

Hamas chief Haniyeh assassinated in Tehran

alestinian resistance movement Hamas leader Ismail Haniyeh was assassinated in the Iranian capital Tehran early yesterday, an attack that drew threats of revenge on Israel and fuelled further concern that the conflict in Gaza was turning into a wider Middle East war.

The Palestinian group and Iran's Revolutionary Guards confirmed Haniyeh's death. The Guards said it took place hours after he attended a swearing-in ceremony for Iran's new president.

Although the strike on Haniyeh was widely assumed to have been carried out by Israel, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's government made no claim of responsibility and said it would make no comment on the kill-

Haniyeh was killed by a missile that hit him "directly" in a state guesthouse where he was staying, Khalil al-Hayya, a senior Hamas official, told a news conference in

Haniyeh had been taking part in internationally-brokered indirect talks on reaching a ceasefire in Gaza.

The assassination occurred less than 24 hours after Israel claimed to have killed Hezbollah's most senior military commander in the Lebanese capital Beirut in retaliation for a deadly rocket strike in the Israeli-occupied Golan Heights.

The latest events appear to set back chances of any imminent ceasefire agreement in the nearly 10-month-old war in Gaza between Israel and Hamas.

Hamas' armed wing said in a statement Haniyeh's killing would "take the battle to new dimensions and have major repercussions". Vowing to retaliate, Iran declared three days of national mourning and said the US bore responsibility because of its support for Israel.

Iran's Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei said Israel had provided the grounds for "harsh punishment for itself" and it was Tehran's duty to avenge Haniyeh's death.

Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas condemned the killing and Palestinian factions in the Israeli-occupied West Bank called for a strike and mass demonstrations.

Three of Haniyeh's sons were killed in an Israeli airstrike in April.

Hezbollah commander killed in Israeli strike

Hezbollah vesterday mourned its top commander Fuad Shukr, whose body was recovered from the rubble of an Israeli strike in south Beirut, as fears mounted of a wider conflict. Shukr will be buried today and Hezbollah leader Hassan Nasrallah will speak at his funeral to outline the Iran-backed movement's position, the group said in a statement. Tuesday's raid on the Beirut suburb, an overcrowded residential area that is a Hezbollah bastion, also killed five civilians - three women and two children - and injured dozens, according to Lebanon's health ministry.

Qatar condemns Haniyeh's killing, calls it a heinous crime

atar strongly condemned the assassination of the Head of the Political Bureau of the Farestinian Islamic Resistance Movement (Hamas) Ismail Haniyeh in the Iranian capital, Tehran, considering it a heinous crime, a dangerous escalation, and a flagrant violation of international and humanitarian law.

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs stressed in a statement yesterday that the assassination and reckless targeting of civilians will lead the

region into chaos and undermine the chances of peace.

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs reiterated Qatar's firm stance against violence, terrorism and criminal acts, including political assassinations, regardless of the motives and reasons.

The ministry expressed the condolences of the State of Qatar, its leadership and people, to the family of the Head of the Political Bureau of Hamas and his personal companion, and the State of Palestine and its people. (ONA) Page 7

Gulf Times condemns killing of AJ journalists in Gaza; calls for world action against Israel



Gulf Times strongly condemns the targeted and brutal killing of Al Jazeera journalists Ismail al-Ghoul and Rami al-Rifi in Gaza yesterday.

These journalists were not combatants; they were dedicated media professionals risking their lives to uncover the genocide perpetrated by the Israeli occupation forces and report the truth from one of the most dangerous conflict zones in the world. Their deaths are a stark reminder of the extreme lengths to which the Israeli occupation forces are willing to go to suppress the free press and silence voices that bear witness to their sinister and dastardly massacres that have so far claimed more than 39,400 Palestinian lives, most of them women and children. This latest attack is not an isolated incident but part of a systematic campaign against journalists in Gaza, aimed at obstructing the flow of information and keeping the world in the dark about the

atrocities being committed against the hapless people of the Strip. Such deliberate targeting of media personnel is a gross violation of international law and an assault on the very principles of press freedom and human rights.

The killings of the family members of Al Jazeera Gaza Bureau Chief Wael al-Dahdouh and journalist Shireen Abu Akleh still haunt the conscience of the world's right-minded people. According to the report of a UN-mandated investigation, Israeli forces used "lethal force without justification" when they shot and killed Al Jazeera journalist Shireen Abu Akleh in the occupied West Bank, violating her "right to life". The international community must not stand idly by as these crimes continue unabated. The killing of journalists is not just an attack on individuals but an attack on the global right to information and truth.



Qatar Museums unveils Olympism: More Than a Dream Exhibition

s part of Qatar's contribution to Paris 2024, Qatar Museums (QM) and 3-2-1 Qatar Olympic and Sports Museum (QOSM) has opened Olympism: More Than a Dream Exhibition, recording 40 years of Qatar's participation in the Olympics since 1984. The exhibition will be on view until August 25 at Le Royal Monceau - Raffles Paris Hotel in Paris, France.

The event was attended by Qatar's ambassador to France Sheikh Ali bin Jassim al-Thani; Qatar Football Association president Jassim bin Rashid al-Buenain; Qatar Olympic Committee vicepresident and Olympic Council of Asia vice-president for West Asia Dr Thani bin Abdulrahman al-Kuwari; 3-2-1 QOSM director Abdulla Yousuf al-Mulla; Yasmin Meichtry, associate director at Olympic Foundation for Culture and Heritage - Olympic Museum - IOC; Alexandra de Navacelle de Coubertin, president, Pierre de Coubertin Family Association; and other guests.

The exhibition is divided into three parts. The first is a tribute to Pierre de Coubertin, founder of the Modern Olympics, and celebrates Qatar's gift of the first translation

of Coubertin's Selected Writings into Arabic for the first time. The exhibition features iconic Olympic objects from the museum's collection, from Muhammad Ali's left boxing glove from Rome 1960, hand-inscribed by the most charismatic of athletes, detailing his victories, to a rare Innsbruck 1964 Olympic torch used on the first occasion that the Olympic flame for a Winter Games was lit in Olympia.

The second part highlights key milestones in Qatar's progress as an Olympic nation, from its first participation at Los Angeles 1984 to Tokyo 2020. Memorabilia and medals include Qatar's first medal in 1992 to one of the two Tokyo 2020 Golds, the bronze won by Oatar athlete Mohamed Suleiman in the 1,500m at Barcelona





It is imperative that Israel be held accountable for these egregious actions through international courts and legal mechanisms.

Gulf Times call on all nations, human rights organizations, and media bodies to unite in condemning these heinous acts and to demand immediate action to protect journalists in conflict zones, particularly in the Palestinian territories. Furthermore. the international community must exert pressure on Israel to release all detained journalists and to cease its relentless campaign of intimidation and violence against those who courageously report the realities of Israeli aggression.

The legacy of Ismail Al-Ghoul and Rami Al-Rifi, and the 165 other journalists who have been martyred in Gaza, must not be in vain. Their work to reveal the truth must be honoured and continued.

MoPH bans 83 healthcare practitioners for violations

he Ministry of Public Health (MoPH) has banned 83 individuals who submitted incorrect or misleading documents to obtain a licence to practise in the country during 2022 and 2023.

MoPH's strict oversight efforts to verify the qualifications and eligibility of health professionals seeking to work in Qatar's healthcare sector has resulted in identifying such documents, a statement said yesterday.

The practitioners who submitted false or misleading documents are permanently banned from working in the healthcare sector of Oatar. Similarly, healthcare institutions outside Qatar that provided incorrect or misleading certificates are identified and blacklisted, rendering their documents unacceptable for licensing purposes.

Dr Saad al-Kaabi, director of the Healthcare Professions Department at the Ministry of Public Health, explained that most of the deceitful attempts involved falsifying experience documents, such as job titles, years of experience, or the size and classification of the institution where the health professional had worked. Additionally, there were instances of forgery in academic qualifications from unreliable institutions and misleading results in qualifying examinations (Prometric). He noted that the violations covered all categories and specialisations, including doctors, nurses, and allied health professionals.

Dr al-Kaabi emphasised that the Ministry employs a unified methodology with fairness, objectivity, and transparency when investigating conduct that undermines the reputation of healthcare professionals and breaches the ethical standards of the profession.

