"Some companies are trying to pull a fast one by shrinking the products little by little and hoping you won't notice." Biden said in a video posted on X. "I'm calling on companies to put a stop to this," he said.

'Real progress' in talks for Gaza ceasefire: US

Rafah civilians must be protected: Biden

egotiators working on a phased framework deal to secure a ceasefire for the release of the remaining hostages held by the Palestinian resistance movement Hamas in Gaza have made "real progress" over the last few weeks, a senior Biden administration official said yesterday.

The hostage release deal was the main focus of a 45-minute telephone call between President Joe Biden and Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu yesterday, although there were still some "significant" gaps to close, the official said, adding, "It's pretty much there."

Biden in the call stressed that the United States did not support Israeli military operations in Rafah under the current circum-

stances, with some 1.3mn people sheltering there "with nowhere

Biden told Netanyahu that Israel should not proceed with a military operation in Rafah without a plan to ensure the safety of the people sheltering there, the White House said.

Israel's relentless offensive in the Hamas-ruled Gaza Strip has killed at least 28,176 people, mostly women and children, according to the territory's health ministry says.

Biden's call with Netanyahu happened days after the US leader told reporters that Israel's military response in the Gaza Strip was "over the top," reflecting growing concern and frustration over the rising death toll of civilians in the Palestinian enclave.

The US president called for "urgent and specific steps" to increase the throughput and consistency of humanitarian aid to Palestinian civilians trapped in Gaza, the White House said in a statement.

Aid agencies say an assault on Rafah, located in the southern part of Gaza on the border with Egypt, would be catastrophic. Israel's military ordered civilians to flee south before previous assaults on Gaza's cities, but now there is no obvious place to go and aid agencies have said many people could die.

Invasion of Rafah will 'torpedo' hostage talks, warns Hamas

alestinian resistance movement Hamas warned Israel yesterday that a ground offensive in Rafah, crowded with displaced Gazans, would imperil future hostage releases.

Foreign governments, including Israel's key ally the United States, and aid groups have voiced deep concern over Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's vow to extend operations into the farsouthern Gaza city.

Rafah, on the border with Egypt, has remained the last refuge for Palestinians fleeing Israel's relentless bombardment elsewhere in the Gaza Strip in its four-month war against Hamas.

"Any attack by the occupation army on the city of Rafah would torpedo the exchange negotiations," a Hamas leader told AFP on condition of anonymity.

Netanyahu has told troops to

prepare to enter the city which wounded in Israeli bombardment w hosts more than half of Gaza's total population, spurring concern about the impact on dis-

placed civilians. Some 1.3mn Palestinians have crowded into Rafah, with many living in tents while food, water and medicine are becoming increasingly scarce.

Netanyahu had told US broadcaster ABC News he would provide "safe passage" to civilians wishing to leave.

When pressed about where they could go, Netanyahu said: "You know, the areas that we've cleared north of Rafah, plenty of areas there. But, we are working out a detailed plan."

Israeli strikes have long hit targets in Rafah, and combat seemed intense several kilometres to the north in Khan Younis city.

Israel's military said troops conducting "targeted were raids" in the west of Khan Younis, southern Gaza's main city, while Hamas reported violent clashes and said air strikes also hit Rafah.

Hossam al-Sharqawi of the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies told reporters that "every day our ambulance guys (in Gaza) are martyred or injured".

Egyptian minister visits injured Palestinians in Qatar hospitals

Dr Abdel Ghaffar appreciated the treatment provided by Qatar for the wounded Palestinians in the state-ofthe-art hospitals with distinguished medical staff and the latest medical equipment which ensures the provision of high-quality healthcare.

On the co-ordination between Qatar and Egypt, he said it contributed to the success of the initiative to treat the wounded Palestinians in Doha.

For her part, HE AlKhater expressed Qatar's appreciation for the close co-operation with Egypt, especially the Ministry of Health and the Egyptian Red Crescent, in treating the wounded Palestinians, noting in this regard that most of the wounded



received treatment first in Egypt before being transferred to Qatar for further treatment.

Qatar Charity project enhances vital paediatric services in northern Syria

atar Charity (QC) has launched the "Enhancing Specialised Child Health Services: project in northern Syria, with the support of benefactors from Oatar.

This initiative involves supporting and operating Al-Ra'i Hospital's Paediatric Department for 12 months, aiming to reduce the child mortality rate.

More than 24,556 children are expected to benefit from the services, which will positively impact at least 122,780 individuals in the region.

to this support, the capacity of the Incubators Department has increased.

The hospital has also been able to receive paediatric intensive cases, instead of referring them to Turkiye, a statement added yesterday.

Traffic congestion increased by 23% in 2023: QMIC report

a ccording to the 9th edition of the *Qatar Traffic Report* (*QTR*), released by the *Qatar Mobility* innovations Centre (QMIC), traffic congestion during weekdays increased by 23% last year compared to 2022.

The report, released yesterday, analyses traffic data from 2023 and compares it against previously recorded data from past years.

The report indicates an increase in hours wasted in traffic from 30 hours/year in 2022 to 37 hours/year in 2023.

The report found a correlation between the congestion levels and population, suggesting that cars remain the primary mode of trans-

There was an increase in the correlation by 14% in 2023 vs 2022.
Conversely, the impact of visitors to Qatar on congestion decreased by around 40% in 2023

compared to 2022, making the

overall impact moderate.

"With over 8bn data records collected by the QMIC's multisource data collection network in 2023, we are committed to continue expanding our traffic data bank," QMIC director of technology and research Dr Fethi Filali, who

led the QTR team, said. "This vast and diverse data bank serves as the foundation for generating the an-

The report highlights several key findings, including:

O The three major factors contributed to traffic trends in 2023 which are: Qatar hosting the World Cup; completion of many road projects; and hosting of the Expo 2023 in Doha.

O Commuters, on average, spent around 37 hours in congestion during 2023.

O November was the most congested month of 2023, with a congestion index of 14.4%, while April and July were the least congested, with a congestion index of 9.4%.

O During weekdays, the evening peak (6pm-7pm) was the most

congested time of the day, with a congestion index of 12.2%.

O A different congestion trend is observed on Thursdays, where congestion is higher towards evening compared to the rest of the weekdays.

O The cost of congestion in 2023 is estimated to be around 0.47% of GDP, which is below the global average of about 1%.

The accessible Sokoon app helps individuals learn sign language in a more interactive and seamless way, forge a social network that connects people with deaf and mute individuals, and promotes the feasibility of interaction and communication with society.

The Sokoon app has been upgraded within the framework of the Qatar government's initiative, represented by the MoSDF, to digitise the unified Arabic sign language vocabulary in collaboration with the Arab League.

