

Israel faces growing pressure to end war

25,490 Gazans, 70% of them women and children, massacred 24 Israeli soldiers killed in deadliest day for troops in Gaza

srael yesterday said 24 soldiers died in the biggest single-day losses since the start of its ground war in Gaza amid growing pressure on the government to end the conflict.

Israel's army said 21 of the 24 troops killed were reservists slain when rocket-propelled grenade fire hit a tank and two buildings they were trying to blow up. Minister Benjamin

Netanyahu said an investigation was launched into the "disaster" and that Israel "must learn the necessary lessons".

Israela Oron, of the Ben-Gurion University in the Negev, said the mounting toll of soldiers killed now 221 - since Israel launched its ground offensive in Gaza will heap pressure on the government.

On the ground, fighting raged in Khan Yunis, southern Gaza's main city, which the Israeli army said it had "encircled". Gaza's Hamas-run health ministry said Israeli tanks fired on Nasser hospital in Khan Younis,

with "dozens expected wounded". The Palestinian Red Crescent said Israeli forces had hit its headquarters in Khan Younis "resulting in injuries among internally displaced individuals who sought

safety on our premises". UN agencies and aid groups have sounded the alarm about the growing threat of disease and famine in Gaza, where 1.7mn people are estimated to have been up-

Israel has carried out a relentless offensive since October 7 that has killed at least 25,490 people in Gaza, around 70% of them women, young children and adolescents. according to the health ministry in the Hamas-run territory.

Netanyahu's vow to destroy Hamas is increasingly seen within the cabinet as incompatible with returning hostages, experts say. Page 7

The next generation of the WISE Prize for Education shifts its focus from recognising exemplary work in the field of education to facilitating the development of breakthrough programmes or products with potential to transform global education systems.

After a rigorous screening process, a group of finalists will embark on their innovation journeys, benefitting from monetary support and tailored mentorship from WISE, to convert their proposed ideas into tangible solutions. The 12-month programme will cul-

minate at the next edition of the WISE Summit in 2025, which will showcase the pioneering solutions. The finalists will compete for a \$1mn prize to further advance their solutions and the selection will be made live at the summit.

Accelerate foundational literacies: Create a personalised learning tool to accelerate basic literacy and numeracy skills, particularly in under-resourced areas.

Address challenges in AI: Design a tech-based intervention to equip youth with skills to navigate challenges of increasing presence in an AI-driven market and society, such as biases and disinfor-

Qatar attends meetings of WHO Executive Board

atar is taking part in the meetings of the 154th session of the World Health Organisation (WHO) Executive Board, which started in Geneva on Monday and continues through Jan 27. HE the Minister of Public Health and Chairperson of WHO Executive Board Dr Hanan Mohamed al-Kuwari heads Qatar's delegation to the meetings.

In her opening speech, HE Dr al-Kuwari stressed that the year 2023, which coincided with the 75th anniversary of the founding of the WHO, was a very important year for the organisation, as it saw the affirmation of its role and its commitment to promoting its strength and funding.

She pointed out that the current year is equally important to demonstrate the values and commitment of the WHO to work towards promoting and protecting the health of all people. HE Dr al-Kuwari also pointed out that the

informal meeting of the Executive Council of the WHO, which was hosted by Qatar early last month, provided the opportunity for an in-depth review of some critical priority issues in the current session of the Executive Board, including the drafting of the 14th General Programme of Work, sustainable financing, negotiations for the International Compact on Epidemics, the mechanism for

electing regional directors, and necessary reforms.

Such issues are of great importance in shaping the global health agenda and strengthening governance in the future, she said. The Executive Board meeting is being held while the world is going through very difficult time, as conflicts are occurring in different countries, health facilities are affected and often destroyed, and a number of health professionals have been injured or killed, HE Dr al-Kuwari said.

She indicated that the members of the Executive Board held a special session on the Dec 10, to discuss the conflict in Palestine and reached a consensus on a resolution calling for, among other things, ensuring respect and protection for all medical and humanitarian workers in the region. For his part, WHO Director-General Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said in his opening remarks that the dawning of a new year gives the opportunity to look forward with hope, and to look back on the vear that has been.

The event, titled "The Role of the Private Sector in Sustainability" and organised by Kuwait Pavilion's commissioner general Samira al-Kandari, featured three presentations that tackle the importance of working towards a sustainable and environmentally responsible future.

A lecture by Gulf Bank titled "Environmental, Social, and Corporate Governance and Sustainability Progress," delivered by Corporate Communications' deputy general manager Ahmed al-Ameer, underlined a comprehensive set of standards and components to enhance governance management strategies.

He unveiled Gulf Bank's pioneering Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) strategy for 2030 and presented the Sus-

tainability Progression report. He noted that the bank financed (external) \$1 billion in projects classified as "environment friendly."

Internally, Gulf Bank show-cased its commitment to sustainability with initiatives such as branch and head office refurbishments, featuring sustainable elements, a shift towards paperless operations, centralised printers, reusable water bottles for employees, and substantial efforts in electronic and material recycling. The "Rebag" initiative was also introduced to encourage the adoption of reusable shopping bags, described as a crucial step towards positive change.

The conference further explored responsible banking with a lecture by Kuwait Finance House (KFH), titled "Responsible Banking to Achieve Sustainable Growth," which was presented by Mohamed al-Arbeed, executive manager of Governance and Sustainability.

He said KFH is known for its pioneering role in Islamic Finance and Shariah-compliant

banking, noting the importance of banking policies and procedures in ensuring the accurate implementation of sustainable growth strategies.

Al-Arbeed said a Memorandum of Understanding between KFH and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) was signed, aimed at strengthening alignment with Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Under the agreement, UNDP will provide technical support of facilitate investments that align with SDGs through key instruments such as SDGs impact standards and the Green Sukuk framework.

The third lecture of the conference, presented by Engineer Bashayer al-Maraghi from Equate Company, focused on "Reducing the Carbon Footprint at the Source." She outlined Equate's efforts, particularly in polyethylene and ethylene glycol plants, to decrease the use of feed streams contributing to emissions. The goal is to minimise the carbon footprint at its source, aligning with global efforts to combat climate change.

Govt forum discusses upgrading communications sector in Qatar

Qatar Cancer Society (QCS) chairman Sheikh Dr Khalid bin Jabr al-Thani has announced that a new strategic plan 2025-2027 is being processed, prepared and developed with Averroes company.

The project aims to formulate QCS' strategic direction, determine the results and strategic objectives, prepare the roadmap, design performance indicators, matrix and as well as prepare the executive plan for the initiatives of the first year of the plan.

QMC holds workshop on public speaking

The Qatari Media Centre (QMC) of the Ministry of Culture organised a training workshop under the title "Art of public speaking and influence."

The workshop, presented by journalist Abdullah Hamdan, addressed several topics, including charisma and building the speaker's personality, building international content, defining the concept of content in general, and about how a speaker can build content suitable for presentation in various media outlets.

The workshop also discussed body language and its importance in presentation, explanation and definition, in addition to the concept of vocal colouring and the necessity of adjusting the rhythm and timbre of the voice with the nature of speech, which contributes to increas-



ing the area of influence on the viewer or listener. In addition, the workshop focused on the methods of persuasion and inspiration that the media speaker should master.

QMC director Iman al-Kaabi said the centre organises several workshops and training courses, which primarily aim to offer qualitative training for those in the media field, alongside those

who desire to join this field, as well as to upgrade their capabilities. She stressed that these training courses and workshops are provided free of charge, and those who wish to benefit, must follow the digital platforms of the Qatar Media Centre, learn about these courses and workshops, and register for them in a way that suits their needs. Ministry aims to protect Al Karaana Lagoon with public awareness drive

The Ministry of Environment and Climate Change (MoECC) has installed surveillance cameras and information boards at Al Karaana Lagoon as part of a campaign to raise public awareness about the importance of preserving biodiversity and the natural ecological system in the lagoon, which is abundant with migratory birds.

