US Secretary of State Antony Blinken yesterday emphasised the importance of a "just and enduring peace" for Ukraine in a meeting with Indian Foreign Minister Subrahmanyam Jaishankar, the State Department said. The discussion came amid a visit being reportedly planned to Ukraine by Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi. Modi is likely to visit Ukraine in August. various Indian media outlets have reported in recent days, which would be his first visit to the country since Russia invaded in February 2022. Page 9

Turkiye might enter Israel to help Palestinians: Erdogan

President Tayyip Erdogan said yesterday that Turkiye might enter Israel as it had done in the past in Libva and Nagorno-Karabakh, though he did not spell out what sort of intervention he was suggesting. Erdogan, who has been a fierce critic of Israel's offensive in Gaza, started discussing that war during a speech praising his country's defence industry. "We must be very strong so that Israel can't do these ridiculous things to Palestine. Just like we entered Karabakh, just like we entered Libya, we might do similar to them," Erdogan told a meeting of his ruling AK Party in his hometown of Rize.

19 dead in Ethiopia boat accident

At least 19 people are dead in Ethiopia after a boat capsized on a river in the country's northwest, a state-run media outlet said yesterday. The tragedy occurred in the Amhara region on Saturday as a group of people were crossing the river Tekeze, which partly forms the border between Ethiopia and Eritrea, the staterun Ethiopian Press Agency (EPA) reported. Restraint urged as Israel vows to hit Hezbollah hard

Rocket kills 12 youths in Golan

sraeli Defence Minister Yoav Gallant yesterday vowed to "hit the enemy hard" after rocket fire from Lebanon killed 12 young people in the Israeliannexed Golan Heights and again raised fears that the war in Gaza will spread.

Iran warned Israel any new military "adventures" in Lebanon could lead to "unforeseen consequences".

UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres condemned the rocket fire and called on all parties to "exercise maximum restraint".

Israel's army called it "the deadliest attack on Israeli civilians" since October

Israel blamed Lebanon's Hezbollah movement for firing a Falaq-1 Iranian rocket but the Iran-backed group - which has regularly targeted Israeli military positions - said it had "no connection" to the incident.

It said, however, that it had fired one such rocket on Saturday toward an Israeli military target in the Golan.

The rocket fire in Maidal Shams, whose opulation are Arabic-speaking Drugs prompted Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to return early from the United States. Upon arrival he went immediately into a security cabinet meeting, his office said.

He said "Hezbollah will pay a heavy price" for the attack, "a price it has not paid before."

The Israeli foreign ministry said Hezbollah had "crossed all red lines".

In expectation of Israel's retaliation, Hezbollah evacuated several positions close to the border and in eastern Lebanon, a source close to the group said.

An Israeli drone fired two missiles at Taraiyya village in eastern Lebanon, destroying a hangar and a home without causing casualties.

The rocket strike on Majdal Shams hit a football pitch and killed young people who local authorities said were aged 10-16. Israeli police said an 11-year-old boy was still missing. Thousands of residents crowded the town's streets in a tearful funeral ceremony for many of the dead.

The White House meanwhile said the rocket launch was "conducted by Lebanese Hezbollah", adding that "it was their rocket and launched from an area they

The UN special co-ordinator for Lebanon, Jeanine Hennis-Plasschaert, and UN Interim Force in Lebanon (UNIFIL) chief Aroldo Lazaro said in a joint statement that intensifying exchanges of fire "could ignite a wider conflagration that would engulf the entire region in a catastrophe beyond belief".

Britain condemned the attack, as did Germany, whose foreign ministry urged "cool heads". Page 6

Israeli advance displaces more people in S Gaza

the Gaza Strip's south yesterday as fighting with Palestinian resistance movement Hamas raged, and Gaza health officials said Israeli military strikes had killed 66 Palestinians across the enclave in the past 24 hours.

Tanks pushed further into the three towns of Al-Karara, Al-Zanna, and Bani Suhaila, in the east of Khan Younis in southern Gaza, and medics said at least nine Palestinians were killed earlier yesterday by Israeli military strikes in those areas.

Residents said fierce fighting could be heard in eastern areas of Khan Younis where the army was operating. The new incursions caused thousands more families to leave their homes and head to overcrowded areas in Al-Mawasi to the west, and north to Deir Al-Balah.

Later yesterday, two separate Israeli air strikes on Khan Younis killed at least 15 Palestinians, medics said.

One air strike on a tent area in the Mawasi district killed five people including a fourmonth-old girl named Maria Abu Ziada. Al-Mawasi in western Khan Younis is a humanitarian-designated area where the Israeli army has been ordering Palestinians from other places to go.

The Israeli military said it was aware of the report and looking into it.

The Israeli occupation army's offensive in the Gaza Strip since Oct. 7, 2023, has resulted in the martyrdom of 39,324 Palestinians.

Meanwhile, in Rafah, near the border with Egypt, Israeli forces advanced deeper into northern parts of the city, where they have yet to take full control. In Central Gaza, the Israeli military called upon Gazans to evacuate parts of the Bureij and Shuhada areas.

In the Tel Al-Hawa suburb of Gaza City, an Israeli air strike killed four Palestinians, medics said. Israel has lost 328 soldiers in combat in Gaza. Page 6

HHCS reduces HMC emergency department visits

comprehensive set of service improvements implemented by Hamad Medical Corporation's Home Health Care Service (HHCS) has led to a reduction in the number of unnecessary visits to emergency departments by registered patients. The service changes have re-

sulted in the percentage of home healthcare patients visiting an emergency department each month falling from an average of 8% to 5%.

Dr Feras Haddad, senior consultant head of section and lead physician, HHCS, said: "Our Home Health Care Service provides a wide range of healthcare services to more than 2,600 registered patients, most of them over 60 years of age with multiple comorbidities. Our aim is to deliver healthcare and assistance to patients in the comfortable and familiar environment of their home, ultimately reducing their need to visit a hospital or healthcare facility for their care."

"Since the start of 2021, our HHCS has introduced multiple initiatives to ensure patients receive the best care possible at home and to reduce unnecessary emergency department visits, relieving pressure on hospital beds and enhancing the care experience for patients."

Service improvements include, A patient assigned physician model of care was introduced to improve continuity of care and follow-ups.

Decentralisation of HHCS services across four districts - Al Wakra, Landmark (with satellite in Al Khor), Muaither, in addition to the main centre at Hamad Medical City - has brought the care teams closer to patients' homes.

Initiatives to reduce hospital admissions, including assessing frequent emergency department attenders, active post-discharge

Services provided by our teams include regular medical check-ups, medication management, wound care, administering injections, respiratory therapy, and specialist physio and occupational therapy, speech, language and dietician services."

Dr Hanadi al-Hamad, HMC's Deputy Chief for Long-Term Care, Rehabilitation and Geriatrics Care, added: "This trend is expected to continue over the next few decades leading to increased demand on our Home Health care Service. I would like to thank everyone who has played their part in the service improvements that have led to the reduction in emergency department visits by registered home care patients. These initiatives are making a real positive impact on patient care."



'Basher' service to streamline registration of national workforce in private sector



Delta Draconid meteor shower to adorn Qatar skies today

atar Calendar House (QCH) has affirmed that residents of the northern hemisphere, including those in Qatar, are set to witness the celestial phenomenon, the Delta Draconid meteor shower, this year.

QCH added that the phenomenon will reach its peak today evening extending until the early hours of Tuesday morning.

Astronomical expert at QCH, Dr Bashir Marzouk, stated that the Delta Draconid meteor shower becomes active on a yearly basis throughout the period extending from mid-July until Aug 23 each year, and reaches its peak on July 29 and 30.

He highlighted that the rate of its fall in the sky at its peak will reach 20 meteors per hour, according to estimates by astronomers who are familiar with sighting meteors.

What distinguishes meteor shower, is that sighting it only requires a location away from environmental and light pollution.

Therefore, residents of Qatar will be able to observe the shower without resorting to

astronomical devices or telescopes, Marzouk emphasised.