The application currently includes 2,637 words, 485 sentences, along with 20 classifications in a variety of fields, and it can be surfed in the Arabic, English and French languages.

Qatar is taking effort to empower persons with disabilities at the local, regional and international levels; the country began unifying the Arabic sign language and issued the unified Arabic sign language vocabulary in 2007. – **QNA**

tury, a ship embarked from the Gulf on a monumental journey, connecting three major cultures – the Abbasid Caliphate, the maritime power of Srivijaya, and China's Tang dynasty.

Laden with Chinese ceramics, the ship faced disaster near Palembang, a major port in southern Sumatra (modern day Indonesia).

The Belitung wreck, discovered in 1998 by fishermen, stands as one of the few surviving Indian Ocean World shipwrecks from the ninth century.

Just over a century and a half later, another vessel set sail from southern China, stopping at a port in southern Sumatra before heading to Java.

Known as the Circhon Wreck

Known as the Cirebon Wreck, this ship carried Chinese ceramics and Middle Eastern glassware, offering insight into interregional trade between Indonesia and China in the 10th century.

Discovered between 2004 and 2006, the Cirebon Wreck provides valuable information on trade and the exchange of ideas and social ties that shaped the world.

Artefacts from the Cirebon shipwreck are on permanent display at the MIA and the National Museum of Qatar.

and technological advancements, is impacting the labour markets in both countries that send and receive workers. This will alter the demand for certain jobs, leading to the change and disappearance of some roles, he said.

HE the Minister of Labour and head of Qatar's delegation in the Ministerial Consultation meeting elaborated that the swift advancement in AI technology presents numerous challenges for the future work environment.

However, it also creates new prospects for both workers and organisations. This necessitates acquiring new skills, with an emphasis on apprenticeship and ongoing learning.

HE Dr al-Marri pointed out that the meeting is an opportunity to exchange new ideas, experiences and dialogue on best practices in order to face these challenges and to keep pace with recent developments and transformation towards a more environmentally friendly and knowledge-based economy by providing the workforce with the necessary skills and competencies for the future, providing social protection, providing social protection for workers and facilitating their transition to new jobs. He stressed

the need to support social dialogue and to enable employers to assess their needs for the required skills and competencies in line with the expected developments of the labour market.

Sixteen countries are participating in this year's ministerial consultative meeting, including labour-receiving countries: Qatar, the UAE, Bahrain, Kuwait, Oman, Saudi Arabia, Malaysia, and the Asian labour-sending countries: Bangladesh, India, Indonesia, Nepal, Pakistan, the Philippines, Sri Lanka, Thailand and Vietnam.

The Abu Dhabi Dialogue is a voluntary consultative mechanism that aims to provide a general platform for dialogue between Asian labour-sending and receiving countries, on best practices that will support and enhance bilateral and regional co-operation efforts and partnerships aimed at developing and activating the management of the temporary contractual work cycle. It also aims to enhance the benefits and advantages that will accrue to contract workers, employers and economies of exporting and receiving countries of these temporary workers as a result of mobility for work. The Ministry of Public Health (MoPH), Hamad Medical Corporation (HMC), Primary Health Care Corporation (PHCC), Sidra Medicine and Qatar Red Crescent Society (QRCS) are the partners in the initiative.

Urgent care centres provide 24/7 medical support for nonlife-threatening conditions such as respiratory conditions, minor burns, sprains, severe headache or earache and high fever.

With 13 health centres across Qatar offering urgent care services delivered by the PHCC and QRCS, these facilities ensure that the public has access to the right level of care at the right time.

PHCC has 11 adult urgent care centres, with five of them also accommodating paediatrics. The utilisation of PHCC's urgent care services has shown a steady increase, reflecting the community's reliance on these essential services, allowing for timely, efficient and comprehensive medical

care when needed. PHCC also offers an urgent consultation service via telephone, seven days a week from 7am to 1pm by dialling 16000, selecting PHCC, followed by option 2.

Dr Samya Ahmad al-Abdulla, senior consultant of Family Medicine and executive director of operations at PHCC said: "Our urgent care services, operated in 11 urgent care units within our health centres, allow individuals with urgent but non-life-threatening conditions to access the care they need quickly which contributes to reducing unnecessary pressure on emergency services."

In addition, QRCS runs two 24/7 urgent care centres dedicated to craft and manual workers. Dr Hasan Ali Kasem, chief medical officer – Medical Affairs Division, QRCS said, "In cooperation with the MoPH, QRCS operates four Workers' Health Centers, which provide primary healthcare services for single male workers. Urgent care can be received at two of our centres in Al-Hemailah and Mesaimeer and

Calls are triaged by a doctor to determine which specialty the patient should be referred to. This is available Sunday to Thursday, 8am to 3pm by dialling 16000 and selecting option 3.

Sidra Medicine delivers private urgent care services at its hospital for both women and children. The chargeable care is available via its Paediatric Urgent Care Clinic, open daily from 8am to 12am midnight. Its Women's Urgent Care services provide assessment and treatment for women who require emergency or urgent care related to early pregnancy, gynaecology and obstetric conditions. It is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

With 46 Open Innovation Calls, launched in partnership with 19 local partners across key sectors, including AI and technology, agriculture, energy and environment, healthcare, and transportation, the programme has garnered participation from Qatar and countries worldwide.

The programme received 1,154 submissions from innovators worldwide. Qatar became the second-largest source of applications, with 129 applications submitted by Qatari companies, 11% of the total number of applications submitted.

WAFF president Prince Ali calls on FIFA to 'isolate' Israel

ordanian president of the West Asian Football Federation (WAFF), Prince Ali bin al-Hussein, in a powerful letter has written to FIFA and its federation members calling for united action to "isolate" Israel for its military action in Gaza.

"The situation in Palestine demands our immediate attention and concerted action as a football community. It is with a sense of profound responsibility and commitment to the principles of human rights, justice and peace that we implore your engagement in this crucial matter," said Prince Ali in his letter.

Jordan shares a border with the Palestinian West Bank and Israel, and even before the current crisis had provide a home for an estimated 3mn Palestinian

refugees, according to the UN Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA).

Citing the United Nations' stance on Gaza and the genocide investigations by the International Court of Justice Prince Ali called for an "unequivocal and resolute response from the global football community" citing the principles in article 3 of the statutes and the FIFA Human Rights Policy. The principles "echo our shared commitment to promoting and protecting these rights" said Prince Ali.

"We, the West Asian Football Federations, encompassing all its members, call upon FIFA, the Football Confederations, and Member Associations to join us in taking a decisive stand against the atroci-

ties committed in Palestine and the war crimes in Gaza, by condemning the killing of innocent civilians including players, coaches, referees and officials, the destruction of the football infrastructure, and taking a united front in isolating the Israeli Football Association from all football-related activities until these acts of aggression cease," added Prince Ali.

