PM, Iranian FM discuss ties, Gaza

HE the Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Mohamed bin Abdulrahman bin Jassim al-Thani received yesterday a phone call from Iranian Foreign Minister Dr Hossein Amir-Abdollahian. They discussed co-operation relations between the two countries and the latest developments in the war on Gaza Strip along with ways of de-escalating the situation. HE Sheikh Mohamed affirmed Oatar's commitment to its efforts in mediating and facilitating negotiations between Iran and Western countries, including continuing to implement the recent agreement between Iran and the United States brokered by Qatar. Intense fighting in south Gaza; massacre toll 26,257

ntense fighting raged yesterday in the Gaza city of Khan Yunis, sending residents fleeing further south as Israel's military targets the Palestinian resistance group Hamas.

On Friday, the UN's International Court of Justice (ICJ) ruled Israel must prevent possible acts of genocide in the conflict - and allow in aid - but stopped short of calling for a ceasefire.

Gaza's health ministry says the Israeli military offensive has killed at least 26,257 people, most of them women and children.

The army says at least 220 soldiers have been killed since Israel began the ground operations, which are now focused around Khan Younis.

Palestinians are fleeing the fighting, adding to the number already crowded into Rafah, near the Egyptian border, where the United Nations says most of Gaza's estimated 1.7mn displaced have converged.

They live in the street, where sewage flows, amid "conditions of desperation conducive to a complete breakdown in order," said incompatible with returning

rab League has decided to convene an extraordinary ession at the level of permanent delegates today to issue a unified Arab position regarding the provisional measures ordered by the International Court of Justice (ICJ) with respect to the lawsuit lodged by South Africa on the commission of genocide by the Israeli occupation in Gaza Strip.

Speaking to Qatar News Agency (QNA) yesterday, Assistant Secretary-General at the Arab League ambassador Hossam Zaki highlighted that the meeting will be held at the headquarters of the Arab League in response to a bid submitted by the State of Palestine on the convention of this extraordinary session considering the ruling issued by ICJ on Friday.

Permanent Representative of the State of Palestine to the Arab League ambassador Muhannad al-Aklouk said that the State of Palestine requested this conven-

tion in co-ordination with Morocco in its capacity as president of the 160th session of the Arab League at the ministerial level and support the member states of Arab

The Association of Secretaries-General of Arab Parliaments has welcomed the ruling of the International Court of Justice (ICJ) regarding Israeli occupation's commission of genocide against the Palestinian People, a QNA report from Kuwait said.

In a statement, the association said that the ruling was a victory for the rule of international law and international humanitarian law, and an important turning point in the pursuit of justice for the Palestinian people.

The statement called on the international community to build on this important step, bear legal, moral and humanitarian responsibility, move immediately to a ceasefire, demand the immediate implementation of the court's ruling, and work to establish the Palestinian state with Jerusalem as its

Israeli war on Gaza spawned unprecedented humanitarian catastrophe: NHRC chairperson

E the Chairperson of the National Human Rights Committee (NHRC), Maryam bint Abdullah al-Attiyah, has asserted that the Israeli war on Gaza Strip has caused an unprecedented humanitarian and health disaster.

HE al-Attivah underscored ramping up real Arab and global pressure to enforce the international law and the international humanitarian law to hold the Israeli occupation to account for the crimes and genocide being perpetrated against the Palestinian people in Gaza Strip, act seriously to cease the Israeli aggression on the Palestinian people and compel the occupation to get the humanitarian assistance into Gaza Strip without any restrictions.

This came during her visit to a group of wounded Palestinians from Gaza Strip in Doha, during which she checked on their conditions because of the Israeli war on Gaza Strip, wishing them a speedy recovery. The NHRC delegation accompanying her offered gifts to the

violations affected the entire strip and targeted the civilians, including children, women, journalists, ambulance personnel, health facilities, international, relief and humanitarian organisations, as well as schools and shelters, and prevented medical supplies and drinking wa-

The Global Alliance of National Human Rights Institutions (GAN-HRI), under the chairmanship of HE al-Attiyah, so far called for protecting the civilians, stopping the escalation in the occupied Palestinian territories, and providing urgent assistance to the population of Gaza

In a previous statement following a meeting held in Copenhagen, Denmark, GANHRI expressed solidarity with the Independent

Commission For Human Rights in Palestine, pointing out that the GANHRI members apprised the Director-General of GANHRI Ammar Dweik of the latest situation in the Gaza Strip and West Bank.

Meanwhile, HE al-Attiyah lauded the efforts made by the Doha-based Arab Network for National Human Rights Institutions (ANNHRIS), along with its regional and global action that was initiated by convening an emergency general assembly, the last one was the meeting with the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights Volker Turk which resulted in Turk's field trip to Rafah crossing point last month to inspect the humanitarian catastrophe and the flagrant violation of all human rights in Gaza Strip.





Over 3.1mn used Doha Metro, Lusail Tram during Asian Cup group stage

atar Railways Company (Qatar Rail) has revealed that during the group stage of the Asian Cup 2023 from January 12-25, more than 3.1mn passengers used the Doha Metro and Lusail Tram, with 3mn passengers using the metro and 113,000 passengers using the tram.

The metro and tram services had significant turnout from the Asian Cup fans during the first 14 days of the tournament, which featured 36 matches.

These services played a key role in providing a safe and reliable travel experience. Additionally, they facilitated access to various activation areas and key destinations around the city.

The total number of trips to and from the stadiums during this stage amounted to 535,000, Qatar Rail said.

The percentage of fans utilising the metro for transportation to the nine tournament stadiums was 29%, while the percentage of those using the metro for access to stadiums within a walking distance from the metro network was 35%.

The opening day of the tournament on January 12 saw the highest ridership for an individual match via the metro, with 52% of fans opting for metro transport to attend the opening ceremony.

