Amir to patronise Qatar Economic Forum 2024

nder the patronage of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani, the fourth edition of 'Qatar Economic Forum, Powered by Bloomberg' (QEF) will kick off today.

The signing of 20 memorandums of understanding, including 18 international MoUs, during the upcoming Qatar Economic Forum (QEF) 2024 is expected to enhance foreign direct investment (FDI) and attract additional FDI to the country.

"The nature of the MoUs and the partnerships [to be signed at the forum] indicate the direction in which entities are moving towards enhancing foreign direct investment and attracting additional investment to Qatar," stated Sheikh Ali bin Abdullah bin Khalifa al-Thani, chairperson, Permanent Supreme Committee organising QEF 2024.

Sheikh Ali noted

fourth edition of the forum, which will run from May 14 to 16 in Doha, is expected to gather 2,300 participants, including 1,300 active leaders in international firms and organisations, in addition to 200 local and international media outlets.

Sheikh Ali said some 10 MoUs were signed in the previous edition. However, he noted that the forum has been seeing "a qualitative shift from one session to another," as translated by the number of international agreements unveiled during the event, in addition to the great interest from international political and economic actors.



Qatar's strategy in global mediation highlighted at Amsterdam Dialogue

E the Minister of State at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs Dr Mohamed bin Abdulaziz bin Saleh al-Khulaifi participated yesterday in the opening session of the Amsterdam Dialogue 2024, held in the Netherlands.

In his speech during the session entitled 'the State of Qatar's strategy in international mediation,' HE Dr al-Khulaifi noted the significant role that Qatar plays in mediation and conflict resolution. He pointed out that in light of the complexities of the global scene, it has become increasingly clear that small countries can have a significant influence in promoting peace and stability.

In this regard, he emphasised that Oatar represents a model for such a country, as it tirelessly calls for dialogue and reconciliation in some of the deep-rooted conflicts in the world. He indicated that the basic principle that guides Qatar's mediation is its firm commitment to dialogue as the most effective means of resolving disputes, recalling that international law obligates states to resolve their disputes and differences by peaceful means. However, it does not stipulate a specific mechanism, allowing states to choose diplomatic or judicial means.

He said that statistics indicate that mediation comes second as the most widely used peaceful method for resolving disputes, after direct negotiations. He explained that Oatar has developed the practice of mediation, allowing it to navigate diverse geopolitical environments with skill and impartiality, whether in the Gulf region, the greater Middle East, or beyond. He added that Oatar constantly demonstrates a remarkable ability to bridge divisions and facilitate constructive dialogue between conflicting parties.

HE Dr al-Khulaifi pointed out that the war in the Gaza Strip currently dominates the global agenda, noting that Qatar is committed to providing and facilitating humanitarian aid, mediation efforts, and diplomatic initiatives. He added that Qatar's

strength lies in its ability to adapt and engage diplomatically in a bilateral/multilateral approach with its partners and the international community.

Concluding his speech, HE the Minister of State at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs stressed that the role played by Qatar in mediation and conflict resolution serves as a strong reminder of the potential of small countries to make a difference on the global stage. He added that by prioritizing dialogue, inclusivity, and commitment to international law and sustainable development, Qatar has emerged as a neutral mediator and a trusted global partner in promoting peace and stability worldwide. As a young country, it is crucial for Oatar to ensure building a lasting legacy that future generations can enjoy.

Qatar Economic Forum: An important annual event to discuss the state of global economy

atar Economic Forum, Powered by Bloomberg, is an important annual event to discuss the state of the global economy, its growth prospects and challenges, and how to address them. Under the generous patronage of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani, the first edition of the forum was held virtually in Doha in June 2021 under the theme 'Reimagining the World'.

It saw the participation of many heads of state and government and an elite group of CEOs of major international companies, inspiring figures, and decision-makers in the fields of finance, economics, investment, technology, energy, education, sports, and climate, in addition to more than 100 speakers from all over the world.

Over the course of three days, the forums participants discussed the agenda which included six main sessions: "Technology Advanced" which highlighted permanent changes to the human-technology nexus; "A Sustainable World" which explored the intersection of capitalism and climate; and "Markets and Investing" which discussed the ability of investors in their hunt for growth to help shape a more resilient global economy.

As for the second edition of the forum, it was held on June 21, 2022, while the world was going through a critical juncture as a result of the repercussions of the Covid-19 pandemic, the war in Ukraine, and fears of recession and food shortages. This edi-



tion was held under the slogan: "Achieving Equality in Global Economic Recovery", with the participation of many heads of state and government, senior policymakers, parliamentarians, thinkers, economists, businessmen, media, and representatives of regional and international organisations.

Throughout the days and sessions of

Qatar's preparations to host the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022 were also at the core of the forums work, within the framework of highlighting Qatar as a leading investment destination in the region and the world as well as the incentives and investment opportunities provided by the state to investors, entrepreneurs, and major international companies in the non-oil and value-added sectors, especially the areas that serve the Qatar National Vision 2030 and the Second National Development Strategy 2018-2022 that aims to establish a diversified and competitive economy based on knowledge.

