'New visa rules spur Qatar-Saudi travel'

Saudi Arabia's recent decision to ease its tourist visa policy has spurred a surge in demand for travel from Qatar.

As the tourism industry in the Middle East and Gulf region continues to grow, travel agencies in Qatar have been playing a vital role in facilitating travel for tourists.

Earlier, Saudi Minister of Tourism and Chairman of Saudi Tourism Authority Ahmed al-Khateeb tweeted: "Saudi visa application is now simpler, more convenient and straightforward for residents of GCC States, regardless of their profession. Apply now."

The visa, which can be for a single entry or multiple entries, enables the holder to visit Saudi Arabia for tourism and Umrah.

There are several tourism activities that are expected to be popular among GCC residents who are planning to visit Saudi Arabia.

"Saudi is undergoing a major transformation, the clients are keen to travel to explore the market. We have Qatari citizens, as well as residents travelling to experience the Riyadh season, Winter Wonderland, and new touris-

tic places in Saudi Arabia, especially Diriyah in Riyadh, Al Ula, and not forgetting the pilgrimage traffic, as well," Syed explained.

Syed noted that many people are looking forward to benefiting from this new policy by experiencing tourist destinations and exploring the different business opportunities available in Saudi Arabia.

"This is indeed a great initiative to attract different segments of travellers to visit Saudi Arabia...since the land border is opened for all vehicles, there is a big rush. Moreover, travelling to Riyadh is just five to six hours, and Dammam is just three hours, hence many families and individuals are travelling to experience the kingdom," he further explained.

He added: "Saudi was considered very conservative a couple of years back but now with the current transformation in progress, it is indeed an eye opener for all GCC states to open and let in the tourism business. Tourism plays a vital role in pushing the economy of any country."

Tomorrow is first day of Ramadan; preparations complete for holy month

The holy month of Ramadan will begin tomorrow (Thursday), it was announced yesterday.

The Crescent Sighting Committee at the Ministry of Endowments and Islamic Affairs (Awqaf) said March 22 is the final day of Sha'ban and that March 23 (Thursday) will be the first day of Ramadan.

This came in the committee's statement after its meeting at the headquarters of the Awqaf ministry yesterday evening under the chairmanship of Sheikh Dr Thuqail al-Shammari, the official Qatar News Agency reported.

The committee said the Ramadan crescent was not sighted yesterday and, as a result, announced that Thursday would be the first day of the holy month.

The committee extended greetings to His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani, His Highness the Father Amir Sheikh Hamad bin Khalifa al-Thani, and His



Sheikh al-Shammari making the Ramadan announcement.

Highness the Deputy Amir Sheikh Abdullah bin Hamad al-Thani, as well as the esteemed government and people of Qatar and all Muslims, on the advent of Ramadan.

Preparations have been finalised for the holy month, with the Awqaf ministry readying some 2,150 mosques across Qatar. The ministry has also made separate arrangements for women in 120 mosques.

Besides, the ministry has announced various Ramadan activities while Iftar meals will be distributed for fasting people and food kits will be given to the needy.

Speaking to Qatar TV, al-Shammari urged believers to seek repentance from God and do more good deeds and charitable acts.

Al-Shammari advised people to take advantage of the holy month by doing good for all, reading the Holy Qur'an, doing charity and strengthening family relations.

Sheikh Mohamed al-Mahmoud, a member of the Crescent Sighting Committee, noted that the believers must take advantage of the holy month as it is a "virtuous and great" occasion.

Fareed al-Hindawi, preacher and imam at Awqaf, also told Qatar TV that Ramadan is the season of goodness and discipline, and urged believers to invest in goodness during the holy month. Pages 3, 12

Qatar, Rwanda share close friendship, promising partnership

Within the solid and distinguished relations that bond Qatar to Rwanda and their friendly peoples, comes the visit of Rwanda President Paul Kagame to Doha. His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani welcomed him to a meeting where they discussed bilateral relations between the two countries and ways to support and enhance them in various fields of co-operation, especially in the economic and investment fields.

The visit is seen as a good sign of the strength of relations between Doha and Kigali, reflecting the aspiration and keenness of the leadership in both countries to boost, strengthen, and develop them in all fields to serve the interests of both countries and their peoples. The visit and the talks that will take place will form a chance to strengthen the bonds between the two sides, discuss various partnership aspects, and

contribute to boosting bilateral co-operation in all fields, especially trade, economic, financial, and investment aspects. Qatar is seen as a strategic partner to Rwanda and the relations between the two countries have witnessed steady growth since establishing the diplomatic relations in 2017. Since then, the leaders of the two countries have met regularly, and the exchanged high-level visits between the two sides have contributed to boosting joint co-operation in various vital fields and enhancing the partnership between the two countries. In this regard, His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani visited Rwanda in April 2019 and made another visit in June 2022 to participate in the 26th Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting in Kigali. Meanwhile, the Rwanda president paid several visits to Doha in February 2022, October 2021, October 2019, December 2019, and November 2018.

Despite the novelty of the relations between Qatar and Rwanda,

it can be described as ambitious and promising and reflects the determination of both sides to strengthen and enhance them in a way that serves the interests of the two friendly countries and peoples. The two countries are continuously working on building exemplary partnerships between them and co-operating on many issues to serve their interests and those of others.

Relations between the two countries are regulated by agreements and memoranda of understanding that cover several fields, such as politics, diplomacy, economy, trade, agriculture, culture, sport, investment, aviation co-operation, and avoidance of double taxation.

The two countries also signed an agreement to acquire 60 percent of the shares of Bugesera International Airport in Rwanda, and Qatar Airways signed two agreements with the Rwandan tourism air transport company and an agreement with the Rwanda civil aviation authority. There is also a memorandum of understanding (MoU) for defence



co-operation between the two countries. Qatar's Hassad Food Company, which invests in the food sector, signed an MoU with the Rwandan government aimed at opening opportunities for co-operation between the two sides and studying investment opportunities in the agricultural and food fields.

The Qatar Financial Centre (QFC) also signed an MoU with the Rwanda Finance Limited to launch joint initiatives that

contribute to promoting the growth and international expansion of the business of QFC and the Kigali International Financial Center, in addition to the partnership between Qatar Airways and Rwanda's flag carrier, RwandAir, which enables travelers to reach 160 destinations in the combined networks of both airlines.

In previous statements, President Kagame expressed his country's aspiration to enhance

its relation and economic partnership with Qatar, stressing that Qatar's development path is exemplary and that there is a great opportunity to develop economic and trade co-operation between Qatar and his country as one of the fastest growing economies in Africa. Rwanda offers a thriving and stable investment system in industries such as textiles, clothing, leather, agriculture, livestock, industry, tourism, information and communication technology, and pharmaceuticals, in addition to the services sector's provision of a significant contribution to the gross domestic product, he added, affirming that his country enjoys many advantages for investment, but it must rely on itself to achieve what it aspires to, by working hard and persistently.

Rwanda is located in the middle of the African continent to the south of the equatorial circle within the range of the Plateau of Lakes, and it is an inland country that has no coasts, connected to the outside world through its neighbouring countries, especially through the ports of Dar es Salaam in Tanzania and Mombasa in Kenya.

Rwanda's area exceeds 26,000sq km, and its population is estimated at 12mn, 83% of whom live in rural areas. In the early 1990s, the country witnessed one of the bloodiest ethnic clashes in history, but was able to rise and stand on its feet again to build a prosperous unified country, full of hope, success and competitiveness at the regional and global levels. The story of Rwanda's success is one of brightest examples of the human ability to change and transform, as this small and poor country in Africa was able to achieve great accomplishments in several areas, starting from achieving political and security stability, to transforming its economy from traditional agriculture to a technology-based knowledge economy service, in addition to encouraging foreign investments, easing restrictions on them, allocating incentives for foreign investors and opening all sectors to them.

