He was speaking on the sidelines





The official noted that the first batch of students has started their academic journey with UDST and others will follow soon. "We have processed (the papers) to bring 20 more in the coming days. The remaining will be processed once all the documentation and other formalities are completed. We are preparing the logistics for them to come here," he continued.

According to Alhathal, currently EAA is focusing more on the national universities to admit the students from Gaza. He said: "We focus on UDST and Qatar University to admit most of the students. Medical students will be admitted at Qatar University while engineering, IT and other technical programme students will be given admission in UDST. We are also in discussion with Qatar Foundation universities (to know) if some of the students can be admitted."

The Al Fakhoora director highlighted that the programme aims to provide several support services also to the students.

"We are providing psycho-social support, trauma support, facilitate education at some of the undamaged facilities in Gaza besides the opportunity for the students to study in universities as well as in schools outside Palestine. We are focusing on well qualified students based on their academic strength, GPA and merit. We hope that with our support, these students will be able to complete their education and rebuild Gaza and Palestine for better."

## Admission process for various military services to open today

The Ministry of Defence, in co-ordination with all military authorities in Qatar, announced the start of the work of the Unified Permanent Committee for the Selection of Candidates for Military Officers, under the followup and supervision of the head of the committee, HE the Chief of Staff of Qatar Armed Forces Staff Lieutenant-General (Pilot) Salem bin Hamad bin Aqeel al-Nabit.

HE the Chief of Staff said that admission will be open for those wishing to join the various military authorities in the country starting from Jan 18, for high school graduates for the current year only (2023/2024).

ered to join one of the military authorities in Qatar, he noted.

He explained that unifying the process of registration is a step aimed at unifying efforts and reducing the burden on applicants under one umbrella that includes the Ministry of Defence, the Ministry of Interior, Qatar State Security, Internal Security Force (Lekhwiya), and the Amiri Guard.

The committee was formed of qualified and experienced representatives of these authorities to select the most suitable applicants according to the needs of each authority and to the conditions and standards that are published via the committee's website.

For his part, the head of the joint committee, Brigadier General Nasser al-Jaber said that the committee is keen to ensure equality and equal opportunities and choose the appropriate applicants who meet the conditions and standards of the military authorities.

He pointed out that the committee aims at fulfilling the Qatar National Vision 2030 and in accordance with the words of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani: "Oatar deserves the best from its children".

necessary measures to ratify the following: 1- Memorandum of understanding (MoU) regarding establishing a mechanism for bilateral consultations between the governments of Qatar and South Africa.

2- An MoU on mutual recognition of maritime qualification certificates for seafarers between the

governments of Qatar and Georgia. Fifth - Approval of a draft MoU between the interior ministries of Qatar and Egypt for co-operation in combating crime. (QNA)

The Ministry of Municipality launched a project to develop protected farming and climate-smart agriculture, in cooperation with the Korea Trade-Investment Promotion Agency (KOTRA), the Hyundai Institute, and the Plant Farm com-

The project aims to better understand agriculture in Qatar, come up with realistic recommendations, and identify the most appropriate technologies to develop and enhance its agricultural and food production capabilities in a manner that is sustainable, natural resource-efficient, adaptive to climate change, and limiting negative impacts on the environment.

In this regard, Director of the Food Security Department Dr Masoud Jarallah al-Marri said that this project comes within the framework of co-operation and the memorandum of understanding on agriculture and food security signed by Qatar and South Korea end of last year, aiming to determine the expected climate change effects that could impact food production in Qatar, propose the necessary means and measures to mitigate their repercussions,

such as by increasing production efficiency and the use of modern technologies and practices, and to create varieties that are resistant to drought, high temperatures, and

high humidity levels. The project will South Korea's successes that are relevant and applicable in Qatar. Dr al-Marri expressed his hope that this project will meet its goals and strengthen Qatar-South Korea ties through knowledge and expertise exchange, praising Qatarbased research institutions and farms' contributions to implement this project.

The Director of the Food Security Department at the Ministry of Municipality said that KOTRA helps countries identify their agricultural challenges and offers Korean technologies and financial projects to deal with those challenges. Dr al-Marri said that discussions will be held in the context of this project with farmers, companies, and stakeholders in order to overcome agricultural challenges and advance food production to reach a self-sufficiency level, in light of state aspirations, in addition to enhancing the responsible

use of water and energy resources

and to lengthen the farming season to as long as possible.

He said that the ministry's new food security strategy 2024-2030, to be finalised and approved soon. will work on converting open-air agricultural activities to ones in order to reduce evaporation rates and water wastage, as well as to avoid soil-related issues.

He added that this was proven to be Qatar's ideal solution given its environment and climate conditions, whereby It increases productivity, reduces water use, lengthens the farming season, reduces pests, provides ease of con-

trol, and uses fertilizers efficiently. Dr al-Marri said that most types of modern international agricultural practices are employed in Qatar, praising the ministry's support for the private sector by providing it with information and selling, seeds and fertiliser, with greenhouses at times, in addition to facilitating administrative and financial matters.

He also praised the private sector for adopting the latest technologies and best practices, advancing the agricultural sector and working towards the country's food security. (QNA)

Two Qatar Armed Forces aircraft carrying 61 tonnes of aid arrived in the Egyptian city of Al Arish. The aid includes medicines provided by Qatar and France, along with food items provided by Qatar Charity. It will be transferred to Gaza. So far Qatar has sent 63 aircraft with 1,958 tonnes of aid. The provision of this aid comes following the successful Qatari-led mediation in co-operation with France in reaching an agreement between Israel and Hamas to get medicines and humanitarian aid shipment to the Palestinian brothers in Gaza Strip, particularly in the most affected areas, in exchange for delivering medicines to those who are trapped in the Strip. It also comes within the framework of Qatar's unwavering support for the brotherly Palestinian people, during the current difficult humanitarian conditions. (QNA)




The initiative is part of the efforts to enhance traffic awareness among school bus drivers.

