Ukraine recaptures Klishchiivka village

The general in command of Ukraine's ground forces said yesterday that Ukrainian forces had recaptured the eastern village of Klishchiivka on the southern flank of Bakhmut, which the Russians claimed control of in January. "Klishchiivka was cleared of the Russians and liberated," Gen Alexander Syrskyi, said. Interior Minister Ihor Klymenko also confirmed that the village was recaptured in heavy fighting. Klishchiivka is around nine km south of Bakhmut. It is several kilometres north of Andriivka which was recaptured earlier

Iranians observe Amini anniversary

Sporadic protests continued in Iran yesterday amid a widespread crackdown by security forces a year after a young Kurdish woman's death in custody set off some of the worst political unrest in four decades. The death on Sept. 16 last year of Mahsa Amini. a 22-year-old Kurdish woman arrested by the morality police for allegedly flouting mandatory dress codes, triggered months of some of the biggest protests against the Islamic Republic's clerical rule ever seen and drew international condemnation.

Libya flood survivors face landmine risk

People whose homes were swept away by flooding in Libya's eastern city of Derna a week ago faced the dilemma yesterday of whether to stay and risk infection or flee through areas where landmines have been displaced by the torrents. Thousands of people were killed after two dams above Derna broke on Sept. 10 during a powerful storm, bringing down residential blocks lining a usually dry river bed as people slept. Libyan authorities have confirmed that 150 people have been poisoned by polluted water in the flood-hit areas.

Probe into air crash that killed 14 people

Investigators travelled yesterday to a remote town in the Brazilian Amazon to probe a plane crash that killed 14 people and left no survivors. The small turboprop plane was flying a group of Brazilian sport fishermen into the northern town of Barcelos Saturday when it crashed in stormy weather, apparently after starting its descent too late and skidding off the end of the runway. The crash killed all 12 passengers and two crew. Page 11

Flu vaccination campaign starts today

The Ministry of Public Health (MoPH), in collaboration with Hamad Medical Corporation (HMC) and Primary Health Care Corporation, (PHCC) has announced the launch of the annual seasonal influenza vaccination campaign from today (Monday).

Flu vaccines will be available free of charge at 90 heath facilities, including 31 PHCC health centres in addition to outpatient clinics at HMC and several semigovernment and private hospitals and clinics across Oatar.

Head of the Infectious Diseases Division at HMC, Dr Abdullatif al-Khal said it was important for people to be proactive and protect themselves against the

Dr Hamad al-Romaihi, director, Health Protection and Communicable Disease Control, said while the flu is a serious illness and everyone six months of age and older should take the vaccine to protect themselves, some groups are more vulnerable than others.

"People of all ages and health conditions can catch the flu virus and become sick, but there are certain key population groups who are at increased risk of the virus," Dr al-Romaihi said. "These are people aged over 50 years; those with chronic conditions regardless of their age; children aged between six months and five years; pregnant women; and healthcare workers due to their close interaction with vulnerable patients and children.


Dr Khalid Hamid Elawad, manager, Health Protection, Preventive Health Directorate at PHCC, encouraged the community to take the flu vaccine as soon as possible to build immunity before the winter season hits in coming

"I urge all of you to take the flu vaccine as soon as possible because maximum protection against the flu takes up to two weeks to develop, so the sooner people get vaccinated, the sooner they will be protected," Dr Elawad

Dr Elawad also reassured the community that they cannot get the flu from the flu shot.

"The virus is inactivated so it can't actually cause the flu after you get the shot," Dr Elawad said. "The flu vaccine is one of the safest and most established vaccines. Hundreds of millions of people around the world have safely received flu vaccines over the past 50 years, and there has been extensive research supporting the safety of flu vaccines."

Registration for next Haj season starts on Wednesday

Speaking at a press conference, Director of the Department of Haj and Umrah Ali bin Sultan al-Misifri said that Qataris and residents can apply on Haj.gov.qa website from 8am on Wednesday, Sept 20 until Oct 20, 2023.

The early registration allows Qatari Haj tour operators to round off their contracts with

corresponding Saudi agencies and better services for pilgrims, al-Misifri said.

He added that the Saudi authorities have allocated Qatar a Haj quota of 4,400 pilgrims.

Qatari applicants must be at least 16 years old, with the possibility of adding five companions. GCC nationals must be at least 18 years old and have the option to add only one companion. For residents, they must be at least 40 years old and completed a 10-year residency in the country. They are allowed to add only one companion. (QNA)



MoEHE sets book fees, transport fares for non-Qatari students

E the Minister of Education and Higher Education Buthaina bint Ali al-Jabr al-Nuaimi yesterday issued ministerial decision determining the book fees and transportation fares for non-Qatari (GCC nationals) students.

The decision came in the context of the Ministry of Education and Higher Education (MoEHE)'s keenness to review educational policies and reduce the financial burdens on parents

The decision set the transportation fee for each student at QR200 per semester, if they use school transportation, instead of QR1,000; a reduction of 78%.

The decision kept the fees of textbooks for each student at QR150 per semester.

The decision also stipulated that the children of Imams and Muezzins of the Ministry of Endowments (Awqaf) and Islamic Affairs be exempted from the book fees and transportation fares, and that exemption of the children of Qatari women and people with disabilities from the book fees and transportation fares shall continue.

The decision is implemented from the beginning of the school year 2023/2024. (QNA)



Steps highlighted to prevent accidental ingestion of medicines by children

Doctors have recommended a number of first aid measures parents should take to help a child who accidentally swallows medication.

Speaking to local Arabic daily Arrayah, they said measures include immediately rinsing the child's mouth with water to remove any remnants of the medicine and encouraging the child to drink plenty of water, tea, or juice to dilute the ingested substance. They also warned against forcing the child to vomit, as this can increase the risk of the vomit entering the lungs and may cause pneumonia.

Doctors stressed the importance of calling for emergency help as soon as symptoms of poisoning are seen in the child, which could include nausea, vomiting, diarrhoea, difficulty breathing, cardiovascular problems, and loss of consciousness.

It is very risky to keep medications within the reach of children and these should be stored in places not accessible to kids, they said. The other reasons for accidental medication ingestion by children are children's curiosity and desire to imitate others, and medications being packaged in colourful packaging resembling candies.

