Defiant Israel strikes Rafah despite Hamas ceasefire nod

amas yesterday agreed to a Gaza ceasefire proposal from mediators, but Israel said the terms did not meet its demands and pressed ahead with strikes in Rafah while planning to continue negotiations on a deal.

The developments in the seven-month-old war came as Israeli forces struck Rafah on Gaza's southern edge from the air and ground and ordered residents to leave parts of the city, which has been a refuge for more than a million displaced Palestinians.

Hamas said in a brief statement that its chief, Ismail Haniyeh, had informed the mediators that the group accepted their proposal for a ceasefire.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's office said later that Hamas' latest truce proposal falls short of Israel's demands but Israel would send a delegation to meet with negotiators to try to reach an agreement. To Page 12

Israel's Rafah evacuation order 'inhumane': UN

> Israel's order for Palestinians to evacuate from eastern Rafah in Gaza is "inhumane", the UN rights chief said yesterday, with Israel widely expected to push ahead with an offensive into the

Volker Turk said forcing hundreds of thousands of people to flee to areas with almost no access to aid for survival was "inconceivable" and warned that the offensive would push suffering and destruction beyond already "unbearable" levels. "Gazans continue to be hit with bombs, disease, and even famine," the United Nations' high commissioner for human rights said in a statement. "And today, they have been told

that they must relocate yet again as Israeli military operations into Rafah scale up.

"This is inhumane. It runs contrary to the basic principles of international humanitarian and human rights laws, which have the effective protection of civilians as their overriding concern.'

The statement said that "civilian deaths, suffering and destruction were set to increase beyond already unbearable levels". Israel's military yesterday called for the evacuation of Palestinians from eastern Rafah,

ahead of a long-threatened ground invasion of the southern Gaza city, the prospect of which has triggered widespread international alarm. "Forcibly relocating hundreds of thousands from Rafah to areas which have already been flattened and where there is little shelter and virtually no acc to humanitarian assistance necessary for their survival is inconceivable. It will only expose them to more danger and misery," said Turk. Meanwhile, the World Health Organisation said the evacuation order would exacerbate the suffering of people living in already precarious conditions. "The military incursion will plunge this crisis into unprecedented levels of humanitarian need," the WHO "It also poses a risk to the only

crossing for fuel into Gaza, which could halt the delivery of life-saving humanitarian aid and services, including the few partially-functional health facilities," the UN health agency

It said there was "no safe and functional place" in Gaza for people to move to. Israel has conducted a military offensive that has killed more than 34,700 people in Gaza. mostly women and children, according to the Hamas-run territory's health ministry.

Nearly 1,000 students to graduate from QF's **Education City this year**

atar Foundation (QF)'s Education City will see the graduation of its largest batch at the convocation today, said an official.

"This is the largest graduating class in the history of Education City with about 1,000 students, from about 75 nationalities. About 40% the graduating class are Qataris," said Dr Abdulnassir al-Tamimi, executive director for student services at QF Higher Education Division.

Dr al-Tamimi said that one of the unique aspects of Education City is its higher education eco-

"We call it multiversity, multiskilled experience mak that we equip the students with the knowledge, skills and experiences, whether it is through curricular or extracurricular activities. The students basically obtain critical skills that will prepare them for the workplace personally and also professionally," explained Dr al-Tamimi.

He noted that with such a diverse community, the students get to interact with one another in a multicultural environment. He also highlighted another key benefit of studying at Education City as the opportunity for cross registration at different

universities "We have what we call, cross registration or cross interdisciplinary studies so that students who are interested in taking a class at any of the universities, can attend them. Another thing is the strict criteria for admission and only the very best get admission at these universities. The admission norms are common for all including the Qataris and non-Qataris and the international students," he said.

Regarding the current batch of graduates, Dr al-Tamimi said that they are probably one of the toughest and most resilient groups of graduates from the Education City.

"Most of these students started their academic session in the midst of the great pandemic that our era has seen. They joined the classes when Covid-19 was at its peak disrupting everyone's life and these graduates have withstood all the challenges and have

come out in flying colours," he said.

Dr Abdulaziz al-Khanji, head of scholarships at QF said several opportunities and financial support are provided to the students while pursuing their studies at the Education City.

He said: "We provide scholarships on academic performance, we also provide scholarships or academic and social performance and we provide scholarships or grants based on the financial needs of the students. We have a variety of scholarships and grants to support the students. We are glad to see these scholarships and grants recipients graduating every year."

According to Dr al-Khanji, the students are selected for the scholarship on various criteria. "There is a platform to decide on the scholarship or grant for each student. There are various criteria for each type of scholarship," he added.

