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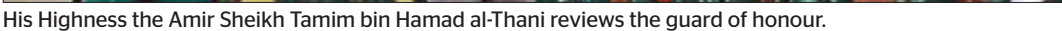
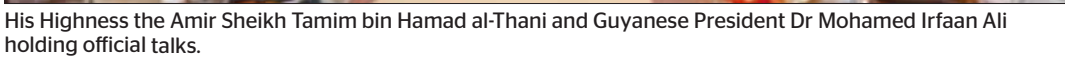
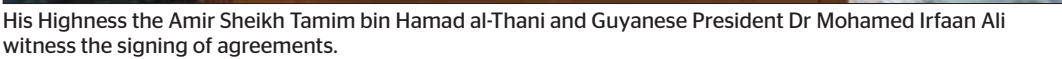

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● Qatar and Guyana sign agreements on economic co-operation and investments

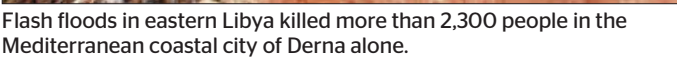

Aligning with carbon market initiatives ‘important’ for Qatar: minister

HE the Minister of Environment and Climate Change Sheikh Dr Faleh bin Nasser bin Ahmed bin Ali al-Thani has stressed the need for Qatar to ensure that it aligns with international carbon market initiatives.

In his opening remarks at the two-day 'Workshop on Article 6 of the Paris Agreement and Climate Finance Mechanisms' yesterday Sheikh Dr Faleh noted: "We must build the structures and capacities needed to efficiently engage in international carbon markets to achieve this."

A "well-functioning" framework and strategy for the implementation of a carbon market mechanism is therefore essential, he said. The minister said it is obvious that the public sector has an important role to plan in climate mitigation. "However, it is also of highest importance that we engage the private sector in the climate transition and not least ensure that they can utilise the opportunities associated with Article 6."

Despite some progress, it is known that the world faces incredible climate change challenges. Scientists warn that a 2C rise of warming above pre-industrial levels will be exceeded during the 21st century, unless we achieve substantial reductions in greenhouse gas emissions.

He said many countries are looking for ways to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and develop carbon markets and climate finance mechanisms as a tool to reaching this goal.

"This workshop aims to feed into an inclusive process of developing an appropriate carbon market strategy for the State of Qatar and attempts to ensure that all relevant actors are well informed

and updated on the latest developments of the international carbon markets.

"For this purpose, we have invited highly qualified experts, both from Qatar and from all over the world, to participate at this workshop and sharing insights and knowledge on recent carbon market developments." Carbon markets, the minister highlighted, "are not something new". The concept was introduced in the USA in the early 1990s.

The notion was internationally recognized in the Kyoto Protocol, which was signed in 1997 and extended during COP18 in Doha in 2012. The Kyoto Protocol introduced the concepts of project-based mechanisms and emissions trading, known as the Joint Implementation (JI) and the Clean Development Mechanism (CDM).

To meet the commitment of the Kyoto Protocol, at the time, the European Union and its member states implemented the first regional Emissions Trading System

(ETS) in 2005. The EU ETS remains the biggest carbon trading scheme in the world until today. In 2015, the Kyoto Protocol was replaced with the Paris Agreement. Article 6 of this agreement introduced the concept of international carbon market approaches.

The concept allows countries to voluntarily cooperate with each other to achieve emission reduction targets set out in their Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs).

Carbon trading is rapidly growing, with many new initiatives currently being launched around the world. In fact, according to the World Bank, more than two thirds of the world's countries are planning to include carbon markets mechanisms as part of their Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs).

Aside from the European and US trading systems already mentioned, China, South Korea, UK, and the United Nations already have functioning trading schemes in place.

"I believe that this workshop gives us a good starting point for a collaborative process and hope that this workshop serves as a great opportunity to start our process," Sheikh Dr Faleh said and thanked its partner the Al-Attiyah Foundation for its expertise and knowledge on this very important topic. He also thanked all contributors for sharing their knowledge and insights.

"I should finally take the opportunity to put our attention to the fact that COP28 meeting will be arranged in Dubai in early December this year. With Qatar having a strong presence, gathering with world leaders and climate elite for intensive discussions, including on climate finance, I believe this workshop will provide valuable insights for our participation," the minister added.

QRDI Council, MoECC to drive research for sustainable future

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Ooredoo marathon to draw 15,000 participants

Ooredoo Doha Marathon 2024, scheduled for February 16, will bring together more than 15,000 participants competing over multiple distances, a statement said. Registration is open for runners wishing to take part.

The full marathon (42.2km) will be staged alongside a half marathon (21.1km), 10km and 5km race – all open to adult participants. There will also be a 5km mini marathon event for juniors (aged 13-17) and a 1km race for children under 13. Ooredoo has partnered with UK-based sports agency GW Active to ensure it meets stringent international standards.

This year, the Ooredoo Doha Marathon holds Gold status on the international marathon schedule, meaning

runners can qualify for international marathon events such as the Boston Marathon. Competitors are invited to register online as soon as possible. The entry process on the official website is easy to follow and by signing up four or more runners in one session, entrants can secure a 25% discount

on registration fees. Runners will receive a goodie bag containing a bespoke race T-shirt as well as their bib number and timing chip. Race packs can be collected from designated locations (to be communicated via the website and participant e-mail) between February 13 and 15, from 3pm to 11pm. Pack collection facilities will not be available on race day. Qatar National Library’s (QNL) programme, Himaya, is effectively countering trafficking of cultural properties and documents, a top official said yesterday.

“The whole world is facing the problem of trafficking of cultural properties which is a threat to the history and identity of the nations. The world needs collective efforts to prevent such actions. That is why we have launched the Himaya programme,” HE the Minister of State and QNL president Dr Hamad bin Abdulaziz al-Kawari explained.

He was speaking to Gulf Times on the sidelines of the two day workshop ‘Second Doha Workshop on Countering the Trafficking of Cultural Property with a focus on Documentary Heritage’, organised by QNL.

“The protection of cultural properties is a very important matter. Fortunately, Qatar National Library has a leading programme

called Himaya to protect the cultural properties. Himaya, the Arabic word stands for protection and this initiative is currently well-known and has been accepted by the international community. All the representative and experts in the field are meeting and discussing the issues to get the best outcomes,” explained Dr al-Kawari.

In partnership with the General Authority of Customs and in collaboration with the US, Italian, and French embassies in Qatar, QNL aims to deepen the understanding

and implementation of best practices in preventing the illicit trade of cultural property and documentary heritage.

Dr al-Kawari noted: “The increasing global threat is evident, despite international conventions like those from Unesco in 1970 and Unidroit in 1995. As smugglers harness modern social media and with geopolitical unrest further propelling these illicit activities, our history, culture, and heritage face unprecedented risks.”

Al-Jamal, said: “Our participation today underscores our crucial role in advancing global efforts to combat the illegal trade in cultural assets. The authority has enacted regulations regarding prohibitions, import and export restrictions,

and the unauthorised transfer of cultural properties. This reiterates Qatar’s commitment to fulfilling its obligations under international treaties, particularly the Unesco 1970 Convention aimed at curbing the trafficking of illicit cultural property.”

Italian ambassador Toschi pointed: “We are proud to stand alongside QNL in their “Himaya Project” for the protection of cultural heritage and the fight against illicit trafficking. When it comes to such topics, Italy is one of the most

active countries, both at a national and international level thanks to our experts and bodies such as the Carabinieri force, for the protection of cultural heritage.”

According to French envoy, Faivre: “France is highly committed to the fight against illicit trafficking of cultural property at the global level. This engagement should go beyond borders; increasing the international co-operation is key. We are delighted today to welcome three high-level French experts to contribute to the workshop.”

Cultural heritage artefacts are our gateway to that historical understanding. That is why the United States and Qatar worked during our strategic dialogue to increase our ongoing co-operation in heritage protection, and why several US agencies and the Smithsonian Institute have convened at Qatar National Library to be part of this important workshop,” added US ambassador Davis.

