead.

The separatist movement later lost a lot of support, with its most vocal advocates today primarily among the Punjabi diaspora in Canada, Australia, Britain and elsewhere.

India has often complained to respective governments over the activities of Sikh separatists who, it says, have been trying to revive the insurgency with a massive financial push.

19 die in Bangladesh bus crash

A speeding bus veered off a major expressway in central Bangladesh and plunged into a ditch, killing at least 19 people and injured dozens, The death toll could rise

further as some of the injured passengers are in critical condition, said Anowar Hossain. police official of Shibchar, where the crash occurred. The city is 80km away from the capital Dhaka.

The bus, carrying more than 40 passengers, fell about 30 feet into a roadside ditch after breaking through the railing of the newly-built Padma river bridge expressway, Hossain

The driver, who was killed,

appeared to have lost control of the vehicle after the tyre of the bus burst, he said, adding that the cause of the accident was under investigation. Road accidents are common in

Bangladesh, often blamed on reckless driving, old vehicles and poor safety rules, and killing thousands each year.



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Food-system revolution is coming

Disruption is coming to the agriculture sector. Around the world, livestock farmers are leaving the land, policymakers are targeting the harmful environmental and social effects of industrial meat production, and consumers are shifting away from meat to embrace healthier, more sustainable alternatives. With the sector approaching a crossroads, decision-makers in government, industry, and civil society will need to heed the lessons from major transitions in other

industries and start preparing.

The preparation will require a careful inventory of farmers, workers, and consumers' needs. While farmers are growing older and leaving the land for other pursuits or retirement, the agriculture sector is struggling to attract new entrants – and not just in richer industrialised countries. For every farm manager under 40, there are three over the age of 65 in Europe; and from Sub-Saharan Africa to Asia, Latin America, and the Caribbean, the number of older people living in rural areas is increasing while the number of young people declines.

At the same time, farms are becoming larger, and small farm operations are being squeezed. Owing to the challenging economics of farming and the power of a small number of giant industry incumbents, farms are being consolidated in the name of efficiency and economies of scale. As a result, the European Union lost more than one-third of its farms, and 40% of its livestock farms, from 2005 to 2020. Policymakers are thus left to consider whether and how to protect family farms, and how to avoid the risks of animal-welfare violations, poor working conditions, and diseases that are inherent in

industrial livestock farming.
Policymakers are also waking up to the compelling body of evidence about industrial meat production's environmental harms. While agriculture accounts for nearly one-third of all greenhouse-gas emissions, livestock alone (particularly cattle) contribute nearly 15%. Moreover, animal agriculture is the main cause of deforestation and

Farmers and companies alike should be prepared to adapt to changes that are now inevitable

biodiversity loss. Forests are razed to free up land not just for animal grazing but also for the additional crops needed to feed those animals. Beef production alone takes up some 60% of land used for agriculture, even though it contributes les than 2% of total calories consumed

While livestock and agriculture have traditionally been excluded from most emissions-reduction schemes, policymakers in Denmark, the Netherlands, and New Zealand are already working to close this gap, and many other countries will soon follow suit. The question now is not whether there will be increased

regulation of the livestock industry, but what shape and form it will take. Farmers and companies alike should be prepared to adapt to changes that are now inevitable.

Finally, consumers, too, are shifting away from meat and dairy. Over the past decade, the average person's meat consumption has decreased by almost 17% in the United Kingdom and by 11% in Germany. Notwithstanding a recent slowdown, there is still growth in the uptake of alternative proteins - a food source that produces only a tiny fraction of the negative environmental and animal-welfare effects of traditional meat products. Plant-based meat and milk sales are already trending up across the board in the EU, but also in countries like Thailand and South Africa. When these products reach taste and price parity with meat, their uptake by consumers could accelerate

Public policy also has a role to play. Livestock farming tends to be heavily subsidised in many countries, owing to the sector's low margins and high levels of debt. As sales fall, declining revenue is likely to have significant welfare implications for farmers and other workers tied to the industrial meat-production systems.