15th Doha Conference on Interfaith Dialogue begins today

The Chairman of the Doha International Center for Interfaith Dialogue (DICID) Dr Ibrahim bin Saleh al-Naimi said the agenda of the 15th Doha Conference on Interfaith Dialogue, which will kick off today, will focus on religions' perspective on the family and its importance as the basic building block of the society.

Speaking to Qatar News Agency (QNA), al-Naimi said the conference, which is held under the slogan "Family Structure in Light of Changing World: Religious Perspective", will highlight the shared commonalities among religions regarding family in light of contemporary world changes, and the distortions and challenges the family has become exposed to.

He noted that all religions pay great attention to the family, and has laid spiritual, intellectual and moral foundations for its establishment, survival, development, cohesion and success, and provided solutions to its social, educational and psychological problems.

Al-Naimi said the DICID will announce during the conference winners of the Doha International Award for Interfaith Dialogue 2024 from among individuals and religious institutions active in supporting affected families.

He applauded the great attention Oatar, under the directives of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani, attaches to family as the foundation of society and the nations renaissance. He said the establishment of the Ministry of Social Development and Family is a true embodiment of the importance the State attaches to family, the society and the authentic Qatari family values.

He pointed to several activities and events that support the family in Qatar, noting that Qatar will later this year host an international conference commemorating the 30th anniversary of the International Year of the Family. The confirms the great importance that Qatar attaches to family within the framework of its National Vision 2030, he stressed.

The conference will bring together about 500 scholars, religious leaders, researchers, academics and specialists in family and social development, including 200 from Qatar, he said, noting that 90 papers were selected for discussion dur-

ing the two-day conference from among 300 papers.

Since its launch in 2003, the Doha Conference on Interfaith Dialogue has served as a platform for dialogue and debate between followers of the three monotheistic religions (Islam, Christianity, and Judaism) on many daily issues of concern to societies and humanity in general, leading to greater communication, co-operation, and building trust, al-Naimi said.

He noted that previous editions of the conference focused on several. vital topics of interest to these religions and their followers, such as human rights, hate speech, the role of youth in promoting dialogue, human solidarity in the event of disasters and crises, and others.

Summaries of the research and working papers discussed are prepared after the conclusion of each conference, and between three to four books are published about them, so that they become an important reference for researchers in the fields of dialogue.

Al-Naimi expressed his regret at emerging negative phenomena affecting family, such as homosexuality and the rights of children to change their gender and name and choose their religion; expressing concern that such negative changes may gradually extend to other countries whether Islamic, Christian, or Jewish.

From this standpoint, the 15th Doha Conference on Interfaith Dialogue will focus on religions and raising children in light of contemporary family changes, he said.

The Chairman of the Doha International Center for Interfaith Dialogue (DICID) Dr Ibrahim bin Saleh al-Naimi underlined that all religions call for family unity, and emphasise the importance of family cohesion and the values of compassion and co-operation, and the issue of marriage and the formation of the natural family.

He noted that many verses in the Holy Qur'an and Hadith in Islam, as well as evidence in other religions, call for the same approach, and stress the necessity of protecting the family as the basic building block and cornerstone in building any society, which means that religion is an important factor in building the family, and it is necessary for any society to maintain the family healthy, interconnected and integrated.

He emphasised the important role the educational, academic, religious, cultural, civil, official research institutions have in supporting family solidarity and cohesion; and underlined that the desired balance in the family system, since its inception, is based on the integration of roles between men and women, not by changing them or erasing them.

Al-Naimi noted that many problems and crises that the world is going through today, including economic ones, affect family cohesion. Therefore, the participants will consider how to deal with these challenges.

He added that the identity and structure of the family system and its status, the responsibility and rights of every individual in it, its central role in upbringing and education, and achieving family integration are fundamental issues for all religions.

Al-Naimi pointed to the negative impact of disputes and conflicts on the family and its cohesion, citing the situation of Palestinian families, which he described as a "tragic," especially in the Gaza Strip, because of Israel's devastating war and its barbaric attacks, as well as the situation of families in other countries exposed to conflicts, noting that the conference will discuss all these negative and harmful impacts on the family in plenary and specialised sessions.

Through the rich and powerful discussion and interventions. the participants will come up with important results and recommendations regarding various issues of the family, its cohesion, safety and stability, he stressed.

Regarding the winners of the 5th Doha International Award for Interfaith Dialogue, al-Naimi explained that the winners were chosen based on their achievements, as individuals or institutions, in supporting affected families whether as a result of poverty, disasters and wars, or due to dispersion and asylum. The students who successfully completed the QADP celebrated their achievements during a ceremony held at WCM-O and received certificates of completion, as well as personal congratulations from the WCM-Q faculty in attendance.