He pointed out that people can see this celestial activity with the naked eye from today evening until the dawn of Tuesday, the best times of sighting, by looking toward the southeastern horizon of the sky from midnight until dawn the following day.

Marzouk added that cuttingedge digital cameras can be used to have images of these meteors, by taking into account the increased exposure time while photographing, to receive distinctive images. (QNA)

The programme was launched by experts in the field of administrative training and human development with the objective of preparing Qatari trainers and national cadres capable of making a positive impact in society.

The final day of the programme witnessed the graduation of a new batch of trainees, including 19 male and female trainees who obtained a certified trainer certificate and certificates accredited by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the Qatar Chamber of Commerce, and the Mear Centre for Training.

Dr Issa al-Hur, trainer and expert in the field of human development and advocate of the "Istidama" initiative, confirmed that the initiative is concerned with nurturing the human element as a pillar for achieving sustainable development.

"We work in 'Istidama' to

build green human resources, which means that a person is productive and influential in all his fields of specialisation," he

Dr Sultan al-Hajri, a trainer and lecturer in management, said that the "Istidama" programme is a social initiative that targets enhancing the professional skills and competencies of individuals in various fields with the aim of enabling a group of people capable of influencing society to acquire these skills and invest them in what serves

Hamad al-Shammari, a trainer in behavioural management skills and emotional intelligence, one of the founders of the "Istidama" programme for Training of the Trainers (TOT), said that the programme is spread out over more than three months of training.

Dr Maryam Mohamed al-Emadi, a certified trainer in relationships and systems and deputy director-general of the "Istidama" programme, expressed her pride in the graduation of a new batch of new train-

26,000 food inspections in Doha from April to June

oha Municipality carried out 26,000 food health inspection tours on the various food outlets across the country during the second quarter of this

There were 6,432 technical inspection tours, and 9,765 public supervision tours.

During this period 172 food samples from the local market were sent to the laboratories for examination.

Accordingly, eight food outlets were shut for different periods, and 3,390 various violation reports were issued.

Veterinarians of the municipality supervised the slaughter 11,000 head of livestock, with 62 carcasses entirely destroyed for being unfit for human consumption, and 606kg of meat destroyed for the all the municipalities across the same reason.

The municipality also planted 1,270 trees, carried out 11,752 pests and rodents control campaigns, and issued 400 building permits and 3,775 advertising permits.

Further, the municipality organised 24 workshops and events.

The total number of food health control inspections carried out by country amounted to 62,000 during the second quarter of the year.

In addition, there were 11,000 technical inspections, 23,000 public supervisions and 1,636 food samples taken to the lab examina-

These resulted in the shutting of 51 outlets, and issuing of 12,000 violations.

Hezbollah evacuates positions ahead of expected raids

ezbollah has evacuated positions in south and east Lebanon after Israeli threats of reprisals for a deadly strike on the annexed Golan Heights, a source close to the group said yesterday.

Israeli Defence Minister Yoav Gallant vowed to "hit the enemy hard" a day after rocket fire from Lebanon killed 12 minors in Majdal Shams, again raising fears that the war in Gaza will spread.

Israel blamed Lebanon's Hezbollah movement for firing a Falaq-1 rocket but the group - which has regularly targeted Israeli military positions - said it had "no connection" to the in-

"Hezbollah has evacuated some positions in the south and in the Bekaa valley that it thinks could be a target for Israel," the source close to the group said, requesting anonymity as they were not authorised to speak to

the media.

Hezbollah has a strong presence in east Lebanon's Bekaa valley, which borders Syria, and in south Lebanon, where it has been launching near daily attacks on Israeli positions since October in support of ally Ha-

The cross-border exchanges of fire have largely been limited to the border area, but Israel has repeatedly struck deep inside

Lebanon, including overnight.

Hezbollah is also deployed in
Syria, where for years it has been
fighting in support of President
Bashar al-Assad in his country's

The Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, a war monitor,

said some groups and Hezbollahaffiliated fighters have "evacuated their positions" south of the capital and in the Damascus countryside, as well as in parts of the Syrian-controlled Golan Heights, in anticipation of "potential Israeli airstrikes".

Hezbollah had already abandoned positions in Syria in early June after Israeli raids, according to the Britain-based Observatory, which relies on a network of sources on the ground.

FLIGHTS RESCHEDULED

Since Syria's civil war erupted in 2011, Israel has carried out hundreds of strikes in the country, mainly targeting army positions and foreign-backed fighters, including from Hezbollab.

The raids also seek to cut off Hezbollah supply routes to Leb-

Israeli authorities rarely comment on individual strikes in Syria, but have repeatedly said they will not allow Iran to expand its presence there.

Israel's raids on Syria intensified after Palestinian Hamas group's storming of Israel in the first week of October last year sparked war in the Gaza Strip, then eased after an April 1 strike blamed on Israel hit the Iranian consular building in Damascus.

That strike prompted Iran to launch a first-ever direct missile and drone attack against Israel on April 13-14, sending regional tensions skyrocketing.

Lebanon's Middle East Airlines said in a statement that it had rescheduled a number of flights yesterday and today, citing "technical reasons related to the distribution of (aircraft) in-

surance risks".

In October, the carrier said it was relocating some planes abroad in light of regional developments. During a 2006 war between Israel and Hezbollah, Israel struck Beirut airport, Lebanon's only international facility.

The cross-border violence since October has killed at least 527 people in Lebanon according to an AFP tally, most of them fighters but also including 104 civilians.

Israeli strikes have killed at least 25 Hezbollah fighters in Syria since the Gaza war erupted, according to an AFP tally.

Arab rights group slams Israeli evacuation order in south Gaza

rab Observatory for Human Rights (AOHR) has condemned the evacuation orders issued by the Israeli occupation army in the north of Rafah and south of Khan Younis in the southern Gaza Strip.

In a statement yesterday, AOHR denounced the systematic eviction of the Palestinians from their homes and workplaces by the Israeli occupation army, in addition to trapping hundreds of thousands of them in a constantly shrinking geographical area, and intentionally targeting them from the air, land, and sea.

AOHR warned of further Israeli escalation to commit crimes of genocide, stressing that the evacuation orders issued Saturday to the civilian inhabitants of Al Hassash, and Musbah in Rafah, and Al Manara, Al Salam, Qeizan Al Najjar, Qeizan Abu Rashwan, and Jourt Al Lout neighbourhoods in Khan Younis, are considered a full-fledged crime.

It added that such a crime is against humanity based on the norms of the International Criminal Court (ICC), which is perpetrated, either for political, racial,

or religious purposes within a large-scale attack and is a flagrant violation of human rights, and underlined that such an act violates a broad range of legitimate rights of the Palestinian people.

The recurrence of crimes perpetrated by the Israeli occupation army in the Al Mawasi area, dubbed as the humanitarian zone, for the second time in less than a week, is a shocking brutality and a new episode of the relentless Israeli crimes against the Pales-

tinian people and the entire humanity, AOHR said. AOHR called for urgent international action to end this dastardly Israeli aggression immediately and to provide protection for the Palestinians amid their suffering from forced displacement in this limited geographical area compounded by measures to tighten a siege on it, in addition to intentionally and directly targeting the zone through air strikes, artillery shelling and attacks from gunboats.

Jordan's Umm al-Jimal added to Unesco heritage list

ordan's Umm al-Jimal village has been added to Unesco's World Heritage List, in a move hailed yesterday by the country's tourism and antiquities minister as a "great achievement".

Unesco, which is hosting a meeting of its World Heritage Committee in New Delhi, said on X on Friday that the earliest structures uncovered at Umm al-Jimal date back to the first century CE, "when the area formed part of the Nabataean Kingdom." It added that inscriptions in "Greek, Nabataean, Safaitic, Latin and Arabic uncovered on the site... sheds light on the changes in its inhabitants' religious beliefs".

The village is near the Jordanian-Syrian border, 86 kilometres north of the capital Amman, and is known as "the black oasis" due to the prevalence of black volcanic

rock in the area.