Given the complexities of these interacting trends, policymakers and corporate leaders need to start getting in front of this issue now. The experience of other sectors that have begun decarbonising - not least energy - shows that a planned and guided transition is always better than an ad hoc, unmanaged process.

One need look no further than last year's farmer protests in The Netherlands or New Zealand to see how abruptly climate policies can be disrupted when workers and communities feel left out. Unfortunately, we still have only a limited understanding of how best to integrate policy and corporate action to reduce food-system emissions while also protecting livelihoods. Since resisting change is not an option, policymakers and corporate leaders would do well to start thinking about how they will manage it in the coming years.

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Confronting the global water crisis in earnest

The world's water crisis can no longer be ignored. Unless we manage water properly, we will neither tackle climate change nor meet most of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

Last year's unprecedented floods, droughts, cyclonic storms, and heatwaves showed what is coming. But while such disasters garner plenty of attention, the underlying water crisis Water-related ch whether there is too much or too little. or whether it is dirty and unsafe – are already fuelling chronic food and health insecurity in entire regions. Every 80 seconds, a child under five dies from a disease caused by polluted water; and hundreds of millions more are growing up stunted and with diminished lifetime

Making matters worse, we have entered a vicious cycle in which the interaction of the water crisis, global warming, and the loss of biodiversity and natural capital exacerbates all three. Wetland erosion and lost soil moisture risk turning some of the planet's great carbon stores into new sources of greenhouse-gas emissions, with devastating consequences for the

No country can rely on its own territory for more than half the rainfall it receives. Everyone's fresh water ultimately comes from precipitation, which depends on the presence of stable oceans, intact forests, and healthy ecosystems in other countries and regions. Yet the capacity of both land and ocean systems to generate water is being destabilised.

As co-chairs of the Global Commission on the Economics of Water, we are calling for collective action to overcome the water crisis. We must marshal a response that is bolder, more integrated across sectors, more networked at the national and global levels, and more equitable than previous efforts. Our work shows that this will require a new "economics of water," as well as a comprehensive strategy to address seven key points.

First, we must recognise the global water cycle as a common good, and manage it accordingly. Since everyone is ultimately connected through water, we must work together to break the vicious cycle and put water back on a sustainable trajectory. That will require a vision based on justice and equity for all communities

everywhere. Second, we must adopt a missiondriven approach encompassing all the key roles that water plays in human well-being. That means treating safe water for domestic use as a human right, and acting collectively to stabilise the global hydrological cycle by managing water use in industry.
To ensure food security and resilient food supply chains, and to preserve biodiversity and natural carbon sinks, we will need a revolution in both green (rain-fed) and blue (irrigated) water management.

In addition to mobilising diverse stakeholders, we will need to use innovation policies and industrial strategies to catalyse solutions to the water crisis. We should scale up investments in water through new public-private partnerships that are as ambitious as those that got us to the moon 50 years ago; but we must attach conditions to ensure that collectively created value is shared widely.

Third, we need to stop underpricing water. With proper pricing and targeted support for the poor, water would be used more efficiently in every sector, more equitably across every commun and more sustainably both locally and globally. But our decision-making also must account for water's non-economic value, to ensure that we are protecting the broader ecosystem on which the water cycle (and human societies)

\$700bn of annual agriculture and water subsidies - which often fuel excessive water consumption and other environmentally damaging practices - and reduce the leakages in today's water-delivery systems. Doing so would free up significant resources with which to incentivise water conservation and

support the poor directly.
Fifth, we should establish Just Water Partnerships (JWPs) to ensure that low- and middle-income countries can invest in water access, resilience, and sustainability, in ways that contribute both to their national development

goals and the global common good. JWPs would help to bring together veral financing streams, not only by re-channeling inefficient domestic subsidies toward better uses, but also by enabling multilateral development banks and development-finance institutions to leverage public finance and crowd in more private capital. The economic returns on these

costs, especially if JWPs are designed to maximise synergies with initiatives to address climate change and achieve more inclusive growth.

