Israeli soldiers, some wearing face masks, shot in the air and ordered young men to surrender, at the start of what the army described as a "precise and targeted" operation at the facility.

About 1,000 male Palestinians, hands above their heads, were in the vast hospital courtyard, Israeli soldiers checking them for weapons or explosives.

Washington, the Red Cross and World Health Organisation urged utmost caution with civilian lives.

A source said that Israeli troops had withdrawn from the facility and redeployed around its outskirts. Israel said the raid was executed based on

"an operational necessity". A White House spokesman pushed back against Hamas claims that US President Joe

Biden was "wholly responsible" for the raid by Washington sharing its assessments that militants were using Al-Shifa complex. "We did not give an OK to their military operations around the hospital," National

Security Council spokesman John Kirby told reporters, adding that such decisions were for the Israeli military. Page 8

4.710 children, 3.160 women among 11,500 massacred

Security Council calls for 'humanitarian pauses'

The UN Security Council yesterday called for "extended humanitarian pauses" in the Gaza Strip, the first time it has broken its silence since the start of the bloody conflict between Israel and Hamas.

The resolution, prepared by Malta and adopted with 12 votes in favour, "calls for urgent and extended humanitarian pauses and corridors throughout the Gaza Strip for a sufficient number of days" to allow aid to reach civilians in the besieged territory. Three states abstained - the United States, Britain and Russia.



As part of these efforts, His Highness the Amir took part in the Joint Arab Islamic Extraordinary Summit in Riyadh on Saturday, and held earlier in-depth discussions in Abu Dhabi, Cairo and Riyadh focused on the developments in Gaza Strip and the occupied Palestinian territories, joint efforts to stop the Israeli aggression and ensure a continuous flow of humanitarian aid, and anything that would support security and stability in the region.

The Cabinet applauded the historic speech of His Highness the Amir at the Joint Arab Islamic Extraordinary Summit, which was comprehensive, sincere and clear in affirming Qatar's firm position in support of the steadfastness of the brotherly Palestinian people and their just cause, and in expressing

the feelings of the Arab and Islamic peoples demanding deterrent steps in the face of the Israeli war crimes, and not being satisfied with statements of condemnation and denunciation, as well as denouncing the inability of the international community and its failure to shoulder its legal and moral responsibilities, and the contradictory positions of some countries that claim to protect international law and the world order but do nothing while watching the scenes of indiscriminate killing of Palestinian civilians, including children or women.

The Cabinet reiterated Qatar's strong condemnation of the Israeli occupation bombardment of the headquarters of the Qatar Committee for the Reconstruction of Gaza (QCRG), in a gross violation of international law, and in a extension of the policy of targeting the human, especially since this committee has worked

through its projects to alleviate the suffering of the population in Gaza Strip who has been suffering from a stifling siege and continuous aggression for years, which has now reached its peak by the killing of thousands of innocent, defenceless people, and the destruction of homes, hospitals, schools, population centres and shelters for displaced persons, which requires urgent action by the international community to hold Israel accountable for the horrific crimes it commits and its serious violations of international law and international humanitarian

Fourth, the Cabinet approved a draft protocol amending some provisions of an air services agreement between the governments of Qatar and Jordan.

Britain's electronic travel scheme opens for Qataris

he UK's Electronic Travel Authorisation (ETA) scheme has officially opened for Qatari nationals, who need an ETA to travel to the UK, the British embassy announced yesterday in a statement. Qataris have been able to apply for their ETA since October 25 this year, with most using the mobile app, which allows for a simple and fast applica-

Last year, the UK welcomed almost 800,000 visitors from the Gulf, 45,000 of whom came from Qatar, with this set to increase over the next few years. British ambassador to Qatar, Jon Wilks, said: "I am delighted to announce the official opening of the Electronic Travel Authorisation scheme for Qatari nationals, who will be the first in the world to benefit from the scheme.

"This initiative not only simplifies the travel process for Qataris visiting the UK but also reflects the strength of our bilateral relationship. We look forward to welcoming more visitors from Qatar, further building the human bridge between our two coun-

Nationals of Bahrain, Kuwait, Oman, UAE, Saudi Arabia and Jordan will need an ETA if they're visiting the UK from February 22, 2024, and can apply for their ETA from February 1. ETAs are replacing Electronic Visa Waivers (EVW) which the majority of Gulf nationals currently apply for. An ETA is an improvement from the EVW, being a third of the price at £10 and allowing unlimited visits to the UK over two years, or until the holder's passport expires whichever is sooner.

The move to the ETA scheme means that the visa requirement will be removed for short stays to the UK for nationals from the Gulf and Jordan. When applying for an ETA, applicants need to provide biographic and biometric information, and answer questions on suitability and criminality, the statement explained. The application process ensures that those who pose a danger to the UK's security, such as criminals, are not allowed to travel here, the statement said. Once individuals have successfully applied, their ETA is digitally linked to their passport. While the standard processing time for an application is three working days, the majority of applications so far have been decided within hours.

VisitBritain CEO, Patricia Yates, said: "It's great to see the Electronic Travel Authorisation scheme pilot underway in Qatar, making travel to the UK easier, cheaper and more flexible for Qatari visitors. We look forward to the scheme rolling out to more Gulf nations from February 2024 which, combined with our strong airline connections, will further boost our competitive tourism offer and our welcome to visitors from the region.

To ensure the scheme is implemented smoothly, the UK government is working closely with global airline, maritime and rail carriers, who are crucial to the successful delivery of the scheme. In the future, the scheme will apply worldwide to those who do not currently need a visa to visit or transit through the UK or who do not hold a UK immigration status, including nationals from Europe and America. Other nationalities do not need to apply yet and timings for when the scheme opens for them will be confirmed in due course, the statement added.

Amir appoints ambassador to Cote d'Ivoire

His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani issued yesterday Amiri Decision No 92 of 2023 appointing Mubarak Hussein Mohamed al-Saeedan al-Marri as ambassador extraordinary and plenipotentiary to Cote d'Ivoire. The decision is effective starting from its date of issue, and is to be published in the official gazette. (QNA)

MoPH workshop trains school nurses on detecting visual impairment in students

The Ministry of Public Health, in collaboration with the Ministry of Education and Higher Education and the Primary Health Care Corp, recently conducted a three-day training workshop for over 120 nurses working in governmental, private, and community schools. The workshop focused on the theme "Protect Our Children from Visual Impairment

The workshop's main objective was to raise awareness about the common causes of visual impairments in school students, emphasising consequences that could occur in children such as visual defects, strabismus, and lazy eye. Nurses received comprehensive training on the correct methods for assessing students' vision and accurately completing screening forms.

