Gaza massacre toll tops 25,000; Hamas defends attacks on Israel

Netanyahu government rejects Hamas's conditions for releasing hostages

alestinian resistance movement Hamas yesterday defended its October 7 attacks on Israel but admitted to "faults" and called for an end to "Israeli aggression" in Gaza, where the health ministry said the death toll passed 25,000.

Southern Gaza is the latest focus of Israel's battle to destroy the resistance movement.

In its first public report, Hamas said the October 7 attacks were a "necessary step" against Israeli occupation of Palestinian territories, and a way to secure release of Palestinian prisoners.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said his government would not accept Hamas's conditions for releasing hostages still held in Gaza. "If we accept this, we won't be able to guarantee the safety of our citizens," he said.

Hamas said in the report its fighters were committed to "Islamic values", and if civilians were targeted "it happened accidentally and in the course of the confrontation with the occupation forces."

Israel's military offensive has killed at least 25,105 people in Gaza, mostly women and children, according to the latest toll

Hamas chief Ismail Haniyeh held a meeting with the Turkish foreign minister, diplomatic sources said. Among their discussion was "a two-state solution for a permanent peace," one

of the sources said. The United States and Arab countries are also seeking such a solution involving Palestinian statehood, but Netanyahu has rejected it, saying "Israel must retain security control over

Hamas in its report rejected any international and Israeli efforts to decide Gaza's post-war future.

Israel's northern border with Lebanon has seen near-daily exchanges of fire between Israeli forces and the Iran-backed Hezbollah movement.

An Israeli drone strike on a car in southern Lebanon killed two Hezbollah fighters, a source

The White House said it was taking "extremely seriously" a weekend attack by Iran-backed militants using "multiple hallistic missiles and rockets" against a base hosting US forces in Iraq.

Dozens of such attacks in Iraq and Syria have taken place since mid-October and most have been claimed by militants opposing US support for Israel, but the use of ballistic missiles marked an escalation. Page 8



Qatar-Tajikistan ties go from strength to strength

is Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani will meet visiting Tajikistan President Emomali Rahmon at the Lusail Palace today, to discuss the relations of friendship and standing co-operation between the two countries and ways to enhance them on all fronts, in addition to the most prominent issues and developments in the regional and international arenas.

The state visit of the Tajik president is an embodiment Qatar's strategy set by the Amir to build bridges and adopt an approach of openness to all world countries, in addition to establishing the strongest of ties with various sisterly and friendly states.

The visit emphasises the strength of bilateral ties, where it is expected to enhance them to reach a strategic partnership, especially in terms of the economy, trade, and investment, in service of the two friendly countries and their peoples

The Qatar-Tajikistan ties date back to 1994, when the two countries establish diplomatic relations on the sidelines of the Organisation of Islamic Co-operation summit held in Morocco. As a result, the Qatari embassy in Dushanbe opened its doors in 2012, whereas the Tajik embassy in Doha followed suit in 2013, as such, this year marks the 30th anniversary of establishing bilateral relations.

The strong relations that bind the two countries stem from their peoples spiritual and historical ties on the one hand, and from the brotherly relations between both countries leaders: His Highness the Amir and President Emomali Rahmon, who share a mutual keenness to advance relations.

Trust and mutual respect form the basis for both countries' ties, especially that Qatar was the first Arabian Gulf country to recognise Tajikistan's in-

dependence

and the first

Arab country to invest in it through the \$300mn-worth Diar Dushanbe project. Furthermore, Qatar financed the construction of Central Asia's largest mosque: Imam Azam Abu Hanifa Nu'man ibn Thabit Central Cathedral Mosque of Dushanbe whose area stretches over 12 hectares and has the capacity of accommodating 133,000 worshippers at a time.

Mutual official visits of the highest order helped strengthen relations between Doha and Dushanbe, during which a number of bilateral agreements and memorandums of understanding were signed, in addition to various ministerial, commercial, and investment delegations exchanging visits.

One of the most prominent bilateral summit-level official visits was when His Highness the Amir paid Tajikistan a state visit in June 2023, and his visit in June 2019 to participate in the 5th Conference on Interaction and Confidence Building Measures in Asia (CICA). President Rahmon paid his first official visit to Qatar in May 2007 while his second official visit took place in February 2017.

Qatar and Tajikistan share similar stances on crucial regional and international issues and dossiers, with both countries being eager on co-operation to maintain international security and peace. The

two states also work closely in the framework of regional and international organisations, such as the UN, the Organisation of Islamic Co-operation, the Conference on Interaction and Confidence Building Measures in Asia (CICA), and the Asia Co-operation Dialogue.

As part of their continuous bilateral political talks, both countries foreign ministries held a round of talks in the Tajik capital in May, whereby they discussed bilateral co-operation, in addition to a number of topics of mutual interest.

The Qatar-Tajikistan joint labour committee convened in Dushanbe in February to discuss aspects of co-operation and the exchange of expertise in labour affairs, facilitating the recruitment of specialised labourers from Tajikistan, the mechanisms for implementing the signed bilateral agreement regarding the organisation of the workforce, among other topics on the agenda.

Tajikistan is taking part in the Expo 2023 Doha through its pavilion which introduces visitors to the country's history, culture, attractions, arts, and Islamic religious and cultural heritage.

Tajikistan is eager to enhance relations with Qatar and considers it as a main partner internationally, calling on Qatari businesspersons to invest in various Tajik sectors, be it in hydraulic energy, banking and financial services, metals, tourism, and agriculture.