In May 2023, Doha hosted the third edition of the Qatar Economic Forum, Powered by Bloomberg, under the slogan "A New Global Growth Story". NHRC chief appeals for pressuring Israel to end brutal war on Gaza

hairperson of the National Human Rights Combint Abdullah al-Attiyah called for pressure on the Israeli occupation to halt its brutal war and aggression on the Gaza Strip, stopping the genocide against the Palestinian people, addressing its consequences, and restoring confidence in international law, human rights, and their instruments, thereby contributing to international security and peace.

She made these remarks during her speech at the seminar organised by the National Human Rights Committee in collaboration with the Independent Commission for Human Rights in Palestine and the Arab Network of National Human Rights Institutions, held at the UN headquarters in Geneva, Switzerland, on the implementation of the International Court of Justice's orders on the responsibility of third states to prevent genocide

in Gaza. She emphasised that the seminar provided an opportunity to explore ways to stop the genocide being carried out by the Israeli occupation forces against the Palestinian people in Gaza for more than two hundred days, noting that the war has caused destruction, tragedies and violations exceeding those committed during World War II.

She stressed that the world's ongoing witness to these events requires an international community stance in fulfilling its responsibilities to protect civilians. She affirmed that the Israeli occupation's crimes have reached unbearable levels, rendering life in Gaza impossible amid the ongoing genocide of the Palestinian people in the region.

She called for necessity in urging governments to respect the International Court of Justice's decisions and UN Security Council resolutions, which call for ending killings and destruction, ensuring the entry of humanitarian aid into Gaza, and discussing and clarifying the roles of stakeholders, including national human rights institutions, in compelling states to fulfil their obligations as third parties under international law.

She urged more efforts to push



governments to fulfil their responsibilities as third parties under international law to pressure the Israeli ocwar and aggression on Gaza, halt the genocide against our Palestinian people, and address its consequences.

Director General of the Palestinian Independent Commission for Human Rights Dr Ammar Dwaik, said that the International Court of Justice's decision obligates states to act on the basis that Israel is vio-

cupation to stop its brutal lating its obligations under the Genocide Convention, including preventing an

committing crime. Chairperson of the National Council for Human Rights in Egypt ambassador Moshira Khattab emphasised that what is happening in Palestine contradicts the obligations and requirements stipulated by the Genocide Convention. (QNA)

He underlined the importance of recognising the Middle East's growing market potential, especially among the MZ generation (individuals under 54 years old), who are active travellers and enthusiasts of the Korean Wave

More people availing of Qatar's National Mental Health Helpline services

he National Mental Health Helpline has seen a 32% surge in total calls between 2022 and 2023.

Since opening in April 2020, the helpline staffed by a dedicated team of professionals, comprising psychiatrists, psychologists, and mental health nurses from Hamad Medical Corporation (HMC), continues to respond to an increasing demand for confidential, mental health support from communities across Qatar.

Callers to the helpline are from various backgrounds and from both genders, with slightly higher use (56%) by females.

Most of the callers (60%) are known to the mental health service, and the helpline provides easy access to appointments, medication

New callers (40%) seek help in managing difficulties sleeping, anx-

Many callers also seek help and advice on behalf of a family member, friend or colleague.

Iain Tulley, national health strategy lead for mental health and chief executive of the HMC's Mental Health Service, highlighted the significance of Qatar's National Health Strategy, which has mental health and wellbeing as a key priority.

"The continued dedication and expertise of those who operate the helpline has made a huge contribution to the health and wellbeing of people in Qatar," he said.

'The team is able to respond to increasing complexity in cases and offer support at times of need," Tulley continued. "The helpline is becoming the primary access point for men and women of all nationalities ... this is reflected in the growing demand for the service."

The helpline has a team of professionals who offer a range of support, from assessment, brief intervention and sign posting, to help or facilitating referral to more specialist help and treatment.

Katja Warwick-Smith, assistant executive director of Clinical Service Development and head of the Helpline, highlighted the diverse composition of the team, comprising international, multilingual, and inter-professional staff to cater to the varied needs of callers.

Emphasising linguistic diversity, she noted that experts are proficient in Arabic, English, Tagalog, Hindi, Urdu, and Malayalam, aligning with the multicultural fabric of Qatar.

Approximately 70% of callers are Arabic speakers and 22% are English speakers; of the remaining 8% of callers, most are Malayalam or

Place identity, city aesthetics discussed at DIBF

s part of the cultural activities accompanying the 33rd Doha International Book Fair (DIBF), a symposium on Identity and Memory of Place was held on the main stage of

The symposium was attended by HE the Minister of Culture Sheikh Abdulrahman bin Hamad al-Thani and a group of intellectuals and the book fair audiences.

Engineer and architectural designer Ibrahim al-Jaidah and the artist and writer Mohamed Ali Abdullah participated in the symposium, moderated by urban planning expert Dr Ali Abdulraouf.

Al-Jaidah shed light on the urban development in Qatar since the discovery of oil, as he reviewed a rare collection of photographs, drawings and architectural plans, and discussed the architectural changes that occurred in Doha in the past three decades.

Each decade witnessed events that contributed to the development of the city, he said, pointing to the urban movement during the 1960s, which he called "Arab Deco", a special architectural style that appears in many buildings in Oatar.