The installations are in collaboration with the Public Works Authority (Ashghal). This campaign is part of the ministry's plans to protect and activate the role of natural reserves in mitigating the effects of climate change and educating the public on proper environmental practices.

The information boards in Arabic, English and Urdu aim to introduce the visitors to the artificial lagoon of Al Karaana and on the importance of preserving all living organisms in the lagoon, and avoid causing any harm to the migratory birds, in addition prohibiting fishing. These boards include excerpts from ministerial decisions related to environmental conservation, reminding people to avoid prohibited practices that harm the ecological system.

Mohamed al-Khanji, director of the Wildlife Development Department at MoECC, stressed that the campaign aims to familiarise people with the Ministerial Decision No 4 of 2002, which regulates the hunting of animals, birds, and wild reptiles within reserves, islands, cities, and villages. Al Karaana Lagoon is a no-hunting zone due to its biodiversity, serving as a habitat for many migratory birds that choose Qatar as a breeding ground and a station during migration.

The official explained that the campaign, in co-ordination with various entities concerned, will continue in the future. The surveillance cameras will monitor the place round-the-clock.

Engineer Hassan Mohamed al-Mohammadi, with the Sewerage Networks Operation and Maintenance Department – Assets Affairs – Ashghal, said that "mitigation and adaptation policies are crucial in addressing climate change and thus continuous co-



ordination with the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change is maintained."

Engineer al-Mohammadi stressed the collective responsibility of individuals and institutions to preserve the active and effective environmental system in these reserves, reducing human-caused damages and climate change impact. Co-ordination is ongoing to expand the awareness campaign to cover 21 other artificial lakes in the coming period, preparing information and warning boards based on MoECC database, and installing cameras in these sites to maintain better control.

Al Karaana Lagoon has been rehabilitated and holds more than 2.4mn cubic metres of clean water. It is considered a new habitat for wildlife, providing a natural and healthy environment for various bird and fish species. It is located 60km southwest of Doha.

theme of the discussion panel emphasises the role of partners, including the school. guardians, and the society, in the educational process to reaching the desired goals







Arab League Council backs joint Qatar-Egypt efforts for Gaza truce

The Council of the League of Arab States, at the level of permanent delegates, affirmed its support for the joint efforts of Qatar and Egypt aimed at reaching a permanent ceasefire and restoring life to normal in the

This came in the final statement issued by the meeting of the extraordinary session of the Arab League Council held in Cairo on Monday at the request of the State of Palestine, to discuss Israeli crimes and plans against the Palestinian people.

The statement condemned the continued crimes of Israeli occupation against the Palestinian people, targeting tens of thousands of civilians, and subjecting the Palestinian people in the Strip to a deadly siege that cuts off all means of life and the destruction of infrastructure, and stressed that these crimes in their entirety constitute the crime of genocide against the Palestinian people.

The statement also called on the US and the countries that support the Israeli aggression against the Palestinian people within the Security Council to adopt positions consistent with international law and international humanitarian law, and to call for a complete and sustainable ceasefire and obligate Israel to stop its aggression against the Palestinian people, warning of the danger of Israel's planning and committing the crime of forced displacement of about 2mn Palestinian citizens who have become displaced inside the Strip.

It stressed that the Arab countries will not allow the Nakba scenario of 1948 to be repeated, or the Israeli plans to displace the Palestinian people to succeed; and will take the necessary political, diplomatic, legal and economic steps to prevent it.

The statement called for the rapid implementation of Security Council Resolution No 2720 (2023) and taking urgent steps to allow the immediate, safe and unhindered delivery of humanitarian aid to the Gaza Strip, and to create the necessary conditions for a sustainable cessation of hostilities, and welcomed the decision of the UN secretary-general appointing a chief co-ordinator for Humanitarian Affairs and Reconstruction in Gaza.

The statement condemned the escalation of Israeli crimes in the occupied West Bank, including the systematic destruction of Pal-

estinian refugee camps and their infrastructure, as well as the daily incursions into dozens of Palestinian cities, villages and camps, the terrorism of Israeli settlers, the killing and wounding of hundreds of Palestinian citizens, the demolition of homes, and the arrest of thousands of Palestinians in inhumane conditions.

The statement also condemned the Israeli siege imposed on Al-Aqsa Mosque for more than a hundred days, which includes undermining the freedom of worship in the mosque, preventing worshippers from entering it, desecrating it, storming it, desecration and vandalising its contents.

It affirmed support for Jordan's custodianship of the Islamic and Christian holy sites in Jerusalem, stressing that the Blessed Al-Aqsa Mosque with its entire area of

144,000sq m, is a pure place of worship for Muslims, stressing that the Jordanian administration of the Jerusalem Endowments and the affairs of the Blessed Al-Aqsa Mosque are the legal authority.

The statement called on countries still providing weapons and ammunition to Israel to stop doing so, as these weapons are then used to kill Palestinian civilians and to destroy their cities, thus, making these countries com-

plicit in crime. Moreover, It called on countries whose citizens are participating with the Israeli occupation army and its crimes, to take the necessary legal measures to hold these citizens accountable

and prevent them from doing so.

The statement expressed the Arab League Council's appreciation for South Africa taking Israel to the International Court of Justice, urging more peace-loving and international law-abiding countries to follow suit. It also welcomed Libya joining the prosecution team.

It also appreciated the countries that referred the situation in Palestine to the International Criminal Court, and urged countries to provide justice to the victims and prevent the perpetrators from escaping punishment. The statement called on the international legal system to process swiftly and carry out its investigation professionally and impartially.

The statement called on states to

designate Israeli settler organisations on their terrorist lists, and to prevent the entry of Israeli settlers into their territories.

It also denounced the repeated Israeli attacks on Lebanese and Syrian territories, as an assault on the sovereignty of the Arab countries and a threat to the security of its citizens and to regional, international peace and security.

The statement stressed that the only way to achieve security, stability and peace in the region is for the Palestinian people to gain their freedom and independence by ending the Israeli occupation of the land of the State of Palestine occupied in 1967, with East Jerusalem as its capital, and enabling the State of Palestine to exercise its full sovereignty over its land, and enabling the Palestinian people to exercise all their legitimate and inalienable rights.

The statement affirmed its support for all the steps taken by Egypt to tackle the consequences of the brutal Israeli aggression against the Gaza Strip, supporting its efforts to bring aid into the Strip in an immediate, sustainable and adequate manner, and supporting the steps that Egypt is taking in defence of its national security, which is an essential part of Arab national security.

It welcomed Algeria's efforts as a non-permanent Arab member of the UN Security Council, including its call to hold an emergency public session of the Security Council to stop forced displacement in Gaza, and noted the unanimous consensus in the session on rejecting the policy of forced displacement.

It also commended the efforts of the UAE during its membership period extending from (2022/2023) as a non-permanent member of the Security Council, in following up on developments in the Palestinian issue and the Council's adoption of Resolutions 2712 (2023) and 2720 (2023).

Qatar participates in Arab League Council extraordinary meeting on Israeli crimes against Palestinians

atar participated in the the Arab League Council extraordinary meeting at the level of permanent delegates, to discuss Israeli crimes and schemes against the Palestinian people.

Held under Morocco's current Arab League Council chairmanship and at the request of the State of Palestine, the meeting took place at the Arab League in Cairo.

The Permanent Representative of Qatar to the Arab League Tariq Ali Faraj al-Ansari chaired the Qatari delegation.

Speaking at the meeting, al-Ansari paid tribute to the government and people of the State of Palestine and its timeless cause in the face of the Israeli occupation's crimes.