Desperate Palestinians in Gaza's Rafah fear upcoming attack

he Abu Mustafa family's tent is hard against the high concrete and metal fence separating Gaza from Egypt in Rafah, the last relatively safe place in an enclave devastated by Israel's military offensive, but one that may now also come under attack.

The family is among more than a million Palestinians now crammed into the area around Rafah and fearing they have nowhere left to flee inside a tiny strip largely reduced to rubble and where fighting still rages.

"Every day, we're on the run.

"Every day, we're on the run. Being displaced is tough because I have two daughters with disabilities. I can't carry them around. I don't have a car or a cart," said Laila Abu Mustafa.

"If there will be more displacement, I'm not moving,"

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has ordered an evacuation plan for the civilians who crowd Rafah, camping in streets and empty lots, on the beach and like the Abu Mustafa family on the sandy strip along the Egyptian border.

Before previous assaults on Gaza cities, Israel's military has ordered civilians to leave without preparing any specific evacuation plan. Aid agencies say an assault on Rafah would be catastrophic in a war that has already caused untold misery.

US President Joe Biden was due to speak with Netanyahu, White House officials said, the first conversation between them since Biden last week described Israel's military response in Gaza as "over the top."

The war began on October first week when the fighter group Hamas that controls Gaza stormed the border fence with Israel.

enclave, smashing houses, public buildings and infrastructure with air raids, artillery fire and controlled detonations.

Palestinian health authorities say more than 28,000 people have been killed in the war. More than 85% of Gazans are homeless. A UN survey found that nearly one in 10 children under five are acutely malnourished.

Talks for a deal on a ceasefire and the release of hostages have so far failed to bring an agreement. Last week Israel rejected a Hamas proposal, saying it would not stop fighting while the group retained brigades that Israel says are hiding in Rafah.

Egyptian security sources said more high-level talks were planned for tomorrow with senior officials from Qatar and the US to attend, as well as Israeli and Palestinian delegations.

Israeli air raids have started

targeting Rafah over recent days.

Yesterday, Hamas said Israeli air raids in the Gaza Strip over the previous four days had killed two hostages and injured eight others

The group said any Israeli assault on Rafah would "blow up" the discussions for a deal to free the remaining hostages.

Speaking in an interview that aired on US network ABC yesterday, Netanyahu reiterated that Israeli forces would assault Rafah, but said they were preparing "a detailed plan" for where civilians there could go.

A spokesperson for France's Foreign Ministry said "a large-scale Israeli offensive at Rafah would create a catastrophic humanitarian situation of a new and unjustifiable dimension".

Palestinian health authorities say around 70% of people killed in Gaza are women or children under 18. The Israeli military said in a briefing in December that they thought roughly two civilians had been killed in Gaza for each dead Hamas combatant. The World Health Organisation has described the Palestinian Health Ministry system for reporting casualties as "very good" and UN agencies regularly cite its death toll figures.

Against the border fence, topped with barbed wire, the Abu Mustafa family hangs laundry between tents. They cook what little food they can gather in empty tin cans over a fire in the sand.

Fear of an assault on Rafah is the constant subject of every conversation in the crammed city, said Mariam, a woman who fled her home in Gaza City early in the war with her three children aged 5, 7 and 9.

"I can't describe how we feel. There is turmoil in my head. My children keep asking me when Israel will invade Rafah and where we will go and if we will die. And I don't have the answers," she said.

Jordan's King Abdullah takes part in Gaza aid airdrop

ordan's King Abdullah participated in an air drop of humanitarian aid to Gaza, state-owned Al Mamlaka broadcaster said yesterday.

A video showed the monarch in military gear on board a plane in the latest mission by the Jordanian air force to drop urgent medical supplies to field hospitals it runs in the wartorn enclave. According to official media, the latest airdrop was on Feb 6.

The kingdom, which has been among Arab neighbours pushing Israel to allow more aid into Gaza, is the only country that airdrops aid to the enclave, channelling it through these two medical facilities.

It has conducted 11 air drops, with at least two conducted with the French and Dutch air forces, to deliver medical aid.

The king, who has been vocal in calling for an end to Israel's campaign, left on Thursday on a tour of major Western capitals and is due to meet US President Joe Biden in Washington today. to lobby for an immediate ceasefire.

Jordan succeeded in getting Israel to allow the World Food Programme (WFP) to send deliveries to Gaza through another land route that begins from Jordan, helping ease pressure on the main Rafah border crossing which is limited in capacity.

Jordan, which shares a border with the West Bank, fears that the Gaza conflict could spread, with wider violence by armed settlers encouraged by the army triggering a large-scale Palestinian exodus to the other side of the Jordan River.

Four Emirati soldiers, Bahraini officer killed in Somalia attack

Four Emirati soldiers and a Bahraini officer were killed following an attack in Somalia, where they were training the Somali national army, the United Arab Emirates announced, AFP reported from Dubai. The soldiers were "exposed to a terrorist act" while "performing their work duties in training and qualifying the Somali Armed Forces", the UAE's defence ministry said in a statement on Saturday, adding that three Emirati soldiers and a Bahraini officer were killed. A fourth Emirati soldier, who was among two injured in the attack, "passed away upon arrival" in the UAE yesterday, the official WAM news agency said, raising the overall death toll. The corpses arrived in the UAE capital Abu Dhabi on board a military aircraft, according to WAM, which carried footage of three coffins draped in Emirati flags being carried on a red carpet across the tarmac during a military ceremony.

Nigeria bank boss dies in US copter crash

The co-founder of Nigeria's biggest bank has died in a helicopter crash in the United States along with his wife and son, his company said yesterday, AFP reported from Abuja. Access Bank Group CEO Herbert Wigwe was killed when the aircraft crashed in California on Friday, Access Holdings said in a statement. "Dr Wigwe died alongside his wife and son on Friday, February 9, 2024 in a helicopter accident in the United States," it said. "The entire Access family mourns the loss of Herbert, Doreen and Chizi." US authorities said two crew members and four passengers were killed. Nigeria's President Bola Ahmed Tinubu said former Nigeria Stock Exchange president Abimbola Ogunbanjo was among the dead, calling the crash "an overwhelming tragedy that is shocking beyond comprehension." "The President condoles with the Wigwe and Ogunbanjo families, the business community, and all those impacted by this harrowing incident," his spokesman said in a statement yesterday.