Artist Abdullah gave a presentation containing a group of pictures that show the different styles of architecture, including the architecture of castles, forts, and residential architecture, as well as the architecture of mosques and other buildings, including palaces and houses, and the most important historical memories that are associated with these places.

A symposium on Aesthetics of Cities, moderated by writer Jamal Fayez, saw the participation of Al Wakrah Municipality director Eng Mohamed Hassan al-Nuaimi, Public Works Authority (Ashghal) project manager of the City Beautification Team Eng Jassim al-Fakhro, and visual artist Salman al-Malik.

Al-Nuaimi said that the city of Al Wakrah possesses all the elements that qualified it to obtain the title of a healthy city, having earned it after proper planning and implementation of the requirements within the Qatar 2030 strategy to provide healthcare for all.

He said that the concept of Al Wakrah as a healthy city is not limited to the health sector.

It encompasses, al-Nuaimi said, an integrated system of standards, services and initiatives that improve the

Artist al-Malik addressed the beautification of the city of Doha with artistic works that enhance the aesthetic vision. The 33rd DIBF, which concludes on May 18, boasts of the participation of 515 publishers from 42 countries.

WCM-Q researchers publish landmark study into proteins

Researchers at Weill Cornell Medicine-Qatar (WCM-Q) have published a study that marks the introduction to Qatar of some of the world's most advanced analytical tools for discovering the links between genetic variations, proteins and a wide range of

Using a new tool to measure proteins, WCM-Q researchers Dr Karsten Suhre and Dr Frank Schmidt analysed the blood samples of more than 320 individuals from a multi-ethnic cohort in Qatar.

The Proteograph Product Suite, allowed the researchers to quantify more than 18,000 different peptides from more than 3,000 proteins.

Bringing this new tool, provided by the US-based biotechnology company Seer, to WCM-Q further enhances Qatar's emerging status as a leader in the field of proteomics, which is the large-scale study of proteins, their structures, interactions, functions, and their impact on health, a statement said.

Lead author Dr Suhre, professor of physiology and biophysics at WCM-Q, explained: "To understand how genetic diseases function, it is not enough to simply identify the genetic variation that causes the disease. We need to know

more, how genes direct which proteins are synthesised by the body, in what quantities, and how they function.

"So, by analysing the relationships between the natural genetic variations in the human population and their effects on specific proteins we can obtain a deeper understanding of how organisms function as a whole, and also eventually a greater understanding of how genetic diseases come about and how to treat them."

Diseases which are linked to genetic variants in proteins that have been addressed by the study include coronary artery disease, type 2 diabetes, amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, and atrial fibrillation

Discovering the complex associations between genetic variants and proteins by merging proteomics and genomics research approaches is considered to be an extremely promising avenue for unearthing new therapies for a wide range of diseases, including cardio and metabolic disorders.

The study, published in Nature Communications, a leading scientific journal, provides evidence that the new analytical tool from Seer has enhanced capabilities to perform a

process called 'protein quantitative trait loci mapping'. This is the identification of links between particular positions on a gene and the presence of a certain amount of a particular protein, which is important because

many serious genetic diseases are

caused by protein dysregulation.
Using the tool, the researchers were able to report in the study that they identified 184 protein-altering variants in 137 genes, which they were also able

to associate with corresponding variant peptides, providing extra confirmation of the accuracy of their observations.

Dr Schmidt, associate professor of biochemistry and director of the proteomics core at WCM-Q, said: "To investigate proteins, you need a way to identify and quantify them in samples of human tissue, such as blood. Our study shows that the Seer Proteograph platform enables us to do this with an enhanced level of accuracy and in high quantities-we can identify and quantify more proteins and match them more accurately with the genes that code each protein, so we can build up far more comprehensive and accurate pictures of how genetic variations code for particular formations of proteins, including formations that subsequently cause disease."

Dr Khaled Machaca, professor of research in physiology and senior associate dean for research, innovations, and commercialisation at WCM-Q, said: "Proteomics is an extraordinarily exciting and important area for research, holding huge potential for discoveries with applications in precision medicine, such as the possible development of new therapies for treating inherited genetic diseases, among many other promising avenues."

German politicians are facing growing violence

The black-clad attackers beat up Matthias Ecke so badly as he put up posters in Dresden that he needed surgery. In Nordhorn, a man threw eggs at a lawmaker then punched him in the face. In Berlin, a pensioner hit a senator on the head with a bag.

Just three of the assaults that German politicians have suffered over the past week as campaigns get underway for European Parliament and district council elections.

Tensions have always risen ahead of votes. But something has shifted. say parties and analysts. Assaults causing physical injury have surged - 22 on politicians so far in 2024, compared with 27 for all of 2023, the Federal Criminal Police Office said this week.

One of the main risks, most said, was that the hostile climate would scare off candidates or campaigners and ultimately skew the outcome of elections. "It makes you feel you are

not wanted here and should disappear," said Michael Mueller, a candidate for the centre-left Social Democrats (SPD) in district elections in the eastern state of Thuringia.

Attackers set his house on fire after he organised a protest against extremism in February.