Qatar calls for prioritising education in war, peace

Need to protect schools, universities from attacks stressed

Qatar has affirmed that the responsibility to respect, protect and activate the right to education necessitates putting education at the top of priorities in times of war and peace alike, with the necessity to protect schools, universities, and all educational facilities from attack, as well as always recognising their civilian nature, for them to remain as safe havens, promoting peace, development and stability.

This came in a speech delivered yesterday by HE the Minister of State for International Co-operation at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs Lolwah bint Rashid AlKhater via video conference, at an event in Geneva, on the occasion of the celebration of the fourth International Day to Protect Education from Attack.

The event was organised by the Permanent Representative of Qatar to the UN in Geneva, the Education Above All Foundation (EAA) and the Global Coalition to Protect Education from Attack (GCPEA), under the auspices of the Permanent Missions of Argentina, Nigeria, Norway and Spain to the UN in Geneva, as well as the Safe Schools Declaration (SSD) core group, the Geneva Global Hub for Education in Emergencies, and Save the Children.

HE AlKhater expressed Qatar's appreciation for all those who worked courageously and tirelessly to ensure educational opportunities for all children, especially for those living in emergency situations due to conflicts or crises. She

pointed out that despite these sincere efforts, attacks on education and the military use of schools have continued unabated over the past years, by all warring parties in different parts of the world, making it impossible for millions of children to continue their studies and education. She stated that estimates show that half of out-of-school children live in countries affected by conflicts.

She stressed that conflict can never be an excuse to deprive a person of their right to education, adding that disrupting education will not only lead children to risk their lives temporarily but will affect their entire future and the future of their communities.

HE AlKhater said Qatar's commitment to supporting education has always remained steadfast and unwavering, where the provision of quality education nationally and globally is set

as a top priority in its strategic vision. She noted the invaluable support provided by Her Highness Sheikha Moza bint Nasser, an advocate for the UN's Sustainable Development Goals, and Chairperson of Qatar Foundation for Education, Science and Community Development (QF), in directing efforts towards protecting education and providing quality education to children who are out-of-school, through her initiative "Education Above All", in addition to initiating the UN General Assembly declaration of September 9 as International Day to Protect Education from Attack.

She pointed out that Qatar has adopted education as one of the strategic tools for regional and international co-operation, with the Education Above All Foundation (EAA) implementing projects via the "Educate a Child" programme, together with 82 global partners in 50 countries, achieving its goal of helping more than 10mn of the most marginalised and out-of-school children by providing them with access to a good primary education.

HE al-Khater pointed out that EAA and other Qatari development and charitable organisations such as the Qatar Fund for Development and Qatar Charity, have built and renovated schools in Palestine and assisted Palestinian refugee students to complete their university education. In addition there is Qatar's support to the UN Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees (UNRWA) which led to the acceleration of its programmes aimed at providing educational opportunities for Palestinian refugees. **(QNA)**

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Qatari woman wins US award

The US embassy in Qatar has announced that Qatari national Wadha Nasser al-Jabor **(pictured)** has received a financial award to bring her peer-to-peer education project, "STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) for All," to life in Qatar. She applied for and won the 2023 IVLP Impact Award, which was open worldwide to alumni of the US International Visitor Leadership Programme (IVLP), a Department of State exchange programme in which

al-Jabor participated in Fall 2022. Al-Jabor, a statistician and leadership coach, will use STEAM for All to allow Qatar's children and youth to explore hands-on learning in robotics, programming, circuitry, 3D modelling, and other areas of STEAM. While developing her STEAM for All idea, al-Jabor travelled to San Diego, California; Washington, DC; and Boston, Massachusetts; and Cleveland, Ohio in the US on an IVLP trip themed "Youth Volunteerism and Civic Engagement."

Qatar Charity's WASH project aids IDPs in Sudan

The technical teams of Qatar Charity (QC) have embarked on implementing a new qualitative project to provide drinking water, hygiene tools, and sanitation facilities to internally displaced persons (IDPs) living in the sheltering centres in Port Sudan.

The health authorities in the Red Sea State described the project as a life-saving initiative in terms of providing water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) services in the IDPs camps.

This project is part of Qatar Charity's humanitarian interventions for those affected by the ongoing crisis. It includes providing safe drinking water supplies for 2,500 people for a period of 60 days, distributing 1,200 water collection and storage equipment, conducting WASH campaigns in the sheltering centres, providing hygiene materials and supplies, as well as the maintenance of sewage facilities in some of the targeted centres.

Najlaa Ahmed Ali, the Director of the Environmental Health and Food Control Department in the Red Sea State, said that Qatar Charity has made significant efforts to provide drinking water and to promote hygiene for the IDPs.

She explained that the project targets all the sheltering centres

in Port Sudan, where basic services of top priority are provided to the IDPs, including the provision of pure drinking water and supervision of water chlorination through training volunteers in 12 sheltering centres.

She revealed that Qatar Charity has implemented cleanliness campaigns, distributed hygiene tools and supplies, including the distribution of waste collection containers, conducted maintenance of sewage systems, and constructed many toilets and

handwashing facilities, to ensure proper sanitation. She added: "It is a substantial project with full support from Qatar Charity and it meets a significant need for the IDPs, and we consider it a life-saving project." **(QNA)**

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‘Qatar pays special attention to Arab, Islamic systems’

HE the Speaker of the Shura Council Hassan bin Abdullah al-Ghanem affirmed that Qatar pays special attention to the Arab and Islamic systems concerned with the issues and concerns of its people, and their participation in decision-making and advancing development.

In a speech delivered on his behalf by HE the Deputy Speaker of the Shura Council Dr Hamda bint Hassan al-Sulaiti during the opening session of the 10th Annual Conference of Association of Secretaries-General of Arab Parliaments, which kicked off in Doha yesterday under the theme “Digital Democracy and Social Communication and the Role of Parliaments in Strengthening them,” he stressed the importance of the conference, given that the association is an effective parliamentary system.

He noted the Shura Council’s keenness to provide all support and assistance to the association in order to achieve its goals and perform the responsibilities entrusted to it efficiently and competently, pointing out that the secretariats-general are the lifeblood of parliaments and popular participation, and that the association represents an advisory centre and repository of parliamentary expertise.

In this regard, he praised the efforts of the secretariat-general in overcoming the tasks of Arab parliaments and legislative councils and assisting them in implementing their legislative and administrative plans and programmes.

HE al-Ghanim said that enhancing co-operation, exchanging experiences, and reviewing best practices between Secretariats-General in parliaments would develop the performance of secretariats-general and improve the quality of their services, which would be reflected in the performance of parliamentary councils.

HE the Speaker drew attention to the tensions and instability that the Arab world is witnessing in some parts of it, particularly the worsening situation in the occupied Palestinian territories, due to the racist and aggressive practices of the occupying entity and its extremist government, which is escalating its repressive measures against the Palestinian people, and working to destabilise the countries of the entire region.

He pointed out in a related context that the occupied territories are witnessing extremely delicate and dangerous situations with the growth of hate speech and the escalation of repeated violations of the Al-Aqsa Mosque courtyard and storming cities and arresting Palestinian youth under the pretext of resisting the occupation, which led to the martyrdom of more than two hundred Palestinians during this year, including women and children.



HE al-Ghanem noted that the Arab region has been suffering for more than seven decades as a result of the aggression and occupation of Arab lands, stressing that all of this makes co-operation and solidarity an urgent necessity at all levels.

He added that as parliamentarians representing the Arab peoples, they should call for the need for the Inter-Parliamentary Union and the various national and international parliamentary organizations to adopt a serious and firm stance against the repeated brutal attacks committed by the Israeli authorities against the brotherly Palestinian people and that the international community and the UN have to work to stop these attacks.

At the beginning of his speech after welcoming the participants, HE the Speaker of the Shura Council extended his deepest condolences and sympathy to Morocco and Libya, the government and people, for the victims of the devastating earthquake that Morocco was exposed to, and for the victims of the floods that swept northeastern Libya, wishing a speedy recovery for the injured, and safety for the two brotherly countries and their people.