# UN agency chief expresses concern over Gaza residents' post-war future

The head of the UN agency for Palestinian refugees, Philippe Lazzarini, warned yesterday of the bleak future facing Gazans after the war between Hamas and Israel ends.

Following his fourth visit to the Palestinian territory since the war erupted in the first week of October, the UNRWA chief said many residents are no longer able to see "the future in the Gaza Strip".

"You have hundreds of thousands of people living now in the street, living in these plastic makeshift (tents), sleeping on the concrete," Lazzarini told journalists in Jerusalem.

The majority of Gaza's 2.4mn residents have been forced from their homes, while Lazzarini said more than 60% of buildings are estimated to be damaged. The most extensive Israeli bombardment has hit the north, where AFP journalists have witnessed scores of residential blocks reduced to rubble. "The north for us is a pocket of humanitarian catastrophe," the UNRWA chief said.

"Would you even encourage anyone to go to the north when we know the north is infested by UXOs — unexploded ordnance — and rubble, and non-functioning services?" he

#### Jordanian army accuses Israel of damaging hospital

he Jordanian army accused Israel yesterday of damaging a Jordanian field hospital in the Gaza Strip and wounding two people during bombardments of the territory, AFP reported from Amman.

The hospital in Khan Yunis, the biggest city in southern Gaza, was severely damaged due to nearby Israeli bombing overnight from Tuesday to yesterday, the military said in a statement.

It came amid Israel's war against Hamas, which was sparked by the Palestinian group's unprecedented storming of Israel in October.

The bombing wounded a hospital medic in the right thigh and hand, the army said, and the medic would be evacuated by air to Jordan for medical treatment.

A Gazan civilian receiving treatment in the intensive care unit "was also injured by shrapnel and a bullet during the aggression", the statement said, citing a senior military source.

"The Jordanian armed forces hold Israel fully responsible for the safety of hospital staff," it said, adding that the strikes were a "flagrant violation" of international humanitarian law and the Geneva Convention. It urged Israel, "the occupying power", to not take "any measures that prevent or

hinder medical personnel from carrying out their duties".

The statement said the hospital would "continue to perform its medical and humanitarian duty".

Hospitals have been hit repeatedly during the conflict. In December, Gaza's health ministry reported damage from a strike at the sprawling tent compound that makes up the Jordanian field hospital in Khan Yunis.

Another Jordanian field hospital in the north of Gaza was hit by an Israeli strike in mid-November, wounding seven staff. The Royal Jordanian Air Force conducted seven airdrops over Gaza since the beginning of the war. Six airdrops delivered medical supplies for the field hospital and one for Palestinians besieged in a church in the north of Gaza. Israel has said airdrops are carried out in "co-ordination" with its authorities.

The war in Gaza was sparked by Hamas' October first week storming of southern Israel.

More than 24,400 Palestinians, around 70% of them women, young children and adolescents, have been killed in the Gaza Strip in relentless Israeli bombardments and a ground offensive, according to the Hamas government's health ministry.

## Patience and sunshine help to charge a phone in Gaza

Luddling around a bewildering tangle of cables and extension leads plugged into a hospital power outlet, displaced Gazan men are pursuing a critical but elusive goal: getting

their phones charged.

In wartime Gaza, a charged phone is nothing less than a lifeline. It serves to check on loved ones after Israeli bombardments, helps find out where food and water might be available, and provides light in tents after darkness

falls.

"Every day we come here for three or four hours and waste time to charge our phones," said Mohamed Abu Skheta, who fled with his family, including a baby boy, from Al-Shati refugee camp in northern Gaza to a tent in Rafah,

southern Gaza.

"It's a dream to fully charge it. It's very difficult. You can charge it to 50 or 60%, 70% at most," he said. The charging spot outside the Emirati Hospital in Rafah is popular because it is free. The hospital allows displaced people to plug cables into its power sockets, which are fed either by solar panels or by a generator, when there is fuel for that.

Elsewhere, some households or small businesses that have solar panels allow people to charge, but often for a fee, which not all can

"My financial situation is difficult, so I have to look for an alternative, such as charging at a hospital or shop, without paying money" said Aby Schetz

money," said Abu Skheta.

Phones are not the only devices in need of regular charging.

Mohamed Abu Taha, a barber in Rafah, said he was relying on a solar panel at the family home to recharge his electric razor in between jobs.

"For almost every haircut, I send my nephew to charge the razor. I have to inform the customer that if it's sunny I can work, if not

then I cannot," he said.

One tailor in Rafah has got around the lack of electricity by converting a dismantled child's bicycle into a pedal dynamo to power his sewing machine.

NO PLACE TO CHARGE

Vowing to destroy Hamas, Israel has responded with a siege, bombardment and ground invasion of Gaza which have killed more than 24,000 Palestinians, according to Gaza health officials.

Most of the population is displaced, and severe shortages of food, water, electricity and medicines have resulted in a humanitarian catastrophe, according to the UN. Charging a phone has become one of the challenges of daily life, as time-consuming and frustrating as the search for bread

or water.

"We came here to charge, but there is no place," said Mahmoud Marouf, who is displaced from Jabalia in northern Gaza, and had brought a battery similar to the ones in cars to the charging spot at the Emirati Hospital.

Alongside phones, people bring such batteries to charge so that they can then power devices they need in their tents.