Negligence in storing medications could lead to kids consuming them accidentally or taking them for candies, warned Dr Mohamed al-Amri, senior consultant for Pediatric Emergency Medicine and Head of the Pediatrics at Hamad Medical Corporation. Some medication could lead to poisoning in children, he said adding the emergency departments usually receive such cases from time

Dr Mohamed al-Batrawi, emergency doctor at Al Emadi Hospital, too stressed the need for medications to be kept in their original boxes and away from food. Parents should avoid telling children these are sweets and explain their real use. Children in their early years tend to imitate adults, so parents have to be careful when taking medications in front of them,

Dr Ahmed Saeed, emergency doctor at Doha Clinic Hospital, said that while incidences of children accidentally consuming medicines is not common in Qatar, there are a number of cases that come to the emergency department with medication poisoning, mostly due to parents' negligence.



he Ministry of Environment and Climate Change (MECC) organised an environmental seminar yesterday to mark the International Day for the Preservation of the Ozone Layer in collaboration with the University of Doha for Science and Technology, adopting the theme "Protecting the Ozone Layer and Combating Climate Change."

The seminar addressed the risks threatening the ozone layer and their impact on the environment and climate change, such as global warming, which leads to numerous natural crises and disasters like hurricanes and floods.

It also discussed Qatar's efforts to preserve the ozone layer and its commitment to implementing the Montreal Protocol and the Vienna Convention for the Protection of the Ozone Layer.

The seminar was attended by Abdulhadi Nasser al-Marri, Assistant Undersecretary for Environmental Affairs; Dr Salem bin Nasser al-Nuaimi, President of the University of Doha for Science and Technology; Khalid al-Kalali, UNEP Policy and Enforcement officer at Regional Office for West Asia; and representatives from some government departments and companies related to the sector.



Addressing the seminar, al-Marri stressed that the occasion represents a crucial opportunity to unify collective efforts in dealing with the issue of ozone layer protection, which is one of the most complex environmental

challenges.

He stressed the need for international co-operation in facing

this challenge.

He pointed out that this day was established to raise awareness about the importance of preserving the ozone layer, educating people on substances that deplete it, and highlighting the

urgent need to reduce the use of such substances.

He also stressed the ministry's commitment to preserving and protecting the ozone layer. He presented Qatar's efforts in ozone layer preservation through its commitment to the Vienna Convention and the Montreal Protocol concerning substances that deplete the ozone layer.

He spoke about MECC plan for the gradual phaseout of these substances and its efforts to stay up-to-date with developments related to the control and regula-

tion of these substances and their alternatives.

He called on governments, organisations, and individuals to collaborate in protecting the ozone layer, promoting the use of alternative materials, and adopting more sustainable practices. He stressed the importance of supporting scientific research to develop new and innovative environmental technologies.

In the meantime, MECC launched a competition for school and university students to encourage to take part in the related awareness programmes.

Difi discusses family policies at Budapest Demographic Summit

ontemporary and emerging challenges that affect the lives of families were the focus of the fifth Budapest Demographic Summit in Hungary with participation from Qatar Foundation's Doha International Family Institute (Difi) at the heart of the conversation.

Dialogue on ways that political decision makers, religious leaders, scholars, media, and civil society can collaborate and harness the power of science and innovation to support families were also held during the summit, which was themed 'The family is the key to security'.





QU's YSC wins seven awards at iCAN 2023

Young Scientists Centre (YSC) has won seven
awards in the 8th International
Invention Innovation Competition in Canada, iCAN 2023, a

The YSC's award sweeps includes two gold, a silver for projects submitted by the students, another silver for the centre itself, in addition to three special awards. This win came after stiff competition with 621 other projects from 50 countries around the world.

led al-Kubaisi, Khaled al-Midfa, Saeed al-Kuwari and Mohamed al-Khulaifi, from Hayat Universal Bilingual School, won a gold medal for their project 'Innovative Football to Analyse the Players Physical Performance.'

The high school students developed a football that evaluates player performance by utilising artificial intelligence techniques, to be used in training evaluations. This project was made possible through the student's participation in the Science in Sports programme offered by the YSC.

Nouf al-Emadi and Naeema al-Fakhro from Al-Arqam Academy for Girls also won a gold medal and a special award, for a project titled 'LiMn2O4-MXene as a new composite material to improve the performance of lithium batteries,' under the supervision of Dr Abdel Shakour and the YSC.

Their project helps in developing sustainable energy systems.

Students Yousef al-Enezi and Mohamed al-Kuwari from Qatar Academy for Science and Technology won a silver award and a special award for a research project titled 'Generating green energy from nanocomposites made of polylactic acid,' under the supervision of Dr Diba and the YSC.

The project aims to use a new, environmentally friendly source of energy by reducing the emission of toxic gases that contribute to the phenomenon of global warming.

The YSC also won a silver medal and a special award for its adop-

tion of developed methods and principles for teaching scientific research methodologies, in a project titled 'An ingenious approach for teachers professional development based on innovative research-based practices towards promoting the scientific research culture in education.'

YSC director Prof Noora al-Thani, congratulated the winners and said, "At the Centre, we are keen to provide a stimulating environment for creativity and innovation. We also encourage our students to develop, search, and disseminate their ideas and experiences at all levels, since it has a major role in developing the knowledge-based economy of Qatar as well as achieving Qatar National Vision 2030."

"At Ashghal, we are keen to make use of the groundwater and to implement sustainable solutions for water use, after ensuring its quality, in some of the projects of the authority," he added.

President of WSTA Eng Abdulrahman al-Mahmoud said the symposium aimed to explore the most significant problems that occurred in the region due to rapid urban development and population growth, especially in major cities.

These issues have made it challenging to harmonise the requirements of development and the large projects while preserving the infrastructure.

He added it was crucial for the competent authorities to follow scientific research, to gain insight on the causes of the phenomenon that has arisen in several cities in Gulf countries and to look for scientific and practical solutions to address the problem.

Malaysia envoy keen to enhance bilateral ties with Qatar

alaysian ambassador Zamshari Shaharan expressed optimism about the potential for high-level visits between Qatar and Malaysia soon, aimed at further boosting bilateral ties in various areas of co-opera-

Interacting with the media recently, the envoy hoped that exchange of visits will take place with Malaysian ministers visiting Qatar in the near future.

"Our goal is to elevate these bilateral relations to a higher level, and we also hope for our prime minister to visit Qatar," Shaharan said, noting that the two countries continue to enjoy strong and deep-rooted ties.