He expressed support for all efforts within legal and counter-criminal frameworks to bring about peace to the sisterly State of Palestine and for the Palestinian people to be granted their right to remain on their land and to be free, as

guaranteed by international law.

Al-Ansari stressed Qatar's firm position on the need to reach a peaceful settlement on the Palestine issue in all of its aspects, on the basis of international law and UN resolutions, whereby an end is put to the Israeli occupation and the two-state solution is materialised, establishing an independence, sovereign, and self-reliant Palestinian state on the 1967 borders with East Jerusalem as its capital. In addition, it was appealed to grant Palestinian people all of their inalienable rights based on the relevant UN Security Council resolutions and the Arab Peace

He noted that the Palestinian cause has strongly been at the forefront of Qatari policy, adding that Qatar's position is evident through its voting on UN resolutions, in addition to Qatar working side by side with Egypt on mediation efforts to reach a comprehensive ceasefire, with Qatar continuing to support a political solu-

tion based on a number of sisterly, friendly and peace-loving countries and partners' initiatives, not to mention Qatar's ongoing humanitarian aid delivery efforts.

Al-Ansari said Qatar sees reducing tensions as a priority for which it is making a lot of diplomatic efforts together with the various parties concerned. He added that this stems from Qatar's belief in the justice of the Palestinian cause. which remains a central issue for His Highness the Amir, the Qatari government, and the Qatari people, based on firm priorities, solid principles and moral values.

Al-Ansari called for Arab unity and expressed support for the draft resolution presented at the meeting regarding countering ongoing Israeli crimes against the Palestinian people, as well as supporting a follow-up of the resolution's implementation within the relevant committee. Iran's Raisi to visit Turkiye for delayed talks with Erdogan

'ranian President Ebrahim Raisi will pay an official one-day visit to Turkiye today for talks focused on the regional repercussions of the Israel-Hamas war, a diplomatic source said.

Raisi will meet Turkish counterpart Recep Tayyip Erdogan in the capital Ankara, making a visit that was postponed twice - once in November and once earlier this month - because of spiralling tensions across the Middle East.

Iran's official news agency IRNA said Raisi would lead a "high-ranking political and economic delega-

The visit comes amid growing fears about the regional repercussion of the war in Gaza, which Israel

launched in reprisal for the unprecedented October first week storming by Hamas fighters into Israel. In response, Israel has carried out a relentless of-

fensive that has killed at least 25,490 people in Gaza, around 70% of them women, children and adolescents, according to the health ministry in the Hamas-

Raisi vowed on Monday that Israel "will certainly pay" for the killing in Syria of a senior general with the Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC).

The US and Britain launched a second round of joint military strikes on Houthi rebels in Yemen yesterday in reprisal to their repeated attacks on Red Sea shipping.

Erdogan condemned the first round of strikes early this month as "disproportionate", accusing Washington and London of trying to turn the Red Sea into a "bloodbath".

Houthis order all US, British UN staff to leave Yemen

Yemen's Houthi rebels have ordered all US and British staff of the UN and its agencies to leave the country within a month, a UN official said, AFP reported from Dubai.

In a letter dated January 20 and shared on social media, the authorities in the Houthi-controlled capital Sanaa told the UN resident co-ordinator that employees with British and US nationality had one month to "prepare to leave the country".

"They must be ready to leave as soon as the deadline expires," the document said, adding that 24 hours' notice would be given by letter.

While they only control a fraction of Yemen's territory, the Huthis hold sway over most of the country's population centres.

A UN official confirmed to AFP that they had received the memo. "The UN and its partners have taken note of this and are waiting to see what are the next steps," said the official, who asked to remain anonymous. Peter Hawkins, the UN's humanitarian co-ordinator in Yemen, is himself British. The expulsion followed joint strikes by the US and Britain against the Houthis aimed at ending the group's attacks on commercial shipping in the Red

Sea and Gulf of Aden, threatening global trade.

The US has launched multiple further strikes and

yesterday carried out a second set of joint strikes

with Britain. Last week, Washington redesignated the Houthis a "global fighter group", having lifted it in 2021 to ease aid delivery to the country. The Houthis have fought a nearly decade-long civil war against government forces, who are backed by Saudi Arabia. The conflict plunged Yemen, into a deep humanitarian crisis, labelled among the worst in the world by the UN. Since mid-November. the rebels have launched missiles and drones from Yemen's coast aimed at shipping the group says is linked to Israel, in solidarity with the Palestinians in Gaza. Gaza is under siege by Israel, which aims to destroy Hamas after the group's surprise storming of the country in the first week of October The Houthis have reacted to the US and British strikes with defiance, targeting further ships. The US, Israel's major ally and provider of military equipment, has created an international coalition to patrol the Red Sea and protect commercial traffic. Maritime traffic through the Red Sea shipping route has fallen by 22% in a month due to attacks on international vessels by Yemen's Houthi rebels, the EU's trade commissioner said vesterday. "That decrease should be bigger now that shipping companies are rerouting their vessels around the Cape of Good Hope," Valdis Dombrovskis told journalists.

Risk of 'pockets of famine' in Gaza, says WFP

The World Food Programme said yesterday that very little food assistance has made it beyond southern Gaza since the start of the conflict and that the risk of pockets of famine in the Palestinian enclave remained.

Israel's offensive launched in the wake of a storming by Hamas fighters in southern Israel in the first week of October has displaced most of Gaza's

2.3mn population and caused acute shortages of food, water and medical supplies.

At least 25,295 people in Gaza have been killed, according to Palestinian authorities, with thousands more feared buried under the rubble of a coastal strip largely laid to waste.

"It's difficult to get into the places where we need to get to in Gaza, especially in northern Gaza," said Abeer Etefa, WFP spokesperson for the Middle

"Very little assistance has made it beyond the southern part of the Gaza Strip... I think the risk of having pockets of famine in Gaza is very much still there." Since the start of hostilities, aid deliveries to northern Gaza have been limited, and the area was cut off altogether from external aid for weeks earlier in the conflict. Etefa noted that there was a "systematic limitation on getting into the north of Gaza. not just for the WFP".

"This is why we're seeing people becoming more desperate and being impatient to wait for food distributions, because it's very sporadic," she said.

"They don't get it frequently, and they have no trust or confidence that these convoys will come

The UN humanitarian office (OCHA) also said this month Israeli authorities were systematically



denying it access to northern Gaza to deliver aid and this had significantly hindered the humanitarian operation there.

Israeli authorities have previously denied hampering aid and say they work to minimise harm to

Israel said on Monday said it was making efforts to help keeping hospitals running, delivering fuel and medical aid and that it expected more field hospitals to be established in the coming days.

OCHA said that in the first two weeks of January, humanitarian agencies had planned 29 missions to deliver essential supplies to areas to the north of Wadi Gaza in the northern part of the enclave.

Only 24% were carried out either fully or partially, which OCHA said represented a significant increase in denials compared with the previous months.

"These denials prevent a scale-up in humanitarian assistance and add significant cost to the overall response," OCHA said.

"The capacity of humanitarian agencies to operate safely and effectively also remains heavily compromised by the long-term restrictions applied by the Israeli authorities on the import of critical humanitarian equipment into Gaza."

EU top diplomat says Israel can't 'have veto' on Palestinian state

U foreign affairs chief Josep Borrell yesterday said that Israel cannot be allowed to unilaterally block the creation of a Palestinian state after the war in

"One thing is clear - Israel cannot have the veto right to the selfdetermination of the Palestinian people," Borrell told a Brussels press conference with his Egyptian counterpart.