Additionally, January 12 recorded the highest flow into a single metro station after the match, at Lusail QNB station, where the rate reached 320 passengers per minute - equivalent to the traffic flow of a seven-lane expressway.

On January 25, the network recorded its

highest daily ridership during the group stage, with a total of 267,900 trips using the metro across its 37 stations.

January 22 witnessed the shortest headway between trains operating since the beginning of the tournament, which was two minutes on the Gold Line to facilitate the movement of fans heading to the matches that were held simultaneously at Khalifa International Stadium and Jassim Bin Hamad Stadium.

Doha Metro's busiest stations during the group stage were Msheireb, DECC, and

Souq Waqif. "The group stage of the tournament highlighted a substantial number of fans opting for the Doha Metro and Lusail Tram for their daily commutes," said Ajlan Eid al-Enazi, chief of Strategy and Business

Development at Qatar Rail. "We have developed operational plans to facilitate seamless movement of fans to reach the stadiums effortlessly."

operational plan in co-ordination with various relevant entities and partners.

Additionally, the metro's capacity was increased by operating the full fleet of 110 trains, including the six-car train on the

Furthermore, the train headway on all lines was reduced to three minutes before and after the matches to facilitate fans



and visitors' movement toward and the stadiums and other popular destinations around the city.

Local Arabic daily Arrayah reported that Asian Cup fans have flocked to Soug Wagif to celebrate and cheer for their teams, especially those from the GCC countries.

Restaurants and eateries spread across Souq Waqif have been experiencing excellent business over the past few weeks, a throwback to the boom during the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022.

Other shops at the souq are experiencing brisk business, reporting excellent sales, especially for souvenirs and clothes.

A number of shop owners and operators revealed that the largest number of visitors hailed from Saudi Arabia, followed by Oman, Kuwait, Bahrain, the UAE, and Iraq, aside from visitors from the Arab and

Asian communities in Qatar. They said that the shops and restaurants are open until the late hours.

The busiest timings at the souq, according to a number of sellers and service providers, is between early morning until noon, and between 3pm and midnight.

One cafe manager said that his outlet is serving around 1,500 customers a day during this period, five times the normal daily average.

Most sellers say that they have maintained the prices and service charges and avoided any increase, to encourage more customers to come and enjoy the unique atmosphere and surroundings of Souq Waqif.

Similarly, the International Zone at Expo 2023 Doha has attracted an increasing number of GCC visitors, who highly praised the high level of organisation of the exhibition and the various interesting activities and events there.

The visitors have also expressed their appreciation for the efforts exerted by Oatar to provide tourists and visitors with all the possible means of convenience and entertainment to help them experience a memorable time in the country.

Trapped in Gaza's south, displaced Palestinians languish in winter

t took Umm Imad three days to reach Rafah, braying rain and cold weather in hopes of reaching safety as fighting rages across the besieged Gaza

However, in the border town, on the Palestinian territory's southern edge, the 70-year-old was forced to sleep rough like hundreds of thousands of other Palestinians displaced by the Israel-Hamas war, now in its fourth month.

"I didn't find shelter, I didn't find a tent, I didn't find anything," said Umm Imad, her black headscarf ruffling in the wind.

Heavy rains in recent days have given way to the return of a blue sky over the coastal strip, but the cold remains.

Rows of tents stretch into the distance behind Umm Imad, now a common sight all over Rafah. Some of the tents are pitched along a hill of sandy

earth, criss-crossed by barbed wire fences several me-

Many of the displaced Palestinians in Rafah have travelled there from Khan Younis, southern Gaza's main city about 7km to the north which has become the epicentre of Israel's military offensive against Ha-

"I spend the night in the street, under pouring rain, without shelter or anything, and I have orphaned children with me," Umm Imad said.

Holding back tears, Abdallah Halas, 24, said: "I don't know where we will go and sleep. Children, women, elderly and sick family members are in the streets?

Nearby, streams of waste water flow through the streets littered with rubbish.

According to the United Nations, 1.3mn people more than half of Gaza's population of 2.4mn - are now trapped in Rafah, crammed together in "desperate conditions".

On the 113th day of the war, sparked by the events

of October 7. Palestinians continue to move from one area of Gaza to another, fleeing fighting that began in the north before moving steadily south.

They move by foot, on donkey carts or crammed into the backs of diesel-powered trucks - a costly option with hardly any fuel left in Gaza.

Israel's relentless bombardment and complete siege of the Hamas-ruled territory began soon after the attacks that resulted in about 1,140 deaths in Israel, mostly civilians, according to an AFP tally of official

The Israeli campaign, according to the Hamas government's health ministry, has killed at least 26,257 people in Gaza, most of them women and children.

In Rafah, drivers must go at walking speed as they make their way on the overcrowded streets.

Roadside vendors sell basic supplies: canned goods, mattresses, blankets and tents.

Similar items are being delivered into Gaza in humanitarian aid shipments, but these have slowed to a

trickle since the war erupted.

A bag of potato chips costs eight shekels (\$2) - an eight-fold increase from its pre-war price.

Hind Ahmed, 29, waited with her three children on a busy street in west Rafah, hoping to find a taxi or a donkey cart that would take her to her husband at a makeshift camp.

"We were staying in a school classroom for over a month ... we shared the classroom with more than 50 people, the air was polluted and the school is overcrowded," she said. "So we decided to go live in a tent despite the cold

weather," Ahmed said, her youngest son in one arm, a sponge mattress and a bag of clothes in the other.

The family has been displaced several times and their situation has become "illogical", she said.

'Open the crossings and let us leave, there is nothing left in Gaza, no schools, no education, no basic life necessities," she said.