For his part, in his remarks during the opening session of the conference, HE the Shura Council Secretary-General, President of the Association of Secretaries-General of Arab Parliaments Dr Ahmed bin Nasser al-Fadala stressed the great interest that Qatar, under the leadership of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani, attaches to the efforts, activities, and achievements of the Association of Secretaries-General of Arab Parliaments through its interaction with the latest regional and international issues. Embassy aims to enhance Thai-Qatar food security ties

The Thailand embassy in Doha is keen to deepen its bilateral ties with Qatar particularly in the area of food security, citing Thailand's abundance of agricultural produce ranging from rice, vegetables and fruits to poultry.

"I intend to expand co-operation with Qatar based on Qatar National Vision 2030, especially on food security because in Thailand, we have many agricultural products... from rice, vegetables and fruits to poultry," Thai ambassador Sira Swangsilpa said at a recent meeting with the media.

With a food security strategy in place, the two countries could explore greater co-ordination and collaboration over the next six years, he stated.

Besides rice, some of the Thai food products being exported to Qatar include fresh, chilled or frozen fish; prepared or preserved fish, crustaceans and mollusk; and fresh, frozen and dried fruits; among others.

Many Thai products are offered by major supermarkets in Qatar such as LuLu Group, which collaborated with the Thai Trade

Commission. In addition, the number of Thai restaurants in Doha has witnessed a notable increase. Qatar's appetite for Thai cuisine has also contributed to the strengthening of cultural ties.

Aimed at fostering better mutual understanding and co-operation, the Thai embassy announced that it is hosting the "Thailand's Shariah-Compliant Innovation" seminar, set on September 14 at Banyan Tree Doha.

The event, according to the embassy, will discuss a diverse array of subjects, including the pioneering advancements in Halal science and technology, safeguarding consumer interests, and investigating potential collaborative opportunities within academia.

The seminar will tackle a 'Revolutionary Rapid Test Kit', a break-

through in detecting non-Halal elements in food products, an innovation that aligns with Thailand's commitment to meeting the highest Halal certification standards.

According to the embassy, the event will also feature sessions led by industry experts, including Associate Prof D. Winai Dahlan, founding director of The Halal Science Centre at Chulalongkorn University, and Dr Anat Denyinghot, assistant director at the same institution.

About trade ties, Swangsilpa noted that trade volume between the two countries stands at \$4.5bn, with Thailand exporting automotive products, air conditioning machines and parts, and electrical equipment, among others, while importing natural gas from Qatar.

Swangsilpa, who is in his third month since arriving in Doha, said he met with members of the Thai community in Qatar, including children attending Thai and English language classes.

The envoy highlighted the growing number of visitors from Qatar, noting that around 100,000 tourists visit Thailand annually for leisure and medical tourism. He said Qataris are entitled to a 30-day visa on arrival to Thailand.

HMC to promote awareness on Alzheimer's in September

Hamad Medical Corporation (HMC) has joined the global community this month to observe World Alzheimer's Month, dedicated to raising awareness, challenging stigma, and advocating support and research in support of people living with dementia.

This year's theme is 'never too early, never too late', which highlights the importance of addressing the risk factors for dementia at any stage in adult life.

Dr Hanadi al-Hamad, deputy chief for Long-Term Care, Rehabilitation and Geriatric Care, explained the importance of focusing on the risk factors and risk reduction. "While there has been a huge transformation in dementia perception and care over the last decade, it is hugely important for us to better understand and respond to the risk factors associated with this condition. Many are considered to be modifiable risk factors or lifestyle factors, such as high blood pressure, uncontrolled diabetes, unaddressed hearing loss, lack of physical activity, or unmanaged depression. Adopting a healthy lifestyle will promote overall good health, including brain health."

"This year's World Alzheimer's Month theme of 'never too early, never too late' highlights the key role of identifying risk factors and adopting proactive risk reduction measures to delay,

and potentially even prevent, the onset of dementia. This includes ongoing risk reduction strategies for individuals who have already received a diagnosis," noted Dr al-Hamad. "We are therefore delighted to arrange activities this month to educate the public as well as deliver specialised training to healthcare staff in understanding the signs and symptoms of dementia and encourage better understanding of the modifiable risk factors linked to lifestyle."

Services such as the free and confidential RAHA Alzheimer's and Memory Services Helpline has been immensely valuable in providing faster access to care and helping to relieve some of the stress that caregivers can feel as the illness progresses,

and the symptoms of the person they care for worsens over time.

The Memory Clinic, which was first set up in Rumailah Hospital, now also provides clinics in several primary care health centres, and also provides a specialised service to diagnose memory loss and cognitive decline and advice on suitable treatment options.

This year's Alzheimer's awareness campaign in Qatar is held under the banner of the WHO Collaborating Centre for Healthy Ageing and Dementia, a joint programme between the World Health Organisation and HMC that is dedicated to the development and strengthening of national and regional institutional capacity and enhancing the scientific validity of its global health work in the field of healthy ageing and dementia care and services.

Dr al-Hamad added: "We have built up a wealth of knowledge and experience over the past decade as we focused our efforts on improving the healthcare for our older population. We have developed better access to care and improved pathways to integrated healthcare services that are targeted to the needs of the older adults. The Collaborating Centre allows us to share this knowledge through the WHO and benefit from the valuable tools and programmes they have as well."

HGH renovation 'from next year'

Hamad General Hospital (HGH) will remain open during the first phase of its renovation works, set to begin in 2024, and continue to provide a wide range of healthcare services while undergoing a significant upgrade to its systems and facilities, local Arabic daily *Arrayah* reported.

A source told the daily that during the first phase of the renovation, two wings for inpatient care at HGH will be closed, and services relocated. However, more than 370 inpatient beds will remain available to cover medical, surgical, and critical care services. Most of the outpatient clinics, the trauma centre and the emergency

department will continue to operate as usual. The source pointed out that the renovation process, expected to last for around three years, will involve the creation of individual rooms, advanced technology systems and modern environments.

This will lead to improved patient care experience in the years to come. HGH, which dates back to 1982, is the largest hospital in the country, providing medical care to hundreds of thousands annually, through outpatient clinics, surgical procedures, inpatient care, laboratories and radiology services.

Sidra Medicine wins \$1mn research grant

Sidra Medicine, a member of Qatar Foundation, has been awarded a grant, to the value of \$1mn from JDRF, the leading global type 1 diabetes (T1D) research and advocacy organisation.

The grant will support the establishment of a programme in Qatar that combines autoantibody and genetic screening for children

with T1D. According to the International Diabetes Federation's Diabetes Atlas, Qatar is ranked fourth globally with the highest incidence of T1D. Currently there is a lack of screening studies on T1D in Qatar and generally in the Mena region.

Titled "DIA-MENA: Type 1 Diabetes Islet Autoantibody Screening Initiative in the Middle East and North Africa", the programme will initially pilot autoantibody and genetic screenings in Qatar, aiming to predict the future risks of T1D in children. The pilot will form the basis to establish national paediatric T1D autoantibody screenings across the country; which can serve as a model for the rest of the Middle East and North Africa region.

The grant, won by Dr Ammira al-Shabeeb Akil, lead principal investigator and head of the Precision Medicine for Diabetes Prevention lab at Sidra Medicine, will encompass a comprehensive research-based screening programme over the span of four years. Key support will be provided by Sidra Medicine's precision medicine programme, pathology,

genetics and genomic medicine clinics. "Most global screening initiatives to identify children at high risk of developing T1D have targeted relatives of individuals living with the disease. However, latest data shows that more than 85% of the children who end up with T1D, do not have affected relatives with the same disease. By combining the comprehensive islet autoantibodies and genetic risk scores testing, we intend to detect and provide estimates of the prevalence of early-stage T1D in children," said Dr Akil.