The Blindness Prevention Pro-



gramme at MoPH aimed to screen low vision among the targeted students in Qatar (1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, and 9th) and to identify and refer cases of low vision and lazy eye. Lazy eye poses a significant risk to risky complications of visual impairment in children, as it results from a defect in the develop-

ment of the visual system in one eye and may negatively affect the child's academic performance and ability to

Regular vision examinations, adherence to ophthalmologists' instructions, and the use of corrective glasses are recommended to mitigate these risks. The Ministry of Public Health carries out surveys to discover cases of visual impairment among students, revealing that 10% of students suffered from abnormal visual acuity (less than 6/6) during the academic year 2022-2023 compared to 14% in 2021-2022. 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

NHRC inaugurates pavilion at Expo 2023 Doha

E the Chairperson of the National Human Rights Committee (NHRC), Maryam bint Abdullah al-Attiyah, inaugurated NHRC's pavilion at Expo 2023 Doha at Al Bidaa Park, in addition to the exhibitions "Human Rights in Islamic Culture" and "Human Rights and Football."

The pavilion aims to spread awareness of human rights in general, emphasise a better and more sustainable future, and raise awareness of the need to address global challenges such as climate change and environmental degradation.

The inauguration of the pavilion coincides with the activities of Qatari Human Rights Day and the 21st anniversary of the founding of the committee to emphasise the right to enjoy a safe, clean, healthy and sustainable environment.

In her speech on the occasion, HE al-Attiyah said the opening of the committees' pavilion alongside the two exhibitions, and the awareness and educational activities that the committee will organise within the work of Expo 2023 Doha, are in line with the objectives of the exhibition, which cannot be separated in any way from human rights.

Rather, it is at the core of human rights, HE al-Attiyah said noting Doha hosted the World Expo, which was organised for the first



time in the Middle East and North

Africa region.
She added hosting the event affirms that transforming the desert into green land has become possible, while it previously constituted a major challenge, and it contributes to finding solutions to global challenges related to water, energy and food shortages, and climate change.

She stressed the pavilion, which displays several publications, receives visitors and delegations of varying age groups, including children, women, people with disabilities, and the elderly. It will contribute to spreading the culture of human rights in society, work to consolidate sustainable development, and make young people aware of their rights and

duties towards future generations.

HE al-Attiyah pointed to the studies and publications related to the right to the environment that were prepared by the committees' experts, the most prominent of which is "Protecting the Right to a Healthy Environment in Qatar". This comes at a time when the world is exposed to many environmental threats and chal-



lenges that affect human rights. The committee also displays an Arabic calligraphy exhibition on "Human Rights in Islamic Culture", which consists of creative paintings of Arabic calligraphy that include Holy Qur'anic verses and noble Prophetic Hadiths that are consistent with modern human rights principles to reflect Islam's adoption of human rights principles over 1,400 years ago, to build bridges of co-operation and dialogue between different cultures and civilisations, to search for common human heritage and values and highlighting them, and to confront speeches of intolerance and hatred.

The exhibition has received praise in many European and Arab capitals. It was shown in Madrid,

Berlin, Athens and Paris. It was also organised twice at the UN headquarters in Geneva, at the European Union headquarters in Brussels, in Kuwait, and in Tunisia on the sidelines of the Arab Interior Ministries Council (AIMC).

The "Human Rights and Football" exhibition, which is being organised next to the NHRC pavilion, links human rights and humanitarian concepts, football, sustainability, and the rights of vulnerable groups.

The exhibitions' paintings reflect awareness messages to consolidate the concepts of the right to sport for all, the importance of achieving sustainable development goals, preserving the environment, and deepening friendship between people. (QNA)

1,000 healthcare providers to take part in QCS international gastrointestinal cancer congress

atar Cancer Society (QCS) will host the International Congress of Gastrointestinal Cancers 2023 from December 1-2 with the participation of over 1,000 healthcare providers academics and researchers from around the world.

QCS founder and chairman HE Sheikh Dr Khalid bin Jabr al-Thani and vice-chairman Dr Abdul-Azim Abdul-Wahab Hussein who shared details of the congress at a press conference yesterday, also cautioned that the incidence rate in gastrointestinal cancers in Qatar is likely to increase significantly by 2030.

Held under the patronage of HE the Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Mohamed bin Abdulrahman bin Jassim al-Thani, the conference will be held at Ritz-Carlton, Doha, with the participation of healthcare providers, researchers, academics and specialists in the field of gastrointestinal cancers worldwide.

Sheikh Khalid said: "The impor-

Sheikh Khalid said: "The importance of the International Congress of Gastrointestinal Cancers comes from the fact that this type of cancer rep-

resents a significant burden globally, both in terms of incidence and mortality. Gastrointestinal cancers account for one in four cancer cases and one in three cancer deaths globally.

"The Qatar National Cancer Registry at the Ministry of Public Health predicts an increase in the disease. The incidence rate in gastrointestinal cancers is projected to increase from roughly 18 per 100,000 right now to 34 per 100,000 by 2030" he added

per 100,000 by 2030," he added. Dr Hussein explained: "Gastrointestinal cancers encompass a wide range of malignancies, including cancers of the esophagus, stomach, liver, pancreas, gallbladder, bile ducts, small intestine, colon, among other organs. Yet, the burden they pose is matched by the opportunity they present - a chance to radically transform the lives of millions through medical breakthroughs, innovative research, and collaborative care."

He noted that the conference is a global platform that brings together an

elite group of specialists and experts in various fields related to gastrointestinal cancers from several countries, including the US, Austria, Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, the UAE, Bahrain, Oman, Lebanon, Jordan. Qatar is represented by the Ministry of Public Health, Hamad Medical Corporation and the Primary Health Care Corporation among other organisations.

Sheikh Khalid said that the conference will include two-panel discussions, the first concerned with raising community awareness about preventing gastrointestinal cancers.

"There will be a medical exhibition in co-operation with health authorities to provide free consultation services to the public. The second session is concerned with people living with cancer and their families to talk about the importance of food and other aspects during the treatment and recovery period by hosting an elite group of specialists in this field."

In 2020, colorectal cancers ranked second in cancer incidence in the country. Amongst the Qatari population registered in the Qatar National Cancer Registry, there were 635 cases diagnosed with colorectal cancer. Of these, 28% have died and 72% have survived

Qatar reiterates its support to set up Middle East WMD-free zone

atar has reiterated its support and readiness for full co-operation to establish a weapons of mass destruction (WMD)-free zone in the Middle East to rid the region of the spectre of wars and unrest, looking forward to a serious and fruitful work in the 4th session of the Conference on the Establishment of a Middle East Zone Free of Nuclear Weapons and Other Weapons of Mass Destruction.

This came in a statement delivered by Vice-Chairman of the National Committee for the Prohibition of Weapons (NCPW) Saad Abdul Hadi al-Marri at the conference in New York.