A man crossing the street interrupted, angrily shouting: "We will not leave Gaza. The (Israeli) Jews are the ones who came to us, they are the ones who

More countries halt funding to UN aid agency in Gaza

ritain, Italy, the Netherlands and Finland have became the latest countries to pause funding for the United Nations' refugee agency for Palestinians (UNRWA), following allegations that some of its staff were involved in the events of October 7.

The United States, Australia and Canada had already paused funding to the aid agency, a critical source of support for people in Gaza, after the allegations by Is-

The agency said on Friday that it had opened an investigation into several employees and severed ties with those people.

Encouraging more donor suspensions, Israeli Foreign Minister Israel Katz said that the UNRWA should be replaced once fighting in the enclave dies down and accused the UNRWA of ties to religious militants in Gaza.

"In Gaza's rebuilding, @UN-RWA must be replaced with agencies dedicated to genuine peace and development," he added on X. Reuters could not immediately

contact the UNRWA's communications head for comment. The UNRWA has always rejected similar accusations in the past and

maintained that it is a relief and humanitarian agency. The Palestinian foreign ministry criticised what it described as an Israeli campaign against the UN-

RWA, and Hamas condemned the

termination of employee contracts

"based on information derived

from the Zionist enemy". The UNRWA was set up to help refugees of the 1948 war at Israel's founding and provides education, health and aid services to Palestinians in Gaza, the West Bank, Jordan, Syria, and Lebanon.

It helps about two-thirds of Gaza's 2.3mn population and has played a pivotal aid role during the war that Israel launched to eliminate Hamas after the events of Oc-

Australian Foreign Minister Penny Wong said yesterday that while the UNRWA provides "vital, life-saving work", Brisbane would "temporarily pause disbursement of recent funding".

"We welcome UNRWA's immediate response, including terminating contracts and launching an investigation," she said on social media platform X, formerly Twit-

Canada's International Development Minister Ahmed Hussen announced on Friday that Ottawa had "temporarily paused any additional funding to the UNRWA while it undertakes a thorough investigation into these allegations".

Finland which had a fouryear agreement to provide €5mn (\$5.4mn) annually to the UNRWA, suspended its payments and called for an "an independent and thorough investigation", in a statement from its foreign ministry.

Italian Foreign Minister Antonio Tajani said Italy is joining the ranks of those suspending funding, adding: "We are committed to providing humanitarian aid to the Palestinian population while protecting Israel's security."

Switzerland, which has made annual contributions of around 20mn Swiss francs (\$23mn) to the UNRWA, said vesterday that no decision would be taken on the 2024 payment until the accusations were clarified.

"Switzerland has zero tolerance for all forms of support for terrorism, and for calls to hatred or incitement to violence," it added.

Dutch Minister for Trade and Development Geoffrey van Leeuwen announced a freeze in fund-

ing for the UNRWA while the investigation is ongoing, saying that the government was shocked".

"The accusation is that the attack was committed on October 7 with UN money, with our money," he told public broadcaster NOS vesterday The British government said it

was "appalled by the allegations" made by Israel and would be "temporarily pausing any future funding" while the Foreign Office reviewed the claims.

Announcing the investigation on Friday, UNRWA Commissioner-General Philippe Lazzarini said that he had decided to terminate the contracts of some staff members to protect the agency's ability to deliver humanitarian assistance.

Lazzarini did not disclose the number of employees allegedly involved in the attacks, nor the nature of their alleged involvement.

He said, however, that "any UN-RWA employee who was involved in acts of terror" would be held accountable, including through criminal prosecution.

During weeks of Israeli bomardment of the Palestinian en clave, the UNRWA has repeatedly said its capacity to render humanitarian assistance to people in Gaza is on the verge of collapse.

Hussein al-Sheikh, head of the Palestinians' umbrella political body the Palestine Liberation Organisation (PLO), said that cutting support to the agency brought major political and relief risks.

"We call on countries that announced the cessation of their support for the UNRWA to immediately reverse their decision," he said on X.

The foreign ministry in Germany, a major donor to the UNRWA. welcomed the UNRWA's investigation, saving that it is deeply concerned about the allegations raised against agency employees.

"We expect Lazzarini to make it clear within the UNRWA's workforce that all forms of hatred and violence are totally unacceptable and will not be tolerated," it said

Lebanon's parliament approves 2024 budget, shunning major reforms

ebanon's parliament passed an amended budget for 2024 that experts said neglected to include crucial reforms that would help the country emerge from a financial meltdown that has gutted the public sector for nearly five years.

The draft was passed late on Friday after three days of drawn-out disputes, including several heated exchanges in parliament's chamber with caretaker premier Najib Mikati, highlighting the deep divisions that have paralysed Lebanese politics and prolonged a more than year-long vacuum at the presidency.

The budget, which has been amended over the course of months from a version that had been submitted to parliament by Mikati, anticipated significantly higher state revenues earned through VAT and customs fees.

It also included measures that appeared to target those who had made illicit gains during Lebanon's financial crisis, by fining companies which unfairly benefited from the central bank's previous currency exchange platform and traders who used the central bank's subsidies on imports to generate profit.

Since Lebanon's economy began to unravel in 2019, its currency has lost around 95% of its value, banks have locked most depositors out of their savings and more than 80% of the population has sunk below the poverty line.

The crisis erupted after decades of profligate spending and corruption among the ruling elite, some of whom led banks that lent heavily

The government estimates losses in the financial system total more than \$70bn, the majority of which were accrued at the central bank.

Vested interests of the political and economic class have blocked key reforms required by the International Monetary Fund (IMF) to unlock a \$3bn aid package for Lebanon, including legislation to resolve its banking crisis and unifying multiple exchange rates for the Lebanese pound.

The IMF had also urged Lebanon to consider increases in social spending "with the goal of protecting the most vulnerable".