Highlighting a framework of relations established in 2019 through a 'high-level joint committee meeting (HLJC), he pointed out that the full potential of this framework is yet to be realised.

The envoy noted that the establishment of the committee serves as a platform for regular meetings to discuss various aspects of the two countries' relations, which include economy, healthcare, and education.

About trade and investment, Shaharan underlined Qatar's proposed investment in Malavsia, which has been under discussion for two years. He noted the concerted efforts on the Malaysian side to welcome more investments from Qatar.

He also expressed confidence that once this initial stage is complete, further investment opportunities will arise, aligning with Qatar's goal to diversify its investment portfolio.

In a recent visit to Qatar, Malaysia's Minister of Economy Rafizi Ramli stressed his country's commitment to further deepen collaboration with Oatar across a range of sectors. He underscored the continuous work towards building strong connections, particularly in

the areas of energy and food secu-

Noting the Malaysian government's initiatives to foster co-operation with Qatar, Ramli said the two countries had signed various agreements focused on economic collaboration. This, he added, aims to enhance integration between the public and private sectors in both countries

Shaharan identified key sectors that Malaysia offers, citing food security as a prominent area of cooperation. He noted that there is a huge potential for co-operation in the hospitality sector, capitalising on the excellent connectivity between Doha and Kuala Lumpur.

About flight connections, he said there are currently three daily flights between the two nations, with Qatar Airways operating one flight and Malaysian Airlines offering two. He noted the sig-nificance of Malaysian Airlines initiating flights to Doha for the first time, and highlighted positive feedback regarding the route's popularity.

On tourism, Shaharan cited a stable flow of Qatari tourists to Malaysia, and pointed to the influx of visitors from various other nationalities from Qatar. He said he sees a big potential for increased tourism promotion in both Qatar and Malaysia.

Regarding visa arrangements, he said Qataris enjoy visa-free entry. while e-visa options are available for other nationalities - applying with ease and making Malaysia more accessible for visitors.

Qatar committed to international covenants, treaties

ince Qatar's accession to the UN in 1971, the state has not hesitated, based on its firm belief in the importance of multilateral international action, to play its role as an active partner in the international community to support the success of the goals of the international organisation, as it has made intensive efforts, benefiting from its active diplomacy at the regional and international levels, to promote peace, stability, and development around the world, confront global challenges and reduce tension in international relations.

To this end, Qatar has been keen to accede to many international treaties and charters within the framework of its full commitment to activate and implement the principle of the rule of law to achieve international justice and contribute to strengthening international peace and security, achieving stability in the region and the world, and supporting efforts to achieve the goals and objectives of the UN through its active membership in the international organisation and its affiliated bodies, and its continuous efforts to support the international initiatives of those bodies.

In affirmation of Qatar's respect for international covenants and conventions, the Permanent Constitution of the State of Qatar stipulates in Article 6 that the state shall respect the international charters and conventions, and strive to implement all international agreements, charters, and conventions it is party thereof. Article 8 of the constitution added that the treaty or agreement shall have the power of law after ratification and publication in the official gazette.

Based on the awareness of the great importance of combating corruption, and as a continuation of its regional and international efforts to eradicate this scourge for the sake of healthy societies based on the principles of integrity and transparency, Qatar ratified in 2007 the UN Convention against Corruption (UNCAC) as the only legally binding universal anti-corruption instrument and to strengthen prevention, control, and accountability efforts.

The award aims to highlight exemplary measures and good practices at the global level, as well as appreciate, promote, collect and disseminate anti-corruption models from around the world to raise awareness, support and solidarity with the aim of fighting corruption to encourage and motivate similar and new initiatives

towards establishing a corruption-free society, as the award works to celebrate and honour those who fight corruption around the world, and not only enhance their image, as well as motivate governments, academic institutions, the media and civil society to adopt, understand, and co-operate in implementing the principles of the UNCAC.

Based on Qatar's keenness to promote and strengthen the legislative structure of human rights, it has joined a number of international human rights covenants that reinforce the principle of non-discrimination, such as the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination (ICERD) in 1976, the International Convention on the Suppression and Punishment of the Crime of Apartheid (ICSPCA) in the same year, and the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) in 2010, which reflects the interest of the wise leadership in promoting and protecting human rights at the national and re-

Qatar supports efforts to achieve the goals and objectives of the UN through its active membership in the international organisation and its affiliated bodies

As an affirmation of the consistent approach and interest in rights and freedoms, especially the rights of children, women, and persons with disabilities, Qatar has ratified the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) and its protocols and has been keen to put into practice the basic principles and provisions of the convention and its protocols.

It has joined other conventions that provide greater protection for children and the environment in which they grow up in, including the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) under Decree No 28 of 2008, the UN Convention Against Transnational Organised Crime of 2000 (UNTOC) under Decree No 10 of 2009, and the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) under Decree No 28 of 2009.

In order to build effective, accountable, and inclusive institutions at all levels, Qatar, represented by the Rule of Law and Anti-Corruption Centre (ROLACC), which was established in Doha in co-operation with the UN in 2012, contributes to promoting the principle of the rule of law and combating corruption at the regional level, by holding seminars, workshops, and academic programmes for specialists from the countries of the region.

Qatar, out of keenness to strengthen its strategic partnership with the UN and

support its efforts in maintaining international peace and security, joined the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons (NPT) in 1989, thus renewing its commitment to work with the international community for the complete elimination of nuclear weapons and the achievement of regional and international peace and security.

Within the framework of its support for regional and international efforts to combat terrorism around the world, Qatar has signed many agreements to combat this scourge that ravages societies. It emerged as an active international member in eliminating this phenomenon through the enactment of legislation to enhance efforts to combat terrorism and dry up its funding, and has taken the initiative to support many international mechanisms concerned with combating terrorism, in addition to hosting and organizing many international events and conferences calling for confronting it.

At the Gulf, Arab, regional, and international levels, Qatar ratified the Arab Convention on Combating Money Laundering and Terrorist Financing in 2012, the GCC Counter-Terrorism Agreement in 2008, the International Convention for the Suppression of Acts of Nuclear Terrorism in 2014, and the OIC Convention on Combating International Terrorism in 2006.

At the national level, Qatar issued the Law No 4 of 2010 on Combating Money Laundering and Terrorism Financing, in addition to forming the National Committee to follow up the implementation of international conventions on combating money laundering and terrorist financing.