Ramadan crescent sighting: astronomical calculations vs the naked eye

Every year with the end of the month of Sha'ban, Muslims around the world await the sighting of the crescent of the month of Ramadan in preparation for fasting and to revive the Sunnah of Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him), when he said in the Hadith "whenever you sight the new moon (of the month of Ramadan), observe fast, and when you sight it (the new moon of Shawwal), break it, and if the sky is cloudy for you, then observe fast for thirty days."

Whenever the month of Ramadan approaches every year, Muslims wonder how and when to monitor and observe the crescent, its conditions, and its requirements. This is due to the different

locations of countries in terms of latitude and longitude, the times of sunrise and sunset, and points of view on the interpretation of religious scripts regarding sighting the crescent. In his remarks to Qatar News Agency (QNA), HE the President of Qatar Centre for Space Sciences and Astronomy, Sheikh Salman bin Jabor al-Thani, said that according to the Sunnah, observing the crescent of the month of Ramadan starts from the 29th day of Sha'ban as people try to apply the Sunnah, which is to observe and try to see the crescent over the western horizon after or with sunset, as it becomes easier to see after sunset.

On the conditions and circumstances that should be met for the

validity of the crescent's observing and sighting, he explained that some things are preferably done for the sighting process, including assuring the birth of the crescent before sunset and a sufficient distance between the moon and the sun, so that the moon creates sufficient light, making it easier for the observer to see it. It is also preferable for crescent observers to be in an area free of environmental and light pollution, away from beaches, so that sea humidity does not affect the possibility of seeing it.

Regarding the process of observing itself, Sheikh Salman said that observers should begin by focusing on the western side from the beginning of contact with the

sun to the western horizon in order to take advantage of as much time as possible to try to see the crescent. There is nothing wrong with using binoculars, and using

them is acceptable in validating the birth of the crescent. As for digital cameras, they are unacceptable because their capabilities far exceed the human eye.

Sheikh Salman said that the existing or the mentioned difference between countries is not of a big significance as religion is supposed to make people's lives easier not harder, and Allah told Muslims to fast Ramadan for 29 days or 30 days according to the possibility of observing the crescent, which is also affirmed in several Hadiths of the Prophet (peace be upon him).

He said that some people deliberately create controversy among countries or sheikhs for media publicity by denying the cres-

cent sighting while the Crescent Sight Committee is meeting on the investigation day, warning of the ensuing social rows. Sheikh Salman stressed that there is no disagreement among sheikhs or astronomers, calling on the public to listen only to the Crescent Sighting Committee.

Arab and Islamic countries use binoculars to see the crescent at a time when other countries adopt astronomical calculations, he said, noting that seeing the crescent with the naked eye is highly recommended among Muslim fuqaha' (Islamic jurists) in accordance with the Holy Qur'an.

Most Islamic countries depend on the spatial visibility of the crescent on the 29th of Sha'ban

in every possible place by committees composed of fuqaha', astronomers and ordinary citizens, he added, highlighting the inevitability of collective investigation of the crescent as the best way to ensure what is being seen is the crescent.

He also noted that the duration of fasting hours in Ramadan vary from one country to another according to their latitude and longitude, highlighting the variance within large countries by area, such as Algeria and Saudi Arabia.

There will be a few-minute increase in the duration of fasting hours during Ramadan coinciding the approach of summer when daylight hours increase, he said. (QNA)

PHCC provides guidelines for chronic diseases management during Ramadan

The Primary Health Care Corporation (PHCC) has offered important health tips for fasting people in the holy month of Ramadan. "We, as doctors, believe that fasting is a patient's personal right, and our mission is to help them take the right decision and fast safely," said Dr Naela Darwish Saad, manager of PHCC's Umm Salal Health Centre.

One of the most important risks that older persons face while fasting is dehydration and complications of chronic diseases, added Dr Saad. These include heart disease, diabetes, high blood pressure, and kidney failure. Add to that medication non-adherence as well as malnutrition and deficiency of some vitamins, minerals, and calcium.

Dr Saad advised older persons with chronic diseases to see a doctor early enough before Ramadan to check if it is safe to fast, and to manage their medications and determine the proper timings for taking them. Further, she advised to hasten to break their fast and avoid high-fat.

For people suffering from chronic diseases, Dr Saad said that they should consult their

doctor before fasting to check if it is safe to fast and develop a treatment plan for them. "People with type 1 diabetes who are on insulin or people with type 2 diabetes on several doses of insulin a day, are not advised to fast. However, if a patient takes one injection of insulin, it should be before Iftar. If taken twice a day morning and evening, the main dose should be before Iftar and the lowest dose before Suhoor, according to their doctor's instructions."

"For diabetics who take a tablet once a day, it can be taken before Iftar. For tablets taken twice a day, a dose can be taken before Iftar and the other be-

fore Suhoor. For some types of tablets, the patient may need to reduce the dose taken at Suhoor, according to their doctor's instructions."

Dr Saad noted that all fasting diabetics need to measure their blood sugar levels at home to ensure that they control their sugar levels properly. Home tests should be done before Iftar and Suhoor meals and two hours after the two meals.

"Patients with acute hepatitis and decompensated liver failure cannot fast as they desperately need sugars and they develop ascites."

"Patients with chronic hepatitis and hepatic steatosis can fast, keeping in mind that they should avoid fatty foods. They should also quit smoking and reduce animal protein to 50-80gm."

"Fasting is not advisable for some patients with cardiovascular disease such as those who experienced a recent stroke during the first six weeks, unstable angina, acute heart failure, heart arrhythmias, some cases of valve stenosis, and some cases of uncontrolled high blood pressure."

"Patients with kidney failure should not fast. If a patient is

undergoing dialysis, they can fast on the day when they are not undergoing dialysis. It is also advisable not to fast for patients with kidney stones, especially on extremely hot days."

"For asthma patients, fasting have benefits such as improving the lungs capacity and asthma. Patients can use bronchodilators while fasting, according to religious scholars' fatwas as well as the doctor's instructions."

Dr Saad stated that fasting for pregnant women does not negatively affect the growth of the foetus if she follows a healthy lifestyle and diet. However, she has to consult her doctor to avoid any risks she or her unborn baby may be exposed to or any pain she may feel.

"Some pregnant women are not advised to fast such as mothers with low blood pressure, severe vomiting in the early months of pregnancy, and some chronic diseases that require a specific medication. They also should not fast if there is a decrease in foetal movement or weight, if they suffer from preterm labour pain, if they are taking medication to prevent preterm labour."

Qatar roundtable to facilitate Afghan health programmes

Qatar hosted a roundtable meeting between delegations from the Ministry of Health of the Afghan caretaker government, the World Health Organisation (WHO), the United Nations Children's Fund (Unicef), and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation to co-ordinate efforts to eradicate polio and discuss the health situation in Afghanistan.

Minister of Health in the Afghan caretaker government Qalandar Ibad, HE the Assistant FM Lolwah bint Rashid AlKhatir, HE the Assistant Minister of Public Health Dr Salih al-Marri, representing HE the Minister of Public Health, WHO representatives headed by Director of the Polio Eradication Program at the WHO Regional Office for the Eastern Mediterranean Dr Hamed Jafari, Unicef representatives led by Deputy Regional Director of Unicef South Asia Noala Skinner, and Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation delegation chaired by the foundation's Director of the Polio Eradication Program Dr Jay Wenger participated in the meeting.