Jordan's Minister of Tourism and Antiquities Makram al-Qaisi said in a press conference yesterday that the inclusion of Umm aljimal on the World Heritage List is a "great achievement we should be proud of". He said the ministry hoped to invite local and inter-

national investors to the site and "present Umm al-Jimal as an attractive tourist destination".

The name Umm al-Jimal comes from the use of camels as part of trade caravans in the village.

The village was first settled by the Nabataean peoples in the first century CE and later occupied by the Romans, becoming an important agricultural and commercial village. Umm al-Jimal is the seventh historical site in Jordan to be added to Unesco's World Heritage List, along with Petra, Quseir Amra, Umm al-Rasas, Wadi Rum,

Mughatas and Salt. Tourism contributes between 12 and 14% of GDP in the kingdom, whose 10mn inhabitants rely heavily on the sector. Qaisi said Jordan welcomed more than 6mn tourists in 2023, bringing in \$7bn.

But tourism has started to feel the effects of the war raging in nearby Gaza. Qaisi said the kingdom saw a 4.9% drop in tourism revenue so far in 2024, and a 7.9% drop in visitors. Most tourists come from Eu-

rope, the US and Canada, followed by Asia Pacific countries.

Libya jails 12 over dam management during deadly Derna floods

welve people were convicted yesterday in Libya's eastern city of Derna over their role in "managing dam facilities" during last year's deadly floods, the general prosecutor's office said in a statement.

The defendants, who included government employees and local officials, received prison sentences ranging from nine to 27 years, said the statement published on Facebook.

They were jailed over their management of "the country's dam facilities" at a time when the collapse of two dams near the port city of Derna contributed to catastrophic flooding.

On September 10 last year, Storm Daniel hit the east coast of Libya triggering flooding and the dam collapses that razed entire neighbourhoods.

The vast surge of water killed more than 4,300 people and left over 8,000 missing, according to the United Nations.

Nearly 44,800 people were displaced by the disaster, including 16,000 children, and their access to care and education has severely deteriorated since, said the UN.

Around 250,000 people still required humanitarian aid in December. A report by the European Union, the UN and the World Bank found last January that the "disaster impacted approximately 1.5mn people — 22% of Libya's population — living in the coastal and inland cities that were hardest hit".

The report estimated that \$1.8bn would be required for reconstruction.

UN humanitarian agency OCHA has confirmed 4,352 deaths and more than 8,000 missing persons, "making Storm Daniel the deadliest storm in Africa since 1900", said the report.

In addition to the reconstruction needs, the report estimated the material damage and economic losses, including of businesses and farms, at \$1.65bn, or 3.6% of Libya's GDP in 2022.

Libya has been battered by armed conflict and political chaos since a Nato-backed uprising led to the toppling of former ruler Muammar Gaddafi in 2011.

The North African country is now divided between an internationally recognised Tripoli-based government led by interim Prime Minister Abdulhamid Dbeibah in the west and an administration in the east backed by military strongman Khalifa Haftar.

Stampede in DR Congo stadium kills seven

Seven people died in a stampede at a stadium in the Democratic Republic of Congo capital Kinshasa, local authorities said.

The incident happened at the Stade de Martyrs stadium in the north of the city during a concert by Congolese gospel singer Mike Kalambayi on Saturday. State broadcasters RTNC said on X that there had been "seven deaths and several people admitted to intensive care".

"Overflows and crowd movements" at the stadium "resulted in the death of men", the cabinet of Kinshasa governor Daniel Bumba said in a statement late on Saturday.

The stadium has a capacity for 80,000 people.

Event organisers Maajabu

Event organisers Maajabu Gospel said 30,000 people had attended the concert.

France makes landmark gesture over WWII massacre of African troops

France has made a key gesture of remembrance for the dozens of African

troops shot dead on French army orders in Senegal during World War II, as Paris seeks to ease tensions with former colonies over historical memory, the government said yesterday, AFP reported from Paris. Six of the African soldiers - four from Senegal, one from Ivory Coast and one from what is now Burkina Faso - have been posthumously honoured for having "died for France" ("morts pour la France"). An official from France's veterans and remembrance ministry told AFP that the decision was taken ahead of the 80th anniversary of the events in Thiarove in Senegal in 1944. It was also in line with the "desire of President Emmanuel Macron to look history in the face", added the official, "It is now time to look at this history, our history, as it was." The decision was taken on June 18 just days before the first meeting in Paris between Macron and the new Senegalese President Bassirou Diomaye Faye. Macron has during his seven years in power sought to address the most painful historical scars over France's relationship with Africa, notably relating to the 1954-1962 Algerian War of Independence and the 1994 genocide against the Tutsi minority in Rwanda. However critics have often said that the gestures, while welcome, do not go far enough and often stop short of a full apology.

19 killed as boat capsizes in Ethiopia

At least 19 people drowned when their boat sank in a river in Ethiopia's northern Amhara region on Saturday, the region's official media said yesterday, AFP reported from Addis Ababa. "Seven people including a child were saved in difficult circumstances," the Amhara Media Corporation (AMC) added, quoting a local administrator.

The boat was taking passengers across the Tekeze river, which runs along Ethiopia's border with Eritrea before it crosses into Sudan at the point where the three countries meet. Twenty six people were estimated to have been on board at the time of the accident at around noon (0900 GMT) on Saturday, officials said.

Only two bodies had been recovered, AMC said, adding that those rescued had been taken to nearby hospitals. Media access to the remote northern Ethiopia is heavily restricted by the authorities, with information often trickling in hours later. Amhara – Ethiopia's second most populous region – has been wracked for months by clashes between the Ethiopian military and an Amhara militia known as Fano. It was also caught up in the neighbouring region Tigray's war, with its regional forces fighting alongside federal government troops against Tigrayan rebels.



Venezuelans vote in highly charged election

renezuelans waited in line at polling stations and cast ballots yesterday in the most consequential election in a quarter-century of socialist party rule, with President Nicolas Maduro confident of victory even as the opposition has attracted impassioned support and warned of possible irregularities.

Opposition leader Maria Corina Machado has been the star of the coalition campaign, despite a ban on her holding public office that forced her to pass the torch to candidate Edmundo Gonzalez, a 74-yearold ex-diplomat.

Gonzalez has won backing even from some former supporters of the ruling party, but the opposition and observers have questioned whether the vote will be fair, saying that decisions by electoral authorities and the arrests of opposition staff are meant to create obstacles.

Maduro - whose 2018 reelection is considered fraudulent by the United States, among others - has said that Venezuela has the world's most transparent electoral system and has warned of a "bloodbath" if

The comments drew condemnation from leaders including Brazil's Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva, who said: "Maduro has to learn: if you win, you stay. If you lose, you

Concerns were further stoked when Caracas blocked international observers at the last minute, including four Latin American ex-presidents who had their plane held up in Panama on Friday.

Observers from the European Union had their invitation withdrawn weeks ago by authorities that have allowed a small delegation from the US-based Carter Centre.

Reuters journalists located in seven locations around the country reported lines outside polling stations, including some that opened late or where voting was mov-

Many voters had arrived before dawn. "It's really delayed," said voter Jonathan Pernia, 35, in San Cristobal, near Venezuela's western border with Colombia, who said he arrived at the polling station at 3.30am. "But we must not give up, it's

our chance." Polls close at 6pm local time (2200 GMT), and results could be published later in the evening or in the following days.

Maduro's government has presided over an economic collapse, the migration

of about a third of the population, and a sharp deterioration in diplomatic relations, crowned by sanctions imposed by the United States, the European Union and others which have crippled an already struggling oil industry.

Maduro has said he will guarantee peace and economic growth, making Venezuela less dependent on oil income.

The minimum wage is equivalent to \$3.50 per month, while basic food for a family of five is estimated to cost about \$500. Many people receive government food baskets or remittances from relatives abroad.

Dozens of voters cast ballots at the Venezuelan consulate in the Spanish island of Tenerife, with others gathered outside waving flags and cheering.

Several voters said they had been registered at the consulate for many years.

Migrants around the world have reported difficulties registering and only a small percentage of the diaspora is expected to be able to vote.