Sixth, we should support more dynamic innovation to extend the reach of scarce water resources. Again, such investments will yield high returns. Going to the moon produced advances not only in aerospace but also in nutrition, electronics, communications, materials, and software. Likewise, focusing our attention on the water challenge means doing many things differently, which will lead to creative breakthroughs across many sectors.


For example, fortifying freshwaterstorage systems will require us to reimagine how we manage wetlands and groundwater resources that have been dangerously depleted. Developing an urban circular (recycling-oriented) economy for water will create a new logic for treating industrial and urban wastewater. Adopting precision irrigation, drought-resilient rain-fed farming, and less water-intensive crops will move us toward more sustainable food systems and higher incomes for farmers. And water footprints in manufacturing can be reduced, including through the reuse of water in producing critical materials such as the lithium we need for widespread electrification.

Lastly, we must reshape multilateral governance for water. The current system is highly fragmented and inadequate to the challenge. One useful tool is trade policy. By incorporating water-conservation standards in trade agreements, we can encourage more sustainable practices and discourage wasteful water subsidies. We also must use multilateralism to develop skills and capacity globally, and to protect the farmers, women, indigenous peoples, and consumers who are at the frontlines of water conservation.

We still have a chance to convert the water crisis into a global opportunity for economy-wide progress and a new social contract with justice and equity at its centre. Failing that, we will no longer have a safe Earth system.

Canada makes immigration easier for **Turks, Syrians**

anada has moved to ease immigration for Turkish and Syrian citizens already in the country, a month after an earthquake killed more than 50,000 people in the two

The 7.8-magnitude earthquake on February 6 killed more than 45,000 people in Turkive and thousands more in neighbouring Syria, and devastated hundreds of thousands of build-

"Canada is committed to providing relief to those impacted by the devastating earthquakes in Turkiye and Syria," said Sean Fraser, the minister for immigration, refugees and citizenship.

The new measures would allow, for example, people from those countries to apply for work permits that authorise foreigners to work for any employer for a specified period.

"Today we are introducing new measures that make it easier for Turkish and Syrian nationals to extend their stay in Canada and be with their families, while continuing to work and study in a safe environment," Fraser

The announcement comes 10 days after the UN urged the international community to speed up its settlement of Syrian refugees from areas affected by the earthquake in Turkiye. - AFP

Putin visits Mariupol in his first trip to an occupied territory

Russian President Vladimir Putin made a surprise trip to Mariupol, the Kremlin said yesterday, his first visit to territory captured from Ukraine since the start of Moscow's in-

Just hours after Putin visited Crimea to mark the ninth anniversary of the peninsula's annexation, video distributed by the Kremlin showed him landing by helicopter in Mariupol, the port city that Moscow captured after a long siege

The visit triggered an angry reaction from Ukraine, with a presidential aide blasting its "cynicism" and "lack of re-

The Russian leader took a tour of the city and was seen driving a car.

The Kremlin said he visited a rebuilt musical theatre and followed the presentation of a report on reconstruction

"Do you live here? Do you like it?" Putin was shown asking residents.

"Very much. It's a little piece of heaven that we have here now," a woman replied, clasping her hands and thanking Putin for "the victory".

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters that the visit was "spontaneous", adding that Putin's movements around the city and his meeting with locals were not planned.

He added that the visit took place "very late" on Saturday and in the early hours of vesterday

It was Putin's first trip to the eastern Donbass region since he launched the invasion in February 2022, and comes almost a year after Moscow announced the capture of Mariupol after a campaign that saw the destruction of the Azovstal steel works, the last holdout of Ukrainian forces in the strategic port

Mariupol was left devastated after Moscow relentlessly bombarded the city on the shores of the Sea of Azov and subjected it to a brutal siege.

"The criminal always returns to the crime scene ... the murderer of thousands of Mariupol families came to admire the ruins of the city and (its) graves," Ukrainian presidential aide Mykhaylo Podolyak said on Twitter. "Cynicism and lack of remorse."