During the meeting, they discussed the progress made by the Ministry of Health in the Afghan caretaker government to eradicate polio and identified existing challenges and plans that could be adopted by the authorities to support the efforts of the Ministry of Health in the Afghan care-

taker government in responding to the disease. Also, the meeting discussed the possibility of expanding polio eradication programmes to build solid foundations for a health system that responds to the needs of the Afghan people.

In her opening speech at the meeting, HE the Assistant Foreign Minister affirmed Qatar's position in support of Afghanistan and its brotherly people, praising the important role played by specialists and workers in the healthcare field, both women and men. She pointed out that good healthcare helps in the prosperity of local economies, stressing the readiness of Qatar to contribute by providing training and projects to build the capacity of the health cadre in Afghanistan.

In his speech, HE Dr al-Marri stated that polio is one of the diseases that the global community is about to eradicate. HE underlined that concerted international efforts to eradicate the disease in Afghanistan would contribute to the total eradication of the disease, which is the goal that the WHO Subcommittee on Polio Eradication, co-chaired by the State of Qatar, is working on.

In turn, the delegation of the Ministry of Health in the Afghan caretaker government extended their thanks to Qatar for its support for the Afghan people. The delegation affirmed their readiness to support international programmes that benefit the Afghan people, and the importance that those programmes employ

During the discussions, the delegations of Unicef, WHO, and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation praised the efforts of the Ministry of Health in the Afghan caretaker government during the past period to address Covid-19 and polio, enumerating the restrictions that impede their work in Afghanistan and ways to facilitate their work by the caretaker government. The delegations noted the identification of the eastern and southeastern regions as areas of the spread of the disease and the measures taken to

implement the optimal model for testing the population and providing preventive vaccinations by intensifying home visits.

In the closing session, the Qatari and the Afghan sides agreed to work together to facilitate the work of international health agencies in Afghanistan and employ Afghan cadres in their projects. The delegation of the Ministry of Health in the Afghan caretaker government shall present a clean sheet indicating the basic needs of the Afghan health sector, in addition to the preparation of signing a memorandum of understanding (MoU) between the Ministry of Public Health of Qatar and the Afghan Ministry of Health to co-operate

in the field of capacity building and enhancing the capabilities of the Afghan health sector.

Polio is one of the infectious diseases that the world suffered from in the past, as it affected about 125 countries in 1988, which led to the infection of 1,000 children daily at that time. However, the great progress in the eradication programs of this disease led to its elimination by 99 percent. Therefore, the emergence of this disease again in regions such as Afghanistan and Pakistan is a matter of concern, and hence the importance of international action to contain the phenomenon before it exacerbates and spreads to other parts of the world. 

Qatar seeks peaceful settlement over deadlocked Syria political solution

Qatar has stressed that the chosen path to reach a political solution in Syria has almost reached a deadlock due to the lack of seriousness of the Syrian regime and its insistence on using the security and military solution based on arbitrary detention, enforced disappearance, killing, torture, destruction, siege, the use of internationally banned chemical weapons, and the deliberate targeting of civilians and civilian objects, and committing the most heinous crimes and gross violations of human rights.

This came in the statement of Qatar delivered by HE the Permanent Representative of Qatar to the UN Office in Geneva Dr Hind Abdulrahman al-Muftah during the interactive dialogue with the Independent International Commission of Inquiry on the Syrian Arab Republic yesterday, within the framework of the 52nd session of the Human Rights Council.

She agreed with what was stated in the report regarding the danger of the absence of a credible political process, which will fuel conflict and increase instability. She pointed out the harsh situations that Syrian people had to face while providing relief for the affected people during the earthquake

recently, and the delay that occurred in the arrival of the humanitarian and relief assistance to the most affected people.

She also referred to the Syrian regime's attempts to use the humanitarian disaster to gain more time and achieve political gains, which is considered a stark reminder that the current situation and half-solutions must not continue, and that the actors and the international community should

take further measures to ensure the protection of the Syrian people, alleviate their suffering, ensure that all people responsible of crimes and violations against Syrian people will be held accountable, and reach a peaceful settlement based on a vision rate less than normal. PHCC implements growth charts, visual acuity test programmes in public schools

The Primary Health Care Corporation (PHCC) has announced the implementation of annual growth charts and visual acuity test programmes in all public schools in the country, in co-operation and prior co-ordination with the Non-Communicable Diseases Department at the Ministry of Public Health.

The PHCC stated that the application of the World Health Organisation's growth charts programme targets all public school students from the first to 12th grade on an annual basis, pointing out that the programme aims to provide a database and build a surveillance system to monitor the growth of school students, and early detection of cases of growth disorders that may be related to the diet or lifestyle in general, which is represented in weight loss or short stature on the one hand, or weight gain and obesity on the other hand.

The School Health Department succeeded in completing the implementation of health surveys for the two programmes of growth plans and examination of visual acuity, and the completion of all procedures and requirements necessary for their implementation.

The number of those targeted in the growth plans programme reached 93,218 male and female students, and 92,984 male and female students were examined, with a rate of 98.1%, the PHCC said.

It noted that the results of the health surveys of the growth charts programme showed that approximately 8,226 students have a defect in their growth indicators, and it was found that 43,000 suffer from short stature problems, 6,817 suffer from obesity problems and 463 suffer from thinness and underweight problems, explaining that all these students were transferred to health centres to be followed up by doctors specialising in this field and to receive the necessary

medical care. The PHCC explained that the visual acuity test programme aims at early detection of cases of weakness and defects in visual acuity among students, as school health nursing has received theoretical and practical training on appropriate methods and the health requirements followed in examining visual acuity, in addition to the mechanism of electronic documentation and the proper transfer of cases discovered for students who suffer from a vision rate less than normal. It includes transferring them to the ophthalmology clinic and the optometry clinic of the PHCC in order to dispense medical glasses and provide them with appropriate treatment.

As for the implementation of the visual acuity test programme, the PHCC revealed that the number of targeted students reached 50,065 students, with the visual acuity measured for 48,923 male and female students at a rate of 97.8%. The results of the surveys revealed 6,256 male and female students, which constitutes a rate of 12.8%, suffer from poor visual acuity, and 99.6% of the detected students were transferred to the health centres of the PHCC for follow-up and to receive the necessary medical care.

Out of keenness to achieve the goals of the programme and with the joint co-operation with the Ministry of Public Health, a training workshop was organised for all school health nurses on how to use devices that measure indicators of growth and body mass indexes recommended by the World Health Organisation, the PHCC said.

The PHCC confirmed that it was able, through the health files system, to follow up and track the implementation stages of the two programmes accurately and effectively, in co-operation with the PHCC's Department of Health Information Systems. (QNA)

HE Sheikhha Alya stated that she deeply believes in the role of cultural diplomacy as an effective tool of soft power influencing the service of the vital national interests of states, and in making an influential position in the international arena, and added that cultural diplomacy

With regard to Qatar Museums, she stated that Qatar pos-

sesses some of the most prominent and ancient international art collections. She also pointed to the 2022 partnership between Qatar Museums and the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York, which included the Hall of the Islamic World dubbed "Qatar Hall" in the Metropolitan Museum in the heart of New York -- as it expresses the symbolic and strategic dimension of this initiative in the context of cultural diplomacy.

He lauded the other creative projects and initiatives of Qatar

Museums in the field of cultural diplomacies, such as the initiative to organise cultural years, which included several countries, like Japan, the UK, Brazil, Türkiye, China, Germany, Russia, India, France, and the US.