"The UN recognises and has recognised many times the selfdetermination right of the Palestinian people. Nobody can veto it." The comments come after Borrell on Monday chaired talks between the EU's 27 foreign ministers and

the top diplomats from Israel, the Palestinian Authority and key Arab states

Borrell has floated a roadmap involving an international conference on a two-state solution and has said peace needs to be "imposed" on Israel.

Egyptian Foreign Minister Sameh Shoukry said there is "an international consensus on the necessity of resolving the conflict on the basis of a two state solution": "It is time to implement it and the international community has the means, has the resources, has the mechanisms to do so," he said.

Israeli Prime Minister Beniamin Netanyahu has drawn condemnation from the UN and defied key backer the US by rejecting calls for a Palestinian

state. Israel insists it is focused on its military operation in Gaza aimed at destroying the Hamas movement and freeing hostages captured during the storming in the first week of October.

The Gaza war broke out with Hamas' unprecedented storm-

Israel's relentless offensive in response has killed at least 25,490 people in Gaza, mostly women and children, according to the health ministry in the Hamas-run territory.

Shoukry warned that displacement of Gaza's population from the territory "will occur" if adequate humanitarian assistance is not allowed in.

"Making the conditions in Gaza unliveable in itself will induce displacements," he warned.

The Israeli military said they were "not aware of the event" when asked about firing at the hospital.

Khan Yunis has become the epicentre of fighting between Palestinian fighters and Israeli soldiers, who have pressed south over nearly three months of their ground offensive.

Gaza's health ministry accused Israeli forces of "cutting off Nasser medical complex, putting the lives of staff, personnel and displaced people at risk".

"Medical staff are unable to transport serious cases from Nasser medical complex to the Jordanian field hospital nearby as a result of relentless bombardment," a second ministry statement said.

The United Nations agency for Palestinian refugees said one of its

Swearing-in of Liberia's Boakai scrutinised after attendee death

iberian media speculated yesterday over the health of the country's new leader Joseph Boakai and the organisation of his inauguration after one man died and the president suffered "heat exhaustion" at the event. A 48-year-old Liberian man collapsed while

watching the ceremony reportedly due to heat exhaustion and he was later confirmed dead at a hospital in Monrovia. The Chief Medical Officer at JFK Memorial Hospital, Dr Sia Wata Camanor, confirmed to

AFP that Dauson Kamara, based in the US, was

declared "dead on arrival" but did not give further details. At Monday's event, the 79-year-old president also had to pause and sit down to finish his inaugural address after speaking for more than 30 minutes in front of foreign delegations and local officials outside the parliament.

The scheduled programme for the rest of the ceremony was abruptly cut short because of the incident. "Heat exhaustion contributed to the few minutes of disruption in his speech but the speech ended successfully and the president was advised by his doctors to come home as a result of that," Amos Tweh, secretary-general of Boakai's party, said on Monday.

The president was not taken to hospital and later resumed his "normal presidential duties," Tweh said. Boakai's age and health are the source of much discussion in the West African nation and his exhaustion on Monday prompted debate in local media and on social networks.

Some claimed the incident showed that

Boakai was too old to take office, while others blamed organisers for not providing adequate equipment to cool down guests.

An AFP correspondent at the ceremony, where the temperature was around 29 degrees Celsius, said the event appeared overcrowded and some guests were left without shade.

Boakai beat former Ballon d'Or winner Weah in November's run-off poll, with 50.64% of the

During his speech, the political veteran stressed unity, the fight against corruption, and pledged to improve basic services for Liberians.

He also said his government would explore the possibility of opening a War and Economic Crimes Court (WECC) for "those who bear the greatest responsibility for war crimes and crimes against humanity to account for their actions in court".

Nigeria's polluted economic hub Lagos bans styrofoam, plastics

Nigeria's Lagos State, which includes the country's sprawling economic capital of more than 20mn people, has announced a ban on styrofoam and single-use plastics to curb pollution, AFP reported from Lagos. The state government said in a statement Sunday the ban would take effect immediately but environmental experts said implementing and enforcing it could be complicated. Many street vendors and markets in Lagos use styrofoam containers

to serve and deliver food or produce and the plastic and other containers litter roads and block drains in the megapolis. "Following the menace which single-use plastics especially non-

biodegradable Styrofoam are causing on the environment, the Lagos State government... is hereby announcing a ban on the usage and distribution of Styrofoam and other single-use plastics." the Lagos environment commissioner said on X. Some Nigerians welcomed the initiative, but others questioned its implementation and what the alternative would be for traders and manufacturers.

Blinken seeks progress in West Africa with Ivory Coast as model

S Secretary of State Antony Blinken yesterday sought progress combatting coups and extremism in West Africa in talks with two key leaders, as he pointed to Ivory Coast as a model.

In a four-nation tour of African democracies as crises engulf the world, Blinken met separately yesterday with Nigerian President Bola Ahmed Tinubu, elected last year on a platform of economic reforms, and Ivorian President Alassane Ouattara, a veteran leader who has won US praise for consolidating democracy.

In Abidjan, Blinken hailed Ivorv Coast's stand against last year's coup in Niger and its approach of

"building security together" by investing economically to combat extremism in northern areas bordering Mali and Burkina Faso.

"I have to applaud the approach that's been taken by Cote d'Ivoire working with communities, listening to communities, making sure that their security forces understand the needs, the concerns of communities," Blinken said alongside Ouattara.

"I think that can serve as a very powerful model for other countries," he said.

Ivory Coast has not experienced a major terrorist attack for some two years, despite its troubled neighbourhood.

Ivory Coast, like its Gulf of Guinea coastal neighbours, Togo, Ghana and Benin, is wary of militant conflicts spilling over the region's

northern borders from the Sahel. Blinken promised to boost cooperation on the ground with Ivory Coast, largely through training of its security forces.

He also said that the US would provide an additional \$45mn to West African nations as part of a plan to battle instability, bringing total funding under the year-old programme to nearly \$300mn.

Ouattara expressed appreciation for the US assistance and voiced alarm over a spate of coups in West Africa.

"Like the US, we are very com-

mitted to democracy and justice," he said, promising that his government would do "everything possible to improve people's dayto-day lives." Nigeria is unlikely to receive similar praise for a nuanced approach on extremism, but the US has welcomed Tinubu's call for an inquiry after a recent Nigerian army drone strike killed 85 civilians by mistake.

Nigeria and Ivory Coast have largely stood by the US - as hasanother key partner, Kenya - despite unease in much of the continent over the Western focus on arming Ukraine and, more recently, US support for Israel in its war with Hamas. Their stance stands in contrast with another heavyweight, South Africa, which the US has accused of allowing arms shipments to Russia and which

most recently annoyed Washington by bringing a genocide case against Israel before the International Court of Justice.

Blinken will not travel to South Africa during his trip but he will visit Angola, which has transitioned from war to democracy and played a vital mediating role to end unrest in the neighbouring Democratic Republic of Congo.

On Monday Blinken stopped in Cape Verde, a long-standing partner of the US. He has sought to showcase a softer side during

On Monday, he also attended a critical football match in the Africa Cup of Nations between Ivory Coast and Equatorial Guinea, when his hosts gifted him an Ivorian orange jersey bearing his name.

North Korea's AI development raises sanctions concerns, says report

orth Korea is developing artificial intelligence (AI) and machine learning for everything from how to respond to Covid-19 and safeguard nuclear reactors to wargaming simulations and government surveillance, according to a new study.

International sanctions imposed over its nuclear weapons programme may have hindered North Korea's attempts to secure AI hardware, but it appears to be pursuing the latest technology, wrote study author Hyuk Kim of the James Martin Center for Nonproliferation Studies (CNS) in California.

"North Korea's recent endeav-

ours in AI/ML development signify a strategic investment to bolster its digital economy," Kim wrote in the report, which cited open-source information including state media and journals and was published on Tuesday by the 38 North project.