Volunteers at the hospital organise a rota allowing people to charge for a certain period of time. The system helps avoid tensions by giving access to precious sockets to as many people as possible, but demand is too high to satisfy everyone.

Marouf said he needed to charge his battery to power medical devices for his children, who have respiratory conditions.

"We got them a large battery and came to charge it, because hospitals are full," he said.

Despite the tedium, those lucky enough to have a spot waited patiently for their phones to charge as much as possible. "It lasts us for one day, or one day and a half at most, not more. We use it for lighting only," said Mohamed al-Shamali, who is displaced from Gaza City.

"Calls and telecoms are down so we don't have Internet. We try as much as we can to secure lighting, to see the roads we are walking on and inside the tent we are in, no more than that."

#### Kuwait forms first govt under new Amir, PM

Kuwait yesterday formed a

government headed by Prime Minister Sheikh Mohamed Sabah al-Salem al-Sabah, the state news agency said, the country's first cabinet after the death of its previous ruler, Reuters reported from Dubai. Sheikh Mohamed appointed new ministers for oil, finance and foreign affairs in the first cabinet formed under Kuwait's new Amir Sheikh Meshal al-Ahmad al-Sabah, which he said would carry out reforms to comply with the Amir's guidance. "This is a heavy responsibility of a new phase of Kuwait's history which includes challenges and aspirations, and requires further hard work and genuine accomplishment," the prime minister said, quoted by KUNA. The prime minister appointed Emad Mohamed al-Atiqi as oil minister, Anwar Ali al-Mudhaf as finance minister and Abdullah Ali al-Yahya as foreign minister. Kuwait's Amir Sheikh Meshal al-Ahmad al-Sabah came to power in December after his predecessor Sheikh Nawaf died, and is expected to preserve Kuwaiti foreign policies.

## Nigeria blast kills two, dozens hurt as buildings collapse

t least two people were killed and dozens injured when explosives stored at a private residence detonated in Nigeria's Oyo state, its governor said yesterday. A Reuters witness saw several

collapsed houses and wrecked cars from the impact of Tuesday's blast, which sent panicked residents into the streets.

Emergency services and security officials used bulldozers to clear debris during a search and rescue operation yesterday in a neighbourhood of Ibadan, the capital of Oyo state about 130km from Nigeria's commercial capital of Lagos. Some houses had roofs blown off and windows shattered and their owners watched from a distance as officials searched for survivors.

Police cordoned off the blast

site, where a huge crater could be seen from a distance.

"I was in the house with my kids and I just saw the ceiling and roof coming down on us. I have a lot of injuries, (including) my back," said Olaitan Okanlawon, a mother of two. Okanlawon said she slept at a hotel with her children and came back to collect some of her belongings from her damaged house.

In a statement, the governor, Seyi Makinde, said there were two deaths while 77 people were treated for injuries, most of them being discharged. "Preliminary investigations by the security agencies revealed that illegal miners occupying one of the houses in Bodija had stored explosive devices there which caused the blast," Makinde added.

#### Central Africa mine blast kills peacekeeper

Cameroonian member of the UN peacekeeping force in northwestern Central African Republic has been killed in a landmine blast and five others wounded, the UN said.

The region regularly sees clashes between rebel groups and the CAR army backed by mercenaries from Russia's Wagner group. Soldiers from Cameroon's contingent of the UN peacekeeping force were escorting a team from the International Organisation for Migration on Monday when the device exploded, the Minusca mission said in a statement seen by AFP yesterday.

It went off as the convoy passed by in the village of Mbindale, 450 kilometres north of the capital Bangui. it added.

of the capital Bangui, it added. Two of the wounded are "seriously" hurt and all were taken to hospital, Minusca said.

The explosion happened 20km from the site of a December 21 massacre of 23 civilians by armed elements of the 3R rebel group. UN peacekeepers were subsequently deployed to the village of Nzakoudou where the killings took place.

The 3R (Return, Reclamation and Rehabilitation) is one of the most powerful of the armed groups and criminal gangs produced by years of civil war that operate in the region.

Civilians are often victims of the conflict, with the UN accusing all sides of perpetrating war crimes and crimes against humanity. In July, a Rwandan member of the UN peackeeping force was killed by an unidentified armed group in an attack on a UN patrol in eastern CAR.

Since 2022, five Minusca soldiers have been killed in the country, according to figures from the organisation.

## Northern Ireland to miss deadline to break political impasse

orthern Ireland's devolved government will not be restored by Thursday's legal deadline after its assembly yesterday again failed to elect a Speaker amid an ongoing boycott by the Democratic Unionist Party.

The DUP withdrew from the Northern Ireland Assembly at Stormont in February 2022, forcing its mothballing, because of post-Brexit trading rules it said undermined the region's place in the wider United Kingdom.

The assembly was yesterday recalled for a seventh time to elect a Speaker, but that bid failed as no candidate could command the required support, prolonging the stalemate. The UK government had set Thursday as the deadline for restoring the assembly, with

the law requiring fresh elections in the event of failure.

Northern Ireland minister Chris Heaton-Harris said it was "disappointing" that no speaker was elected. "The return of a locally elected, accountable and effective devolved government is the best way to govern Northern Ireland," he said. "However, in the absence of an executive, the government will proceed with a pragmatic and reasonable approach to support

Northern Ireland." Heaton-Harris has indicated he will pass legislation to extend Thursday's deadline rather than call elections. Frustration is mounting in the province over political dysfunction and crumbling public services, which have been hit by cuts in central funding from London.