It said last year that Lebanon "will be mired in a never-ending crisis" unless it implemented rapid reforms. - Reuters

Washington, Baghdad open talks on the future of foreign soldiers in Iraq

Iraq and the United States held yesterday a first round of talks on the future of American and other foreign troops in the country, with Baghdad expecting discussions to lead to a timeline for reducing their

Roughly 2,500 US troops are still deployed in Iraq as part of the anti-Islamic State (IS) group international coalition formed in 2014 - the year the religious militant group overran swathes of Irag and neighbouring Syria.

However, after the Israel-Hamas war began in October, US-led coalition forces in Iraq and Syria have faced frequent attacks by Iran-aligned groups, leading to US retaliatory strikes and Iraqi complaints of American "aggression" against its territory.

The volatile situation has pushed Iraq's prime minister - whose government relies on the support of Iran-aligned parties - to call for the coalition to leave, although talks between the two sides had been planned since August.

The office of Prime Minister Mohamed Shia al-Sudani issued a photograph of him with top-ranking officials from both the Iraqi armed forces and the US-led coalition. Sudani's foreign affairs adviser, Farhad Alaaldin, told AFP that the

talks "and whatever progress made will determine the length of these negotiations".

"Iraq is engaging the other countries taking part in the international coalition for bilateral agreements that serves the best interest of Iraq and these countries," Alaaldin said. - AFP

Mali junta eyes new peace talks after ending accord with separatist rebels

Mali's junta has issued a decree to establish a committee to organise national peace and reconciliation talks, a day after it ended a 2015 peace deal with Tuareg separatist rebels and accused mediator Algeria of interfering in its affairs.

The decision to end the so-called Algiers accord threatens to further destabilise the conflict-torn West African nation.

Algeria, which shares a 1,300km border with Mali, said the decision

could put the entire region at risk. In an apparent move to establish a new internal peace process, the junta's decree outlined the structure of a committee and the steps it should take to prepare talks.

It did not give a timeframe or say which groups it wanted to include in the dialogue.

Tuareg rebel spokesperson Mohamed Elmaouloud Ramadane told Reuters yesterday that the new initiative was a "staged event" between groups who are already aligned. "We think it's a show, a waste of time and a waste of state resources,"

An alliance of Tuareg rebel groups on Friday acknowledged the termination of the 2015 peace deal in a statement and called on their members to review and update their objectives in light of the new situation. - Reuters

Hundreds march against gender violence in Kenya violence," Amnesty International's

n everal hundred people marched in Nairobi yesterday to protest against femicide in Kenya where more than a dozen women have been killed this month in cases that shocked the nation.

The campaigners took to the streets of the capital holding placards that read "Being a woman should not be a death sentence" and "Patriarchy kills" while others featured names and photographs

"Stop killing us," they chanted as they marched towards parliament, bringing traffic to a halt in Nairobi's central business district.

At least 16 women have been killed in Kenva this year, according to media reports, shining a spotlight on violence against women which the government has described as "rising".

"Femicide is the most brutal manifestation of gender-based Kenya chapter said in a statement ahead of the march. "It is unacceptable and must

never be normalised," the rights group said, calling on authorities to expedite investigations and prosecution of the perpetrators. At the protest yesterday, Terry

Wangare, a communications officer, said it is "time for Kenya to stand up and make a decision".

"Nobody cares. If you complain, you are bad," the 32-year-old told Student Faith Claire Wanjiru, 23,

who was at her first protest, said she is "angry" and is not going to tolerate the violence. "Taking someone's life should

not be anyone's work," she said. Organisers of the protest said other marches took place in 10 other regions, including the lakeside city of Kisumu and the Indian Ocean port city of Mombasa.

More than 30% of women in Kenya experience physical violence and 13% experience some form of sexual violence, according

to a government report last year. Human rights watchdogs are convinced that the number repre-

sents just a fraction of actual cases. There were at least 152 cases of femicide in Kenya last year, according to non-profit Femicide

In 2022, some 725 women and girls were murdered in the East African country, according to a report from the UN Office on Drugs and Crime.

India, France sign up for joint defence production

ndia and France have agreed to work together on the joint production of defence equipment including helicopters and submarines for the Indian armed forces and production for friendly countries, New Delhi said.

The deal was reached during a visit by French President Emmanuel Macron, who met Prime Minister Narendra Modi and attended a state banquet hosted by President Draupadi Murmu, the government said in a statement late on Friday.

Macron and Modi agreed to expand bilateral ties in defence production, nuclear energy, space research and the use of artificial

intelligence for public services like climate change, health and agriculture, the statement said. It did not specify the value of any deals. After Russia. France is the largest arms supplier to India, which has relied on its fighter jets for four decades.

The leaders welcomed the setting up of maintenance, repair and overhaul services by France's Safran for leading-edge aviation propulsion (LEAP) engines in India and adding such services for Rafale engines, and a helicopter

partnership. The bilateral summit during Macron's 40-hour visit, was the fifth Macron-Modi meeting since

India's Tata Group and France's Airbus have signed an agreement to manufacture civilian helicopters together, Indian Foreign Secretary Vinay Kwatra said.

French jet engine maker CFM International also announced an agreement with India's Akasa Air to buy more than 300 of its LEAP-1B engines to power 150 Boeing 737 MAX aircraft.

Akasa Air previously ordered 76 aircraft powered by the engine, of which 22 are in use.

India and France agreed to intensify co-operation in the southwest Indian Ocean, building on joint surveillance missions carried out from the French island territory of La Reunion in 2020 and 2022, the government statement said.

Macron also said France would create conditions to attract up to 30,000 Indian students a year for higher education.