Speaking during the closing ceremony, one of the participating students who completed the QADP with honours, Essa Mubarak al-Buainain, from Qatar Academy Al Wakra, said: "This programme has been a profound journey over two academic semesters, one that has not only demanded academic dedication but also instilled in us the



capacity for self-directed learning." Commenting on her experience, Fatma Wael al-Emadi. from Al Maha Academy for Girls, who also completed the QADP with honours, said: "All in all, I have become the best version of myself during this programme, and I will take the talent and skills that I have absorbed at WCM-Q and apply them to the rest of my educational and working life.

QC Gaza aid reaches 2.5mn beneficiaries

atar Charity (QC) continues to distribute humanitarian aid in the Gaza Strip through the Qatari air bridge and its urgent relief projects, with the number of beneficiaries as of May 5 reaching about 2.5mn.

The volume of aid provided via the Qatari air bridge (which has been or will be shipped) in co-operation with the Qatar Fund for Development and other parties has reached 1,011 tonnes through 95 aircraft, and the number of beneficiaries is estimated at 729,766 so far, while

the number of beneficiaries of urgent relief projects is estimated to be 1,650,670.



A legendary helmet at the heart of the design

In sculpting the look of this new timepiece, Karl-Friedrich Scheufele and Jacky Ickx were inspired by the aesthetics of one of the latter's emblematic helmets. 

Apple has big AI ambitions - at a lower cost than its rivals

For most of the past year and a half, Apple Chief Executive Tim Cook has fielded questions from Wall Street analysts about his plans for artificial intelligence (AI) amid grumbling that the iPhone maker has no AI story to tell.

After the company reported quarterly earnings on Thursday, Cook insisted that Apple will have concrete details about its plans for AI to talk about very soon.

"We continue to feel very bullish about our opportunity in generative AI and we're making significant investments," Cook told Reuters in an interview, noting the company has spent \$100bn over the past five years on research and development.

Apple's Big Tech rivals have spent comparable or even greater amounts on R&D over the same period, but they have also been spending heavily to build data centres to host AI services.

Microsoft shelled out \$14bn in the most recent quarter on capex, with Alphabet's Google not far behind, at \$12bn. Meta Platforms told investors last week to expect as much as \$40bn in capital expenditures this year.

Apple thinks different. Its capital expenditure for all of 2023 was just over \$10bn.

Shares of Meta, Google and Microsoft - all of which make money selling software or advertising services – have all soared to record highs

Apple, which makes most of its money selling consumer devices, has paid a price for that stance most of this year, with its shares falling 10% as investors worried the company was

falling behind in the AI race. On Friday, Apple share rose 6.4%, recovering some of their recent losses.

Shares of Meta, Google and Microsoft - all of which make money selling software or advertising services have all soared to record highs as the companies grapple to dominate the emerging AI landscape, though investors have

also flinched at skyrocketing price tags for data centres and specialised processors required to train AI models

Apple hinted on Thursday it won't take the same tack. While Apple is expected to unveil new AI features at its annual software conference next month and overhaul its product lines with AI-ready chips, Chief Financial Officer Luca Maestri said Apple investors should not expect a huge change in how the company handles capital expenditures.

Responding to an analyst's question, Maestri noted the company's longstanding practice of splitting the cost of manufacturing tools with its suppliers, which has kept Apple's costs down and its cash generation up for more than a decade.

"We do something similar on the data centre side," Maestri said. "We have our own data centre capacity, and then we use capacity from third parties. It's a model that has worked well for us historically, and we plan to continue along the same lines going

That could be just as well for Apple, because it remains unclear whether AI features such as chatbots that run directly on a device will spur users to buy new phones, tablets or laptops, which remain Apple's biggest source of revenue and profits.

Ben Bajarin of Creative Strategies said that while better processors could serve as a "line in the sand" for some users who need AI tools for professional use, those features may not ignite a

"It'll be something that helps lift sales, but I don't expect it to be super cycle," Bajarin said. "You have to be careful to temper expectations."



The European Union's new triumvirate

ecent speeches by French President Emmanuel Macron and Polish Foreign Minister Radek Sikorski show just how much European thinking has changed since Russia invaded Ukraine in February 2022. With German Chancellor Olaf Scholz endorsing Macron's basic message, a more dynamic, coherent foreign policy for the European Union may be at hand.

Macron himself has come a long way. Back in 2019, he famously warned that Nato was becoming "brain dead" and called for greater strategic autonomy for Europe, even openly contesting US policies (and not just those of the Trump administration) While many thought he had blundered, his misdiagnosis had positive consequences. After all, even if Nato wasn't brain dead, it was at least comatose, with most European members having disarmed since the Soviet Union's collapse. Europe did need to learn to stand on its own two feet.