He said the project to establish a Middle East WMD-free zone is considered a unique challenge to rid the region of WMD of all three types, noting that it is an extremely complex task, given that the Middle East is still a hotbed of conflict and fraught with conflicts. Al-Marri stressed the importance of strengthening efforts to make the Middle East region free of WMD as it is an essential step for consolidating the non-proliferation system and achieving the goal of complete elimination of nuclear weapons and their facilities, stressing that the goal of establishing a region in the Middle East free of nuclear weapons is a common goal for the people of the region and for the

entire international community. He reiterated Qatar's firm



stance on justice of the Palestinian cause, the legitimate rights of the fraternal Palestinian people, and the establishment of their independent state on the 1967 borders with East Jerusalem as its capital.

He also reiterated Qatar's condemnation of the extremist Israeli statements regarding dropping a nuclear bomb on the besieged Gaza Strip, which is considered a dangerous incitement to a war crime and a disregard for international values and laws and is an admission that Israel possesses this destructive weapon, which contradicts with the Middle East WMD-free zone.

Al-Marri called for accelerating the establishment of the Middle East WMD-free zone in accordance with Security Council resolutions, and the relevant General Assembly resolutions.

He said that the Middle East region is still witnessing a state of instability, which makes it possible for the international community now to discover options for reviving the arms control process in the Middle East.

He added that Qatar supports all initiatives aimed at limiting the spread of nuclear weapons, and all other weapons of mass destruction, and the means of delivering them in the Middle East, without further delay. Al-Marri reiterated Qatar's affirmation that the path towards establishing a WMD-free zone passes through all countries of the region, whose facilities and activities must be subject to International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) safeguards as a criterion for verification. (QNA)

Algeria, Libya condemn Israeli bombing of Qatar committee HQ in Gaza

lgeria has strongly condemned the Israeli occupation's bombing of the headquarters of the Qatar Committee for the Reconstruction of Gaza, considering it a new violation and challenge to all provisions and norms of international law, and in conflict with the principles and values of humanity, QNA reported from Algiers.

Algeria also called for the pro-

tection of civilians and opposed targeting buildings of a civilian and humanitarian nature.

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Algeria said in a statement that this attack on a humanitarian facility concerned with rebuilding what was destroyed at the hands of the occupation, is conclusive evidence of the intention of the occupation, which knows only the language of intransigence and destruction, of every possibility for peace or dialogue to end its series of attacks. The statement expressed Algeria's full solidarity with Qatar and with the Palestinian brothers against the blatant aggression, and stressed that the responsibility to stop the aggression and in ensuring the protection of the Palestinian people falls entirely on the Security Council, which cannot shirk responsibility and the consequences of its inability to end the injustice, and which cannot be justified in any way against the Palestinian people. Libya has also condemned the Israeli occupation's bombing of the premises of the Oatari Committee for Reconstruction of Gaza, QNA added from Tripoli.

In a statement, Libya's Ministry of Foreign Affairs and International Collaboration said that targeting a leading institution that serves the Palestinians in the Gaza Strip through its development projects, indicates the intention of the Israeli occupation to destroy all institutions that work to alleviate the suffering of the Palestinians. It pointed out that this attack comes within the clear Israeli occupation policy of destroying all civilian and service facilities in Gaza.

In the statement, the Libyan Ministry of Foreign Affairs and International Collaboration renewed its call to the international community to protect civilians and civilian establishments in the Gaza Strip and the occupied Palestinian territories, in compliance with the provisions of international law and all international treaties related to protection of civilians. UN 'fears the worst' if war expands beyond Gaza

The UN humanitarian chief said yesterday he and Iran's top diplomat had discussed fears of what an expansion of the Gaza war might entail, and had agreed it "would not be good".

At a Geneva press briefing, United Nations humanitarian chief Martin Griffiths voiced deep concern Israel's war against Hamas could expand beyond Gaza, "into the north".

"If there is to be a war in the north with Hezbollah and Israel, then I fear the worst," Griffiths said. "We can easily imagine the worst because it will be a war that makes even Gaza with its awful horrors of daily struggle look like just a beginning."

He said he had discussed these concerns with Iranian Foreign

Minister Hossein Amir-Abdollahian, whose country supports Hamas and Hezbollah fighters in neighbouring Lebanon.

"Naturally, the worry about expansion was the topic I discussed mainly with him," Griffiths said.

"And of course, he agreed with me that such expansion would not be a good thing."

"It would be a regional war, which would affect so many parts," Griffiths said, pointing out that impacts have already been seen in Syria and Yemen. Israel has vowed to destroy Ha-

mas in response to its storming into the country in the first week of October.

The Hamas-run health ministry in Gaza says Israel's ensuing aerial bombardment and ground offensive has killed 11,320 people, mostly civilians, including thousands of children.

During yesterday's meeting, Amir-Abdollahian had called on the UN to do more to get desperately needed aid into war-bat-

"The amount of humanitarian aid sent to Gaza is very small and almost zero, and it is necessary for the United Nations to take immediate and serious action in this regard," he said, according to a readout from Iran's foreign ministry.

He called for "strong and urgent management by the UN to remove the blockage at the Rafah border crossing and get humanitarian aid into Gaza".

Griffiths insisted the UN had 460 aid trucks ready to go, calling for more border crossings to be opened and appealing for co-operation from all parties to ensure the aid can get in and be distributed throughout Gaza.

Erdogan labels Israel a 'terror state', slams its backers in West

Turkish President Tayyip Erdogan said yesterday Israel was a "terror state" committing war crimes and violating international law in Gaza. sharpening his repeated criticism of Israeli leaders and their backers in the West.

Speaking two days before a planned visit to Germany to meet Chancellor Olaf Scholz, Erdogan said Israel's military campaign against Palestinian group Hamas included "the most treacherous attacks in human history" with "unlimited" support from the West.

He called for Israeli leaders to be tried for war crimes at the International Court of Justice in The Hague, and repeated his view - and Turkiye's position – that Hamas is a political party that won past elections.

Ankara hosts some members of Hamas and supports a twostate solution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

"With the savagery of bombing the civilians it forced out of their homes while they are relocating, it is literally employing state terrorism," Erdogan said of Israel in parliament. "I am now saying, with my heart at ease, that Israel is a terror state.

"We will never shy away from voicing the truth that Hamas members protecting their lands, honour, and lives in the face of occupation policies are resistance fighters, just because some people are uncomfortable with it," he said.

Erdogan's trip to Germany will be his first to a Western nation since Israel began bombarding Gaza in response to Hamas' storming of Israel.

Germany has expressed strong solidarity with Israel, while urging a focus on limiting the impact of military operations on Gaza's civilian population. "The West, namely the US, is unfortunately still seeing this issue backwards," Erdogan said, adding he would call leaders of the countries who last month abstained from a vote at the UN General Assembly on an aid truce in Gaza.

Later yesterday, Erdogan spoke to Italian Prime Minister Georgia Meloni and told her that Ankara expected Rome's support in achieving a ceasefire

in Gaza, the Turkish presidency said. Meloni's office said she had called for rapid de-escalation in Gaza, adding Turkiye had a crucial role in preventing the spread of the conflict. Erdogan also called on Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to announce whether or not Israel had nuclear weapons, adding that Netanyahu would soon be a "goner" from his post.