Taiwan issue biggest threat to Sino-US ties, says Wang Yi

hinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi and US National Security Advisor Jake Sullivan held candid talks in Bangkok aimed at keeping in contact, both sides said, with Wang stress-ing that "Taiwan independence" posed the biggest risk to Sino-US

The meeting came just over two months after US President Joe Biden and Chinese President Xi Jinping met on the sidelines of the Asia-Pacific Economic Coop-

eration summit in San Francisco. China and the United States had a rocky start to 2023 but met more often in the second half of the year to try to stabilise ties ahead of democratic Taiwan's presidential transition in May and a potentially caustic 2024 US

election campaign. China's struggling economy may also dampen Beijing's appetite for what had been more combative ties with Washington amid improving Chinese relations with

Wang and Sullivan agreed to properly handle important and sensitive issues in US-China relations, China's foreign ministry said, and for Xi and Biden maintain regular contact to provide strategic guidance for bilateral relations...and make good use of the current strategic communication channels?

The White House in a statement said both Wang and Sullivan recognised recent progress in resuming military-to-military communication and the importance of maintaining those channels Sullivan also "underscored the importance of maintaining peace and stability across the Taiwan Strait," the statement said.

Taiwan's defence ministry said yesterday it detected 11 Chinese military planes crossing the Taiwan Strait's median line in the past 24 hours. The ministry on Friday reported 23 Chinese air force planes operating around Taiwan, carrying out "joint combat readiness patrols" with Chinese warships ahead of high-level China-US talks in Thailand.

The White House added that "Sullivan stressed that although the United States and China are in competition, both countries need to prevent it from veering into conflict or confrontation." In San Francisco, Xi and Biden agreed to open a presidential hotline, resume military-to-military communications, and work to curb fentanyl production, but remained at odds over Taiwan.

China claims the island as its own territory and has never renounced the use of force to bring it under its control. Taiwan strongly objects to China's sovereignty claims and says only the island's people can decide their

The United States switched diplomatic recognition from Taipei to Beijing in 1979 and has long said it does not support a formal declaration of independence by Taiwan. It does, however, maintain unofficial relations with the self-governed island and remains its most important backer and arms supplier.

Saturday's meeting was the latest quiet engagement between Wang and Sullivan, who reports directly to Biden, having met previously away from media to try to lower the temperature.

Wang, according to a foreign ministry statement, told Sullivan the two countries should treat each other as equals and respect their core interests, rather than undermine them, and "build mutual respect, peaceful coexistence and win-win co-operation" to establish the "correct way for China and the United States to get along".

Wang said Taiwan was China's internal affair, and a recent election there "cannot change the basic fact that Taiwan is a part of China." China criticised the United States on Thursday for causing "trouble and provocation" after the US Navy sailed its first warship through the sensitive waters separating China and Taiwan since the election.

"The biggest risk to peace and stability in the Taiwan Strait is Taiwan independence' and the biggest challenge to China-US relations is also 'Taiwan independence," Wang was quoted as

Tuvalu's pro-Taiwan PM loses seat in election

uvalu's pro-Taiwan prime minister has lost his parliamentary seat, according to election results released yesterday, fuelling speculation the microstate may be poised to switch diplomatic recognition to Beijing.

Results showed that Kausea Natano, who has backed longstanding relations with Taipei, failed to win one of two seats up for grabs on the main atoll of Funafuti. Just 12 nations around the world still formally recognise Taiwan, after Nauru abruptly severed diplomatic ties in favour of China earlier this month.

Some Pacific watchers have questioned whether Beijing could persuade Tuvalu to also make the switch. Natano's finance minister, Seve Paeniu, has floated the idea of reviewing Taiwan ties. He

won his election race uncontested and is expected to try to chase the island country's top job.

There are only a little over 6,000 registered voters in the country of around 11,500 people and votes are still coming in from some islands. With no formal political parties, the process of MPs selecting a prime minister and potentially changing government policies could be slow.

Taiwan's ambassador to Tuvalu Andrew Lin dismissed the idea of a potential switch, recently telling AFP the two allies enjoyed a "very long-term friendship" that would endure beyond the election. But China has been methodically poaching Taiwan's Pacific allies, convincing Solomon Islands and Kiribati to switch recognition in 2019 before Nauru did the same.

China claims democratic, self-

ruled Taiwan as part of its territory and has vowed to one day seize it, by force if necessary. Tuvalu's looming leadership change may also throw into doubt a recent treaty with Australia, which saw Canberra offer refuge to Tuvaluans threatened by climate change.

The United Nations says Tuvalu is "extremely vulnerable" to the effects of climate change, with most of its landmass less than 5m above sea level. Most of it is predicted to be underwater - at least some of the time - by 2100.

Around 40% of the main atoll Funafuti already gets submerged during periodic "king" tides that wash away taro and cassava which were the islands' staple crops. Two of the atolls represented on its flag of 11 stars have already disappeared. (AFP)

Wildly popular Khan, party erased from poll drive

Pakistani cricketing legend turned world leader Imran Khan is wildly popular in his constituency and ancestral homeland of Mianwali, but the political posters that line the streets do not bear his face and flags do not fly his colours.

A relentless crackdown widely attributed to Pakistan's powerful military has seen him and his Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) party almost erased from the election campaign ahead of the vote.

"Our party workers are facing harassment, and I personally have received death threats," says 61-year-old Jamal Ahsan Khan, who is standing for PTI in Mianwali in place of his leader.

"Throughout my life, I have never witnessed an election as intense and threatening as this one." Khan, currently in jail fac-

ing dozens of legal challenges, is barred from contesting elections on February 8 because of a disputed conviction — cases he claims are politically motivated.

Across the country, PTI has been obstructed from holding rallies and the heavily censored media is restricted in its coverage of the opposition, pushing the party's campaign almost entirely online.

Dozens of candidates nationwide have also had their nomination papers rejected by the Election Commission of Pakistan.

