inister for Foreign Affairs of the Kingdom of Swelen Tobias Billstrom said that the visit of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani to Stockholm presents an opportunity to deepen and strengthen bilateral ties with Qatar, especially as it coincides with the 50th anniversary of diplomatic relations between the two coun-

In an interview with Qatar News Agency (QNA), he said that the visit is the first by a Head of State from the Gulf region to Sweden and will make a strong, dynamic and important relation even stronger and open new horizons for enhancing co-operation in various fields. He also praised the current level of relations between the two countries.

He explained: "We highly value our bilateral relations with Qatar and see great potential in deepening our collaboration on multiple

fronts. One key area is issues of ecurity where have both much knowledge and many experiences to exchange. Qatar is a valued partner not only to Sweden but to Nato, which Sweden recently became a member of. This creates an even wider platform for collaboration."

His Highness the Amir's visit will also witness the signing of several MoUs between the two countries, he added.

Billstrom said that both Sweden and Qatar strive for and contribute to a more secure, sustainable and peaceful world, noting that Oatar is also a valued partner of the EU, and the EU-Gulf partnership is another excellent avenue for expanding co-operation on issues including trade, sustainability, and climate change.

The Swedish foreign minister noted that an important mechanism for enhancing the bilateral relations is the frequent visits and contacts between the two countries, expressing hope for an increase in the number of official visits exchanged. To Page 15

Netanyahu not doing enough to secure Gaza deal: Biden

S President Joe Biden said yesterday that Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu was not doing enough to secure a deal for the release of hostages held in Gaza and the US was close to presenting a final proposal to negotiators working on a ceasefire agreement.

Biden when asked whether he thought Netanyahu was doing enough to reach a hostage deal with Palestinian resistance movement Hamas, Biden said "No". He did not elaborate.

Asked if he was planning to present a final hostage deal to both sides this week. Biden said: "We're very close to that."

"Hope springs eternal," he added when asked whether a deal would be

successful. Biden and Vice-President Kamala

New education strategy in line with NDS3, QNV 2030: minister

E the Minister of Education and Higher Education Buthaina bint Ali al-Jabr al-Nuaimi announced the launch of the ministry's new 2024-2030 strategy titled 'Igniting the Spark of Learning'.

She affirmed that this strategy aligns seamlessly with the objectives of Qatar's Third National Development Strategy (NDS3) and the Qatar National Vision (QNV)

Speaking at the launch ceremony, HE al-Nuaimi emphasised that the strategy aims to identify opportunities and overcome challenges in the coming years by fostering innovation and excellence in education. It focuses on enhancing and professionally developing teachers' skills while preparing a resilient generation capable of

confronting future challenges.

She highlighted the comprehensive nature of the new strategy, which encompasses all stages of learning from early childhood to post-secondary and vocational education. To elucidate its scope, she presented a detailed overview outlining the strategy's phases, core pillars, and the goals intended to be achieved through various associated programs and projects.

She underscored that investing in human education has always been a paramount priority for Qatar's wise leadership, which has consistently dedicated substantial human and material resources to this sector. She noted that the launch of the Third National Development Strategy earlier this year reaffirms education's role not only as a fundamental pillar

of human development but also as a crucial driver for achieving comprehensive and sustainable progress across diverse fields.

Describing the strategy as a guiding compass for Qatar's educational journey toward realising national aspirations, HE al-Nuaimi affirmed that to successfully 'Ignite the spark of Learning' that illuminates path to the future, it is a must to adhere to scientific methodologies, demonstrate unwavering determination, and consistently keep motivations and objectives at the forefront.

Further detailing the strategic roadmap for the education sector, she outlined its goal to establish an inclusive and innovative educational environment that reinforces values, ethics, and skills. This environment is designed to nurture a

conscientious generation capable of contributing to a progressive society and a thriving economy.

Addressing early childhood education, she noted that the ministry aims to increase pre-primary enrolment rates, which currently stand at 44%, voicing resolve to double this percentage by 2030 through expanding public and private nurseries and kindergartens, enhancing their quality, and boosting family awareness about the importance of early education.

In support of this objective, HE the minister announced amendments to public school regulations to commence education at the age of three, alongside the opening of eight new classrooms dedicated to this age group. She affirmed the ministry's commitment to further expansion, aiming to incorporate

all public kindergartens within the next five years. Discussing primary and secondary education, she stressed that the ministry strives to cultivate positive learning attitudes among students, instil commendable values, and build strong character by providing a stimulating and secure educational environment that supports holistic growth socially, psychologically, health-wise, and academically.

It will look to develop their cognitive abilities and skills in line with future requirements, enhancing curricula and aligning learning resources and methodologies with the skills and knowledge required to be mastered.

This involves upgrading academic and vocational guidance methodologies, including smooth educational paths for all students, accelerating the paths of the gifted and providing them with the possibility of early planning for the higher education stage.

Also, developing the performance of government schools to raise the level of education outcomes for all grades by updating the school supervision model and increasing the competencies of school leadership to improve operations management through support plans dedicated to each school according to its needs, while ensuring the availability of high-quality expertise.

Dr Tinubu-Karch said that it is a huge achievement for Qatar: "It is not happening in the US, not Europe, but Qatar is doing it."

The official noted that Sidra Medicine, over the last five years, has become a regional expert in precision medicine, the next generation of healthcare.

"Precision medicine is essentially

targeting specific therapies to specific people, based on unique information of that individual," Dr Tinubu-Karch said. "We went with the research and now we are at the point to actually deliver diagnostic care. Because of our tripartite mission of research, education, and clinical care, we are now able to take care of those diseases."

The official said that Oatar and Sidra Medicine will be perfectly positioned to begin therapeutic solutions for the rare diseases.

"And so it is an incredible trajectory. And the great thing is that it is not just Sidra Medicine," she highlighted. "It is an ecosystem that has been fuelled by the Qatar Foundation and the incredible investment in research.

Dr Tinubu-Karch said that Sidra Medicine is expanding genetic services to do more genetic and diagnostic testing.

"We can open up the testing to those who are now coming into Qatar for treatment," she said. "We are expanding our rehabilitative services and embracing artificial intelligence to drive our precision health research."

"10 years from now, Sidra Medicine will be a pioneer in the treatment of paediatric rare diseases and manufacturing groundbreaking gene therapy drugs," Dr Tinubu-Karch added.

National oral health campaign launched

he Ministry of Public Health (MoPH), in co-operation with the Hamad Medical Corporation (HMC)) and the Primary Health Care Corporation (PHCC), has launched the national campaign for oral health 2024, which will continue throughout September, under the slogan Your teeth are the gateway to your health.

The ministry said that the main focus of the campaign is the importance of caring for oral and dental health among all members of Qatari society.

The MoPH also noted that the campaign aims to raise awareness among all members of society, such as children, adolescents, adults, and the elderly, and to establish the concept of "a healthy mouth in a healthy body" and change negative habits that affect oral and dental health, such as "smoking, consumption of foods and drinks full of sugar" and increase awareness about the importance of daily care for oral health.

The ministry added that the campaign also aims to encourage a healthy diet to have a healthy mouth and teeth by reducing the percentage of sugar in foods and drinks and following a healthy diet, with the aim of reducing the rate of tooth decay in children.

It revealed that the percentage of tooth decay among children in the 2017 national survey for ages 4-8 years was

The campaign, which is being implemented for the sixth consecutive year, includes the Ministry of Education and Higher Education (MoEHE), Ministry of Interior (MoI), QatarEnergy, Heart Hospital, Elderly Care Centre, Sidra Medicine, Aster Hospital, Ahli Hospital, Turkish Hospital, Doha Clinic Hospital, Al Emadi Hospital, Aman Hospital, and The View Hospital.

The campaign is part of the outputs of the National Oral and Dental Health Committee and includes the publication of educational awareness publications about oral and dental health in general, through the social media platforms of the MoPH and the social platforms of health sector partners, in addition to display screens at the public entrances of government and private hospitals and health centres, throughout the month of the event.

There will be virtual awareness lectures on the importance of oral health to all ministries and institutions in the country, with the aim of reaching the largest possible number of community members in Qatar.

An awareness event will be organised targeting all students of Qatar Foundation in the last week of September, to introduce students to the National Oral Health Campaign and the importance of taking care of oral and dental health in general. - QNA


Philippines reaffirms 'no placement fee' for **Qatar-bound OFWs**

The Philippine Department of Migrant Workers (DMW) reiterated its dedication to protecting the rights of overseas Filipino workers (OFWs) by issuing a circular that underscores the strict enforcement of the "no placement fee" policy for Filipinos bound for Qatar.