She also pointed to the great role of the Cultural Village Foundation - Katara and the smart strategic partnerships with international cultural institutions, and the membership of Qatar in the largest of these institutions, adding that the international conferences and forums hosted by the Qatar every year play a role in building bridges of human and civilised communication, such as The Doha Forum, which is hosted by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the World Innovation Summit for Education (WISE) and the World Innovation Summit for Healthcare (WISH), which are organised by Qatar Foundation.

She pointed out that Qatar's hosting of the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022 was the largest example of integration and harmony between well-known traditional diplomacy, cultural and sports diplomacy, and added that Qatar succeeded in hosting the most successful World Cup in the history of football. Crucial diplomatic role of cultural institutions stressed

Participants in the Libraries Lead Forum - Qatar National Library's (QNL) annual forum for library professionals - stressed the need to strengthen the diplomatic role of cultural institutions during the conclusion of the forum's sessions.

Speaking to Qatar News Agency (QNA), Director of Research and Learning Services at QNL Abeer al-Kuwari said the forum is an annual occasion that enhances communication among library specialists in Qatar and beyond, pointing out that the forum chose the theme of cultural institutions' role, namely libraries, museums, archives, and exhibitions, in promoting cultural diplomacy, due to the emergence of cultural diplomacy as a type of soft power for states, in bringing closer people of the world and in raising their multicultural understanding.

She added that the forum concluded with the recommendation of raising awareness amongst state institutions and ministries of the importance of establishing a partnership between public diplomacy and cultural diplomacy.

Al-Kuwari revealed that the forum chose next year's theme to be on libraries and Artificial Intelligence.

President of the Arab Federation for Libraries and Information Dr Nabhan al-Harrasi said at the conclusion of the forum that the Libraries Lead forum succeeded in bringing together library experts from around the world, to emphasise this year's theme on the diplomatic role of cultural institutions, which could serve as soft power in civilisational interactions among states, noting that the presentations made during the Forum raised some recommendations to promote the dissemination of the Arab culture abroad, and its integration with other cultures.

The second day of the forum saw a number of sessions, the most important of which was a seminar on "using culture to strengthen local, regional and international relations." Librarians from Qatar and the region gave quick presentations on libraries as a motivating force.

QNL's Eman al-Shammari presented a paper entitled 'National libraries as political catalysts', and Sheikhha Maryam al-Thani from Qatar University



Library presented an intervention entitled 'Introducing library users to the history and heritage of Qatar.' Sarah al-Safadi presented a research paper under the title 'Cultural institutions...a diplomatic tool in confronting extremism, ignorance and problems of relationship with the other,' and Tasneem Dari of the Museum of Islamic Art presented a paper entitled 'Refugees, brave Afghans tell their stories to the library of the Museum of Islamic Art! Topics on the mechanisms of restitution of cultural heritage property and the diplomatic role of the Palestinian National Library were also discussed. In an inaugural speech on Sunday, HE the Minister of State and President of QNL Dr Hamad bin Abdulaziz al-Kawari said that there is an increasing need to strengthen the bonds of cultural diplomacy among the people of the world amid the fluctuations the humanity is going through due to pandemics, diseases, natural disasters, wars and conflicts.

This has generated an intense and strong desire among people to search for rapprochement more than searching for difference, al-Kawari said, noting the essential role played

by cultural institutions in being bridges of communication.

Al-Kawari also highlighted the manifestations of cultural diplomacy represented in sports during Qatar's hosting of the 2022 World Cup, with the Qatari culture being represented in museums, galleries, historical facilities, libraries, local customs and traditions.

Al-Kuwari discussed QNL's efforts and its diplomatic initiatives as an ambassador of Arab culture in international cultural forums, and its use of cultural diplomacy tools to build bridges of communication with other cultural institutions, whether in the Arab world or globally, the most important of which was QNL's exchange of books with national Arab libraries and the embassies of friendly and brotherly countries in Doha, collecting Arab and Islamic manuscripts and relocating them digitally.

HE al-Kawari pointed to the success of the library in gaining the confidence of the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA) to play the role of the IFLA regional centre for preserving heritage materials, preserving it in Arab countries and the Middle East. (QNA)

World Water Day: 'Accelerating Change' a necessity to solve crisis

Countries of the world will celebrate today (March 22), as the World Water Day for the year 2023.

This year's theme is "Accelerate Change" to solve the water and sanitation crisis, with the aim of raising awareness on all matters related to water and inspiring others to take the necessary measures towards the most important challenges facing the population of the planet today, which is water scarcity, that comes as a result of natural and human causes and factors.

The main focus of this occasion is to support Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 6, which stipulates the need to address the issue of water availability and sanitation facilities for all by 2030.

Dysfunction throughout the water cycle undermines progress on all major global issues, from health to hunger, gender equality to jobs, education to industry, and disasters to peace.

Access to water, sanitation and hygiene is a human right, but billions of people and countless schools, businesses, healthcare centres, farms, and factories still face daily challenges in accessing even the most basic services.

Qatar, along with the rest of the world, celebrates this occasion, out of its awareness of the importance of water and the need to save it, rationalise its consumption and manage its



resources in a way that achieves sustainability, especially since these aspirations are in line with Qatar National Vision 2030, which aims to transform the country by 2030 into a state capable of ensuring the continuation of a decent life for its people, generation after generation.

Qatar is also working to sustain the provision of high-quality water services and is continually striving to upgrade them to the best levels while adhering to local, international health and safety standards, and this is implemented through a comprehensive strategy to achieve integrated and sustainable management of the country's water resources and through the na-

tional programme, TarSheed, which succeeded in reducing the water consumption rate per capita in the country by a large percentage.

Over the past years, Kahramaa has succeeded in meeting the increasing demand for water in the country, despite an annual increase in water consumption, and achieved its strategic goals by consolidating the water security in the state, increasing the capacity of the strategic water reserve, and raising the capacity of the water system to enable it to cope with severe emergencies, as the storage capacity was increased from 1,000 to 2,400mm gallons, creating an increase of 140% in Kahramaa's

drinking water reserves. In 2022, Kahramaa launched the National Water Control Center, after completing its renovation and development work, and announced establishing of the National Emergency Control Center.

Doha Municipality action against improper food preparation, storage

Doha Municipality has taken action against an individual found preparing and storing food items improperly.

The offender was spotted while a house at Madinat Khalifa North was being vacated to implement an administrative decision regarding Law No 15 of 2010 on the Prohibition of Workers Camps within Family Residential Areas.

A violation report was issued and the person referred to the security entities concerned.

Since February this year, Doha Municipality has evacuated 27 buildings, cut electricity supply to 34 buildings, and spotted 36 unregulated storehouses inside residential areas, in addition to detecting four vehicle parking areas converted into food outlets.

The campaign to evacuate the illegal workers camps will continue until the targets are achieved.

Accordingly, 1,050kg of expired rice and lentils were found and a violation report was issued based on Law No 8 of 1990 on the Regulation of Human Food Control.

The seized items were destroyed in co-operation with the General Cleanliness Department.

Meanwhile, the meat health unit at the section carried out earlier an awareness and inspection campaign targeting vehicles that transport meat to shops and the slaughterhouse.

This was done to ensure that the mechanisms comply with the requirements for the safe transportation of meat.