Qatar has also carried out fundamental legislative reforms, perhaps the most important of which is the legal framework regulating the rights of expatriate workers, the issuance of real estate ownership laws for non-Qataris, political asylum law, domestic workers law, permanent residence law, regulation of the entry and exit of expatriates and their residence, and the establishment of a workers support and insurance fund, in addition to establishing the National Committee to Combat Human Trafficking (NCCHT), which aims to co-ordinate national efforts to monitor, prevent, and combat forms of human trafficking.

The promotion and protection of human rights is one of the main pillars of the policy of Qatar and a strategic choice that is relied upon in the comprehensive reform process pursued by the state that was emphasised in the Qatar National Vision 2030, which included important axes related to major human rights issues in the fields of education, health, environment, labour rights, women's empowerment, children's rights, national development strategy, and the strengthening of relevant national institutions. UNHCR's partnership with Qatar a beacon of hope for refugees

Representative of the UN High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) to Qatar Ahmed Mohsen has affirmed that the strong and established partnership between Qatar, its various institutions, and UNHCR, represents a beacon of hope for millions of refugees and internally displaced persons around the globe.

He stressed that Qatar has continued its strong support over the years for diplomatic and humanitarian efforts in Afghanistan, especially its support for Afghan refugees and the countries hosting them, which culminated in its recent assumption of the presidency of the Solutions Strategy for Afghan Refugees Support Platform (SSAR). Indigenous rights supporters rally across Australia before vote

ustralians rallied around the country yesterday to fight for a landmark Indigenous rights reform that is bleeding support in the polls before an October

Tens of thousands joined "Walk

for Yes" events in major cities ahead of the vote that could grant Indigenous Australians a constitutionally enshrined right to be consulted on policies that affect them a so-called Voice.

More than 200 years since British colonisation, Indigenous people - whose ancestors have lived on the continent for about 60,000 years - have shorter lives than

other Australians, poorer education and are far more likely to die in police custody.

"I think we need a voice in parliament and I think it's about time," said Laurel Johnson, a 58-vearold retired Indigenous community services worker who joined hundreds of people at the Sydney rally, many seeking shade during a spring heatwave.

Asked if the Voice would improve the lot of Indigenous people, she said: "I jolly well hope so."

Her sister Priscilla Johnson, 53 said some Indigenous people still lived in "Third World" conditions.

"Australia is considered a First World country. The poor social determinants of health have been continuous since the 1788 invasion," she said, referring to the landing of the First Fleet that established a British penal colony in Australia.

In Melbourne, more than 10,000 supporters marched through the streets, some with banners reading: "You're the voice, vote yes".

Thousands more gathered in Canberra, Perth, Brisbane, Darwin, Hobart and Alice Springs.

But the "Vote Yes" campaign,

launched just weeks ago by Prime Minister Anthony Albanese, faces an uphill battle.

Recent surveys show about 60% against the reform versus 40% in support - a near reversal of the situation a year ago.

To pass, the referendum needs majority support across Australia but also a majority in at least four

Canada delays planned trade mission to India

anadian Trade Minister Mary Ng is postponing a trade mission to India planned for October, an official said, reflecting increasingly tense diplomatic relations just days after India's prime minister scolded his Canadian counterpart at a G20 summit in New Delhi.

"At this time, we are postponing the upcoming trade mission to India," said Shanti Cosentino,

a spokesperson for the minister. without giving a reason.

Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi, who held formal bilateral meetings with many world leaders during the G20 summit, snubbed Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, allowing only a short, informal meeting on the sidelines of the event.

Canada has the highest population of Sikhs outside their home state of Punjab in India, and the country has been the site of many protests that have irked India.

"They are promoting seces-

sionism and inciting violence against Indian diplomats, damaging diplomatic premises and threatening the Indian community in Canada and their places of worship," India's government said after the leaders met.

Earlier, India said it had paused trade talks with Canada. Canada made a similar announcement earlier this month, saying such a

pause was needed to "take stock". Only about four months ago the two nations said they aimed to seal an initial trade agreement this year.

Riding India's G20 wave, Modi's party sets up for elections

he G20 summit was India's big moment on the world stage, giving the country an opportunity to work on global issues and providing Prime Minister Narendra Modi a chance to present his credentials as a global statesman.

Although some analysts said the meeting showed few concrete results, his Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) is now cashing in on Modi's enhanced image ahead of a series of state elections and national elections due by May 2024.

In the run-up to the summit, Modi's face was plastered on G20 hoardings across the country. During the meeting last weekend, local television channels had wall-towall coverage of Modi with world leaders, including US President Joe Biden, and the praise that was showered on him for a successful meeting. The BJP peppered its social media platforms with messages of praise from world leaders.

The summit declaration papered over key differences and had few breakthroughs in critical areas such as debt and climate change but for a popular leader with a long-dominant lead over his political rivals, these are diplomatic intricacies that matter little in domestic politics, analysts said.

India's successful mission last month to land a spacecraft on the moon is another factor that feeds into the country's feel-good image and gives Modi a fillip, they said.

The opposition Congress party has criticised Modi for turning G20 into an election campaign, charging him with promoting dialogue and peace on the international stage while his Hindu nationalist administration discriminates against religious minorities and quashes dissent, charges the government has denied.

But analysts say Modi's political position is so strong there is little risk of the strategy backfiring.

"The message which has gone out is that India has really emerged very strong in the world," said Sanjay Kumar, psephologist at New Delhi's Centre for the Study of Developing Societies.

"And it's only because of Modi. The narrative is the national pride of an average Indian has gone up," he said. Modi enjoys high approval ratings and surveys suggest he will easily win the general election and a third term next year despite concerns about rising inflation, unemployment and an uneven economic recovery after the Covid-19 pandemic. Worries about violence in the northeastern state of Manipur have also affected Modi's image.

The BJP plans to highlight the "success of the summit" during fortnight-long celebrations of Modi's birthday starting tomorrow, a party official said.

Modi's contribution to India's rising global stature will be a key theme of a special five-day parliament session beginning next week, the official said.

"It's really a fact that India's image has transformed under Prime Minister Modi," BIP vice-presi-

dent Baijayant Jay Panda said. Modi, who turns 73 tomorrow, swept to power in 2014 promising stability and change from what he called the long-ruling Congress party's corruption and poor gov-

He consolidated his win with welfare economics, boosting infrastructure and unabashed Hindu nationalism, winning a second term in 2019 with a bigger majority.