This move aligns with Qatar's existing labour laws, which prohibit recruitment agencies from charging any fees for recruitment, expenses or other associated costs, according to the Philippine embassy in Doha.

The announcement stressed that Qatar is classified as a nonplacement fee labour-receiving



country. This means that licensed recruitment agencies are explicitly barred from collecting any form of payment related to recruitment fees from workers heading to Qatar.

The DMW circular, signed by Secretary Hans Leo J Cacdac, draws attention to Article 33 of Qatar Law No 14 of 2004, which clearly states that recruitment

agencies are not permitted to charge any sum for recruitmentrelated expenses.

This directive is further supported by Section 56 (b) of the DMW's 2023 Department Circular No 01, titled "Promulgating the 2023 Department of Migrant Workers Rules and Regulations Governing the Recruitment and Employment of Landbased Overseas Filipino Workers", which governs the recruitment and employment of land-based

The DMW has warned that violators of the no placement fee policy will face serious administrative penalties, including the cancellation of their licenses as stipulated under Section 139 (m) Rule II. Part VI of the aforementioned rules and regulations.

Awgaf opens new mosque at Al Ugdah

The Ministry of Endowments (Awqaf) and Islamic Affairs, represented by the Department of Mosques, has opened a new mosque at Al Uqdah Area.

The Hilal Bin Mohamed Ibrahim Al Mohannadi Mosque has space for 1.135 male and female worshippers. Spread over an area of 3,467sq m, the mosque has houses for the Imam and Muezzin.

The new mosque, according to an official statement from Awqaf, was endowed by Ibrahim Hilal al-Mohannadi and built within Awqaf's plan to expand the number of mosques and develop them in all regions of the country while keeping pace with urban and population growth. This is in line with Qatar National Vi-

With number MS 1402, the mosque has a main prayer hall with space for 850 worshippers, in addition to a daily prayer hall that can accommodate 180 worshippers. Also, there is a hall for women worshippers and this can accommodate 105 worshippers. The mosque also includes a spacious ablution place in addition to a large number of public parking lots, including those for persons with disabilities. The entrances and exits of the mosque are disabled-friendly.

The Department of Engineering Affairs at the ministry is concerned with fulfilling the needs of the regions in the country for mosques and prayer grounds while providing temporary mosques and supervising their preservation as well as preparing the annual plan for the maintenance of mosques and imams' residences. These are in co-ordination with the competent authorities.

In mosque designs, the department takes into account the requirements of different areas along with



the guidelines for green and sustainable buildings. Also, the department focuses on the conditions for sustainability in the use of electricity and water, and preserving the aesthetics of heritage in design that reflect the authenticity of Qatari and Islamic heritage of the highest standards.

The Ministry of Endowments' plans to build mosques also take into account the population density map along with engineering, architectural specifications and the heritage aspect within the framework of caring for the mosques to enable worship and to serve the worshippers.

Awgaf's website provides the facility to search for mosque locations geographically, according to the global navigation system, through accurate and specific maps that facilitate access to mosque locations in all cities across the country.

Ministry permits brick use in barn complexes

The owners of the barns within barn complexes can now use bricks for attachment buildings, including majlis (reception area), workers' accommodation and storehouses.

The Ministry of Municipality posted on its X account that as part of protecting and maintaining private property, it has permitted willing barn owners to use bricks for such buildings according to certain standards and

The maximum allowed height above the ground is four metres, and the roof has to be insulated corrugated sheet of 7cm thickness. The ministry stressed that concrete and iron must not be used in the building process. The permit to use bricks in some specific buildings applies only to the owners of the barns within the barn complexes according to the building spaces permitted.

The numbers of livestock heads raised by



local barn owners have been steadily increasing over the past few years raising the share of local production of red meat and dairy products to unprecedented volumes within the local market. Qatar currently enjoys 100% selfsufficiency in dairy products, compared to only around 28% in 2016. Similarly, local red meat production is above 18% of the requirement while it was around 14% in 2016.

Accordingly, the prospects of the livestock industry looks positive despite the challenges that often encounter investors in these sectors, which mainly involve the high cost of business operations, including that of certain types of fodder, veterinary services and drugs. The Livestock Department at the Ministry of Municipality pays close attention to the demands of livestock owners and offers them various means of support and subsidies to help improve production. The registered barn owners get concentrated fodder and other

types of subsidised fodder. In addition, the ministry supplies them with drinking water and there is collaboration with the Ministry of Interior to facilitate recruitment of workforce for the barns. Besides, there are a number of initiatives in cooperation with various related entities to help livestock owners market their sheep and goats at competitive prices.

Most barn complexes have easy access to livestock marketing yards, public veterinary clinics and services market nearby. Free veterinary visits are conducted at these complexes.

According to a recent report, the number of livestock owners in the country was 8.151 with around 62% having sheep estimated at more than 813,941 heads and 27% goats, with more than 358,137 heads.

Dar Al Salam Model Village



70% of UNRWA schools in Gaza 'damaged'

N Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA) Commissioner-General Philippe Lazzarini said that more than 70% of UNRWA schools in the Gaza Strip have either been destroyed or damaged, with the vast majority of them now serving as overcrowded shelters to hundreds of thousands of displaced families, which means that they cannot be used for learning.

Lazzarini warned in a post on X yesterday saying: "The longer children stay out of school, the higher the risk of a lost generation." On the occasion of the start of the back-to-school season in the region, minus Gaza, the UN-RWA commissioner-general said: "More than 600,000 children there are deeply traumatised,

living in the rubble. They continue to be deprived of learning and schooling. Half of them used to be in UNRWA schools." Lazzarini added that in the absence of a ceasefire in Gaza, children are likely to fall prey to exploitation, as is the case too often in conflicts

around the world, calling for this not to be allowed to happen in Gaza.

Last week, the UNRWA commissioner-general accused Israel of purchasing Google ads to discredit UNRWA and to discourage donations to it. (QNA)

Palestinian dies in detention amid troops' West Bank operation

sraeli troops handed the body of a Palestinian man arrested hours earlier in the occupied West Bank to Palestinian health authorities yesterday, as a major operation in the flashpoint city of Jenin continued for a sixth day.

The Palestinian Red Crescent said it had received the body of 58 year-old Ayman Rajeh Abed from the village of Kafr Dan, just outside Jenin after he was arrested around dawn yesterday. The director of the Wissam Bakr hospital in Jenin said the body bore signs of beatings and torture.

The Israeli military said Abed had been detained during counterterrorism operations and experienced a "cardiac event" on arrival at a detention facility. He was given initial treatment by medical staff from the military, before being evacuated to the hospital in Jenin. "The IDF is aware of reports that the suspect died during his evacuation by the Red Crescent," it said in a statement, adding that details of the incident were under review.

The incident occurred as Israeli forces extended their operations in Jenin to villages around the city, where bulldozers con-

tinued to dig up streets and major thoroughfares to find roadside bombs.

Israel launched the operation, one of the largest in months, last Wednesday, saying foreignbacked fighter groups were planning to attack civilian targets.

Hundreds of troops backed by drones and helicopters have taken part in the operation which has caused extensive damage to houses and infrastructure in Jenin and the densely packed refugee camp adjacent to the city. At least 29 Palestinians have been killed, most of whom have been claimed as members by armed factions including Hamas and Islamic Jihad. Another 121 people have been wounded, according to Palestinian health authorities.

Late on Sunday, a man was killed west of Jenin city.

Yesterday, the Palestinian Red Crescent said a man had been hit in the chest by gunfire in Qabatiya near Jenin. His condition was described as serious.

Saudi tanker, another oil ship attacked in Red Sea

Israeli strike kills two in southern Lebanon

n Israeli strike on a vehicle in south Lebanon killed two people yesterday, the health ministry said, nearly 11 months after increased violence between the Hezbollah movement and Israel.

The United Nations Force in Lebanon said one of those killed worked for a cleaning company contracted by UNIFIL.

Hamas ally Hezbollah has exchanged near daily cross-border fire with Israeli forces since the Palestinian group stormed Israel in the first week of October.

"The Israeli enemy's strike targeting a car in Naqura left two dead," the health ministry said.