Through the JDRF grant and in partnership with the Qatar Genome Programme and the Primary Health Care Corporation, Dr Akil's team will embark on a combined screening pilot programme on young children from the ages of 1 1/2 years to 14 years old; using a small blood sample and pathology-based testing technology that has been developed in-house at Sidra Medicine by Dr Akil's team.

By determining the individuals most likely to develop T1D, the DIA-MENA programme will also become the focal point in guiding future clinical trials in Qatar.

MoT to hold sustainable transportation and legacy conference, exhibition

The conference will include six panel discussions and more than 20 speakers, highlighting the latest advancements of Qatar's

Frustration mounts with Morocco quake aid yet to reach some survivors

Many survivors of Morocco's earthquake struggled in makeshift shelters yesterday after a fourth night in the open, while villagers in devastated mountain areas voiced frustration at having received no help from the authorities.

The death toll from the 6.8 magnitude quake that struck in the High Atlas Mountains late on Friday evening rose to 2,901, while the number of people injured more than doubled to 5,530, state television reported.

It was the North African country's deadliest earthquake since 1960 and its most powerful in more than a century.

Rescuers from Spain, Britain and Qatar were helping Morocco's

search teams, while Italy, Belgium, France and Germany said their offers of assistance had yet to be approved.

The situation was most desperate for people in remote areas cut off by landslides triggered by the earthquake that blocked access

roads, while in accessible locations relief efforts were stepping up with tent camps and distribution of food and water.

Mehdi Ait Bouyali, 24, was camping along the Tizin Test road, which connects remote valleys to the historic city of Marrakech, with

a few other survivors who had also fled their destroyed villages.

He said the group had received food and blankets from people driving by but nothing from the state. "The villages of the valley have been forgotten. We need any kind of help. We need tents," he said, criticising the government's relief efforts.

In his first televised appearance since the earthquake struck, King Mohamed VI visited Marrakech — 72km from the tremor's epicentre — to meet injured people at a hospital, where the state news agency said he donated blood.

State media said on Saturday he chaired a meeting assigning aid funds. Hamid Ait Bouyali, 40, was also camping on the roadside.

"The authorities are focusing on the bigger communities and not the remote villages that are worst affected," he said.

Witnesses reported shelling by the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces in the Karary district of Omdurman, a part of greater Khartoum that has seen fierce battles between the RSF and the regular army.

A medical source told AFP "17 civilians were killed" in the attack, five months into the conflict between the army under General Abdel Fattah al-Burhan and RSF commanded by his former deputy, Mohamed Hamdan Daglo.

Nearly 7,500 people have been killed in Sudan since the conflict broke out on April 15, according to a conservative estimate from the Armed Conflict Location & Event Data Project.

"In the past week, more than 103 civilians have been killed during military operations by both parties in Khartoum and Omdurman," UN human rights chief Volker Turk told the Human Rights Council in Geneva yesterday.

On Sunday, at least 51 people were killed and dozens wounded in air strikes on a southern Khartoum market, Turk reported, in one of the deadliest single attacks since fighting began.

According to activists, a dozen bodies were unidentified and — like many of those killed on the street and missing from their families — buried by volunteers in shallow graves.

China releases new measures for Taiwan ‘integration’

China yesterday outlined measures for strengthening integration with Taiwan, in an indication that Beijing aims to expand links with the island that were severed during the Covid-19 pandemic. The document jointly issued yesterday by the ruling Communist Party’s Central Committee and the State Council consists of more than 20 “opinions” for laying a “new path towards integrated development” between Taiwan and the culturally similar mainland province of Fujian. They include making it easier for Taiwanese people to live, work, study and do business in Fujian, as well as encouragement for companies in the province to hire staff from Taiwan.

Chinese city hunts for crocodiles on the loose

A Chinese city has launched an operation to find a large number of crocodiles that escaped when floods hit the region in recent days, authorities said yesterday. A typhoon brought sustained heavy rains to southern China last week, triggering inundations in Hong Kong and other areas. Deluges around the city of Maoming in Guangdong province caused a lake at a commercial crocodile farm to overflow with over 70 animals escaping, local media reported. A person at the local emergency management office said officials were “working to deal with” the reptilian runaways. The person did not say how many animals were on the loose.

UK to introduce X-ray age checks for asylum seekers

The UK government said it is introducing legislation allowing bone and teeth X-rays to verify the age of asylum seekers suspected of falsely claiming to be minors. The government is trying to curb what it calls “illegal” migration to the UK. Legislation unveiled this week by the justice ministry, which still needs parliament’s approval, will “authorise the use of X-rays in scientific age assessments”, the interior ministry said. The interior ministry will introduce further laws specifying that X-rays of teeth and bones of the hands and wrists as well as MRIs of knees and collar bones “can be used as part of the age assessment process”.

UK jobless rate rises as wage growth hits record high

The UK unemployment rate edged higher to 4.3% in the three months to the end of July, as wage growth remained at a record high, official data showed yesterday. Unemployment had been 4.2% in the quarter to the end of June, the Office for National Statistics added in a statement. The figures came a day after administrators of struggling UK household goods retailer Wilko said that more than 10,000 staff will lose their jobs after the firm failed to find a buyer. In further gloomy jobs news yesterday, high street bank Barclays confirmed that it would axe some 450 mid- to senior-level roles across the country.

India govt warns automakers of higher taxes in pollution fight

India’s road transport minister yesterday said he will propose an additional 10% tax on diesel vehicles and warned automakers of even higher levies to come to force them away from diesel-burners and cut fuel emissions and pollution.

Nitin Gadkari made the comments at the Society of Indian Automobile Manufacturers (SIAM) annual conference in New Delhi, where executives of Tata Motors, Mahindra and Mahindra, Maruti Suzuki and foreign carmakers such as Mercedes and Volkswagen had gathered.

Gadkari said he will ask the finance minister for an “additional 10%” goods and services tax on diesel vehicles to tackle problems related to pollution.

India currently imposes a 28% tax and additional so-called “cess” is levied depending on the vehicles’ engine capacity.

“Say bye to diesel soon, otherwise we will increase so much tax that it will become difficult for you to sell these vehicles,” Gadkari told the conference.

“We have to leave petrol and die-

sel soon and walk on the new path of being pollution free ... There should be a diversification (by companies) as soon as possible,” he said in a warning to automakers.

Gadkari’s comments sparked widespread discussion among auto executives at the Delhi conference, with some describing the move as a “bombshell” announcement.

Mercedes India managing director, Santosh Iyer, said many customers still prefer diesel vehicles and any change in tax policies will lead to a shift in automakers’ “portfolio strategy”.

“We will need six-odd months to change our production planning processes but we can always vary and shift based on the demand,” he said.

Pollution is a growing problem across India. Attempts to cut vehicular emissions, reduce fuel imports and curb stubble burning have not yielded great results in a country where the proposed coal power capacity is the highest after China.

The minister later wrote on social media platform X, formerly Twitter, the proposal to increase tax was not “currently under active consideration by the government”.

Shares of automakers Mahindra and Mahindra, Tata Motors and commercial vehicle maker, Ashok

Leyland, dropped between 2.2% and 2.5%.

The finance ministry did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

Gadkari has also issued warnings at past SIAM conferences. In 2017, Gadkari told auto executives they should move towards electric vehicles (EVs), saying: “I am going to do this, whether you like it or not. And I am not going to ask you. I will bulldoze it.”

India has in recent years promoted electric vehicle sales with tax incentives, though less than 2% of India’s nearly 4mn in car sales last fiscal year were EVs. The government has said it wants EVs to make up 30% of total car sales by 2030.

The number of diesel vehicles in the world’s third-largest car market has fallen to 18% from 50% a decade ago, Gadkari said, warning that just like India pushed through stricter fuel emission norms against opposition from the industry, it will similarly drive up taxes to push out diesel vehicles.

Veejay Ram Nakra, chief executive officer for the automotive division of Mahindra and Mahindra, told TV news channel ET Now that any change in duty structure “will certainly have an impact on volume of sales.”