The publications will come out in paper, digital, audio and open access formats and in line with the needs of people with visual impairments, the university said. Speaking to Qatar News Agency (QNA), Dean of LU, Prof Nitham Hindi, said the move comes in line with the LU's strategic plan, which aims to enhance the culture of scientific research, highlighting that its mission is based on providing a stimulating envi-

ronment for scientific research and knowledge production that contributes to sustainable development, and promotes service and community building. With most publications available today being concerned with Arab and foreign law, the new project will start with publications (paper books and e-books) related to Qatari law, Prof Hindi said. Most of the House's books will be available in Arabic, and the most important English books will be translated into Arabic to offer a true benefit for the society, he added. Director of Publications and Artistic Works Department at the Ministry of Culture, Mubarak bin Abdullah al-Khalifa, hailed the move as a distinguished initiative in elevating the cultural activity in Qatar, noting the ministry's support and welcome of various initiatives that promote cultural activity.

LU's launching of the publishing house with the aim of enhancing the knowledge and cultural aspects of the concerned groups are highly appreciated, al-Khalifa said. Director of LU Press, Dr Murielle El Hajj Nahas, said the house will offer a large-scale publication of the LU staff's papers, highlighting the House's policies that ensure the accuracy and authenticity of scientific publications and journals. The LU Press will also translate scientific research published in Arabic into English, so that it can be recognised globally, Dr Nahas said. She added that the House will contribute effectively to highlighting the distinction of Qatari and Arab culture, by publishing academic works on Qatar and the region, highlighting the debut textbook entitled Introduction to Qatari Law.

Doha Debates launches Arabic-language podcast

Qatar Foundation's (QF) Doha Debates has released its first Arabic-language podcast, Lana, which explores timely issues impacting young Arabs. Doha-based journalist Rawaa Augé hosts the podcast, produced in partnership with the Amman-based podcasting company Sowt. Lana - the Arabic word for 'Ours' - features young Arab speakers who represent different sides of an issue, but are committed to listening to one another and engaging in open, thoughtful dialogue. During the podcast's first season, guests will discuss contemporary issues such as 'cancel culture' and beauty standards, as well as long-standing challenges such as immigration and work. The podcast's launch event on March 18 took place at the TEDinArabic summit, organised through a partnership between TED and QF. Lana is hosted by Rawaa Augé, a news anchor, producer, moderator, and digital content host at Al Jazeera Media Network. Augé hosted and executive-produced 70 episodes of the award-winning show Bekasretaa (which means Women's Voices) for Al Jazeera Arabic TV from 2019-2021. The inaugural episode of Lana explores the use and value of online debate. Other episodes in the first season address the evolution of the Arabic language, mental health issues affecting younger generations



and the complex topic of immigration and asylum. Doha Debates' managing director Amjad Atallah said: "We've been able to create a number of spaces for people with diverse viewpoints to seek common ground despite their differences. We've found an excellent partner in Sowt for our first Arabic-language podcast, and we're confident that it will create a similar space for Arab youth to engage in the kind of constructive dialogue that leads to social change." Ramsey Tesdell, CEO of Sowt, added: "Sowt's goal has always been to create thought-provoking, intellectual and engaging content. When we started speaking with Doha Debates about a podcast, it was clear that we are closely aligned on this goal."

QC delivers Eid Charity-funded aid to quake survivors in northern Syria

Qatar Charity (QC) has started to deliver a new batch of urgent relief assistance to those affected by the earthquake in northern Syria. The aid funded by Eid Charity is expected to benefit 5,750 people in northwestern Syria. This is part of QC's continuous efforts to contribute to meeting the basic needs of the earthquake victims. The aid, worth QR2mn, includes the installation and equipping of 1,150 shelter tents and the provision of primary shelter materials, which comprise mattresses, blankets, fire extinguishers, and first aid kits. Digital technologies major enablers of change in future: UDST vice-president

Computer scientist, academic, researcher, keen squash player, doting husband and father. Professor Rachid Benlamri, vice-president of the University of Doha for Science and Technology (UDST) is a multi-faceted researcher and a distinguished academic administrator who has left an indelible mark on all the positions he has held and the different roles he has played, endowed with resourceful enthusiasm and abundant energy to lead younger generations to push boundaries to even greater heights. *Gulf Times* met with Prof Benlamri, a well-versed academic with a passion for sports who discovered the virtues of leadership, good organisation and time management at a young age during scouts' camps. He says: "I strongly believe that success starts from a young age, a number of characteristics shaped my life and made me successful. Resiliency, creativity, optimism and sociability. I see them as a must for any youth in order to be successful. "I was lucky to join the boy scouts, the school of life, and this made me work hard, be at the top of my class. I got my BSc in Computer Science from the University of Constantine in Algeria. I was top of my class, this got me a scholarship to study at one of the top schools in computer science, Manchester University, where the world's first stored program digital computer was designed and built by the late Tom Kilburn and Freddie Williams. "I was fortunate to be in the research

group of one of the leaders in computer science, professor David Aspinall, who worked under the supervision of Tom Kilburn and designed the fastest computer in the world in 1962, namely Atlas Computer. "Being there gave me the opportunity to get an international experience, to work with scholars and leaders who made the first footprints in computer science. This gave me the extra mile to innovate, and to be with the big players in this field." Prof Benlamri has previously held academic and leadership positions in the UAE for 25 years, and transformed a number of small institutions into big ones. "The unique turning point in my life was when I joined the UAE University in 1996, as the head of the computer science department." This mindset has always accompanied

Professor Benlamri. He contributed to academia in Canada for 16 years, mainly in research, "where I built research centres in the health informatics sector, computing and healthcare, developing smart healthcare systems using AI, IoT and knowledge engineering to address crucial healthcare challenges; thus impacting the health of people and programs that are still used in the healthcare system in Canada." This enhanced his international experience after working as an academic in Algeria, a researcher in the UK, along with the UAE know-how, to give him a rich experience and a different approach to understand challenges and work from the experience he gained. This consequently impacted his joining of College of the North Atlantic - Qatar, which is now UDST. He sees this as

"a lifetime opportunity in terms of joining a technical college that was in the transition of becoming the first national applied science and technology university in Qatar." Talking about the last one-and-a-half years of being here, Prof Benlamri said: "We made a fantastic transition. We are also making our partners very active in the delivery of our technical programmes that address Qatar's needs, which are aligned with the strategic goals of Qatar National Vision 2030. These are a very good fit for the needs of the industry, with which we create very close relationships to be unique in this area." He stressed that "the mindset about applied science institutions has completely changed. The world is about jobs now - startups, creating new industries; therefore, technical skills, competencies, innovation, leadership and being sustainable in your way of thinking are the major drivers of the landscape in education in the future. We are witnessing an era where many big companies are falling down. The leading ones in terms of job creators are the companies who were not here five or 10 years ago, such as Snapchat, Instagram, Twitter, TikTok, Google, Amazon, etc. These are the main players of the future industries. "In the knowledge economy, students equipped with leadership skills, soft skills and professional competencies are the main assets for developing and accelerating the building of a new wealth for our nations." Prof Benlamri said he is grateful to "the presidents of universities I worked with, who shaped my life and provided me with opportunities to take up new leadership positions and make

a change. In Canada, I worked with president Brian Stevenson, I built many projects there. In Qatar, I am fortunate to work with Dr Salem Al-Naemi, who has an inspirational vision for applied education and long, rich experience in industry. We met the challenges and put large perspectives for UDST, set high goals for it and made progress in this big project." The UDST vice-president is of the view that applied research is a major driver: "We promote STEM/STEAM education building on our legacy of 20 years of TVET (Technical and Vocational Education and Training) excellence. We strongly believe that there are many new creative industries that mix arts with technology, especially in the media, digital communications, and artistic production, where we can lead and be unique. We try to inspire our youth that the future jobs are vocational, professional, and the challenge of the future is to be able to compete, get a job, and make a change. We strongly believe that digital technologies - AI, IoT, Cloud computing, data science, cybersecurity and 5G+ - are the major enablers of change in the future, in industry, and they are also vital to support the healthcare system and its sustainability. That's what we are teaching our students at UDST." Prof Benlamri grew up in Constantine, Algeria, and talked about his hobby and family. "My favourite sports are squash and swimming. I have been raised in a family of nine kids, I am the middle one, my grandfather was an entrepreneur, and he owned a successful construction company in the east of Algeria, Constantine. My father took over from him after being