Since then, Russia's invasion of Ukraine (following its seizure of Ukrainian territory in 2014) has revived Nato and even led to the alliance's enlargement, with the recent addition of Finland and Sweden. Moreover, Europe has begun to devise its own joint defence policy, buying weapons collectively, coordinating more efficiently, and matching the United States in its military and economic support for Ukraine.

The main message of Macron's latest speech was straightforward: "Our Europe is mortal. It can die." This resonates with Polish Prime Minister Donald Tusk's own warnings that Europe is now in a "pre-war era".

Moreover, by describing Europe as a common liberal-democratic project spanning from Lisbon to Odesa, Macron gave a strong nod to Ukraine's eventual EU membership.

Europe faces threats not only to its security (from Russia), but also to its prosperity, owing to disruptions in global energy markets, US and Chinese protectionist and industrial policies, and other factors. In keeping with his tendency to launch revolutionary projects, Macron has now called for a doubling of the EU budget, with significant increases in public spending on artificial intelligence, quantum computing, space technologies biotechnology, and energy.

That proposal is sure to upset the Germans, as are Macron's ideas about creating European corporate "champions," establishing a "European preference" in defence procurement, and assigning the European Central Bank an additional mandate to support growth, in addition to fighting inflation. And yet, something has changed in the recently deteriorating Franco-German relationship. Immediately after Macron's speech, Scholz tweeted: "France and Germany both want Europe to remain strong. Your speech contains good ideas on how to achieve this,...Together we are moving the EU forward: politically and economically. For a sovereign and innovative EU. Long live Europe!"

In his own speech before the Polish Sejm (parliament) on April 25, Sikorski went even further. Like Macron, he believes that, "The Union must become a geopolitical actor equal to other international powers," and he has called for reforms to move the European Council

away from strictly unanimous decision-making. "Poland and the Polish people deserve to be one of the leaders in the process of further European integration," he declared. "A leader is, by definition, someone who can achieve their goals in a way that will win them supporters.

...Poland has this potential." If Macron and Sikorski's speeches rhymed, that is partly because Polish foreign policy is finally coming back into alignment with that of its closest allies. The broad transatlantic consensus is that defence policy must stand on two legs: American and European. This realisation has dawned even on Germany, which is now Ukraine's most important European supporter.

For Poland (and the Baltic states), Europe's strategic sea change is obviously a welcome development, given their proximity to Russia. It was therefore gratifying to hear Sikorski repeatedly and explicitly mention Polish-German rapprochement in his speech.

Sikorski also outlined Poland's priorities for its presidency of the EU, which starts at the beginning of 2025. It will focus on security and the supranational fight against populism. Poland has much credibility and soft power on the latter issue, given its recent experience enduring the illiberal Law and Justice (PiS) government, before voters rejected it decisively in last October's election. The restoration of normality

since then has felt like a slowly grinding revolution, because the Polish electorate remains effectively divided into two parts with opposite foreign policies. Even Poland's "Second Republic" (1918-39), which was quickly pieced together at World War I's end to right the

 $eight eenth-century\ partitions$ by Prussia and the Habsburg and Russian empires, did not have such opposing policies. While warring Polish factions clipped each other's wings, their strategic outlooks were broadly complementary. Later, everyone agreed that Józef Piłsudski, the leader of the Socialists, gave Poland its eastern border, and Roman Dmowski, the leader of the Nationalists, who participated in the Versailles conference, gave the country its western border.

Whatever one thinks of Dmowski, he had a strategic concept, and did not merely pursue a foreign policy of sheer resentment, as PiS's leader Jarosław Kaczy ski has done vis-à-vis Germany. Historically, when the Germans were clearly the biggest threat to Poland, seeking dialogue with Russia made a kind of sense (odd as it is now to think that the Polish right was traditionally pro-Russian).

Today, the roles are reversed: Russia is the main threat, and Germany is an obvious potential friend and partner for Poland. To continue leaning on 1930s-era clichés about the Germans is not only anachronistic; it is dangerous idiocy. The map on which Kaczy ski operates exists only in his head.

The new messages emanating from Europe augur a reactivation of the post-1991 Weimar Triangle (France, Germany, and Poland). But it will no longer be just a regional or symbolic alliance; rather, should it hold, it will become the new engine of the EU, as well as a new pillar of support for Polish sovereignty. - Project Syndicate

Judge threatens Trump with jail over continued gag order violations

The New York judge presiding over Donald Trump's historic criminal trial has again found the former US president in contempt of a gag order and threatened to jail him for further violations.