Senegal protest death toll rises to three

A 16-year-old died following clashes in Senegal's Ziguinchor, the third fatality in unrest after President Macky Sall postponed this month's election, a hospital source and a local politician said yesterday, AFP reported from Dakar. Sall's decision to push back the February 25 presidential vote has plunged Senegal into one of its worst crises since independence from France in 1960. Protests pitting youths against the security forces have turned increasingly violent in a country seen as a haven of stability and democracy in West Africa, a region roiled by coups and unrest. Landing Camara, who was known as Diedhiou, died Saturday evening in hospital after being wounded in Ziguinchor. His identity papers showed he was 16, after the hospital source said he was 19. The southern city is a stronghold of jailed opposition figurehead Ousmane Sonko, where youths and security forces clashed throughout the day.

Tensions have spiralled since the bloodiest ever Gaza war erupted in the first week of October with the Palestinian group Hamas's storming of Israel, in turn sparking violence between fighter groups and US forces.

Support for the Palestinian cause and harsh criticism of the US — often dubbed the "Great Satan" in Iran — and Israel dominated ceremonies marking the anniversary.

In Tehran, Raisi accused the "Zionist entity", Iran's term for

Israel, of committing "genocide" in Gaza with the support of the US and other Western countries.

Supporters chanted "Down with the United States", "Down with Israel" and "Down with the United Kingdom" at the square, where Iranian-made missiles and other military hardware were on display.

Raisi demanded that the "bombing of Gaza should be stopped as soon as possible" and declared that "the death of the Zionist regime has come", in his speech to thousands at Azadi Square in western Tehran.

He asked about Israel: "How can a regime that has violated 400 statements and resolutions of international organisations adhere to UN covenants? "We believe that one of the important steps that should be taken is the expulsion of the Zionist regime from the UN."

Iran has presented itself as one of the main supporters of Hamas in the war triggered by its October first week storming of southern Israel. Israel has vowed to eradicate Hamas and launched a military offensive that has killed at least 28,176 people, mostly women and children, according to the health ministry in the Hamas-run Gaza Strip. Iran has hailed Hamas's October first week storming as a "success" but denied any direct involvement.

Crowds in Azadi Square held up portraits of the Supreme Leader, Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, as well as of the founder of the Islamic Republic, Ayatollah R Khomeini, and popular general Qasem Soleimani, who was killed in an US strike in Ianuary 2020.

Iran has been under crippling US sanctions since Washington's 2018 withdrawal from a landmark deal which granted it sanctions

relief in return for curbs on its nuclear programme.

The US has accused Tehran of "actively facilitating" attacks on US forces in the Middle East and of backing attacks on Red Sea shipping by Yemen's Houthi rebels, charges Iran has denied.

Around Azadi Square, Iranianmade Qiam ballistic missiles, Shahed 136 drones and Simorgh satellite launchers were on display.

Western countries have accused Iran of supplying drones to Russia during the Ukraine war, which Tehran denies, and missiles to armed groups in the Middle East.

The celebrations come ahead of March 1 legislative elections, the first national vote since a large-scale protest movement shook Iran after the death of Mahsa Amini on September 16, 2022. Amini, 22, died after being arrested for allegedly violating the country's strict dress code for women.

King Charles thanks well-wishers after cancer diagnosis

ritain's King Charles III ex-pressed his "heartfelt thanks" to well-wishers, in his first statement since his shock announcement that he has cancer.

Buckingham Palace said on Mon-

day that Charles had begun treatment, but did not specify what type of cancer he has.

"I would like to express my most heartfelt thanks for the many messages of support and good wishes I have received in recent days," the king wrote in a message to the public. "As all those who have been affected by cancer will know, such kind thoughts are the greatest comfort and encouragement," he added.

The note was published on the 75-year-old monarch's website and the royal family's official page on social media platform X.

Charles added that it is "equally heartening to hear how sharing my own diagnosis has helped promote public understanding and shine a light on the work of all those organisations which support cancer patients and their families across the UK and wider world."

"My lifelong admiration for their tireless care and dedication is all the greater as a result of my own personal experience," he concluded, signing the letter "Charles R."

Britain's National Health Service

reported last week that the king's diagnosis had sparked a surge in online searches for advice about the

Charles has taken an indefinite break from public duties while he receives treatment and is currently staying at the royal country residence of Sandringham, in the east of England. He is continuing some

administrative duties and held his weekly audience with the prime minister via phone this week.

Charles is not thought to have prostate cancer, since after his recent hospital procedure for a benign prostate enlargement the palace said that "a separate issue of concern was noted", adding subsequent tests had identified "a form of cancer".

India scrutiny of Chinese firms unnerves suppliers: Xiaomi

hina's Xiaomi has told New Delhi that smartphone component suppliers are wary about setting up operations in India amid heavy scrutiny of Chinese companies by the government, according to a letter and a source with direct knowledge of the matter.

Xiaomi which has the biggest share in India's smartphone market at 18%, also asks in the letter dated February 6 that India consider offering manufacturing incentives and lowering import tariffs for certain smartphone components.

The Chinese company assembles smartphones in India with mostly local components and the rest imported from China and elsewhere. The letter is Xiaomi's response to a query from India's information technology ministry asking how New Delhi can further develop the country's component manufacturing sector. India ramped up scrutiny of Chinese businesses after a 2020 border clash between the two countries killed at least 20 Indian soldiers and four from China, disrupting investment plans of big Chinese companies and drawing repeated

protests from Beijing. While Chinese companies operating in India are reticent to speak publicly about the scrutiny, Xiaomi's letter shows that they continue to struggle in India, especially in the smartphone space where many critical components come from Chinese suppliers.

In the letter, Xiaomi India president Muralikrishnan B said India needed to work on "confidence building" measures to encourage component suppliers to setup operations locally. "There are apprehensions among component suppliers regarding establishing operations in India, stemming from the challenges faced by companies in India, particularly from Chinese origin," Muralikrishnan said, without naming any companies. The letter said the concerns were related to compliance and visa issues that it didn't elaborate on, and other factors. It said "the government should address these concerns and work to instil confidence among foreign component suppliers, encouraging them to set up manufacturing facilities in India."

Xiaomi and the IT ministry did not respond to queries for further information and comment.

Indian authorities last year accused Chinese smartphone company Vivo Communication Technology of breaching some visa rules and alleged it siphoned \$13bn in funds from India. India has also frozen more than \$600mn in Xiaomi assets for alleged illegal remittances to foreign entities by passing them off as royalty payments. Both Chinese companies deny any wrongdoing.

Other than regulatory scrutiny of the likes of Xiaomi and Vivo, India has since 2020 also banned more than 300 Chinese apps, including ByteDance's TikTok, and halted planned projects such as those planned by Chinese automakers BYD, and Great Wall Motor.

Philippines accuses China vessels of 'dangerous' manoeuvres

The Philippine Coast Guard yesterday accused Chinese vessels of "dangerous" manoeuvres during a nine-day patrol near a reef off the coast of the Southeast Asian country.