a teacher and went into business. That is why I am inspired about achieving and not shunning challenges. We are a typical middle-class family who values culture, and our Islamic values. I am also a young grandpa. I have two successful daughters, we gave them all the support. "One is a doctor, a neo-natal specialist at the University of Calgary, and the second specialised in mental health and works at a hospital in Ottawa, Canada. They were raised in the Gulf and then went for higher education to Canada. We nurtured them well and they are very successful. They follow the footsteps of their parents, I am very proud of them." He also reflected on the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022. "I think the World Cup has been a worldwide lesson, and brought about a change in mindsets the world over. Many of the de facto western perceptions in general towards the Arab and Muslim world have changed because of what was witnessed during the World Cup - the ability to run a mega project with excellence, and people in our region have the leadership and are able to run such a scale project in all its aspects. Also, the cultural perspective, that this part of the world is a very safe place. Those who came here experienced a very social and friendly atmosphere, and discovered the real Islamic values, a safe and hospitable society and a wealthy nation. "From our perspective, making Qatar a regional educational hub and to promote study in Qatar, where we provide education, empower youth to make a change, and a very safe student life."

End to era of easy money and race to contain the banking crisis

Policymakers are racing to ease growth strains and a loss of confidence in the global financial system after the collapse of Silicon Valley Bank and as UBS Group agreed to buy Credit Suisse Group in a government-brokered deal.

Over the weekend, the Federal Reserve and five other central banks announced co-ordinated action to boost liquidity in US dollar swap arrangements.

Central banks opened spigots wide to keep the global financial crisis of 2008 from triggering a depression, using low interest rates and other measures to try to stimulate business activity.

They kept rates low for years in the face of a notably anaemic recovery, then opened the faucets again when the pandemic struck: The Fed cut interest rates back to near zero and didn't raise them until March 2022.

It helped fuel a period of extraordinary growth in US financial markets, save for the short, sharp pandemic drop in 2020.

The US stock market rose more than 580% after the financial crisis, accounting for price gains and dividend payments.

It also led to a massive increase in debt taken on by companies and countries.

From 2007 to 2020, government debt as a share of gross domestic product globally jumped to 98% from 58%, and non-financial corporate debt as a share of GDP surged to 97% from 77%, according to data compiled by Ed Altman, professor emeritus of finance at New York University's Stern School of Business.

No banks were unaffected by the interest-rate changes: At the end of 2022, according to the FDIC, US banks had suffered \$620bn in losses on their holdings

The unparalleled era of easy money came to a screeching halt in 2022, as central banks shifted gears to subdue inflation: The Fed raised its benchmark rate from near zero to 4% in a mere six months.

That speed led to worries that something in the financial system would break, as the tightening of credit revealed previously hidden vulnerabilities.

Those fears seemed to materialise in the failure of two US banks, and the buyout of global giant Credit Suisse.

The market turmoil that followed raised questions of whether chastened banks would pull back on lending in a way that could tip economies into recession.

It also left the Fed facing even greater difficulties in balancing its inflation fight against the damage aggressive monetary policy can cause.

Lending rules were tightened after the collapse of credit markets in 2008, especially for the largest banks, leading to bolstered confidence in the financial system's resilience.

But no banks were unaffected by the interest-rate changes: At the end of 2022, according to the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp (FDIC), banks had suffered \$620bn in losses on their holdings.

JPMorgan Chase has estimated the US economy faces a potential hit to gross domestic product of a half to a full percentage point from diminished credit growth in the aftermath of the latest banking-sector troubles.

The worst outcome would be a giant bank failure that would dry up the flow of credit and almost guarantee a recession.

Credit Suisse's crisis came shortly after the failure of three US regional lenders and underscored how some less well-managed financial institutions have struggled since the era of rock-bottom interest rates came to an end.

Its demise may push other banks to lower their risk profile, which means issuing fewer of the loans that enable economies to grow. That would make it harder for central banks to keep raising benchmark rates to cool red-hot inflation without causing recessions.

Investors have been abandoning bets on more rate hikes and now see US rate cuts coming as early as the summer.

European Central Bank president Christine Lagarde said on March 16 that the financial market turmoil could hit credit conditions and dampen confidence. However, she said the banking sector is "in a much, much stronger position than where it was back in 2008."

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It's World Water day!

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Waking up to the world's water crisis

The world is becoming accustomed to the drip-drip of catastrophic headlines following each new climate-driven disaster. Increasingly frequent and severe heatwaves are causing wildfires in California and widespread coral die-offs in Australia. Unprecedented floods have wreaked havoc in Pakistan, Germany, China, and New Zealand. Drought in the Horn of Africa is causing famine for millions. And this list could go on.

The common element underlying all these cataclysms is water. From the forced shutdown of nuclear reactors in France to the heavy snowfall that covered large swaths of North America in December, or the recent cholera outbreak in Lebanon, we are witnessing the symptoms of a mounting global water crisis – either too much, too little, or too dirty.

Yet water remains mostly absent from global discussions. While concerns about the geopolitical order, climate change, and the Covid-19 pandemic have understandably been in the spotlight, water is rarely discussed outside the context of humanitarian responses to local, national, or transboundary floods or droughts. This is a major blind spot: In the World Economic Forum's 2023 Global Risks Report, nine of the ten biggest risks for the next decade have a water-related component.

For at least the last 5,000 years, human communities and civilisations have deliberately regulated water in order to survive. Even today, many people see water as a gift from God – or, in more secular terms, as a key part of a universal cycle that demands our respect and appreciation. However, in most places where water is "controlled" through dams and pipes, and made safe and available around the clock, we have come to take it for granted. And when concerns about access to safe water or exposure to extreme weather events are raised, they are generally ignored or treated as a low priority.

This apathy is no longer tenable. The injustices associated with water-driven disasters are growing, and the global water cycle itself is changing. Human freshwater use has exceeded blue-water capacity (rivers, lakes, and aquifers), creating huge risks for everyone and the planet's ecosystems. Around 20% of global water consumption for irrigation now comes from overuse of groundwater sources, and about 10% of the world's food trade comes from non-renewable groundwater.

Climate change is amplifying these challenges. Global warming increases demand for water as temperatures rise and as water requirements for food increase with the decline in relative air humidity. By 2070, two-thirds of the world's land mass will experience a reduction in terrestrial water storage, and the land area subject to extreme hydrological droughts could more than

double to 8%. Southwestern South America, Mediterranean Europe, and North Africa are all projected to suffer unprecedented and extreme drought conditions by 2050.

The UN 2023 Water Conference in March – the first such gathering in almost a half-century – must mark a turning point in our relationship with water and the water cycle. Only by fundamentally re-examining our relationship with water, revaluing its many uses, and treating it as a local and global common good can we achieve a safe and just future.

As the lead experts at the Global Commission on the Economics of Water, we see three areas that require transformation. First, we must consider the entire water cycle and how it is connected with biodiversity, the climate, human well-being, and ecosystem health – all key factors in socioeconomic and ecological prosperity. That means "connecting the dots" and promoting resilient relationships between water and food, water and energy, and water and the environment.


Second, water and the water cycle must be governed as global common goods. The ongoing proliferation of water crises calls for a new economic framework based on a systems approach to the water cycle, societies, and economies. We must develop a better understanding of existing "lock-ins" (including property rights, bilateral treaties, and corruption) and other structural challenges that impede water reallocation for the common good.

