The offer, delivered to Hamas last week by Qatari and Egyptian mediators, awaits a reply from Hamas, the Palestinian resi movement, who say they want the Gaza Strip.

The ambassador added that the arrival of the ship Vulcano yesterday in Italy confirms the success of the joint humanitarian efforts made by Italy and Qatar to alleviate the suffering of civilians.

Meanwhile, Qatar's ambassador in Rome Khalid bin Youssef al-Sada said that the arrival of the new batch of wounded Palestin-



ian children and their families to Italy's Port of La Spezia on board the ship Vulcano is the result of co-ordination and co-operation between Qatar and Italy.

He pointed out that a medi-

cal team of six doctors from Qatar Armed Forces accompanied the wounded Palestinians on board the Italian ship and helped the Italian crew in providing the necessary medical support. (QNA)

More injured Palestinians arrive in Doha for treatment

A Qatar Armed Forces aircraft arrived in Doha carrying the 13th batch of injured Palestinians from the Gaza Strip for treatment, as part of the initiative of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani to provide treatment for 1,500 Palestinians from the Strip. 


PM meets UNRWA commissioner-general

HE the Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Mohamed bin Abdulrahman bin Jassim al-Thani met at his Amiri Diwan office yesterday with Commissioner-General of the UN Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA) Philippe Lazzarini.

The meeting discussed cooperation ties between Qatar and UNRWA, especially in the humanitarian field in the Gaza Strip. HE Sheikh Mohamed emphasised that Qatar will continue to support UNRWA whose responsibility has been doubled amid the current cataclysmic humanitarian situation facing the innocent civilian population in the Gaza Strip. He stressed Oatar's keenness to continue the unhindered and sustainable delivery of humanitarian aid to the Gaza Strip.

He underscored Qatar's appreciation for the critical role performed by UNRWA in helping millions of people in the Gaza Strip, West Bank, Jordan, Syria and Lebanon. HE Sheikh Mohamed warned of the catastrophic consequences arising from putting the funding for UNRWA to a halt, and called for



separating between UNRWA as a UN agency with deep-rooted values and traditions and the claims unleashed against a handful of its personnel who are being interrogated.
For his part, Lazzarini expressed UNRWA's appreciation for Qatar for its generous and unwavering support for UNRWA's programmes to contribute to meeting the emergency humanitarian needs for the Palestinian brothers.

Never respond to fake messages and e-mails asking for bank details or one-time passwords (OTPs), the Ministry of Interior (MoI) has cautioned.

While addressing the *Police With You* programme on Qatar Radio yesterday, Economic and Cyber Crimes Combating Department (E&CCCD) officer First Lieutenant Nayef Nasser al-Hamidi cautioned against phishing attacks that use e-mails or messaging services that prompt to click on a link or open an attachment containing malicious files

"Verify the web address and avoid opening links from suspicious e-mails (which may be) from fraudsters impersonating the websites of various companies," he said.





The Council hosted HE the President of the Civil Service and Government Development Bureau (CGB) Abdulaziz bin Nasser bin Mubarak al-Khalifa along with a number of CGB experts to present the strategic plan for recruitment in the government sector, the plans to train and qualify Qataris for the labour market, replacement and nationalisation, and development of government services.

At the outset of the session, HE al-Ghanem stressed the important role played by the CGB in qualifying Qatari citizens, and its efforts in implementing nationalisation and replacement policies, which stems from the centrality of the human element as a fundamental pillar of development, and as an important resource that must be developed and preserved in line with the Qatar National Vision 2030.

Afterwards, the Council listened to the presentation made by the president of CGB, in which he discussed the efforts made to provide sustainable competitive services and to realise the potential of human resources through excellence and innovation.

During the presentation, HE al-Khalifa touched on CGB's specialisations, its efforts in managing and developing human resources, and its role in the recruitment through the "Kawader" platform, by posting job opportunities in 54 government and semi-government entities and the private sector.

He pointed out that the CGB succeeded during the past year in securing jobs for 4,576 citizens (1,476 males and 3,100 females) in the government sector.

He added that the bureau is continuously developing the "Kawader" platform, to provide support to jobseekers by providing courses on preparing CVs and for passing interviews. More than 1,900 jobseekers have benefited from this during 2023.

He highlighted the bureau's efforts to improve the government work system and develop and qualify cadres, reviewing human resources policies and plans in implementing replacement and nationalisation policies in accordance with the directives of the wise leadership.