The Philippine vessel BRP Teresa Magbanua was sent in early February to patrol the waters around Scarborough Shoal, a rich fishing ground in the South China Sea, and deliver provisions to Filipino fishermen and ensure their safety.

The reef has been a flashpoint between the countries since China seized it from the Philippines

Since then, Beijing has deployed patrol boats that Manila

says harass Philippine vessels and prevent Filipino fishermen from reaching the lagoon where fish are more plentiful.

During the patrol, Chinese Coast Guard (CCG) vessels "performed dangerous and blocking manoeuvres at sea against BRP Teresa Magbanua four times, with the CCG vessels crossing the bow of the PCG vessel twice", the Philippine Coast Guard said in a statement.

The Philippine Coast Guard said its ship was also "shadowed" by four Chinese Coast Guard ves-

sels "on more than 40 occasions". The coast guard also observed what it described as "four Chi-

nese Maritime Militia vessels". China Coast Guard spokesman Gan Yu hit back, saying the Philippine vessel had "illegally intruded" into the waters several

"The China Coast Guard, noting that the warnings it had issued had proved ineffective, took action in accordance with the law to control the progression of the Philippine vessel and force it to leave," Gan said.

"The China Coast Guard dealt with the incident professionally and to standard," he added.

Videos released by the Philippine Coast Guard show a Chinese Coast Guard vessel metres from the port beam of the BRP Teresa Magbanua, before it crosses the path of the Philippine boat.

Scarborough Shoal is 240kms west of the Philippines' main island of Luzon and nearly 900kms from the nearest major Chinese land mass of Hainan.

The incidents came two months after tense standoffs between China and the Philippines around disputed reefs in the South China Sea that saw a collision between vessels from the two countries and Chinese ships blasting water cannon at Philippine boats.

China claims almost the entire sea and has ignored an international tribunal ruling that its assertions have no legal basis.

It deploys boats to patrol the busy waterway and has built artificial islands that it has militarised to reinforce its claims.

Chinese and Philippine officials last month agreed on the need for closer dialogue to deal with "maritime emergencies" in the waterway as tensions esca-

Philippine landslide death toll rises to 54

The number of people killed by a landslide in the southern Philippines has risen to 54, the provincial government said yesterday, as rescue workers dug more bodies from the mud. The landslide struck on Tuesday night near a gold mine in Maco town in the province of Davao de Oro, burying homes and vehicles ferrying employees to the site operated by Apex Mining. Davao de Oro's provincial government said in a Facebook post that 54 people had died in the landslide, raising its previous death toll of 37 earlier in the day as rescue workers found more bodies. The tally of missing people stood at 63 people, with the provincial government saying the number remains unverified. A total of 32 people were injured in the landslide. Edward Macapili, an official at Davao de Oro, said over 300 people were involved in the rescue, but operations were being hampered by heavy rain, thick mud and the threat of further landslides.

India's 'lake man' cleans up critical water supplies

ncient lake systems once provided Bengaluru with critical water supplies, but the Indian tech hub's breakneck expansion left many waterways covered over or used as dumps.

In the rush to modernise, the city once known for its abundance of water largely forgot the centuriesold reservoirs it depended upon to survive, with the number of lakes shrinking by more than three-quar-

But after experts warned the city of nearly 12mn - today dubbed "In-

dia's Silicon Valley" - would not be able to meet its water needs with existing resources, mechanical engineer Anand Malligavad decided to take action.

"Lakes are lungs of the earth," said the 43-year-old, known to some as the "lake man" for his campaign to bring scores of them back to life.

"I tell people if you have money, better to spend it on lakes. Decades later, it will serve you."

Water shortages are a chronic problem in India, which has nearly a fifth of the world's population but only four percent of its water resources, according to government

think tank NITI Aayog. Malligavad's first target was a trash-filled and dried-out site he passed on his way to work at an automotive components maker.

"I thought instead of inspiring people... let me start doing it," Malligavad said. "Let it start with me."

He began by studying the skills used during the centuries-long rule of the medieval Chola dynasty, who turned low-lying areas into shallow reservoirs that provided water for drinking and irrigation.

The lakes stored the heavy monsoon rains and helped to replenish groundwater.

But of the 1.850 that once dotted the city, fewer than 450 remain today. Many were destroyed to make room for high-rise towers, while canals were filled in with concrete meaning heavy rainfall now sparks flooding and is not stored for the

Nearly half of Bengaluru depends on water sucked from intensive groundwater boreholes that often run dry in the summer heat, according to the city's Water, Environment, Land and Livelihoods (WELL) Labs research centre.

Many residents already rely on expensive water trucked in from afar, and the problem is likely to get worse as climate change pushes global temperatures higher and alters weather patterns.

"We're dependent on a precarious groundwater table, and that is going to get even more precarious as you have a more unreliable rainfall," said WELL Labs chief Veena Srinivasan.

"We already don't have enough water to drink," she added, noting that "the water sources that we do have, we are polluting".

Fixing lakes can ease the problem, though the city still needs a largescale urban water management plan, she said.

Malligavad, trekking out to visit more than 180 ancient lakes, said he saw the "simple cost" they had taken

to construct. They did not use expensive materials but only "soil, water, botanicals

(plants) and canals", he said. He persuaded his company to

stump up around \$120,000 to fund his first project, the restoration of the 36-acre Kyalasanahalli lake.

Using excavators, Malligavad and his workers took around 45 days to clear the site back in 2017. When the monsoon rains came

months later, he went boating in the cool and clean waters. The restoration process is simple,

Malligavad said. He first drains the remaining

lake water and removes the silt and weeds.

Then he strengthens the dams, restores the surrounding canals and creates lagoons, before replanting the site with native trees and aquatic

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PACE satellite spurs climate, ocean research

The successful launch of a Nasa satellite last Thursday is a fillip in the quest to study ocean health, air quality, and the effects of a changing climate for the benefit of humanity. Known as PACE, the Plankton, Aerosol, Climate, ocean Ecosystem satellite has made contact with ground stations back on Earth providing teams with early readings of its overall status, health, operation, and capabilities postlaunch. A full postlaunch assessment review to determine PACE's readiness to move into the operational phase of its mission will be conducted in the coming weeks.