Moreover, an inclusive interdisciplinary framework – with a portfolio of new instruments and metrics – is needed to manage the systemic risks associated with the water cycle and its alteration by humans. Creating such a framework must begin by acknowledging water's central role in driving economic, sociocultural, and environmental change.

Lastly, we must bring everyone into the decision-making process – starting with marginalised communities – to develop new strategies for properly valuing water. When nature and freshwater are not valued in the marketplace, we still pay a price for their misuse, which increases dramatically when we cross planetary boundaries.

The UN 2023 Water Conference offers a unique opportunity for the world to respond effectively to a critically important but neglected issue. Confronted with the world water crisis, we can either embark on a sustainable and just pathway or carry on with business as usual. The survival of human civilisation as we know it demands that we make the right choice. – Project Syndicate

5bn people will face water shortage by 2050

According to the first of a series of United Nations reports on the impact of climate change on water resources released last year, around two-thirds of the global population, or five billion people, will encounter water shortages for at least a month by 2050.

The World Meteorological Organisation report assessed river flows, floods, and droughts on all continents. The findings are a mixed bag, but the report warns that water security will become increasingly uneven worldwide.

The Great Lakes region of the United States is in better shape, while Brazil's Rio São Francisco basin faces a challenging future. Climate change's impacts are frequently experienced through water, including more extreme and frequent droughts, erratic seasonal rainfall, and more severe flooding, with cascading consequences for economies, ecosystems, and everyday lives.

WMO Secretary-General Petteri Taalas said that there is inadequate knowledge about the distribution, quantity, and quality of freshwater resources, and the 36-page report aims to fill that gap and provide a succinct overview of water availability worldwide

Johnson denies lying over 'partygate' on showdown eve

Britain's former prime minister Boris Johnson said yesterday he inadvertently misled parliament over the "Partygate" scandal but blamed top aides, ahead of a televised grilling that could determine his political fate. Johnson released a 52-page dossier detailing why he denied breaking the rules over two years of Covid lockdowns, when his staff were often partying in 10 Downing Street. He was fined himself by police for one gathering, along with his then finance minister and current Prime Minister Rishi Sunak. The former Conservative leader apologised and corrected the parliamentary record last May after previously insisting to MPs that the gatherings were above board. Johnson refused to quit at the time but did so in July, after a ministerial rebellion over a separate ethics scandal, and the stakes are high as his supporters agitate now for his return to power. "I did not intentionally or recklessly mislead the House on 1 December 2021, 8 December 2021, or on any other date," he wrote in the submission, which was reportedly drafted by one of London's most expensive lawyers. "I would never have dreamed of doing so."

A guilty verdict could lead to his suspension from the House of Commons. If the suspension is more than 10 sitting days, it could trigger a special election for his west London seat.

Macron defiant amid pension fury

French President Emmanuel Macron appeared defiant yesterday after his government narrowly survived no-confidence votes, telling allies he would stand by his beleaguered prime minister. Ignoring calls from opponents, Macron said there would be no government reshuffle, no fresh parliamentary elections and no referendum on his controversial pension reform, even in the face of widespread protests that have brought millions into the streets. Police arrested another 234 people in Paris on Monday night during clashes between protesters and security forces, with several groups burning trash bins, bikes and other objects. The latest unrest came after Macron's centrist government narrowly survived two no-confidence motions in parliament on Monday, clearing the way for the legislation to raise the retirement age from 62 to 64 to enter into force.

Quake hits Pakistan and Afghanistan

A strong earthquake lasting for at least 30 seconds was felt across much of Afghanistan, Pakistan and parts of India last night, with the United States Geological Survey putting the magnitude at 6.5. "People ran out of their houses and were reciting the Qur'an," an AFP correspondent in Pakistani city of Rawalpindi said, with similar reports coming from elsewhere in the country and in Afghanistan. USGS said the quake was centred near Jurm in northeastern Afghanistan and had a depth of 187km. Afghanistan is frequently hit by earthquakes, especially in the Hindu Kush mountain range, which lies near the junction of the Eurasian and Indian tectonic plates.

Putin: Chinese proposal could be basis for peace in Ukraine

Russian President Vladimir Putin said after talks with Chinese leader Xi Jinping yesterday that Chinese proposals could be used as the basis of a peace settlement in Ukraine, but that the West and Kyiv were not yet ready.

In a joint statement issued at the end of Xi's state visit to Moscow, the two men cautioned against any steps that might push the Ukraine conflict into an "uncontrollable phase", adding pointedly that there could be no winners in a nuclear war.

Putin accused Western powers of fighting "to the last Ukrainian", while Xi reiterated China's "neutral position" on Ukraine and called for dialogue.

"We believe that many of the provisions of the peace plan put forward by China are consonant with Russian approaches and can be taken as the basis for a peaceful settlement when they are ready for that in the West and in Kyiv. However, so far we see no such readiness from their side," Putin said.

China's proposal — a 12-point paper calling for a de-escalation and eventual

ceasefire in Ukraine — lacks details on how to end the war.

The United States has been dismissive of the Chinese proposal, given Beijing's refusal to condemn Russia over Ukraine, and says a ceasefire now would lock in

Russian territorial gains and give Putin's army more time to regroup. Kyiv has welcomed China's diplomatic involvement but says Russia must pull its troops out of Ukraine, and underlines the importance of Ukraine's territorial integ-

riety. The Kremlin talks were intended to cement the "no limits" partnership the two leaders announced last February, less than three weeks before Russia invaded Ukraine.

They signed a series of documents on a "strategic co-operation" after what Putin described as "successful and constructive" talks showing China was clearly now Russia's most important economic partner.

"I am convinced that our multi-faceted co-operation will continue to develop for the good of the peoples of our countries," Putin said in televised remarks.

Xi's state visit is a major boost to Putin as he squares off against what he sees as a hostile West bent on inflicting a "strategic defeat" on Russia.

The Chinese leader visited Moscow days after an international court issued an arrest warrant for Putin over Russia's actions in Ukraine, where Russian forces have made little progress in recent months despite suffering heavy losses.

In their joint statement, Xi and Putin also called on the United States to stop "undermining global strategic security" and to cease developing a global missile defence system.

While pledging more regular joint military drills, however, the two lead-

ers said their closer bilateral relationship was not directed against any third nation and that it did not constitute a "military-political alliance".

Putin said Russia, China and Mongolia had completed all agreements on a planned pipeline to ship Russian gas to China, and that Moscow was ready to increase oil exports to Beijing.

He also said Moscow was ready to help Chinese businesses replace Western firms that have left Russia over the Ukraine conflict.

The planned Power of Siberia 2 pipeline would deliver 50bn cubic metres (bcm) of natural gas per year from Russia to China via Mongolia. Moscow put forward the idea many years ago, but it has gained urgency as Russia turns to China to replace Europe as its major gas customer.

Russia's Gazprom already supplies gas to China through an existing Power of Siberia pipeline under a 30-year, \$400bn deal launched at the end of 2019. That pipeline spans some 3,000km.

Russia's gas exports to China are still a small fraction of the record 177 bcm it delivered to Europe in 2018-19.

Putin said yesterday Russia would deliver at least 98 bcm of gas to China by 2030.

Freed French journalist recounts ordeal in Mali

Finally home after almost two years in jihadist captivity in Mali, French journalist Olivier Dubois yesterday grinned from ear to ear after reuniting with his family.

"I feel better, so much better," the 48-year-old told AFP after landing at Villacoublay airbase outside Paris.