"Giving up is now an option, although I would have

never have thought it before."

Overall, verbal and physical attacks on politicians in Germany have

more than doubled since 2019, according to government data. The party that has come off the worst is the Greens, the junior partner in Chancellor Olaf Scholz's coalition. Its members reported 1,219 incidents last year, up sevenfold from 2019.

Second on that count is the resurgent far-right Alternative for Germany (AfD) party with 478 incidents, then Scholz's SPD on 420. Members of the SPD, the Greens and other parties closer to the centre of the political spectrum blamed the overall souring of the mood and rise in confrontations on AfD rhetoric.

"If you have politicians that officially (say) 'let's hunt them down' ... words shape actions," said Niklas Nienass, a member of the European Parliament for the Greens. In a 2017 speech, former AfD leader Alexander Gauland said the party would hunt down then Chancellor Angela Merkel.

"Nowadays, three men shouting at me that I'm a paedophile or a criminal or 'we will see where the future leads us' or we all belong in front of a wall, is almost I would say business as usual," Nienass added.

The AfD has rejected such accusations outright. Co-leader Alice Weidel said last week that attempts to use the news of attacks for political gains were "vile and irresponsible", and that AfD politicians and members were themselves frequently attacked.

Politicians for the Greens said many of the insults directed at them increasingly had Nazi inflections.

"People will say: go to Buchenwald, for example, or when we get into power we will deal with you," said Max Reschke, head of the Greens in Thuringia. One of four people investigated after the assault on the SPD's European Parliament member Matthias Ecke in Dresden last Friday had right-wing material in his home, police said. The gang that assaulted him, damaging his cheekbone and eye socket, had earlier attacked another Greens campaigner who was also putting up posters.

"It reminded me of the stormtroopers of the 1930s," said Anne-Katrin Haubold, a second Greens campaigner who witnessed the attack, referring to the original paramilitary wing of the Nazis.

Some said they were avoiding publicising campaign events ahead of time and had stopped branding their vehicles to avoid being targeted. "It's not good because our party members feel insecure if we tell them

we now need a police protection in order to do political rallies," said German Green MEP Michael Bloss. Interior Minister Nancy Faeser said this week she wanted to increase

legal penalties for attacks on politicians and activists and have more police protection for campaigners. But the police are already struggling with their current workload, said

the head of Germany's largest police union Jochen Kopelke. Politicians on the campaign trail in eastern Germany said they were taking their own precautions and holding more security workshops. -

Russia can't match Western asset seizure, can inflict pain

ussia's ability to mete out likefor-like retaliation if Western leaders seize its frozen assets has been eroded by dwindling foreign investment, but officials and economists say there are still ways it can strike back.

The United States wants to seize immobilised Russian reserves - around \$300bn globally - and hand them to Ukraine, while EU leaders favour ringfencing profits from the assets, estimating they will total €15-20bn by 2027.

Much of that money is centrally held, meaning it is accessible if the West decides to go after it.

Russia says any attempt to take its capital or interest would be "banditry" and has warned of catastrophic consequences, although it has been vague about exactly how it might respond.

Former president Dmitry Medvedev recently acknowledged that Russia did not have enough US state property to retaliate symmetrically and would have to go after private investors' cash instead - a step he said would be no less painful.

Reuters spoke to six economists, lawyers and experts who have been tracking the status of assets frozen by both sides since Russia launched its full-scale invasion of Ukraine in February 2022.

The consensus among them was that one of the most likely countermeasures would be to confiscate foreign investors' financial assets and securities currently held in special "type-C" accounts, access to which has been blocked since the war started unless Moscow grants a waiver.

Russia does not disclose how much is in the accounts, held by the country's National Settlement Depository, a sanctioned entity. Russian officials have said the amount is comparable to the \$300bn of Russian reserves frozen.

"Payouts on blocked assets in type-C accounts could start to be seized in favour of the state," said Vladimir Yazev, investment

portfolio manager at investment firm Aigenis.

"Additionally, the government may consider measures on blocking nonexchange assets still held by unfriendly countries." These assets include taxes, grants and private donations.

A Russian lawyer familiar with C accounts, who asked not to be named, said that if non-residents decline to take part in an asset swap scheme run by a state-appointed Russian broker, the only remaining option would be confiscation or foreclosure.

Under the scheme, Westerners would get Russians' blocked holdings of foreign securities and Russians get Westerners' blocked holdings of Russian ones. Retail investors wishing to participate have until May 8 to submit offers.

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said at the weekend that there was still a lot of Western money in Russia that could be targeted by Moscow's counter-measures. He said the government would also pursue legal challenges against the confiscation of assets.

"Russia...will tirelessly defend its interests," he said.

Medvedey proposed the confiscation of private individuals' Russian assets as one response to any US seizure of its reserves, adding such a move was justified by the

"hybrid war" being waged against Moscow. The former president, who espouses hardline views towards the West, is a close ally of President Vladimir Putin and maintains influence as deputy chairman of the Security Council of Russia.

However, since Western nations imposed sweeping sanctions in response to the invasion of Ukraine, foreign holdings in Russia have dropped by around 40% to \$696bn, central bank data shows, reducing some of the potency of such a threat.