Maduro voted early in the morning in Caracas and said the result announced by the National Electoral Council will be recognised and defended by the armed forces

After casting his ballot vesterday, the

president insisted he was the only Venezuelan politician being "persecuted" - by the "world powers, by Goliath".

Maduro said he will decree a national dialogue today, using a term that typically means conversations between the government and opposition, businesses, communities and others.

Many Maduro supporters speak enthusiastically of his late mentor, long-time socialist President Hugo Chavez, and see Maduro, in power since Chavez's death in 2013, as a continuation of Chavez's legacy of helping the poor.

Others have told Reuters that they saw Maduro's record as mixed but that they would back him.

"There are things that without doubt need to improve in our country, but this government has lived through sanctions and blockades like no other. That's why I back President Maduro and think he deserves another chance," said Jose Lopez, 57, as he waited to vote in central Valencia.

Gonzalez and Machado, who have promised major changes and said a fresh start may motivate migrants to return, have urged people to hold vigils at polling

They have said they expect the military to uphold the results of the vote.

Gonzalez voted around noon in Caracas, and Machado was expected to cast her ballot in the Caricuao district of the capital. The opposition campaign posted videos of her greeting supporters and taking photos as she was transported on the back of a motorcycle.

Venezuela's military has always supported Maduro, a 61-year-old former bus driver, and there have been no public signs that leaders of the armed forces are breaking from the government.

Twenty-two people have been arrested since Friday "in the context of the electoral process", Gonzalo Himiob, the vicepresident of human rights organisation Foro Penal, said on X, adding that at least 15 remain detained.

Venezuela's attorney-general this week denied participating in political persecu-

Public spending has grown only slightly during the campaign, analysts say, a change from past campaigns when spending was generous.

Maduro says he has opened 70 public works projects during the last several months, but many have been renovations of already existing schools, hospitals and roads, according to events broadcast on state television.

Yellen savs \$3tn needed annually for climate financing

S Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen said on Saturday that the global transition to a low-carbon economy requires \$3tn in new capital each year through 2050, far above current annual financing, but that filling the gap is the biggest economic opportunity of the 21st century.

Yellen said in Belem, Brazil's Amazon gateway city, that reaching net-zero emissions goals remained a top priority for the Biden-Harris administration and this would require leadership far beyond US borders.

"Neglecting to address climate change and the loss of nature and biodiversity is not just bad environmental policy. It is bad economic policy," Yellen said in a speech after attending a G20 finance leaders meeting on Thursday and Friday in Rio de Janeiro.

Wealthy economies provided and mobilised a record \$116bn for climate finance for developing countries in 2022, 40% of which came from multilateral development banks (MDBs).

Yellen said the banks, including the World Bank and the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB), are setting new targets.

The financing need is "the single-greatest economic opportunity of the 21st century" and can be leveraged to support sustainable and more inclusive growth, including for investment-starved countries, she said.

While in Belem, Yellen met with finance ministers from Amazon basin countries and IDB President Ilan Goldfajn.

She reaffirmed the US commitment to the bank's Amazonia Forever platform, which provides a holistic approach to sustainable development in the region through financing, project preparation and collaboration.

"We are hopeful that this programme will incentivise greater private-sector investment in the region that supports nature," she

Yellen called on MDBs nearly two years ago to expand their missions and lending capacity to include fighting climate change.

She said this was "now in their DNA", but massive private investment was needed, and the Treasury, Brazil's finance ministry and other stakeholders were working to boost engagement with the private sector.

She said the banks should also catalyse new business models to mobilise investments that support nature and biodiversity while strengthening economies and advancing climate transitions.

Earlier on Saturday, Yellen launched a new initiative with Amazon basin countries Brazil. Colombia, Ecuador, Guyana, Peru, and Suriname to combat nature crimes, such as illegal logging and harvesting of wildlife and minerals, that are threatening biodiversity and the Amazon ecosystem. - Reuters

The panel was flooded with hooded figures concealed by masks that resembled the iconic comic book villain known for his skills in both sorcery and science when Downey Jr revealed himself.

The actor launched the entire MCU with 2008's Iron Man.

"New mask. Same task. What'd I tell you? I like playing complicated characters," said Downey Jr.

Marvel fans have complained in recent years about over-complicated plotlines and the departure of beloved characters, including Downey Jr's Iron Man, with some calling for a wholesale reboot of the movies.

The franchise was also rocked by domes-

tic violence revelations about actor Jonathan Majors, who had originally been set to become the major new supervillain across multiple films.

Majors, who was convicted for assaulting and harassing his then-girlfriend, was dropped by Marvel. The answer to who will fill that role was

seemingly answered by Downey Jr's return as Downey Jr won an Oscar this year for his

role in Christopher Nolan's Oppenheimer, and had seemingly retired from the Marvel The Russo Brothers, who are returning to direct both Avengers: Doomsday and Avengers: Secret Wars, believe that while Downey Jr

has a "new mask, he, the rest of the Marvel team, and everyone else has the "same task" of helping to "create the greatest possible experience" at the movie theatre. Another major villain joining the Marvel

Cinematic Universe (MCU) is cosmic entity called Galactus, which will be the antagonist of The Fantastic Four: First Steps, and directed by WandaVision director Matt Shakman.

The panel had plenty more showstopping moments, as it began with a boisterous "Deadpool choir", inspired by the recent film Deadpool & Wolverine.

Different iterations of the silly red-costumed character named "Deadpool" danced around the Hall H floor, walking amidst the seated attendees as the film's anthem Like a Prayer by Madonna played.

US to announce military command structure revamp in Japan

The US will unveil a major revamp of its military command structure in Iapan and other measures to deepen defence ties with its Asian ally at high-level security talks in Tokyo, a US official said.

The overhaul comes as Tokyo looks to establish a new joint headquarters to oversee its armed forces by March to co-ordinate better with Washington on growing regional threats they see emanating from China and North Korea.

US Secretary of State Antony Blinken and Secretary of Defence Lloyd Austin will hold talks with Japanese counterparts Yoko Kamikawa and Minoru Kihara. Austin and Kihara also met their South

Korean counterpart, Shin Won-sik earlier. 'Secretary Austin plans to announce that the United States intends to reconstitute US Forces Japan as a Joint Force Headquarters, reporting to the commander of US IN-

DOPACOM," the US official told a briefing ahead of the talks.

Japan provides a base for the US to project its military power in Asia, hosting 54,000 American troops, hundreds of US aircraft and Washington's only forward-deployed aircraft carrier strike group. - Reuters

California fire rapidly reaches state's top 10 biggest ever

fire raging out of control in northern California has rapidly become among the biggest ever in the western US state, authorities said.

The so-called Park Fire burned more than 350,000 acres (142,000 hectares) as of Saturday evening, making it the seventh-largest ever recorded in California history, the state agency Cal Fire said.

The fire, which prompted orders for more than 4,000 people to flee their homes, was burning through a largely rural, mountainous area near the city of Chico, about 90 miles (145km) north of state capital Sacramento.

"Extreme fire conditions continue to challenge firefighters," Cal Fire said in a post on X.

The fire was just 10% controlled, despite the efforts of more than 3,700 personnel with over a dozen helicopters and several planes, according to an agency "Numerous firefighting air

tankers from throughout the State are flying fire suppression missions as conditions allow," it said. "Lower temperatures and high-

humidity have reduced fire activity," the agency said, while adding that fire was still spreading. US President Joe Biden has been

briefed on the fire and has directed his team to do everything possible to support efforts to fight it, a White House official said. The Park Fire started on Wednesday near Chico, in Butte

devastated a wide area there and in neighbouring Tehama County. Cal Fire's latest update said 20 structures were confirmed destroyed by the fire, lowering an

County, and within hours had

earlier estimate of 134. The agency said the numbers were expected to fluctuate as officials assess the damage on the ground.

The blaze has generated an enormous column of dense gray smoke which has also been blown over nearby states.

On Thursday, police detained a 42-year-old male on suspicion of having started the fire by pushing a burning car into a ravine.