Some of North Korea's AI researchers have collaborated with foreign scholars, including in China, the report found. North Korea established the Artificial Intelligence Research Institute in 2013 and in recent years several companies have promoted commercial products featuring AI, the report said

Communications technology is heavily restricted and monitored in the authoritarian North.

During the Covid-19 pandemic North Korea used AI to create a model for evaluating proper mask usage and prioritising clinical symptom indicators of infection, Kim said in the report. North Korean scientists have also published research into using AI for maintaining the safety of nuclear reactors, the report added.

The UN nuclear watchdog and independent experts said last month that a new reactor at North Korea's Yongbyon nuclear complex appears to be operating for the first time, which would mean another potential source of plutonium for nuclear weapons. The AI development presents many challenges, Kim wrote. "For instance, North Korea's pursuit of a wargaming simulation program using (machine learning) reveals intentions to better comprehend operational

environments against potential adversaries," he wrote. "Furthermore, North Korea's ongoing collaborations with foreign scholars pose concerns for the sanctions regime."

North Korea has demolished a major monument in its capital that symbolised the goal of reconciliation with South Korea on the orders of leader Kim Jong-un, who last week called the rival a "primary foe" and said unification was no longer possible.

Satellite imagery of Pyongyang on Tuesday showed that the monument, an arch symbolising hopes for Korean reunification which was completed after a landmark inter-Korea summit in 2000, was no longer there, according to a report by NK News, an online outlet that monitors North Korea. Reuters

could not independently confirm that the monument, known informally as the Arch of Reunification. had been demolished. Kim called the monument an "eyesore" in a speech at the Supreme People's Assembly on Jan. 15, where he ordered that the constitution be amended to say the South was a "primary foe and invariable principal enemy," official media said. Tensions have spiked on the Korean peninsula following intensifying military manoeuvres by the South Korean and US militaries in response to weapons testing by the North, which said it was readying for a "nuclear war'

The arch, formally known as the Monument to the Three Charters for National Reunification, stood 30m tall and was symbolic of the

with its enemies.

three charters, which were selfreliance, peace and national co-operation, according to South Korean government records, South Korean President Yoon Suk-yeol who took office in 2022 has taken a hard line against the North, calling for immediate and tough responses to North Korea's military actions that have raised tensions on the Korean peninsula. North Korea has vowed to "wipe out" the South if attacked by the South and US forces. Late last year, the North declared as no longer valid a key agreement signed with the South in 2018 aimed at deescalating military tensions.

Following Kim's speech last week, the North's assembly abolished key government agencies that have been instrumental to decades of exchanges with Seoul.

3 dead, dozens hurt in quake on China-Kyrgyzstan border

hree people were killed and dozens injured after a 7.0-magnitude earthquake struck along the mountainous China-Kyrgyzstan border yesterday, authorities said. The major quake was registered just after 2am at a depth of 13km in China's Xinjiang region, about 140km west of the city of Aksu.

Local authorities dispatched a team to the quake's epicentre, Beijing's Xinhua state news agency said, while around 800 people were on standby for any large disaster relief mission.

The earthquake caused three deaths, while five other people sustained injuries, Chinese state broadcaster CCTV reported yesterday evening. CCTV added that "12,426 people in the disaster area have been relocated" as rescue and relief efforts continue.

The health ministry in Kazakhstan said earlier that 44 people suffering "various" injuries had sought medical help in Almaty, the country's largest city. Images posted on social media and by local news outlets showed citizens streaming outside following the quake. In China's Akqi County, six people suffered injuries – two of which were "serious" – according to a Weibo post by a Xinjiang government media account.

A total of 47 buildings in the county collapsed, while a further 78 were damaged, the post said.

Two residential houses and livestock sheds collapsed in the

area near the epicentre, in rural Wushi County, Xinhua reported, while electricity was temporarily knocked out. Video circulating on Chinese social media showed household appliances crashing to the floor as wild shaking rocked homes.

More footage shared by state broadcaster CCTV showed firemen entering a damaged building with cracked walls and police helping an injured local. Local TV channels in the Indian capital New Delhi reported strong tremors in the city, about 1,400km away.

One Aksu resident told Xinhua that people rushed outside for safety during the shaking despite the frigid early morning temperatures hovering around -10C. Cao Yanglong, in the city on a business trip, told the state news agency that while on the 21st floor of a hotel, he felt like he was "going to be shaken out of bed". People also fled their homes to seek refuge in the street in Kyrgyzstan's capital Bishkek, according to an AFP reporter, after the quake caused walls to shake and furniture to shift.

Bohobek Azhikeev, head of the Kyrgyz Ministry for Emergency Situations, said in a video message that "no casualties or damage have been registered" in the city. Five villages are located within 20km of the epicentre, according to Xinhua, and a slew of small aftershocks followed in the area, with magnitudes as high as 5.5.

And yesterday morning the Kazakh seismological agency reported two new tremors of magnitude 5.2 and 5.3 around 10am local time in the same area. The tremors were felt in

Almaty, where schools were closed, according to an AFP correspondent. Yesterday's earthquake came the day after a landslide killed at least 31 people and buried several others in the southwest of China. A December quake in the northwest of the country killed 148 peoand displaced thousands in Gansu province. That quake was China's deadliest since 2014, when more than 600 people were killed in southwestern Yunnan province.

In the December earthquake, subzero temperatures made the aid operation launched in response even more challenging, with survivors huddled around outdoor fires to keep warm.

31 dead in southwest China landslide

the death toll from a landslide that struck a remote and mountainous part of southwestern China reached 31 yesterday, state media said, as rescuers raced to find those still trapped under the debris.

The pre-dawn landslide buried 18 homes and sparked the evacuation of more than 200 people when it struck in Zhenxiong county, Yunnan province early Monday.

Nearly 36 hours since the disaster, 31 people have been confirmed dead, state news agency Xinhua said. An earlier report yesterday afternoon by state broadcaster

CCTV, which announced the toll had risen to 20, added that 24 people were still missing at that time. Xinhua said rescue workers were in a "race against time" to find those still missing, after a night of sub-zero temperatures.

"Search and rescue efforts persisted through the night," firefighter Li Shenglong told Xinhua.

Wu Junyao, director of the natural resources and planning bureau of Zhaotong, told Xinhua that the disaster "resulted from a collapse in the steep cliff area atop the slope". Two hundred rescue workers have been dispatched to the scene as well as dozens of fire engines and other equipment.

The site was covered in thick snow and rescuers were "using all kinds of tools to

search for survivors", Xinhua reported. Wu said the rescuers were digging through collapsed debris of "100 metres in width, 60 metres in height, with an average thickness of around 6 metres".

CCTV showed footage of rescue workers digging through twisted metal and concrete overnight in a bid to find survivors. Other CCTV footage showed locals huddling for warmth around a fire in a shelter, eating instant noodles. People from the surrounding area have chipped in to help with relief efforts, state media said.

"Our main focus is on distributing supplies, cooking, and delivering food to those in need," Hong Jie, a 38-year-old resident of a nearby village, told Xinhua. Chinese President Xi Jinping on Monday ordered "all-

out" rescue efforts. Landslides are common in Yunnan, a far-flung and largely impoverished region of China where steep mountain ranges butt against the Himalayan plateau. Monday's disaster occurred in a rural area surrounded by towering peaks dusted with snow, state media footage showed. China has experienced a string of natural disasters in recent months, some following extreme weather events such as sudden, heavy downpours.

Rainstorms last September in the southern region of Guangxi triggered a mountain landslide that killed at least seven people, according to media reports. In August, heavy rains sparked a similar disaster near the northern city of Xi'an, killing more than 20 people.

change to constitution to match 'globalised world'

Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos Jr said the country's constitution should be changed to support the economy and was "not written for the globalised world", as the country's senate criticised efforts to amend it as "sinister and underhand".