He added that the implemen-



es through two paths, the first through immediate replacement via the "Kawader" platform, or through practical training, and the second path is through future replacement through government scholarship programmes.

He pointed out that the first track of the plan is by targeting any job held by a non-Qatari, according to the replacement and nationalisation guide issued by the bureau, to ensure appropriate replacement without disrupting the workflow.

He said that various government agencies succeeded in replacing 712 of the targeted jobs during 2023. Regarding the "Knowledge Transfer" initiative, he said that it is the first-of-itskind at the state level and aims to develop national talent and the capabilities of government sector employees whose experience does not exceed five years to allow them to build a network of professional relationships and to acquire cognitive, behavioural skills in the fields of studies, data analysis, strategic planning, design concept development, project management and effective communication.

The bureau is continuously developing the "Kawader" platform, to provide support to jobseekers by providing courses on preparing CVs and for passing interviews. More than 1,900 jobseekers have benefited from this during 20

Regarding the "Tamheen" programme, launched by the CGB in co-operation with the Ministry of Education and Higher Education, he said that it aims to attract citizens towards the teaching profession by qualifying non-educational university graduates and preparing them to fill teaching positions

HE al-Khalifa said the initiative seeks to develop national expertise in various fields based on the needs required in the government sector through a sixmonth development programme of functional practice and work within consulting companies on existing strategic projects, which contributes to raising the efficiency and performance of employees in particular and the government sector in general.

Regarding the strategic plans in the field of training and qualification, he pointed to the Bu-

reau's efforts to achieve the highest levels of organisational and administrative development and modernisation, as well as to enhance human resources in government agencies and to advance them in a way that increases efficiency, effectiveness and achieves optimal use.

HE al-Khalifa highlighted the achievements of the Institute of Public Administration of the CGB in training and empowering Qatari employees, by providing them with the necessary functional skills that enable them to carry out their tasks effectively.

The institute provided 1,415 training programmes in various fields during 2023 that benefited more than 32,000 government employees, he added.

He also spoke about the efforts of the CGB in developing organisational structures, government services, building capabilities and government leaders, pointing out in this regard the launch of the "Mahara" programme in co-operation with a number of parties to qualify jobseekers and to train them extensively to fill jobs in the technical, technological, administrative and media fields.

HE the President of the CGB also touched on the "Taqat" initiative launched by the Bureau to optimally handle the challenges faced by institutions regarding efficiency of operating employees by re-establishing, qualifying and training them to occupy new jobs that add value to the

He also gave a brief presentation on the bureau's efforts in proposing and reviewing work systems in government authorities with the aim of improving the work environment, such as activating part-time work, launching flexible work systems on an experimental basis to reduce the working hours of female employees of government agencies during vacations, as well as implementing a questionnaire to measure government sector employees' satisfaction with the work environment, to ensure the preparation of plans developed in accordance with employees' points of view.

The presentation also included a comprehensive explanation of the "Ada'a" system launched by the bureau to develop employees' performance and to motivate them to demonstrate their talents and abilities by involving all employees in implementing the employer's goals by linking individual performance to institutional performance. Realising potential of climate loss and damage fund

In the vein of We Are the World, the 1985 hit that sold more than 20mn copies globally, the song $Lasting\ Legacy$ was released at the United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP28) in Dubai. The official charity anthem features 13 artists from around the world singing about unity, co-operation, and climate action.

One legacy of COP28 that ought to be commemorated in song is the launch of the Loss and Damage Fund. This new channel for multilateral finance aims to support developing countries that are facing ballooning costs from storms, heatwaves, floods, landslides, wildfires, droughts, sea-level rise, biodiversity loss, and desertification. These adverse effects of global warming are causing hundreds of billions of dollars in damage every year.

Currently, however, pledges to the Loss and Damage Fund are well below target. At COP28, donor countries, led by France, Germany, Italy, the United Arab Emirates, and the United Kingdom, promised around \$700mn - far short of what is needed to meet the challenge. Despite that, the UAE's commitment is a welcome departure from the widely held view that only those countries with a historic responsibility for climate change should pay for loss and damage. It signals to today's world that the responsibility for the state of the planet and its climate must be borne by everyone, while underscoring the importance of multilateral co-operation, especially among powerful governments.