Like many other party candidates, loyalist Ahsan Khan has been in near hiding in the build-up to the election, unable to hold meetings or distribute leaflets.

"It feels disheartening that as a candidate of Pakistan's leading

political party, I am unable to conduct my campaign in a meaningful way," he told AFP.

With two weeks until the vote, there is none of the fervour and excitement that usually marks an election in the country of more than 240mn people.

It was from Mianwali, a largely rural district in the central province of Punjab, that Khan built his political career and was elected three times as a member of parlia-

PTI's national victory in 2018, driven by its promises to put an end to corruption and the family dynasties which have ruled the country for generations, propelled him to prime minister.

In Mianwali, where he notably built a hospital and a university, the 71-year-old "is not just a political figure, he is a hero", Rana Amjad Iqbal, editor-in-chief of

local newspaper Nawa-e-Sharar, or the Daily Spark, tells AFP.

"However, the primary and most significant reason for his enduring political relevance lies in his anti-establishment stance," underlines the journalist.

Khan was widely believed to have been backed by the military in his rise to power, but became emboldened during his leadership and began to push against the control of the mighty generals.

Eventually, he lost their favour and was ousted in a controversial parliamentary no-confidence vote in 2022 after dozens of his MPs defected. His subsequent arrest in May 2023 brought supporters onto the streets who protested against military symbols — sparking the start of a widespread crackdown against PTI.

Thousands of supporters were arrested and around 100 — half from Mianwali — are awaiting trial before military courts, while senior party leaders were detained and forced underground before defecting in their dozens.

Khan "is still popular with the public, but he is unacceptable" to the army, retired schoolteacher Ijaz Khan said.

Earlier this month, PTI suffered a crucial blow when the Supreme Court controversially banned it from contesting elections with its electoral symbol: the cricket bat.

In a country where millions of people cannot read or write, symbols are crucial for voters to identify their preferred party and candidate.

The Election Commission instead ordered Ahsan Khan to use a bottle, an emblem viewed with disdain in rural areas because it is associated with alcohol.

Khan's rival in Mianwali, Obaid Ullah Khan, is indifferent to the punishment meted out to his rival political party.

"When would it be justified if not now?" he said of the crack-down

Unlike PTI candidates, Obaid Ullah Khan, who is standing for Pakistan Muslim League (PML- N), meets openly with villagers, whose leaders assure him of the support of the entire community, in return for future favours.

The PML-N is the party of another former prime minister, Nawaz Sharif, who was jailed ahead of the 2018 election and later forced into self-imposed exile.

As Khan has fallen, Sharif has risen, returning to the country and into the arms of the military, analysts say.

Despite being sidelined from the election campaign, voters have not lost their love for Khan.

Hanzala bin Shakeel, a 23-yearold computer science student, will vote for the first time and is making no secret of his choice.

"I will vote for (Imran Khan) because he is the only one who really cares about this country; the others prioritise their personal interests."

Dozens of parks closed as fires rage in Colombia

olombian capital Bogota has closed some 40 parks and hiking trails due to heavy smoke from wildfires raging in the area, the mayor's office announced yesterday.

Following an air-quality alert, the parks will remain closed through the weekend, the office said on X, the former Twitter.

A mountain range bordering the city of 8mn to the east has seen at least four wildfires break out since Monday. Most are now under control, but at least one reached within a few hundred meters (yards) of the popular El Paraiso neighbourhood.

Amid hot, dry conditions linked to the weather phenomenon El Nino, fires have devastated more than 17,000 hectares (42,000 acres) across Colombia over the past three months, the authorities say.

As the country suffers through record heat, the Environment Ministry says at least 20 fires are still active, affecting forests, farmland and the mountain ecosystems that provide water to lower altitudes. With thick smoke degrading air quality in Bogota, the authorities are urging residents — who enjoy hiking and biking on weekends — to stay inside as much as possible and wear masks if they must go out

The office of Mayor Carlos Fernando Galan said he was studying whether he might have to issue mandatory restrictions on citizens' movements.

Colombian President Gustavo Petro declared a natural disaster on Wednesday, allocating funds to address the emergency, and asked UN and European Union member nations for help.

This month could be the hottest in Colombia in 30 years, and February is expected to see even higher temperatures, according to the country's Institute of Hydrology, Meteorology and Environmental Studies. Rain is not expected before March.

Ukraine to Russia: Where are the bodies of dead POWs?

Ukraine's spy chief yesterday questioned why Russia had not shown any images of the bodies of Ukrainian soldiers that Moscow claims were killed when a military plane was shot down. Russia said 65 Ukrainian prisoners of war died when Kyiv shot down a military transport plane on Wednesday near the border between the two countries. While Kyiv has not outright denied Russia's claims, it has questioned key parts of its narrative — in particular, who was on board the plane. "There are a number of factors that are unclear," Kyrylo Budanov, chief of Ukraine's GUR military intelligence unit said in an interview with Ukrainian state TV.

"First of all, they did not show fields covered with corpses and remains," he said.

"If it happened as Russia claims, why does Russia...continue to hide the bodies?," Budanov said yesterday. Russia's Investigative Committee has published three videos of what it says is the crash site. One showed a blurred close-up of a dead body. Another showed a forensics team sealing up a single body bag.

French farmers continue protests despite concessions

rench farmers maintained a series of nationwide protests yesterday, arguing government measures announced to quell the demonstrations did not go far enough to meet their demands for better pay and living conditions.

On Friday, Prime Minister Gabriel Attal's government dropped plans to gradually reduce state subsidies on agricultural diesel, and announced other steps

aimed at reducing the financial and administrative pressures faced by many

farmers.
The FNSEA, France's biggest farming union, said it would keep up its protests and many farmers remained at roadblocks set up by motorways and major roads yesterday.