Marcos, in an interview with GMA News TV aired yesterday, said the economic provisions of the 1987 constitution, introduced after the overthrow of his father and namesake after two decades in power, must be changed to attract more foreign investors.

While he was not closing doors to amending political provisions, Marcos said the priority should be economic parts of the constitution to ease curbs and lure foreign businesses. Certain provisions, such as limits on ownership by foreign firms, have been criticised by some international businesses as protectionist and favouring local conglomerates.

However, some opponents of constitutional change say it is driven by an agenda to change the political system and remove term limits, including that of the president, who can currently serve just one, six-year term.

Yesterday, the Senate in a manifesto signed by all of its 24 members, including the sister of Marcos, condemned what it described as "sinister and underhanded attempt" to change the constitution without the senate's participation and vowed to thwart it. "Throughout Philippine history, the Senate has always been one of the first targets by those who seek to undermine our country's democracy," it said.

'Does not endorse Taiwan independence, seeks to avoid conflict'

Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos Jr said he does not endorse Taiwan independence and reiterated his country was committed to its One-China policy, a response to China's outrage over recent remarks in congratulating Taiwan's election winner. Marcos said in an interview with GMA News TV aired yesterday that his congratulatory comment to Lai Ching-te earlier this month, where

was a "common courtesy".

"The One-China policy remains in place. We have adhered to the One-China policy strictly and conscientiously since we adopted

he referred to him as president.

(it)," Marcos said.
"We are not endorsing Taiwanese independence. Taiwan is a province of China."

The congratulatory message, however, drew a sharp rebuke from China, with its foreign ministry spokesperson telling Marcos last week to "read more books to properly understand the ins and outs of the Taiwan issue".

UN expert slams Britain's 'severe crackdown' on climate activists

nvironmental activists face a severe crackdown in Brit-ain, a UN expert warned yesterday, lamenting that peaceful protesters face long prison terms and are the targets of "toxic discourse". Michel Forst, the UN special rapporteur on environmental defenders, said he had received "extremely worrying information" during a recent visit to Britain about "an increasingly severe crackdown".

"Regressive laws" were being used to slap environmental and climate activists with severe penalties, "including in relation to the exercise of the right to peaceful protest", he warned in a statement.

Forst, an independent expert appointed by the UN Human Rights Council but who does not speak on behalf of the United Nations, stressed that "the right to protest is a basic human right".

"It is also an essential part of a healthy democracy," he said.

British police were controversially granted anti-protest powers by the government last year following several years of disruptive demonstrations by

environment activists. Forst said peaceful demonstrators are being prosecuted under the 2022 Police, Crime, Sentencing and Courts Act for the criminal offence of "public nuisance", punishable by up to 10 years behind

In addition, the 2023 Public Order Act is being used "to further criminalise peaceful protest", he said.

Last month, for instance, a peaceful climate protester who took part in an approximately 30-minute slow march on a public road was sentenced to six months in prison. Forst stressed it had hitherto been "almost unheard of since the 1930s for members of the public to be imprisoned for peaceful protest in the UK". The expert also said it was incomprehensible that some judges were barring "environmental defenders from explaining to the jury their motivation" for protesting "or from mentioning climate change at all".

He voiced alarm at harsh bail conditions slapped on environmental protesters while they await trial, including bans on further protests or having contact with others in their move-

Some activists were also re-

quired to wear electronic ankle tags or GPS trackers. Currently, "environmental defenders may be on bail for up to two years from the date of arrest to their eventual

criminal trial," he said. Forst said environmental activists were frequently publicly derided in British media and by politicians, placing them at heightened risk of threats, abuse and physical attacks. This "toxic discourse", he warned, "may also be used by the state as justification for adopting increasingly severe and draconian measures against environmental defend-

"We are in the midst of a triple planetary crisis of climate change, biodiversity loss and pollution. Environmental defenders are acting for the benefit of us all," Forst said. A spokeswoman for Britain's Home Office told AFP: "The right to protest is a fundamental part of our democracy but we must also protect the law-abiding majority's right to go about their daily lives.

"While decisions on custodial sentences are a matter for the independent judiciary, the Public Order Act brings in new criminal offences and proper penalties for selfish, guerrilla protest tactics," the interior ministry added.

N Ireland devolved govt deadline extended again

missed deadline to hold an election in Northern Ireland unless the region's long-suspended devolved government is restored was extended by the British government yesterday to February 8. The previous deadline expired last Thursday with the Democratic Unionist Party, the province's largest pro-UK party, still undecided on whether to end its almost two-year boycott of the Northern Ireland Assembly executive, known as Stormont, over post-Brexit trading rules.

"Tomorrow (Wednesday) I will

be introducing the Northern Ireland (Executive Formation) Bill to allow for the reformation of Stormont," said Northern Ireland Secretary Chris Heaton-Harris on X, formerly Twitter.

"The bill only has a single clause: to extend the period of time Stormont can legitimately come back until the 8th February."

The DUP, which collapsed the power-sharing executive by walking out in February 2022, says that Northern Ireland's place in the wider United Kingdom is diminished by rules within a "Windsor Framework" trade deal agreed between London and the European Union. It fears the new rules cuts Northern Ireland adrift from the rest of the country, making a united Ireland more likely.

The first minister-designate of the assembly is Michelle O'Neill, from the nationalist party Sinn Fein. She called on DUP leader Jeffrey Donaldson to "do the right thing and restore the democratic institutions". Stormont's mothballing has coincided with a decay in public services and escalating pay demands by workers that led to the province's biggest mass strike in decades last Thursday.

Heaton-Harris says long held up pay awards for public service workers can be met by a £3.3bn (\$4.2bn) package offered last month, on condition that the assembly restarts.

India threatens to expel French journalist ahead of Macron visit

New Delhi

French journalist said yesterday she was facing expulsion from India after two decades for what authorities have termed "malicious and critical" reportage, days before a state visit by President

Emmanuel Macron. Critics say that press freedom in the world's biggest democracy is increasingly under attack, with journalists who touch on sensitive topics often subjected to government rebuke. The latest is Vanessa Dougnac, a contributor to several Frenchlanguage publications including the ported on a number of flashpoint weekly magazine *Le Point*, who has

Last week the home ministry sent a notice to the reporter saying her work was "inimical" to national interests. "Her journalistic activities are malicious and critical in manner...they create biased perception about India," the notice said. "In addition, her activities may also provoke disorder and disturb peace."

The notice gave Dougnac, who has an Indian spouse, until February 2 to challenge the ministry's decision to cancel her permanent residency a move that would force her to leave the country. Dougnac, who has retopics including the ongoing Maoist Naxalite insurgency in part India, denied "all the allegations and imputations" made against her in the letter.

"India is my home, a country which I deeply love and respect, and I have never engaged in any acts that are in any manner prejudicial to Indian interests," she said in a statement. The home ministry and foreign ministry were contacted for comment. The notice was issued to Dougnac a week before Macron's Thursday arrival in India, where he will be guest of honour at the annual Republic Day military parade.

As France woos India, its former colony recalls the past

eventy years after France quit once hard-fought for territories seized from India, the dwindling influence of Paris on the bustling streets of Puducherry is still reflected in language, architecture and cuisine.

It is more than 8,000km from Paris to Puducherry, but some women dressed in colourful saris still chat in French, policemen wear the peaked kepi hats of the gendarme, and road signs mimic the famous blue and white enamel lettering of Paris. As President Emmanuel Macron

heads to New Delhi to celebrate Republic Day on Friday - marking the day independent India's constitution came into force - Francophiles in Puducherry say the impact of France's colonial rule was better than British brutality elsewhere in

"Indians of Pondicherry were considered as French nationals - culturally and legally," said 96-year-old David Annoussamy, a former judge who served in the French court in the port city, using its colonial-era name.