Trump, 77, is charged with falsifying business records to reimburse his lawyer, Michael Cohen, for a \$130,000 payment made to am adult entertainment actress just days ahead of the 2016 election against Hillary Clinton.

Judge Juan Merchan held Trump in contempt of court and fined him \$1,000 yesterday for a violation of the gag order prohibiting him from publicly attacking witnesses, jurors or court staff and their relatives.

Trump was also fined a total of \$9,000 last week.

However, Merchan said these penalties were not serving as a "deterrent" and he would have to consider jail time for further violations.

"As much as I do not want to impose a jail sanction ... I want you to understand I will," Merchan told Trump, who sat silently at the defence table dressed in a dark blue suit and red tie.

"At the end of the day I have a job to do and part of that job is to maintain the dignity of the justice system," the judge said, calling Trump's defiance a "direct attack on the rule of law".

Merchan's ruling came at the start of the third week of testimony in the high-stakes trial of the Republican White House candidate, the first former president to face criminal charges.

The judge acknowledged that putting him behind bars for contempt would be a weighty decision and a logistical challenge.

Trump receives around-theclock US Secret Service protection as a former president and Merchan said "the last thing I want to do is put you in jail".

"I also worry about the people who would have to execute that,"

The trial has gripped the legal and political establishment as Trump seeks to re-take the White House from President Joe Biden in November's election.

Trump complains frequently that the gag order limits his ability to make his case to voters in his comeback White House bid.

"He's taken away my constitutional right to speak." Trump told reporters outside the courtroom before the start of the 12th day of trial.

In addition to the New York case, Trump has been indicted in Washington and Georgia on charges of conspiring to overturn the results of the 2020 election won by Biden.

He also faces charges of illegally storing huge quantities of top-secret documents taken from the White House after his presidency to his home in Flor-

India election chiefs warn parties against AI deepfakes

ndia's election authorities have warned political parties against using artificial intelligence (AI) to create deepfake videos and Lspread misinformation during the country's ongoing general election.

Millions of voters will head to polling stations today in the third of seven voting phases in the world's most populous country.

A rash of deepfake and doctored videos and misinformation have circulated on social media in recent weeks.

The Election Commission of India (ECI) warned against "misuse of AI-based tools to create deepfakes that distort information or propagate misinformation". - AFP

Russia announces nuke drills, threatens UK military targets

Russia has announced that its troops stationed near Ukraine would rus and weapons and training would rus and train weapons drills and threatened to strike UK military targets outside the embattled country, citing what it said was an escalation in Western sabre-rattling.

The defence ministry announced the drills and also said Russian forces had captured two villages in eastern Ukraine, where outgunned and outmanned Ukrainian troops have been struggling to hold their positions.

Officials in the border region of Belgorod meanwhile said that Ukrainian aerial attacks had left at least seven people dead and wounded more than 30, including several children.

Russian President Vladimir Putin, who ordered the nuclear drills, has upped his nuclear rhetoric since ordering his army into Ukraine in 2022, warning in February there was a "real" risk of nuclear war.

The defence ministry gave no date for the exercises, but said they would involve the air force, navy and troops stationed near Ukraine.

"They are talking about the readiness and even the intention of sending armed contingents to Ukraine - that is, in fact, to put Nato soldiers in front of the Russian military," Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said. "This is a completely new round of escalating tensions. It is unprecedented and requires special meas-

The Russian foreign ministry meanwhile said that it had summoned the UK's ambassador in Moscow and warned him that if Ukraine used British weapons to attack Russia, that Moscow could hit UK military targets in Ukraine "and beyond".

It also summoned France's envoy after "increasingly belligerent statements" by Paris, following Macron's comments.

"The Russian side presented its assessment that Paris's destructive and provocative line is leading to an escalation of the conflict".

Ukrainian forces have been dependent on Western military aid to battle Russia but the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (Nato) has

said it will not send troops into Ukraine.

Russia's defence ministry said troops from the Southern Military District, which borders Ukraine and includes the occupied Ukrainian territories, will take part in the drills.

"During the exercise, a set of measures will be taken to practise the preparation and use of non-strategic nuclear weapons," it said in a

Non-strategic nuclear weapons, also known as tactical nuclear weapons, are designed for use on the battlefield and can be delivered via missiles.

Russia and the United States are by far the world's biggest nuclear powers, holding more than 10,600 of the world's 12,100 nuclear war-

China has the third-largest nuclear arsenal, followed by France and Britain.

Russia has about 1,558 non-strategic nuclear warheads, according to the Federation of American Scientists, though there is uncertainty about exact figures for such weapons due to a lack of transparency.