It is in our common interest to assist the most climatevulnerable countries in a way that does not compromise development

To be sure, billions of dollars are already being invested in climatechange mitigation and adaptation through the multilateral system. Nearly all international financing institutions have facilities devoted to this end. The International Monetary Fund, for example, has its Resilience and Sustainability Trust, which received at least \$41.1bn in pledges as of November 2023. Meanwhile, the UN has several, including the Central ency Response Fund, w spent around \$2.2bn between 2006 and 2022 on efforts to mitigate the effects of climate change, and Country-Based Pooled Funds. The UN Framework Convention on Climate Change Synthesis Report on Loss and Damage (which one of us co-authored) identified some 45 funding windows dedicated to disaster preparedness, with 13 more focused on emergency response.

This raises the question of where the Loss and Damage Fund fits in this crowded and complex terrain. Certainly, there is still a great need for financing: significant gaps remain, and the lack of grant funding, especially for recovery and reconstruction, is particularly worrisome. It will also be crucial to expand climaterisk insurance coverage and facilitate debt swaps (and deferrals) to create more fiscal space amid surging global interest rates. On the other hand, the new fund risks becoming another vain attempt to mend a multilateral system that is outdated and unfit for purpose especially if it is underfunded.

To avoid that outcome, the Loss and Damage Fund should move away from a project-based model that involves doling out small amounts of money. Given the scale of the challenge and the intensity of people's suffering, the Fund should instead embrace structural and policy innovations that would help establish a new generation of multilateral organisations. The Summit for a New Global Financing Pact, convened by French President Emmanuel Macron last year, and the Bridgetown Initiative led by Barbadian Prime Minister Mia Amor Mottley provide many starting points and proposals for redesigning the global financial system.

More specifically, the Loss and Damage Fund could create a new template for countries to mobilise domestic resources for climate mitigation and adaption more effectively, and to access global financial markets and multilateral lending at fair terms, as well as different forms of debt relief. The Fund could also design a global insurance scheme for the most vulnerable households and small and medium-size businesses

In today's fragmented world, the Loss and Damage Fund could easily be derailed. But it is in our common interest to assist the most climate-vulnerable countries with recovery and reconstruction in a way that does not compromise development gains achieved over past decades. Providing these countries with enough resources, financial and otherwise, would ensure stability for us all. – Project Syndicate

Germany's risky alternatives

or years, German foreign policy was rarely a domain of fierce debate over fundamentally different alternatives. Since reunification (1989-91), Europe's largest country and strongest economy has defined its foreign policy in terms of European and transatlantic relations, implying ever-deeper anchoring within the European Union and Nato. In practice, this meant outsourcing German security to the transatlantic alliance, disinvesting militarily, and concentrating on boosting the country's economic power.

Postwar Germany's highest priority has been to forg compromises with fellow Europeans, both deepening and enlarging the EU, which German leaders have seen as the single most important contribution the country can make to peace and prosperity on the continent. Not only is the goal of a stronger EU formally enshrined in Germany's Basic Law, but the country's economic model relies heavily on European integration and global market access. That reliance has only increased now that cheap energy from Russia no longer underpins the

economy's competitiveness. But Germany's party system is changing ahead of this spring's European Parliament elections. Newer, radical parties are openly challenging the postwar consensus. Indeed, the far-right Alternative für Deutschland (AfD) is promoting an exit from the EU, an end to support for Ukraine and sanctions against Russia, and a reversal of the country's decarbonisation policies.

Two years into the current government's tenure, the AfD

has risen to 20% in national polls, and it polls nearly 30% in the three eastern German states that will hold elections this fall. Domestic intelligence authorities are on the watch and have already designated three regional AfD chapters as extremist groups.

Back in 2014 (a year after its founding), the AfD made a point of openly supporting Nato and the United States. But those commitments have faded. In recent years, according to the German investigative outlet Correctiv, AfD politicians have echoed Russian narratives and talking points, describing the US as a "foreign power". Following Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine in February 2022, AfD politicians continued to travel to Russia and to Russian-occupied territory in Ukraine.

AfD members also continue to promote ties with the Russian-led Eurasian Economic Community and the China- and Russia-dominated Shanghai Co-operation Organisation. And recently, the AfD incorporated the idea of a "multipolar world" - the battle cry of Russian and Chinese nationalists - into its party programme.

These changes should do away with the founding myth that the AfD is a copy of the Christian Democrats of the 1980s, firmly anchored in Western values. Never has a party in the Federal Republic adopted a policy of embracing the Kremlin so strongly. The AfD's strategic reorientation toward Russia sets it apart even from many other right-wing parties in Europe, including those in Finland and Sweden. In Italy, the right-wing nationalist prime minister, Giorgia Meloni, has openly sided with Ukraine and criticised the AfD for its Russia ties.