Ukraine's defence ministry said on Twitter that Putin visited the city at night "as befits a thief".

"He watched the 'rebuilding of the city' ... at night. Probably in order not to see the city, killed by his 'liberation', in the light of day," the exiled Mariupol city council said on its Telegram account.

The visit comes ahead of a trip to Moscow this week by Chinese President Xi Jinping, widely seen as a diplomatic coup for Putin.

Beijing, a strategic ally of Moscow, has touted the trip as a "visit for peace" as it seeks to play mediator in the Ukraine conflict.

China has sought to position itself as a neutral party, urging Moscow and Kyiv to open negotiations.

However, Western leaders have repeatedly criticised Beijing for failing to condemn Russia's offensive, accusing it of providing Moscow with diplomatic cover for its campaign.

Putin also met army chiefs including the chief of the general staff, Valery Gerasimov, in the southern Russian city of Rostov-on-Don near the border with Ukraine, the Kremlin said.

He also made an unannounced visit to Crimea on Saturday, with Russian state TV showing him visiting the Black Sea port city of Sevastopol accompanied by the local Moscow-appointed governor Mikhail Razvozhayev.

Russia annexed Crimea in 2014 following a referendum that was not recognised by Kyiv and the international community.

The weekend visits came after the International Criminal Court (ICC), based in The Hague, issued an arrest warrant for Putin over Russia's alleged deportation of thousands of Ukrainian children during the conflict.

Kyiv says more than 16,000 Ukrain-

ian children have been deported to Russia since the start of the conflict, many of them placed in institutions and foster

ICC prosecutor Karim Khan told AFP that Putin is now liable for arrest if he set foot in any of the court's more than 120 member states.

The 70-year-old Russian leader has not commented publicly on the warrant but the Kremlin dismissed its validity as "void" since Russia did not recognise the ICC's jurisdiction.

Fighting on the ground is concentrated in the eastern Donetsk region of Ukraine, particularly the city of Ba-

Russia last autumn announced the annexation of Donetsk along with three other Ukrainian territories - Luhansk, Kherson and Zaporizhzhia – despite not fulling controlling them.

Russian shelling yesterday killed three people and injured two others in the village of Kamianske in the southern Zaporizhzhia region, the regional administration said.

rsrael and the Palestinian Authority have agreed to establish a mechanism to curb violence during a meeting aimed at preventing already surging violence from escalating further when the holy month of Ramadan begins later this week.

French govt defiant on pension reform ahead of crucial no-confidence votes

resident Emmanuel Macron faces a critical moment today when the French National Assembly is due to vote on no-confidence motions filed after his government bypassed parliament on Thursday to push through an unpopular rise in the state pension age.

The move, which followed weeks of protests against the pension overhaul, triggered three nights of unrest and demonstrations in Paris and throughout the country, with reminiscent of the Yellow Vest protests that erupted in late 2018 over high fuel prices.

However, while today's votes may put on display the level of anger at Macron's government, they are unlikely to bring

it down. Opposition lawmakers filed two motions of no-confidence in parliament on Friday.

Centrist group Liot proposed a multiparty no-confidence motion, which was co-signed by the far-left Nupes alliance.

Hours later, France's far-right National Rally party, which has 88 National Assembly members, also filed a no-confidence motion.

However, even though Macron's party lost its absolute majority in the lower house after elections last year, there was little chance the multiparty motion would go through unless a surprise alliance of lawmakers from all sides is formed from the far-left to the

The leaders of the conservative Les Republicains (LR) party have ruled out such an alliance. None of them had sponsored the first no-confidence motion

filed on Friday. However, the party still faced some pressure.

In the southern city of Nice. e political office o leader of Les Republicains, was ransacked overnight and tags were left threatening riots if the motion was not supported.

"They want through violence to put pressure on my vote on Monday. I will never yield to the new disciples of the Terror," Ciotti wrote on Twitter yesterday.