In addition to stakes in companies and physical assets, Russia could target foreign investment held in securities, according to one of the economists, who asked not to be named because of the sensitivity of the subject.

But experts said the latest published figures from Russia's central bank on foreign direct investment showed that a sizeable proportion of foreign money was likely coming from Russian companies registered abroad.

Russia stopped releasing a country-bycountry breakdown after the invasion, but the last such data published for January 1, 2022 showed that Cyprus, where many Russian firms are incorporated, accounted for almost 30% of all Russia's FDI.

Many Russian companies are also incorporated in The Netherlands.

"A chunk of total FDI in Russia is really Russian money already," said Gian Maria Milesi-Ferretti, senior fellow in economic studies at The Hutchins Center on Fiscal and Monetary Policy at the Brookings Institution, a US think-tank.

Russia's state-run RIA news agency reported in January that Western firms' assets worth \$288bn were ripe for seizure in Russia, citing January 2022 data.

Reuters could not determine where RIA took its figures from, but central bank figures showed \$289bn in derivative and other foreign investments at that time. That figure had fallen to \$215bn by

end-2023. RIA also said Cyprus and The Netherlands, respectively, accounted for \$98.3bn and \$50.1bn of those assets implying a high degree of Russian company ownership.

The central bank and finance ministry did not respond to a request for comment on the figures.

Moscow has already forced foreign companies selling assets in Russia to do so at discounts of at least 50%. It has placed other Western assets under temporary management and installed Kremlin-friendly

Western companies have acknowledged losses totalling \$107bn, a significant sum that goes beyond the value of physical assets.

'Russia has already snatched up affiliates of Western firms, often for a song," said Milesi-Ferretti. But the value of seized assets is not just in buildings and machinery, it is also in the technology, know-how and connections attached, he added.

Energy group Shell, fast food giant McDonald's and carmakers Volkswagen and Renault have sold their Russian businesses. Others including Austrian bank Raiffeisen, food group Nestle and US food and beverage giant PepsiCo continue to do business.

Another area of leverage Moscow has is in Europe, where the Brussels-based depository Euroclear holds the majority of Russia's reserves.

Some politicians in the bloc are nervous that the euro could be adversely affected if other countries such as China - a Russian ally — start repatriating reserves as a precaution against them being swooped on down the line.

There is also the risk that Russia could, through court action, try to seize Euroclear cash in securities depositories in Hong Kong, Dubai and elsewhere. The worry is that this could drain Euroclear capital and require a huge bailout.

A Euroclear spokesperson declined to comment on what Russia might do.

"Euroclear of course takes into account all possible risk scenarios and strengthens its capital by retaining Russian sanction-related profits as a buffer against current and future risks," the spokesperson added.

While its ties with the West have frayed, Russia has used a current account surplus of almost \$300bn in 2022-23 to build up overseas assets - likely in so-called friendly jurisdictions that do not openly oppose the war in Ukraine, according to Milesi-Ferretti.

Voting resumes as Kashmir poised to oppose Modi

India's six-week election resumed yesterday including in Kashmir, where voters appeared eager to express discontent with Prime Minister Narendra Modi's cancellation of their disputed territory's semi-autonomy and the security crackdown that followed.

Modi remains popular across much of India and his Hindu-nationalist Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) is widely expected to win the poll when it concludes early next month.

But his government's decision in 2019 to bring Kashmir under its direct rule — and the subsequent clampdown — have been deeply resented among the region's residents, who voted yesterday for the first time since the move.

"I voted for changing the current government. It must happen for our children to have a good future," civil servant Habibullah Parray told AFP.

"Everywhere you go in Kashmir today you find people from outside in charge. Everyone wants that to change."

Boycotts called by rebel groups left few Kashmiris willing to participate in past elections, with just over 14 percent of eligible voters in Srinagar casting a ballot during the last national poll in 2019.

By the time polls closed yesterday, nearly

36% of eligible voters in the constituency had cast a ballot, well below India's average turnout but the highest figure in the constituency in nearly three decades.

Kashmir has been divided between India and Pakistan since their independence in 1947. Both claim it in full and have fought two wars over control of the Himalayan region.

Rebel groups opposed to Indian rule have waged an insurgency since 1989 on the side of the frontier controlled by New Delhi, demanding either independence or a merger with Pakistan.

India accuses Pakistan of backing the insurgents, a charge that Islamabad denies.

The conflict has killed tens of thousands of soldiers, rebels and civilians in the decades since, including a spate of firefights between suspected rebels and security forces in the past month.

Violence has dwindled since the Indian portion of the territory was brought under direct rule five years ago, a move that saw the mass arrest of local political leaders and a months-long telecommunications blackout to forestall expected protests.

Modi's government says its cancelling of Kashmir's special status has brought "peace and development", and it has consistently claimed the move was supported by Kashmiris.

But his party has not fielded any candidates in the Kashmir valley for the first time since 1996, and experts say the BJP

would have been roundly defeated if it had. "They would lose, simple as that," polit-

"They would lose, simple as that," political analyst and historian Sidiq Wahid told AFP last week.

For voters, the election was "a referendum in order to voice their disagreement" with the Modi government's actions in Kashmir, he added.