Tajikistan is currently imple-

menting promising economic programmes, with the country ranking 6th among the most advanced countries in terms of hydraulic energy, the source of 98% of the country's electricity.

Tajikistan also enjoys a competitive economic environment and has four economic zones fo-

cusing on mining, energy, and textile. Moreover, the country offers a competitive market for investments and provides a range of foreign investment guarantees including 240 advantages and facilities such as those regarding its taxation and customs laws.

Tajikistan is a mountainous, landlocked country located in Central Asia and is the smallest country in its region. The country's population is estimated at about 9.5mn people living on an area of about 143,000sq km. The economy of Tajikistan relies on agriculture and the production of cotton and high-quality aluminium. Thanks to it being a mountainous country, Tajikistan enjoys huge water resources, ranking it 8th globally in terms of water reserves and first in Central Asia. Thus, Tajikistan offers great investment opportunities in agriculture, textiles, tourism, and clean and green energy.

Tajikistan has several important advantages, including its geopolitical position among three of the worlds largest economies of China, India, and Russia, as well as bordering several countries with emerging economies. The country is resource-rich, whereby it enjoys vast water reserves accounting for 65% of its regions water, in addition to having the worlds largest silver mine, as well as possessing gold and precious stone mines, a vast river system which enables it to generate huge amounts of hydraulic energy, the Norak Dam, one of the world's highest dams. The country is also home to grand fertile lands with fresh water rendering its environment ideal for agriculture and is a destination for rare bird hunting. The country has a lot of tourist attraction potential. (QNA)

Ambassador al-Nasr noted continuous co-operation between the two countries through supporting international conferences in combating terrorism and water which Tajikistan hosts from time to time.

BMW, Ford, Toyota models recalled

he Ministry of Commerce and Industry (MoCI), in co-operation with Alfardan Automobiles, has announced the recall of BMW 735i Saloon, 740i Saloon, and i7 xDrive 60 Saloon, 2023 model, as it is possible that the warning lights won't function correctly due to a programming defect in the control

The MoCI, in co-operation with Almana Motors Company, announced the recall of Ford Bronco 2021-22 models, as the wiper system may enter a dry detect mode in certain conditions. If this occurs, the wipers slow down to an intermittent speed while in the continuous low or high wiper setting.

The MoCI, in co-operation with Al Abdulghani Mo-

QU magazine spotlights soil-free vegetable cultivation

Qatar University Research Magazine highlighted in its new issue the vertical farming technology for year-round soil-free vegetable cultivation in Qatar, as well as the prospects of this new technology in supporting the domestic agricultural product.

The vertical farming technology is a qualitative shift in agriculture and has succeeded in providing effective means of cultivating soil-free crops utilising stacked layers or shelves instead of resorting to open fields, something that would potentially contribute to providing spaces, increasing them, reducing resource consumption and increasing production during the whole year with the emphasis on observing the environmental impacts, the magazine outlined. The magazine noted the Agricultural Research Station patented agricultural technology to grow vegetables without soil throughout the year in Qatar through hydroponic vegetable cultivation system in the facility, for fresh leafy vegetables that leverages the cuttingedge scientific technologies in a highly controlled environment to offer the optimal growth conditions. The journal touched on the cultivation process

starting from a careful selection of high-quality seeds, focusing on varieties that thrive in controlled environments to ensure optimal growth. Subsequently, seeds are sown on the seeding mat, using seedling trays and kept under a lighting shade cover for one day. These trays are placed in a seedling pool where temperature, humidity and lighting conditions are carefully controlled to encourage rapid and uniform germination.

The report pointed out that vertical farming offers a host of benefits. It allows for year-round production, ensuring a consistent supply of leafy greens regardless of external factors like weather and seasons. The research team is currently working on adapting and developing project ideas to fit the Qatari environmental conditions, particularly in terms of cooling systems and energy supplies, in collaboration with researchers from Qatar University in these fields. This project is expected to open new research horizons for various disciplines within and outside of Qatar University, offering new training and research opportunities for students. **(QNA)**

Sidra Medicine study seen as key advancement in cancer microbiome field

Idra Medicine, a member of Qatar Foundation, has announced that one of its research studies published in Nature Medicine in May 2023, has been featured in the Year in Review section of Nature Reviews Gastroenterology & Hepatology, which focuses on key advances in the field of cancer microbiome in 2023.

Titled "Microbiota-based biomarkers and therapeutics for cancer management", the article provides a comprehensive overview of the latest discoveries and applications of microbiota-based approaches for improving cancer prevention, prognostication, and therapy, with a focus on colorectal cancer.

The research study from Sidra Medicine "An integrated

tumour, immune and microbiome atlas of colon cancer" by Roelands et al, revealed the impact of the immune system and microbiota on the ability to survive colon cancer. The study was done in collaboration with Leiden University Medical Centre (LUMC) in the Netherlands.

The study comprehensively characterised the genomic, transcriptomic, immunological, and microbial features of a cohort of 348 patients with colorectal cancer, sequenced at Sidra Medicine, with long-term follow-up data to devise a composite score for prognostication.

The Sidra Medicine and LUMC team analysed various aspects of primary colon cancers, including the characteristics of cancer cells, cancer immune responses, and microbiota composition. They found that a specific composition of bacteria in the tumour and intratumoural immune response were associated with a more favourable prognosis for colon cancer patients.

Dr Wouter Hendrickx, one of the senior authors of the article and a principal investigator at Sidra Medicine, said: "Our article showcases the cutting-edge research that Sidra Medicine is conducting in collaboration with leading institutions such as LUMC. This is a testament to the hard work and dedication of our team and our partners and reflects the high quality and impact of the research coming out of Qatar."