Kerala reports two deaths from Nipah virus

India retail inflation eases in August, upside risks remain

India’s retail inflation eased in August as food prices moderated, but remained above the upper end of the central bank’s target band for a second consecutive month, keeping policymakers watchful.

Annual retail inflation in August was 6.83%, compared with 7.44% in July – a 15-month high – according to data released by the ministry of statistics yesterday. Food inflation, which accounts

for nearly half of the overall basket, was up 9.94% in August compared with a rise of 11.51% in July.

“Offering a modicum of relief, the CPI inflation eased below the 7% mark ... largely led by vegetables, amidst some moderation in the prints for clothing and footwear, housing and miscellaneous items as well,” said Aditi Nayar, economist at ICRA.

Food prices have been a key concern for policymakers since last year as erratic weather conditions have hurt the output of vegetables, milk and cereals.

Inflation has been above the central bank’s 2%-6% target band for seven months out of the last 12.

Earlier this month, Reserve Bank of India (RBI) governor Shaktikanta Das said India’s monetary policy committee would remain watchful of the evolving inflation situation, but the recent spikes in vegetable prices would start to ebb.

Vegetable inflation eased to 26.14% in August from 37.34% in the previous month. Cereal inflation in August eased to 11.85% from 13.04% in July.

Indian police arrest cow vigilante linked to riots

Indian police yesterday arrested the leader of a vigilante group devoted to protecting cows who had been accused of inciting deadly religious riots near New Delhi in July. Monu Manesar leads a chapter of the Hindu right-wing group Bajrang Dal and is a suspect in the mob lynching in February of two Muslim men accused of cow smuggling. Manesar remained free and continued to post inflammatory anti-Muslim content regularly on Facebook and Instagram for months after authorities linked him to the murders. He announced in July plans to attend a Hindu procession in Nuh, a largely Muslim district near the capital. At least six people were killed and dozens injured in the resulting unrest, which continued for days and spilled over to Delhi’s outskirts. Nuh district police officer Shubhjeet Singh confirmed Manesar’s arrest on charges of spreading hateful content on social media.

Princess Catherine visits prison

Russian sellers ‘stop fertiliser discounts to India’

Russian companies have ceased offering fertiliser such as di-ammonium phosphate (DAP) to India at discounted prices due to tightening global supplies after becoming the biggest suppliers to the country last year, three industry sources said.

The move in August by Russian companies to instead offer fertilisers at market prices could increase India’s import costs and subsidy burden amid a rally in global prices, as a top exporter, China, tries to curtail overseas sales. “There are no discounts,” said a New Delhi-based senior industry official involved in the negotiations with overseas suppliers.

“Russian companies are offering fertilisers at the market

prices,” the official said, declining to be named due to the sensitivity of the matter. India’s fertiliser imports from Russia surged 246% to a record 4.35mn metric tonnes in the 2022-23 financial year ended on March 31 as suppliers gave discounts to the global market price for DAP, urea and NPK fertilisers.

Russia’s aggressive selling last year eroded the Indian market share of other fertiliser exporters including China, Egypt, Jordan, and the UAE. “Russian companies were offering DAP at discounts of as high as \$80 (per tonne). However, now they are not offering discounts of even \$5,” said another Indian company official.

The current price of Russian DAP is approximately \$570 per tonne on a cost and freight (CFR) basis for Indian buyers, which is the same price offered to other Asian buyers, said a Russian industry official.

Philippine Nobel winner Ressa acquitted of tax evasion

Philippine Nobel laureate Maria Ressa was yesterday cleared of tax evasion following a five-year legal battle, hailing the verdict as a win for press freedom and voicing hope she will be cleared of other charges she insists are politically motivated.

The 59-year-old, who won a Nobel Peace Prize in 2021, has been fighting multiple charges filed during former president Rodrigo Duterte’s administration.

Despite the acquittal, Ressa and Rappler, the news website she co-

founded in 2012, face an uncertain future as they contest another two court cases.

A vocal critic of Duterte and his deadly drug war, Ressa has long maintained that the charges against her and Rappler were politically motivated.

“You gotta have faith,” a visibly relieved Ressa told reporters outside the court after the acquittal.

“Guys, it’s up to us. We hold the line, and this proved that we can hold the line.”

Ressa and Rappler had faced five government charges of tax evasion stemming from the 2015 issue of Philippine depositary receipts, used by companies to raise money

from foreign investors.

A court acquitted them on four charges in January. The fifth was heard by a different court, which cleared her and Rappler of wrongdoing yesterday.

“Today, we celebrate the triumph of facts over politics,” Rappler said in a statement.

“We thank the court for this just decision and for recognising that the fraudulent, false, and flimsy charges made by the Bureau of Internal Revenue do not have any basis in fact.”

Human Rights Watch senior researcher Carlos Conde said the acquittal of Ressa and Rappler was “long overdue” and urged Presi-

dent Ferdinand Marcos to “ensure that legal harassment of Maria Ressa and other journalists ends”.

Ressa and a former colleague Rey Santos Jr are appealing a cyber libel conviction that carries a nearly seven-year jail sentence.

Rappler, meanwhile, is challenging a Philippine Securities and Exchange Commission order to close for allegedly violating a ban on foreign ownership in media.

Under the constitution, only Philippine citizens or entities controlled by citizens can invest in the media.

That case springs from a 2015 investment by the US-based Omidyar Network, established by eBay

founder Pierre Omidyar.

The Omidyar Network later transferred its Rappler investment to the site’s local managers to stave off efforts by Duterte to shut it down.

Despite the remaining hurdles, Ressa was characteristically defiant and optimistic yesterday, telling reporters the latest acquittal “strengthens our resolve to continue with the justice system”.

“It shows that the court system works and we hope to see the remaining charges dismissed,” she said.

Ressa and Rappler’s legal troubles began in 2016 with the election of Duterte, who frequently

launched foul-mouthed attacks against his critics.

They have faced what press freedom advocates describe as a grinding series of criminal charges, arrests and online abuse.

Duterte’s government claimed it had nothing to do with any of the cases against Ressa.

Another high-profile Duterte critic, human rights campaigner Leila de Lima, has spent more than six years in jail on drug trafficking charges she said were fabricated to silence her.

Throughout the campaign against her, Ressa, who is also a US citizen, has remained based in the Philippines.

A slowing China economy is a global concern

China's \$18tn-plus economy is a key driver of global growth, but fears of an economic slowdown have gripped the country. Expansion in the world's second largest economy has already been sputtering amid sluggish consumer spending, a shaky property market, flagging exports amid a US drive for "de-risking," record youth unemployment and towering local government debt.

The impact of these strains is starting to be felt around the globe on everything from commodity prices to equity markets. As the world's second-largest economy, a weaker growth trend in China would have an impact on almost every country. When China's growth rate accelerates by 1 percentage point, other countries benefit by about 0.3 percentage point, according to the International Monetary Fund (IMF).

Countries like Australia and Chile, which export raw materials such as iron ore and copper, are usually affected the most. China is also a big buyer of oil from the Middle East, and tech products from its East Asian neighbours.

Foreign businesses that operate in China, from Volkswagen to Nike and McDonald's are vulnerable to slower revenue growth and lower stock valuations.

Countries around the world that welcome Chinese tourists may see less spending.

For the US, which remains China's biggest trading partner, a slowdown in the world's second-largest economy can help lower inflation, but probably not by enough to move the dial for the Federal Reserve, unless there's a hard landing in China.

It also means China's economy may never overtake the US on a consistent basis, according to Bloomberg Economics.

China's economic troubles mainly boil down to one key word: Property.

This sector has been slumping since 2021, after Beijing tightened credit to large developers and told banks to slow mortgage issuance.

Housing - together with related industries like steel, cement and glass - accounts for about 20% of the country's gross domestic product.

Goldman Sachs Group estimates the housing downturn will reduce China's GDP growth by 1.5 percentage points this year.

China has taken a series of incremental steps to boost its economy, but Beijing isn't pulling out a "bazooka" stimulus package - something measured in trillions of yuan - like it did during the global financial crisis in 2008-09, or even when the pandemic hit in 2020.