The turnout was just a small fraction of the 7mn registered voters in Africa's largest megacity, which has a population of more than 20mn people. The Lagos election was the highest profile among races for powerful governorships in 28 of Nigeria's 36 states, as well as for state assemblies across the

At least seven killed in Mexico shootout

t least five suspected criminals and two soldiers were killed in a shootout after gunmen ambushed a military unit in southwest Mexico, authorities reported on Saturday.

The confrontation occurred on Friday afternoon in the community of El Pescado, in a mountainous area of the state of Guerrero that is difficult to access and the scene of conflicts between criminal groups.

A military unit "was the target of an attack by approximately 18 armed civilians aboard two vehicles", after which a shootout broke out, an army report said.

Five gunmen and two soldiers were killed while two people suffered gunshot wounds.

According to local authorities, the attackers were likely members of La Familia Michoacana, which was one of the most powerful drug cartels in Mexico but lost much of its influence after the capture of its leaders. The cartel has been regrouping.

According to authorities, La Familia Michoacana is battling the Los Tequileros criminal group for control of the area where they engage in drug trafficking, extortion and kidnapping. - AFP

enior Republicans have echoed Donald Trump's claim that a looming indictment in a hush-money case would amount to political "persecution", while Democrats warned that his call for protests could trigger a repeat of chaos his supporters unleashed at the US Capitol.

In an explosive announcement on Saturday, the former president said he expected to be "arrested" tomorrow (Tuesday) in connection with a grand jury inquiry into a 2016 payment to an adult entertainment actor, allegedly to keep her from revealing a past affair with Trump.

Even potential Republican rivals in the stillevolving 2024 presidential race reacted sharply. "I'm taken aback at the idea of indicting a former president of the United States at a time when there's a crimewave in New York City," Trump's former vice-president Mike Pence said on ABC's This Week.

"It just feels like a politically charged prosecution here," he said. "I just feel like it's just not what the American people want to see."

The Manhattan District Attorney's Office has not confirmed any plans for an indictment, though multiple signs - including the recent appearances before the grand jury of Trump's former fixer Michael Cohen and the actor known as Stormy Daniels - point to a quick conclusion. Trump has denied any untoward involvement

with Daniels. However, law enforcement agencies are preparing for a possible indictment, with chaotic scenes outside the Manhattan Criminal Court a near-certainty if it does happen.

The possibility of a former president being arrested has fanned passions and injected considerable uncertainty into the 2024 campaign.

Republican Senator Lindsey Graham, a vocal supporter of the former president, called a possible indictment "an effort that's ongoing, never-ending to destroy Donald Trump, everything around Donald Trump".

Trump camp slams 'political' prosecution as Democrats brace for 'unrest'

Even Governor Chris Sununu of New Hampshire, an outspoken Trump critic and a potential rival for the 2024 nomination, suggested that an indictment could generate a powerful backlash. "I think it's building a lot of sympathy for the

former president," he told CNN talk show State "It does drastically change the paradigm, as we go into the '24 election," he said, adding of a

possible indictment: "It's going to be a circus." Trump's call on his Truth Social platform for his backers to "Protest! Protest!" and "Take our nation back!" was seen by Democrats as a worrying echo of his language ahead of the January 6, 2021 rioting by his supporters at the

Pence, Sununu and other Republicans defended the right to protest any legal action against Trump, so long as people do so peace-

However, Pence's former chief of staff, Marc Short, told CNN that "trying to encourage protests in the shadow of January 6th is reckless". Democrats said they feared Trump's call could provoke violence.

Nancy Pelosi, the former House of Representatives speaker, has called Trump's announcement "reckless", saying that he was trying to "foment unrest among his supporters".

Democrat Mark Kelly recalled being in the Senate chamber when the January 6 riots forced him and other lawmakers to seek shelter, and expressed concern that Trump urging protests could spark a repeat of life-threatening unrest.