Jordanian minister hails Qatar's efforts to stop war in Gaza

atar and Jordan have developed historical and sustainable relations, hinging upon consolidated decades-long bedrocks, said Jordanian Minister of Government Communications Dr Muhannad Mubaidin said.

Speaking with Qatar News Agency (QNA), Mubaidin, who is also the official spokesperson for the Jordanian government, added the two countries established a unified position on Arab issues and crises in the region, in a way that serves the Arab interests.

Both countries' leaders coordinated stances on the issues pertaining to Arab and Islamic nations, mutually respecting each country's agenda and interests on certain issues, he added, highlighting that the harmonious policies included political, cultural, economic and social fields and led to continuously solid and fruitful bilateral rela-

He added that Qatari investments in Jordan are continuing to grow and that the Jordanian expat community is highly respected in Doha.

Commenting on the aggression on the Gaza Strip, he said the two countries had involved since the first day of the aggression, in a high-level co-ordination, highlighting the consensus reached during the Riyadh Summit in November by Doha, Amman and other Arab countries on a clear position that rejects war and the killing of civilians.

The Qatari Foreign Ministry and diplomacy made great efforts in parallel with the Jordanian Foreign Ministry, and held consultations with many countries concerned with the Palestinian issue that led to a UN General Assembly resolution to stop the war.

In this context, Mubaidin hailed Qatar's efforts within the Security Council, relief assistance and diplomatic endeavours to reach a humanitarian truce and to release prisoners, expressing his country's unrelent-

UN's Guterres condemns Israel for 'heartbreaking' killings in Gaza

Secretary-General Antonio Guterres yesterday denounced Israel for the "heartbreaking" deaths of Palestinian civilians in Gaza and called it unacceptable to resist statehood for the Palestinian people.

"Israel's military operations have spread mass destruction and killed civilians on a scale unprecedented during my time as secretary-general," Guterres said at the opening of a summit of the G77+China in the Ugandan capital Kampala.

"This is heartbreaking and utterly unacceptable. The Middle East is a tinder-box, we must do all we can to prevent conflict from igniting across the region." Israel launched its offensive in Gaza after the Hamas group stormed Israel in the first week of

Israel's campaign has killed more than 25,000 Palestinians, according to Gaza health authorities yesterday, and displaced most of the enclave's 2.3mn people from their homes.

Over the course of the war, the Israeli military has expressed regret for civilian deaths but it accuses Hamas of operating in densely populated areas and using civilians as human shields, a charge the group denies.

Guterres added that the refusal to accept the two-state solution for Israelis and Palestinians is totally unacceptable, saying denying Palestinians the right to statehood "would indefinitely prolong a conflict that has become a major threat to global peace and security".

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu appeared on Saturday to push back against US President Joe Biden's remarks about Palestinian statehood after the war against Hamas ends. His office

said that in talks on Friday with Biden, Netanyahu "reiterated his policy that after Hamas is destroyed Israel must retain security control over Gaza to ensure that Gaza will no longer pose a threat to Israel, a requirement that contradicts the demand for Palestinian sovereignty".

Guterres was in Kampala to attend the summits of G77+China and the Non-Aligned Movement (NAM). Leaders and senior officials from dozens of countries including South Africa, Iran, China, Turkiye, Cuba, India, Vietnam and others attended the meetings.

The G77+China is a group of 134 developing countries that champions the common interests of countries from the global south.

A document released late Saturday at the end of the NAM summit included a condemnation of "the illegal Israeli military aggression on the Gaza Strip, the indiscriminate attacks against Palestinian civilians, civilian objects, the forced displacement of the Palestinian population" and called for an immediate and durable humanitarian ceasefire.

The Dixmude, a French helicopter carrier, has been docked in the Egyptian port of Al-Arish, 50km west of the Gaza Strip, since November. The vessel is equipped with wards, operating theatres and 70 medical staff.

Nearly 120 injured people have been hospitalised on board, while hundreds more have been seen for outpatient consultations, including follow-ups on injuries and psychiatric issues, said Captain Alexandre Blonce, calling it an "unprecedented mission".

Israeli forces launched all-out war to eliminate Gaza's ruling Palestinian group Hamas after its fighters stormed southern Israel in the first week of October.

Gazans have struggled to get medical care at home as tens of thousands have been wounded. with most of Gaza's 36 hospitals no longer functioning, and those remaining operating at far over capacity, the World Health Organisation says. Israel has targeted the largest remaining hospitals, saying Hamas fighters are operating there, something Hamas denies.

Those lucky enough to cross into Egypt, like 16-year-old Ahmed Abu Daqqa, who was injured on Nov 1, faced long waits for medical care.

Doctors in Gaza "took out the shrapnel and put in two rods, but a month later they discovered more shrapnel in my knee. They told me they'll handle it later because there were too many surgeries," he said on board the Dixmude.

"I tried many times to get a transfer" before finally crossing into Egypt, he said.

He was then able to undergo further surgery where the rods and shrapnel were removed and a resulting infection dealt with, as well as receiving physical therapy.

He and others on board the French ship were awaiting further transfers to hospitals in Egypt or abroad. Italy sent a similar floating hospital to the Egyptian coast

Israeli strike killed 13 in Damascus: monitor

strike on Damascus targeting the Iranian Revolutionary Guards' Syria spy chief and blamed on Israel killed 13 people, a war monitor said yesterday in an updated toll, AFP reported from Beirut.