"A blacklist has also been compiled, including healthcare institutions that issue incorrect or misleading certificates to practitioners. Any certificate issued by these institutions is not accepted."

Dr al-Kaabi also noted that all institutions and healthcare facilities that provided false experience doc uments are located outside of Oatar. "The Ministry of Public Health is committed to upholding the highest standards of quality and safety in the healthcare services provided in the country. It regulates the practice of health professionals, works to improve the quality of healthcare, and ensures patient safety," the statement added.

QPC slams assassination of AJ journalists

The Oatar Press Center (QPC) condemns in the strongest terms the Israeli occupation forces' continued targeting of journalists in Gaza with killing and abuse, the latest of which is the assassination of journalist Ismail al-Ghoul and

photographer Rami al-Rifi. The QPC calls on the international community and interna-

tional, human rights and media organisations to condemn the targeting of journalists in Gaza nalists on Aidiya Street, west with murder, arrest and intimidation, and to take urgent action to hold the Israeli occupation accountable before international courts for war crimes against journalists and media professionals, and to pressure it to stop crimes of genocide and stop the assassination of Palestinian

sure on Israel to release journalists detained in Israeli prisons who are suffering from compelling conditions that deprive them of the most basic p rights stipulated in international laws and conventions.

The QPC notes that with the martyrdom of al-Ghoul and al-Rifi, the number of journalist martyrs has risen to (165 male and female journalists) since the start of the war on the Gaza Strip, on the seventh of last October. Page 7

CRA, ITU hold workshop on collaborative digital regulation

The Communications Regulatory Authority (CRA), in collaboration with the International Telecommunication Union (ITU), hosted a national multi-stakeholder's workshop focused on collaborative digital regulation.

This initiative aims to enhance the regulatory environment in Qatar's Information and Communication Technology (ICT) sector by adhering to international standards, advancing cooperation and collaborative governance, utilising new tools for ICT regulation, and facilitating the country's digital transformation.

The workshop gathered government officials, representatives from ministries responsible for ICT policy and regulation, officials from national regulatory bodies, and telecommunications Service Providers. Participants engaged in insightful discussions on various aspects of digital regulation, exploring agile approaches to digital policy, regulation,

and governance. They gained insights into flexible strategies for managing the rapidly evolving ICT landscape, covered the ITU Unified Framework of Generations of Regulation and regulatory metrics such as the ICT Regulatory Tracker and the G5 Benchmark, and deep dive into Qatar's legal, policy, and governance frameworks for digital transformation, highlighting strengths and areas for improvement.

Hussain Abdulla Salatt, Public Relations and Communication manager at CRA, praised the collaboration with ITU, stating: "This partnership is essential for supporting Qatar navigate the challenges of the digital world and strengthen its position in the global digital economy. This evaluation of our regulatory frameworks supports Qatar National Vision and Digital Agenda 2030, as well as our National Development Strategy, by enhancing the digital economy and supporting digital transformation across various sectors, especially with the rapid adoption of new technologies like artificial intelligence and big data."

Following the workshop, a national review of digital collaborative regulation and digital transformation will begin. This review will assess the setup of the telecommunications and IT sector and the foundations for digital transformation across the economy and society in terms of key policies and programs, joint policies across sectors, and collaborative practices among institutions.

It will also examine regulatory tools to boost the digital economy and evaluate the level of regulatory maturity and policy implementation, also inviting feedback from a wide range of national stakeholders from government and the private sector. The analysis will allow formulating recommendations to improve the regulatory environment and governance practices towards achieving an inclusive and sustainable digital transformation and enhancing the local digital economy.

Since 2020, ITU has conducted similar national reviews in 15 countries, focusing on regulatory frameworks, institutional structures, and collaborative digital governance.

These reviews help decision-makers understand the role of collaboration and governance, use new tools to regulate ICT and digital markets, and address the rapidly changing trends in digital policy, regulation, and governance.



Qatari-Korean workshop explores avenues in climate-smart agriculture

The Ministry of Municipality represented by the Food Security Department, in collaboration with the Korea Trade-Investment Promotion Agency (Kotra), Hyundai Research Institute, and Plant Farm. organised a workshop yesterday on knowledge exchange on smart agriculture.

Korean ambassador Yun Hyunsoo, Ministry of Municipality's assistant undersecretary for agriculture and food security engineer Fahd Mohamed al-Qahtani, Food Security Department director Dr Masoud Jarallah al-Marri, and other officials from both sides were present.

Dr al-Marri stressed in his speech at the workshop that Qatar places great importance on food security and has focused on increasing local production of agricultural food products to achieve safe levels of self-sufficiency in general agricultural food commodities, particularly perishable vegetables.

This is achieved through the utilisation of modern technology and the expansion of high-tech greenhouses and the development of agricultural systems. The Ministry of Municipality has provided various support packages in this context to improve vegetable productivity and launched several greenhouse projects for vegetable production to reach the targeted self-sufficiency percentage.

He stated that in an effort to address the challenges facing agri-



cultural production in Qatar, most notably the scarcity of natural resources such as water and arable land, alongside harsh climatic conditions like high temperatures and humidity, the agriculture and food security sector has been striving to find smart and sustainable solutions to ensure agricultural production and achieve targeted self-sufficiency levels.

Accordingly, the Food Security Department proposed a project as part of the knowledge exchange projects provided by the Korean government through Kotra. The project aims to: analyse and identify the impacts of climate change that could affect food production in Qatar, propose policies and measures to address these impacts, such as protected agriculture, and enhance economic cooperation between the Republic

of Korea and Qatar. Dr al-Marri noted that the work on this project began in January 2024, after assigning its implementation to the Hyundai Research Institute and Plant Farm. The project's activities included data collection through reciprocal visits and meetings, where a team of Korean experts and researchers visited Qatar to assess the current situation and review the technology used in agriculture.

They had previously reviewed the various policies and procedures related to agricultural production, especially those related to adapting to climatic conditions. A visit was also organized for Qatari specialists and stakeholders to the Republic of Korea to discuss the interim report and visit some agricultural production institutions in Korea to learn $\,$ about the latest technologies

used in food production. The workshop included a discussion of the final report of the knowledge exchange project between Qatar and Korea in the field of smart agriculture, an analysis of the current situation in Qatar, and highlighted the best practices and advanced technologies used

in Korea. Dr al-Marri expressed his hope that this project would provide technical solutions and policy proposals that Qatar could adopt and contribute to enhancing economic co-operation between the two countries.

Qatar chairs meeting of GCC Border Guard officials



Qatar chaired the 31st meeting of Border Guard and Coast Guard officials of the Gulf Co-operation Council (GCC) countries. The two-day meeting via video-conferencing, which concluded yesterday, was chaired by Director General of Coasts and Border Security at the Ministry of Interior Major General Nasser Jaber al-Nuaimi. The participants discussed several topics related to enhancing co-operation and exchanging expertise among the Border Guard and Coast Guard agencies of the GCC states. (QNA)

QRCS initiates development projects in Niger



r Mohamed Salah Ibrahim. director of Relief and International Programmes Division at Qatar Red Crescent Society (QRCS), has made an official visit to Niger, to inaugurate new shelter projects, inspect ongoing development projects, and to hold co-ordination meetings with senior government officials and representatives of UN and humanitarian organisations.

Accompanied by Rachid al-Krouty, head of QRCS' representation office in Niger, Dr Ibrahim inaugurated a new residential village for poor families in Koutoukale Koira Tegui. It consists of 33 homes, one borehole, one mosque, one two-classroom school, and basic infrastructure. During the opening ceremony, Dr Ibrahim emphasised the successful partnership between QRCS and the government of Niger, commenced in 2005 as a representation of the strong brotherly relations between the people of Oatar and Niger.