"I think it's going to be important for law enforcement to pay attention to protests and make sure it doesn't rise to the level of violence" seen at the Capitol two years ago, Kelly said on CNN. Short suggested that Trump might be drawing attention to the Manhattan case to plant the notion that other state and federal inquiries into his past actions, seen as legally more serious, are "all politically based".

The current House speaker, Republican Kevin McCarthy, said on Saturday that Trump's arrest would be "an outrageous abuse of power by a radical DA", adding he would direct congressional committees to investigate whether federal funds are "being used to subvert our democracy".

Some saw that as a thinly veiled threat to the office of Manhattan district attorney Alvin Bragg, who is leading the hush-money inquiry.

As security agencies prepared for possible protests outside his courthouse, Bragg told staff on Saturday in an internal message that intimidation or threats against them would not be tolerated, NBC reported.

Seminar Series ends with discussion on impact of Islamic civilisation on West

The second edition of the Seminar Series concluded yesterday evening in the presence of HE the Minister of Culture Sheikh Abdulrahman bin Hamad al-Thani, HE the Minister of Justice Masoud bin Mohamed al-Ameri, a number of other dignitaries, and a large gathering of intellectuals and interested citizens and residents.

The Seminar Series was organised by the Ministry of Culture over a period of two weeks, in co-operation with Qatar University, the Arab Centre for Research and Policy Studies, and Qatar National Library.

Moroccan academic and preacher Dr Saeed al-Kamali spoke on the topic of The Impact of Islamic Civilisation on the West, which witnessed a large audience and was moderated by preacher Youssef Achir.

He presented what European historians have narrated about the influence of the Islamic civilisation on the West, and said there are several opinions in this regard.

Some of these were critical while others had a fair view of the civilisation of Muslims.

The claims of the group holding unfavourable views have since been invalidated by evidence found in history in view of the stream of Muslim scholars' contributions in various fields.

Dr al-Kamali explained that some books and opinions have been fair to Muslims, adding: "Some authors and historians, such as French writer Voltaire, were fair to Muslims when he said 'we owe them physics, chemistry, medicine, astronomy and even the arts? Voltaire also said that 'we owe them algebra', and he meant the Arabs."

"Voltaire said this was a great invention, which seems to be the flame of the human mind, and by that he meant that the human



mind was in darkness (ignorance) and was lit by the Arabs' invention of algebra," he said. "Also, Western Orientalist Gustave said in his book, Civilisation of the Arabs that 'the Arabs taught us medicine, philosophy, physics, chemistry and even the arts."

Then, Dr al-Kamali spoke about the impact of the Islamic religion on Arabs, as "it moved them from the state of illiteracy to knowledge and proficiency, and from the state of ignorance to the state of literacy".

"Then, the Arabs understood through Islam that they are the successors on earth," he continued. "That they are required to rebuild it, and they understood that through its reconstruction, they will construct their hereafter."

"Islam stimulated people to work, emphasising that many of the honourable hadiths of the Prophet (PBUH) urged Muslims to construct the land, which they did, as it appears from their achievements in the first century CE, when they became allies on this approach," he added.

Dr al-Kamali referred to the Islamic civilisation's interest in all fields of engineering, starting with urbanisation and construction to establishing the bases of military engineering since the first century CE, when rules were set for the creation of military monuments that protected the country since the era of Muawiyah Ibn Abi Sufyan, while stressing that Andalusia was an important and great station.

Elements of Islamic civilisation also penetrated Europe.

Dr al-Kamali made a comparison based on the testimonies of Western writers in the history of Europe in the Middle Ages and between Andalusia, which was advanced scientifically, intellectually and cultured.

Its streets were paved and luminous, and there were means to preserve the environment, unlike European capitals that did not know about lighting, nor did they have elementary knowledge or know how to get rid

On the other hand, Andalusia boasted of universities, observatories, laboratories and libraries, and there were more than 70 public libraries in Spain.