Chico is only about 15 miles from Paradise, a city devastated by a 2018 fire that ranked as California's most deadly ever, claiming 85 lives.

The explosive growth of the

Park Fire has again placed Paradise under evacuation warning, unleashing painful memories for its residents. Ava Elsner, who lived through

the 2018 fire, told CNN that she worries about her neighbours as the Park Fire blazes. "I don't want anyone else to

experience this. It's the most traumatising, terrifying, and saddening thing to have a whole community go up in flames," she told the broadcaster. Experts say climate change,

accelerated by human action, is leading to more extreme weather The Park fire was the largest of

dozens of active blazes across the country that have burned more than 2mn acres, according to the National Interagency Fire Centre. In Oregon, the Durkee Fire,

which started earlier this month, has consumed nearly 290,000 acres and was about 50% contained, the state's wildfire response and recovery agency said.

Myanmar ethnic armed group moves into key town

against the military. On Thursday the MNDAA claimed it had captured the town of around 150,000 people and the

On Saturday the United Wa State Army (UWSA) - another ethnic minority armed group with greater manpower - moved personnel into Lashio to "protect" its properties there, its spokesman

going to intervene, cooperate nor give support to the groups which are fighting," he said.

He did not say how many UWSA fighters were now in the town, or how long they would stay. The military had "been informed in advance" about the move, the junta's information team said in a statement, without giving details.

US, Japan take a swipe at China and deepen defence ties

he US and Japan issued scathing verbal attacks on China and Russia yesterday after high-level discussions on enhancing already close defence collaboration between Tokyo and Washington in an increasingly unstable region.

A joint statement issued after "2+2" talks in Tokyo between US Secretary of State Antony Blinken, Defence Secretary Lloyd Austin and their Japanese counterparts said China's "foreign policy seeks to reshape the international order for its own benefit at the expense of oth-

They also reiterated their "strong objections" to China's "unlawful maritime claims, militarisation of reclaimed features, and threatening and provocative activities in the South China Sea".

The communique also criticised Russia's "growing and provocative strategic military co-operation" with China, as well as Moscow's procurement of ballistic missiles and other materiel from North Korea "for use against Ukraine". It also expressed alarm at China's "ongoing and rapid expansion of its nuclear weapons arsenal".

Blinken said US alliances were all "defensive in nature".

"They have no ambitions toward anyone else, and never have been or ever will be offensive in nature," he

told a news conference. "But at a time when unfortunately these threats are increasing, our alliances, our partnerships, they're getting deeper, they're getting stronger, they're getting more effective," he

Japanese Foreign Minister Yoko Kamikawa said: "We are at an his-

Philippines delays recovery of oil from sunken tanker

The Philippines yesterday postponed the removal of fuel from a tanker that sank in Manila Bay, with fears of an environmental catastrophe growing as leaking oil reached shore for the first time.

The siphoning of the 1.4mn litres of industrial fuel oil from the vessel's hold was pushed back to tomorrow at the earliest so divers could seal nine leaking valves first, Philippine Coast Guard spokesman Rear Admiral Armando Balilo told reporters. The tanker sank in bad weath-

er off Manila early Thursday, killing one crew member and leaving the Philippines facing the possibility of its worst oil spill ever. "An order was given to seal the

valves first before the start of the

siphoning operations in order to prevent further leakages," Balilo said vesterday. "The weather remains bad out

there but they have a target to finish this (sealing the valves) by

Balilo later said the coast guard had found "small patches" of oil on the coast of the municipality of Bulakan, on the bay's north shore near Manila.

The contaminated shoreline was on the edge of a reclamation project for a future international airport, he said.

Balilo said the coast guard was also investigating a report by the environmental group Greenpeace that a "thick layer of oil" was coating the sea yesterday about 4kms off the coast of Hagonov municipality, near Bulakan. The coast guard has warned that it would be an "environmental catastrophe" if the entire cargo were to leak.

Central China landslide kills 15: state media

A landslide caused by flooding in central China's Hunan province destroyed a guesthouse and killed 15 people yesterday, state media reported. Officials initially believed that 18 people had been buried by the landslide but rescuers have since found 15 bodies and six injured survivors. the official Xinhua news agency said. The landslide was caused by flash flooding on a mountain, which destroyed the guesthouse, according to state broadcaster CCTV More than 300 emergency personnel were sent to the scene, according to Xinhua. A video published by the state-run Beijing Youth Daily showed a swathe of mud and debris cutting through a green hillside and an uprooted tree lying in front of a three-storey building. An aerial video on Xinhua showed what appeared to be the ruined bottom half of a building at the top of the debris trail, as well as damaged buildings at the foot

Australia prime minister Albanese rejigs cabinet

ustralian Prime Minister Anthony Albanese yesterday replaced the government ministers responsible for immigration and national security, overhauling the scandalplagued portfolios.

Australia's department of home affairs has been under pressure since it was forced to release more than 100 immigration detainees - many convicted of assault, kidnapping and murder - in the wake of a landmark court ruling. Albanese has sought to draw a line under the politically damaging saga, dumping home affairs minister Clare O'Neil and Immigration minister Andrew Giles and moving them into new portfolios.

Both roles were taken over by

veteran government problem solver Tony Burke.

Some of the detainees were charged with further crimes after they were released, stoking a barrage of bad publicity for the centre-left Labor government.

Officials scrambled to fit the cohort with ankle monitoring bracelets while imposing other strict conditions such as curfews.

Under the old policy, migrants could be detained indefinitely if Australia refused them a visa but could not legally deport them elsewhere - for example, if they faced the death penalty in their home country. With nowhere to go and no hope of release, many languished inside spartan Australian detention centres for years. But a high court ruling in November found this was "unlawful", overturning a 20-yearold bipartisan policy and forcing the release of almost 150 people.

Bangladesh students vow to resume protests unless leaders freed

Bangladeshi student group has vowed to resume protests that sparked a lethal police crackdown and nationwide unrest unless several of their leaders are released from custody.

Last week's violence killed at least 205 people, including several police officers, according to an AFP count of police and hospital data, in one of the biggest upheavals of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's 15year tenure.

Army patrols and a nationwide curfew remain in place more than a week after they were imposed, and a police dragnet has scooped up thousands of protesters including at least half a dozen student leaders.

Members of Students Against Discrimination, whose campaign against civil service job quotas precipitated the unrest, said they would end their week-long protest moratorium.

The group's chief Nahid Islam and others "should be freed and the cases against them must be withdrawn", Abdul Hannan Masud told

reporters in an online briefing.

Masud, who did not disclose his location because he was hiding from authorities, also demanded "visible actions" be taken against government ministers and police officers responsible for the deaths of protesters.

"Otherwise, Students Against Discrimination will be forced to launch tough protests" from today, he said. Islam and two other senior members of the protest group were forcibly discharged from hospital in the capital Dhaka on Friday and taken away by a group of plainclothes detectives. He said last week he was being treated at the hospital for injuries police inflicted on him during an earlier round of detention and said he was in fear for his life.

"I haven't seen him since he was picked up," Islam's mother Momotaz Nahar told reporters outside the national detective agency after unsuccessfully asking officers to allow a visit with him.

"We are worried about his life," she said. "I want my son back."

Home Minister Asaduzzaman Khan has said the trio were taken into custody for their own safety but did not confirm if they had been formally arrested.

At least 9,000 people have been arrested nationwide since the unrest began, according to Prothom Alo, Bangladesh's largest daily newspaper. Khan said 147 people had been killed in clashes so far in the government's first toll, published a day after Students Against Discrimination gave its own preliminary count of 266. Khan told reporters yesterday the police had operated with restraint and only fired on demonstrators to protect government buildings.

A curfew imposed last weekend remains in force but it has been progressively eased through the week, a sign of the Hasina government's confidence that order was gradually being restored. One small street rally held in Dhaka yesterday to demand Hasina's resignation was quickly dispersed by police.