GAZAN CANCER PATIENTS TO TURKIYE

Turkiye has sent 666 tonnes of humanitarian aid, medicine and medical equipment and a medical team to Egypt for Gazans so far. Ankara has said it is working with Egyptian and Israeli authorities as part of a co-ordination mechanism to bring cancer patients and some wounded civilians to Turkiye for treatment.

Speaking at Egypt's Al-Arish airport after meeting with his Egyptian counterpart visiting the hospitals housing wounded Gazans, Turkish Health Minister Fahrettin Koca said 26 patients and their 13 companions would be flown to Turkiye yesterday.

Koca said the 39 people were the first to be brought out to Egypt, and later to another country, since the fighting broke out, adding Ankara wanted to bring as many of the nearly 1,000 cancer patients from Gaza to Turkiye as possible.

Footage shared later by Turkish state media showed Koca and officials greeting the patients as they arrived on stretchers at Al-Arish airport before being put on a plane to Turkiye.

Displaced as a girl and again in old age, Palestinian grandmother relives the Nakba

riven from her home by war and sheltering in a tent with no certainty of ever being able to return, elderly Palestinian refugee Abla Awad felt like history was repeating itself in a tragic, never-ending loop.

Rubble lies at the site of a strike on a mosque, amid the ongoing conflict,

in Khan Yunis in the southern Gaza Strip, yesterday.

When she was a girl, she and her family were forced from their village, inside what is now Israel, to Gaza, during the mass displacement of Palestinians in 1948, when Israel was created, an event Palestinians call the "Nakba", or catastrophe.

Now, she has had to abandon her home all over again, fleeing Jabalia refugee camp in northern Gaza to escape Israeli air strikes, and taking shelter with generations of her family in a tent city in Khan Yunis, in the southern part of the enclave.

"I was five years old and I remember being displaced. Our families carried us along with their bags, and they took us to Gaza. I swear it's the same as what's hap-

pening today," said Awad, sitting outside her tent on a patch of sand.

"I was a little girl and now I am reliving the same thing... Ever since I can remember, since I was five years old. I have been witnessing wars," she said, as her grandchildren ran around her, playfully darting in and out of the tent.

The latest war, between Israel and Hamas, the group that runs

Gaza, began when Hamas fighters stormed southern Israel in the first week of October.

In response, Israel imposed a total siege on Gaza and launched an air, sea and ground assault that has killed more than 11,000 people, most of them women and children, according to Gazan officials. An estimated two thirds of the enclave's 2.3mn residents have been made homeless. "What did we do to them? Every

few years they bring a new Nakba on us," said Awad, breaking down "They displaced us from our

home and brought us to Gaza. Now where will they send us? To Sinai? Where will they take us? Let them throw us in the sea, then they can rest without Gaza and the poor Palestinian people," she said.

The Israeli military has said its current war is against Hamas, not civilians, and that displaced people will be allowed home when it is over, but this has given little reassurance to Palestinians still suffering the consequences of the

Most people in Gaza are registered as refugees, after they or their ancestors fled their homes in

"I can't take this anymore. I'm so tired of this life. We're so sick of this, oh God. Have mercy on us. Countries of the world, please look at us, have mercy on us. We're hungry. We've been displaced. How many more years?" said Awad, her voice full of despair.

Two killed after blaze sweeps through Nigeria displaced camp

At least two children died when fire swept through an informal camp for displaced people in northeast Nigeria, destroying more than a thousand tents, emergency officials said yesterday, AFP reported from Maiduguri. The fire broke out at the Muna Alamdari camp near the Borno State capital Maiduguri, where thousands of people have taken refuge in recent years fleeing from fighting in rural areas in the country's 14-year war against militants. National Emergency Management Agency official Mannir Gidado said the cause of the fire was still under investigation, though fires are quite frequent in the camps. Gidado said the fire was suspected to have started because of people cooking in their tents, near their clothes and their beds. Residents of the camp said four people had died in the blaze, though officials did not confirm that figure. Fighting in northeast Nigeria's conflict has ebbed in recent years with militants losing the territory and towns they once held. But they still strike at army patrols and rural farming communities. More than 40,000 people have been killed and 2mn more displaced since 2009. More than 100,000 people in recent years have taken refuge in Maiduguri, which is protected by the army and security trenches. Most of them came to live in official camps run by government authorities, who began closing the sites more a year ago, saying the countryside was now safe for them to return.

Zimbabwe minibus crash leaves 22 dead

Zimbabwean police said 22 people were killed and two injured late on Tuesday after a minibus collided with a truck on a highway, which links the country to the South African border, Reuters reported from Harare. The fatal accident, on the Bulawayo-Beitbridge road, involved the minibus, which was carrying 21 passengers, and the truck with one passenger on board, police said on X, formerly known as Twitter. It was not immediately clear if bystanders were also hurt or killed. The two people who were wounded were receiving treatment in the southwestern city of Bulawayo. Road accidents are frequent in Zimbabwe, where transport operators are often accused of overloading vehicles that are then driven on pothole-ridden roads.

Prosecutor summons Duterte over death threat

A Philippine prosecutor has summoned former president Rodrigo Duterte to respond to an accusation that he threatened to kill Filipino congresswoman France Castro. Duterte is alleged to have committed the crime of "grave threats" under the Cybercrime Prevention Act during an October 10 interview with local broadcaster SMNI. Duterte gave on-air advice to his daughter. Vice-President Sara Duterte, about how she could use intelligence and confidential funds allocated to her office and the education department, which she also heads. "Your first target with your intelligence fund is you, you France. 'Tell her, it is you communists who I want to kill," Duterte said.

Greta Thunberg denies public order offence

The Rwanda scheme has been the central plank of Sunak's immigration policy as he prepares to face an election next year, amid rising concern among some voters about the numbers of asylum seekers from

The ruling had taken on even greater political significance after Sunak on Monday sacked Interior Minister Suella Braverman, a popular figure on his party's right whose remit included dealing with immigration.

She launched a scathing attack on Sunak on Tuesday, saying he had broken promises on tackling immigration and betrayed the British people. After becoming prime minister in October last vear, Sunak vowed to "stop the boats", one of the five key pledges of his premiership.

This year more than 27,000 people have arrived on the southern English coast without permission, after a record 45,755 were detected

Meanwhile the cost of housing the 175,000 migrants waiting an asylum decision is costing £8mn (\$10mn) a day.

The Rwanda policy was originally drawn up by former prime minister Boris Johnson in an initial £140mn (\$180mn) deal.

Critics, ranging from opposition lawmakers as well as some Conservatives to church leaders and the United Nations refugee agency, had argued the policy was flawed, a waste of money, immoral and simply would not work.

"He was told over and over again that this would happen, that it wouldn't work, and it was just the latest Tory (Conservative) gimmick," Keir Starmer, leader of the main opposition Labour party, told parlia-

"But he bet everything on it. And now he's totally exposed. The central pillar of his government has crumbled beneath it."