The BJP has appealed to voters to instead support smaller and newly created par-

ties that have publicly aligned with Modi's policies.

But voters looked set to back one of two established Kashmiri political parties calling for the Modi government's changes to be reversed.

Former chief minister Omar Abdullah, whose National Conference party is campaigning for the restoration of Kashmir's special status, said his allies had urged voters to make their feelings known.

"The point of view that we want people to send out is that what happened... is not acceptable to them," he told AFP.

Before the changes in 2019, permanent residents in the Muslim-majority territory

had enjoyed land and jobs protections.
In rural districts outside Srinagar, the region's biggest city, army soldiers patrolled

roads in convoys of bulletproof vehicles. Several polling booths around the constituency had more than two dozen para-

military troops guarding voter queues.

India's election is conducted in seven phases over six weeks to ease the immense logistical burden of staging the democrat-

More than 968mn people are eligible to vote in India's election, with the final round of polling on June 1 and results expected three days later.

Voter turnout elsewhere in India has so far declined significantly from 2019 to around 66%, according to election commission forms

mission figures.

Analysts have blamed widespread expectations that Modi will easily win a third term and hotter-than-average temperatures heading into the summer.

India's weather bureau has forecast more hot spells in May and the election commission formed a taskforce last month to review the impact of heat and humidity before each round of voting.

Belousov: The economist in charge of Russia's army

An economist and technocrat with no military background, Russia's new defence minister Andrei Belousov has been tasked with deploying his number-crunching skills and bureaucratic oversight to secure Russian victory against Ukraine.

Belousov has been one of President Vladimir Putin's most trusted and influential advisers and is widely seen as his point man on all things related to the domestic economy. His move to the defence ministry signals a shift in the Kremlin's understanding of the current state of the conflict and of how it can beat Ukraine: by outspending Kyiv and outlasting the West.

"For the West, Belousov's appointment as defence minister is bad news. It is the development of the theme of a war of attrition," independent Russian political analyst Konstantin Kalachev said.

"The main aim is to exhaust and bleed out the enemy, and cause fatigue and discord among its allies," he added.

Belousov, 65, is unlikely to have a big sway over military decisions. Instead, he will oversee the billions of dollars Moscow spends on everything from missiles, tanks and bullets to soldiers' salaries and welfare payments. Yesterday, Belousov said he would tackle "excessive bureaucracy" at the ministry. The Rybar Telegram channel, which is close to the Russian military, said Belousov would oversee a "major audit and restructuring" of the army's finances and approach to

The defence ministry was rocked by a corruption scandal in April when Deputy Defence Minister Timur Ivanov — a key ally of Belousov's predecessor Sergei Shoigu — was arrested on suspicion of taking bribes.

As First Deputy Prime Minister Belusov has

pushed for aggressive state spending to boost arms production and overcome Western sanctions.

Russia's military spending has swelled to around seven percent of GDP this year. "He's somebody Putin trusts, especially when it comes to economic issues," Rybar noted. The Kremlin said Belousov's background made him the right fit to take over the defence ministry at this juncture.

"Today the winner on the battlefield is the one who is more open to innovation," state news agencies quoted Putin's spokesman Dmitry Peskov as saying. "It is very important to fit the economy of the security sector into the economy of the country," he added. Valery Gerasimov, the Chief of the General Staff who oversees military operations and reports directly to Putin is set to stay in place — a sign that Belousov will have little influence over decisions on the ground. But his appointment signifies a growing

But his appointment signifies a growing belief in Moscow that victory could be determined by developments far away from the front lines. "There is an iron logic to this. Today, the strongest person is the one who can combine the war and the economy in the most comfortable way for the country," said Alexander Sladkov, a pro-Kremlin military

The son of a renowned Soviet economist, Belousov has steadily risen through the government's ranks under Putin's quartercentury rule.

Born in 1959 in Moscow, he graduated from Moscow State University and started his career at the Institute of Economic Forecasting at the Russian Academy of Sciences

During Putin's first two terms as president he was an outside adviser to various prime ministers and became deputy economy minister in 2006.

When Putin stepped aside to become prime minister in 2008, Belousov headed his economic and financial affairs team.
With Putin's 2012 return to the Kremlin, he became economic development minister and a year later an adviser to the president.
Belousov gained a reputation as one of Putin's most trusted domestic advisers.
He was appointed deputy prime minister in 2020, overseeing support for Russian businesses during the coronavirus

After Moscow sent troops into Ukraine in February 2022, he was tasked with protecting the Russian economy from the fallout of Western sanctions and reorientating it to support the offensive. During the conflict Belosov has been a key player in developing Russia's domestic drone-manufacturing sector, and one of his last official big projects was boosting Russia's "technological sovereignty."

India, Iran sign 10-year pact to develop port

India and Iran yesterday signed a 10-year contract to develop and equip the strategic Chabahar port in Iran as India seeks to grow trade in west and central Asia.

The agreement will give India 10-year access to use the port, located close to Iran's southeastern border with Pakistan, according to Iran's Ministry of Roads and Urban Development.

The contract will in turn see

India Ports Global Limited (IPGL) invest \$370mn into "providing strategic equipment" and "developing the transport infrastructure of the port".