"The measures announced by Attal are not enough, they will not help our cash flow," farmer Natacha Guillemet told BFM

Others stuck to their threat of setting up roadblocks around Paris.

Demonstrators also held a silent march in the northern French town of Beauvais to pay tribute to farmers who have died in recent years, with some having committed suicide due to the stress of their working conditions.

France is the European Union's biggest agricultural producer and the French farmers' protests follow similar action in other European countries such as Germany and Poland, with many demonstrators saying they are being hit by globalisation and foreign competition.

Gunmen in Iran kill nine Pakistanis in border area

unmen in southeastern Iran killed nine people yesterday, Iranian media reported, with Islamabad's ambassador identifying them as Pakistanis, as the neighbouring countries have sought to ease tensions after deadly cross-border

Iran's Mehr news agency reported that "according to witnesses, this morning unknown armed men killed nine non-Iranians in a house in the Sirkan neighbourhood of Saravan city" in

Sistan-Baluchistan province.
So far, no group had claimed responsibility, the news agency added.

The province's deputy governor, Alireza Marhamati, told official news agency IRNA that according to survivors of the incident, "three armed people shot at the foreigners after entering their residence and fled the scene."

Marhamati confirmed the toll of nine deaths and said three others were wounded.

The Pakistani ambassador to Tehran, Mohamed Mudassir Tipu, said on X, formerly Twitter, he was "deeply shocked by horrifying killing of 9 Pakistanis in Saravan".

"Embassy will extend full support to bereaved families...We called upon Iran to extend full cooperation in the matter."

Pakistani foreign ministry spokeswoman Mumtaz Zahra Baloch condemned the attack as "horrifying and despicable" and asked Iranian authorities to "investigate the incident and hold to account those involved in this heinous crime".

embassy in Iran "will do its best to repatriate dead bodies at the earliest", adding that "such cowardly attacks cannot deter Pakistan from its determination to fight terrorism".

She stressed that the Pakistani

On January 18, Pakistan launched air strikes on "militant targets" in Iran, two days after Iran had launched strikes on its territory. Tehran said it had targeted Jaish al-Adl, a jihadist group which has carried out a spate of deadly attacks in Iran in recent months and blacklisted by Iran as a "terrorist" organisation.

The Iranian strikes, which Pa-

kistan said killed at least two children, drew a sharp rebuke from Islamabad, which recalled its ambassador from Tehran and blocked Iran's envoy from returning to Islamabad.

Tehran also summoned Islamabad's charge d'affaires over Pakistan's strikes, which left at least nine people dead.

The two countries, however, announced last Monday that they had decided to de-escalate and resumed diplomatic missions with the two ambassadors returning to their posts.

The Pakistani ambassador yesterday presented his credentials to Iranian President Ebrahim Raisi in Tehran, the presidency website reported.

"Borders are an opportunity for economic exchanges and improving the security of neighbours, and it is necessary to protect this opportunity against any element of insecurity," Raisi said during the meeting with the Pakistani envoy.

The Iranian president called the two countries "brothers" and described their relations as "unbreakable".

Colombia recalls envoy to Argentina

Colombia has recalled its ambassador to Argentina after Argentine President Javier Milei called Colombian leader Gustavo Petro a "murderous communist". Right-wing libertarian Milei on Thursday said in an interview with a Colombian journalist that Petro was "sinking Colombia". Petro, a former urban guerrilla, took office in August 2022 as the country's first leftist president, with the stated goal of achieving "total peace" in a country ravaged by decades of fighting between security forces, leftist guerrillas, right-wing paramilitaries and drug gangs. He shot back at Milei by saying those who attack him "have no idea what is communism and what is socialism," adding that "we are not looking for" a system where "the state owns the means of production."

Low-income countries need policy reforms to boost growth, avoid costly debt crisis

Problems associated with sovereign debt are acute in lowincome countries due to various factors.

High levels of indebtedness, debt servicing challenges, vulnerability to external shocks, currency depreciation, limited access to capital markets, and dependency on aid, corruption and lack of infrastructure investment exacerbate liquidity squeeze, particularly in low-income countries.

According to IMF, low-income countries have significant debt repayments falling due in the next two years. They need to refinance about \$60bn of external debt each year, about three times the average in the decade through 2020.

But with many competing demands for financing, including from advanced and emerging market economies that are also trying to adapt to climate change, there's a significant risk of a liquidity crunch - failure to raise sufficient financing at an affordable cost. That could in turn lead to a destabilising debt

One major factor for rising debts was higher government borrowing and deficits to mitigate the impact of the pandemic and other external economic shocks. This has increased the level of debt and consequently the cost of servicing it.

However, IMF recently noted it is encouraging that this trend is reversing as countries bring primary deficits back in line with pre-pandemic levels.

In addition, central banks have significantly raised borrowing costs to tame inflation. That makes to raise new debt or refinance existing debt.

While central banks may be done raising rates, it is not clear when they will start to cut volatile financial market

Low-income countries have also increasingly borrowed from the private sector - with about one third of financing coming from private creditors in the last decade compared with about one fifth in the previous decade.

This reflected a slowdown in financing from multilateral

development banks (MDBs) and through official development assistance (ODA) agencies. This shift has increased both financing costs and vulnerability to global financial shocks.

Building resilience in the face of these trends requires countries to act. Some countries have made progress and have taken steps to implement significant energy subsidy reforms to create space for development spending.

But many are lagging behind, especially in efforts to increase revenues, such as broadening the tax base, reducing tax exemptions, and increasing the efficiency of tax administration.

For instance, the typical Sub-Saharan African country raised only 13% of gross domestic product in revenues in 2022, compared with 18% in other emerging economies and developing countries and 27% in advanced economies.