Supreme Court president Robert Reed said the five judges involved agreed there were "substantial grounds for believing that asylum seekers sent to Rwanda would be at real risk of refoulement", meaning being sent back to their country of origin where they could be at risk of ill-treatment.

This would be in breach of a number of international treaties, including the ECHR, Reed said. But he left open the chance the scheme could be resurrected, saying "the changes needed to eliminate the risk of refoulement may be delivered in the future, but they have not been shown to be in place now".

Bangladesh elections to be held on Jan 7

Bangladesh will hold a parliamentary election liamentary election on January 7, the national poll body said yesterday, amid deadly protests by opposition parties demanding the resignation of the prime minister to make way for a caretaker government.

At least four people, including a policeman, were killed and hundreds injured in violent protests across the country in the past two weeks. The main opposition Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP), whose top leadership is either jailed or in exile, has already said it will boycott the next national election if Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina does not resign and allow in a caretaker government, two party leaders said early this month. Boycotting the elec-

tion will de-legitimise any win for her, they said. The BNP also boycotted the 2014 election too but participated in 2018.

The BNP and other opposition groupings have been calling on Hasina to step down and allow the election to be held under a neutral caretaker government - a demand her administration has rejected.

A senior BNP official yesterday said the "unilateral declaration" of the election schedule would further fuel tensions in the country. "We sincerely wish the government would shun this path of violence and coercion of the opposition so that an appropriate congenial environment is created... ensuring peaceful co-existence where people can freely exercise their democratic rights," Abdul Moyeen Khan, a former minister and member of the BNP's highest policy-making body, said.

ndia has sought advice from the Thai company that rescued children from a flooded cave in 2018 as it races to save 40 men trapped in a road tunnel, officials said yesterday.

Excavators have been removing debris since Sunday morning from the site in the Himalayan state of Uttarakhand to create an escape tunnel for the workers, all of whom are still alive.

Officials have "contacted the Thai company which rescued the children trapped in the cave", the

state government's department of public relations said in a statement.

The statement was referring to the dramatic operation to rescue 12 boys from a junior football team and their coach who were trapped for more than two weeks in the Tham Luang cave complex.

No other details were given.

Authorities have also asked for help from engineering experts in soil and rock mechanics at the Norwegian Geotechnical Institute as frantic efforts to free the men stretched into a fourth day.

Rescuers said on Wednesday they had sent medicine to the 40 men, trapped since the road tunnel they were building collapsed on Sunday.

"After consultation with doctors, medicine has been sent to the workers through pipes," police officer Prashant Kumar said from the site. "Contact is being maintained with the workers."

No details were given about the condition of the men or how many of them were sick.

Food and oxygen had also been sent to the trapped workers, he said. But as rescue teams removed the vast piles of rubble, more fell from the broken roof of the tunnel and two labourers working to remove the debris were injured overnight Tuesday, Kumar said.

The pace of drilling was "slow because of natural causes", but efforts were being made on a "war footing", Uttarakhand state police chief Ashok Kumar said in a statement yesterday.

The air force yesterday flew in a second drilling machine on a C-130 Hercules military plane to "speed up rescue work" after the first one broke down, he said.

Dozens of colleagues of the trapped workers protested outside the tunnel yesterday, blaming authorities for "slow rescue work", one of the protesters said.

Photos released by government rescue teams soon after the collapse showed huge piles of rubble blocking the wide tunnel, with twisted metal bars from its roof poking down in front of slabs of concrete.

Engineers are using heavy machinery to drive a steel pipe about 90cms wide through the debris, wide enough for the trapped men to squeeze through.

"We should keep our patience and trust," Ashok Kumar said. "I am sure that we will rescue all the labourers."

The 4.5km tunnel was being constructed between the towns of Silkvara and Dandalgaon to con-

nect Uttarkashi and Yamunotri. The tunnel is part of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's road project aimed at improving travel conditions in the country as well as areas bordering China. Experts have warned about the

impact of extensive construction in Uttarakhand, where large parts of the state are prone to landslides.

Construction worker Hemant Nayak said he had been in the tunnel early on Sunday when the roof caved in, but he had been on the right side of the collapse and escaped.

Small amounts of dirt had been falling into the tunnel but "everyone took it lightly", he said.

"Then suddenly a huge amount of debris came and the tunnel was

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Sunak gambles on Cameron to win over moderate voters

Few expected David Cameron's return to government, but his appointment is one that British Prime Minister Rishi Sunak hopes will signal to wavering supporters that the Conservatives are not lurching to

the right to win an election expected next year.

As well as firing his interior minister, Suella Braverman, after she published an unauthorised article criticising the police's handling of protests, Sunak has used a wider reshuffle to bring back the prime minister who campaigned to remain in the European Union in a referendum on membership he called in 2016.

It's a risky strategy — while welcomed by centrist lawmakers, the party's right senses the end of their increased dominance, built during the wars over EU membership, with one fearing the appointment amounted to a "Brexit surrender".

"He has appointed the man who led the 'remain' campaign and who has got huge problems over his association with Greensill," said a Conservative lawmaker on the right of the party, referring to Cameron's lobbying work for a now-collapsed supply chain finance firm.

"Is he spoiling for a fight with Conservatives?" The decision to fire Braverman removes from the cabinet one of the most prominent supporters of leaving the EU and means even more of

Sunak's top ministers supported remaining in the bloc in 2016. Out of the 29 cabinet roles, at least 16 backed remaining in the EU, compared with 10 who supported leaving. Sunak backed Brexit. Since he became Britain's third prime minister in as many months, Sunak

has tried to keep all wings of the party happy — reappointing Braverman, a favourite on the right, to her interior minister role just a week after she was fired in the final days of his predecessor Liz Truss's brief premiership. He has also tried to portray himself as a tough decision-maker and agent of change, ready to take on "establishment attitudes" on the environment and crime despite the Conservatives having been in power for more than

languishes around 20 points behind the opposition Labour Party before an election that must happen by January 2025. He has resisted the right's

Sunak's party still

calls to cut taxes before the next election, and his moves could mean Sunak creates a hostile and vocal lobby sitting behind him in parliament.

Several of them believe that the party membership. which did not elect Sunak as leader, want what they call traditional Conservative policies and felt Braverman was on-message with her tough approach to tackling

illegal immigration and crime.

But centrist lawmakers believe Cameron's appointment is inspired, saying he not only brings a wealth of government experience but is also seen as a moderate, one who can reassure traditional supporters largely in affluent southern England.

"It reassures mainstream Tories," one Conservative lawmaker said on condition of anonymity. Another pointed out that he won two elections, although in his first victory he depended on the Liberal Democrats to form a coalition government.

The appointment has done little to unite a party that has taken in-fighting to new levels over the years, particularly since Cameron announced he was holding the EU referendum.