A spokeswoman for UNIFIL said "a vehicle driven by an employee of a cleaning company was targeted by a strike on the Tyre-Naqura road," adding that the company was contracted to the peacekeeping force.

"Attacks on civilians are violations of international humanitarian law. They must stop. Once more, we urge all actors to put down their weapons," she said.

A security source earlier told AFP on condition of anonym-

Lebanon's official National News Agency (NNA) reported a drone strike on the Naqura road, without elaborating.

There was no immediate Israeli comment about the attack. Israel has said it targets military infrastructure and Hezbollah fighters in Lebanon's south and east, while the movement says it is mainly targeting military positions in northern Israel.

Tunisia election body ignores court in presidential vote

unisia's electoral board said yesterday it approved three candidates for an October 6 presidential election, ignoring court rulings that had granted appeals by three other hopefuls who had been rejected.

The three dismissed candidates were among 14 potential contenders to be turned down by the electoral board, ISIE, last month for not obtaining enough endorsements to challenge President Kais Saied.

Last week, the three hopefuls unexpectedly won appeals at the administrative court against ISIE's decision, in a verdict the court called "definitive".

But yesterday, ISIE chief Farouk Bouasker said the board's initial list of candidates was also "definitive" and "not subject to appeal".

Bouasker said the ISIE was

maintaining the initial list because "the administrative court did not officially communicate its decisions within a 48-hour deadline, as per the law".

Saied, the incumbent and election frontrunner, was democratically elected in 2019 but orchestrated a sweeping power grab in 2021 and has since ruled by decree.

Former parliamentarian Zouhair Maghzaoui and businessman Ayachi Zammel are now his only challengers in next month's poll.

Mpox patients lack medicine, food in east DR Congo hospital

pozens of feverish patients lay on thin mattresses on the floor of a makeshift mpox isolation ward in east Democratic Republic of Congo, as overstretched hospital workers grappled with drug shortages and lack of space to accommodate the influx.

Congo is the epicentre of an mpox outbreak that the World Health Organisation declared to be a global public health emergency last month.

Vaccines are set to arrive within days to fight the new strain of the virus, while Congo's President Felix Tshisekedi has allowed a first \$10mn disbursement to fight the outbreak.

But at the hospital complex

in the town of Kavumu, where 900 symptomatic patients have been taken in over the past three months, health workers are desperate for support.

"We run out of medicine every day," said head doctor Musole Mulamba Muva.

"There are many challenges we struggle to overcome with our local means," he said, noting that donations from international organisations rapidly dwindled.

Last week there were 135 patients in the mpox ward, children and adults combined, crammed between three large plastic tents pitched into damp earth without a floor cover.

Relatives that usually provide the bulk of meals in underfunded public facilities such as the Kavumu hospital were banned from visiting the mpox ward to avoid contamination. "We do not have

anything to eat," said Nzigire Lukangira, the 32-year-old mother of a hospitalised toddler.
"When we ask for something

to lower our children's temperature, they do not give us anything," she said, coaxing honey into her daughter's mouth.

The head of Congo's mpox response team, Cris Kacita, acknowledged that parts of the vast central African country lacked medicine and that dispatching donations, including 115 tonnes of medicine from the World Bank, was a priority.

TRADITIONAL REMEDIES

Mpox causes flu-like symptoms and pus-filled lesions and, while usually mild, it can kill. Children, pregnant women and people with weakened immune systems are all at higher risk of complications.

Like other mothers in the Kavumu mpox ward, Lukangira had started improvising with traditional remedies to ease her baby's pain. They dipped their fingers in potassium bicarbonate or salty lemon juice and popped their children's blisters. Adult patients did the same to themselves.

Most cases came from the

town itself and surrounding villages. Two other makeshift mpox wards have been set up in the area.

Local health ministry repre-

cikuru, called on the government to continue pushing for vaccines.

Kacita said high-risk contacts and nine priority areas had already been identified for the first vaccination stage.

There were 19,710 suspected cases of mpox reported since the start of the year in Congo by Aug 31, according to the health ministry. Of those, 5,041 were con-

firmed and 655 were fatal.

US seizes Maduro's plane in Dominican Republic, flies it to Florida

he United States has seized a plane used by Venezuelan President Nicolas Maduro and flown it from the Dominican Republic to Florida after determining that its purchase violated US sanctions, the US Justice Department said

The seizure of the aircraft came amid continuing pressure on Maduro at home and abroad over a contested July 28 election that he claimed to have won, while the opposition said its vote tallies showed its candidate to have soundly defeated him.

Maduro, his associates and the Opec member-state's vital oil sector are under heavy US sanctions, and his handling of the election has raised the prospects that further measures could be imposed.

US Attorney-General Merrick Garland said in a statement that the Dassault Falcon 900EX aircraft was illegally purchased for \$13mn through a shell company and smuggled out of the US "for use by Nicolas Maduro and his cronies".

"Let this seizure send a clear message: aircraft illegally acquired from the United States for the benefit of sanctioned Venezuelan officials cannot just fly off into the sunset," said Matthew Axelrod, the US Commerce Department's Assistant Secretary for Export Enforcement.

US officials said the seizure, which was first reported by CNN, was carried out working closely with the Dominican Re-

Aircraft tracking site Flight Radar 24 showed that the jet flew from Santo Domingo to Fort Lauderdale yesterday morn-

The Venezuelan government did not immediately respond to a request for com-

"This is an important step to ensure that Maduro continues to feel the consequences from his misgovernance of Venezuela," said a spokesperson for the White House National Security Council.

A wide range of independent sources

has shown that Maduro and his representatives "have tampered with the results of the July 28 presidential election, falsely claimed victory and carried out widespread repression to maintain power by force", the spokesperson added.

The United States, the European Union and several Latin American countries have refused to recognise Maduro as having won without seeing detailed voting results.

Trump says he had 'every right' to interfere in 2020 election

ormer US president Donald Trump (pictured), who faces fodor: state charges for allegedly trying to overturn his 2020 election loss to President Joe Biden, insists that he had "every right" to interfere in the election.

"Whoever heard you get indicted for interfering with a presidential election where you have every right to do it?" he said in a Fox News interview that aired on Sunday.

A federal indictment accuses Trump of defrauding the United States by preventing Congress from certifying Biden's victory and depriving voters of their right to a fair

He faced a revised federal indictment last month accusing him of illegally trying to overturn his 2020 election loss.

Trump faces similar charges in Fulton County, Georgia, where he was also charged with racketeering, which is used to target members of organised crime groups and carries a penalty of up to 20 years in

That case, which is on hold while a state appeals court weights the district attorney's role, stems from a January 2, 2021, phone call in which Trump urged Georgia's top election official, Brad Raffensperger, to "find" enough votes to reverse his narrow loss in the state.

Raffensperger declined to do so.

Trump, who is the current Republican nominee for president, has not said whether he would unconditionally accept the results of the November 5 election if his Democratic rival, Vice-President Kamala Harris, wins.

Biden, Harris to make first joint campaign appearance

resident Joe Biden and Kamala Harris (**pictured**) hit the campaign trail together for the first time yesterday, in a public display of unity after she replaced him as candidate and revived Democratic election hopes.

81-year-old president The bowed out in late July under mounting pressure after his disastrous debate performance against Donald Trump.

His rapid endorsement of Vice-President Harris, 59, saw her quickly shore up party support and she became the formal Democratic nominee last month.

Riding a wave of fresh enthusiasm, she has held packed rallies in try and raked in cash donations for the final two-month stretch of the campaign.

Polls show her entry improving the party's chances at defeating Republican Trump, but with the race still neck and neck.

Harris last appeared with Biden after his speech two weeks ago at the Democratic National Convention in Chicago.

As she works to define her platform, the vice-president has sought to promise changes, while avoiding criticism of Biden's ten-

With Monday being the national Labour Day holiday, Biden and Harris were expected to argue that she would be better for workers than Trump, choosing the unionheavy city of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania as the backdrop.

"The most pro-labour admin-

dent Biden and Vice-President Harris's leadership, support for union membership has grown to its highest level in half a century," her campaign said in a statement previewing the day's events.

Pennsylvania is one of a handful of states that will decide the election, and is viewed as possibly the one on which the outcome will

Harris and Biden will speak at a union hall where they will meet local members.

Harris is expected to say that US Steel - which Japan's Nippon Steel is seeking to buy - should remain domestically owned, a campaign official said.