Information collected throughout PACE's mission will benefit

society in the areas of ocean health, harmful algal bloom monitoring, ecological forecasting, and air quality. PACE also will contribute new global measurements of ocean colour, cloud properties, and aerosols, which will be essential to understanding the global carbon cycle and ocean ecosystem responses to a changing climate. The PACE's mission is designed to last at least three years, though the spacecraft is loaded with enough propellant to expand that timeline more than three times as long

From hundreds of kilometres above Earth, the PACE mission will study the impact of tiny, often invisible things: microscopic life in water and microscopic particles in the air. "With this new addition to Nasa's fleet of Earth-observing satellites, PACE will help us learn, like never before, how particles in our atmosphere and our oceans can identify key factors impacting global warming," said Nasa administrator Bill Nelson. "The satellite's hyperspectral ocean colour instrument will allow researchers to measure oceans and other waterbodies across a spectrum

visible, and nearinfrared light. This will enable scientists to track the distribution of phytoplankton time from space identify which communities of these organisms are present on daily, global scales. Scientists and coastal resource managers can use the data to help forecast the

health of fisheries, track harmful algal blooms, and identify changes in the marine

environment.

The spacecraft also carries two polarimeter instruments, Hyper-Angular Rainbow Polarimeter #2 and Spectro-polarimeter for Planetary Exploration. These will detect how sunlight interacts with particles in the atmosphere, giving researchers new information on atmospheric aerosols and cloud properties, as well as air quality at local, regional, and global scales. With the combination of the instrument and the polarimeters, PACE will provide insights into the interactions of the ocean and atmosphere, and how a changing climate affects these interactions.

"Observations and scientific research from PACE will profoundly advance our knowledge of the ocean's role in the climate cycle," said Karen St. Germain, director, Earth Science Division, Science Mission Directorate, at Nasa Headquarters in Washington. "The value of PACE data skyrockets when we combine it with data and science from our Surface Water and Ocean Topography mission – ushering in a new era of ocean science. As an open-source science mission with early adopters ready to use its research and data, PACE will accelerate our understanding of the Earth system and help Nasa deliver actionable science, data, and practical applications to help our coastal communities and industries address rapidly evolving challenges."

Earth's oceans are responding in many ways to climate change – from sea level rise to marine heat waves to a loss of biodiversity. With PACE, researchers will be able to study climate change's effects on phytoplankton, which play a key role in the global carbon cycle by absorbing carbon dioxide from the atmosphere and converting it into their cellular material. These tiny organisms drive larger aquatic and global ecosystems that provide critical resources for food security, recreation, and the economy.

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
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How to democratise AI

he rapid advance of artificial intelligence evokes both wonder and dread. Many regard AI as an object of marvel and awe (a Stupor Mundi, to borrow a Latin phrase), while others believe it can be a benevolent saviour (a Salvator Mundi). Regardless of whether AI is seen as miraculous or merely helpful, the question remains: How can we ensure that its benefits are available to everyone?

To answer this question, we need a nuanced understanding of AI. That means rejecting several simplistic narratives: functionalism, which says humans should adapt and augment themselves to keep up with technological progress; sensationalism, which depicts AI as an existential threat; cynicism, which seeks to exploit AI for profit; and fatalism, which implies a resigned acceptance of AI's inevitable rise.

What these scenarios overlook is that the future is still ours to shape. Adopting the verumfactum principle – knowing through making – is crucial to developing a more profound understanding of AI's capabilities and implications.

To prevent a minority from co-opting AI's transformative potential, it must be democratised. Equitable access is the key to ensuring that the benefits of technological progress are broadly shared, and that AI serves as a unifying force, rather than exacerbating the divisions within our fragile societies.

The potential benefits are enormous. In the 1990s, Joseph

Stiglitz observed that "a child anywhere in the world who has access to the Internet has access to more knowledge than a child in the best schools of the industrial countries did a quartercentury ago." By democratising access to AI, we can empower today's children to engage with humanity's brightest minds in a way that caters to their individual needs.

But achieving this depends on how we shape the narrative surrounding AI's adoption and future impact. Instead of making lofty promises like "AI will solve world hunger," we should focus on its ability to bring about incremental yet meaningful improvements in people's daily lives.

In this regard, the technology's rapidly expanding capabilities and declining costs create new opportunities for smaller-scale models and enable individual users to personalise AI solutions, mirroring the Internet's freewheeling, creative early days. Just two years ago example, the leading opensource AI model was Meta's OPT-175B. Today, a leading open-source model, Mistral 7B, is 40 times smaller, at least 40 times cheaper to operate, and outperforms its predecessor. Remarkably, it was developed by a company of just 18 people.

And this is just the beginning.
Al is currently experiencing

setting the stage for rapid uptake,
akin to the diffusion of telephones
and televisions. This accelerated
process calls for a shift in focus
toward developing practical
applications and mitigating risks,
rather than fixating on reducing
costs.

osts. The rise of AI is a double-edged

sword. The technology could be a powerful equaliser or a source of division, depending on how it is deployed and who controls it. Like previous technological revolutions, it promises to create new employment opportunities while simultaneously threatening to displace existing jobs. A recent report by the International Monetary Fund underscores this point, warning that AI could lead to a growing divide between techsavvy individuals, well-positioned to reap the economic benefits of innovation, and those who risk falling behind.

But our understanding of these technologies must reflect their complexities and the power of human ingenuity. By developing and promoting AI systems that significantly improve essential services, especially in underserved regions, we could ensure that their benefits are broadly shared. To achieve this, AI technologies must be deployed with the explicit objective of reducing existing inequalities.

At the same time, it is worth noting that AI will most likely increase the overall consumer surplus by lowering the costs associated with certain services. To ensure that these benefits reach the majority of people, a two-fold strategy is necessary: enabling individuals to harness this value locally while redistributing the overall gains to those unable to access them.

Hence, enhancing the accessibility of AI is both feasible and critical. To leverage these technologies to tackle pressing social problems, it is crucial to identify specific areas where AI can make a substantial difference, such as healthcare, education, environmental sustainability, and governance. But setting the

right priorities and implementing technological solutions requires a concerted effort. The concept of AI for good should be integrated into the strategies of development institutions and multilateral organisations.

But first, the global conversation about AI must shift from "wow" to "what" and "how." It is time to move away from mere fascination with the emerging technology to identifying the challenges it can address and devising strategies for its integration into the educational and social systems of developed and developing countries alike. Preparing society for an AI-augmented future requires more than just technological innovation; it calls for establishing ethical frameworks, updating policymaking, and promoting AI literacy across communities.

As we navigate the Stupor Mundi phase of AI, captivated by its seemingly magical capabilities, we must never lose sight of the fact that the impact of technology depends on how we use it. The choices we make today will determine whether AI benefits and enriches a select few or evolves into a powerful force for positive social change. To realise the promise of Salvator Mundi, we must harness these emerging technologies to forge a better, more inclusive future for all.

PTI-backed independents lead in final tally

The final results of Pakistan's national election put independents, backed by jailed former prime minister Imran Khan, in the lead with 93 of 264

The party of another former prime minister, Nawaz Sharif, was second with 75 seats after Thursday's vote, lacking a clear majority but it was the largest single party in parliament as Khan's independents ran as individuals.