No power has used nuclear weapons in war since the United States unleashed the first atomic bomb attacks on the Japanese cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki in 1945.

Major nuclear powers routinely check their nuclear weapons but very rarely publicly link such exercises to specific perceived threats in the way that Russia has.

Building collapse in South Africa leaves two dead, dozens trapped

Two of the 22 people rescued from the building and sent by ambulance to hospitals in the region succumbed to their injuries, city authorities announced in the evening.

A construction crew of 75 people were on the site at the time of the collapse, city spokeswoman Chantel Edwards said.

In addition to the people hospitalised and the two dead, no information was yet available for the 50 or so others still trapped under the rubble.

Mario Ferreira, spokesperson for the charity Gift of the Givers, assisting at the site of the incident, told AFP that rescue workers had "communication with some of the people under the rubble".

The five-storey building, including an underground parking lot, collapsed in the early afternoon, for reasons still undetermined. Photographs shared by the municipality showed

a flattened construction site with multiple rescue services present. The building's broken roof was still clearly visible

euters won two Pulitzer Prizes yesterday, taking home the breaking news photography award for searing images of the Israel-Gaza conflict as well as the national reporting award for a series of investigations into Elon Musk's manufacturing empire.

ProPublica won the coveted public service award for stories detailing undisclosed gifts and trips that US Supreme Court justices, particularly Clarence Thomas, accepted from wealthy donors.

The New York Times and the Washington Post each captured three prizes.

The annual Pulitzers, first presented in 1917, are the most prestigious honours in US journalism.

Reuters photographers - often working at great risk to their personal safety - have produced thousands of images documenting the war between Israel and Hamas, which began with the events of October 7 attack that killed 1,200 people.

Since then, Israel's retaliatory offensive in the Gaza Strip has killed more than 34,000 people, including many children, and displaced the majority of its 2.3mn residents.

The winning photos include an image taken in October by Reuters photographer Mohamed Salem, depicting a Palestinian woman cradling the body of her five-yearold niece in Gaza.

That photograph previously won the prestigious 2024 World Press Photo of the Year.

Reuters's Musk series. The Musk Industrial Complex, revealed a spate of worker injuries and one death at Musk's rocket company SpaceX and the mistreatment of animals at his brain-implant company, Neuralink.

In addition, Reuters found that electric car pioneer Tesla covered up dangerous defects, rigged its cars' dashboard driving-range estimates and shared sensitive images recorded by its vehicles without drivers' knowledge.

Mali junta launches national talks to seek an end to crisis

unta leader Colonel Assimi Goita has launched the national phase of inter-Malian malogue in a bid to find a domestic response to the country's yearslong crisis.

The "inter-Malian dialogue for peace and national reconciliation" follows local consultations and is due to wrap up on Friday.

A major part of the opposition has boycotted the process, accusing the colonels of exploiting the dialogue to bolster their increasingly contested legitimacy and stay in power. The West African nation has

been ruled by juntas since backto-back coups in 2020 and 2021, with the military promising to hand over power through the ballot box in February.

However, they have postponed elections until an unspecified date, citing a precarious security situation aggravated by religious militant attacks.

In April, the military authorities suspended all party political activities after muzzling opponents, journalists and human rights activists.

Goita insisted that the dialogue framework had been "entirely inclusive" in line with his wish for all Malians to "take part and express themselves freelv".

"We have decided that Malians will get together without intermediaries to draw up a new structure for peace," the colonel said during a ceremony broadcast on national television.

The authorities are counting on the dialogue to strengthen its peace efforts after ending a major 2015 agreement with armed separatist groups in the north.

The deal was considered internationally as a strong stabilising factor, but a section of public opinion saw it as a foreign-led attempt at partition.

The separatists took up arms against Bamako again last year and the junta withdrew from the deal.

Philippines won't use water cannon on Chinese ships

In the latest confrontation on April 30, Manila said the China coastguard damaged a Philippine coastguard ship and another government vessel with high-pressure water cannon as the boats were bringing supplies to Filipino fishermen at Scarborough Shoal.

'We will not follow the Chinese coastguard and the Chinese vessels down that road," Marcos said yesterday when asked if Manila would start using the water cannons on its own coast guard vessels to retaliate. "It's not the mission of our navy, our coast guard to start or to increase tensions ... we have no intention of attacking anyone with water cannons or any other such offensive (equipment)."

Marcos added that "the last thing" the Philippines wanted was "to raise the tensions" in the disputed waters. Asked about Marcos's comments at a

Mathaf presents 'Khalid Albaih: Shahid' exhibition

athaf: Arab Museum of Modern Art opened its doors to the "Khalid Albaih: Shahid" exhibition yesterday, showcasing the poignant work of Sudanese artist and political cartoonist Khalid Albaih.