Bangladesh's mobile internet network was restored vesterday afternoon, 11 days after a nationwide blackout imposed at the height

of the unrest. Fixed line broadband connections were restored on Tuesday but the vast majority of Bangladesh internet users rely on mobile devices to connect with the

Protests began this month over the reintroduction of a quota scheme reserving more than half of all government jobs for certain With around 18mn young Bang-

ladeshis out of work, according to government figures, the move deeply upset graduates facing an acute employment crisis.

Critics say the quota is used to stack public jobs with loyalists to the ruling Awami League.

India links of US poll contenders may spell little fizz for ties: experts

The Indian links of some US presidential election contenders probably mean little additional benefit for ties, experts said, against the backdrop of bipartisan support for closer rela-

tions with the South Asian nation to counter an assertive China.

Democratic Vice-President Kamala Harris and Usha Chilukuri Vance, the wife of Republican Donald Trump's running-mate, have rarely visited the birthplace of one or both of their parents, although Indians take pride in their success.

"Either way, from India's per-

spective, whether it is Republican or Democrat, that relationship enjoys bipartisan support and should not be affected," said Harsh Vardhan Shringla, a former Indian ambassador to the US. "It can only benefit," he said of the India links, adding: "(It) cannot be affected adversely."

Since ties with New Delhi are viewed favourably by both parties

in Washington, there will be little impact on relations, regardless of which party wins, or the candidate's Indian roots, an Indian government official said on condition of anonymity

Both President Joe Biden and Trump, his predecessor in office, sought to woo India, not just to challenge China in the region, but also to wean New Delhi from a traditional dependence on Russian weapons. Both Harris and Usha Vance, the wife of Republican vice-presidential candidate, J D Vance have links to southern India.

Vance belongs to a family of renowned academics. Harris, who has garnered the backing of enough delegates to secure the Democratic nomination, is viewed as role model in her mother's ancestral village of Thulasendrapuram. She has "proven how young women, previously confined to their homes, can reach such heights, becoming a public figure in the world's No1 country," said J Sudhakar, a resident of the village where here.

India will not sign global tax deal 'until concerns are addressed'

India will not sign a global corporate tax deal focused on highly profitable multinational firms unless its concerns on dispute resolution and the treatment of withholding tax are addressed, a finance ministry official said.

The so-called "Pillar 1" arrangement, part of a 2021 global two-part tax deal, aims to replace unilateral digital services taxes (DSTs) via a new mechanism to share taxing rights on multinational companies, such as US tech giants Alphabet's Google and Amazon and Apple.

India is "constructively engaging" with all the countries for the successful conclusion of "Pillar 1", and was hopeful the deal would be finalised soon, revenue secretary Sanjay Malhotra, one of the top finance ministry officials, said. "However, it cannot be at the cost of our own interests."

US Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen in May accused the Indian government of refusing to engage on issues important to US interests, noting that negotiations were stuck.

Among other issues, India does not want any tax-related disputes to be subject to international arbitration.

As a conciliatory measure, India proposed to remove a 2% equalisation duty on digital service providers that would cost the Indian government about Rs25bn (\$300mn) annually.

Talks over a global tax deal are continuing well past a June 30 deadline and governments are now looking to a Group of 20 finance leaders' meeting in Brazil for progress.

The stakes are high. A failure to reach agreement on final terms could prompt several countries to reinstate their taxes on US tech giants and risk punitive duties on billions of dollars in exports to the US.

Many countries are already implementing Pillar 2, which sets a global minimum tax of 15% on multinationals, although it has not be ratified by the US.

Britain 'broke and broken', new government declares

Britain's government declared the country was "broke and broken" ahead of an assessment of the public finances on Monday which the newly-elected Labour Party will use to blame their predecessors for a £20bn (\$26bn) shortfall.

Elected to run the world's sixth largest economy in a landslide victory on July 4, Labour has spent much of its first three weeks in power telling the public that things are worse than expected in almost every area of public policy.

Finance Minister Rachel Reeves will set out the findings of a fiscal review in a statement to parliament that will accuse the Conservative Party - which led the country for the previous 14 years - of making unfunded spending commitments to try to win public support.

"The assessment will show that Britain is broke and broken - revealing the mess that populist politics has made of the economy and public services," a statement issued by Prime Minister Keir Starmer's office said.

"It will show that the previous government made significant funding commitments for this financial year without knowing where the money would come from"

The Conservatives have dismissed Labour's widely-previewed announcement of a 'black hole' in the public finances as a fabricated pretext for tax rises it did not disclose during the election campaign. Some economists were also sceptical, saying there were few big surprises Labour could not have foreseen before taking office. Reeves will also reveal the date for her first budget, commission the independent forecasts that will be published alongside that

budget, and set out plans for the formal spending review process that decides how much money each department gets.

She is also expected to agree to above-inflation pay awards for teachers and health workers. It is unclear how Labour will address the shortfall it identifies. Reeves is hemmed in by election promises not to raise rates of income tax, National Insurance social security payments, value-added tax and corporation tax.

Media reports have mooted that Reeves would use today's statement to pave the way for other tax rises at the subsequent budget. The Financial Times said she would delay some road and hospital building projects.

The government statement did not set out any measures, but senior Labour minister Pat McFadden said: "We will not shy away from being honest with the public about the reality of what we have inherited."

RBI fines Visa for unauthorised payment method

The Reserve Bank of India imposed a penalty of Rs24.1mn (nearly \$288,000) on Visa in relation to its usage of an unauthorised payment transfer method, the central bank said. "It was observed that the entity (Visa) had implemented a payment authentication solution without regulatory clearance from RBI," the central bank said in a statement.

"We duly acknowledge the Reserve Bank of India order and remain committed to following RBI guidelines and regulations to continue providing safe and secure payment solutions in India," a Visa spokesperson said. In February, the RBI had ordered the credit card company to stop using an unauthorised route to make some commercial payments, per a Reuters report. The central bank has aimed to tighten scrutiny of the processes followed by financial technology, or fintech, companies.

India set to decide soon on sugar selling price

India will make a decision on sugar industry calls for a hike in the minimum selling price (MSP) in the coming days, a senior government official said, adding that ethanol policies would be set before the start of the next season.

India, the world's largest sugar consumer, restricted the use of sugar in ethanol production during the 2023-24 marketing year that ends on September 30 and also prohibited exports to keep a lid on domestic prices.

"We are discussing the MSP (proposal). In the coming days, we will hopefully take a call," food secretary Sanjeev Chopra told reporters during a conference.

The sugar-processing industry has been demanding an increase in the minimum selling price, saying the government has raised the mandatory procurement price of sugarcane in recent years while the MSP has remained unchanged since 2019.

Industry bodies say a higher MSP would enable them to make timely payments to millions of sugarcane farmers in the upcoming season starting on October 1.

Chopra said the production outlook for the next season has improved due to good monsoon rainfall and increased sugarcane acreage, allowing the government to formulate policies for the next year. The sugarcane area has edged up to 5.77mn hectares from 5.7mn hectares a year ago. "We should be having very healthy stocks at the end of the present sugar season, which would allow us to have better planning of its diversion in the next year," Chopra said, referring to sugar's use in ethanol production.

Supermarket loyalty pricing not misleading UK shoppers: regulator

The British competition regulator's ongoing review of supermarket loyalty prices is unlikely to identify widespread evidence of promotions that mislead shoppers, the watchdog said.

Loyalty schemes have proved hugely successful for the UK's biggest supermarkets, offering significantly lower prices for members. The vast majority of customers now use them and an increasing number of products are covered by them.

The Competition and Markets

Authority (CMA) launched a review in January to consider the impact on shoppers of the schemes used by supermarkets that offer cheaper prices only to loyalty card members. Market leader Tesco and No 2 Sainsbury's are among those who offer such schemes.

The watchdog considered whether there are pricing practices that indicate the non-loyalty, or non-member, price may have been artificially inflated to make the loyalty price appear misleadingly attractive.

It looked at what happens to prices before, during and after a product goes on a loyalty price

"Our analysis – involving tens of thousands of loyalty price promotions – is ongoing, but the results to date suggest we are unlikely to identify widespread evidence of loyalty promotions that mislead shoppers in this way," the CMA said.