During a campaign tour last week in swing-state Georgia, Harris held her first in-depth interview since becoming the party standard-bearer, accompanied

Governor Tim Walz.

Harris aimed to stake out a centrist position in the CNN sitdown, insisting that she will be tough on illegal immigration and support oil and gas fracking - but not abandon her long-time liberal

In her 2020 campaign, Harris had pledged to ban fracking - a major source of income in Pennsvlvania.

Yesterday's joint appearance with Biden is also seen as launching the two-month sprint to the November vote, with Labour Day marking the traditional end to the US summer.

Before the Pittsburgh rally, Biden and Harris received a briefing at the White House on ceasefire negotiations in the Israel-Hamas

The meeting was added to their

After the briefing, Harris headed to Detroit, Michigan for another event with union leaders, before joining Biden in Pittsburgh.

Yesterday five Supreme Court judges, including Moraes himself, voted in a virtual session to uphold his ruling.

"Elon Musk demonstrated his total disrespect for Brazilian sovereignty and, in particular, the judiciary, positioning himself as a true supranational entity, immune to the laws of countries," Moraes said in the new ruling.

His colleague Flavio Dino added that "freedom of expression does not excuse repeated violations of the legal system".

Chief Justice Luis Roberto Barroso, who was not on the review panel, said that removing legal representatives to avoid complying with court decisions "is a behaviour that would not be acceptable anywhere in the world".

Three of the justices on the panel said the suspension could be reversed if the plat-

form complied with previous rulings.

Yesterday Musk replied "Exactly" to a post that described the suspension as an attack on freedom of expression and Brazil-

Musk, who also owns Tesla and SpaceX, reacted with fury to last Friday's order, branding Moraes as an "evil dictator cosplaying as a judge" and accusing him of trying to destroy democracy in Brazil".

The standoff began when Moraes ordered the suspension of several X accounts belonging to supporters of Brazil's former farright president Jair Bolsonaro.

Bolsonaro had tried to discredit the voting systems used during the country's 2022 elections, which he lost.

Brazilian authorities are investigating whether Bolsonaro plotted a coup attempt to prevent his successor, Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva, from assuming office in January 2023.

Online users blocked by Moraes include far-right ex-congressman Daniel Silveira, who was sentenced to nine years in prison in 2022 on charges of leading a movement to overthrow the Supreme Court.

In April, Moraes ordered an investigation

of Musk, accusing him of reactivating some of the banned accounts.

Musk is also the subject of a separate investigation into the alleged use of public money to orchestrate disinformation campaigns in favour of Bolsonaro and those

The suspension of X came just over a month before municipal elections are to be held in Brazil.

In August, X announced it was shuttering its offices in Brazil due to the Moraes's actions, but assured clients they would still have access to its services.

Until Friday, X counted about 22mn users in Brazil, according to the site DataReportal.

As X remained inaccessible for most users in Brazil, local telecom regulator Anatel told Reuters that Starlink, a satellite Internet provider also controlled by Musk, was not blocking X.

Starlink was refusing to do so until a freeze on its Brazilian bank accounts was

Moraes last week froze Starlink's accounts after X did not pay fines imposed for failing to turn over documents.

10,000 US hotel staff strike as contract talks break down

ome 10,000 US hotel workers began a multi-day strike in several cities on Sunday after contract talks with hotel operators Marriott International, Hilton Worldwide, and Hyatt Hotels stalled, the Unite Here union said.

Unite Here, which represents workers in hotels, casinos, and airports across the United States and Canada, said thousands of workers at 24 hotels are on strike in some major travel destinations including San Francisco and San Diego in California, Hawaii's capital city Honolulu, Boston, Seattle, and Greenwich, Connecticut, with workers from additional cities ready to join the walkout as the Labor Day holiday weekend continues.

The strike is taking place with the industry facing a 9% increase in Labour Day weekend domestic travel compared to last year, according to AAA booking data.

"Strikes have also been authorised and could begin at any time" in Baltimore, New Haven, Oakland, and Providence, the union said in a statement, as hotel workers and operators struggle to agree on wages and on reversing pandemic-era job cuts.

Hotel workers are stretched thin, according to the union, with management frequently assigning three staff members to do the job of four. This leads to undue stress and a focus on speed over service.

"Since (the coronavirus pandemic), they're expecting us to give five-star service with threestar staff," the union said, quoting a staff member at Marriott's Palace Hotel in San Francisco.

Hotel housekeepers in Baltimore are fighting to bring wages up to \$20 per hour from their current \$16.20. In Roston

make \$28 per hour, the union is seeking a \$10 per hour raise by the end of four years. Hilton and Hyatt said they re-

main committed to negotiating a fair agreement with the union.

Hyatt has contingency plans in place to minimize the impact on hotel operations related to potential strike activity, Michael D'Angelo, head of labour relations at the luxury hotel chain said in a statement.

Marriott did not respond to a Reuters request for comment.

The strike comes as 40,000 Unite Here hotel workers across 20 cities face expiring contracts this year.

Negotiations for new four-year contracts have been taking place since May, and about 15,000 of those workers have authorised strikes in 12 markets.

The union has urged travellers to cancel their hotel stays if the workers are on strike, and to demand penalty-free refunds. -

Lopez Obrador gives final report as opponents, US fret

'exico's President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador (pic**tured**) presented on Sunday the final report of his government, defending his legacy a month before turning power over to his successor along with a congressional supermajority and a highly controversial judicial reform plan.

In the Zocalo, Mexico City's sprawling central square, Lopez Obrador bade farewell to thousands of enthusiastic followers, buoyed by what polls say is a lofty 73% approval rating as his sixyear term winds down.

"We are living in a true democracy, building a new homeland" and "laying the foundations to begin a new stage." he said in a speech that lasted nearly

two hours. A party-like atmosphere pervaded the square, which was filled with supporters - and animated by musical groups and folk dancers - two hours



before the speech began.

Some attendees ate snacks under umbrellas, seeking relief from a hot sun, as they waited for Lopez Obrador, widely known by his initials AMLO.

"I came because it is the farewell of one of the most historic presidents in the country," Jose Luis Diaz, a 39-yearold entrepreneur, told AFP. "We won't see another president like him for 100

Daniela Barrera, a 27-year-old who says she comes from an "Obradorist" family, said Lopez Obrador's greatest achievement was generating hope for

Mexico. The presidential report is a tradition in Mexican politics, an annual review of governmental progress not unlike a US president's State of the Union address. On October 1, Lopez Obrador will

hand power to a fellow member of his Morena party, Claudia Sheinbaum. Elected June 2 by an overwhelming 60% of Mexico's 36mn voters, she will

be the country's first woman presi-Sheinbaum will also inherit a package of constitutional reforms initiated under Lopez Obrador, including a controversial reform of the judiciary that opponents see as a worryingly auto-

cratic move by the governing party. At the heart of that reform is a proposal to elect judges and magistrates by popular vote.

The leftist government argues that the judiciary now serves the political and economic elite, not the public. However, detractors say the plan will

dangerously politicise the justice system, compromising its independence. The proposal has already sparked a strike by affected workers, and thou-

sands of students marched against it on Sunday in the capital, chanting slogans like "wake up Mexico, we are your defence" and "justice is not something you vote on".

For the United States - Mexico's principal trade partner, buying 83% of its exports - the reform represents a risk for democracy and a threat to the free trade agreement linking the two countries and Canada, according to US

ambassador Ken Salazar. In response, Lopez Obrador has decreed a "pause" in relations with Salazar - though not with the administra-

tion of President Joe Biden. Although the reform plan reached Congress months ago, it will only be debated or voted on by the new legislature, which was formally seated on

In the new congress, the governing Morena party and its allies will enjoy the supermajorities they achieved in the June elections, controlling twothirds of seats in the lower house and nearly the same proportion in the Sen-

Logger operating near isolated Peru tribe has certification suspended

An international forestry group has suspended the sustainability certification of a logging company operating on land near an uncontacted tribe in Peru's Amazon, the non-governmental organisation (NGO) Survival International said yesterday, handing an initial victory to groups demanding a stop to logging in the

The Forest Stewardship Council (FSC) withdrew its certification of the Canales Tahuamanu company for eight months after members of the Mashco Piro tribe were seen in late June in a remote area of the Madre de Dios region of Peru, the NGO said.

It said the FSC certification would be suspended from September 13 while the forestry group investigates the case and meets with Peruvian authorities to "understand the land classification issues" in the Andean country.