Another radical party that has jumped to double-digit support

in the polls is the Bündnis Sahra Wagenknecht (BSW), founded just last month by Wagenknecht, a longtime senior figure in Germany's far-left party, Die Linke. Wagenknecht wants immediate "peace" negotiations with Vladimir Putin and a resumption of cheap Russian hydrocarbon imports. When it comes to Russia's war of aggression and internationally recognised war crimes against the Ukrainian people, she is largely silent. With Russian disinformation campaigns gearing up ahead of this year's elections, her party has a good chance of entering German state governments and the European

Support for the BSW and the AfD has come at the expense of the ruling coalition members: the Social Democrats, the Greens, and the pro-business Free Democrats. Their popularity is now at historic lows, with some eastern German chapters polling at levels below the 5% threshold to remain in parliament. True, support for the coalition

parties is higher nationally (the eastern states represent only one-fifth of the electorate), and even if the AfD or the BSW make it into regional governments, foreign policy would remain primarily a federal matter. Nonetheless, the AfD's growing support has led established parties - especially the centreright Christian Democrats - to harden their positions on issues such as migration.

German business leaders are waking up to these developments as the country enters its second year of recession. One big worry is that if the AfD gains more ground, sorely needed high-skilled migrant labour may dry up and foreign investment may decline. Companies planning to set up shop in Germany - such as

the chip producers TSMC and Intel - would have a hard time persuading their staff to move to a country with increasingly nativist politics. Corporate leaders are speaking up, realising that protecting Germany's open society is an economic priority as much as it is a moral and political one. Even more importantly,

millions of Germans have taken to the streets following a report by Correctiv that AfD members had met with neo-Nazis to discuss mass deportations of immigrants and "nonassimilated citizens." Even the French far-right leader Marine Le Pen has now distanced herself from the AfD.

Following these revelations, this year's Holocaust Remembrance Day (January 27) and the promise of "never again" acquired a newly poignant resonance. More people are recognising that far-right extremists could become a part of the government in the near future. The fragility of democracy, and the possibility that Germany - or even Europe will return to the darkness of its past, cannot be discounted.

For now, Germany's commitment to Ukraine holds. While the governing coalition is often criticised for late arms deliveries, it has just earmarked another €7bn (\$7.6bn) for Ukraine aid. Germany is now shouldering over half of all EU aid, even though it accounts for only onequarter of the bloc's GDP.

But with the prospect of a victory for Donald Trump in this year's US presidential election, German Chancellor Olaf Scholz has made it clear that others must step up. Germany needs to invest billions into digitalisation, the green transition, its ailing military, transportation infrastructure, and education; but it cannot afford to weaken its European commitment. While the three governing parties have each become somewhat more restrictive on migration, they have doubled down on strengthening the EU.

That means the upcoming European elections will finally offer voters a real choice with far-reaching implications. Moderates will need to explain that a symbolic protest vote for radicals holds real dangers. As Scholz recently warned: "Nationalists act against national interest." At a time when Germany and Europe must adapt to a new geopolitical environment, the danger is acute. – Project Syndicate

China hands suspended death sentence to **Australian writer**

Chinese-Australian dissident writer Yang Jun was yesterday handed a suspended death sentence for espionage in China, Beijing said, five years after he was detained on a rare visit to his homeland.

The Chinese-born Australian citizen has been in jail since 2019 on spying allegations and is said to be in ill health.

The writer, whose pen name is Yang Hengjun, has denied the allegations, telling supporters he was tortured at a secret detention site and that he feared forced confessions may be used against

His sentencing is one of China's heaviest in a public trial for espionage in years. Yang, who gained a huge following in exile for his spy novels and calls for greater freedom in his homeland, was sentenced by a Beijing court yesterday "in an espionage case", the foreign ministry said.

"It found that Yang Jun was guilty of espionage, sentenced him to death with a two-year suspended execution, and confiscated all his personal property," foreign ministry spokesman Wang Wenbin said.

Canberra has condemned the death sentence, which it said could be commuted to life in jail after a period of two years, during which time Yang would remain imprisoned.

"The Australian government is appalled at this outcome," Foreign Minister Penny Wong told a news conference.

"We will be communicating our response in the strongest terms," the Australian minister said.

Chile mourns 122 killed in wildfire

Chile began two days of national mourning yesterday for at least 122 victims of a raging wildfire, as the search continued for the missing and survivors picked through the scorched remains of their lives.