Unionist hardliners, who support Northern Ireland's membership of the UK, insist problems with post-Brexit trading rules with the European Union remain. They say changes negotiated with Brussels by Prime Minister Rishi Sunak under the so-called "Windsor Framework" adopted last March failed to remove a de facto border with mainland Britain in the Irish

The DUP's political foes, including the largest pro-Ireland nationalist party Sinn Fein, have heaped pressure on the party to return to Stormont. Sinn Fein vice-presi-

dent Michelle O'Neill warned yesterday that power-sharing institutions created as part of the peace process, which brought decades of sectarian violence to an end, were at risk. "If (DUP leader) Jeffrey Donaldson does not change his approach, then this sitting may well be the final one of this Assembly," she said.

"I fear that the democratic institutions of the Good Friday Agreement are in free fall."

# Britain's Charles, Kate postpone appearances over health issues

British head of state King Charles III has been treated for an enlarged prostate and will undergo a procedure in hospital next week, Buckingham Palace said yesterday. The rare announcement about the monarch's health comes after Kensington Palace said his daughter-in-law Catherine, Princess of Wales, had undergone successful abdominal surgery.

Catherine, often known as Kate, is facing up to two weeks in hospital and several months' recuperation after the operation, which palace officials said was non-cancerous, without specifying further. Charles, 75, became king on the death of his mother, Queen Elizabeth II, in September 2022 after spending most of his life as her heir.

He is head of state of 14 other countries outside the United Kingdom, including Australia, Canada and New Zealand, and is head of the 56-member Commonwealth, which comprises 2.4bn people.

He is also Supreme Governor of the Church of England, the mother church of the worldwide Anglican communion.

Charles has thrown himself into the role, despite reaching a phase of life when most men of his age have retired. His last public ap-

pearance was with other senior royals at a Christmas Day service at Sandringham. "In common with thousands of men each year, The King has sought treatment for an enlarged prostate," a palace statement read.

"His Majesty's condition is benign and he will attend hospital next week for a corrective procedure. The King's public engagements will be postponed for a short period of recuperation." Benign prostate enlargement is common in men aged over 50 and is not normally considered a serious threat to health or an increased risk of developing prostate cancer.

If the prostate gland is enlarged, it can put pressure on the bladder and urethra, affecting urination.

Causes of prostate enlargement are unknown but are thought to be linked to hormonal changes with age, according to the UK's state-

run National Health Service. The announcement came some 90 minutes after the health bulletin about Catherine, who is married to Charles's eldest son and heir, Prince William.

Her office at Kensington Palace said she was admitted to a private clinic in central London on Tuesday.

"The surgery was successful and it is expected that she will remain in hospital for 10 to 14 days, before returning home to continue her recovery," a statement read. "Based on the current medical advice, she is unlikely to return to public duties until after Easter (on March 31)."

The princess is one of the most popular - and photographed - members of the royal family.

In the latest polling she was third most-popular living royal with a 63% public approval rating,

behind William (68%) and King Charles III's sister Princess Anne (67%). Queen Elizabeth II, who died in September 2022 aged 96, remains the most popular, with 75%, according to YouGov.

The king's rating was 51%.

Catherine, 42, is frequently seen alongside William, 41, with whom she has three young children - Prince George, 10, Princess Charlotte, eight, and Prince Louis, aged five. But she is increasingly undertaking solo public engagements, particularly in her key areas of interest such as early years education.

At The London Clinic, one of the UK's largest private hospitals, two police officers stood guard at the main entrance as photographers and film crews gathered. Kensington Palace added: "The Princess of Wales appreciates the interest this statement will generate. She hopes that the public will understand her desire to maintain as much normality for her children as possible; and her wish that her personal medical information remains private.

"Kensington Palace will, therefore, only provide updates on Her Royal Highness' progress when there is significant new information to share. The Princess of Wales wishes to apologise to all those concerned for the fact that she has to postpone her upcoming engagements. She looks forward to reinstating as many as possible, as soon as possible."

# India holding talks with Iran over Houthis' Red Sea attacks: source

India is holding diplomatic talks with Iran and taking other measures to help shield its exporters from the impact of attacks on ships in the Red Sea by the Houthi group in Yemen, a government source said yesterday.

The attacks have slowed trade between Asia and Europe, disrupting supply chains. The Houthis say they are acting in solidarity with the Palestinians in Gaza and have threatened to expand the attacks to include US ships as the war between Israel and Hamas group rages for a fourth month.

Indian Foreign Minister Subrahmanyam Jaishankar held talks in Iran on Monday which he said had touched on the Red Sea situation.

"The defence ministry has improved surveillance (in the region) and the ministry of external affairs is diplomatically negotiating this very well," said the government source, who requested anonymity.

The finance ministry's banking division will also make it easier for exporters affected by the disruption to get credit, he added.

"The idea is to ensure credit flow to exporters is maintained as cargoes are getting delayed and transit is costing more," the source said. The foreign ministry did not immediately respond to a request for comment from Reu-

ters.

The Red Sea, which leads to the Suez Canal, lies on the key east-west trade route from Asia's manufacturing hubs to Europe and onto the east coast of the

Americas.
About 12% of world's shipping traffic accesses the Suez Canal via its waters. India's defence ministry is providing protective escorts to Indian container ships in the region and the Indian Navy has responded to at least two attacks and hijacking attempts on merchant vessels in the Arabian

The government source said trade volumes from major ports had not been affected so far, but ships were having to take longer routes to avoid the attacks.

#### China's population drops for 2nd year, with record low birth rate

hina's population fell for a second consecutive year in 2023, as a record low birth rate and a wave of Covid-19 deaths when strict lockdowns ended accelerated a downturn that will have profound long-term effects on the economy's growth potential.