Modi often underlines national pride in his speeches, which resonates with a large section of the people that has been aggrieved about India's portrayal in Western media as a poor country, analysts said.

"Every small thing counts when a narrative of national pride is being built," said Yashwant Deshmukh, a psephologist with the C-Voter agency. According to C-Voter's biannual "Mood of the Nation" survey in India Today magazine last month, 47% said India's G20 presidency will enhance the country's global stature and 73% said it will be a poll plank in 2024. The opposition Congress party was not so impressed, with its chief spokesperson Jairam Ramesh saying Modi's statements of tolerance on the global stage are "sheer hypocrisy".

"At home...he remains silent on hate speech, lynchings, targeted killings, and attacks on holy places. His party, and the larger ecosystem he belongs to, has unleashed systematic polarisation campaigns... and has torn apart the social fabric of the nation," Ramesh posted on X, formerly Twitter.

BBC 'urgently looking' into issues raised by Brand report

ritain's BBC yesterday said it was "urgently looking into the issues" raised by allegations of sexual assault made against the broadcaster's former employee, British comedian and actor Russell Brand. who denies the accusations.

Brand, 48, the former husband of US singer Katy Perry, worked on BBC radio programmes between 2006 and 2008.

He issued a denial on Saturday to unspecified "very serious criminal allegations" hours before the accusations of sexual assaults, including rape, were published online by the Sunday Times newspaper and later aired on Channel 4 television.

The Times and documentary show Dispatches reported that the alleged incidents had taken place between 2006 and 2013 and said one woman had made an allegation of rape, while another said Brand assaulted her when she was 16 and still at school.

Two of the accusers reported that the incidents occurred in Los Angeles, the paper said.

A BBC spokesperson said in a statement: "The documentary and associated reports contained serious allegations, spanning a number of years. Russell Brand worked on BBC radio programmes between 2006 and 2008 and we are urgently looking into the issues raised."

Women's charity Trevi, which helps women affected by violence and abuse, said it had ended its association with Brand, and Tavistock Wood, a talent agency, said in a statement it "has terminated all professional ties to Brand".

"Russell Brand categorically and vehemently denied the allegation made in 2020, but we now believe we were horribly misled by him," it said.

N Korea's Kim heads home after week-long visit to Russia

orth Korean leader Kim Jong-un was heading home by train yesterday, Russian news agencies reported, after a week-long visit to Russia that included talks with President Vladimir Putin on closer military and other co-operation.

A video published by Russia's state-run RIA news agency yesterday showed Kim walking along a red carpet to his train carriage in the Russian Far Eastern city of Artyom, and waving goodbye to the sounds of a military band.

Artyom is about 254km from Khasan station on Russia's border with North Korea.

The trip by the North Korean leader, who seldom leaves his country, signifies "a fresh heyday of friendship and solidarity and cooperation is being opened up in the history of the development of the relations between the DPRK and Russia," North Korean state news agency KCNA said, using the initials for the Democratic People's Republic of Korea.

Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov said Moscow wanted to develop "equal and fair cooperation" with North Korea despite sanctions imposed on Pyongyang by the UN

Security Council. "We have not declared sanctions against North Korea, the Security Council did that. So appeal to the Security Council, and we will develop equal and fair cooperation with the DPRK," Lavrov said in a state TV interview, excerpts of which were broadcast

The Kremlin earlier said it abides by UN sanctions, but that it has a right to develop neighbourly relations, including in relation to sensitive topics. The US and its allies worry about warming military ties between the two neighbours as Russia presses its invasion of Ukraine and North Korea, a reclusive communist state, proceeds with missile and nuclear development. South Korea and the US say military cooperation between North Korea and Russia would violate UN sanctions against Pyongyang and that the allies would ensure there was a price to pay. South Korean President Yoon Suk-yeol called such a military partnership "illegal and unjust", saying the international community would "unite more tightly" to cope with deepening ties between Moscow and Pyongyang, in written responses to the Associated Press vesterday.

Yoon will head to New York today for the UN General Assembly.

Russia has gone out of its way to publicise Kim's visit, dropping repeated hints about the prospect of

military co-operation with North Korea, a country formed in 1948 with the backing of the Soviet Union. On Saturday, Kim met Russian Defence Minister Sergei Shoigu, who showed the North Korean leader Russian nuclear-capable strategic bombers, hypersonic missiles and

Kim and Shoigu "exchanged their constructive opinions on the practical issues arising in further strengthening the strategic and tactical co-ordination, co-operation and mutual exchange between the armed forces of the two countries and in the fields of their national defence and security," KCNA said vesterday.

Moscow is discussing joint military exercises with North Korea, Shoigu told Russian media. He visited Pyongyang in July and toured a weapons exhibition with Kim, one of the most striking signs of deepening ties up to that point. During his trip to Russia, Kim

toured Russia's Pacific Sea Fleet, equipped with strategic nuclear submarines among other military vessels, KCNA said, quoting him as praising the fleet for its contribution to peace in the region.Oleg Kozhemyako, governor of Russia's far eastern Primorsky region, gave Kim a bulletproof vest and six drones produced in the region, RIA news agency said.



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The mystery of extraterrestrial life and earthlings

If the hugely popular 1982 film E.T. The Extra Terrestrial, caught the world's fancy, and the Men in Black science fiction comedy film series debuting in 1997 approached the topic in a lighter vein, any news about the possibility of finding extraterrestrial life continues to attract attention always. Two separate developments last week prove this.

The first incident in Mexico City, saw the alleged bodies of two "non-human beings" presented during a congressional hearing, generating a mixture of surprise, disbelief and ridicule on social media on Wednesday, as reported by AFP.

The purported mummified remains were exhibited on Tuesday - the first time the Mexican Congress has officially addressed the issue of possible extraterrestrial life.

The alleged corpses, which had a grayish colour and facial features similar to humans, were brought by Jaime Maussan, a controversial Mexican journalist and researcher who reported finding them in Peru in 2017.

"They are non-human beings. We don't want to call them extraterrestrials because we don't know," Maussan said during the session called by ruling party lawmaker Sergio Gutierrez, who defended the event as being in the "public interest."

Maussan cited carbon dating analysis by the National Autonomous University of Mexico that he said showed "these beings are around 1,000 years old."

During the hearing, Gutierrez said Maussan requested the session after a US congressional committee in July was told by a former intelligence official that humans were not alone in the universe and American authorities were covering up the evidence.