According to him, QRCS has diverse interventions in Niger, in keeping with the national development plans, including shelter, water and sanitation, health, livelihood, food security, and disaster response. "With the reopening of QRCS' representation office in Niger last year, its humanitarian activities were revived after a three-year halt," said Dr Ibrahim. "This year, the office implemented numerous projects, including the digging of 60 boreholes in Tillaberi, Dosso, Tahoua, and Zinder;



construction of two residential villages, one already opened and the other in the Filingue department; performance of more than 1,500 cataract surgeries; treatment of more than 117,000 school students with eye diseases in Niamey and Kollo; distribution of 3,550 food baskets under Ramadan Campaigns 2023 and 2024; distribution of the meat of 448 Adahi sacrificial heads of cattle during Eid-al-Adha 2024; and funding of 105 income-generating projects for 790 poor families".

Dr Ibrahim revealed plans to launch several new projects in the starting 53 income-generating enterprises for 163 families in Niamey and Tillaberi, deploying five ophthalmology clinics in Dosso and Maradi, and distributing 1,575 food baskets in Niamey.

On day two, Dr Ibrahim laid the foundation stone for Al-Amal Residential Village in Koure, which consists of 47 fully furnished homes, one mosque, one four-classroom school, one health centre, one borehole, footpaths, and solar panels.

After that, the QRCS delegation made a field tour to inspect the progress of a number of projects undertaken by QRCS' representation office including incomegenerating projects (handicrafts, sewing, fishing and livestock breeding) and an eye disease treatment project for school students at the teaching hospital in Niamey.

Official meetings were also held fice of the President of Niger, the Minister of Interior, the Minister of Hydraulics and Sanitation, coordinator of the United Nations Office for the Co-ordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) in Niger; and head of the office of Turkiye's IHH in Niger.

GCC, Islamic nations condemn assassination of Hamas leader

Gulf Co-operation Council (GCC) has condemned the assassination of Ismail Haniyeh, head of the political bureau of Hamas, in the Iranian capital, Tehran, stressing that this operation is part of a series of crimes committed by the Israeli occupation against the Palestinian people.

In a statement yesterday, the GCC Secretary-General Jassim Mohamed AlBudawi, called on all parties to exercise maximum restraint and abandon policies of violence and the use of force.

He noted that the assassination is a dangerous indicator of the Israeli occupation's lack of seriousness in reaching a political solution and restoring security and stability in the region, and that it clearly undermines the peace efforts being made.

The statement reiterated the GCC's position on the need to stop the war in Gaza and for permanent ceasefire, and to support the steadfastness of the Palestinian people to achieve their national goals of establishing their independent state with East Jerusalem as its capital on the 1967 borders, and to provide a just solution to the refugee issue, in accordance with relevant UN resolutions.

It called on the international community and influential countries to assume their responsibilities, and move immediately to provide protection for the Palestinian people in Gaza and the West Bank, and to stop the violations committed by the Israeli occupation forces against the Palestinian people, and to engage seriously in the political solution to the crisis, and to allow the arrival of humanitarian aid.

ISLAMIC NATIONS SLAM ISRAEL

Arab and Islamic countries have also condemned the assassination of the Head of the Political Bureau of Hamas, Haniveh. and warned over the policy of assassinations and breaching the states' sovereignty, that could imperil the Middle East region and drag it into the cycle of chaos and undermine peace opportuni-

Jordan has condemned, in strongest terms, this assassination and deemed it a breach of international law and international humanitarian law and an escalatory crime that would foment further tension and chaos in the region.

Attaf confirmed that the Israeli occupation forces are proceeding with their indifference and nonrecognition of the simplest humanitarian, legal, political, moral rules and regulations.

Additionally, Malaysia condemned the assassination of Haniyeh and considered it the most brutal homicide, with the Prime Minister of Malaysia, Dr Anwar Ibrahim, highlighting the objective of the assassination as to unequivocally impede the ongoing talks that aim to end the massacre in Gaza that has killed over 40,000 people.

He added that this crime would never have happened in a peaceful environment devoid of impunity, expressing his deep concern over the ramifications of this incident on the Palestinian people who have been exposed to much pain and suffering for many decades.

Guinea ex-dictator Dadis Camara jailed for 20 years over 2009 massacre

A Guinean court sentenced ex-dictator Moussa Dadis Camara to 20 years in jail for crimes against humanity yesterday, after a landmark trial over a 2009 massacre at a political rally, AFP reported from Conakry. Seven other defendants were handed sentences of up to life imprisonment at the end of a landmark trial that played out over nearly two years. On September 28, 2009 and in the following days, members of Dadis Camara's presidential quard, soldiers, police and militia brutally suppressed an opposition rally at a stadium in the suburbs of Conakry. In one of the darkest chapters in the West African nation's history, at least 156 people were killed, hundreds more wounded and 109 women physically abused, according to a UNmandated commission of inquiry. Security forces had been massively deployed for the hearing, in a case keenly awaited by victims' families for nearly 15 years.

Hundreds mourn children killed in Israeli strike on south Beirut

undreds of mourners vesterday chanted "death to Israel" and "America is the Great Satan" at the funeral of two children killed in an Israeli strike on Hezbollah's stronghold in southern Beirut the day before.

The Israeli military said the strike had "eliminated" Fuad Shukr, a top Hezbollah commander it blamed for carrying out a weekend rocket attack on the Israeli-annexed Golan Heights that killed 12 children.

The raid on the Beirut suburb, an overcrowded residential area that is also a Hezbollah bastion. killed siblings Amira and Hassan Fadlallah as well as two women and injured dozens of civilians. according to Lebanon's health ministry.

"I feel very angry because the...

lives of our children are becoming very cheap," said Aya Ahmed, 38, a friend of the two killed children's mother.

The Hezbollah group said Shukr was in the targeted building but that his fate remained unknown.

An AFP photographer at the scene on Tuesday night saw an eight-storey building that had partially collapsed in the strike, while ambulances struggled through crowds and rescue workers combed through the rubble of the building for survivors.

"Every mother now is thinking: I could lose my children at any moment because the Israelis have a license to kill," said Ahmed.

At the procession in southern Beirut, Hezbollah-affiliated scouts carried the two children's coffins, draped in the youth group's white flag. Other mourners carried photographs of the two dead siblings while some held up Hezbollah's flag.

Al Jazeera decries 'assassination' of its two journalists in Israeli strikes

l Jazeera condemned yesterday's killing of two of its journalists in an Israeli strike on Gaza, calling the deaths a "cold-blooded assassination" in a

bench of the Court of Appeal said in a ruling.

The Qatar-based news outlet said its Arabic channel correspondent Ismail al-Ghoul and cameraman Rami al-Rifi were "targeted by Israeli occupation forces" during their coverage of Gaza's Al-Shati refugee camp.

"This latest attack on Al Jazeera journalists is part of a systematic targeting campaign against the network's journalists and their

families since October 2023," Al Iazeera added.

Since the start of the war in Gaza in the first week of October last year, Al Jazeera has aired continuous on-the-ground reporting on the effects of Israel's campaign.

The network's office in Gaza has already been bombed in the conflict and two other correspondents

Al Jazeera said Ghoul and Rifi's killings showed "the urgent need for immediate legal action against the occupation forces".

The channel said it would "pursue all legal actions to prosecute the perpetrators of these crimes and stands in unwavering solidar-

ity with all journalists in Gaza". In a statement, Hamas con-

demned the killings as a "heinous crime" which it said was "aimed at terrorising and silencing" Palestinian journalists as they reported "the ongoing genocide against our people in the Gaza Strip for nearly

ten months". Al Jazeera has been the focus of months of criticism from Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and his government.

Last month, an Israeli court confirmed it had extended a ban on the network, which broadcasts in Arabic and English, initially placed on Al Jazeera in early May.

UN CHIEF CRITICISES

The spokesman for UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres condemned the killings and said the incident and others like it "must be fully and transparently investigated and there must be accountability".

In January, Israel said an Al Jazeera staff journalist and a freelancer killed in an air strike in

Gaza were "operatives". The following month, it accused another journalist with the channel who was wounded in a separate strike of being a "deputy company commander" with Hamas. Al Jazeera has fiercely denied Is-

rael's allegations and accused it of systematically targeting Al Jazeera employees in the Gaza Strip. Its bureau chief in Gaza, Wael

al-Dahdouh, was wounded in an Israeli strike in December that killed the network's cameraman. His wife, two of their children

and a grandson were killed in the October bombardment of central Gaza's Nuseirat refugee camp.

His eldest son was the Al Iazeera staff journalist killed in January when a strike targeted a car in Rafah.