As coalition talks were held and protesters blocked roads in the north of the country, it was not clear who would form a government. The final tally of votes was published by the Election Commission more than 60 hours after voting ended, raising questions over the delay.

The former prime ministers and bitter rivals have both declared victory, adding to the uncertainty as the country faces numerous urgent challenges, including negotiating a new International Monetary Fund programme to keep a struggling economy afloat.

A prime ministerial candidate has to show a simple majority of 169 seats in the National Assembly when the house is called in the coming days. This will be determined by coalition talks and whether Khan-backed candidates are able to join a smaller party in parliament to form a single bloc to gain reserve seats.

Khan's PTI party had threatened to hold nationwide peaceful demonstrations yesterday if the vote tally was not released over-

Pakistan's interim government said the voting count delay was caused by communications issues due to a mobile Internet outage on Election Day. The outage, which authorities said was for security reasons, drew concern from human rights groups and foreign governments, including the United States.

Around 93 of the independent candidates who won seats were associated with Khan's PTI party. Khan's supporters ran as in-

dependents because they were barred by the Election Commission on technical grounds from contesting the polls under his party's electoral symbol.

Despite the ban and Khan's imprisonment for disputed convictions on charges ranging from leaking state secrets to corruption, millions of the former cricket superstar's supporters came out to vote for him, even though he cannot be part of any government

Scenarios: What's next in deadlock

Pakistan's national election ended with no party winning a majority in parliament, in polls marred by militant violence, political turmoil and questions of transparency. Former prime ministers

and bitter rivals Nawaz Sharif and Imran Khan both declared victory, adding to the uncertainty as the country faces numerous challenges that need to be addressed quickly, including negotiating a new International Monetary Fund programme to keep a struggling \$350bn economy afloat. Next, a prime ministerial candidate has to show a simple majority of 169 seats in the National Assembly when the house is called in coming days. The Assembly consists of 336 seats of which 266 are decided through direct voting on polling day. There are also 70 reserved seats - 60 for women and 10 for non-Muslims - allotted according to the strength of each party in the house to determine the final position of parties in the Assembly. Here are four scenarios on what could happen next:

Sharif strikes deal to head a coalition

Sharif's party, which won 75

seats, strikes a deal with the Pakistan People's Party (PPP) of Bilawal Bhutto-Zardari, the son of assassinated former premier Benazir Bhutto, which won 54 seats, to pull together a majority in parliament.

The two, along with other smaller parties, form a coalition government in which Sharif or his brother is prime minister and important positions are given to other parties. The two parties were in government together for 16 months till August, with Bhutto Zardari as foreign minister and Sharif's brother Shehbaz as prime minister.

Khan's independents sweep to power

Khan's independent candidates, who won 93 seats, join a smaller party in parliament in order to form a single bloc to fulfil a requirement for them to be allocated reserved seats. That would push them closer to a majority and allow them to put up a candidate for prime

They can also strike a deal with other parties to support a consensus candidate, which also means Khan's supporters are in power, and can push to have their jailed leader released under an agreement. Khan himself is not eligible to become prime minister The party will have to push hard for allies to align with Khan's

Bilawal pushes to head coalition

While Sharif and Khan's candidates won the most seats. no party can form government without the PPP. With both looking to keep the other out of power, the PPP strikes a deal to make the young Bilawal prime minister.

He pushed the idea before the polls, saying he would bring a fresh approach to pull Pakistan out of multiple crises which other aged leaders have been unable to do.

No deal, army steps in

Uncertainty drags on with noone able to form government. Pakistan's army, the most powerful and organised force in the country, steps in to restore order and takes power as it has done thrice before in the country's 76-year history - the last time in 1999 to overthrow Sharif's government. The army has already called on political parties to show "maturity and unity".

Clashes were reported in Rawalpindi city, south of the capital, and Lahore, in the east, while dozens of other protests were held across the country without incident.

Police warned earlier they would come down hard on "illegal" gatherings. There were no immediate reports of injuries from

"Throughout Pakistan, elections were manipulated in a subtle way," PTI chairman Gohar Ali Khan told a news conference Saturday, calling on supporters to "protest peacefully" yesterday.

Authorities warned they would take strict action, saying so-called Section 144 orders were in place a colonial-era law banning public gatherings.

"Some individuals are inciting illegal gatherings around the Election Commission and other government offices," a statement from Islamabad's police force said

"Legal action will be taken against unlawful assemblies. It should be noted that soliciting for gatherings is also a crime," it said.

A similar warning was also issued in Rawalpindi, while dozens of police equipped with riot gear assembled near Liberty Market in

In Rawalpindi, AFP staff saw police fire tear gas at a crowd of dozens of PTI supporters after they refused orders to stop picketing an office used to collect constituency election results.

Another gathering of around 200 PTI supporters in Lahore dispersed quickly when police moved in with riot shields and batons.

Local media said several people were detained in Karachi, in the south, when they refused orders to clear the area.

Khan's candidate deserts party

As the race to secure support from independent candidates, Waseem Qadir, who was backed by the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI), deserted the party last night to join the Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N). His decision followed a triumphant victory over PML-N's Sheikh Rohail Asghar in the NA-121 constituency of Lahore, where he secured a commanding lead of over 8,000 votes in the polls held on February 8. This development unfolds against the backdrop of negotiations between the PML-N and the Pakistan People's Party (PPP) regarding the potential formation of a coalition

Milei, Pope meet face to face in Rome

Argentina's top political and religious leaders - President Javier Milei and Pope Francis met for the first time vesterday in Rome, amid the explosive economic situation in their native country.

The two men with sharply diverging views on how to eradicate the poverty gripping Argentina met briefly before and after a papal mass, during the 53-year-old economist's first official visit to Rome as president. Milei, a libertarian and freemarket champion who once called the 87-year-old pope from Buenos Aires an "imbecile" who "promotes communism". attended the ceremony at St Peter's Basilica to canonise Argentina's first female saint. Following the mass, Francis, in a wheelchair, stopped briefly to shake hands and share a few words with Milei amid the

congregation, who gave the pontiff a hug. The Vatican said they also met briefly beforehand.

An official audience comes today. when Milei also plans to meet with Italian President Sergio Mattarella and Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni.

The meeting between the two men comes amid major political uncertainty in Argentina, where newcomer Milei is engaged in a controversial, massive deregulation of Argentina's economy by presidential decree. Milei and Francis radically disagree over how to tackle poverty, which affects 40% of the population of Argentina, where inflation soars over 200* Francis has railed throughout his papacy against the inequalities generated by the free markets, calling for protection of the most vulnerable in society.

Mayotte birthright citizenship revoked

French authorities yesterday announced a controversial plan to amend the Constitution to revoke birthright citizenship on the French Indian Ocean island of Mayotte, which has been struggling with social unrest and a crippling migration crisis.