Peru's government and Canales Tahuamanu did not immediately reply to a request for comment. The Mascho Piru are fleeing their shelters to escape from loggers who have forestry concessions granted by the authorities, according to indigenous organisations in Peru.

According to the FSC and Peru's Forest and Wildlife Resources Supervisory Agency, the Canales Tahuamanu logging company has concessions on almost 53,000 hectares of forest in Madre de Dios where it extracts cedar and mahogany. - Reuters

Swathes of China, Japan log record summer temperatures

Swathes of China logged the hottest August on record last month, the weather service said, as Japanese authorities announced that this summer had been the ioint warmest since records began. China's weather service said average air temperatures last month in eight provinces, regions and cities "ranked the hottest for the same period" since records began. Extreme heat has seared much of East Asia this summer, with Japan saying yesterday that its long-term average temperature between June and August was 1.76C above the standard value - equalling the level seen in summer 2023 - the highest since statistics started being kept in 1898.

Australia home prices nudge higher in August

Australian home prices nudged higher in August, posting a 19th straight monthly rise, though the pace of growth showed some signs of slowing, data showed vesterday. Figures from property consultant CoreLogic showed national home prices rose 0.5% in August, slightly above the downwardly revised 0.3% rise in July. Prices, which have continued to hit record highs since bottoming out early last year, are up 7.1% from a year ago. Rates of increase across the cities remained diverse as prices rose 2% in Perth, followed by a 1.4% increase in Adelaide and 1.1% in Brisbane. Sydney rose a mild 0.3%, while prices dipped in Canberra, Melbourne, Darwin and Hobart.

Murdoch looks to buy UK property website Rightmove

REA Group, the Australian online real estate business majority-owned by Rupert Murdoch's News Corporation empire, said yesterday it is mulling a multi-billion-pound takeover of British peer Rightmove. Shares in Rightmove soared by 22% in afternoon deals on London's top-tier FTSE 100 index, giving it a market value of around £5.4bn (US\$7.1bn). In a statement published on the London Stock Exchange, REA Group did not reveal what it would be prepared to pay for Rightmove. Following media speculation, it confirmed "that it is considering a possible cash and share offer" for all of the British company. Rightmove had yet to comment on the news.

South Korea denies hospital emergency rooms collapsing

South Korea's health ministry yesterday said it was deploying military doctors to assist in some hospital emergency rooms due to a shortage of medical staff. but disputed a warning by some physicians that the system was on the verge of collapse. A strike by young doctors has increased strain on the medical system, but Vice Health Minister Park Min-soo said that while some hospitals had shortened the hours of emergency room operations and were working with fewer doctors reports that some hospitals had suspended ER operations were false. The government plans to initially send 15 military doctors to badly affected emergency rooms.

China urges EU to be 'objective, fair' on South China Sea issue

hina urged the European Union to be "objective and fair" and careful with words and actions on issues in the South China Sea, after the bloc remarked on an incident that occurred over the weekend.

China said it was "strongly dissatisfied" with the European Union's "accusations" against it on the issue, a statement by the Chinese mission to the EU showed.

"The European Union is not a party to the South China Sea issue and has no right to point fingers on the issue," it said.

It also said the EU's repeated "hyping up" on the freedom of navigation issue "has no benefits to the EU's own interests and international credibility".

China and the Philippines exchanged accusations of intentionally ramming coastguard vessels in disputed waters of the South China Sea on Saturday, the latest in an escalating series of clashes.

The collision near the Sabina Shoal was their fifth maritime confrontation in a month in a longstanding rivalry over the vital wa-

The EU said in a statement on Sunday that it condemned the "dangerous actions by China Coast Guard vessels against lawful Philippine maritime operations" in the

sea. In the statement, the EU External Action Service said the recent incidents between Chinese and Philippines authorities "endanger the safety of life at sea, and violate the right to freedom of navigation and overflight to which all nations are entitled under international law". Asked about the Chinese response, an EU spokesperson yesterday said the bloc has "a big stake in peace and security in Asia".

"A large portion of the EU's foreign trade passes through the South China Sea," the spokesperson add-

"The European Union calls for de-escalation of tensions and remains committed to supporting its partners seeking to exercise their legitimate rights, in the region and

Beijing yesterday insisted it was defending its "rights" in the South China Sea, after the Philippines released footage appearing to show a Chinese coast guard vessel ramming one of its ships during the at-sea confrontation.

Footage released by the Philippine coast guard of the incident appeared to show the Chinese vessel coming up from behind the ship and ram-

Another clip also showed what appeared to be a deliberate collision. Asked about the footage yesterday, foreign ministry spokeswoman Mao Ning reiterated Beijing's claim the Philippines had "deliberately rammed" the Chinese vessel.

11 dead as storm triggers landslides in Philippines

loods and landslides killed 11 people after a fierce tropical storm dumped heavy rain on the Philippines for a second day, officials said yesterday.

Tropical Storm Yagi slammed into the main island of Luzon yesterday after brushing past the Bicol region southeast of Manila overnight Sunday, with more heavy rain forecast which the state weather service said could cause flooding and more landslides.

As a precaution, schools and government offices across the capital were shut for the day,

ferry services in some areas were suspended and 29 domestic flights were cancelled due to the

Three people, including a pregnant woman, were killed in a landslide yesterday in Antipolo, near equally rain-soaked Manila, city information officer Relly Bonifacio said.

He said the bodies of four other people, all drowning victims, were recovered yesterday in three other areas of the hilly community, hours after creeks overflowed overnight.

The Bicol city of Naga was also hard-hit, with a man electrocuted as floodwaters rose and a baby girl drowning, rescuers said.

"The floods were above head height in some areas," Joshua Tuazon of the city's public safety

office said, adding that hundreds of residents had been rescued. More than 300 people were at evacuation camps yesterday, with local officials saying the floodwaters in the city of 210,000 people were slow to ebb.

Two landslides killed two people and damaged five houses in the central city of Cebu on Sunday, the local disaster office there said.

The storm also unleashed strong currents and big waves that wrought chaos in Manila Bay yesterday, hurling a barge and an oil tanker onto the seawall and causing another barge to run adrift, the coast guard said.

A tug and a small passenger ship also collided while both were anchored, causing a fire aboard the second vessel, it said in a statement.

Oasis fans' fury sparks UK government review of dynamic pricing

The British government has said it will probe surge pricing after furious Oasis fans faced huge hikes in ticket prices for the Britpop band's much-anticipated reunion.

Fans were left frustrated on Saturday when sales websites crashed due to sheer weight of demand.

But many who eventually made it to the front of the online queue hours after sales began were also dismayed to find their tickets had more than doubled in price.

Culture Secretary Lisa Nandy called the inflated prices "depressing" on Sunday, adding that the practice would be reviewed as part of the government's upcoming consultation on consumer protections in ticket sales and re-sales. "We will include issues around the transparency and use of dynamic pricing, including the technology around queuing systems which incentivise it," Nandy said.

Manipur insurgents launch drone attack

> nsurgents in India's Ma-nipur state have carried out ■a deadly attack on security forces, using drones to drop explosives in what police called a "significant escalation" of violence in the restive northeastern

> A 31-year-old women was killed and six people were wounded on Sunday in what police said was an "unprecedented attack" by rebels who used drones to drop the heads of rocket-propelled grenades.

Fighting broke out in Manipur in May 2023 between the Meitei and Kuki community, an ethnic conflict that has since killed at least 200 people.

Rival militias have set up blockades in parts of the state, which borders war-torn Myan-

Longstanding tensions between the two groups revolve around competition for land and public jobs, with rights activists accusing local leaders of exacerbating ethnic divisions for political gain.

"While drone bombs have commonly been used in general warfare, this recent deployment of drones to deploy explosives against security forces and the civilians marks a significant escalation," Manipur police said in a statement on Sunday.

The attack outside the state capital Imphal was carried out by "alleged Kuki" rebels, the statement said.

Those injured included an eight-year-old girl - the daughter of the woman who was killed - as well three civilians and two police officers.

Final report may not bring justice, say Grenfell Tower fire victims

even years on, Shah Aghlani still remembers clearly the call in the middle of the night from his distressed aunt who was trapped with his disabled mother in a 23-storey social housing block in west London that was on fire.