But the regulator said it had seen examples of retailers alternating between so-called "was/now" promotions available to all shoppers and loyalty price promotions.

"This raises questions as to what the 'regular' price is for the product and therefore whether the claim saving for the 'was/now' promotion is genuine," the CMA said, adding that it was examining

the issue further and planned to publish a full report in November.

The British Retail Consortium, which represents the major supermarket groups, welcomed the CMA's update, saying grocers know they have to demonstrate value to retain customers.

Tesco, which has a 27.7% share of the UK grocery market, currently offers more than 8,000 Clubcard Prices deals each week. Sainsbury's, which has a 15.3% market share, has rolled out Nectar Prices to about 7,000 products.

Separately, the CMA said competition in UK grocery appears to be effective in bearing down on profit margins, with the average

operating margin for supermarket groups less than 3% in 2023-24.

However, it added that UK drivers were still paying too much for road fuel, with increases in retail fuel margins costing them over

£1.6bn (\$2.1bn) in 2023.

The Competition and Markets Authority (CMA) said its analysis showed the cost to drivers of weakened competition in the fuel sector persisted, and that margins were "still significantly above historic levels."

It said supermarkets' fuel margins were roughly double their 2019 level.

The report echoes the findings of a 2023 CMA review, which

proposed reforms to help boost competition in the sector by giving consumers more information about pricing.

"One year on and drivers are still paying too much. We want to work with government to put in place our recommendation of a real-time fuel finder scheme to kickstart competition among retailers," CMA chief executive Sarah Cardell said in a statement.

The watchdog compiled its analysis using a voluntary pricesharing system, which it said covered only 40% of fuel retail sites and was not yet comprehensive enough to properly help consumers and impact competition.

What Democrats can learn from science of co-operation

In a fitting finale to one of the most upstanding and progressive political careers in modern American history, US President Joe Biden, once again, did the right thing. By deferring to his party's preference that he drop out of the presidential race, he has provided a model of selflessness and decency not only for all Americans, but for democratically minded people around the

Still, the struggle within the Democratic Party over the past month has been unsettling, exposing divisions that could still put the party's prospects - and America's future - in peril. The drama began with Biden's wobbly performance in the debate against the Republican presidential nominee, Donald Trump, on June 27. In the weeks that followed, Democratic Party "elders" (including Nancy Pelosi, Barack Obama, and Chuck Schumer), as well as the editorial boards of major newspapers (the New York Times and the Washington Post most prominently) and leading celebrity fundraisers (George Clooney) called for Biden to step down.

They questioned Biden's cognitive capacities, even as others - including Bernie Sanders, a former rival, and Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, a major star of the left - remained loyal to him. After three weeks of displaying the tenacity that has marked his half-century in politics, Biden threw in the towel.

But the story is not over. Biden has endorsed Vice-President Kamala Harris, as have Bill and Hillary Clinton and other high-profile Democrats, and Harris responded by signalling her intention to "earn and win" the nomination. But others, Obama for one, refrained from immediately endorsing her, perhaps heeding those who called for a competitive open process or some type of "mini-primary." Nonetheless, as of July 23, Harris had secured enough Democratic Party delegates to clinch the nomination.

While the Democrats were airing their dirty laundry in public to convince Biden to step aside, the Republicans put on an ostentatious display of unity at the Republican National Convention in Milwaukee. Trump, strengthened by a wave of sympathy following the attempt on his life, formally accepted

his party's nomination. His choice of running mate is the unabashedly sycophantic junior senator from Ohio, JD Vance, the author of a bestselling memoir about the plight of the white working class Appalachia.

Notably, former Trump challengers such as Nikki Haley and Ron DeSantis offered their unqualified support, while the former pro wrestler Hulk Hogan ripped open his shirt for an audience of delegates wearing ear bandages in solidarity with Trump. Republican politicians seemed ready to sit back and

enjoy the show playing out within the Democratic Party. The Democrats' self-questioning, critical spirit may seem laudable compared to the cultish, chilling vision of a Republican Party that now exists to serve a convicted felon. But 100-odd days before one of the most consequential elections in history is no time for bickering in public. To keep

things together between now and Election Day, the Democrats should heed

lessons from the science of co-operation. According to group selection theory, "multi-level selection" is the key factor driving evolution in social animals like ourselves. Societies that have achieved uniquely rapid rates of progress have done so not because they embraced competition between individuals or a "survival of the fittest" mindset, but because they fostered co-operation within groups. Call it survival of the friendliest. The takeaway for the Democrats is that the individual candidate

they field may matter less than their ability to coalesce around that person.

Despite its incessant preaching about individualistic values, the right has often practiced this form of collectivism better than the left. Neoliberalism's capture of economic theory and policymaking from the 1980s to 2008. for example, owed much to Milton Friedman's brother-in-law, Aaron Director, who showed relentless zeal in consolidating the Chicago School of Economics into a highly cohesive, unified intellectual paradigm. Equally, the gains made by left-of-centre parties in elections this year - whether in India or France – were products of strong coalitions, whereas the $\operatorname{British}$ right lost because it had fragmented into warring factions, both within the Conservatives and between them and Reform UK.

If Democrats are serious about averting the catastrophe of another Trump presidency, they will remember that any remaining uncertainty or ongoing infighting is their biggest enemy. Internal ambivalence about the 2016 Democratic nominee, Hillary Clinton, may have helped pave the path for Trump's first term. That same Democratic dithering and self-doubt could put him in the White House again.

Science offers a clear lesson for the course that Democrats must chart in the run-up to their convention and beyond. If they fail to co-operate in mobilising voters and reaching out to independents in key states, they will lose. - Project Syndicate





River Seine fails first Olympics test as pollution hits training

The River Seine failed its first Olympic test on Saturday as a training session for triathletes was scrapped after the water failed pollution checks.

A statement from Paris 2024 organisers and World Triathlon said "a joint decision was taken to cancel the swim leg of the triathlon familiarisation" but that running and bike training sessions would "go ahead as planned."

The quality of the Seine — which is set to be used for triathlon and marathon swimming - is dependent on the amount of rain that falls in and around Paris.

Heavy downpours of the sort seen on Friday during the sodden opening ceremony of the Games overwhelm the city's sewage system, leading to discharges of untreated effluent into the waterway.

"We're not particularly worried," chief organiser Tony Estanguet told reporters during a trip to an equestrian event at the Versailles Palace yesterday. "We're vigilant as we have been since the

Organisers 'sorry' for any offence over Olympic opening ceremony

Paris Olympics organisers said yesterday they were "really sorry" if any offence was caused by their quirky opening ceremony while denying any intention to "disrespect" religion after complaints from French bishops

Some Catholic groups and French bishops have condemned what they saw as "scenes of derision and mockery of Christianity" in the parade on Friday choreographed by theatre director Thomas Jolly. Catholics and other Christian groups have been angered by a tableau in the opening ceremony that appeared to parody Leonardo da Vinci's 'The Last Supper' painting.

"Clearly there was never an intention to show disrespect to any religious group," Paris 2024 spokeswoman Anne Descamps told

"If people have taken any offence, we are of course really, really sorry," she added.

Jolly, 42, denied taking inspiration from the Last Supper in his nearly four-hour production, which took place in driving rain along the River

"The idea was to do a big pagan party linked to the gods of Olympus," Jolly told the BFM channel.

"You'll never find in my work any desire to mock or denigrate anyone. I wanted a ceremony that brings people together, that reconciles, but also a ceremony that affirms our Republican values of liberty, equality and fraternity," he added.

In one of the other striking moments of the ceremony, a woman holding a bloodied severed head and intended to be executed French queen Marie-Antoinette appeared in a window of the Conciergerie, a building where she was imprisoned after the 1789 French Revolution. She was later guillotined along with her husband Louis XVI. "Certainly we were not glorifying this instrument of death which is the

quillotine," Jolly added. Reactions were mixed towards the unprecedented ceremony, the first time a Summer Olympics has opened outside of the main athletics

French President Emmanuel Macron said Saturday that the ceremony had "made our compatriots extremely proud". A spokesman for France's far-right National Rally party, Julien Odoul,

called the ceremony "a ransacking of French culture". Around 300,000 spectators watched from the river banks, often at a cost of hundreds, sometimes thousands, of euros.