In June, the US space agency Nasa held its first public meeting on the issue, and urged a more rigorous scientific approach to clarify the origin of socalled unidentified phenomena (UAPs).

The second development was on Thursday when a Nasa panel recommended in a report that the US space agency increase its efforts to gather information on UAP, by the government -

and play a larger role in helping the Pentagon detect them, Reuters said. The panel, comprised experts in scientific fields ranging from physics to astrobiology.

"Nasa has a variety of existing and planned Earth- and spaceobserving assets, together with an extensive archive of historic and current data sets, which should be directly leveraged to understand UAP," the report said.

"Although Nasa's fleet of Earth-observing satellites typically lack the spatial resolution to detect relatively small objects such as UAP, their state-of-the-art sensors can be directly utilised to probe the state of the local earth, oceanic, and atmospheric conditions that are spatially and temporally coincident with UAPs initially detected via other methods. Thus, Nasa's assets can play a vital role by directly determining whether specific environmental factors are associated with certain reported UAP behaviours or occurrences," the report said.

The US government in the past few years has made several disclosures of information it has gathered regarding a subject that once was met by virtual official silence. The new report called UAPs "one of our planet's greatest mysteries."

"Despite numerous accounts and visuals, the absence of consistent, detailed, and curated observations means we do not presently have the body of data needed to make definitive, scientific conclusions about UAP," it added.

The US government issued a watershed report in 2021 compiled by the Office of the Director of National Intelligence in conjunction with a Navy-led task force encompassing numerous observations, mostly from military personnel of UAP.

The report included some UAP cases that previously came to light in the Pentagon's release of video from naval aviators showing enigmatic aircraft off the US East and West Coasts exhibiting speed and manoeuvrability exceeding known aviation technologies and lacking any visible means of propulsion or flight-control surfaces. The report said defence and intelligence analysts lacked sufficient data to determine the nature of some of the objects.

At London arms fair, global war fears good for business

s Russia's Vladimir Putin and North Korean leader Kim Jong-un met last week to discuss what analysts believe will be a deal for an exchange of weapons, the West's leading companies were descending on Europe's biggest arms show in London.

Since the last iteration of the biennial Defence and Security Equipment International (DSEI) in September 2021, Russia's invasion of Ukraine and dramatically increased tensions over Taiwan and North Korea have given a shot of adrenaline to arms manufacturers worldwide.

According to the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute, European defence spending rose 13% in 2022 alone, bringing total global spending to an all-time high of \$2,240bn.

Consultancy McKinsey reports that Russia saw its defence exports fall 21% over the first year following the Ukraine invasion, creating further openings for Western arms sales in the developing

Overall, it expects military spending to increase globally by an average of 4% a year through to 2028, led by Japan increasing its military budget by an unprecedented 14% a year.

"We are extremely busy," says Michael Elmore, head of sales at MTL Advanced, which specialises in processing and fabricating armoured steel at its factory near Sheffield.

Within days of Russia's invasion of Ukraine in February 2022, it was supplying basic body armour plating for Ukrainian combat troops.

Since then, demand has only increased, particularly for armoured vehicle components to be used by both Britain and other European states. The firm says finding suitably skilled labour is a mounting problem, prompting it to step up its apprenticeship programme over the last two years.

The need for greater armour is one of the more obvious lessons of fighting in Ukraine, analysts say. Others include the importance of being able to move quickly, minimise electronic emissions to avoid detection, and the mounting importance of high volumes of unmanned systems.

Estonian firm MILREM, a market leader for light unmanned ground vehicles, says some of its equipment has already been trialled in action in Ukraine for tasks such as route clearance, surveillance and casualty evacuation.

Already, battlefield experience has highlighted the importance of night operations and resistance to electronic jamming, CEO Kuldar Vaarsi said.

"Ukraine is a very interesting combination of First and Second World War technologies and very modern technology," said Vaarsi, also pointing to the development of "loitering munitions" and artificial intelligence analysis.

"Before the war in Ukraine, these were more theoretical concepts."

MILREM says it has struggled to secure sufficient financing in Europe, prompting it to turn to Middle Eastern investors in the United Arab Emirates to fund the next round of development and expansion - a move only approved by European Union regulators with the strict provision that data from MILREM's European military work would not be accessible by their non-European partners.

Such nervousness over information leaks is increasingly widespread - the United States and its allies are now engaged in a protracted worldwide effort to minimise loss of critical technology to Moscow and Beijing. Other worries include a lack of sufficient industrial capability to make basic weapons such as artillery shells as well as more expensive items such as drones and rockets.

Ukraine fighting continues to consume huge volumes of Western stocks. According to experts at the conference, the waiting time to order a US Javelin anti-tank missile is now in excess of three years. Britain's BAE Systems unveiled a new artillery shell at DSEI this week specifically designed to be cheaper and faster to manufacture.

Britain doubled its arms exports in 2022 to a record £8.5bn. British officials also hope the AUKUS agreement with the US to provide nuclear submarine technology to Australia will open the door to further deals.

DSEE is designed to build on that. But according to the organisers, this year has also seen a significant uptick in the presence of Asian, eastern and northern European manufacturers, many of them beneficiaries of Ukraine-related sales and rapidly shifting international partnerships.

South Korea's tech and defence industries have made particular inroads into Europe, viewed as an alternative to China to manufacture high-tech chips and striking an increasingly confident series of defence deals to conquer the European market.

The largest, a 2022 \$13.7bn deal to supply Poland with equipment including tanks, artillery pieces and jets, began delivering weapons within months.

Defence industry insiders say South Korean firms are also now shipping increased amounts of weaponry to Taiwan, although this has not been acknowledged publicly.

Ukraine is also striking its own deals with foreign suppliers. Ukraine and Sweden this month announced a deal to jointly produce 1000 CV-90 infantry fighting vehicles for the Ukrainian army. Multiple firms including Britain's BAE, Germany's Rheinmetall and Finland's Patria have all been reported to be talking with Ukraine to build factories there.

As one defence executive put it: "War is good for

Ukraine has used unmanned drones at sea on a scale few Western navies could currently hope to match. On other areas, such as unarmed ground vehicles particularly for major resupply, the technology is still believed a year or two away from being truly operational — and with different countries pursuing a variety of priorities.

"Germany will most likely field autonomous logistic convoy capabilities before combat vehicles," Rheinmetall Vice President for Business Development and Innovation Alain Tremblay said.