Another Conservative lawmaker said the appointment of Cameron was about trying to differentiate Sunak's government from the economic chaos under Truss and the scandal-ridden premiership of her predecessor Boris

"It is a fascinating and smart move," he said.

But as he was talking, he asked a former cabinet minister to the right of the party for her thoughts. She replied: "I thought we were meant to be looking forward, not back."

Some party commentators said it showed Sunak did not believe he could recreate the circumstances in 2019, when Johnson persuaded many voters in traditional Labour-supporting regions in northern and central England to vote Conservative for the first time. In any election the Conservatives will take on not only Labour, but

also the centrist Liberal Democrats in southern England, where some lawmakers are fearful the Conservatives were once again being seen as "the nasty party".

"In many ways, David Cameron's modern conservatism is the very reason I'm here in parliament today," wrote Dehenna Davison, a former minister in the housing department who previously announced she was stepping down at the next election.

With few Conservatives believing they can win the next election, others

might follow her in preparing for a new job. The reshuffle also prompted a number of junior ministers to resign their posts in departments including health, transport and education. Ministers who lose their parliamentary seats at an election face restrictions on what jobs they can immediately take. Those without ministerial positions do not. – Reuters

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
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A victory lap for the transitory inflation team

s the world was recovering from the pandemic, inflation shot up, owing to widespread disruptions to global supply chains and sudden changes in patterns of demand. While the demand shifts might have posed a challenge to price stability even in the best of times, the breakdown in supply chains made matters worse. The market could not respond immediately to the new demand patterns, so prices increased.

Recall that we initially experienced a car shortage, simply because there was a shortage of computer chips - a problem that took 18 months to correct. The issue was not that we had forgotten how to produce cars, or lacked trained workers and factories. We were just missing a key component. Once it was supplied, automobile inventories expanded, and prices came down

- disinflation set in. (Disinflation is a decline in the rate of inflation, not necessarily of the actual price level, and is what matters for central banks monitoring changes in prices. In this and several other cases, prices actually came down.)

Housing provides another example of this temporary, self-correcting phenomenon. Since population size is a major determinant of demand, the

loss of one million Americans under Donald Trump's pandemic mismanagement ought to have lowered housing prices at the aggregate level. But the pandemic also induced people to look for greener pastures. Major cities like New York came to seem less attractive than places like Southampton and the Hudson Vallev.

Increasing the supply of housing in such places is not easy in the short term, so prices duly rose. But owing to wellknown asymmetries in how prices adjust to changing market conditions, they did not fall commensurately in the cities. As a result, housing-price indices (which capture the average) went up. Now, as the effects of the pandemic have waned, prices (as measured by these indices) have drifted down slowly, reflecting the fact that most leases last for at least a year.

What role did the US Federal Reserve play in all this? Given that its interest-rate hikes did not help resolve the chip shortages, it cannot take any credit for the disinflation in car prices. Worse, the rate hikes probably slowed the disinflation in housing prices. Not only do significantly higher rates inhibit construction; they also make mortgages more expensive, thus forcing more people to rent instead of buy. And if there are more people in the market for rentals, rental prices - a core

component in the consumer price index - will increase.

The pandemic-induced inflation was exacerbated further by Russia's invasion of Ukraine, which caused a spike in energy and food prices. But, again, it was clear that prices could not continue to rise at such a rate, and many of us predicted that there would be disinflation - or even deflation (a decline in prices) in the case of oil.

We were right. Inflation has indeed fallen dramatically in the United States and Europe. Even if it has not reached central bankers' 2% target, it is lower than most expected (3.7% in the US, 2.9% in the eurozone, 3% in Germany, and 3.5% in Spain). Moreover, one must remember that the 2% target was pulled out of thin air. There is no evidence that countries with 2% inflation do better than those with 3% inflation; what matters is that inflation is under control. That is clearly the case today.

Of course, central bankers will pat themselves on the back. But they had little role in the recent disinflation. Raising interest rates did not address the problem we faced: supply-side and demandshift inflation. If anything, disinflation has happened despite central banks' actions, not because of them.

Markets largely understood this all along. That is why inflationary expectations remained tame. While some central-bank economists claim that this was

due to their own forceful response, the data tell a different story. Inflation expectations were muted from early on, because markets understood that the supply-side disruptions were temporary. Only after central bankers repeated over and over their fears that inflation and inflationary expectations were setting in, and that this would necessitate a long slog entailing high interest rates and unemployment, did inflationary expectations rise. (But, even then, they barely budged, reaching 2.67% for the average of the next five years in April 2021, before falling back to 2.3% a year later

Before the latest conflict in the Middle East - which again raises the spectre of higher oil prices - it was clear that a "victory" over inflation had been achieved without the large increase in unemployment that inflation hawks insisted would be necessary. Once again, the standard macroeconomic relationship between inflation and unemployment - expressed in the Phillips curve - was not borne out.

That "theory" has been an unreliable guide over much of the past quarter-century, and so it was again this time. Macroeconomic modelling may work well when relative prices are constant and major changes in the economy revolve around aggregate demand, but not when there are large sectoral changes and concomitant changes in relative


When the post-pandemic inflation started more than two years ago, economists quickly divided into two camps: those who blamed excessive aggregate demand, which they attributed to large recovery packages; and those who argued that the disturbances were transitory and self-correcting. At the time, it was unclear how the pandemic would unfold. Confronted with a novel economic shock, no one could confidently predict just how long it would take for disinflationary forces to appear. Similarly, few anticipated markets' lack of resilience, or how much temporary monopoly power supply-side disruptions would confer on select

But over the ensuing two years, careful studies of the timing of price increases and the magnitude of aggregate-demand shifts relative to aggregate supply largely discredited the inflation hawks' aggregate demand "story." It simply did not account for what had happened. Whatever credibility that story had left, it has now been further eroded by disinflation.

Fortunately for the economy, team transitory was right. Let us hope the economics profession absorbs the right lessons.

Heat projected to kill nearly five times more people by 2050

Nearly five times more people will likely die due to extreme heat in the coming decades, an international team of experts said vesterday, warning that without action on climate change the "health of humanity is at grave risk". Lethal heat was just one of the many ways the world's still-increasing use of fossil fuels threatens human health, according to The Lancet Countdown, a major annual assessment carried out by leading researchers and institutions. More common droughts will put millions at risk of starving, mosquitoes spreading farther than ever before will take infectious diseases with them, and health systems will struggle to cope with the burden, the researchers warned. The dire assessment comes during what is expected to be the hottest year in human history - just last week. Europe's climate monitor declared that last month

It also comes ahead of the COP28 climate talks in Dubai later this month, which will for the first time host a "health day" on December 3 as experts try to shine a light on global warming's impact on health

Despite growing calls for global action, energy-related carbon emissions hit new highs last year, the Lancet Countdown report said, singling out still-massive government subsidies and private bank investments into planet-heating fossil

Last year people worldwide were exposed to an average of 86 days of life-threatening temperatures, according to the Lancet Countdown study. Around 60% of those days were made more than twice as likely due to climate change, it

The number of people over 65 who died from heat rose by 85% from 1991-2000 to 2013-2022, it added.