Australia sweats in heatwave, raising risk of bushfire

arge swaths of Australia sweltered again yesterday through a widening heatwave, which the national weather forecaster said raised the bushfire risk in an already high-risk fire season as the country endures an El Nino weather pattern.

"Extreme" heatwave alerts. the highest danger rating, were in place for a second day for parts of Western Australia and were extended to South Australia, while areas of Oueensland, New South Wales and the Northern Territory were under "severe" warnings, the forecaster said.

It cautioned that in Western Australia, the nation's largest state geographically, the remote Pilbara and Gascoyne areas could hit the high forties Celsius (up to 120° Fahrenheit).

In the Pilbara mining town of Paraburdoo about 1,500km (930 miles) north of the state capital Perth, a high of 48C (118F) was forecast, more than 7C above the average January maximum, according to forecaster data.

It was 45.7C (114F) at 12.30pm (0430 GMT).

Australia's highest recorded temperature, 50.7C (123F), was logged at the Pilbara's Onslow Airport on January 13, 2022.

In the West Australian town of Meekatharra, Royal Mail Hotel manager Alex McWhirter said the heat could "cook you alive".

"You have the sun beating down from above, you've got the hot ground heating you from below and it is quite a challenge," the 29-year-old English national said. "I'm not sure that I want to try and go to bed tonight in 50° without an aircon."

On the east coast, parts of New South Wales' capital Sydney were forecast to reach 40C, almost 10° above the average January maxi-

In the city's west, it was 37.9C (100F) at 3.30pm (0430 GMT).

The hot, dry conditions raised the risk of bushfires in some areas, the forecaster said, during the El Nino, which is typically associated with extreme phenomena such as wildfires, cyclones and droughts.

However, social media users criticised the use of taxpayer money by Marcos, the son and namesake of the late strongman president whose rule ended nearly four decades ago in a historic "people power" revolution. "Using official resources, like the presidential chopper, for personal and non-official activities is generally considered an abuse of power or misuse of government resources." Facebook user James Patrick Aristorenas said in a post on Saturday

"We paid for the use of the chopper, fuel and security, who knows even for the tickets for everyone," Facebook user Arvine Concepcion said. - Reuters

UK is taking election interference threats 'very seriously': minister

The UK is taking threats of foreign interference elections expected later this year "very seriously", the defence minister said yesterday, after a warning from a counter-terrorism official.

"Obviously, that's something that we take very seriously," Defence Secretary Grant Shapps told the Sky News channel.

Counter-terrorism bodies and other institutions would "be looking very carefully at that" he said.

UK counter-terrorism chief Matt Jukes said on Friday that the espionage threat from foreign states - such as China, Russia and Iran - is greater now than it has been "since the days of the cold war".

He said the police had set up a new unit to counter the threats of interference ahead of the election, which is expected to be called later this year.

UK to upgrade warship defence missile system used in Red Sea

The unit would use powers granted by the National Security Act passed in July to make it harder for countries to spy and interfere in the political process, he said.

"We are talking about parts of the state apparatus of Iran, China and Russia," Jukes

A report by US software company Microsoft in November last year said that Russia. Iran and China were likely to engage in sophisticated influence and interference efforts ahead of the 2024 US presidential election and in other pivotal elections

All three countries were expected to seek to shape geopolitical outcomes in their favour amid major ongoing or potential regional conflicts, the report said.

Interference efforts were likely to take place on different online platforms than

those targeted in elections in 2016 and

The counter-terrorism chief also warned that conflict in the Middle East had led to a surge in religious extremist activity and that the United Kingdom is facing "a radicalisation moment".

He said there had been a 25% increase in information flowing through police systems about terrorism and violent extremism, "a significant increase" on "usual levels".

"We always see spikes after terrorist incidents but what we've seen since October 7 has been a spike which is higher and more sustained than ever before," Jukes said in comments to local media. "I would describe the speed and the scale of the impact of those global events as extraordinary."

The defence ministry (MoD) has meanwhile said that it would spend £405mn (\$514mn) to upgrade a missile system now being used by the Royal Navy to shoot down hostile drones over the Red Sea.

The Sea Viper Air Defence system will be upgraded with missiles featuring a new warhead and software enabling it to counter ballistic missile threats, the MoD said in

The contracts were awarded to the British division of MBDA, a missiles joint venture owned by Airbus, BAE Systems and Leonardo, the MoD said.

"As the situation in the Middle East worsens, it is vital that we adapt to keep the UK, our allies and partners safe," Shapps said in the statement. "Sea Viper has been at the forefront of this, being the Navy's weapon of choice in the first shooting down of an aerial threat in more than 30 years."

US and British naval forces in the Red Sea have shot drones and missiles fired by Yemen's Houthi movement this month as the conflict between Israel and Hamas spilled out into the broader region.

India plans to fence off Myanmar frontier

'ndia plans to construct a fence along its vast and porous frontier with Myanmar and will scrap a free movement border zone agreement, Indian media reported yes-

The announcement by Home Minister Amit Shah comes after hundreds of troops from Myanmar fleeing insurgent attacks crossed into India.

The government had "decided to fence the entire open India-Myanmar border", Shah said on Saturday during a visit to the northeastern state of Assam.

The frontier stretches for more than 1,200km (750 miles), ranging from remote jungle to soaring snow-capped Himalayan

Shah, who gave no details of a timeframe or how the fence would be built, said the government would also end a free movement agreement.

The deal allows those living in border zones to venture a short distance into each other's territory without a visa.

Many in the border zones share close cultural and religious ties. "We are going to end this facility," Shah


said, according to a video posted by the Times of India.