"Nationality wasn't about colour, it's about knowing France," the author told AFP, wearing a traditional Tamil wrap around his waist and speaking from his sprawling

home with a tree-lined central courtyard.

"The main thing was to know French".

Today, New Delhi and Paris celebrate growing ties, with France seeking to boost economic deals including already valuable military contracts with India, the world's fifth-biggest economy and most populous nation.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi was guest of honour at France's annual Bastille Day celebrations last July, and Macron is expected to be likewise feted this week in India. The territory on India's southeastern coast was taken by France in 1674 when the French East India Company set up a trading centre

France only left in 1954 - seven years after India's independence from Britain - and it took until 1962 for Paris to formally cede full sovereignty. The former French trading post has since changed its name to Puducherry, an administrative territory also incorporating other French ex-colonial enclaves

including Karaikal, Mahe and Yan-

to exploit its rich spices and goods.

Together, 1.25mn people reside in the Puducherry territory, according to the last census in 2011, and most speak the Tamil language. Just 5,000 French nationals live in Puducherry city today, the majority having Indian forebears who took citizenship from France.



Annoussamy took French nation-

ality at the time of the handover, something he is proud of.

"Someone born in Paris or someone born in Pondicherry both had the same rights," he said, speaking in fluent French. He counts Provencal-style bouillabaisse fish soup as his favourite dish. "It's a country we've adopted, and it's become our country," said Franco-Indian fashion designer Vassanty Manet, showing a black and white photo of her father when he served in the French army.

"We're a population that looks Indian but has a French culture,

and that's what's so special".

Manet said she grew up with stories about France that "fed our imagination", adding her uncle also fought for France during World War II in Algeria. "We've never had any resentment towards France,"

Unlike elsewhere in India, where there have often been wholesale name changes of streets to strip away Britain's legacy and statues of London's imperial leaders torn down, echoes of France remain.

A white marble statue of France's patron saint Joan of Arc - who battled the English in the 15th century,

just as the French fought British forces for control of Puducherry in

the 19th century - stands tall. The old French quarter - "La Ville Blanche" or "White Town" is a favourite with tourists for its colonial architecture with centuries-old mansions. Elegant streets are adorned with bougainvillealaden bungalows, with the aroma of freshly baked baguettes from cafes filling the air. "They want to try French croissants, baguettes, pain au chocolat, lemon tarts and chocolate tarts," said Saloua Sahl, 44, who was drawn from France to set up a bakery.

Uneasy equilibrium seen for global economy amid geopolitical risks

As 2023 was drawing to a close, there were mounting concerns that the war in Ukraine, Israel-Gaza conflict along with the Red Sea tensions, soaring inflation and the rising cost of servicing debt could trigger a global recession.

But the world is finding an uneasy equilibrium with a more benign economic backdrop overshadowed by geopolitical risks, according to the final Davos panel of 2024.

The prospects of subsiding inflation and a pickup in global trade offer some encouragement for investors despite the backdrop of war and populism, European Central Bank chief Christine Lagarde and peers agreed as the World Economic Forum drew to a close.

"Normalisation — that's what we have begun to see," she told the audience, before adding an important qualifier. "It is not normality that we're heading to," she added.

The optimism has at times been undermined by the spectre of geopolitics, with wars in Ukraine and the Middle East looming large, and Red Sea tensions too.

Donald Trump's Iowa victory, setting him on the road to the Republican nomination, was also greeted with alarm by many

The optimism has at times been undermined by the spectre of geopolitics with wars in Ukraine and the Middle East along with Red Sea tensions

While the explosion of debt is throwing a shadow over global economic growth, WEF experts warn that sub-Saharan Africa, where several countries are already in default, is experiencing its worstever crisis.

In 2022, African public debt stood at \$1.8tn, a 183% jump from 2010, having grown at around four times as fast as economic output, according to UN figures.

After Covid and the war in Ukraine, free-trade boosters in Davos fretted over a new bout of turmoil

in global supply chains due to rising geopolitical frictions.

Before the Israel-Hamas conflict in October, the World Trade
Organisation had forecast global trade growth of 3.3%, an
improvement from 0.8% in 2023. But WTO chief Ngozi OkonjoIweala told the WEF that she was now "less optimistic" about
world trade in 2024 due to "worsening geopolitical tensions".

She added, however, that it would be "much better than what we saw in 2023. Unless a major war breaks out, then all bets are off."

The Red Sea route carries about 12% of global maritime trade

The Red Sea route carries about 12% of global maritime trade, but the attacks have prompted many companies to take a massive and costly detour around the southern tip of Africa.

There are concerns along other major trade routes.

Taiwan's presidential election has renewed US-China tensions over the island, which China considers a part of its territory that

must be brought back under its control, by force if necessary.

Speaking in Davos, US Secretary of State Antony Blinken recalled that a huge amount of commerce flows through the

Taiwan Strait.

"If that were to be disrupted, it would affect the entire planet.

And it's about the last thing we need, especially coming back from

On top of geopolitical tensions, climate change has also played tricks on global trade.

A drought and water shortages linked to the El Nino weather phenomenon reduced ship traffic through the Panama Canal.

Talk of AI rippled through Davos meeting rooms and panels, its promise touted on signs and its security risks invoked by China's premier. While conversations included how to regulate the burgeoning technology and how to apply it to scientific discovery, the question of how to monetise it persisted.

Heads of global banks have warned of inflationary pressures from increased shipping costs and the possibility of oil price rises. Bank executives fear the market is mispricing interest rate cuts, and that geopolitical risks could cause volatility.

In Davos, participants tended to put a brave face on the global outlook, accentuating the likelihood that a deep recession will probably be avoided despite unprecedented monetary tightening to bring inflation under control.



Army to be deployed for Pakistan election

Pakistan will deploy the army to ensure peace at its general election next month, the prime minister's office said, amid concerns that recent attacks by militants could threaten the holding of the February 8 polls. The military's deployment at the polling stations has been controversial in the past, with several political leaders alleging the army uses troops to help its favourite party rather than provide security, a charge the army denies. The cabinet chaired by caretaker Prime Minister Anwaar ul Haq Kakar approved the deployment of army and paramilitary troops to ensure a peaceful election, a statement by Kakar's office said, adding: "These contingents will perform duty at polling stations and in sensitive areas." An uptick in attacks by militants who aim to overthrow the government and install their own brand of strict Islamic law has underscored worries among political leaders that such violence could threaten the peaceful holding of the polls. Pakistan's last election in 2018, which brought former prime minister Imran Khan to power, saw hundreds of thousands of troops deployed across the country to provide security. Khan's opponents and several analysts alleged that vote rigging helped by the troops contributed to his victory, which the military denied. Khan is now in jail after falling out with the generals and his party faces what analysts consider a militarybacked crackdown.

Father kills son for hoisting Khan's party flag, flees

A father killed his son after the pair disagreed about which political party flag to display in the lead-up to Pakistan's general election, police said. The argument broke out when the son, who recently returned from working in Qatar, hoisted the flag

of former prime minister Imran Khan's Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) party at the family home on the outskirts of Peshawar in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province. "The father prohibited his son from hoisting the PTI flag at home, but the son refused to take it down and abandon PTI," said district police official Naseer Farid. "The argument escalated, and in a fit of anger, the father fired a pistol at his 31-year-old son, bet fleeing the house.'

The son died on the way to the hospital.

Police are searching for the father, who was affiliated with the nationalist Awami National Party and had previously displayed their flag.

Turkiye and Hungary maintain better relations with Russia than other members of the US-led North Atlantic Treaty Organisation.