Much of the reluctance lies in a drive by the government to control the growth of debt in the country, especially at the municipal level; a desire to shrink the property sector's outsized influence on the economy; and an aversion to doling out cash to consumers, Western-style.

Slower economic growth in China could reduce Beijing's global influence if, for instance, it cuts back on lending to developing nations.

Policymakers in Tokyo believe China's deepening economic woes could hit Japan's fragile recovery, especially if Beijing fails to shore up demand with meaningful stimulus, potentially delaying an exit from ultra-loose monetary policy.

In a sign of growing pessimism over China, the government said its economic report for August that "concern over China's outlook" was among risks to Japan's recovery.

China is Japan's largest trading partner, accounting for 20% of its exports, having replaced the US in 2020.

Exports to China fell 8.6% in the first half of this year as demand for cars, steel and electronics wilted.

Economists believe China's downturn could knock 1-2 percentage points off Japan's annual growth, fuelling fears of a prolonged slowdown in Asia's two biggest economies, which combined account for about a fifth of global GDP.

The IMF forecasts China will be the top contributor to global growth over the next five years, with a share expected to represent 22.6% of total world growth - double that of the US.

A lot of the world's jobs and production depend on China, with its vast market and factory floors.

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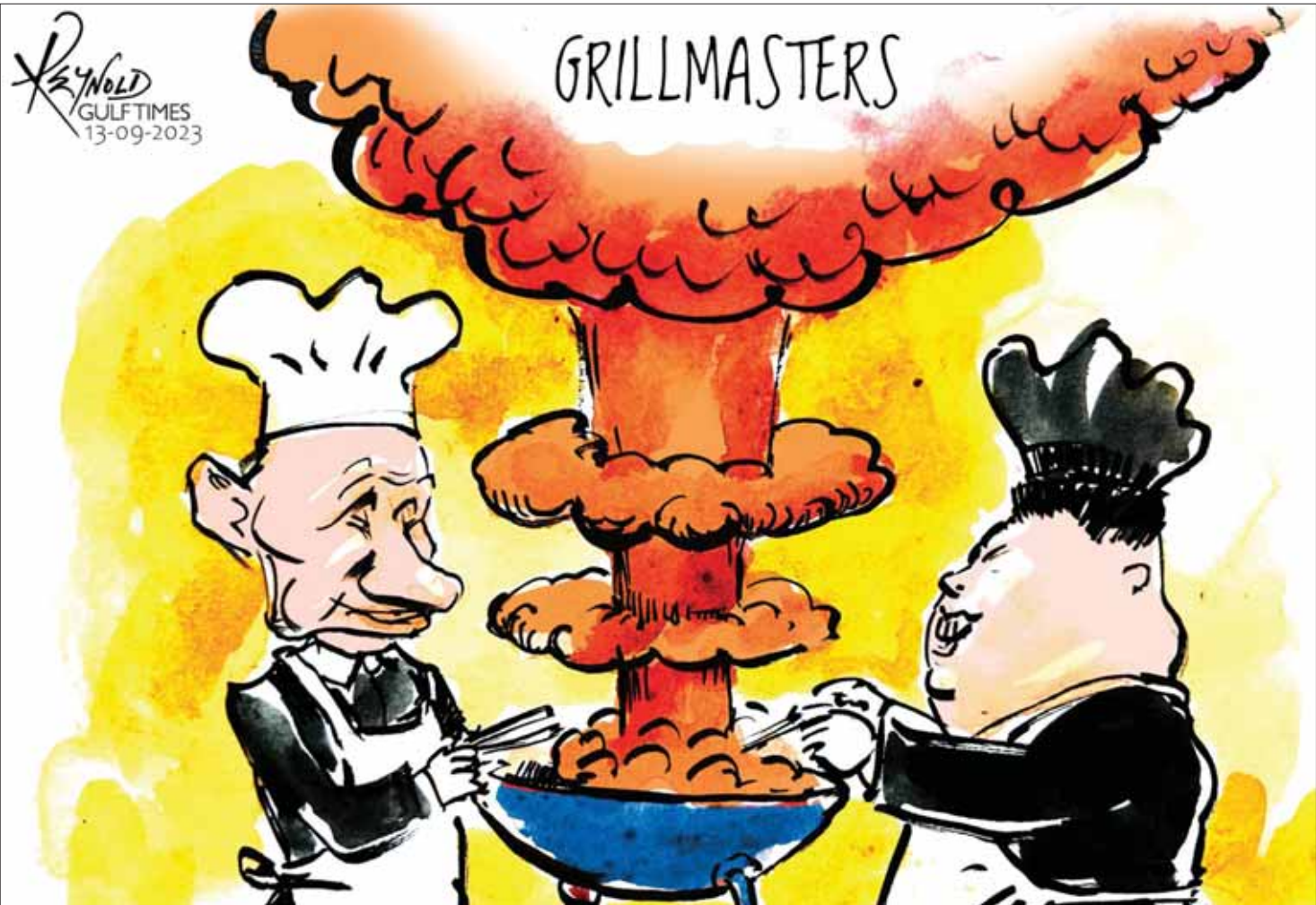

Trillions of dollars a year needed for green shift

Amid warnings that the world is failing to do enough to slow climate change, the Group of 20 big economies has set a goal of tripling renewable energy capacity but faced criticism for spurning bolder steps to halt the use of fossil fuels.

The G20 "New Delhi Leaders' Declaration", at a weekend summit in India, promised to reach net-zero emissions of climate-heating gases "by or around" mid-century to avert ever more damaging heatwaves, droughts, wildfires and rising seas.

The leaders set a goal of tripling global renewable energy capacity by 2030, and stressed that the transition of the energy systems remain "sustainable", "inclusive" and "just" while "leaving no-one behind".

The declaration, by countries which are the source of nearly 80% of the world's climate-heating emissions and about 85% of world's GDP, also highlighted that the shift to a greener economy will require trillions of dollars annually.

Home to 93% of global coal power plants, the group reiterated a promise from last year's G20 in Bali, Indonesia, for a "phase down" of highly polluting coal power, rather than a bolder "phase out" favoured by many developed nations.

China and India are the world's top consumers of coal.

The G20 also stopped short of setting a goal to phase out all use of fossil fuels, the main source of humanity's greenhouse gas emissions.

On Friday, a UN assessment of global climate

action under the 2015 Paris Agreement said governments were not on track to limit warming to the most ambitious target of 1.5 degrees Celsius (2.7 degrees Fahrenheit) above pre-industrial times.

"Much more is needed on all fronts," the UN Climate Change Secretariat said, pointing to "a rapidly narrowing window to raise ambition". Average surface temperatures are already up about 1.2C.

In a deeply divided G20 due to Russia's invasion of Ukraine, the Indian G20 presidency called the consensus declaration a big win.

Climate change looms like 'dark cloud'

Climate activists and academics around the world lauded some progress on climate change but said that the group's overall commitments were insufficient.

"While the G20's commitment to renewable energy targets is commendable, it sidesteps the root cause - our global dependency on fossil fuels," said Harjeet Singh, head of global political strategy at Climate Action Network (CAN), a global network of civil societies from 130 countries.

"As the climate crisis looms like a dark cloud over humanity, the world cries out for a just transition away from fossil fuels," Singh said.

He said rich nations in the G20 had done too little to curb their own emissions and to provide finance to emerging economies.

Analysts said the G20's decisions could set the tone for two-week UN climate talks of almost 200 nations in Dubai, known as COP28, starting in late November.

"Tripling of renewables alone will not get us to 1.5C," said Linda Kalcher, executive director of Strategic Perspectives, a European think-tank.

"We need a strong fossil fuel phase out goal adopted at COP28. We cannot afford business as usual for oil and gas companies anymore," she added.

Urgency of climate action collides with geopolitics

The G20's only mention of fossil fuels was in reiterating a 2009 call for a phase out of "inefficient fossil fuel" subsidies.