"The UK will probably be the first Nato country to formally integrate unmanned ground vehicles into their land forces. The US Marine Corps are also moving very rapidly?

Much depends on regulation. Rheinmetall and other firms say they already have the technology to push "trains" of multiple trucks across Europe with several vehicles following a single human driver. Getting permission to do that on ordinary roads would either require more testing or a major international crisis.

Such a crisis, however, is what many firms are quietly now preparing for.

Dominic Philpott, chief operating officer of Hanwha Phasor - a UK-based satellite relay firm now purchased by South Korean conglomerate Hanwha that serves both civilian and government clients - noted several shifts. Clients with sensitive projects no longer wanted microchips from China, he said, citing concerns over both security and future supply.

Those wanting satellite communications were also now requesting to access multiple different satellite systems at different levels in Earth orbit, giving them greater resistance to jamming or other deliberate action.

"That's all happened very quickly," he said. "Companies are looking for resilience." — Reuters

Investigators probe Brazil plane crash that killed 14

Investigators travelled yesterday to a remote town in the Brazilian Amazon to probe a plane crash that killed 14 people and left no survivors, as authorities brought the bodies to be identified.

The small turboprop plane was flying a group of Brazilian sport fishermen into the northern town of Barcelos Saturday when it crashed in stormy weather, apparently after starting its descent too late and skidding off the end of the runway, said officials in Amazonas

A team of five air force investigators flew from state capital Manaus to Barcelos to begin analysing the crash, which killed all 12 passengers and two crew aboard.

A second flight carried empty coffins to the town so the bodies could be brought back to Manaus to be identified, along with a second set of teams to transport them and assist in the investigation, officials said.

Military personnel could be seen at the Manaus airport using a forklift to load the dark wood coffins onto the air force plane early yesterday, an AFP photographer said.

"The Amazonas state government dispatched teams to help transport the victims of the accident from Barcelos, 399km from Manaus," state officials said in a statement.

"The teams comprise 10 people from the department of forensic investigation, emergency response and police."

Officials said the bodies were expected to arrive in Manaus around 6:00pm (2200 GMT) yesterday

Covered mostly in dense rainforest, Amazonas is a popular adventure travel destination. It receives hundreds of thousands of visitors each year, according to Amazonastur, the state tourism company.

Located on the Rio Negro tributary of the Amazon, Barcelos, a town of 19,000 people, is a popular jumping-off point for expeditions into the jungle.

The plane, a twin-engine turboprop made by Brazilian company Embraer, was operated by regional airline Manaus Aerotaxi.

Media reports showed the small white plane belly-down on a dirt track, its front end crumpled into

the dense vegetation to the side.
Officials said two aircraft approaching Barcelos around the same time had returned to Manaus

because of the weather.

Initial news reports had said US nationals were believed to be on the plane, but Amazonas officials said preliminary investigations indicated all the victims were Bra-

The plane's passengers were all men who were travelling to the Amazon from various parts of Brazil to go fishing, officials said.

Greek rescue team members killed in road accident

rescue team en route to the flood-ravaged city of Derna and three members of a Libyan family were killed in a road accident yesterday, the health minister for the Libyan eastern government said.

Fifteen of the Greek rescue team were injured, including seven in a critical condition, Othman Abduljaleel told a televised news conference. Two of the Libyan family were also critical, he said.

also critical, he said.

The Greek Armed Forces said a bus carrying medical personnel collided with a vehicle moving in the opposite direction, but it did not confirm the deaths.

"The causes and circumstances of the incident are being investigated in co-operation with the Libyan authorities, while an operation is underway to gather the personnel in Benghazi and repatriate them," it said in a statement.

The Greek foreign ministry was not immediately available to comment on Abduljaleel's statement regarding the killing of four Greeks.

Biden aide in hours of 'constructive' talks with China diplomat

Thite House national security adviser Jake Sullivan met with Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi in Malta for hours this weekend, Beijing and Washington said yesterday, as the world's two largest economies seek to stabilise troubled relations.

Both sides held "candid, substantive and constructive" talks during multiple meetings held September 16-17, according to separate statements from the White House and the Chinese foreign ministry published yesterday.

There were also "limited" early signs that severed military communications between the two sides may start to be restored, a senior Biden administration official said

Chinese officials did not comment on the prospect of military-to-military communication.

Sullivan's meeting with Wang was the latest in a series of high-level discussions between US and Chinese officials that could lay the groundwork for a meeting between US President Joe Biden and Chinese President Xi Jinping later this year.

They come amid a string of upheavals in the Chinese government's top ranks,

including the disappearance of defence minister Li Shangfu, and wobbles in the country's economy that have caused consternation in foreign capitals.

The Malta talks spanned about 12 hours over the two days, a senior Biden administration official told reporters. Sullivan last met Wang in Vienna in May.

China's foreign ministry said both sides agreed to maintain high-level exchanges and hold bilateral consultations on Asia-Pacific affairs, maritime affairs and foreign policy.

The United States told China it was ready to work together on counter-narcotics, artificial intelligence and climate change even as it expressed concerns over unspecified Chinese support for Russia and Beijing recently sending fighter jets across the sensitive median line of the Taiwan Strait, the US official

Wang cautioned the United States that the Taiwan issue is the "first insurmountable red line of Sino-US relations," according to the Chinese foreign ministry statement. China claims the self-ruled island as its own territory.

The US official said "there have been some small or limited indications" that Beijing is ready to re-open some cross-military communications used to de-escalate conflict between the two countries after those ties were cut following an Aug. 2022 visit by former US House of Representatives Speaker Nancy Pelosi to Taiwan that enraged China.

In its statement, the White House strongly suggested that more meetings are to come between the US and China, adding that both sides "committed to maintain this strategic channel of communication and to pursue additional high-level engagement and consultations in key areas ... in the coming months"

Biden this month expressed disappointment that Xi skipped a summit of Group of 20 leaders in India, but said he would "get to see him." The next likely opportunity for Biden to hold talks with Xi is an Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation summit in San Francisco in November, where US aides for months have hoped to stage such a meeting.

US Commerce Secretary Gina Raimondo, Secretary of State Antony Blinken, Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen and Biden climate envoy John Kerry have travelled to China this year to thaw relations and ensure continued communication between the two countries amid tensions that flared after the US military shot down a Chinese surveillance balloon that travelled over the United States.