"All of Chile weeps for Valparaiso," President Gabriel Boric said Sunday as the central coastal region reeled from the weekend inferno that has become the world's third-deadliest wildfire this century.

Crowded hilltop neighbourhoods that overlook the tourist hotspot found themselves without electricity and with limited water, the streets strewn with charred cars, debris and ash.

'The most important my house were saved, but now we are without electricity, we can't do anything or charge our cell phones. Traffic is complicated with burned cars, everything is devastated," said Patricia Guzman, 63, in the otherwise razed Canal Chacao neighbourhood

Volunteers streamed to the worsthit areas to help families, rescue pets, and deliver food, water, and

Meanwhile, rescue workers scoured the rubble for further victims.

The state forensic agency yesterday reported the toll stood at 122 dead, with only 32 of the victims identified.

Boric had warned Sunday that the earlier death toll of 112 could rise "significantly."

Most of the deaths have been in Vina del Mar, a popular tourist spot known for its beaches and botanical gardens.

US storm brings record rain, floods

Millions of people faced dangerous flooding in California yesterday after a storm brought record rains and gusting winds, leaving at least one person dead. The US National Weather Service warned of "life-threatening" flash flooding caused by "excessive rainfall," especially in the southern part of the state, as a so-called "atmospheric river" came ashore from the Pacific Ocean.

"This is a serious storm with dangerous and potentially life-threatening impacts," said Governor Gavin Newsom as he declared the state of emergency for eight counties in Southern

Areas under the emergency order include Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego and Santa Barbara. According to the NWS, another five to eight inches of rain were expected to fall around the Los Angeles area Monday, bringing the total amount of rain in the last 48 hours to up to eight to 14 inches in some areas.

Jailed Khan looms large over flawed election

akistan goes to the polls this week in an election that rights observers have dubbed deeply flawed, with the country's most charismatic politician languishing in jail, barred from taking part. The nuclear-armed nation of 240mn people presents itself as the world's fifth largest democracy, but judicial hounding of former prime minister Imran Khan has some questioning that claim.

In the past week Khan, a former international cricketer who led Pakistan to victory in the World Cup in 1992, has been sentenced to lengthy jail terms for treason, graft, and an illegal marriage.

Analysts say the character assassination shows how worried the military-led establishment is that his Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) party could still prove a decisive factor in Thursday's vote.

"I am sure they are worried about it, and the military doesn't have the capacity to put in a fix at national level," said analyst Shuja Nawaz, author of The Battle for Pakistan, a book examining Islamabad's relations with

"PTI can squeak in with a sizeable number and still be a player," he told AFP. Shuja said while Western nations were avoiding making any comment on the political chaos gripping Pakistan, they were still watching events closely, worried about the risk of insecurity.

"In a broad sense, an election in Pakistan

is a mere blip on the radar, given all the crises proliferating around the world," said Michael Kugelman, director of the South Asia Institute at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars in Washington.

"But let's be clear: Pakistan's polls do matter." The country has been run by the military for much of its history since partition from India in 1947, and occupies a strategic space neighbouring also Afghanistan, Iran and China.

It has been at the centre of the so-called

"war on terror", with Al Qaeda founder Osama bin Laden finding shelter in the country until he was killed in a Navy Seal commando raid in 2011.

The architect of the 9/11 attacks on the United States, Khalid Sheikh Mohamed, is a Pakistani, now incarcerated at Guantanamo

The strategic importance is highlighted by the fact that Beijing made the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) the centrepiece of its trillion dollar Belt and Road initiative, giving the world's most populous nation access to the Arabian Sea and beyond via an "all-weather friend".

The country itself, however, appears permanently in crisis.

Deeply in debt, the economy has for decades been propped up by successive bailouts from the International Monetary Fund and loans from wealthy gulf Arab nations.

Inflation is galloping at nearly 30%, the rupee has been in freefall for three years - losing nearly 50% of its value since 2021 and a balance of payments deficit has frozen imports, severely hampering industrial growth. The Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) is expected to win the most seats in Thursday's vote, giving its 74-year-old founder Nawaz Sharif a fourth shot at running the country.

He will most likely have to form a coalition with one or more junior partners - including the Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP), another family-run dynasty now led by Bilawal Bhutto-Zardari.