Swati Dsouza, lead analyst and India coordinator of International Energy Agency (IEA) said "the clear and concise language" about renewables was a step in the right direction.

"Moreover, if this gets into COP summaries, it becomes another hook for countries to expand" the ambition of their national climate plans, she said.

G20 member Saudi Arabia, which is heavily dependent on oil exports, has long opposed a phase out of fossil fuel use.

And a source aware of the talks said Saudi Arabia only agreed to the language on renewables after the text included a mention of other zero and low emission technologies to limit emissions, including largely unproven carbon capture and storage.

Another contentious issue was over how to reflect findings by the UN's Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) that global emissions have to peak "at the latest by 2025".

The declaration said that the countries "recognised" the IPCC findings limiting global warming to 1.5C requires rapid, deep and sustained reductions in climate heating emissions of 43% by 2030 relative to the 2019 levels.

But, mentioning 2025, the declaration said "this does not imply peaking in all countries within this timeframe".

Developing nations argue that they need more time to cut emissions than developed economies which have grown rich by burning fossil fuels since the Industrial Revolution.

"Global carbon emissions are unlikely to peak before 2025 and hence the targets stated look too optimistic," said Dhruva Purkayastha, India director of the Climate Policy Initiative, a global think tank.

Trillions of dollars needed for climate finance

On finance, the G20 countries noted a need for \$5.8 - \$5.9tn before 2030 for developing countries to reach their climate action goals.

The countries also noted a report on prepared under the Indian presidency, which estimates that the world needs an annual investment of over \$4tn for clean energy technologies by 2030.

The declaration also reiterated that developed nations have failed to meet a 2009 commitment to mobilise \$100bn a year in climate finance for developing nations by 2020. Developed nations say the goal will be met in 2023.

G20 leaders expressed strong support for reforming multilateral development banks to help mobilise more climate finance for developing nations.

However, "there is little direction provided as to how this would be possible," Purkayastha said.

Experts welcomed the G20 declaration's strong support for a just energy transition.

"Just energy transitions can improve jobs and livelihoods, and strengthen economic resilience," the preamble of the declaration said. "We affirm that no country should have to choose between fighting poverty and fighting for our planet."

US takes on Google in landmark antitrust trial

A landmark case pitting the US government against Google over the dominance of the company's world-dominating search engine kicked off in a Washington courtroom yesterday.

"This case is about the future of the Internet and whether Google will ever face meaningful competition in search," said Justice Department lawyer Kenneth Dintzer as the United States government began making its case against the tech titan.

Over the course of 10 weeks of testimony involving more than 100 witnesses, Google will try to persuade Judge Amit P Mehta that the landmark case brought by the Department of Justice is without merit.

Held in a Washington courtroom, the trial is the biggest US antitrust case against a big tech company since the same department took on Microsoft more than two decades ago over the dominance of its Windows operating system.

"Even for Washington DC, I think we have the highest concen-



tration of blue suits in any location here today," Mehta joked, observing the dozens of lawyers packed into his courtroom.

The Google case centres on the government's contention that the tech titan unfairly gained its domination of online search by forging exclusivity contracts with device makers, mobile operators and other companies that left rivals no chance to compete.

Dintzer told Judge Mehta that Google pays out \$10bn every year to Apple and others to secure its search engine default status on phones and web browsers, thereby burying upstarts before they have a chance to grow.

Over the past decade, this created what the government calls a

"feedback loop" in which Google's dominance of search grew ever bigger because of its monopolist access to user data that rivals could never match.

That dominance has made Google parent Alphabet one of the world's richest companies, with search ads generating nearly 60% of the company's revenue, dwarfing income from other activities such as YouTube or Android phones.

"We will track what Google did to maintain its monopoly... It's not about what it could have done or should have done, it's about what they did," Dintzer told the court.

Google firmly rejected the US case saying that its search engine was successful because of its quality and the huge investments made over the years.

"Google has for decades innovated and improved its search engine, plaintiffs escape this inescapable truth," Google's lawyer John Schmidtlein argued before the court.

"This court cannot intervene in the market and say 'Google you are not allowed to compete.' That is anathema to US antitrust law," he said.

Schmidtlein insisted that testimony from executives at Apple and others will demonstrate that Google won the coveted default status on iPhone and the Safari browser "on the merits."

The biggest alleged victims in the case are rival search engines that have yet to eke out a meaningful market share for search or search ads against Google, like Mi-

crosoft's Bing and DuckDuckGo.

Google remains the world's go-to search engine, capturing 90% of the market in the United States and across the globe, much of which comes through mobile usage on iPhones and phones running on Google-owned Android.

Mehta's ruling is expected months after the roughly three months of expected hearings.

He could dismiss the government's arguments or order drastic remedial action such as a breakup of Google's businesses or a revamp of the way it operates.

Whatever the outcome, the ruling will almost certainly be appealed by either side, potentially dragging the case on for years.

Launched in 1998, Washington's case against Microsoft ended in a settlement in 2001 after an appeal reversed an order that the company be split up.

The US government launched its case against Google during the Trump administration and the suit carried over in the transition to President Joe Biden.

Biden has also made a point of challenging tech giants and nominated well-known tech critics to key posts, but with little yet to show for it.

In January, Biden's Department of Justice launched a separate case against Google involving its advertising business and this could go to trial next year.

The company also faces various lawsuits from US states that accuse it of abusing monopolies in ad tech and for blocking competition in its Google Play app store.

Marseille woman hit by stray bullet in turf war dies

A 24-year-old woman has died after being hit by a stray bullet in an attack on a drug-dealing hotspot in the French Mediterranean city of Marseille, prosecutors said yesterday. The woman was hit late on Sunday evening when a burst of fire from a Kalashnikov rifle tore through her apartment building. She was declared brain-dead on Monday. Around 40 people have been killed in drug-related violence in Marseille this year — a situation described as a "bloodbath" by city authorities. "This is a total tragedy," Interior Minister Gerald Darmanin told broadcaster France Bleu during a visit to the port city, which has a history of drug-related violence. Sunday's shooting raises new concerns about the impact of drug crime in Marseille, which is set to host fixtures for the Rugby World Cup and a visit from Pope Francis in the coming weeks. Darmanin said it would take "a lot of police" to tackle the violence between drug gangs. The minister was in Marseille to open a new building for an elite police unit called the RAID. The dead woman was hit by a bullet that pierced the plywood surround of her third-floor window, the city's chief prosecutor, Dominique Laurens, said. "She was admitted to hospital with a serious wound to the head and in danger for her life. She died in the early hours of yesterday," she added. Two other women, aged 79 and 86, and a 71-year-old man escaped unharmed after their apartments were also struck by bullets.

Children of couple that fled Britain put into Pakistan state custody

Five British-Pakistani children brought to Pakistan by a fugitive couple wanted over the death of a 10-year-old girl in Britain were taken into the custody of state protective services yesterday, police said.

Surrey Police in Britain said last week the welfare of the five children was "a priority" after Sara Sharif was found dead with multiple injuries in her family home in August.

They believe her father Urfan Sharif, aged 41, his partner Beinash Batool, 29, and his brother Faisal Malik, 28, fled to Pakistan with the children aged between one and 13 before Sara's body was found, sparking an international manhunt.

The children were found at Sharif's father's house in Jhelum, around 120km east of the Pakistan capital, after police received information that the couple were hiding there. "We have been conducting investigations and raids for some time and were finally successful in recovering the children yesterday," Mudassar Khan, spokesman for the Jhelum police, told AFP.

Pakistan police are still investigating how long the children had been in the house as the search for Sharif and Batool continues. The house where the children were found was otherwise empty. After a court appearance yesterday "the area magistrate has ordered the children be handed over into the custody of the child protection bureau," Khan said.

The fugitive couple said last week they were prepared to cooperate with UK authorities. "Sara's death was an incident. Our family in Pakistan are severely affected by all that is going on," Batool said in a video shared with AFP by her relatives.