Policy reforms are needed to boost growth and capture more revenue from that growth, for instance, through tax reforms. This will directly improve countries' key debt metrics and ensure they can avoid a costly debt crisis.

However, reforms take time to deliver results, so countries should also proactively work on mobilising funding at lower costs, in particular grants. For some, this might mean turning to the IMF for help.

Addressing sovereign debt issues in low-income countries often requires a combination of measures, including improved governance, debt restructuring, increased transparency, and international assistance to create a more sustainable and inclusive path for economic development.

Takeaways from the New Hampshire primary

Manchester (New Hampshire)

onald Trump, the former president, won his second straight nominating contest over challenger Nikki Haley, the only other Republican left in the race, by besting her in Tuesday's New Hampshire primary.

Haley, who served as Trump's ambassador to the United Nations, was attempting to keep the margin close in order to argue she has a viable path forward.

Meanwhile, President Joe Biden easily won the Democratic primary, even though he wasn't officially on the ballot.

Here are takeaways from the New Hampshire primary:

It was often said in New Hampshire that Haley needed to keep Trump's vote share below 50% in order to argue that more Republicans want Trump to go away than win.

But she failed to do that on Tuesday, leaving her as the leader of a no-Trump coalition that is likely not large enough to get her where she wants to be.

Before voters headed to the polls, Haley's campaign argued a path lay ahead for her even if she didn't win New Hampshire. Campaign manager Betsy Ankney noted that multiple states on the calendar will have setups similar to New Hampshire, where independents can crash the party and vote. South Carolina, which holds

its Republican primary on February 24, allows any voter who doesn't first cast a ballot in the Democratic primary on February 3 to vote. Michigan, which follows, has an open primary and a closed convention. Then comes Super Tuesday on

March 5, when 874 delegates are up for grabs from 15 states and one US territory. Ankney said roughly two-thirds of those are in states with open or semi-open primaries.

She named Virginia, Massachusetts, Texas and North Carolina among states where Haley could perform well with independent or moderate voters whom the campaign views as persuadable.

Still, all of this could soon become academic. If Trump blows Haley out in her home state of South Carolina, where she served as governor, she will face mounting pressure to quit.

Until then, Halev has a month to campaign, raise money and position herself as the only anti-Trump Republican left.

Trump's victory wasn't nearly as sweeping as his Iowa win last week, but it was never expected to be in a state with an electorate packed with moderate Republicans and independents.

In fact, the town-by-town map showed Trump fell to Haley in New Hampshire in many of the same areas where he lost to Biden in 2020. That should concern the Trump

campaign because Biden beat Trump in the state by about seven percentage points, a margin that made it hard for even Trump to cry fraud. According to exit polls by

Edison Research, independents flocked to Haley. She won 60% of them, and she dominated among college graduates 56% to 41%.

All that suggests Biden can still assemble a coalition in November that can defeat Trump if he becomes the nominee.

But there was no denying that Trump continued to flex his muscle with the Republican base.

He crushed Haley among working-class voters without college degrees, according to Edison. Among those who said they made less than \$50,000 a year, Trump took 66% of the vote.

He won large majorities among voters who said they attend religious services weekly and who said they own a gun.

Perhaps most critical for a

rematch with Biden, Trump, unsurprisingly, kept his hold on voters who described themselves as dissatisfied or angry with the state of the country and dominated among voters who said the economy was "not so good or poor."

For voters who said their families were falling behind financially, Trump won 74% of their support.

And for New Hampshire voters who were most interested in which candidate could beat Biden in November, Trump handily beat Haley 59% to 39%.

That means a majority of Republicans still do not buy the argument Haley has been making that Trump is unelectable.

It is hard to lose to a candidate who isn't on the ballot, but Democrat Dean Phillips pulled it off on Tuesday.

For Biden, the result brings a sigh of relief that his campaig avoided what could have been a mortifying night that would provide talk-show fodder for weeks. The incumbent president was on track to win the primary by a nearly 50-percentage-point margin after voters wrote his name in on their ballots.

The primary offered Phillips a chance to make a name for himself after the national Democratic Party punished New Hampshire for refusing to follow the more diverse South Carolina on the Democratic primary calendar. Since no delegates will be awarded from the New Hampshire primary, Biden did not bother with qualifying for the ballot.

Phillips, a Minnesota congressman and the only mainstream Democrat challenging Biden for the nomination, aired a surprising number of TV and radio ads in the run-up to the primary while the Biden campaign kept its distance from the whole thing.

Local Democratic officials, looking to ensure their state did not become a political punchline. mounted a write-in effort on Biden's behalf.

More than 30,000 Democrats braved the cold to write in Biden's name even though it meant nothing in the grand electoral scheme, a win that the White House will take. At least among some Democrats, there were no hard feelings about being bypassed in favour of South Carolina, which holds the first official Democratic primary on February 3.

Haley needed a healthy number of independent voters, who are permitted to vote in the primary. to come out for her to offset Trump's strength with traditional conservatives.

There were early signs that may have been occurring, based on Edison Research exit polls.

According to Edison, 34% of voters who turned out considered hemselves moderates or liberals compared to 29% in 2016, when Trump won the primary handily. Of the 43% who called

themselves independents, Haley was winning 60% of their vote compared to 35% for Trump. She was winning 73% of those who call themselves moderates.

On the flip side, Trump was dominating with self-declared conservatives, winning them by a 70% to 28% margin.

More than half the voters (51%) believe Biden did not win the 2020 election fairly, according to the poll. Trump, who has perpetuated that false claim since he lost to Biden, was getting the vast majority of those voters at 86%.

More than half the voters (54%) also said they believed Trump would be fit for the presidency even if convicted of a crime, the

Conversely, 42% said he would be unfit, and Haley was earning 84% of those voters. That suggests Trump's legal problems could hamper him in a generalelection matchup against Biden. Reuters