The two women in their late 50s and 60s both died, alongside 70 others, inside Grenfell Tower - Britain's deadliest residential fire since World War II and the subject of an inquiry that will publish its final re-

port tomorrow. The rapid spread of the blaze was

blamed on cheap flammable cladding, and the sight of the huge Grenfell Tower engulfed in flames, in one of the richest parts of London, in June 2017 came to symbolise the inequality that exists in Britain.

Survivors and the families of victims have since campaigned for the material to be stripped from tower blocks in Britain and across Europe, where similar fires have broken out, including in the Spanish city of Valencia this year.

They have focused on that while having to contend with a lack of justice, as the inquiry has delayed any criminal proceedings. Police said in May that any charges would not be announced until late 2026, and suspects might only face trial in 2027, a decade after the blaze.

"It's very painful for us, who lost a loved one, to see their death going in vain. It actually stops us from coming to a closure," Aghlani, 55, said, standing in front of a vivid mural near the tower bearing the message: "truth will not be hidden".

Tomorrow's report is expected to provide answers on the choice of cladding materials used in the tower's 2016 refurbishment carried out by the council of Kensington & Chelsea, the London borough where the building was located.

Witnesses included representatives of the architects, contractors and sub-contractors who carried

out the refurbishment, and from the

makers and sellers of the cladding. The government has said the inquiry will get to the truth of what happened, and provide justice for the community. The fire triggered widespread outrage in Britain, and the cladding - highly flammable aluminium composite material (ACM) - is now banned. The former Conservative government also took action to remove and replace existing ACM panels, which use polyethylene in their core, but progress has been limited.

As of July 2024, 4,630 buildings standing at 11 metres or higher still had unsafe cladding, with remediation work yet to start on half of them, government data showed.

After a fire engulfed a multistorey building in east London last week, Angela Rayner, deputy prime minister of the new Labour government, said officials had to move

Guillermo Rein, fire science professor at Imperial College London, said the world needed to learn from Grenfell, as the UK was the only nation that has identified buildings that use ACM cladding, as many others don't want to know.

The Grenfell Next of Kin group called for a global ban on unsafe cladding following the fire at a block of flats in Valencia, that killed 10

Rein added that criminal prosecutions would send a warning to the construction sector.

Kimia Zabihyan, from the Grenfell Next of Kin group, said the inquiry would provide very valuable information, but it had delayed justice.

"It actually got in the way of criminal prosecution," she said, noting that an inquiry looks into the facts and causes of an incident and often makes robust recommenda-

tions, but it is not a criminal court. Aghlani said he was running out of energy to fight for justice for his mother and aunt but he still hoped authorities would not "water down the prosecution" when the time

Scholz urges parties to isolate the far-right

erman Chancellor Olaf Scholz yesterday urged mainstream parties to avoid working with the far-right, after record gains by the AfD in two regional polls sent alarm bells ringing a year before a

In the former East German state of Thuringia, the anti-immigrant, anti-Islam AfD became the first far-right party to win a regional election since World War II, taking around 33% of the vote on Sunday.

The AfD was also headed for a close second place in neighbouring Saxony, just behind the conservative CDU.

Scholz, whose deeply unpopular threeparty coalition received a slapdown in both states, called the results "bitter".

"All democratic parties are now called upon to form stable governments without right-wing extremists," he said in a message on Facebook.

"Our country cannot and must not get used to this. The AfD is damaging Germany. It is weakening the economy, dividing society and ruining our country's reputation,"

Coalition governments are the norm in Germany at federal and state levels, and mainstream parties have consistently ruled out collaboration with the far right.

But AfD co-leader Alice Weidel said she

believed the "undemocratic firewall" was untenable given the party's electoral success in both states, while fellow leader Tino Chrupalla said there would be "no politics without the AfD".

In Thuringia, where the Nazi party first came to power in 1930, the AfD's large share of the vote means it will have a "blocking minority" in the regional parliament, giving

it special powers including the right to block judicial appointments.

In the city of Erfurt in Thuringia, 22-yearold pharmacy student Marius Guender said he felt "really depressed" at the outcome, adding that he wanted "a Germany that is there for everyone".

But Siegfried Koehler, 67, complained of "too many migrants".

"They easily get money (from the state), and us pensioners need pensions to go up," he told AFP.

The conservative CDU, the only centrist party to perform strongly on Sunday, reiterated that it would not open coalition talks with the AfD despite the complicated electoral maths now looming.

The CDU only narrowly edged out the AfD with 32% of the vote in Saxony, and came second in Thuringia.

The conservatives hold hopes of leading the next government in Thuringia, with their lead candidate Mario Voigt appealing for a "reasonable government" in a coalition led by the CDU.

The AfD's controversial local leader, Bjoern Hoecke, meanwhile declared that his party was the "people's party in Thuringia" and that "change will only come with the

Hoecke has often caused outrage with his outspoken statements and was fined twice this year for deliberately using a banned

Sahra Wagenknecht, who heads the farleft BSW, said her party "cannot work together" with Hoecke and has long ruled out a coalition with the AfD.

The BSW, formed earlier this year as a breakaway from the ex-communist Linke party, was the other big winner on Sunday.

The tough-on-migration upstart secured vote shares in the teens in both regional polls and is seen as a key building block in any coalition. The BSW however has serious differences with the more established parties that will likely complicate negotiations, including a dovish stance towards Russia and opposition to the planned stationing of US missiles in Germany.

Wagenknecht said yesterday voters in Thuringia and Saxony had sent a signal to Berlin that showed the "unhappiness with the federal government" ahead of the September 2025 national election.

Scholz's Social Democrats (SPD) suffered their worst-ever regional result in Thuringia, falling to just 6.1%. The SPD scored just over 7% in Saxony.

The chancellor's partners in a fractious coalition - the liberal FDP and the Greens struggled even more.

The FDP fell below the 5% threshold for seats in both elections, while in Saxony the

Greens only scraped in. The results were "nothing to celebrate", Social Democrats party chair Lars Klingbeil

said, adding that the party had to be "bet-

The run-up to Sunday's elections was dominated by a bitter debate over immigration stirred up by a suspected Islamist knife attack a few days before the vote that left three people dead.

The AfD, which seized on the stabbing to criticise the government's asylum policies, is also expected to perform strongly in a regional election in the eastern state of Brandenburg on September 22.

Pakistanis tried for incitement in Wilders plot

Two Pakistani men stood trial in absentia vesterday at a highsecurity court in The Netherlands over alleged attempts to incite the murder of far-right and anti-Islam **Dutch leader Geert Wilders.** Dutch prosecutors have charged 56-year-old religious leader Mohamed Ashraf Jalali for calling on his followers to kill Wilders and promising they would be "rewarded in the afterlife". Another man, Saad Hussain Rizvi, leader of the Tehreek-e-Labbaik Pakistan (TLP) party, is suspected of urging followers to kill Wilders after Pakistani cricketer Khalid Latif was sentenced for incitement to murder him. "This case has had a huge impact on me and my family," said Wilders, dressed in a dark suit, white shirt and maroon tie. "I'm asking this court to send a

The trial took place at a highly secure courthouse near Amsterdam's Schiphol airport. **Dutch authorities asked** Islamabad for legal assist to question the suspects and demand they appear in court. However, no treaty exists with Pakistan for mutual legal assistance and the two men did not appear in the dock. Neither man had legal representation present.

in this country is unacceptable,"

In September last year, judges sentenced Latif to 12 years behind bars for incitement to murder Wilders after the firebrand lawmaker sought to arrange a competition for cartoons of the Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him).

Wilders cancelled the cartoon contest after protests broke out in Pakistan and he was inundated with death threats. He has been under 24-hour state protection since 2004.

The planned competition "caused a lot of unrest within the Muslim community. He (Wilders) received hundreds, if not thousands of death threats," said the judge, who asked not to be identified.

Furore after principal fired over 'smartphone ban' in Hungary

Thousands demonstrated in central Budapest yesterday after the head of a renowned high school was sacked for not implementing a government-mandated "smartphone ban".

A decree, adopted in August, requires schools to collect students' phones and smart devices at the start of the day.

The move has reignited simmering tensions between nationalist Prime Minister Viktor Orban, in power continuously since 2010, and teachers, who have protested over poor working conditions in the past two

On the first day of the school year, thousands packed the square at the headquarters of the Interior Ministry, which has supervised public education since

"I found it outrageous that the measures were taken without prior consultation overnight." Katalin Elteto, a 71-year-old retired teacher told AFP.