2,000km of its border with Pakistan, and at least 3,100km with Bangladesh, according to government statistics from 2021.

Parts of Myanmar near the Indian border have seen frequent clashes since Arakan Army (AA) fighters attacked security forces in November, ending a ceasefire that had largely held since a 2021 military coup.

Investigation under way after China school fire kills 13

uthorities in central China's Henan Province were looking yesterday into the cause of a night-time fire that killed 13 schoolchildren as they slept in a

The inferno, which took place at the Yingcai School in Yanshanpu village, was reported to the local fire department at 11pm (1500 GMT) on Friday and was put out around 40 minutes later, official news agency Xinhua said.

Thirteen students died in the accident, while one other person suffered injuries. Dozens of police were in and around a

cordoned-off area near the school yesterday morning, AFP journalists saw.

An official at the scene told AFP: "There is an investigation ongoing inside. Nobody can go in."

Several windows on the side of the school were broken - the only obvious signs of a major accident at the building. Vertical metal bars covered the school's

windows, AFP saw, while a permanent sign on the building's facade read: "Enter the kindergarten happily and go home happily." A teacher at the school told state-run

Hebei Daily that all the victims were from the same third-grade class of nine and 10-year-olds.

Yesterday a row of shops next to the school stood mostly shuttered, while a small clinic in a crumbling courtyard building appeared unattended.

A few locals went about their day and a couple of children played as police cars made loops around the cordoned-off area. Some people passing by stared at the scene, and one man at an auto workshop across the street told AFP that he had been unaware of the fire until the following

Authorities in the area are investigating the fire's cause, and at least one person linked to the school has been detained, Xinhua reported on Saturday.

No official explanation of the precise cause of the deadly blaze has yet been provided, although some domestic media reports suggested it was related to an electric heating device.

Yanshanpu village lies on the outskirts of Nanyang, a city of nearly 10mn people about 850km west of Shanghai.

Little information about the boarding school is publicly available, though social

media videos published before the tragedy showed young children including kindergarteners wearing smocks with the school's logo as well as older children learning calligraphy.

Fires and other deadly accidents are common in China due to lax safety standards and poor enforcement.

In November, 26 people died and dozens were sent to hospital after a fire at a coal company office in northern China's Shanxi province.

The month before, an explosion at a barbecue restaurant in northwestern China left 31 dead and prompted official pledges of a nationwide campaign to promote workplace safety.

In April, a hospital fire in Beijing killed 29 people and forced desperate survivors to jump out of windows to escape.

Kidnapped Nigerian sisters rescued after outcrv

Briton convicted of murder in France dies in Ireland

A British journalist convicted in his absence by a Paris court over the 1996 murder of a Frenchwoman died yesterday, his lawyer told Irish

Sentenced to 25 years in prison in 2019 for the death of Sophie Toscan du Plantier, lan Bailey consistently maintained his innocence and lived in Ireland, which refused to extradite him. Bailey, 66, died yesterday in Bantry, southern Ireland, following an illness, according to broadcaster RTE, which added that his death was confirmed by his lawyer Frank Buttimer.

Bailey suffered two heart attacks last year, according the Irish Times newspaper.

The body of 39-year-old Toscan du Plantier, wife of film producer Daniel Toscan du Plantier, was discovered by a neighbour on December 23, 1996, outside a holiday home in southwestern Ireland.

Irish police soon after suspected Bailey, who was arrested in 1997 and again in 1998, but was never prosecuted in Ireland due to a lack

of evidence. A Paris trial, however, ruled that there was "sufficient evidence" linking Bailey to the crime. Multiple French extradition bids for Bailey were struck down by Irish courts. - AFP

Why high-fat and high-sugar foods are so irresistible, dieting challenging

Finally, researchers have identified distinct neural pathways in the brain for fat and sugar cravings. A study found that activating both fat and sugar circuits simultaneously leads to a significant increase in dopamine release and overeating in mice. This discovery provides key insights into why high-fat, high-sugar foods are so irresistible and why dieting can be challenging, opening new avenues for developing anti-obesity strategies.

The research by a team at Monell Chemical Senses Center, a nonprofit independent scientific institute located at the University City Science Center campus in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, US, reveals that separate circuits in the vagus nerve, originating in the gut, communicate information about consumed fats and sugars to the brain, triggering dopamine release in the brain's reward centre.

"Food is nature's ultimate reinforcer," said Monell scientist Guillaume de Lartigue, PhD, lead author of the study, published in Cell Metabolism. "But why fats and sugars are particularly appealing has been a puzzle. We've now identified nerve cells in the gut rather than taste cells in the mouth are a key driver. We found that distinct gut-brain pathways are recruited by fats and sugars, explaining why that doughnut can be so irresistible."

Ultimately this research provides insights on what controls "motivated" eating behaviour, suggesting that a subconscious internal desire to consume a diet high in both fats and sugar has the potential to counteract dieting efforts. The team used cuttingedge technology to directly manipulate fat or sugar neurons in the vagus nerve system and demonstrated that both types of neurons

cause a dopamine release in the brain's reward centre in mice. They discovered two dedicated vagus nerve pathways: one for fats and another for sugars. These circuits, originating in the gut, relay information abou what we have eaten to the brain, setting the stage for cravings.

To determine how fats and sugars affect the brain, the team stimulated gut vagal nerves with light. This, in turn, induced the mice to actively seek stimuli, in this case food, that engage these circuits. The results indicated that sugar and fat are sensed by discrete neurons of the vagus nerve

and engage parallel but distinct reward circuits to control nutrientspecific reinforcement.