The proposal risks to further ramp up tensions in France following the adoption of a tough new law on immigration.

The left denounced the fresh plan as another attack on France's centuries-old values, while the right suggested it be enforced across the

Centre-right Stubb leads Finland presidential vote

lexander Stubb of the centre-right National oalition Party led in the run-off vote for Finland's next president yesterday, with 52.7% support in early results, justice ministry data showed.

The liberal Green Party member Pekka Haavisto was behind him at 47.3% support, with 63.2% of the votes counted, the data Finland is electing a new head

of state who will also be responsible for its security and foreign Stubb, a former prime minister,

won the first round on January 28 with 27.2% of the vote ahead of Haavisto on 25.8%. He has also led Haavisto in surveys, most recently by 6-8 percentage points.

"A very good start to this evening. That feels good at the moment but there are still plenty of votes to be counted," Stubb said after seeing the early results.

Haavisto remained hopeful.

"We are starting from a bit behind but it's still possible to catch up in the Election Day votes," he

The vote marks a new era in Finland, which for decades has elected presidents to foster diplomacy, in particular with neighbouring Russia, and opted not to ioin military alliances so it could soothe tensions between Moscow

and Nato But Finns changed their minds about playing that role after Russia's invasion of Ukraine in 2022, in a rapid U-turn that led to the country joining Nato in April last

Now under the Western alliance's security umbrella, the new president will replace Sauli Niinisto, who is retiring after two sixvear terms in which he earned the nickname "the Putin Whisperer" for his previous close ties with the Russian leader.

Niinisto's successor will have a central role in defining Finland's Nato policies, while taking the lead on overall foreign and security policy in close co-operation with the government and acting

Vegan garden at QIFF is the largest in Qatar's history

he 13th Qatar International Food Festival (QIFF) is breaking new ground by showcasing its largest 100% vegan garden to date, offering visitors a wide selection of healthier food options and a diverse range of culinary experiences.

"Eight years ago, we launched Evergreen Organics at the food festival with the idea to test the market," Qatari entrepreneur Ghanim al-Sulaiti told Gulf Times on the sidelines of the festival, which runs until February 17 at Expo 2023 Doha, at Al Bidda Park. "Now, we have 14 (local and international) vegan concepts in one place."

Citing the growing demand for healthy and vegan options, he said that they were delighted to see the enthusiastic response from people eager to indulge in healthy and vegan cuisine.

Among the favourites, al-Sulaiti said, were vegan hot dogs and machboos, both of which have

garnered significant attention since the festival's opening.

"In the festival, we're very happy to see that vegan hot dogs being a staple, a lot of people want to try them," he said, noting that partnerships with renowned chefs and brands like Beyond Meat have helped elevate these dishes, challenging traditional perceptions of vegan cuisine.

"The vegan machboos is also very interesting ... we collaborated with Chef Noor AlMazroei, a local Qatari traditional chef, who created a vegan alternative to the machboos," he said. "The goal of this is to change the norms and change what people perceive when it comes to vegan."

Underlining the importance of catering to diverse dietary needs, al-Sulaiti suggested that food festivals in various parts of the globe should always have vegan or gluten-free options that cater to different people.

He also underscored the community's support, with numerous Qatari entrepreneurs joining the movement towards healthier dining options.

It's nice to munity coming together. I mean, we have many local entrepreneurs joining us and being part of this, and that just changes the way we see restaurants nowadays," said al-Sulaiti, who is the founder and chief executive of Evergreen Organics and Botany Lab.

He shone a spotlight on the authenticity of the vegan concept, aimed at providing a safe and inclusive space for both vegans and non-vegans.

"(Most people) think vegan is just salads and greens," al-Sulaiti said. "Actually, vegan can be burgers, hot dogs, donuts and even sushi. So that's the idea: more options and more flavours."

Queried about expansion plans, he said they expanded extensively in the last seven years, bringing together several brands and concepts, and looking forward to fostering more.

"We're trying to grow within our community, trying to bring more people and create a little bit of this kind of consciousness that veganism is not just a trend, not just a thing and a faith," he stated. "It's something that's here to stay, and it's a lifestyle."

Doha Metro, Lusail Tram carried over 6.4mn Asian Cup fans

atar Railways Company (Qatar Rail) announced that more than 6.46mn ngers used the Doha Metro and Lusail Tram during the AFC Asian Cup Qatar 2023 from January 12 to February 10.

In a statement, Qatar Rail noted that 6.22mn passengers used the metro and 236,000 passengers used the tram. The metro and tram played an instrumental role in facilitating the movement of fans and visitors to and from stadiums and other event activations.

In terms of operational performance, 83,358 train-trips were completed on the metro and tram network during the tournament, of which 72,010 were by metro and 11,348 by tram. Throughout the tournament, 29% of spectators travelled to stadiums using the metro, whilst metro usage increased to 36% for stadiums within walking distance to metro stations.

The day of the Asian Cup Final recorded the highest daily network ridership of 303,500 with 295,900 travelling by metro and 7,600 on tram. Furthermore, Lusail QNB Metro Station recorded a footfall more than 115,000, with approximately 53% of the overall stadium trips using metro on the day. The overall footfall across all stations and associated facilities of the metro exceeded 734,000 across the day.

Engineer Abdulla Saif al-Sulaiti, chief of Service Delivery at Qatar Rail, stated: "We are proud of the reliable operational performance recorded during the Qatar 2023 Asian Cup and our contribution to its success while serving Qatar's visitors throughout the tournament via the Doha Metro and Lusail Tram networks."

He added: "This success is attributed to the pre-planning and readiness for the tournament. taking in consideration the lessons learned from the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022 and previous major events into account in terms of operations, crowd management, customer service, and more.

"A comprehensive operation plan was developed and executed to meet the tournament's requirements, including increasing the metro's capacity by operating the full fleet of 110 trains, running the 6-car trains on the Red Line, and the train

headway was set to be 3 minutes all lines to."

"Additionally, we cannot overlook the role of coordinated efforts at various levels among all relevant entities, especially the Ministry of Transport and the Local Organising Committee, to provide a smooth and safe travel experience," al-Sulaiti

Both the Doha Metro and Lusail Tram played an exceptional role in providing a safe and reliable travel experience, allowing the fans the opportunity to attend four matches in a single day

during the group stage.

Ajlan Eid al-Enazi, chief of Strategy and Business Development at Qatar Rail, stated: 'The Asian Cup tournament represented another key experience and added another milestone in network track record during major events. The metro achieved a new success as it became one of the key players of the tournament's transportation system, given its role in complementing the experience of both local fans and visitors throughout the Asian Cup.'