Philippines, US navies hold joint exercise in S China Sea

he Philippines and US navies conducted a joint maritime exercise in the South China Sea yesterday, the Philippine armed forces said.

The two allies began joint mari-

time activities in November to enhance how their militaries could operate in tandem at a time of growing tensions with China in the South China Sea.

The latest exercise, held inside the Philippines' exclusive economic zone, included two vessels and was designed to enhance communication and operational co-ordination between the two navies, Manila's military said in a statement. "These joint exercises with our ally are crucial in enhancing our naval capabilities and ensuring that we can effectively collaborate to safeguard our maritime interests," Philippine military chief Romeo Brawner was quoted as saying in the statement. On Tuesday, US State Secretary Antony Blinken and Defence Secretary Lloyd Austin held talks with their Philippine counterparts in which Washington pledged funding of \$500mn to beef up Manila's military and coast guard.

More funds could come next year, a diplomatic source said yesterday. Meanwhile, China yesterday warned the Philippines it risks "greater insecurity for itself", after the US said it would provide \$500mn in additional military funding to Manila in the face of Beijing's growing assertiveness.

Asked about the announcement, Beijing's foreign ministry yesterday warned Manila that "wooing countries from outside the region to provoke confrontation in the South China Sea will only undermine regional stability and aggravate tensions".

"Trying to introduce external forces to protect its own security will only lead to greater insecurity for itself, and it might even become someone else's pawn," spokesman Lin Jian said.

China revises drone export controls amid western scrutiny

hina will amend drone export controls from September 1, including adding high-precision measurement equipment to the control list and adjusting standards for some unmanned aircraft components.

The move comes amid intensified scrutiny from the US and its allies over allegations that Beijing is supporting Russia's war effort in Ukraine.

Last year China dismissed reports from the US and Western media about Chinese drones being used in the Ukraine conflict as "unfounded" and a "smear" against Chinese firms.

The commerce ministry said these adjustments would help better safeguard China's national security and interests, and ensure the security and stability of the global industrial and supply

Notably, Beijing will also lift temporary export controls for certain consumer drones. China, a major player in the global drone manufacturing industry, emphasises that it opposes the use of civilian drones for "non-peaceful purposes," according to the statement.

On Tuesday, Kyiv's foreign ministry spokesperson said its Foreign Minister Dmytro Kuleba was told during his visit in China last week that Beijing had not sent weapons to Russia and would not do so in the future, and that Beijing is also strengthening export controls particularly on civilian drones.

DJI Technology Co, a leading Chinese drone maker, said in a statement yesterday it was pleased to see the export control adjustments, which it said would be favourable for the development of the drone industry.

"DJI have made it absolutely clear that our products are for civilian use only. We have never designed, developed or manufactured military-grade equipment, we have never adapted our products or pursued business opportunities for combat operations; we have never marketed or sold our products for combat use in any country," it added.

The company added it would continue to strictly comply with and implement China's export control rules, and the laws and regulations of the countries and regions where it operates.

In May, a group of House Republicans proposed legislation that would hike US tariffs on Chinese-made drones by 30% and bar imports of drones that contain critical components made in China by 2030.

Last year, China announced export controls on some drones and drone-related equipment, saying it wanted to safeguard "national security and interests" amid escalating tension with the US over access to the technology.

Bangladesh police lob stun grenades to disperse protesters

Police in Bangladesh fired tear gas and stun grenades to disperse people who were demonstrating yesterday against the excessive use of force by authorities during protests earlier in July that left at least 150 dead.

The unrest is the biggest test facing Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, 76, since she won a fourth term in January elections boycotted by the main opposition Bangladesh Nationalist Party, which were also marred by deadly pro-

Police said they used force when people in the northeastern district of Sylhet broke through barricades to march towards for the courts.

"We requested the protesters to move from

the road, but they didn't listen and instead attacked the police, forcing us to disperse them with tear gas and stun grenades," said regional deputy commissioner Azbahar Ali Sheikh. Police and protesters scuffled in Dhaka, the

capital, and the southern port city of Chittagong, witnesses said. It was not immediately clear if there were any fatalities. At least 10 people, including four journal-

At least 10 people, including four journalists, were injured in southern Barishal district, where police used batons to disperse protesters.

Police detained at least seven students in Dhaka near the high court, where lawyers and university teachers joined the demonstrators. Yesterday's nationwide "March for Justice" was called by the Students Against Discrimination group that was at the forefront of pro-

tests against quotas in government jobs.

That initial unrest earlier in July left thousands wounded as security forces fired rubber

bullets, tear gas and stun grenades to disperse those gathered.

Although the students agreed to halt their protest after the Supreme Court scrapped most quotas on July 21, they returned recently to the streets to call out the dozens of deaths, arrests, and government intimidation.

"We will also demand a United Nations investigation into the violence," Mohamed Mahin Sarkar, a co-ordinator of the movement, said in a statement.

International rights groups have condemned close to 10,000 arrests over the past two weeks on charges of involvement in clashes and destruction of government property.

They say Hasina has become increasingly autocratic during her last 15 years in power, which have been marked by arrests of political opponents and activists, allegations she denies.

Landmark peanut allergy treatment for babies begins in Australia

Australian children with potentially deadly peanut allergies will be offered lifesaving treatment in a nationwide programme touted as a world first. Eligible babies will receive daily doses of peanut powder for two years to build up their tolerance. said officials announcing the initiative vesterday. Over time, the infants will be given increasing doses in the hope of reducing their sensitivity to peanuts, under the supervision of doctors at 10 paediatric hospitals around the country. It is the first national peanut allergy treatment programme offered in hospitals outside of a clinical trial setting, said Kirsten Perrett, head of oral immunotherapy at the National Allergy Centre of Excellence. At the end of the two years, a food allergy test will determine if the treatment has led to a remission. "Ultimately we want to change the trajectory of allergic disease in Australia so that more children can go to school without the risk of a life-threatening peanut reaction," Perrett said.

Singapore, US sign civil nuke co-operation pact

The US and Singapore yesterday signed an agreement to "deepen" co-operation on the peaceful use of nuclear energy as the city-state considers alternative power sources to cut carbon emissions.

Singapore, a regional financial centre and a key player in the global semiconductor industry, is currently reliant on oil and natural gas.

It is studying options, including nuclear power, to meet its target of net-zero carbon emissions by 2050. US Secretary of State Antony Blinken and his Singaporean counterpart Vivian Balakrishnan signed the "123 Agreements" on civil nuclear co-operation during a visit by Washington's top diplomat as part of his latest swing to Asia.

The 123 Agreements, named after their section in the US Atomic Energy Act, are critical for investment by US nuclear companies, which are wary of running afoul of laws related to proliferation.

"This agreement builds on the long-standing civil nuclear collaboration between US and Singapore and outlines a comprehensive framework to deepen peaceful nuclear co-operation based on a mutual commitment to nuclear non-proliferation," both countries said in a joint statement.

The agreement is expected to come into force by end-2024 after being reviewed by the US Congress, the statement said.

The pact will last for 30 years and will "facilitate Singapore's access to detailed information on US nuclear energy technologies and expertise that are under export control," according to the statement.

Myanmar junta extends state of emergency by six months

Junta chief Min Aung Hlaing had proposed the extension "in

order to prepare valid and accurate ballots" for the election the junta has promised to hold, possibly in 2025.

The extension was also needed to "carry out the population census and in order to continue the implementation of the work to be done," MRTV said.

Under the military-drafted 2008 constitution, which the junta has said is still in force, authorities are required to hold fresh elections within six months of a state of emergency being lifted.

The military seized power after making unsubstantiated allegations of fraud in 2020 elections

which Aung San Suu Kyi's National League for Democracy (NLD) won in a landslide.

It has extended the state of emergency multiple times since as it battles established ethnic minority armed groups and newer pro-democracy "People's Defence Forces".

In recent months it has suffered a string of battlefield defeats to an alliance of ethnic minority armed groups in the north and west of the country.

Last week the Myanmar National Democratic Alliance Army (MNDAA) claimed it had seized the northern town of Lashio, which

sits on a vital trade highway to China and is home to the military's northeastern command.