The National Bureau of Statistics said the total number of people in China dropped by 2.08mm, or 0.15%, to 1.409bn in 2023.

That was well above the population decline of 850,000 in 2022, which had been the first since 1961 during the Great Famine of the Mao Zedong era. China experienced a dramatic nationwide Covid surge early last year after three years of tight screening and quarantine measures kept the virus largely contained until authorities abruptly lifted curbs in December 2022. Total deaths last year rose 6.6% to 11.1mn, with the death rate reaching the highest level since 1974 during the Cultural Revolution. New births fell 5.7% to 9.02mn and the birth rate was a record low 6.39 births per 1,000 people, down from a rate of 6.77 births in 2022.

Births in the country have been plummeting for decades as a result of the one-child policy implemented from 1980-2015 and its rapid urbanisation during that period. As with earlier economic booms in Japan and South Korea, large populations moved from China's rural farms into cities, where having children is more expensive. Japan's birth rate was 6.3 per 1,000 people in 2022, while South Korea's rate was 4.9. "As we have observed again and again from

other low fertility countries, fertility decline is often very difficult to reverse," University of Michigan demographer Zhou Yun said. Further denting appetite for baby-making in China in 2023, youth unemployment hit record highs, wages for many white-collar workers fell, and a crisis in the property sector, where more than two-thirds of household wealth is stored, intensified.

The fresh data adds to concerns that the world's No 2 economy's growth prospects are diminishing due to fewer workers and consumers, while the rising costs of elderly care and retirement benefits put more strain on indebted local governments.

India surpassed China as the world's most populous nation last year, according to estimates by the United Nations, fuelling more debate over the merits of relocating some China-based supply chains to other markets, especially as geopolitical tensions rise between Beijing and Washington.

Long-term, UN experts see Chi-

Long-term, UN experts see China's population shrinking by 109mm by 2050, more than triple the decline of their previous forecast in 2019.

China's population aged 60 and over reached 296.97mn in 2023, about 21.1% of its total population, up from 280.04 million in 2022.

China's 2023 rate of 7.87 deaths per 1,000 people was higher than a rate of 7.37 deaths in 2022.

The country's retirement-age population, aged 60 and over, is expected to increase to more than 400mn by 2035 - more than the entire population of the United States from about 280mn people currently. The state-run Chinese Academy of Sciences sees the pension system running out of money by 2035. Zhu Guoping, a 57-year-old farmer in northwestern Gansu province, said his annual income of about 20,000 yuan (\$2,779.59) leaves his family with meagre savings. He will receive a 160 yuan monthly pension once he turns 60, the equivalent of \$22. "The money is definitely not enough," Zhu said. "Maybe our children can provide us with some support in the

future."
High childcare and education costs put many Chinese couples off having children, while uncertainty in the job market discourages women from pausing their

careers. Gender discrimination and traditional expectations that women assume the caretaker role in the family exacerbate the issue, demographers say. President Xi Jinping said last year

that women should tell "good family tradition stories," adding it was necessary to "actively cultivate a new culture of marriage and child-bearing," which he linked to national development.

Local governments have announced various measures to encourage childbirth including tax deductions, longer maternity leave and housing subsidies. But many of the policies have not been implemented due to insufficient funding and a lack of motivation by local governments, said a Beijing policy institute, urging a unified nationwide family subsidy scheme instead. Beijing resident Wang Weidong, 36, who works at an internet company, said he and his wife were reluctant to have a second shild.

"People will not have a child because of these incentives. The incentives are auxiliary, not the root cause. So I think it is harder to reverse this trend," Wang said.

wenty-three people have died after an explosion at a fireworks factory in central Thailand yesterday, the provincial governor said. Images shared by the local rescue service showed metal debris littered on the ground, and a huge plume of black smoke.

The blast occurred at around 3pm near Sala Khao township, in central Suphan Buri province. "We received reports from EOD team that there were 23 confirmed dead," Nattapat Suwanprateep, Suphan Buri province governor, told AFP, referencing the Explosive Ordinance Disposal group.

There was no indication of what may have caused the explosion

However, Nattapat said officials were investigating what may have triggered the incident. "The factory was operating legally with valid licences," he said. Police officers said the surrounding area had not been damaged. "Glass windows on one house have been affected by the explosion but no other reports," Nattapat said.

Police Lieutenant General Naiyawat Phademchid told AFP Prime Minister Srettha Thavisin - currently in Switzerland for the World Economic Forum - had been informed of the incident. "Estimate of 20 deaths, however, we cannot confirm the official death toll," said the police officer, who is responsible for lower western Thailand.

He said that officials were sealing the surrounding area, and would begin to identify the bodies once the situation had stabilised, without going into further details.

"There were on average about 20-30 people working at this factory every day," he said.

In an official statement posted online, Prime Minister Srettha expressed his sorrow for the families of those killed. Srettha also ordered an investigation into whether the workshop was operating illegally, as well as the

cause of the incident.
Explosions at workshops pro-

ducing firecrackers and other pyrotechnics are not uncommon in Thailand.

At least 10 people died after an

explosion in a fireworks warehouse in Sungai Kolok town in southern Narathiwat province last year.

The blast was believed to have

been caused by welding during construction work on the building, and police later sought the owners on charges of negligence.

Last year 11 people were also injured when a fireworks factory exploded in the northern city of Chiang Mai.

The Southeast Asian kingdom also has a poor safety record in the construction sector and deadly accidents are common.