While opposing Russia's invasion of Ukraine, Turkiye has criticised Western sanctions on Moscow. For its part, Russia has cautioned that it would respond if Nato bolstered military infrastructure in the two Nordic states.

Sweden, whose member-ship bid marked a historic shift away from a non-aligned security policy, would enhance Nato defences in the Baltic Sea region facing Russia.

New Hampshire goes to vote

Voters in New Hampshire were choosing whether to give Donald Trump a smooth glide to the Republican presidential nomination or bolster rival Nikki Haley's longshot bid to topple him yesterday in a pivotal primary election. The former US president and the former South Carolina governor made their final pitches to voters in what became a two-person race after Ron DeSantis, the Florida governor once seen as the party's best bet to take on Trump, dropped out and endorsed Trump. Polls show Trump with a wide lead over Haley, who needs a victory or a strong second place showing in New Hampshire to carry her to the next nominating contest in her home state of South Carolina, where Trump is also dominant in the polls. Trump had a record-setting victory in Iowa's first-in-thenation contest last week. A resounding win in New Hampshire would help propel

Trump to secure the par nomination despite multiple criminal counts against him, two impeachments and his chaotic 2017-2021 presidency. The Republican nominee will face President Joe Biden, the presumptive Democratic nominee, in the general election in November. Trump, who is balancing campaign stops with appearances in various courts, denies wrongdoing and has used the criminal charges to bolster his claim of political persecution.

US defence secretary makes his first appearance since secret hospitalisation

US Defence Secretary Lloyd Austin yesterday made his first appearance since being hospitalised for complications from cancer treatment - a stay he concealed from both the White House and Congress for several days. Austin, who was admitted to Walter Reed on January 1 and spent two weeks in the military hospital, spoke via videolink from his residence at the opening of a meeting on aid for Ukraine's fight against

"The security of the entire international community is on the line in Ukraine's fight. I am more determined than ever to work with our allies and partners to support Ukraine and to get the job done," Austin said in front of a Defence Department seal and small American and Ukrainian flags. He highlighted a \$250mn military assistance package that Washington announced last month, but did not detail any new American aid, with funding having dried up and Republicans refusing to authorise $% \left\{ 1\right\} =\left\{ 1\right\} =\left\{$ more until President Joe Biden bows to their demands for measures to curb migration over the Mexican border.

Austin's prepared comments — which were posted on the Defence Department's website - included a reference to his health: "As you can tell, I'm joining from home today. I'm feeling good and looking forward

to being back at the Pentagon very soon." But he skipped over that section in the remarks he delivered, making no mention of his medical situation.

CIA tries to recruit double agents in Russia in new video release

The US Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) has released a Russian-language video to try to persuade Russian intelligence employees to switch sides and work as double agents for Washington.

CIA Director William Burns said in July that disaffection among some Russians over the war in Ukraine was creating a rare opportunity to recruit spies, and that the CIA was not letting it pass.

The video, released on the CIA's official social media channels, tries to appeal to what it suggests are patriotic Russians working in intelligence agencies who may feel betrayed by what it called corruption in elite circles and the poor way the Russian armed forces are equipped and supplied.

"Those around you may not want to hear the truth. But we do. You are not powerless," says the video, the latest in a series of recruitment videos targeting Russia, before detailing ways to contact the CIA. Accompanied by melancholy classical music, the video's main, fictional character is an unnamed 35-year-old male employee of Russia's military intelligence agency who casts himself as a patriot who loves Russia and

once served as a paratrooper. "Do I have enough courage to confront this betrayal?" the video shows him saying, before he says he has realised the real enemy is inside Russia in the form of a corrupt leadership and elite.

"The top leadership has sold the country out for palaces and yachts at a time when our soldiers are chewing rotten potatoes and firing from prehistoric weapons. Our people are forced to give bribes to simply find work," the man says as video clips of a bleak Russian winter are spliced with images of official limousines and wealthy Russians giving toasts. The fictional character says his patriotism has spurred him to act and work with the CIA, and the video's final shot depicts a well-dressed man contacting the CIA by mobile phone from a snowy courtyard. President Vladimir Putin, a former KGB spy who served in what used to be East Germany, has called on Russia's FSB domestic security service to step up its activity to counter what he has said is increasing e by the West. The Kremlin says everything is done to ensure the Russian military has the equipment it needs to be successful in what Moscow calls its "special military operation" in Ukraine. It has rejected as false various corruption allegations, and shrugged off the CIA video.

"You know, this practice is quite common, intelligence agencies around the world very often use the media and social networks to recruit new employees. And they do it all the time, the CIA does it every year," Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said yesterday.

'Doomsday Clock' remains at 90 seconds to midnight

The symbolic "Doomsday Clock" was held at 90 seconds to midnight yesterday, reflecting existential threats to humanity posed by potential nuclear escalation from the war in Ukraine and the multiplying impacts of the climate crisis following Earth's hottest recorded year. Set by top scientists and security experts, the timing of the clock remains the same as last year and the closest it has ever been to midnight in its more than 75-year-history.

"Trends continue to point ominously towards global catastrophe," said Rachel Bronson, president and CEO of the Bulletin of Atomic Scientists. "The war in Ukraine poses an ever present risk of nuclear escalation, and the war in Gaza provides further illustration of the horrors of modern war, even without nuclear escalation."

Woman dies after car rams French farmers' roadblock

A car rammed into a roadblock put up by protesting farmers in southwestern France yesterday, killing a woman and seriously injuring her husband and teenage daughter. The three occupants of the car that crashed into the barrier on a motorway in the southwestern department of Ariege were taken into police custody on suspicion of involuntary manslaughter, police said.

The vehicle was travelling on the dual-lane carriageway leading to the roadblock despite it being clearly marked as closed to traffic because of the protest. Ariege prefect Simon Bertoux told reporters. The woman who was killed was a member of the powerful FNSEA farmers union which has been leading nationwide protests.

Oppenheimer tops Oscar nominations with 13

Nolan's masterly portrait of the father of the atomic bomb topped the Oscars nominations yesterday, earning an impressive 13 nods including for best picture.

The comedy had to settle for eight nods - not bad for a satire based on a popular line of plastic dolls, but lower than many had predicted, and missing out on key nominations for Greta Gerwig as director, and star Margot Robbie in best actress. Oppenheimer, which came out in theatres on the same day, and grossed almost \$1bn, led the way with nods for its director Nolan, and stars Cillian Murphy, Robert Downey Jr and Emily Blunt. Murphy told the Irish Times he was at his parents' house in Cork, when he heard the news. and celebrated in a low-key, but very Irish, way.

Star Lily Gladstone became the Oscars' first Native American nominee for best actress She will now go head-to-head with Emma Stone, the star

of Poor Things, which also earned an acting nod for Mark Ruffalo, along with a swathe of technical nominations. from cinematography to costume design. But there was disappointment for Killers star Leonardo DiCaprio, who failed to earn a best actor nomination, and the movie also missed out on best adapted screenplay. It proved to be a record year for female directors.

Three movies helmed by women French courtroom drama Anatomy of a Fall, Barbie and Past – were nominated for best picture, for the first time in more than nine decades of Academy

Justine Triet secured a nod that had been widely predicted to go to Gerwig, and it also earned recognition for editing and original screenplay. Bradley Cooper earned an impressive three individual nominations for acting in, producing and writing Maestro. The Leonard Bernstein biopic, which Cooper also directed, took seven nominations. Other strong performers included Alexander Payne's The Holdovers, about a teacher, a cook and a student holed up in a boarding school over the festive season. It took five nominations, including acting nods for Paul Giamatti and Da'Vine Joy Randolph, who are both now considered strong contenders in

their respective categories. And it was a good morning for American Fiction, a deft satire on race, publishing and Hollywood, which also had five nominations including for stars