"However these impacts that we are seeing today could be just an early symptom of a very dangerous future," Lancet Countdown's executive director Marina Romanello said.

Under a scenario in which the world warms by 2 degrees Celsius by the end of the century – it is currently on track for 2.7C — annual heat-related deaths were projected to increase 370% by 2050. That marks a 4.7-fold increase. Around 520mn more people will experience moderate or severe food insecurity by mid-century, according to the projections.

And mosquito-borne infectious diseases will continue to spread into new areas. The transmission of dengue would increase by 36% under a 2C warming scenario, according to the study. Meanwhile, more than a quarter of cities surveyed by the researchers said they were worried that climate change would overwhelm their capacity to cope. "We're facing a crisis on top of a crisis," said Lancet Countdown's Georgiana Gordon-Strachan, whose homeland Jamaica is currently in the middle of a dengue outbreak.

"People living in poorer countries, who are often least responsible for greenhouse gas emissions, are bearing the brunt of the health impacts," she said. World Health Organisation chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus told an online conference launching the Lancet Countdown report that limiting warming to the Paris agreement target of 1.5C is a "public health imperative".

"The world is moving in the wrong direction, unable to curb its addiction to fossil fuels and leaving vulnerable communities behind in the much-needed energy transition," Tedros said. On Tuesday, the UN warned that countries' current pledges will cut global

carbon emissions by just 2% by 2030 from 2019 levels - far short of the 43% drop needed to limit warming to 1.5C. Romanello cautioned that if more progress is not made on emissions, then

"the growing emphasis on health within climate change negotiations risks being iust empty words". However there are "glimmers of hope",

she added. The number of global deaths linked to air pollution from fossil fuels has fallen 16% since 2005, mostly thanks to efforts

to reduce the impact of coal burning, the

Global investment in green energy rose by 15% to \$1.6tn last year, compared to \$1tn for fossil fuels.

And if people changed to healthier, lower-carbon diets it would prevent up to 12mn deaths a year, at the same reducing emissions from dairy and red meat production by 57%, the report said.

France releases policeman behind killing of teen that sparked riots

was the warmest October on record

French authorities yesterday released from custody a police officer who shot dead a teenager during traffic controls this year in a killing that sparked over a week of nationwide rioting, prosecutors said.

The officer fatally wounded Nahel M., 17, during a traffic stop in the Paris suburb of Nanterre on June 27, with massive police deployments unable to contain often violent protests on successive nights that caused significant damage to businesses and property.

The 38-year-old officer, identified only as Florian M., has already been charged with murder. While he is no longer in jail ahead of trial, he is under judicial supervision which means restrictions are still placed on his

movements. Investigating magistrates agreed to the latest request by the officer's lawyer for a conditional release, but said he is banned from speaking to witnesses or plaintiffs, going near the scene of the shooting and from carrying a weapon, the office of the Nanterre prosecutor told AFP. Following new questioning of the officer last Thursday, the investigating magistrates ruled that "the legal criteria for the pretrial detention of the police officer incarcerated since June 29, 2023 no longer appear to be met, at this stage of the investigation." France deployed 45,000 officers backed by light armoured vehicles during the protests, while special police units and other security forces fanned out acr the country to quell violence. Nahel was killed as he pulled away from police who were trying to stop him for a traffic infraction. A video, authenticated by AFP, showed two police officers standing by the side of the stationary car, with one pointing a weapon at the driver.

A voice is heard saying: "You are going to get a bullet in the head." The police officer then appears to fire as the car abruptly drives off. Clashes first erupted as the video emerged, contradicting police accounts that the teenager was

driving at the officer. The officer's lawyer, Laurent-Franck Lienard, said his client had apologised as he was taken into custody.

The day after the shooting Nahel's mother, Mounia, told France 5 television: "I don't blame the police, I blame one person: the one who took the life of my son." She said the officer "saw an Arab face, a little kid, and wanted to take his life".

A memorial march for Nahel, led by Mounia, ended with riot police firing tear gas as several cars were set alight in the western Paris suburb of Nanterre, where the teenager lived and died.

France issues arrest warrant for Assad

rance has issued an international arrest war Syrian President Bashar al-Assad accused of complicity in crimes against humanity and war crimes over chemical attacks in 2013, plaintiffs in the case said yesterday.

In one of the more than decade-long conflict's many horrors. as attacks saw more than 1,400 people suffocate to death near Damascus in August 2013.

The organisations that filed a legal complaint hailed the move, saying it was the first time a sitting head of state had become the subject of an arrest warrant in another country for war crimes and crimes against humanity.

Three other international warrants were also issued for the arrests of Assad's brother Maher, the de-facto chief of the Fourth Division, Syrian army's elite military unit, and two generals. The Paris court's unit concerned with crimes against humanity has been investigating the chemical attacks since 2021.

France can prosecute alleged war crimes and crimes against humanity committed anywhere in the world under the principle of universal jurisdiction.

A judicial source, who asked not to be named, confirmed the issuing of the four warrants by investigating magistrates of the Paris court's crimes against humanity section. The probe followed a complaint filed by the Syrian Centre for Media and Freedom of Expression (SCM) NGO, lawyers' association Open

Society Justice Initiative (OSII) and the Syrian Archive, an organisation documenting human rights violations in Syria.

"It's a huge development," SCM president Mazen Darwish said of the warrant for Assad's

"An independent jurisdiction is recognising that the chemical attack couldn't have happened without the knowledge of the Syrian president, that he has responsibility and should be held

accountable," he told AFP. The case against Assad and the others was backed by first-hand witness accounts and deep analysis of the Syrian military chain of command, Darwish said.

"This is a historic moment - with this case, France has an opportunity to establish the principle that there is no immunity for the most serious international crimes, even at the highest level," Steve Kostas of the Open Society Justice Initiative was quoted as saying in a statement. According to a source close to the investigation, the arrest warrants were the culmination of "painstaking work"

by investigators from France's specialised OCLCH unit tracking international crimes.

The goal was to "go as far up the chain of command as possible," the source said.

"If you stop at the helicopter pilot who dropped the bomb, he will be able to say 'I only carried out orders? The further back you go, the greater the responsibility."

Activists in 2013 posted amateur videos on YouTube said to show the effects of the attack, including footage of dozens of corpses, many of them children. stretched out on the ground.

Other images showed unconscious children, people foaming at the mouth and doctors apparently giving them oxygen to help them breathe.

The scenes provoked revulsion and condemnation around the globe. A United Nations report later said there was clear evidence of sarin gas use.

Syria agreed in 2013 to join the Organisation for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons (OPCW) global watchdog and give up all chemical weapons.

The OPCW has since blamed Damascus for a series of chemical attacks during the civil war.