Dubois and US aid worker Jeffery Woodke, 61, had arrived in the capital of Niger, Niamey, a day earlier after being freed.

"Yesterday, I couldn't believe it when I landed at the airport (in Niamey), but it's starting to sink in," Dubois told AFP, after being met by his wife, two children, sister and father.

"Now I've seen my family. It's happened, I'm free," he added. Beside him, his sister Canele Bernard agreed, laughing. Dubois was kidnapped in the north of Mali on April 8, 2021.

He said in a video released by his captors that he was taken by the Al Qaeda-linked Support Group for Islam and Muslims (GSIM), the main jihadist alliance in the Sahel.

Dubois said his 711 days in detention were not easy. "There were some tough moments," said the freelancer, who was working for French daily *Liberation* when he was seized. But "I was not mistreated, nor humiliated or hit". He said he felt very lucky, even if he was "very, very tired". Dubois said he had asked the French authorities how his release had been negotiated, but received no answers. Whether "a prisoner swap, money, both, I don't know," he said.

"I just know that Niger was implicated, as was French intelligence," Dubois said he was told on March 7 that he would be released "in 15 days' time". On March 16, he was transported on a motorbike then in a pick-up truck, and left to await his release "under a tree". He said he only met Woodke, who had been abducted in southwest Niger in October 2016, shortly before they were both freed. It took them "two nights and a morning" to leave the country. Dubois said he was constantly being ferried from one place to the next during his detention.

"You move a lot — every month, every two weeks," he said. "They're the ones who make you move. There are alerts, there are drones." The last place he was held was in Mali's northeastern region of Kidal, he said, though "most of the time" he did not know where he was.

India resists calls for more air access

India dampened foreign airline hopes for more access to its airports yesterday, with its aviation minister urging domestic carriers to fly long-haul and help establish new hubs as it seeks to recapture control of Indian travel from foreign rivals.

It is also asking aerospace companies to step-up local production and will soon finalise rules to safeguard rights of lessors on repossession of jets, in a bid to level up with major global aviation markets, Jyotiraditya Scindia told Reuters.

"India is now at that inflection point," Scindia said during an interview at his office in New Delhi. "We are going to see an explosion of air traffic in India in the years to come," he said, adding he wanted domestic carriers to look at international expansion with greater focus.

The South Asian nation is one of the fastest-growing aviation markets in the world where demand for air travel is outstripping the supply of planes, but the bulk of international traffic is captured by global carriers with efficient hubs.

Now, India wants to harness these economic gains for itself by boosting growth of its airlines and airports. Air India last month placed a record order for 470 jets and is making an aggressive push in the international market. Domestic rival IndiGo is also in talks for a new order of more than 500 planes, Reuters reported earlier this month, even as it waits to take delivery of the same number from an older order.

Scindia said India was not looking at increasing air traffic quotas with Gulf states and instead wanted Indian carriers to offer non-stop long haul flights on larger planes. He said Air India's widebody plane order and IndiGo's twin-aisles to some destinations were signs that "transition" had begun.

Pak parliament summoned to 'take important decisions'

Pakistan's parliament is to meet in a special joint session today to "take important decisions" to enforce the state's authority, media reported, in the midst of prolonged anti-government defiance by former prime minister Imran Khan.

Former cricket star Khan was prime minister from 2018 until 2022, when he was ousted from office in a controversial parliamentary vote. Since then, he has been demanding a new election and holding protests across the country to press his case. He also forsook his party's governments in the Punjab and Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa provinces, necessitating elections there within 90 days, which the ruling coalition tried to thwart but the Supreme Court ordered it to do so.

His supporters have clashed with police several times over recent days as authorities try to force him to appear in court in connection with various cases brought against him.

The office of the speaker of parliament, in calling today's joint session, did not give a reason but the state-run Associated Press of Pakistan (APP) said the ruling coalition had called for parliament to "take important decisions" to ensure the writ of the state was enforced.

The APP, reporting on a meeting attended by Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif and his cabinet,

cited the participants as saying Khan's Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) was not a political party but "rather a gang of militants", and its "enmity against the state" could not be tolerated.

Sharif has rejected Khan's demand for a new election saying it would be held as scheduled later this year.

Parliament will meet in the capital, Islamabad, as Khan's supporters gather for his latest rally in the eastern city of Lahore.

The clashes between Khan's supporters and the security forces have brought a new round of political instability to the nuclear-armed country of 220mn people, which is in the midst of a crippling economic crisis.

Khan says the government and the powerful military are try-

ing to stop him from contesting the next election, scheduled for November. If convicted in a case, Khan could face disqualification from the polls.

Both the government and military deny this.

Police have arrested hundreds of Khan's supporters in raids in recent days in response to the clashes.

Khan appeared yesterday before the Lahore High Court to apply for protective bail in fresh cases against him, PTI leader Mussarat Jamshed Cheema told Reuters.

The former prime minister is also appearing before a bench hearing a case he has filed against the police for raiding his home, which he says was in violation of court orders granting him protective bail last week.

Judge to Trump: Trial date in NY civil fraud case 'written in stone'

A New York judge yesterday rejected former US president Donald Trump's bid to delay the scheduled October 2 trial in state Attorney General Letitia James' civil fraud lawsuit, calling the date "written in stone."

Justice Arthur Engoron in Supreme Court in Manhattan agreed to requests by Trump and other defendants to push back some deadlines for gathering evidence. "You can move anything else in between," the judge told

lawyers at a two-hour hearing, which was delayed by a bomb scare. "I don't want to move that trial date."

The schedule means the former president could face trial in James' case just two blocks from the Manhattan criminal court building where he is expecting to be indicted for covering up a hush money payment to porn star Stormy Daniels.

Both cases come during Trump's third White House run, in which he is a leading

Republican candidate. James sued Trump, three of his adult children, the Trump Organisation and others last September over an alleged decade-long scheme to manipulate more than 200 asset valuations and Trump's net worth, to win better terms from banks and insurers. The attorney general has long accused Trump of stalling to delay her case.

On Monday, she accused the Trump Organisation's accounting firm of failing

to produce documents she subpoenaed and improperly asserting privilege.

Trump has called James' case a partisan witch hunt. He had originally sought a delay that would have likely pushed any trial to the spring of 2024, when the race to become the Republican presidential nominee might be sewn up.

James countered that her office had already turned over "enormous" quantities of evidence to the defendants,

enough to prevent any trial from "becoming a game of surprise."

Engoron also said many disputes are easy to resolve, including whether Trump overstated the value of his Trump Tower penthouse apartment by inflating its size. "A triplex apartment is worth less money if it is 11,000 square feet than if it is 30,000 square feet," he said. "You do not need to be an expert... to know these things. You don't even need a high school diploma."

Among the other defendants are Trump's adult children Donald Jr., Eric and Ivanka, and the jailed former Trump Organisation chief financial officer, Allen Weisselberg. Christopher Kise, a lawyer for Trump, said the defendants' confidence is growing as they learn more about James' case. "Once everybody knows exactly what happened, then they're going to see that President Trump has done absolutely nothing wrong," he said.

Traffic safety workshop held

More inspections at food outlets

Inspectors of Al Wakra Municipality, in co-operation with the General Cleanliness Department, have carried out an inspection campaign on food stores at the Logistic Village area to ensure compliance with food health and safety regulations.

The campaign resulted in the confiscation and destruction of three tonnes of expired food products. A violation report was issued regarding this incident according to Law No 8 for 1990 on the regulation of human food control.

Al Khor and Al Thakhira Municipality's Health Control Section has also carried a number of intensive inspection campaigns, which resulted in the shutting of five food outlets.