The junta denied the claim.

The loss of Lashio and the regional military command would be a huge blow to the junta, which has lost territory to the MNDAA and other armed groups in recent works.

In January the MNDAA captured the city of Laukkai near Myanmar's border with China after around 2,000 junta troops surrendered, in one of the military's biggest de-

feats in decades.
Since the coup fighting between the military and its opponents has

forced 2.7mn people to flee their home, according to the United Nations

More than 5,400 people have been killed and 27,000 arrested in the junta's crackdown on dissent since the coup, according to a local monitoring group.

The junta has said it will hold fresh elections in 2025.

But critics say the proposed polls will be neither free nor fair.

Last year the junta-stacked election commission announced that Suu Kyi's NLD would be dissolved for failing to re-register under a tough new military-drafted electoral law.

India's steel ministry 'seeks probe into cheaper imports'

ndia's federal ministry of steel has asked the trade ministry to investigate cheaper steel imports from China and Vietnam, a government source directly aware of the matter said yesterday, as New

Delhi grapples with rising imports. India, the world's second-biggest crude steel producer, turned net steel importer in the fiscal year through March and the trend continued with finished steel imports scaling a five-year high in April and May, according to provisional government data.

"We have said that the trade

ministry should investigate these imports and offer its recommendations to the finance ministry, which will take the final call," the source told Reuters, declining to be identified as the discussions are not public. India's steel and trade ministries did not immediately respond to e-mails from Reuters seeking com-

Last week, India's JSW Steel told Reuters that the steel industry was in talks with the federal government for trade measures to combat rising imports, particularly from China and Vietnam.

The source added that the steel ministry had urged officials from the European Union not to impose higher taxes on its carbon-producing industries in a meeting two weeks ago. Reuters on July 29 quoted a top official as saying India had not accepted an EU proposal to levy higher taxes on its carbon-producing industries.

The EU last year approved the world's first plan to impose tariffs on imports of high-carbon goods, including steel, aluminium and cement, part of its aim to reach netzero greenhouse emissions by 2050.

Separately, the steel ministry is in talks with mills to diversify imports of coking coal, a key steelmaking raw material, from countries including Russia, Canada and the US, the source said, as the country tries to cut its reliance on Australia, its biggest supplier.

Ex-BBC host pleads guilty to indecent child pictures charges

London

ormer BBC news anchor Huw Edwards, one of the most recognisable faces on UK television, pleaded guilty yesterday to three counts of making indecent images of children.

The 62-year-old - who resigned from the BBC in April on "medical advice", six months after he was arrested - faces a maximum prison sentence of 10 years and a minimum of 12 months.

Wearing a dark suit and blue tie, Edwards sat impassively during the 25-minute court hearing as he admitted receiving 41 indecent images of children on WhatsApp, including seven of the most serious type.

Under English law, electronic communications involving indecent imagery of children - including receiving and downloading pictures and videos - can constitute the offence of making indecent images of children.

The crimes involving Edwards occurred between December 2020 and August 2021, amended from the initial chargesheet which ran

Westminster Magistrates' Court in London heard that the former TV anchor had received 377 images from a man he met online, of

which 41 were indecent. Edwards's lawyer, Philip Evans.

said that his client's devices had been seized and that it was clear he had not made or shared the images. He added that the defendant was of "good character" and that "there are serious issues in relation to Edwards's health both mental and physical".

Chief magistrate Paul Goldspring released Edwards on conditional bail until his next hearing on September 16, when he could be sentenced. Goldspring ordered probation services to draw up a report, telling Edwards he needed "to read more about you" before sentencing. "I'm asking the probation service to look at this case, with genuinely all options open," the magistrate said.

Hope had earlier told the court that a suspended sentence might be appropriate, if paired with a community order and a sexual offender treatment programme.

Edwards, the BBC's lead presenter on key events such as the death and funeral of Queen Elizabeth II, was suspended in July 2023 when allegations first emerged.

He had also been the anchor of the BBC's flagship 10pm news programme since 2003.

He quit on April 22 after 40 years with the broadcaster.

As the accusations became front-page news last July, Edwards's wife Vicky Flind said the father-of-five was "suffering from serious mental health issues" and had been admitted to hospital.

Hopes of finding survivors fade in Kerala after landslides kill 167

opes of finding survivors began to fade as hundreds of rescuers worked through slush and rocks and pulled out bodies from debris in the hills of India's Kerala state yesterday, a day after 167 people were killed in monsoon landslides

Steady rain that intensified as the day progressed and the rising water level in a local river hampered the rescue, with a temporary bridge built to connect the worst affected area of Mundakkai being washed away.

The weather department has forecast more heavy rain over the next 24 hours, Kerala's Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan said and urged people to be on "high alert".

Heavy rain in Kerala, one of India's most popular tourist destinations, led to the landslides in its Wayanad district early on Tuesday, sending torrents of mud, water and tumbling boulders downhill and burying or sweeping people to their deaths as

It was the worst disaster in the state since deadly floods in 2018. Experts said the area had received heavy rain in the last two weeks that softened the soil. Extremely heavy rainfall on Monday then triggered the landslides.

Nearly 1,600 people have been rescued from the hillside villages and tea and cardamom estates, authorities said vesterday.

They said at least 167 people died, while the local Asianet news TV channel put the death toll at 230. More than 8,000 people were being sheltered in camps across the district, authorities said.

Wayanad's district administrator said people had been asked yesterday to shift to camps 'as soon as possible as there is a danger".

Rescuers had found 24 bodies and six body parts yesterday and were not hopeful of finding any survivors more than 36 hours after the tragedy, one official in Chooralmala town said.

The landslides were mostly on the upper slopes of hills which then cascaded to the valley below, M R Ajith Kumar, a top state police

Nearly 350 of the 400 registered houses in the affected region have been damaged, Asianet reported, citing district officials.

The Indian navy said its disaster relief team had reached the area on Tuesday night and search and rescue helicopters were deployed early vesterday but adverse weather conditions due to "incessant rains" posed chal-

India has witnessed extreme weather conditions in recent years, from torrential rain and floods to droughts and cyclones, blamed by some experts on climate change.

"Climate change has led to significant alterations in our environment. We need to take proactive steps to address and adapt to these changes," Chief Minister Vijayan said. "Effective measures should be taken to prevent impending disasters."

India gets 9% more rain in July after weak June

India received 9% more rainfall than average in July as the monsoon covered the entire country ahead of schedule, delivering heavy rain in central and southern states, weather department data showed yesterday. The lifeblood of the nearly \$3.5tn

economy, the monsoon brings nearly 70% of the rain India needs to water farms and refill reservoirs and aquifers. Without irrigation, nearly half of the farmland in the world's second-biggest producer of rice, wheat and sugar depends on the annual rains that usually run from June to

regions of the country received nearly a third more rainfall than the average, while east and north-eastern regions received 23.3% less rainfall, according to the India Meteorological Department (IMD).

Unesco lauds Stonehenge tunnel project cancellation

> The United Nations' cultural organisation yesterday welcomed Britain's decision to cancel a controversial tunnel project near Stonehenge,

> a world heritage site. The UK's Chancellor of the Exchequer Rachel Reeves on Monday announced a number of "difficult" budget decisions, telling parliament that a few "unfunded" projects launched by the previous government would not go ahead under the Labour administration of Prime Minister Keir Starmer, including plans for a road tunnel close to Stonehenge, a renowned prehistoric site in England.

> "Unesco welcomes the Starmer government's decision to cancel the construction of a road

tunnel under the Stonehenge World Heritage Site," the organisation's director-general Audrey Azoulay said in a social media post. Unesco last month warned that Stonehenge could be added to its world heritage in danger list because of the tunnel project.

Stonehenge has had Unesco world heritage status since 1986. Placement on the UN body's heritage in danger list is seen as a dishonour by some countries.

Last year, the former government of prime minister Rishi Sunak approved the construction of a road tunnel near Stonehenge despite efforts by campaigners to halt the £1.7bn (\$2.2bn) project.

The tunnel was intended to ease congestion on an existing main road to southwest England that gets especially busy during the peak holiday periods, but experts had warned of "permanent, irreversible harm" to the area.