# Is Biden the new Jimmy Carter?

It has become fashionable of late to compare US President Joe Biden in 2023 to Jimmy Carter in 1979. Just as the events of 1979 doomed Carter's re-election hopes the following year, developments in 2023 are said to have effectively sunk Biden's bid for a second term in November.

Most obviously, both Carter and Biden confronted a demoralising inflation problem. But Carter-era inflation was far worse: in November 1979, a year prior to the election, consumer price inflation in the United States was running at 12.6%. In the 12 months ending in November 2023, in contrast, CPI inflation was a modest 3.1%. But inflation does remain a political liability for Biden, regardless of whether the phenomenon is now largely in the rearview mirror.

Second, Biden, like Carter before him, has given the Federal Reserve free rein to tackle the problem. Carter selected Paul Volcker to chair the US Federal Reserve Board largely for Volcker's inflation-fighting credentials, in full knowledge that the new chair would jack up interest rates. Despite warnings from his political adviser, Bert Lance, that Volcker's appointment would doom the president's re-election prospects, Carter then let Volcker go about his business. Carter's hands-off approach during the run-up to an election was quite different from that of some of his predecessors, in particular Richard Nixon before the 1972 election.

History suggests that American voters prefer optimism. But it also suggests that they are full of surprises 1972 election.

Biden has similarly allowed Jerome Powell's Fed to adjust interest rates as it chooses, ignoring howls of pain from homebuyers and others. And, again, Biden's unwillingness to criticise the Fed is diametrically opposed to the stance taken by his predecessor, Donald

Then there are the two presidents' problems on the foreign-policy front, in general and with respect to Iran in particular. In November 1979, student

demonstrators stormed the US embassy in Tehran, taking 66 Americans hostage. Soon thereafter, Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini returned from exile in Paris.

The hostages were released minutes after Ronald Reagan's inauguration in January 1981. The failure of Carter's effort to rescue them the previous April had become an open political wound in the run-up to the election and a symbol of a failed foreign policy.

The Biden administration's inability to engineer an extended ceasefire or otherwise aid in freeing the captives in Gaza creates a similar sense of impotence.

Meanwhile, US-backed Ukrainian forces' failure to gain much ground against their Russian adversaries in their 2023 summer offensive, and the failure of US sanctions to deter aggression by Russian President Vladimir Putin, heighten the sense that American foreign policy is in disarray.

All this has translated into dismal approval ratings for Biden, worse even than Carter's in 1979. Thus, the comparison would be suggestive even if we hadn't just been reminded that none other than the young Biden, then a US senator, expressed doubts in the run-up to the 1980 election that it would serve the incumbent or the Democratic Party for Carter to seek a second term.

In addition to parallels, however, there is also an important difference between Biden and Carter, namely in their political positioning. Carter worried about Americans' anxious mental state and the outlook for the country. In July 1979, he delivered what came to be known as the "Malaise Speech." He decried Americans' crisis of confidence and lamented "growing doubt about the meaning of our own lives" and "loss of a unity of purpose for our nation." Americans, Carter went on, were losing faith "not only in government itself but in the ability as citizens to serve as the ultimate rulers and shapers of our democracy." Sound familiar?

In fact, the speech was not entirely negative. But it came to be portrayed that way, specifically by Reagan, who portrayed himself as a "happy warrior," famously asserting at the conclusion of his election eve address, "I find no national malaise." It was a winning bet on an optimistic message. In the dark days of 1979-80, American voters preferred Reagan's sunny confidence to Carter's dour rumination.

Now, of course, it is the incumbent, Biden, who is the optimist, insisting that America is on the right track, while the likely challenger, Trump, claims that America is suffering from a deepseated malaise, rages about retribution, and sees threats at every turn. History suggests that American voters prefer optimism. But it also suggests that they are full of surprises. — Project Syndicate

# Pavel visit spurs ties with Qatar in multiple fields

he visit of the President of the Czech Republic, Petr Pavel, to Doha yesterday will contribute to enhancing co-operation in multiple fields, discovering more trade and investment opportunities between the two countries, supporting and further developing bilateral relations, and opening new areas in a way that serves the common interests and aspirations of the two countries and their friendly peoples.

Qatar and the Czech Republic share growing relations in various fields and are experiencing significant development, especially at the economic level, and in the fields of health, energy, and investment.

Relations between the two countries date back to 1990 when diplomatic relations were established at the level of ambassadors (non-resident representation), and Qatar's ambassador to the Czech Republic presented his credentials in 2007.

The visit of His Highness the Amir, Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani, to the Czech Republic in 2022 contributed to consolidating relations between the two countries and increasing co-operation in many fields. His Highness the Amir and Milos Zeman, the president of the Czech Republic at the time, held an official discussion session in Prague, focusing on developing bilateral relations in various fields.

The Amir pointed to the strength of Qatari-Czech relations and their continuous

development, along with the co-operation that brings the two countries together in various sectors. The session discussed ways to enhance co-operation in trade, industry, energy, and investment, besides exchanging views on several regional and international issues of common interest.

The relations between Qatar and the Czech Republic are regulated by a set of agreements in many areas of trade, economy, and the air transport sector. The political views of the two countries on many regional and international issues are similar. To strengthen bilateral relations, the Qatar-Czech Parliamentary Friendship Committee was established in the Czech Parliament in April 2019.

Mutual visits and joint meetings between investors and businessmen in the two countries contributed to providing an important platform for discussing ways to establish alliances and joint projects, in addition to gaining a broader overview of viable investment opportunities in several promising sectors in the two countries. They also contributed to raising the rate of trade exchange between the two countries.

This resulted from the success achieved by Qatar in providing an attractive investment environment through facilities and incentives that allow a foreign investor to invest up to 100% in various sectors and economic activities, as well as the advanced infrastructure, laws, and economic legislation that have contributed to Qatar reaching a world-renowned position as a leading destination for investment and business.