Iran's urban development min-

ister Mehrdad Bazrpash and India's ports and shipping minister Sarbananda Sonowal signed contract in the town of Chabahar, in a ceremony broadcast live on state media.

India in 2016 agreed to finance the development of the Iranian port as a trading hub for central Asia as Prime Minister Narendra Modi sought to revive economic ties with Tehran after the lifting of

sanctions.

Modi and former Iranian presi-

dent Hassan Rouhani oversaw the signing of a memorandum of understanding for the provision of a line of credit from India's EXIM Bank to develop the port.

The development of the port however stalled, despite waivers to sanctions that the US began reimposing in 2018 after withdrawing from a landmark 2015 nuclear deal with Iran.

"Chabahar... can act as a focal point in the transit development of the region," Bazrpash said at the signing ceremony.

"We are pleased with this agreement, and we have full trust in India," he added.

"Iran and India are seeking to develop Chabahar port as much as possible, taking into account the interests of the two countries for joint access to regional markets," the Indian minister said.

This "long-term contract symbolises the enduring trust and effective partnership between India and Iran," he added.

In 2019, before the outbreak of the Covid pandemic, both countries agreed to speed up the project after a visit by India's external affairs minster Subrahmanyam Jaishankar to Tehran.

Chabahar port is on the Indian Ocean about 62 miles west of the Pakistan border.

Russia pummels Kharkiv region in tactical success

Russia yesterday pummelled towns and villages in Ukraine's northeastern Kharkiv region days after launching a surprise ground offensive over the border, forcing thousands to evacuate. The Ukrainian army acknowledged Russia was "achieving tactical success" after launching a ground assault on Friday that has sparked the evacuation of almost 6,000 people. Russia's defence ministry said its troops had "improved the tactical position and dealt a blow to (Ukrainian) manpower" around border villages, including Lyptsi, and the town of Vovchansk. Kateryna Stepanova, 74, who fled Lyptsi with her son, said several bombs had hit her street. "We weren't going to leave... but now this. Thankfully, we're alive," she said, sitting in a minibus at a gathering point for

AfD pursues goals 'against democracy': Court

A German high court yesterday ruled that domestic security services could continue to treat the far-right Alternative for Germany (AfD) as a potentially extremist party, meaning they retain the right to keep it under surveillance.

The Federal Office for the Protection of the Constitution (BfV), charged with protecting Germany's democratic order from extremist threats, has classified the AfD as potentially extreme since 2021.

Judges at the higher administrative court in Muenster upheld a lower court's 2022 finding that the designation was proportionate and did not violate the constitution, or European or domestic civil

"The court finds there is sufficient evidence that the AfD pursues goals that run against the human dignity of certain groups and against democracy," the judges wrote.
"There are grounds to suspect at least part
of the party wants to accord second-rank
status to German citizens with a migration
background."

The party, which tops polls in several eastern states that hold elections later this year, has recently faced harsher scrutiny over racist remarks by members and allegations that it harbours spies and agents for Russia and China.

"The establishment of this state — and that includes the BfV and the media — is being used to exclude us from democratic competition," said the AfD's co-leader, Alice Weidel, adding that the AfD would appeal. Yesterday's ruling settles the facts of the case: an appeal could only involve questioning the way lower courts applied the law.

4 killed in Mumbai billboard collapse

Four people were killed and at least 60 injured after a billboard collapsed during a fierce storm in India's financial capital Mumbai, officials said yesterday. The signage collapsed at a petrol station in the city's east, trapping dozens of people underneath.

"So far, 60 people have been rescued from the accident site and admitted to hospital. Four people have died," a statement issued by municipal authorities said. The collapsed billboard measured 70 by 50 metres, according to a post on social media platform X by Mumbai's police force. Mumbai was hit by strong winds accompanied by rain and dust storms on Thursday that uprooted trees and caused brief power outages in parts of the city, along with disruptions to the city's train network. A "high-level inquiry has been ordered into the incident," Fadnavis said in a post on X.

Dazzling auroras fade from skies as sunspot turns away

The spectacular auroras that danced across the sky in many parts of the world over the weekend are fading, scientists said yesterday, as the massive sunspot that caused them turns its ferocious gaze away from Earth.

Since Friday, the most powerful solar storm to strike our planet in more than two decades has lit up night skies with dazzling auroras in the United States, Tasmania, the Bahamas and other places far from the extreme latitudes where they are normally seen. But Eric Lagadec, an astrophysicist at France's Observatoire de la Cote d'Azur, told AFP that the "most spectacular" period of this rare event has come to an end.

The first of several coronal mass ejections (CMEs) – expulsions of plasma and magnetic fields from the Sun – came just after 1600 GMT Friday, according to the US-based National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA).

The event was later upgraded to an "extreme" geomagnetic storm — the first since the "Halloween Storms" of October 2003 that caused blackouts in Sweden and damaged power infrastructure in South

Excitement over the phenomenon — and otherworldly photos of pink, green and purple night skies — broke out across the world, from southern Europe to Australia's island state of Tasmania.