UK police brace for more violence after knife attack sparks riot

K police yesterday mobilised to prevent a repeat of overnight violence in which dozens of officers were injured, following the mass stabbing at a Taylor Swift-themed dance party that killed three children.

Merseyside Police chief Serena Kennedy said her force was "absolutely planning" for further possible disturbances in Southport, northwestern England, after Monday's knife rampage targeting children prompted Tuesday evening's

Supporters of the far-right English Defence League (EDL) are suspected of having travelled from outside the area to the seaside town near Liverpool to orchestrate sever-

al hours of serious violent disorder. A 100-strong group attacked police, properties and a mosque and

set vehicles and other things on fire. Police say 53 officers were wounded, at least eight of them seriously, and that they had arrested

four suspects. The scenes of violence have been widely condemned, UK Prime Minister Keir Starmer vowing that those responsible would "face the full force of the law". During a visit there yesterday, Kennedy said her

officers were "well prepared" and had had "sufficient resources".

But she added: "The people who turned up on Tuesday were bolstered very quickly and it very quickly escalated."

Acknowledging communities in Southport were "really worried" about further disturbances, she added that Merseyside Police would continue to be supported by other regional forces.

That would ensure "that we don't see a repeat of what happened", she added.

Officers have been granted new temporary powers to disperse any crowds that attempt to gather in the

The violence erupted shortly after a vigil was held in the town centre, where hundreds fell silent in tribute to the victims of the stabbing attack that also critically injured five children and two adults.

Police have said they are not treating it as terror-related.

Few details have emerged about the suspected attacker, other than that he is 17 years-old and born in the Welsh capital Cardiff. His parents were from Rwanda, according to the BBC.

Police have been granted more time to question him. He cannot be named because of his age.

Hours after the attack, unverified information about the suspect's

background began spreading on social media.

Far-right influencer Andrew Tate had posted a video on social media, viewed by nearly 15mn people, blaming the stabbing on an "illegal

migrant". The Muslim Council of Britain said the Islamophobic backlash started with a false online rumour stoked by misinformation from a Russian news site, wrongfully associating the crime with Muslims.

"At a time of great tragedy, loss, and mourning, we must stand firm against the cynical forces of hatred and division," MCB secretary-general Zara Mohamed said.

Merseyside Police's assistant chief Alex Goss said there had been "much speculation and hypothesis" about the suspect while "many people who do not live in" the local area had participated in Tuesday night's violence.

"What did we do to deserve this? We've already lost our children," 53-year-old Suzanne Jerram, owner of a store that was vandalised, said.

"Our community's grieving, how dare they come here to our town and do this? It's disgusting, it really is disgusting."

Shadow interior minister James Cleverly urged the government to respond "hard and fast" to the disturbances and online

misinformation.

Poll conundrums of France, Britain

The outcome of the United Kingdom's general election, in which Keir Starmer's Labour secured two-thirds of the seats in Parliament despite receiving just 33.8% of the vote, shows that Roman statesman Marcus Tullius Cicero was right: "Nothing is more uncertain than the masses, nothing more obscure than human will, nothing more deceptive than the whole electoral process."

Shortly after the election, advocates of electoral reform in the UK attributed Labour's overwhelming victory to the country's firstpast-the-post (FPTP) system and called for a shift to proportional representation. Labour's share of the vote, the argument goes, was too small to justify such a supermajority, especially in comparison to previous elections. The fragmentation of votes across multiple political parties contributed significantly to this seemingly disproportionate outcome, as did Labour's strategy of maximising the ratio of seats per voter.

A few days later, the second round of France's snap election resulted in a hung parliament and political uncertainty that will likely persist for months, if not years. Although Marine Le Pen's National Rally (RN) became the single largest party in the National Assembly, it ended up in third place, behind the left-wing New Popular Front (NPF) coalition and President Emmanuel Macron's centrist alliance, Ensemble. Remarkably, despite receiving 37% of the vote, RN won just 24% of the seats.

France's majoritarian electoral system was supposed to prevent such a deadlock. Established in 1958, it was designed to overcome the Fourth Republic's structural instability (frequent changes in government) by awarding a de facto seat premium to the largest party - a principle known in France as "fait majoritaire." But no party has been able to secure an absolute majority since 2022, owing to a combination of political fragmentation and convoluted alliances.

Both have experienced a gradual political and economic decline since the end of their respective

The French election's outcome can be attributed largely to a series of candidate withdrawals between the first and second rounds. To prevent RN from gaining a majority, all other parties - including Macron's coalition - withdrew their candidates in various constituencies, leaving only one contender to face the far-right. This approach resulted in many close races, but proved effective in getting voters to reject RN. Instead of producing a majority,

however, this anti-RN tactic may alienate many voters who view political alliances as either ineffective or unstable, further eroding trust

in politicians and reinforcing populist trends. Moreover, it resulted in a fragmented parliament that is divided into three main blocs of similar size. The largest coalition, the NPF, claims the mandate to govern, despite not having a majority and receiving only 26.3% of the vote.

Similarly, Macron's allies believe they still have a pivotal role to play in governing, despite being rejected by the vast majority of voters in both the European Parliament elections and the general election. Macron himself, essentially a lame duck, will find it difficult to navigate the next three years, even without a major political or economic crisis.

Meanwhile, RN is capitalising on the situation, claiming that being excluded from power is proof that the system is rigged. Staying in the opposition will allow the party to avoid making any massively unpopular budget decisions, thus solidifying its position as the favourite to win the 2027 presidential election.

Given this current deadlock, where the three main blocs lack both a majority in Parliament and compatible ideas, some commentators are urging French political leaders to embrace compromise and consensus-building. After all, countries like Germany, The Netherlands, Belgium, and Sweden have faced similar challenges: the rise of far-right populist parties, voter fragmentation, and the collapse of bipartisan systems, driven by economic decline, uncontrolled immigration, and rising crime.

Yet despite these issues, former adversaries have managed to set aside their ideological differences and form effective coalition governments. France, according to this argument, must learn from these examples to overcome its own political turmoil.

But neither France nor the UK can easily change its political culture, given their long histories of centralised governance. In both countries, a strong state has created a vertical power structure, preventing the emergence of consensus-seeking practices or collective decisionmaking. This is exacerbated by the dominance of bipartisanism in the UK and the pervasive influence of ideology in France. Consequently, there is little appetite for compromise and coalition-building on either side of the Channel. Changing these political dynamics will likely require a prolonged process of devolution.

France and the UK have much in common beyond their electoral systems. Both have experienced a gradual political and economic decline since the end of their respective empires and a surge of support for populist parties, fuelled by disaffected voters lamenting the loss of purchasing power and cultural identity. — Project Syndicate



Harris needs to challenge Trump overtures to American workers

> uly 2024 will go down in history as one of the most momentous months in American politics. Between the attempted assassination of Donald Trump, US President Joe Biden's withdrawal from the

presidential race, and the rise of Vice-President Kamala Harris as the Democratic Party's presumptive nominee, it is hard to keep up with the frantic pace of political events. While some may look to the past for guidance or reassurance, it is unclear if any historical comparison can truly match the sheer drama of recent weeks.

Since it became clear that Trump would once again be the Republican Party's nominee, Democrats have framed the election as an existential battle between democrac and authoritarianism. Biden is portrayed as a Winston Churchilllike leader who will not only protect democratic institutions and values in the United States, but also defend Europe's freedom, by supporting Ukraine.

By contrast, Trump is often depicted as "America's Hitler" as his own running mate, Senator J D Vance, once called him - bent on turning the country into an autocratic dystopia. This was the Biden campaign's narrative, and if her early remarks are any indication, it will also be Harris's.

Not surprisingly, Republicans see things differently. In a private conversation, one adviser to the Trump-Vance campaign used an unexpected historical analogy. Instead of comparing the US to the United Kingdom during World War II, he drew parallels with postwar Britain,

which was, in his view, victorious but overburdened. In WWII's aftermath, the UK's primary political battle was internal, with the UK's Conservative Party, which stood for the elites and the British Empire, facing off against the worker-friendly Labour Party, which focused on winning the peace at home.