Building materials, office furniture, equipment, and electrical appliances are at the forefront of Qatar's imports from the Czech Republic, while ethylene polymers represent the most important Qatari exports to the Czech Republic. There are also many areas that contribute to deepening bilateral cooperation between the two countries, especially in the health, real estate, tourism, and agricultural sectors. The Czech Republic has a long history in these fields, and its economy is one of the most promising in Europe, bringing with it great future potential for investment.

The Czech Republic is one of the fastest-growing countries in Europe in recent years in the fields of infrastructure and medical tourism. It is a landlocked country located in central Europe with an estimated area of 78,867sq km and a population of 10.7mn people. Thanks to its special strategic geographical location and reasonable costs, with advanced infrastructure and a skilled workforce, the Czech Republic has become an ideal and attractive base for business and investment projects.

# Pakistan recalls ambassador, bars Iran envoy from returning to Islamabad

Pakistan recalled its ambassador from Iran yesterday and blocked Tehran's envoy from returning to Islamabad after an Iranian air strike killed two children in the west of the country a day earlier.

Iranian news agency Mehrnews said the "missile and drone" attack targeted the Jaish al-Adl group's headquarters in Pakistan, calling it "another decisive step taken by Iran in response to the aggression against the security of our country".

The raid came late on Tuesday after Tehran also launched attacks in Iraq and Syria against what it called "anti-Iranian terrorist groups".

Pakistan denounced the strike, near the nations' shared border.

Pakistan Foreign Minister Jalil Abbas Jilani yesterday warned his Iranian counterpart Hossein Amir-Abdollahian that Pakistan reserved the right to respond to Iran's "provocative act" of attacking inside its territory.

Jilani, who is currently leading the Pakistan delegation to the ministerial meeting of the Non-Aligned Movement in Kampala, Uganda, made these remarks as he received a telephone call from the Iranian foreign minister, according to a statement issued by the Foreign Office.

The foreign minister firmly underscored that the attack conducted by Iran inside Pakistani

territory, on January 16, 2024, was not only a serious breach of Pakistan's sovereignty but was also an egregious violation of international law and the spirit of bilateral relations between Pakistan and Iran.

Expressing Pakistan's unreserved condemnation of the attack, the foreign minister said that the incident has caused serious damage to bilateral ties between Pakistan and Iran.

"Pakistan reserved the right to respond to this provocative act," the statement quoted Jilani as saying.

"Last night's unprovoked and blatant breach of Pakistan's sovereignty by Iran is a violation of international law and the purposes and principles of the Charter of the United Nations," Pakistan Foreign Office spokeswoman Mumtaz Zahra Baloch said in a statement yesterday.

The foreign ministry recalled its ambassador from Tehran and said Iran's envoy — currently on a visit home — would not be allowed to return to Islamabad.

Tehran's top diplomat insisted his country's armed forces had targeted "Iranian terrorist group" Jaish al-Adl in Pakistan.

"None of the nationals of the friendly and brotherly country of Pakistan were targeted by Iranian missiles and drones," Foreign Minister Hossein Amir-Abdolla-

hian said on the sidelines of the World Economic Forum in Davos, Switzerland.

The Iranian foreign ministry said Amir-Abdollahian spoke with his Pakistani counterpart Jalil Abbas Jilani yesterday, stressing that "Pakistan's sovereignty and territorial integrity are of great concern".

Amir-Abdollahian said "Jaish al-Adl is a terrorist group that

acts against the common security of the two countries", according to a summary of the conversation released by Tehran.

Iran had earlier launched missile attacks on "spy headquarters" and "terrorist" targets in Syria, and Iraq's autonomous Kurdistan region.

The Iranian strikes add to multiple crises across the Middle East, with Israel waging a war against Hamas in Gaza and pro-Palestinian Houthi rebels in Yemen attacking commercial vessels in the Red Sea.

Tehran and Islamabad frequently accuse each other of allowing militants to operate from the other's territory to launch attacks, but it is rare that official forces on either side engage.

"It is even more concerning that this illegal act has taken place despite the existence of several channels of communication between Pakistan and Iran," Pakistan's foreign ministry said.

"Pakistan has always said terrorism is a common threat to all countries in the region that requires coordinated action."

Michael Kugelman, director of the South Asia Institute at the Washington-based Wilson Center, warned of the seriousness of the strike.

"Iran has staged cross-border operations against Pakistan-based militants in the past, but I don't recall anything on this scale," he said on X, formerly Twitter.

"This plunges Pakistan-Iran ties — a delicate relationship even in the best of times — into serious crisis."

Meanwhile, the United States yesterday condemned recent Iranian strikes in Pakistan, Iraq and Syria, which Tehran has claimed were carried out against "anti-Iranian terrorist groups."

"So we do condemn those strikes. We've seen Iran violate the sovereign borders of three of its neighbours in just the past couple of days," State Department spokesman Matthew Miller told reporters.

#### Spain probes drowning of two soldiers during training

A Spanish military court is investigating the drowning of two soldiers who were made to cross a lake while bearing a heavy load, a lawyer for one of the victim's family said yesterday.

The Spanish army had on December 21 that two soldiers had died "during manoeuvres" at the Cerro Muriano base near the southern city of Cordoba, without giving details of the circumstances.

But Spanish media reports said the men, aged 24 and 34, had drowned after dozens of soldiers were made to cross a lake in frigid temperatures while carrying their material.