"I think this protest is not just about the restriction of mobile phones, but the state of the public education in general," she added, saying she is saddened by the lack of public debate over the issue, which is designed to "cover up the failing system".

The main teachers' union PDSZ criticised the regulation dubbed "smartphone ban" by some media — as "poorly thought out" and "unrealistic", urging the government to let schools come up with their own solutions.

Budapest's Imre Madach high school announced in mid-August it would not take away digital devices.

In a statement to parents, the school faculty said its "pedagogical goal" is to "educate pupils in the correct use of digital culture".

It cited a part of the regulation, which allows institutions to authorise the use of restricted items.

A week later, the Interior Ministry fired the principal, Csaba Meszaros, saying that a "leader who does not abide by the law and openly defies it cannot run a public institution".

Zita Nemethy-Csato, 17, said she finds the policy "discouraging" and "unnecessary".

"Instead, we should be taught how to use smartphones sensibly," she told AFP, echoing placards held up by young demonstrators calling for the state to educate "thinkers, not slaves".

Mate, also 17, a student of Imre Madach high school, who did not want give his full name, called the dismissal of Meszaros "injustice".

"He was an excellent principal for 24 years...educating students to think freely and building a completely child-centred school," he said.

Macron speeds up efforts to break deadlock over PM

rench President Emmanuel Macron yesterday intensified efforts to find a new prime minister after almost two months of deadlock following inconclusive legislative elections, hosting two former presidents and two potential candidates.

France has been without a permanent government since the July 7 polls, in which the left formed the largest faction in a hung parliament with Macron's centrists and the far right comprising the other major groups.

Two possible candidates for prime minister – former premier Bernard Cazeneuve from the centre left and right-wing ex-minister Xavier Bertrand - held separate meetings with Macron

It is traditional for the French president to consult predecessors during moments of national importance, and Macron also met yesterday at the Elysee presidential palace with the two surviving former presidents - right-winger Nicolas Sarkozy and Socialist Francois Hol-

An Elysee source, asking not to be named, did not rule out that a third candidate could emerge.

French daily Le Monde reported that 62-year-old Thierry Beaudet, head of the Economic, Social and Environmental Council (CESE) advisory body and a figure utterly unknown to most French people, was also considered for the job.

"It's a very serious option," a person close to Macron said. "It's a solid, new response to the need for dialogue in society."

To the fury of the left, Macron has refused to accept the nomination of a left-wing premier, arguing such a figure would have no chance of surviving a confidence motion in parliament.

Amid the political deadlock Macron, who has less than three years of his term remaining, has run down the clock as the Olympics and Paralympics took place in Paris, to the growing frustration of opponents.

But amid signs of an acceleration as France returns from holidays, Macron early yesterday hosted Cazeneuve, a former leading Socialist who headed the government in the final months of Hollande's 2012-17 presidential term.

Cazeneuve was regarded by many commentators as the figure most likely to be named by Macron, but his appointment is far from a foregone conclusion.

Cazeneuve, 61, spent years as interior minister, including during the 2015 Paris attacks, and enjoys respect from across the political spectrum.

Rut the hard-left France IInbowed (LFI) party was unimpressed and vowed to seek to vote him out of Macron also held talks with Xavi-

er Bertrand, the right-wing head of the northern Hauts-de-France region and a former minister.

Bertrand, 59, would be a much more palatable figure for the right

Sarkozy remains an influential figure on the right – despite a string of graft convictions after leaving office on charges he denies - and even within Macron's circle, has already made his preference clear.

"The centre of gravity of French politics is on the right", he argued in the Figaro daily on Saturday.

He said Bertrand would be a "good choice", while opposing Cazeneuve's nomination. For a president who came to of-

fice in 2017 vowing radical change as to how France is ruled, naming a former prime minister from a previous administration could be seen as a step backwards by Macron.

Former Polish premier's close associate detained in London

former top Polish official who worked closely with ex-prime minister Mateusz Morawiecki was detained in London yesterday, a spokesperson for the Polish prosecution said, adding that prosecutors were seeking his swift extradition to Poland.

The man, identified by prosecutors as Michal K, faces accusations in Poland of taking part in an organised criminal group and of failing to fulfil his duties as a public servant in order to obtain financial gain. He has previously denied the accusations against him.

Polish law does not allow for the publication of the last name of a person accused in criminal proceedings. Michal K, who was detained under an international arrest warrant, is the former head of Poland's Strategic Reserves

"A decision must be taken quickly on his temporary arrest for the purpose of these extradition proceedings, and then there will be a procedure to surrender him based on this warrant, but this is a decision of the British court," National Public Prosecutor's Office spokeswoman Anna Adamiak said.

Poland's pro-European government has made a priority of holding to account officials from the previous nationalist Law and Justice (PiS) administration it suspects of wrongdoing.

Morawiecki has repeatedly praised Michal K for his work, including organising a military hub at the Rzeszow airport in eastern Poland after the war in neighbouring Ukraine began, and has said the charges against him were political.

Polish media reported that the agency he had headed signed several contracts with a private clothing company without holding tenders for items ranging from protective equipment during the Covid pandemic to power generators for Ukraine.

There was no immediate comment from Morawiecki yesterday but PiS condemned Michal K's detention.

"This is a political attack on the head of an agency who supported Ukraine by providing it with necessary equipment," PiS said in a statement emailed to Reuters.

The detention comes days after Warsaw asked the European Parliament to strip another former top aide of Morawiecki, Michal Dworczyk, of his immunity as an EU lawmaker, in a separate case involving alleged obstruction of

Belgium taps FM for EU post

Belgium yesterday named foreign minister Hadja Lahbib as its candidate for the next European Commission, bolstering EU chief Ursula von der Leyen's push to get more women on her team. The European Union (EU)'s member states have been putting forward their picks for the top jobs in the next EU executive after elections in June. Belgium was the last of the bloc's 27 countries to make its nomination, as its politicians are locked in negotiations to form a coalition government. Von der Leyen has been pressing countries to name both a man and woman for the job in a bid to reach gender parity. But most member states have ignored her plea, meaning she appears on course to fall short of reaching the target. Belgium's choice of candidate fell to Lahbib's Reformist Movement party after it made a strong showing in the recent elections. "This designation reflects a desire for feminisation and renewal," party leader Georges-Louis Bouchez wrote on X.

One dead as Czech police find 30 migrants in truck

zech police said they had found around 30 migrants, one of whom died, in a semi-trailer on a motorway between Prague and the southern German city of Dresden yesterday. A helicopter was deployed to look for several of the migrants who

had run away from the truck with foreign licence plates that police had stopped after 1800 GMT. Police also closed the D8 motorway 18km north of the capital

"All these persons have been detained," police said on X later. "We have no information suggesting someone has managed to escape."

The migrants appeared to be travelling through the Czech Republic toward another destination, they said adding, "and unfortunately the first information we got from the site mentions one deceased person." A private emergency service present on the site said on X it had treated a woman aged about 30, who was unconscious.

"A doctor declared her dead after resuscitation lasting dozens of minutes," the emergency service said. The other migrants did not require hospital care, but they were "in

poor health", the emergency service added. The Czech Republic, an EU and Nato member of 10.9mn people, is

a transit country for migrants heading to wealthier European states

India needs more big businesses

At a time of growing doubts about China's economic prospects, India's rise has been attracting increasing attention, with some predicting that the country will become the developing world's next economic superstar. Whether you believe India can be the "next China", however, may depend on whether you subscribe more to "young" or "old" Schumpeterian logic.

The twentieth-century economist Joseph Schumpeter is best known for the concept of "creative destruction", which describes how new innovations transform the economy partly by making older technologies obsolete. But Schumpeter's ideas about economic dynamism and development were not static: whereas he initially emphasised the role of entrepreneurship above all, he later recognised the importance of big businesses.

So, in assessing India's prospects, the "old" Schumpeter might look at the number of big businesses the country has produced. India lags well behind China on this front, with just eight Fortune Global 500 companies, compared to its neighbour's 135. (To put this in perspective, the United States has 136 Fortune Global 500 companies, and South Korea has 18, despite having a much smaller population.) China has achieved this lead over India in just a few decades: in the early 1990s, China had three Fortune Global 500 companies, and India had one.