Putin warns US to be ready for the consequences if it deploys missiles

Russian president threatens to restart the production of mid-range nuclear weapons

ussian President Vladimir Putin yesterday threatened to relaunch production of intermediate-range nuclear weapons if the United States confirmed its intention to deploy missiles to Germany or elsewhere in Europe.

The United States said on July 10 that it would start deploying longrange missiles in Germany from 2026 in preparation for a longerterm deployment that will include SM-6, Tomahawk cruise missiles and developmental hypersonic weapons.

In a speech to sailors from Russia, China, Algeria and India to mark Russian navy day in the former imperial capital of St Petersburg, Putin warned the United States that it risked triggering a Cold War-style missile crisis with the move.

"The flight time to targets on our territory of such missiles, which in the future may be equipped with nuclear warheads, will be about 10 minutes," Putin said.

"If the United States carries out such plans, we will consider ourselves liberated from the unilateral moratorium previously adopted on the deployment of mediumand short-range strike capabilities." Putin said, adding that now in Russia "the development of a number of such systems is in the final stages".

"We will take mirror measures in deploying them, taking into account the actions of the US, its satellites in Europe and in other regions of the world," the Russian president warned.

Such missiles, which can travel between 500 and 5,500km, were the subject of an arms control treaty signed by the US and the Soviet Union in 1987.

Putin said that the United States was stoking tensions and had transferred Typhon missile systems to Denmark and the Philippines, and compared the US plans to the Nato decision to deploy Pershing II launchers in Western Europe in 1979.

The Soviet leadership, including General Secretary Yuri Andropov, feared Pershing II deployments were part of an elaborate US-led plan to decapitate the Soviet Union by taking out its political and mili-

tary leadership. "This situation is reminiscent of

Cuban Missile Crisis, and both the events of the Cold War related brought similar missiles to Europe Moscow and Washington have to the deployment of American and Asia. medium-range Pershing missiles in Europe," Putin said.

> The Pershing II, designed to deliver a variable yield nuclear warhead, was deployed to West Germany in 1983.

In 1983, the ailing Andropov and the KGB interpreted a series of US moves including the Pershing II deployment and a major Nato exercise as signs the West was about to launch a pre-emptive strike on the Soviet Union.

Putin repeated an earlier warning that Russia could resume production of intermediate and shorter range nuclear-capable missiles and then consider where to deploy them after the United States

US missiles continued to be sta tioned through the reunification of Germany and into the 1990s.

But following the end of the Cold War, the United States significantly reduced the numbers of missiles stationed in Europe as the threat from Moscow receded.

The Kremlin had already warned in mid July that the proposed US deployment would mean that European capitals would become a target for Russian missiles.

"We are taking steady steps towards the Cold War. All the attributes of the Cold War with the direct confrontation are returning," Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told a state TV reporter.

35 killed as Pak tribal feud sparks sectarian fighting

A land feud between tribes in northwestern Pakistan has spilled over into days of sectarian fighting with machine guns and mortars, killing 35 people so far, officials said vesterday. The Muslim Madagi and Mali Khel tribes have been fighting since Wednesday, when a gunman opened fire at a council negotiating a decades-long dispute over farmland, local police official Murtaza Hussain said. While no-one was wounded in that attack, Hussain said it reignited longstanding religious tensions between the clans who live side-by-side in the district of Kurram on the border with Afghanistan, "Initially a land dispute, the issue has now escalated into sectarian violence," Hussain told AFP, confirming the conflict "claimed 35 lives" so far. "The government and local leaders are attempting to halt the fighting through jirgas (tribal councils), but have not yet succeeded," he said. Inter-family feuds are common in Pakistan. However, they can be particularly protracted and violent in the mountainous northwestern region of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, where communities abide by traditional tribal honour codes.

Meloni vows to 'relaunch' China ties

talian Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni vowed vesterday to "relaunch" co-operation with China, signing a three-year action plan during her first official visit to Beijing since taking office.

Meloni, who has led a right-wing government since 2022, made the announcement during a meeting with Chinese Premier Li Qiang, as Rome seeks to improve trade ties with Beijing after it exited President Xi Jinping's flagship Belt and Road infrastructure investment scheme last vear.

The Italian leader said her fiveday trip was a "demonstration of the will to begin a new phase, to relaunch our bilateral co-operation". The action plan aims to experiment with new forms of co-operation, she added.

Later in the day Meloni said that an industrial co-operation memorandum signed by Italy and China includes strategic industrial sectors such as electric mobility and renewables.

Li Quiang pointed to "mutually beneficial co-operation between small and medium-sized enterprises in the fields of shipbuilding, aerospace, new energy, artificial intelligence," in a statement released by his office.

Meloni, who sees Chinese investment as a way to spur Italy's anaemic economic growth, will meet Xi and China's top legislator, Zhao Leji, third in the leadership

Yesterday, Meloni also attended an Italy-China business forum, to which companies including Italian tyre-maker Pirelli, energy group ENI, defence group Leonardo, wine producers and several Italian luxury fashion groups such as Dolce & Gabbana were invited.

The forum gives "another signal of the mutual interest ... (to) balance more our interests, our commercial exchange," she said. Meloni is expected to raise Chinese overcapacity with Chinese officials, as well as Chinese economic support for Russia in its war with Ukraine. "China and Italy should adopt

a win-win mentality and increase trade and investment co-operation, making cooperation even more dynamic and sustainable," said Li at the opening of the forum, according to a video shared by Meloni's office.

In 2019, Italy became the only Group of Seven country to join the massive Belt and Road Initiative but withdrew last year under US pressure over concerns about Beijing's economic reach.

Meloni's government said the deal had brought no benefits to Italy, whose trade with China – worth €66.8bn (\$80bn) in 2023 - is heavily tilted in Beijing's favour. China is Italy's biggest non-EU trading partner after the US.

2 Japanese climbers fall from Pakistan's 'Savage Mountain'

Two elite Japanese mountain climbers fell from Pakistan's K2, officials said yesterday following an attempt at a helicopter rescue that spotted the motionless pair but was forced to turn back. Veteran mountaineers Kazuva Hiraide and Kenro Nakaiima were attempting an ascent of the jagged western face of the world's second highest mountain, using an expert climbing style prioritising speed and relying on minimal fixed ropes. But on Saturday "they fell from a height of 7,500 metres (24,600 $\,$

feet)", Alpine Club of Pakistan (ACP) Secretary Karrar Haidri said in a statement.

"A helicopter rescue was attempted, however the heli could not land," said Wali Ullah Falahi, the deputy commissioner for Shigar district, which encompasses the 8,611-metre K2.

"Upon close inspection, the bodies of the two climbers were spotted, and it was determined that there was no movement. The heli then turned back," he told AFP. No organisation, as yet, has confirmed the pair are dead.

Ishii Sports – a Japanese outdoor goods brand sponsoring the pair – said the high altitude and steep slope forced the helicopter to abort its landing. "The pilot said the two men can be seen, but their status was unclear," the firm said in a statement. "We are currently reviewing how we will rescue them."

Rescue attempts are extremely risky on K2, even on the southeastern ridge, which is the most common route climbers take to the top. The western face is a more vertical and exposed rock face, and has only been successfully scaled once before by a Russian team in 2007.

The ACP said Hiraide and Nakajima had both won multiple Piolets d'Or awards – described as "the Oscars of climbing" – for their feats of sportsmanship.

They "meticulously planned and trained for their K2 expedition, underscoring their dedication to pushing the boundaries of highaltitude mountaineering", the ACP said.

During this summer climbing season three other Japanese climbers have died in Pakistan — all on the 7,027-metre Spantik mountain, which is also in the Gilgit Baltistan region.

Pakistan is home to five of the world's 14 mountains above 8,000 metres, including K2 which is considered a more difficult ascent than Everest, earning it the nickname "Savage Mountain".