One of the soldiers who drowned, Carlos Leon Rico, had been made to carry an extra 3.5 kilos by his superiors as a punishment, for a total of 12 kilos, his family's lawyer Luis Romero told AFP. It was not immediately clear if the second soldier who died was also carrying extra weight. There were no rescue rafts or lifeline at the site of the exercise as should have been the case, Romero said, just a loose rope to guide the soldier. The "tragedy could have been

even worse" since around 60 soldiers were waiting on the bank of the lake to cross, he added. The Cordoba court that was investigating the deaths handed over the case Tuesday to a military court in Seville at the request of military officials.

# Police in Russia break up rare protest over jailing of activist

Riot police fired tear gas and struck protesters with batons in the Russian republic of Bashkortostan yesterday after a leading local rights activist was sentenced to four years in a penal colony.

Large protests in Russia are extremely rare because of the risk of arrest — especially since the start of the war with

unauthorised. Clashes broke out between the police and a crowd of up to several thousand people who had gathered in support of the activist, Fail Alsynov. At a trial that was closed to the media, a court found him guilty of inciting ethnic hatred, a charge he denied.

Russia said yesterday it had targeted a group of French fighters in a long-range strike on the eastern Ukrainian city of Kharkiv, an attack authorities said injured more than a dozen cirilians.

The Kremlin's claim came hours after Ukraine's foreign minister vowed to gain full control over its skies in 2024, as Russia's full-scale assault enters its third year.

Kharkiv, Ukraine's second largest city lying close to the Russian border, has been under persistent shelling since Russia launched large-scale hostilities in Ukraine in February 2022.

"On the evening of 16 January, the armed forces of the Russian Federation carried out a precision strike on a temporary deployment point of foreign militants in the city of Kharkiv, the core of which were French mercenaries," the defence ministry said in a statement.

The ministry claimed to have killed dozens of foreign militants in the attack and injured many more but did not provide evidence.

The strikes tore into a multistorey building in central Kharkiv, gutting the structure and leaving debris strewn around the street below.

Kharkiv region governor Oleg

Synegubov said that there were no military targets in the area.

Officials in Kyiv have seen a steep rise in civilian casualties since December, as Moscow intensifies air attacks, reversing a downward trend seen earlier in 2023, the United Nations has warned.

Ukraine's Foreign Minister

Dmytro Kuleba yesterday said his country's priority for 2024 was to gain control over its skies, where Russian forces have had the upper hand.

"In 2024, of course the priority is to throw Russia from the skies," Kuleba said in an address to the World Economic Forum in Davos.

Kyiv has long pressured the West to deliver advanced fighter jets to support its troops entrenched in

the south and east of the country.

Responding to those calls,
French President Emmanuel Macron announced this week that
France would deliver a new batch
of around 40 SCALP long-range
cruise missiles as well as hundreds
of bombs as Kyiv fights the Russian

Kuleba's comments at the World Economic Forum in Davos came hours after Russian drone and missile attacks — including in Kharkiv — wounded at least 20 people across Ukraine and shelling killed two civilians.

The barrage left massive craters in the southern city of Odesa where AFP journalists saw residential buildings charred in the wake of the assault.

#### European crew poised for private mission to International Space Station

International Space Station in a mission with Axiom Space, as countries hungry for a taste of space turn increasingly to the private sector. The launch, Axiom's third, is scheduled to see the fourmember crew lift off in a SpaceX Crew Dragon capsule fixed to the top of a Falcon 9 rocket at 4:49pm local time today from the Kennedy Space Center in Florida. "It marks a new era of opportunity for countries to join the international space community" and "shifts the paradigm of how space agencies access LEO (low Earth orbit), for exploration and research in microgravity," Axiom Space's chief of mission integration and operations Derek Hassmann said of Axiom Mission 3 (Ax-3). It is the first ISS mission for Axiom where all three of the paid seats have been bought by national agencies, rather than by wealthy individuals. Turkish pilot and air force colonel Alper

Gezeravci is joined by Marcus

Wandt from Sweden, who will be the second Swede in space, and Walter Villadei, an Italian air force colonel who has previously flown to the edge of space on a Virgin Galactic spaceplane

Galactic spaceplane. The crew are led by Axiom's Chief Astronaut Michael Lopez-Alegria, a Spanish and US citizen and former Nasa astronaut. The exact costs haven't been disclosed, but in 2018 when the company first announced the program, which involves chartering SpaceX hardware and paying Nasa for services, it set a price tag of \$55mn per seat. More recently, Hungary was reported by spacenews.com to be planning a \$100mn deal with Axiom for a future mission involving one astronaut. Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan has displayed a keen interest in the mission, presenting Gezeravci to the Turkish public in the run-up to his re-election last year, and calling the 21year air force veteran a "heroic Turkish pilot". "We see it as a new

symbol of the growing, stronger

and assertive Turkiye," Erdogan

said about the space mission on Tuesday. Sweden's Marcus Wandt, meanwhile, applied for the European Space Agency (ESA) astronaut class of 2022 but was made a reserve. Axiom-3 therefore allows Sweden to put its second national in space. The Axiom-3 team will join seven crew currently aboard the ISS from Japan, Denmark, the United States and Russia — and carry out 30 experiments, learning more about the impact of microgravity on the human body, advancing industrial processes and more. Axiom-3 was previously scheduled to launch yesterday, but SpaceX posted on X it was holding another day to "complete pre-launch checkouts and data analysis on the vehicle." On Tuesday Benji Reed, the senior director of human spaceflight at SpaceX, said engineering teams had discovered certain technical issues in the way the Dragon capsule's landing parachutes deployed, and how it was attached to the Falcon 9 rocket. but said both problems had been resolved.