Dr al-Kamali also mentioned the contributions made by the Islamic civilisation in mathematics, and many other contributions, which the West benefited from and built upon them later, and which made Western writers keen to translate the books written by Muslims on mathematics.

Located within and outside the museum, the exhibition includes new site-specific works that continue to explore the Icelandic-Danish artist's abiding interests in light and colour, geometric studies, ecological awareness and morethan-human relationships.

Creates, the year-round national cultural movement that curates, promotes and celebrates the diversity of cultural activities in Qatar.

HE Sheikha Al Mayassa bint Hamad bin Khalifa al-Thani, Chairperson of Qatar Museums, said: "The Curious Desert by Olafur Eliasson illustrates the power and problem-solving ability

"These two natural cultural sites enrich each other - together they make up The Curious Desert " Eliasson said.

Located in a sabkha habitat 64km northeast of Doha, near the Al Thakhira Mangrove Reserve, 12 temporary pavilions enclose a series of new, experimental artworks that respond to the

ephemeral natural phenomena of the local envi-

ronment, such as sunlight, wind and water. The first three outdoor pavilions explore optical phenomena, making use of rainbows, shadows and mirrors to create mesmerising effects, while pavilions five through seven contain awing machines t ements of the sabkha habitat to create artworks that will later be displayed within the exhibition

at the NMoQ. The final three pavilions bring this environment into dialogue with others, with materials such as obsidian and glacial mud from Iceland.

Among the projects located in the 12 desert pavilions are:

O Rainbow incubator: 11 prisms, arranged along the top of a reflective sphere according to the path of the sun at Al Thakhira, bend and break the daylight entering the sphere, causing it to appear at different times of the year as a perfectly circular rainbow.

O Saltwater-drawing observatory: two circular canvases - one white and the other black - turn slowly on motors as water, mixed with black and white pigments respectively, drips down onto the spinning surfaces.

The wind causes the drawing utensil to move across the surface of the turning page, leaving undulating marks upon the surface. The drawings, portraits of the weather con-

ditions at the location, are then periodically shown at the NMoQ. O Solar incense burner: a single glass

sphere uses the rays of the sun to ignite a selection of scents typical of Qatar and the region oud, musk and amber, among others.

Each burns for one hour, functioning as a clock by marking the time of day with scent.

O Your obsidian garden: inspired by Eliasson's hikes through volcanic obsidian fields in the Icelandic highlands, the artwork in this pavilion features black, shiny obsidian that stands out in stark contrast to the sandy ground, appearing to have erupted from beneath the desert.

Eliasson and the QM worked with an ecologist to conduct an extensive survey of the site near Al Thakhira to ensure the protection of its

O The Research map, 2019: a sprawling pin wall that charts the research and ideas that have inspired Eliasson and his studio in recent years. The map can be seen as a space of micro-sto-

rytelling, where seemingly unrelated contents vibrate next to each other and create new mean-

O Photography series depicting the natural landscapes of Iceland: including the glacier melt series, 1999/2019, 2019, the inner cave series, 1998, and the horizon series, 2002 - selected with the landscape of Oatar in mind.

• Artworks created by drawing and painting machines installed outdoors near the Al Thakira Mangrove Forest.

The presentation of The Curious Desert follows Qatar Museums' October 2022 unveiling of Eliasson's outdoor installation commissioned for the desert near the Ain Mohamed heritage site in northern Qatar.

The artwork, Shadows Travelling on the Sea of the Day (2022), continues the Icelandic-Danish artist's longstanding exploration of the interplay between human perception and the natural



A two-part film created by Tigerlily Production for Studio Olafur Eliasson and Qatar Museums captures the development of Eliasson's installation, Shadows Travelling on the Sea of the Day, and his exhibition, The Curious Desert.

The film created for Shadows Travelling on the Sea of the Day will be on view at the Mohamed Jassim Al Khulaifi Library of the NMoQ, together with a special reading room dedicated to Eliasson, which collects a broad selection of catalogues covering the artist's production, starting from the his first solo exhibition in the nineties running up to the present.