The Syrian government has denied the allegations, which have also sparked legal complaints in Germany and other

European countries. Syria's civil war broke out in 2011 after Assad's repression of peaceful demonstrations escalated into a deadly conflict that pulled in foreign powers and global iihadists.

The war has killed more than half a million people and displaced half of the country's prewar population.

Biden, Xi vow to reduce tensions

'S President Joe Biden and Chinese President Xi Jinping shook hands yesterday and pledged to reduce tensions as they met for the first time in a year at a high-stakes summit in California.

A smiling Biden greeted Xi after the Chinese leader stepped out of a black limousine at the scenic Filoli country estate in the California foothills near San Francisco, before the two leaders shook hands on the front steps.

The two leaders then headed inside for painstakingly choreographed, closed-door talks on issues including Taiwan, sanctions and trade that have roiled relations between the world's largest economies.

Biden opened his remarks by saying that tensions should "not veer into conflict."

Xi responded by saying that "turning their back on each other is not an option" for the super-

Biden was to give a solo press conference to discuss the summit, which was being held on the sidelines of the APEC summit in San Francisco, the White House said.

Protesters lined part of the route of Biden's motorcade from San Francisco, many with pro-Xi signs and red and yellow Chinese flags hung up on security fences.

US officials have played down the chance of major breakthroughs although an agreement on restoring a hotline between the Chinese and US militaries on the cards, along with co-operation on stopping supplies of the drug fentanyl.

But the main goal of the talks – which are taking place at the setting for the famed 1980s US soap opera *Dynasty — is to restore predictability to the relationship, US

officials say. The last time Biden and Xi met in person was in Bali in November 2022, and relations nosedived after the United States shot down an alleged Chinese spy balloon in February this year.

The talks, which come after months of delicate diplomatic negotiations, come against the backdrop of a long struggle for global primacy between the United States and an increasingly assertive China.

One of the most sensitive issues is Taiwan, the self-ruling democracy over which Beijing claims sovereignty and which it has not ruled out seizing by force.

Biden was expected to tell Xi that the United States will stick to its "One China" policy that emphasises it does not support Taiwanese independence, but that it will continue to give Taiwan military aid.

"We do not want to see the tensions across the Taiwan Strait evolve into any kind of conflict", White House National Security Council spokesman John Kirby told reporters hours before the meeting. Biden was also expected to "raise concerns over human rights in China" including the repression of the Uyghur Muslim minority, added Kirby.

The 80-year-old Biden held out an olive branch to Xi, 70, on the eve of the talks, insisting that the United States was "not trying to decouple from China" and wanted to improve the relationship.

But Biden could not resist adding at a fundraising dinner that under communist leader Xi China faced "real problems," while Biden claimed to be "reestablishing American leadership in the world."

China responded with a foreign ministry spokeswoman pointing out all countries had problems, including the United States, while sticking to positive talking points on the summit.

Russia admits Ukrainian troops on occupied Dnipro river bank

Russia said yesterday for the first time that some Ukrainian troops had established positions on the Moscow-held side of the Dnipro river, the vast waterway that splits the frontline in southern Ukraine.

A sustained Ukrainian breakthrough across the river would mark a significant tactical success for Kyiv, whose wider counteroffensive has so far failed to turn the tide of the 21-month war.

"Small groups" of Ukrainian soldiers were stretched along the eastern bank of the Dnipro river, and had been "blocked" in the tiny village of Krynky, the Moscow-installed head of Ukraine's Kherson region, Vladimir Saldo, said in a post on Telegram.

But he insisted they were facing a "fiery hell" from Russian artillery, rockets and drones, and were suffering heavy losses.

Greenhouse gas concentrations hit record high in 2022

Greenhouse gas concentrations in the atmosphere hit new record highs in 2022, with no end in sight to the rising trend. the United Nations warned yesterday. The UN's World Meteorological Organisation said levels of the three main greenhouse gases — the climate-warming carbon dioxide, methane and nitrous oxide - all broke records last year. Such levels of heat-trapping gases will mean further temperature increases, more extreme weather and higher sea levels, the WMO said in its 19th annual Greenhouse Gas Bulletin. "Despite decades of warnings from the scientific community, thousands of

pages of reports and dozens of climate conferences, we are still heading in the wrong direction," said WMO chief Petteri Taalas

The bulletin comes ahead of the November 30-December 12 COP28 UN climate summit in Dubai.

The 2015 Paris Agreement saw countries agree to cap global warming at "well below" two degrees Celsius above average levels measured between 1850 and 1900 - and 1.5C if possible. The global mean temperature in 2022

was 1.15C above the 1850-1900 average and Taalas said it was all but certain that 2023 would be the warmest year on record.

"The current level of greenhouse gas concentrations puts us on the pathway of an increase in temperatures well above the Paris Agreement targets by the end of this century," said Taalas.

"This will be accompanied by more extreme weather, including intense heat and rainfall, ice melt, sea level rise and ocean heat and acidification.

"The socioeconomic and environmental costs will soar. We must reduce the consumption of fossil fuels as a matter of In 2022, carbon dioxide concentrations were at 418 parts per million, methane at 1,923 parts per billion and nitrous oxide at 336 parts per billion.

These values constitute, respectively, 150%, 264% and 124% of the pre-industrial (before 1750) levels.

Of the three major greenhouses gases, carbon dioxide (CO2) accounts for about 64 percent of the warming effect on the climate. Global averaged concentrations of CO2 in 2022 were, for the first time, 50 percent above those of the pre-industrial era, and "continued to grow in 2023", said

"Given the long life of CO2, the temperature level already observed will persist for several decades even if emissions are rapidly reduced to net zero," the WMO warned, with Taalas adding: "There is no magic wand to remove the excess carbon dioxide from the atmosphere".

Atmospheric methane is the second largest contributor to climate change, accounting for around 16 percent of the warming effect.

Methane remains in the atmosphere for only about 10 years, but has a much more powerful warming impact than CO2. "We don't fully understand why methane concentrations are steadily growing," said Taalas.

For nitrous oxide - accounting for around seven percent of the warming effect - the increase last year "was higher than that observed any time before in our modern time record", the WMO said. Around 80% of greenhouse gas emissions come from G20 countries. Although the scientific community has a broad understanding of climate change and its implications, there are still some uncertainties about the carbon cycle - and the fluxes in the ocean, the land biosphere and the permafrost areas

The bulletin called for greater information on certain topics.

These included feedback loops in the climate system – for example, increased carbon emissions from soils or decreased carbon uptake by oceans due to climate change. The WMO is also concerned about so-called tipping points, where a certain level of change leads to a selfaccelerating and potentially irreversible cascade of changes.

One could be how parts of the Amazon rainforest, long a carbon sink, has now become a source of carbon emissions due to deforestation.

The organisation said more information is also needed on non-CO2 greenhouse

Taalas said there was a risk that the wars in Ukraine and Gaza were overshadowing climate change, which "is still the biggest challenge for the welfare of mankind this century"