But the story doesn't end there. The team also found that simultaneously activating both the fat and sugar circuits creates a powerful synergy. "It's like a one-two punch to the brain's reward system," said de Lartigue. "Even if the total calories consumed in sugar and fats stays the same, combining fats and sugars leads to significantly more dopamine release and, ultimately, overeating in

This finding sheds light on why dieting can be so challenging. Human brains may be subtly programmed to seek out high-fat, high-sugar combinations, regardless of conscious efforts to resist. "The communication between our gut and brain happens below the level of consciousness," said de Lartigue. "We may be craving these types of food without even realising it."

The team predicts that this line of research offers hope for future development of anti-obesity strategies and treatments. Targeting and regulating gut-brain reward circuits could offer a novel approach to curb unhealthy eating habits. "Understanding the wiring diagram of our innate motivation to consume fats and sugars is the first step towards rewiring it," said de Lartigue.



trengthening relationship between Qatar and the Republic of Tatarstan is vitally important within the two nations' plans to expand partnerships and investments, particularly in the energy field, as Qatar maintains a privileged standing in oil, gas, and petrochemical markets at regional and global levels. The Republic of Tatarstan is one of the most critical Russian territories that produce oil, gas, and petrochemicals.



Ukraine market strike kills 27 in **Russian-held Donetsk**

strike on a crowded market in the Russian-occupied city of Donetsk in eastern Ukraine left at least 27 people dead and 25 wounded vesterday, Moscow-backed officials said.

Both Moscow and Kviv have accused each other of a sharp escalation in attacks on civilian areas in the past two months.

Shattered storefronts and broken glass could be seen in videos shared by Russian state media, along with what appeared to be bodies lying on the ground near-

"At the moment, information about 27 dead has been confirmed. At least 25 more people have been injured," said Denis Pushilin, head of the region's Russian-controlled administration.

He blamed Ukraine for the strike, calling it a "horrific" attack on a civilian area.

Ukraine did not immediately comment, and AFP was not able to immediately verify the circumstances of the attack.

Officials said the strike hit a

she heard an incoming projectile overhead, and hid under her market stall.

"I saw smoke, people screamed, a woman was crying," she told a local media outlet.

The toll marks one of the deadliest in Donetsk since Moscow People remove debris at a food market following a Ukrainian strike in Donetsk vesterday.

a fire at Novatek's terminal in the port of Ust-Luga. Personnel were evacuated," Aleksandr Drozdenko, governor of Leningrad Oblast, said.

He shared a photo showing firefighters spraying water on a large fire at the terminal. The RIA-Novosti news agency

Russia suspends operations at gas export terminal after drone strike

ovatek, Russia's largest liquefied natural gas producer, said yesterday it had been forced to suspend some operations at a huge Baltic Sea export terminal due to a fire started by what Ukrainian media said was a drone attack.

The giant Ust-Luga complex, located on the Gulf of Finland about 170km west of St. Petersburg, is used to ship oil and gas products to international markets. It processes stable gas condensate into light and heavy naphtha, jet fuel, fuel oil and gasoil, according to Novatek's website.

It was not clear how long the disruption would last, how many tankers would have to idle outside the port, and what the knock-on effect would be on international energy markets.

The Interfax-Ukraine news agency, citing unnamed sources, said the fire was the result of a special operation carried out by Ukraine's security services.

"The Ust-Luga Oil terminal in the Leningrad region is an important facility for the enemy. Fuel is refined there, which, among other things, is also supplied to Russian troops," it cited one source as say-

"A successful attack on such a terminal not only causes economic damage to the enemy, depriving the occupiers of the opportunity to earn money to wage war in Ukraine, but also significantly complicates the logistics of fuel for the Russian military."

Reuters could not confirm that the fire resulted from a Ukrainian drone attack.

If it did, such an attack would demonstrate Kviv's ability to conduct strikes deeper into Russia than usual using what are believed to be domestically produced drones at a time when it is on the defensive on the battlefield and struggling to secure as much Western financing as it wants.

Such an attack, the latest in a spate of apparent strikes in recent days targeting Russian energy facilities, would also raise awkward questions about the quality of Russian air defence systems around key infrastructure facili-

The incident, along with what Russia says was a Ukrainian artillery strike on civilians in a Russian-held city in eastern Ukraine that left at least 25 dead, could prompt wider Russian retaliation in a war which shows no sign of

Alexander Drozdenko, the Leningrad region's governor, said on the Telegram messaging app. that there had been no casualties at the Ust-Luga terminal and all workers had been safely evacuated. Russian news agencies reported that two storage tanks and a pumping station had been damaged, but that the fire had been brought under control.

Novatek said in a statement it had suspended some operations after the fire which it said was the result of "external influence."

"The technological process at Novatek-Ust-Luga has been stopped, and an operational headquarters has been established to eliminate the consequences. Damage assessment will be carried out later," the company

Russian news outlet Shot reported that local residents had heard a drone operating nearby followed by several explosions.

Russia and Ukraine have targeted each other's energy infrastructure in strikes designed to disrupt supply lines and logistics, each side seeking to demoralise the other.

On Friday, a drone attack hit an oil depot in Russia's western region of Bryansk, bordering Ukraine, for which Moscow

blamed Kyiv. That came a day after an attack on a Russian Baltic Sea oil terminal that Russian officials said was unsuccessful.

Baza, a Russian news outlet known for its security services contacts, posted footage on Telegram yesterday of large flames shooting into the sky over what appeared to be an industrial com-

Three international tanker ships were anchored near the Ust-Luga terminal, though there were no reports of damage to them from the fire, the St Petersburg-based Fontanka outlet said.