Biden and Xi last met in 2022 on the sidelines of a G20 summit on Indonesia's resort island of Bali.

Italian PM calls for EU help: migrant surge

Taly's prime minister warned yesterday that the "future of Europe is at stake", after droves of migrants landed on the Mediterranean island of Lampedusa.

Thousands of migrants on vessels from the North African coast landed on Italy's southernmost island this week, sparking a crisis that has rekindled debate over the division of responsibility among the EU nations.

At a press conference with European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen during a visit to the island, Giorgia Meloni said the bloc needed to work together to face the challenges of uncontrolled migra-

It is "the future that Europe wants for itself that is at stake here, because the future of Europe depends on Europe's capacity to face major challenges," Meloni

said.

Between Monday and Wednesday, around 8,500 people — more than the island's entire local population — arrived in 199 boats, according to the UN migration agency.

"Irregular immigration is a European challenge that needs a European response," von der Leyen said, calling on other members of the bloc to take in some of the migrants.

The Italian Red Cross, which runs the overcrowded Lampedusa migration centre, said yesterday that 1,500 migrants remained there despite having a capacity for just 400.

Transfers of migrants to Sicily and the mainland have not kept up with the flow of new arrivals, although further transfers were expected to be made yesterday, the Red Cross said.

The officials were met on arrival at the airport by residents unhappy with the mass arrivals, threatening to block their motorcade.

"We are doing everything possible," Meloni had said in response. Large vessels operated by NGOs like the Geo Bar-

Large vessels operated by NGOs like the Geo Barents by Doctors Without Borders (MSF), which have rescued nearly 500 migrants in 11 operations, are headed for major Italian ports.

But dozens of small boats continue to make the perilous sea-crossing to Lampedusa, where the migrant management system has come to the brink of asphyxiation.

In July, von der Leyen — with Meloni's strong backing — struck an agreement with Tunisia aimed at curbing the flow of irregular migration from the North African country. More than 127,000 migrants have arrived on Italy's shores so far this year, almost double the same period last year.


Over 2,000 people have died this year crossing from North Africa to Italy and Malta, according to the UN migration agency. The EU is pushing to overhaul rules on how to handle the migrant flow.

In France, members of the far right say Paris should not allow any migrants from Lampedusa across the border from Italy.

US admits ousting Russia from Ukraine territory tall order

The United States' highest-ranking military officer said yesterday that while Ukraine's counteroffensive has not "failed," the country's broader goal of ousting Russian forces from its territory faces a "very high bar." General Mark Milley, the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, also defended US weapons assistance being sent to Kyiv, saying Washington is doing its best and cannot just boost Ukraine's battlefield power by sprinkling "magic dust."

counteroffensive by Ukraine was "slower than the planners had anticipated, it has been steady." "I know there's some commentary out there that somehow this offensive

has failed. It hasn't failed," Milley said, adding that Ukraine has "a lot of combat power remaining. The Ukrainians are not a spent force." However, when it comes to the likelihood of achieving more ambitious goals such as reaching the southern coast and recapturing the city of Mariupol, Milley said he didn't want to "make a prediction." He said that the overall strategy of liberating all Ukrainian territory from occupation and managing to "completely kick out all the Russians" is "going to be a very significant effort."

"It'll take a considerable length of time to militarily eject all 200,000 or plus Russian troops out of Russianoccupied Ukraine. That's a very high bar. It's going to take a long time to do it." Milley defended the rate at which

the US has been providing weapons and other aid to Ukraine since the full-scale Russian invasion began in February 2022. Despite criticism — including

from inside Ukraine — that the US government is dragging its feet, Milley said some \$40bn in weapons and \$100 billion in overall aid was "extraordinarily generous."

The speed of deliveries, however, is governed by logistics and "how fast they can absorb it. So, it's not just, sprinkle magic dust and the stuff

starts showing up."

Climate activists spray paint Berlin's Brandenburg Gate

limate activists sprayed orange and yellow paint on the columns of Berlin's landmark Brandenburg Gate yesterday to push demands for a stop to the use of fossil fuels by

"Members of the so-called 'Last Generation' sprayed the columns on the east side of the Brandenburg Gate with orange paint from fire extinguishers during the morning," Berlin police said on X.

It added that police officers noticed a hydraulic lift was being operated at the gate and they kept the protesters from scaling the landmark building. They arrested all 14 protesters at the site and launched an investigation into property damage. The Last Generation, a Germany-based group within the Europewide A22 network that includes Britain's Just Stop Oil, has made headlines in Germany with hundreds of road blocks by protesters who glued themselves to the tarmac.

Their action has triggered a lawenforcement crackdown by Germany's federal states.

The Last Generation posted pictures of the spray-painting on X.

"We will not stop our protest unless

"We will not stop our protest unless a pivot is initiated. We have to exit oil, natural gas and coal by 2030 at the latest," it said. Germany aims to reach net-zero emissions by 2045, but it missed annual

targets for the last two years.

Minister al-Sulaiti said Oatar's investments in developing the infrastructure projects and the transportation sector's support services came in implementation of the directives of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani, and resulted in the country having an integrated, connected, and sustainable transit system, positioning the country high on world map of transportation industry, and enabling it to host major events efficiently.

At the event, the minister also announced the launch of the Autonomous Vehicles Strategy, a plan over the coming five years to regulate the terms and conditions of using autonomous vehicles in Qatar to provide smart, and environmentally conscious transit systems.

The minister said MoT is currently working on studying the standards and specifications of EVs to approve the minimum technical specifications and safety standards, in addition to establishing a centre for inspecting EVs' specifications conformity and issuing approval certificates.

On maritime transportation, HE al-Sulaiti said the advanced infrastructure and technologies at Hamad Port contributed to transforming the port to a regional hub expanding transportation network with over 100 ports worldwide. The minister also highlighted the development works at Al Ruwais Port and Doha Port.

Al-Sulaiti highlighted the outcomes of the major efforts to develop the air transportation sector through establishing a modern system supported with modern services. He noted that during FIFA World Cup Oatar 2022, over 26,500 aircraft movements were recorded at both Hamad International Airport and Doha International Airport. He noted that the two S-band radar system and long-range L-band radar have started operations. The minister added that the meteorology field also saw great progress with weather information stations currently reaching 48.

Following the opening session the dignitaries visited the stalls of the accompanying exhibition. There were three panel discussions on the first day of the conference. The conference and exhibition concludes today.