But the showing of PTI's candidates – forced

to run as independents since the party was barred from competing as a bloc - will be crucial

"No party will get an outright majority, leaving the top finishers - likely led by the PML-N — to put together what will probably be a weak coalition susceptible to heavy influence by the military," predicted Kugelman.

"If PTI loses, its large support base — already reeling from crackdowns on the party - will be highly aggrieved."

His supporters took to the streets last May after Khan was first arrested, a year after he was controversially ousted from office following a National Assembly vote of noconfidence.

Khan claims his dethroning was orchestrated with the help of Washington, angered by his visit to Moscow the day after Russia invaded Ukraine and his refusal to take sides in that conflict.

Khan is out of the picture for now, sentenced to prison terms of 14, 10 and seven years in three hastily-run trials held inside a prison court last week.

But disgrace rarely lasts long in Pakistan politics - frontrunner Sharif was himself sentenced to lengthy jail terms and exile abroad, only to have the convictions quashed when his party's fortunes

improved. It all depends on the mood of the military. said Munizae Jahangir, co-chair of the Human Rights Commission of Pakistan. "They first make up all these leaders and then they demolish them," she told AFP last

UK, Ireland leaders in Belfast as power sharing resumes

The prime ministers of the UK and Ireland met Northern Ireland's new political leaders in Belfast yesterday to mark the return of power-sharing in the province after a two-year impasse.

UK Prime Minister Rishi Sunak arrived in the Northern Ireland capital on Sunday, a day after Sinn Fein's Michelle O'Neill made history by becoming the province's first Irish nationalist leader.

Sunak and his Ireland counterpart Leo Varadkar, who arrived in Belfast yesterday morning, met O'Neill and the pro-UK Democratic Unionist Party's (DUP) Emma Little-Pengelly, who holds the Deputy First Minister post.

The return of devolved governance in the province comes after the DUP, Northern Ireland's biggest pro-UK party, ended a twoyear boycott of Northern Ireland's parliament, Stormont.

The stalemate, which collapsed the devolved government in 2022, was broken after a deal was struck with Sunak's government in London over post-Brexit trade rules in Northern Ireland.

"It has taken a lot of hard work and indeed courage to get us sitting round this table," Sunak told the joint heads of the ministerial executive at Stormont.

"Today isn't the end. It's the beginning, and the real work starts now." The UK government has offered a £3.3bn (\$4.15bn) package to stabilise the region's finances and settle public sector pay claims.

Sunak said the offer represented "a generous and fair settlement", but policy-making ministers in the Northern Ireland Executive are expected to press for more.

Varadkar vowed that his government would "do everything that we can do to help this executive to be successful, adding that

"we're keen to get north-south co-operation going again."

O'Neill, who predicted on Saturday that the UK territory will hold a vote on unification with Ireland within the next decade, said on Saturday that Northern Ireland's funding model was the executive's number one priority.

Northern Ireland was created in 1921 with an in-built Protestant majority after Ireland gained independence from Britain.

Three decades of sectarian conflict erupted within the territory in the late 1960s.

A 1998 peace deal largely ended the violence and provides for the possibility of an all-Ireland vote on unification, often referred to as a border poll.

Under the terms of the accord, the British and Irish governments should organise a vote if it becomes apparent that "a majority of those voting would express a wish" for Northern Ireland to split

"Don't be STUPID!!! We need a separate Border and Immigration Bill. It should not be tied to foreign aid in any way, shape, or form!" said Trump, who running for reelection and is desperate to deprive President Joe Biden of a major legislative win ahead of the November vote.

With the White H looking almost certain to be a rematch of 2020, the Republican former president has been hammering his Democratic successor over record numbers of undocumented migrants crossing the southern border.

Senators unveiled one of the harshest immigration bills in a generation Sunday, including significant restrictions that Biden has committed to signing into law.

The \$118.3bn package includes \$60bn for Ukraine, \$14bn for Israel, \$10bn in humanitarian aid, nearly \$5bn for Asia-Pacific partners including Taiwan, and \$20bn in new border funding.

It would be a major win for immigration hawks - full of concessions that Democrats would normally have strongly opposed, such as the curbing of presidential discretion in allowing in refugees for humanitarian reasons, an expedited removal process and a mandate to close the border when apprehensions reach 5,000 daily.

It also includes none of the priorities Democrats typically push for, such as a path to citizenship for the country's estimated 11mn undocumented mi-

But Trump has an iron grip on Remublicans leading th of Representatives, and has called repeatedly for the party to kill the legislation and deny Biden and his Democrats a political victory ahead of November's election.