My interlocutor said that today's Democrats remind him of the Conservatives, who represented the upper class, embodied the political establishment, and sought to maintain the trappings of a global empire during a period of retrenchment. Trump and Vance's pro-worker agenda, he claimed, more closely mirrors that of the postwar Labour Party.

After WWII, the Labour Party held particular appeal for the working class, who felt that they had borne more than their fair share of the burden of WWII, suffered the consequences of internationalist foreign policies and been generally "left behind". Similarly, Trump and Vance claim to speak for "forgotten" Americans, and the key focus of their campaign is reinventing the Republican Party's class base.

Trump and his supporters often point out that the Democratic Party is now the party of Wall Street, Hollywood, and Silicon Valley. Now, GOP advisers are seeking to rebrand "countryclub Republicans" as "workingclass Republicans". When Vance said he hoped to celebrate his mother's ten years of sobriety in the White House, he was speaking to a very specific audience of working-class Americans struggling in places "blown out by globalisation", as one Republican strategist put it to me.

Moreover, just as the postwar British left railed against the pernicious influence of upperclass elites, Trump and Vance are targeting the Washington establishment. In his iconic 1941 essay The Lion and the Unicorn, George Orwell – a fervent Labour supporter called for replacing the UK's out-of-touch mandarinate. The MAGA movement is similarly suspicious of the nationalsecurity establishment, military leadership, and Big Business, all of which today's Republicans associate with the Democratic Party. As part of its Project 2025 agenda, the Heritage Foundation advocates firing the 50,000 federal civil servants who comprise the administrative state and replacing them with a new leadership class - a step Vance

has enthusiastically endorsed. But for my interlocutor, the most relevant parallel between today's US Republican Party and the postwar UK Labour Party lies in their stances on their respective countries' global role. After WWII. Britain faced the cho either to maintain its empire or - as Labour advocated - to focus on improving welfare at home. According to Trump's strategists, the US now faces a similar choice.

At his rallies, Trump often criticises what he views as US strategic overreach, noting that, as president, he did not start a major war or initiate any foreign interventions. Electing him, he argues, would bring both greater peace and a renewed focus on domestic prosperity. Vance's vision - which focuses on raising the minimum wage, expanding social protections, and bolstering corporate regulation - has a quasi-social-democratic quality.

To be sure, my Democratic friends - much like most reputable historians of postwar Britain - will see the comparison to Labour as absurd. After all, Trump's first term focused

more on courting plutocrats and cutting taxes for the rich than on building a welfare state. The Biden administration, for its part, has done a lot to help left-behind voters, especially through major policy initiatives like the Inflation Reduction Act. But, if the Trump-Vance campaign gets its way, voters will not recognise that.

In the lead-up to November's presidential election, Democrats will undoubtedly attack Trump and Vance for their extreme views on women's bodies, the US Constitution, and Ukraine - views that do not align with mainstream public opinion. But they must also work to dismantle the narrative that Trump and Vance are champions of the working class.

In a sense, postwar Britain does carry an important lesson for Democrats today. Churchill was widely expected to win the 1945 general election, but the majority of British voters ultimately embraced the Labour Party's agenda of trading imperial glory for rebuilding the domestic economy. Trump, Vance, and their strategists hope that their promise to Make America Great Again will resonate in a similar way.

Consequently, Harris will need to devote as much effort to countering Republicans' cultural and policy-based appeals to workers as she does to addressing the threats to reproductive rights and the Constitution. To defeat Trump in November, Democrats must convince voters that they are the true party of the American working class. – Project Syndicate

3 inmates killed in Nevada prison fight

A Nevada maximum-security prison went into lockdown after a brawl that left three inmates dead and nine others hospitalised, officials said.

Nevada Governor Joe Lombardo's office said the brawl on Tuesday was gang related, Fox channel KVVU-TV in Las Vegas reported. The deadly melee broke out on Tuesday afternoon at the Ely State Prison in a rural mining town some 250 miles north of Las Vegas. The prison, the state's only maximum security facility, is also the site of its death row.

No corrections officers were injured in the fight, officials said in the statement, which did not provide a cause for the fight or say how many others may have been

The nine inmates who were hospitalised were stabbed, ABC affiliate KOLO-TV reported. A spokesperson for the Nevada Department of Corrections did not immediately respond to phone calls and e-mail seeking more information.

It was unclear if the prison remained on lockdown vesterday. but the Department of Correction's website said that visitations were cancelled indefinitely at all state

Prison officials were concerned about retaliation, CBS affiliate KLAS-TV reported.

The Ely prison can hold 1,183 inmates and has more than 400 employee positions. Nevada currently has 60 inmates on death row at the facility, according to the Death Penalty Information Center. There have been 21 deaths across all Nevada prisons this year, according to the state's website, including two at the Ely prison.

Ex-news presenter in 5 new probes over alleged rape

French investigators have opened five new probes into rape allegations against former primetime news presenter Patrick Poivre d'Arvor, prosecutors said yesterday. The 76-vear-old has denied repeated accusations of rape or sexual assault. In December he was charged with the rape of writer Florence Porcel in 2009. That probe was widened in February to look into claims of the rape of two more women and a sexual assault of another committed between 2007 and 2018, which could lead to fresh charges. The new investigations are into accusations of rape during an earlier period the prosecutor's office in the Paris suburb of Nanterre and a lawyer told AFP.

The five accusers had filed previous complaints that had been rejected for being past the statute of limitations, a source at the prosecutor's office said. Their lawyer used a different legal channel to get the investigations opened. Poivre d'Arvor's lawyer was not immediately available for comment. Amongst the five accusers, journalist Helene Devynck has alleged the television presenter raped her when she was his assistant in 1993. Another journalist, Stephanie Khavat. has accused him of two rapes in 1994 and 1997. Marie-Laure Eude-Delattre claims Poivre d'Arvor raped her as a 23-year-old intern at the Cannes Film Festival in 1985. Margot Cauquil-Gleizes, now a teacher, said he raped her the same year when she was 17. All four were identified by their lawyer Corinne Herrmann. It was not immediately clear who the fifth person was.

Tesla Model S car was in "Full Self-Driving" mode when it hit and killed a 28-year-old motorcyclist in the Seattle area in April, police said, making it at least the second accident involving the technology on which Tesla CEO Elon Musk is pinning his

The 56-year-old driver was arrested on suspicion of vehicular homicide based on his admission that he was looking at his cell phone while using the driver assistant feature, the police said in a statement.

"The case is still under active investigation," said Chris Loftis of Washington State Patrol, adding that drivers are responsible for the safe operation of their vehicles.

Musk has this year shelved Tesla's all-new affordable cars and increased his bets on self-driving vehicles, saying he will be shocked if Tesla can't achieve full self-driving capability next year.

"The overwhelmingly important thing is achieving unsupervised full self-driving", he said in an interview with the Tesla Owners of Silicon Valley club last weekend. He said a future vehicle will be like a "tiny mobile lounge" where

drivers will be able to watch movies, play video games, work and even Musk has been aiming to achieve self-driving capability for several

years, with the technology under growing regulatory and legal scrutiny. Tesla calls its driver assistant features Autopilot or "supervised" Full Self-Driving, but says they require active driver supervision and do not make its vehicles autonomous.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) previously said there was one fatal accident between August 2022 and August 2023. The regulator began a probe of Autopilot in August 2021 after identifying more than a dozen crashes in which Tesla vehicles had hit stationary emergency vehicles, and reviewed hundreds of crashes involving Autopilot.

Tesla was forced to recall nearly all its vehicles on US roads over a lack of safeguards.

Trump on Harris: 'Is she Indian or Black?'

Republican presidential candidate Donald Trump questioned whether his Democratic rival Kamala Harris is "Black" during a contentious appearance at the country's largest annual gathering of Black journalists yesterday.

"Is she Indian or is she Black?" Trump said of his opponent in the presidential race, drawing a smattering of jeers. "She was Indian all the way, and all of a sudden she made a turn and became a Black person.'

Harris, whose mother was Indian and whose father is Black, is the first Black and the first Asian American US vice-president.

Since launching her White House campaign earlier this month, Harris has faced a barrage of sexist and racist attacks online, while Republican Party leaders have urged lawmakers to refrain

from personal attacks and focus on her policy

The interview — in front of a gathering of about 1,000 journalists – started on a tense note, when ABC News reporter Rachel Scott asked Trump to explain why Black voters should support him despite a history of racist comments.