Running until August 10, the exhibition offers visitors an immersive and thought-provoking experience, inviting them to reflect on their role as witnesses to ongoing tragedies, particularly what the artist described as "an ethnic cleansing in Gaza".

Albaih's installation, titled Shahid, which translates to "witness" in Arabic, confronts viewers with the stark realities of the conflict in Gaza.

Through interactive audiovisual elements, the exhibition compels visitors to contemplate their response to the crisis and recognise the humanity behind the staggering statistics of lives lost.

During a media tour, Albaih highlighted the aim of his installation, saying: "In this one (installation), I ask the viewer to stand and to say these people's names and be involved in those images that we all see?

"There are a few images that we know who these people are, but there are 6,647 names that we'd never seen their pictures, we don't know who they are," he continued.

"But here, we say their names and we stand witness to their lives ... if the world can't see Gaza with all the evidence coming out of there, how can they see Sudan; which means if they can see Gaza, they can definitely see us and all of us," he added.

The artist stressed the impor-

tance of acknowledging the individual lives lost, urging viewers to engage with the names and stories behind the images that often circulate on social media.

Curated by Fatma Mostafawi and Hadeel al-Kohaji, the exhibition features four powerful digital illustrations displayed on a mirrored wall.

These illustrations capture pivotal moments from the conflict, drawing attention to the human cost of violence and displacement.

Visitors' reflections in the mirror merge with the depictions of victims, reinforcing their role as witnesses to the tragedy in Gaza.

The exhibition incorporates a recorded recitation of the names and ages of martyrs, sourced from the Palestinian ministry of health.

Albaih reiterated the urgency of bearing witness to these lives, highlighting the global community's responsibility to confront injustice and amplify marginalised

Speaking to Gulf Times, Mathaf director Zeina Arida underlined the timeliness of the exhibition amid ongoing crises, noting that the artist informed her about the urgency and the pressing nature of his task - a factor that motivated Mathaf's decision to organise the exhibition.

Welcoming Albaih's initiative. she cited the artist's clear vision and trusted his direction, saying: "Khalid is a politically engaged artist who brings his two-dimensional work to three-dimensional installations, addressing urgent issues with clarity and vision."

Global witnessing amidst launch of 'Shahid' exhibition

udanese artist and political cartoonist Khalid Albaih's "Shahid" exhibition shines a spotlight on the interconnected nature of the ongoing crises in Gaza and Sudan, and the urgent need for collective witnessing.

The artist's powerful installation, which opened vesterday at Mathaf: Arab Museum of Modern Art, confronts viewers with the stark realities of conflict and displacement in Gaza while drawing attention to the neglect faced by Sudan in Western media narratives.

"We are all aware of Sudan's neglect by Western media, particularly during the simultaneous devastations in Gaza and Sudan over the past year," Albaih said in a statement. "This disregard of Sudan can largely be attributed to Western media's struggle to simplify the country's multifaceted issues into black-and-white narratives, overlooking its interconnectedness with the same regional powers."

"In my interactive installation Shahid, which means 'witness' in Arabic. I aim to highlight a few of the early viral images from Gaza, which were often quickly forgotten as the world witnessed wave after wave of horrific imagery from the ongoing massacres," he said.

"Additionally, practical challenges, like limited Internet access on the ground in Sudan, contribute to the scarcity of footage available for use by the media," Albaih added. "Amidst

my constant search for news on Sudan online, like many around the world, I became a firsthand witness to Gazans documenting their own genocide."

The exhibition invites visitors to immerse in the experiences of those affected by conflict.

"Through this act of solidarity with Gaza, I also stand in solidarity with Sudan and other overlooked countries in conflict in the Global South. I firmly believe that only when the world sees the well-documented genocide in Gaza, will it see us all," he said.

Albaih's work challenges mainstream narratives and calls for a reevaluation of how global crises are perceived and addressed.

Through art, the artist advocates for solidarity, empathy, and action in the face of adversity.

She lauded the artist's ability to provoke meaningful dialogue through his immersive installations, which challenge viewers to confront uncomfortable truths.

"It is with great pride that we unveil Khalid Albaih's exhibition at Mathaf: Arab Museum of Modern Art, reflecting Mathaf's role as a platform for regional artists to

The show is a collective presentation of the unique and often convention-breaking works of VCUarts Oatar's senior students from the undergraduate programmes of graphic design, interior design, painting and printmaking, and fashion design, as well as the

university's postgraduate programme in design.