Drozdenko said a "high alert regime" had been introduced and that officials had gathered for an emergency meeting.

Tens of thousands flood protests against far-right in Germany

Tens of thousands gathered across Germany again yesterday to protest the far-right AfD, after it emerged that party members discussed mass deportation plans at a meeting of extremists. The influx of demonstrators was so large in Munich that organisers were forced to cancel a planned march and ask people to disperse for safety reasons.

Organisers said some 50,000 people had turned up to the demonstration, twice as many as were registered for the event. An earlier estimate announced to the crowd had put the figure at 200,000, according to an AFP journalist.

Police estimated a figure somewhere in the middle, around 100,000, according to the German daily Sueddeutsche Zeitung. Those who made it to the site of the planned protest carried signs saying "Nazis out" and "never again is now".

Some 250,000 people had already gathered in cities across the country on Saturday, according to ARD estimates. Demonstrations were called in some 100 locations across Germany from Friday through the weekend, including in Munich, Berlin and cities in the east of the country where the AfD has its strongholds. The wave of mobilisation against the far-right party was sparked by a January 10 report by investigative outlet Correctiv, which revealed

that AfD members had discussed the expulsion of immigrants and

'Four survivors' after Russian jet crashes in Afghan mountains

"non-assimilated citizens" at a meeting with extremists.

Four people survived and two are unaccounted for after a Russian plane crashed in mountainous northeastern Afghanistan, the air transport agency Rosaviatsia said yesterday.

The Falcon 10 business jet was believed to be carrying six people on a hospital flight from India to Uzbekistan and Russia before communication was lost on Saturday evening.

"Of the six people on board the aircraft, tentatively, four are alive. They have various injuries. The fate of two people is being clarified," Rosaviatsia said, citing the Russian embassy in Afghanistan. The RIA Novosti news agency said two passengers were Russians, one who was seriously ill, and the other her husband who had paid for the flight. The two-engine plane was built by France's Dassault in 1978 and owned by a company called Athletic Group and a private individual. A provincial government official in Afghanistan told AFP the aircraft came down in Badakhshan province, which borders China, Tajikistan and Pakistan. The area of the crash is eight hours by road from the provincial capital Faizabad, said Zabihullah Amiri, head of the provincial information department. Russian investigators announced the opening of a probe into the cause of the crash.

100th death anniversary of Lenin

Dozens of Russian communists gathered in Red Square yesterday to mark the 100th anniversary of Vladimir Lenin's death, in one of the few official events commemorating the Soviet founder. The centenary of the Bolshevik revolutionary's passing has largely been ignored by ordinary Russians, but Lenin continues to be venerated by those nostalgic for the USSR. "I came here to honour the memory of Vladimir Lenin – our leader, the founder of the Soviet state," said 47-year-old Yulia, one of many admirers who gathered outside Lenin's mausoleum in freezing temperatures. "His ideas lit the way for many revolutionaries, fighters for the bright future of the people, for justice," she told AFP. Attendees could be seen carrying portraits of the late leader and waving flags of the Russian Communist Party.

Haley woos independents in final New Hampshire push

om Mita, a 45-year-old nonprofit worker in Portsmouth, New Hampshire, is not registered with a political party. That makes him the perfect target for Nikki Haley, who needs independent voters for a chance to prevail in this pivotal primary state.

Mita is thinking about voting for Haley, he told a pair of door knockers who were canvassing on behalf of the former US ambassador to the United Nations outside his suburban home on Saturday, but

he isn't completely sold on her candidacy. He wants Haley, who has so far spared Donald Trump from some lines of attack, to go after him more aggressively. He considers Trump a threat to democracy for trying to overturn his 2020 election loss to Democratic President Joe Biden. If Haley pulls her punches, he may vote in the Democratic primary instead.

"It's really about stopping Trump," said Mita, standing outside his door, hands stuffed in his pockets, on a 19-degree Fahrenheit day. "Best scenario would be if she comes out and says that she won't endorse Trump for president."

Voters like Mita, who are unaffiliated with either major party, will be crucial to Haley if she is to pull off an upset and beat Trump in New Hampshire, which holds its primary tomorrow. She likely needs a victory here or a very close second to survive, following her third place finish behind Trump and Florida Governor Ron DeSantis last week in Iowa.

Voters untied to either party are the state's most important bloc. They account for 343,000 of all registered voters, eclipsing both the number of registered Republicans and Democrats, according to

data from the secretary of state. Unaffiliated voters are allowed to participate in the primary of their choice. About 30% are effectively Republicans, 35% align with Democrats, and 35% are truly independent, estimates Andrew Smith, director of the University of New Hampshire Survey Center and a political science professor.

Given Trump's stranglehold on the Republican base, Haley will need to secure the support of 70% to 75% of unaffiliated voters in order to win the state, he said.

"That's never happened before," said Smith. "That's a really tall order."

While Haley has closed the gap with Trump in New Hampshire, the former president retains a comfortable lead of 14 percentage points according to an average of polls compiled by website FiveThirtyEight. Trump has in recent days sought to portray Haley's gains in state polls as improper because they reflect growing support among independents. He has also falsely claimed registered Democrats would be allowed to

vote in the Republican primary. Chris Ager, chair of the state Repub-

lican party, noted that Trump himself benefited from the backing of independent voters when he won New Hampshire in 2016, reviving his campaign after a loss in Iowa. Ager thinks Trump will win but gives Haley an outside shot.

"Nikki Haley could win New Hampshire," he told a media roundtable hosted by Bloomberg in Manchester on Saturday. "The undecideds can break very late."