In response, Trump called the question "horrible," "hostile" and a "disgrace" and described ABC as a "fake" network.

"I have been the best president for the Black population since Abraham Lincoln," he said. Trump's first-ever appearance at the National Association of Black Journalists' annual convention in Chicago received a backlash from some members, prompting a co-chair of the convention to step down in protest.

Khan offers conditional talks with the military

akistan's former prime minister Imran Khan has offered to hold "conditional negotiations" with the powerful military as he serves a year into a jail term that he said he was given on trumped up charges designed to keep him out of power. Khan did not specify what he

wanted to discuss with the military, but in a post on his official X account yesterday said that one of the conditions for negotiations was that "clean and transparent" elections be held and that "bogus" cases against his supporters be dropped.

He said he had appointed Mahmood Khan Achakzai, a close political ally and a known critic of the military, to represent him in any talks.

The military has previously ruled out talks with Khan.

"We will hold conditional negotiations if the military leadership appoints its representative," Khan said on X.

"The country is under an undeclared martial law," he added. "We prefer negotiations with the military leadership, who are

the actual decision-makers," he said, adding that he refused to "puppet" govern ment for any talks.

In response to Khan's offer, the military released a video clip from a May 7 media conference in which its spokesman, Major General Ahmed Sharif Chaudhry, said it was not possible to sit with "any political ideology, any political leader, or any political group who is involved in attacks on its own

army". The military says Khan and his party were behind the attacks on military installations that occurred last year during widespread protests against his

Khan blames the military for his 2022 ouster in a parliamentary vote of no confidence, a charge the military denies. The army, which has ruled Pakistan for more than half of its 76-year history and plays an pivotal role in politics, says it "does not get involved in government affairs".

Khan has been in jail since last August facing dozens of

His imprisonment has added to the political volatility in Pakistan, which is facing an economic crisis and is the process of being bailed out by the International Monetary Fund.

Khan and his Pakistan Tereek-e-Insaf (PTI) party the charges were politically motivated to thwart his return to power.

Candidates backed by PTI had a stronger-than-expected showing in general elections earlier this year and a court recently ruled they were eligible for extra reserved seats, though still not enough to rule out-

Venezuela in chaos amid fears of more opposition arrests

tores were closed and buses not running around much of Venezuela yesterday, as tensions over a disputed presidential election and rumours of opposition arrests kept many people home. Socialist President Nicolas Ma-

duro, who has ruled since 2013, was declared the winner of the weekend vote by the electoral council. But the opposition says its tally of about 90% of votes shows that its candidate Edmundo Gonzalez received more than double the support attracted by Maduro.

The US-based Carter Center, which observed the vote, said in a statement late on Tuesday that the election "cannot be considered democratic." It said the process was flawed throughout and called the electoral authority's failure to publish disaggregated results a "serious breach."

Maduro yesterday presented a writ to Venezuela's top court to "activate an electoral dispute."

"The United Socialist Party of Venezuela is ready to present 100% of the electoral tallies that are in our hands," he said.

The United States, Brazil, Chile and others have urged the electoral authority – which the opposition accuses of being in Maduro's pocket - to publish a full breakdown of results.

"Our patience and that of the international community is running out," said White House national security spokesperson John Kirby yesterday. "It's running out on waiting for the Venezuelan electoral authorities to come clean and release the full detailed data on this election."

The dispute has led to widespread protests that Maduro and his government have denounced as an attempted coup. Gonzalez has said 11 protesters have died. Maduro has said Gonzalez and

Machado should be held accountable for alleged crimes of the protesters. Jorge Rodriguez, the head of the

Congress for Maduro's ruling socialists, insisted on Tuesday that both opposition figures should be arrested. "The bosses (of the protesters)

should go to prison," he told lawmakers. The government has said two

members of the security forces also died and has invited people to report crimes associated with what it calls "fascist activities" via an app. Fears were growing among the opposition on Wednesday that

police would arrest Gonzalez and Machado, who last appeared in public in Caracas on Tuesday. "I alert the world about a cruel

Last week, he denied to Reuters that Venezuela prosecutes people for their political beliefs.

Germany summons Chinese envoy over cyberattack

Germany has summoned the Chinese ambassador. to Berlin over a 2021 cyberattack by "state actors" who were seeking to spy on a crucial government mapping agency, officials said yesterday. Western nations have been increasingly voicing concerns about cyber breaches by Beijing-backed groups directed at targets ranging from lawmakers to democratic institutions. In the latest case revealed yesterday, the German government said

the Federal Agency for Cartography and Geodesy - a branch of science related to studying the Earth - had been hit. The agency, which officials said performs an "important function" for state and

private- sector institutions, makes products such as

printed and digital maps and other digital tools. "This serious cyberattack on a federal authority shows how great the danger posed by Chinese cyberattacks and espionage is," Interior Minister Nancy Faeser said.

"We call on China to refrain from and prevent such cyberattacks... (which) threaten the digital sovereignty of Germany and Europe.' Intelligence services concluded after an investigation that "Chinese state actors" were behind the attack and that it was for "espionage purposes", according to the foreign ministry. The investigation found that one of the agency's networks had been compromised.

Is America ready for its first-ever First Gentleman?

If Kamala Harris wins the US presidential election she will make history – and so will her husband Doug Emhoff.

The ebullient 59-year-old lawyer will be the first-ever First Gentleman if Harris, succeeds in becoming the first woman president in the United States' nearly two-and-a-half-century existence.

Emhoff has already got used to blazing something of a trail of his own alongside his trailblazing wife, who's also 59.

He has leaned into his role as the first Second Gentleman, proving an energetic campaigner and fierce defender of Harris in her initially bumpy tenure as the first female, Black and South Asian vice-president.

In vet another milestone, Emhoff is also the first Jewish spouse of an American president or vicepresident, taking a very visible role in President Joe Biden's

administration combating anti-Semitism.

He is now enthusiastic about the prospect of following in the footsteps of famous Democratic first spouses, like Jackie Kennedy, Michelle Obama and Jill Biden but as the first man to hold the

Where he doesn't have a record is in being the first prospective First Gentleman, a title claimed by former president Bill Clinton during his wife Hillary Clinton's failed 2016 run.

"I'm honoured now to have my wife be at the top of the ticket," he told a podcast recently. The sudden change in Harris's fortunes caught Emhoff short. He said that when Joe Biden dropped out of the race he was in the gym with his phone off — leading to a flood of missed texts and calls,

including from Harris. "Never leaving my phone in the car again," he said on X.

The swift swap in the Democratic ticket has raised questions about whether America is ready to overcome racism and sexism

to choose a Black woman president - but Emhoff would be a paradigm shift too. Republicans are already attacking

him, based partly on race. Harris's campaign on Tuesday slammed "Trump's despicable attack against the Second Gentleman" after Trump nodded along while an interviewer said Emhoff was a "crappy Jew." Trump himself then said that Harris "doesn't like Jewish people." Yet Emhoff has long shown he can give as good as he gets. "Mr Trump, I know you have so much trouble pronouncing her name," Emhoff said in a recent video, referring to Trump's habit of mispronouncing Kamala. "After the election, you can just call her Madam President." An entertainment lawyer, Emhoff met then-California Attorney General Harris on a blind date in 2013 and they married a year later. That made Harris a stepmother to Emhoff's then-teenage son and daughter from his previous marriage, Cole and Ella. Famously, they dubbed her "Momala".

In 2020 he took a leave of absence from his law firm to campaign for Harris in her first presidential bid, and then in January 2021 officially became Second Gentleman. Emhoff admits the transition wasn't easy, with some of the "toughest moments" caused by "leaving the career that I loved." "It was always the president (Biden) who came up to me and said, 'Look, I know, I know, kid. You're a great lawyer. I know this must have been tough," Emhoff told campaign staff last week. Since then he's taken a high-profile role in the Biden administration, particularly in a series of speeches calling out anti-Semitism after the October 7 attacks by Hamas on

At the same time Harris has been vocal in urging Israel to ease the suffering in Gaza, meaning that as a couple they have effectively bridged a deep divide in the Democratic Party.