Culture, language, identity, mental health, physical well-being, and the environment were just some of the themes researched by the Class of 2024. Some students explored the notion of cultural

identity shaped through memories, highlighting history and heritage, while others examined the implications of displacement and colonisation.

The psychological effects of being a third-culture kid continued to be a popular topic for investigation.

This year, several projects explored health-related

Projects tackling obesity, maternal health, autism, Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder, and digital over-use underscored the role of design in promoting well-being and addressing health concerns, lifestyle-induced and otherwise.

Further projects drew inspiration from Qatar: the country's unique marine biosphere and landscapes. ship-building heritage, and the history and significance of its banknotes and stamps.

Students used a variety of media, resources and tools that allowed them to incorporate techniques such as light, sound, video, animation, textile design, silk printing, fabrication technology, visual language, product, print and website design, typography, coding, interior graphics, printmaking, digital painting, screen-printing, lithography, computer programming, and photographic stencil techniques, in their final projects.

"This class began their studies with VCUarts Qatar through the early days of the pandemic and their artwork tells their story, inviting each of us along on their journey," said VCUarts Qatar dean Amir Berbic. "The themes of displacement, colonisation and duality are found in some pieces, while others encourage exploration of the expat experience, and the questions surrounding the balance between utility. creativity, and personal artistic expression."

The day of the launch also saw prospective students visit the campus for "Hayakom", the traditional welcome accorded to students offered places at VCUarts Qatar, for the 2024 Fall semester.

Some members of the Class of 2024 have been recognised through international awards - such as the Telly Awards, the Venice TV Award, the International Property Awards, and the Red Dot Award - while others have had their work displayed at prestigious exhibitions and events in places such as Doha, Dubai, Milan, Venice, London, Berlin, Moscow, Paris, and Hong Kong.

Defiant Israel strikes Rafah despite Hamas ceasefire nod

In a statement, Netanyahu's office added that his war cabinet approved continuing an operation in Rafah. UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres urged Israel and Hamas "to go the extra mile needed to make an agreement," his spokesman said.

An Israeli official, speaking on condition of anonymity said the proposal that Hamas accepted was a watered-down version of an Egyptian offer and included elements that Israel could not accept.

"This would appear to be a ruse intended to make Israel look like the side refusing a deal," said the Israeli official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

But an official briefed on the peace talks, also speaking on condition of anonymity, said the offer Hamas accepted was effectively the same as one agreed at the end of April by Israel.

A US official familiar with truce negotiations told Reuters that Netanyahu and the war cabinet "have not appeared to approach the latest phase of negotiations in good faith."

US State Department spokesman Mat-

thew Miller said Washington would discuss the Hamas response with its allies in the coming hours, and a deal was "absolutely achievable".

"We want to get these hostages out, we want to get a ceasefire in place for six weeks, we want to increase humanitarian assistance," White House national security spokesperson John Kirby said, adding that reaching an agreement would be the "absolute best outcome".

More than 34,600 Palestinians have been killed in the conflict, according to Gaza health officials.

The UN has said that famine is imminent in the enclave.

Any truce would be the first pause in fighting since a week-long ceasefire in November, during which Hamas freed around half of the hostages.

Since then, all efforts to reach a new truce have foundered over Israel's insistence that it would discuss only a temporary pause.

Taher al-Nono, a Hamas official and adviser to Haniyeh, told Reuters that the proposal met the group's demands for reconstruction efforts in Gaza, return of

displaced Palestinians and a swap of Israeli hostages for Palestinian prisoners in The Hamas deputy chief in Gaza, Kha-

lil al-Hayya, told Al Jazeera television that the proposal comprised three phases, each of six weeks, with Israel to pull its troops out of Gaza in the second phase (see box on the right).

Earlier yesterday, Israel ordered the evacuation of parts of Rafah, the city on the Egyptian bordered that has served as the last sanctuary for around half of Gaza's 2.3mn residents.

Israel's closest ally, the United States, has called on it not to assault Rafah, saying that it must not do so without a full plan in place to protect civilians there, which has yet to be presented.

Washington is committed to stopping Israel's Rafah attack, the US official said. Israel said yesterday that it was conducting limited operations on the eastern part of Rafah.

That was being accompanied by massive air strikes, according to Palestinian residents.

O 42-day ceasefire period O Hamas releases 33 Israeli hostages in return for Israel releasing Palestinians from Israeli jails.

O Israel partially withdraws troops from Gaza and allows free movement of Palestinians from south to

north Gaza. PHASE-2

O Another 42-day period that features an agreement to restore a "sustainable calm" to Gaza, language that an official briefed on the talks said Hamas and Israel had agreed in order to take dis-

O Hamas releases Israeli re-