US CDC to decide who should get the new Covid-19 shots

A US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) advisory panel met yesterday to come up with a recommendation on whether updated Covid-19 shots approved by the government should be used broadly or targeted to specific at-risk populations, setting the stage for the launch of a re-vaccination campaign.

The CDC advisers are set to decide on whether to recommend that everyone ages 5 and older receive a dose of the updated shots — and signalled that they were leaning toward such a broad use. The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) on Monday authorised updated Covid vaccines made by Pfizer and its German partner BioNTech SE as well as by Moderna. Novavax said the FDA was still reviewing its shot.

The shots are part of a push by public health officials to align the next Covid vaccines more closely with the actual circulating variant of the virus, similar to the way annual flu shots are designed. A vaccination campaign is expected to be kicked off in the

coming days. In their presentation at the ongoing meeting, the advisers said they were supportive of a universal Covid-19 vaccine recommendation across age groups at this time. At issue is whether the advisers will call for targeting specific populations for the new boosters — such as older adults and people with underlying medical conditions or compromised immune systems — or a campaign with the broader population in mind.

All three vaccine manufacturers will also make presentations at the meeting of the CDC advisers. "There is an urgent need for alternatives to mRNA-based vaccines, including protein vaccines, and so in that regard, we will review such a submission expeditiously," FDA official Dr David Kaslow said in response to a question about Novavax's vaccine.

Novavax's protein-based vaccine is based on an older technology than the messenger RNA vaccine, which has been used for decades to combat diseases.

Kaslow said he was not at liberty to speak about Novavax's shot specifically.

CDC Director Mandy Cohen will make the final decision some

time after the committee's vote, and may or may not follow the panel's advice.

Keeping up with the latest variants of the ever-evolving coronavirus has been a challenge for public health officials globally since the pandemic began in 2020, with some possessing more worrisome characteristics than others. Vaccines can be formulated to target specific variants. The variants circulating the most widely in the United States right now are subvariants of what is called the XBB lineage of the virus.

"I do think that a broad boosting strategy makes sense," said Caitlin Rivers, a senior scholar at the Johns Hopkins Center for Health Security in Baltimore, adding that while the virus was not causing as many hospitalisations and deaths as before, it is still circulating.

Covid infections and hospitalisations have been rising in the United States, Europe and Asia but remain well below previous peaks. US deaths are now relatively low — reported at around 2,000 last month — though the country has experienced 1.1mn Covid deaths since the outset of the pandemic. — Reuters

Spain strips Pinochet of Franco-era award

Spain yesterday withdrew a military award given to deceased Chilean dictator Augusto Pinochet, saying it wanted to rectify a "historic injustice" 50 years after the Chilean coup. Pinochet, who seized power in Chile on September 11, 1973, was awarded the Cross of Military Merit by Spain in 1975 when it was ruled by dictator Francisco Franco. The US-backed coup in Chile toppled Marxist leader Salvador Allende and underscored covert interference by the United States. It ushered in the 17-year Pinochet dictatorship under which more than 3,200 people were killed or "disappeared" and tens of thousands tortured.

"We have decided to withdraw the Grand Cross of Military Merit from the dictator Pinochet," government spokeswoman Isabel Rodriguez said. The council of ministers yesterday ratified the decision, which had been announced by left-wing Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez on Monday evening.

"Fifty years ago, Chilean democracy was the victim of a brutal attack that shook the world," the Spanish leader posted on X.

"The time has come to right a historic injustice". Chilean president Gabriel Boric thanked Sanchez, saying: "For memory and justice, but above all for the future, so that this never happens again".

'Indiana Jones' art sleuth recovers stolen Van Gogh

A Dutch art detective has recovered a precious Vincent van Gogh painting that was stolen from a museum in a daring midnight heist during the coronavirus lockdown three-and-a-half years ago, police said yesterday.

Arthur Brand took possession of the missing painting, the 1884 "Parsonage Garden at Nuenen in Spring", worth between three and six million euros (\$3.2 and \$6.4mn), at his Amsterdam home on Monday, stuffed in a blue IKEA bag.

Brand, dubbed the 'Indiana Jones of the Art World' for tracing a series of high-profile lost artworks, told AFP that confirming the painting was the stolen Van Gogh was "one of the greatest moments of my life."

"Arthur Brand, in co-operation with the Dutch police, has solved this matter," Richard Bronswijk of the Dutch police arts crime unit confirmed to AFP.

"This is definitely the real one,

there's no doubt about it."

Brand told AFP that frequent calls by him and the Dutch police to hand back the stolen artwork finally paid off when a man, whose identity was not revealed for his own safety, handed Brand the painting in a blue IKEA bag, covered with bubble-wrap and stuffed in a pillow casing.

A video clip supplied by Brand showed him unpacking the painting in his lounge and gasping in astonishment when he realised what it was.

"I couldn't believe it," he said.

The painting was burgled from the Singer Laren Museum near Amsterdam on March 30, 2020 in a heist that made headlines around the world.

Dutch police released video images shortly after the burglary showing a thief smashing through a glass door in the middle of the night, before running out with the painting tucked under his right arm.

In April 2021, police arrested a man named in Dutch media as Nils M for the theft. He was later convicted and sentenced to eight

years behind bars. M was also convicted for stealing another masterpiece by Frans Hals called "Two Laughing Boys" in a separate heist.

"After a few months I heard from a source in the criminal world who had bought the Van Gogh," from Nils M, said Brand,

who has gained fame for his remarkable recoveries of stolen art, including the 'Hitler's Horses' bronze statues, a Picasso painting and a ring that once belonged to Oscar Wilde.

This man, identified by Dutch media as Peter Roy K, was cur-

rently behind bars for a separate case involving the large-scale import and export of cocaine, Brand said.

K wanted to use the painting as collateral to negotiate a reduction in his sentence.

Brand confirmed Peter Roy K's identity, stressing he had said before that "no deal for a reduced sentence would be made."

The whereabouts of the Van Gogh however remained unknown until two weeks ago when a mysterious man contacted Brand saying he wanted to return it.

After some negotiation, Brand persuaded the man — who had "nothing to do with the theft," according to the art detective — to hand back the artwork.

"The man told me 'I want to return the Van Gogh. It has caused a massive headache'" because it could not be used as a bargaining chip, Brand said.

"In an operation done in close coordination with the Dutch police, we got the painting back," he said. The painting, which comes from relatively early on in Van Gogh's career, before the prolific

artist embarked on his trademark post-impressionist paintings such as "Sunflowers" and his vivid self-portraits, has already been handed back to the director of the Groninger Museum, from where it was on loan to the Singer Laren Museum.

"At first there was disbelief. Staff were asking themselves 'can this be true?'" said Karina Smrkovsky, head of communications at the Groninger museum.

"Then, when it was confirmed, our disbelief turned into delight. We are incredibly happy that it has been returned," Smrkovsky told AFP.

"We are incredibly thankful to Arthur Brand for getting it back."

Smrkovsky said however that the painting would not be on public display immediately, most probably only next year.

"We are delighted that art lovers from all over the world once again will be able to see this wonderful painting," said Evert van Os, museum director at Singer Laren.

Meanwhile Frans Hals' "Two Laughing Boys" remains missing — but Brand said he hoped it would also be returned soon.

Amir accorded official reception ceremony in Guyana



Amir’s visit will ‘broaden horizons of co-operation’

The great Kaieteur Falls in Guyana, with a height of 226 metres, is about five times higher than Niagara Falls.

Guyana is famous for gold, diamonds, and semi-precious stones production, with the mining sector exporting these materials and other high-quality bauxite, copper, iron, nickel, and aluminium. Guyana is seeking to attract foreign investments to support its economy. Guyana’s economy has witnessed a radical transformation since the discovery of crude oil there in 2015 and commercial exploration in 2019. According to a statement issued by ExxonMobil in 2020, Guyana has a large, high-quality oil reserve, estimated at 33bn undiscovered barrels, with the potential to produce 750,000 barrels per day by 2025, which could significantly change Guyana’s economic prospects and put it on the world’s richest countries list.