The storm had been forecast to intensify again until 0600 GMT yesterday, the NOAA said, adding that auroras could be viewable as far south as New York. But thousands of people who came out on Sunday night in the hope of seeing the aurora borealis over the Joshua Tree National Park in California instead

only saw the glittering stars of the Milky Way. Lagadec said that while there were further solar outbursts on Sunday, it is unlikely that more auroras will be visible to the naked eye in lower latitudes such as in France.

"Only the most experienced photographers will be able to capture them" in such areas, he said. The geomagnetic storm was caused when multiple CMEs emanated from a massive sunspot cluster 17 times wider than Earth arrived at our planet at around the same time.

However the sunspot has now moved to "the edge of the Sun, (so) we do not expect the next coronal mass ejections to head in Earth's direction," Lagadec said. This means the solar storm is expected to "progressively decrease in the coming days," said Quentin Verspieren, the European Space Agency's space safety programme co-ordinator.

Pointing out that hopeful aurora spotters were "mostly disappointed" on Sunday night, Verspieren told AFP it was unlikely that the celestial spectacle would be repeated.

effects extend farther toward the equator. Unlike during 2003's solar storms, no major disruptions to power or communications networks appear to have been reported this time around. Elon Musk's satellite Internet operator Starlink said on X that its thousands of satellites in low Earth orbit had "weathered the geomagnetic storm and remain healthy"

Unlike solar flares, which travel at the speed of light and reach Earth in around eight minutes, CMEs travel at a more sedate pace, with officials putting the current average at 500 miles per second. Fluctuating magnetic fields associated with geomagnetic storms induce currents in long wires, including power lines, which can lead to blackouts. Long pipelines can also become electrified. Spacecraft are at risk from high doses of radiation, although the atmosphere prevents this from

reaching Earth.

ormer Turkish minister of foreign affairs Mevlut Cavusoglu gave a talk yesterday evening at the Qatar Press Center (QPC) on The future of the Middle East after the Gaza War.

The event, which was attended by centre's officials and journalists from Qatar and Turkiye, saw Al Jazeera journalist Iman Ayad and Cavusoglu address the events of October 7 in Israel, the arduous negotiation paths, and eight

in Ukraine, there has been an increase in the number of irregular migrants," he said. "(Then there are issues like) climate change, cybersecurity attacks...other uncertainties...the international system has been in decline."

"So how can we resolve the crises through diplomacy?" the former minister posed. "Turkiye has exerted many efforts with our best partner Qatar to reach a solu-

"The war on Gaza is unprecedented with the 35,000-plus death toll, most of them women and children," Cavusoglu continued. "In addition, 2.5mn civilians have been displaced and deprived of their basic needs."

"The aggression perpetrated by Israel against Gaza is a war crime," he stated. "It took the UN Security Council 171 days to call for a ceasefire during the month of Ramadan, but Israel did not implement it."

"Turkiye and Qatar are exerting tremendous efforts to support Hamas, which has accepted the recent Egyptian, Qatari and American solution (for a ceasefire), but (that) has been stalled by Israel," Cavusoglu said.



in the US, Western countries and elsewhere." "Unfortunately, you can see how students, professors and academics are (being) treated in the US and in Western countries, who have been lecturing us about the freedom of expression and the freedom of the press," Cavusoglu

remarked. "Everyone with a conscience should stand up for the Palestinian cause," the former top diplomat said. "We should act all together to stop this war. Israel has been trying to shift the tension to Lebanon, Syria and Iran by violating international law with its aggression on Iran's diplomatic mission, to shift focus and gain the support it has

lost." "Turkiye has made tremendous efforts to prevent this shift," he stated. "(Turkiye is doing this) through diplomatic efforts and strong messages to Israel and by

"However, we should continue our efforts and impose strong economic measures on Israel," he stressed. "The Muslim communities must also be united in order to take effective measures."

"As the GCC countries are united, they can, together with Turkiye, work to encourage East-West corridors and North-South relations," Cavusoglu added. "We should try different mechanisms through bi-lateral, tri-lateral and regional ties."

He said that the Turkish vision strongly supports Qatar and Egypt's efforts for an unconditional ceasefire in Gaza and the exchange of hostages and prison-

"The protection of civilians has to be guaranteed," Cavusoglu emphasised.

"Turkiye proposes to make any peace agreement permanent and not to go back to conflict," he said, adding: "As the saying goes 'it

takes two to tango:..the two-state solution is the answer, with East Jerusalem as the capital of Pales-

"If there is no fair peace, there is no peaceful solution," Cavusoglu pointed out. "Both sides have to agree. We need to increase our efforts and get the support of the US, we have to be realistic."

"(Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu) is trying to sustain his extremist government, Israel should be stopped and held accountable for war crimes," he

Concerning a question on the future of Hamas, the former Turkish foreign minister said: "Hamas was elected in 2006, it is not a terrorist organisation."

"Hamas has a presence in Qatar as they are taking part in the dialogue," he pointed out. "Also, the Western leadership want Hamas to stay in Qatar."

"Palestinian political parties should reconcile," Cavusoglu said. "In any political settlement, Hamas will be an important actor... even Israel accepts that."

"Hamas is defending the rights of Palestinians," he concluded.