Haley's bid could be boosted by a super PAC formed to persuade right-leaning independents in New Hampshire to support her. The group, Independents Moving the Needle, has been airing a number of supportive ads on local television.



DI organises two-day symposium on The Gulf Novel: Parallel Sociology

he Doha Institute for Graduate Studies (DI), represented by the Gulf and Arabian Peninsula Studies Unit, organised a symposium on The Gulf Novel: Parallel Sociology from January 20-21.

The afternoon session on January 21, titled "The Other in the narrative in Gulf societies: The Other and the narrator", was moderated by Gulf Times Editor-in-Chief Faisal al-Mudahka.

"In this session, we will talk about Gulf literature, specifically the Gulf novel, which took a romantic turn at its beginning," he said in his introduction. "The novel Shahanda by Rashid Abdullah from the Emirates may be one of the first clear examples of this trend."

"The Gulf novel touched on the transition from desert and sea life to city life after the discovery of oil, which moved Gulf society from the simplicity and harshness of life to the complexity, spaciousness and improvement of the city, as well as the standard of living and education," al-Mudahka said.

"One such work is the novel Cities of Salt, by the Saudi novelist Abdul Rahman al-Manif, which is one of the most famous Arabic novels, depicting life with the beginning of the discovery of oil and the rapid transformations that befell the cities and villages of the Arabian Peninsula," he continued. Al-Mudahka

Mageb al-Adwani, professor of Criticism and Theory in the Department of Arabic Language and Literature at King Saud University in Riyadh's College of Humanities and Social Sciences, and Prof Maisa al-Khawaja, associate professor of Literature and Criticism in the Department of Arabic Language at King Saud University."

Prof al-Khawaja said that her idea "revolves around how the novel can depict societal transformations and present a vision about a society, and that among the

questions and problems that such seminars can raise is the idea of identity and that of 'Other'".

"My paper concerns those who lived in Saudi Arabia, in Jeddah specifically, and wrote about Saudi society," she continued. "Therefore the idea was about how to create their own identity, and also how to formulate an image of Saudi society."

"Is this picture imaginary or an approximate picture of what is happening in society, and is it exclusionary?" Prof al-Khawaja posed. "All of this is included within the work of fiction and how it is presented through the characters, through cultural discourse or patterns that exist within the work of fiction

"The period that I am studying is related to the transformation in Saudi society, and the entry into what is called the awakening and the dominance of the clergy, etc., and how these people responded to some laws and some regulations related to dealing with others," she said.

"But the idea is that they are the ones who are writing by themselves and trying to create an identity that distinguishes them, or perhaps includes them under the dominant category of society in which

they live," Prof al-Khawaja continued. "I was exposed more to cultural patterns related to religious discourse, racist discourse, the relationship between men and women, and self-discovery and identity and how one rediscovers oneself by discovering one's own identity, for example, that he is Eritrean and not Saudi or half-Saudi, as he expresses it."

Prof al-Adwani presented six literary works and stressed that the novel does not relate to reality at all, especially in relation to the representation of the Western or Eastern "Other". In the novel Grandma Nina and I, he

pointed to the great symbolic aspect and ow good triumphs over evil, stressing that the language of this novel was characterised by simplicity and was based on simple narration.

The successful debate, he said, is the one that depends on simplicity in this novel, which shows the relations between a Russian and a Jew among its characters, and openness to Russian culture.

At the conclusion of the session, the speakers agreed that the "Other" is a linguistic event or linguistic fact, so that the issue remains relative.

QRCS distributes winter aid in Yemen

The representative office of the Qatar Red Crescent Society (QRCS) in Yemen has implemented a winterisation aid distribution project to meet the needs of 6,000 most vulnerable families in Sana'a, Taiz, Ma'rib, Ibb, and Dhale, at a cost of \$274,466 (QR1,000,428).

The project, under the QRCS's "Warm Winter campaign" with the theme Humanity First, Hope for Warmth, involved two phases, comprising distribution of 2,700 winterisation kits containing blankets and mattresses, and distribution of winter clothes for the benefit of 3,300 children.

During the inauguration ceremony in Ma'rib, Ali al-Marqat, Shelter Sector Officer at the governorate's executive unit for internally displaced people (IDPs), said: "This aid will be handed over to the poor IDPs in Al-Wadi and Al-Madina districts and help cover some of the winter needs of poor people in the governorate."

"Ma'rib is a desert governorate where the temperature drops sharply during the winter," he explained. "Hosting approximately 2.2mn IDPs, it needs more projects and humanitarian aid in food, medicine, and shelter. We call upon the QRCS to provide more aid for the governorate, which bears the burden of 70% of IDPs in the entire country."

In Taiz, Nabil Jamil, the director-general of Planning and International Co-operation in the governorate, said: "The QRCS has significant interventions and is at the heart of health, shelter, and water priorities in Taiz."

The QRCS allocated 650 winterisation kits for some medical and social organisations, including the Sana'a-located Al-Amal Hospital for Psychiatric and Addiction Treatment.

Dr Mohamed Ibrahim al-Qashar, assistant general manager of the hospital, said: "Working against the scarce resources, we are trying to continue to receive the patients, offer high-quality services, and hire senior consultants and specialists. I would like to thank the QRCS for their continuous support."

The protracted conflict in Yemen is one of the world's worst humanitarian crises.

According to the International Organisation for Migration, it forced 4.1mn Yemenis to flee their homes and face difficult living conditions at camps.

With the winter, challenges become even more serious, including harsh weather conditions and lack of adequate household needs.