China has also pulled well ahead of India in terms of per capita income. In 1978 - just before China initiated the "reform and opening up" that enabled its "economic miracle" - both countries' per capita income amounted to about 5% of the US level. By the early 2010s, Chinese incomes had reached about 20% of the US level, compared to just 10% for India. Today, Chinese and Indian per capita income relative to the US stands at 33% and 13%, respectively.

Big businesses contribute significantly to economic growth

The fact that China has been far more successful than India in generating world-class big businesses might help to explain this divergence. Big businesses contribute significantly to economic growth. By contrast, a larger number of small and medium-size enterprises (SMEs) is only correlated with faster

growth, indicating that it may be growth that fuels the proliferation of SMEs, not the other way around.

One reason for this - as "old" Schumpeter might note - is that big businesses tend to execute high-end and high-value-added activities, such as research and development and marketing, at home, while carrying out low-value-added activities abroad. Though the latter can boost growth and facilitate knowledge transfer, latecomer countries must translate this into locally owned, innovative big businesses if they are to break into high-end segments

The "young" Schumpeter might be more impressed by India. That is because India has proved more than capable of generating "unicorns" - private companies with a valuation above \$1bn boasting 91 such companies, as of last year. To be sure, China far outstrips India here, too, with 368 unicorns. But India remains in the top four globally, behind the US (1,524) and the United Kingdom (153), but ahead of countries like Germany (64), Brazil (30), and South Korea (29).

Yet the discrepancy between Fortune Global 500 businesses and unicorns in India is notable. In 2020-23, that ratio amounted to just 0.1 in India, compared to 0.4 in China, 0.5 in Germany, and 0.25 in Brazil. The ratio in South Korea - whose economy is notoriously dominated by big businesses - is particularly high, at 0.6, implying that big businesses actually facilitate the rise of unicorns.

This likely happens through a few channels. One is the transmission of relevant skills and know-how through employment. To cite one example, the founders of Naver - essentially the "Korean Google" – used to work for Samsung. Another is direct investment: the Chinese tech giant Tencent supports hundreds of startups as an equity investor.

The older Schumpeter would probably argue that, if India wants to become an economic superpower on par with China, it should devote more attention to generating big businesses. In fact, without homegrown big businesses to drive growth and investment, India is likely to lose its innovative startups to acquisitions by foreign giants.

To avoid this kind of "brain drain," efforts must be made to help startups grow quickly within India, so that they can become the flagship companies of tomorrow. South Korea and Taiwan became high-income economies by growing a few large firms, such as Samsung and Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Company (TSMC), not by having thousands of SMEs. Creating a sound institutional or investment climate to nurture startups can take decades. It takes less time to concentrate resources and competencies among a few firms so that they may grow into leading flagship companies. - Project Syndicate

Alarm as Trump threat to US democracy has grown

n overhauled Democratic ticket has re-energised the party and eliminated the widening polling lead that former US president Donald Trump had over his successor, Joe Biden. There is much to admire in Kamala Harris and Tim Walz's backgrounds, careers, and recent campaign speeches, which have focused on fighting poverty, improving the lot of working people, reclaiming patriotism from Republicans, and strengthening democracy. But even setting aside these virtues, there are good reasons to support the Democratic ticket. After all, the alternative is Trump, who poses such a serious threat to US institutions that any halfway decent candidate running against him would deserve strong support.

Trump threatens American democracy in part because US institutions were not designed to deal with an autocratic populist who is willing to break norms and even laws. As I pointed out in 2017, American voters and civil society are ultimately the only forces that can stop such a figure. Although American democracy withstood Trump's presidency in 2017-21, he exploited every institutional weakness he could find, deepened the divisions of an already polarised society, and tried to overturn the result of a free and fair election that he lost.

The Democrats successfully reclaimed the White House in the 2020 election, despite Trump's coup attempt on January 6, 2021, because they had a major advantage: his own incompetence. Although

long-standing political norms had been severely damaged, democracy survived.

Trump's incompetence as president had two dimensions. First, he was incapable of demonstrating any consistency. His only real agenda was to concentrate power in his own hands and elevate and enrich his family and cronies, but he lacked the discipline and focus to see it through. The terrifying implication, of course, is that somebody more disciplined could have done far more damage. Second, Trump failed to win the unconditional personal loyalty of many of his underlings, and that ultimately meant that most of his wildest schemes and decisions were exposed or blocked from

Unfortunately, Trump poses a far greater threat to American democracy today for five key reasons. First, he has grown only angrier, which means he will be more determined to concentrate power in his own hands and deploy it against his enemies (real and perceived). If he returns to the White House, he will be not only more vicious but also potentially more consistent in pursuing his personal agenda.

Second, Trump and his ideological fellow travellers will have put much more thought and vetting into high- and mid-level appointees, as they have already done for his implicit governing agenda: the Heritage Foundation's Project 2025. Although Trump claims to renounce this comprehensive policy blueprint, it has already become a valuable tool for identifying potential administration personnel. Supporting the Heritage Foundation's dark vision is a litmus test, ensuring that no whistleblowers or defenders

of democracy can serve as the "adults in the room" this time

Third, the GOP is now Trump's personal cult, which means that local Republican officials across the country will be willing to do whatever he commands. Some may go so far as attempting to rig elections and seize control of local law enforcement and public services. If Trump once again demands that local election officials "find" more votes in his favour, he might just get what he wants.

Fourth, owing to a variety of mistakes by intellectual elites and Democratic Party leaders - such as advocating extreme "woke" positions like open borders, defunding the police, and so forth - many right-leaning, moderate, and non-college voters have concluded that Democrats are left-wing extremists. Those who see the Democrats as lacking patriotism will be much less likely to break with Trump, even though Harris and Walz are taking steps to appeal to them.

Fifth, for all these same reasons, effective civil-society action against Trump has become more difficult. After years in which the left has applied its own ideological purity tests and shamed anyone who falls short, fewer independent voters and moderate Republicans will be willing to join a big-tent anti-Trump coalition. Progressive Democrats could end up standing alone against his unconstitutional or anti-democratic behaviour. and that would not be enough.

For all these reasons, Trump's threat to US institutions must be taken seriously. Once again, the only way to defend American democracy is to use democratic means to defeat him. Democracy thrives when it delivers real-

world results and helps people fulfil their aspirations. In practice, that means promoting economic prosperity, security, fairness, competent governance, and stability. The latter is especially important for withstanding periodic shocks and challenges, including threats to democracy

Trump is not the first antidemocratic demagogue to attract a strong following, and he will not be the last. US institutions became stronger after withstanding a proto-fascist challenge from Father Charles Coughlin in the late 1930s; resistance to Black civil rights in the Jim Crow South of the 1950s and 1960s; the segregationist George Wallace's 1968 presidential run; and Watergate. If Trump is defeated this November, US institutions will emerge stronger once again

But for democracy to withstand such challenges, there must be good alternatives on the ballot. People must be able to cast a vote for politicians with good track records of solving problems, inspiring people, and defending free institutions. The Harris-Walz ticket looks like it fits the bill. Now begins the hard work of mobilising people and restoring support for democracy. But the even harder work will be to deliver on the promises of democracy, by combating poverty and inequality, reducing polarisation and extremism from both sides, and demonstrating that government does work for the common people. – Project Syndicate

However, to improve our ability to address these challenges, global governance must become more effective, he explained, adding that we must take steps to reform necessary parts of the UN so that they are fit for the challenges of the 21st century.

Qatar, Sweden: Promising prospects for future

The Amir's visit is expected to contribute to developing relations between the two countries as well as opening new horizons for co-operation between them in may sectors.

The two countries have had good

relations with steady growth in various fields since the establishment of diplomatic relations between them. The first Qatari ambassador to Sweden presented his credentials as a non-resident ambassador in 2011, while the Qatari embassy in Stockholm was inaugurated in December 2014.

Relations between Doha and Stockholm have been strengthened in various fields as a result of mutual visits and agreements signed between the two countries, which include, among other things, UN activities and humanitarian aspects.

In 2019, Qatar and Sweden signed a memorandum of understanding (MoU) to hold political consultations between the foreign ministries of the two countries.

Qatar signed an MoU for co-operation and exchange of expertise in several work areas with both Sweden and the International Labour Organisation (ILO), to enhance co-operation in the areas of occupational health and safety at work, as well as corporate social responsibility through institutional co-operation and exchange of expertise.

In the educational sector, there is a co-operation agreement between Qatar University (QU) and Lund University in Sweden in joint

research projects, exchange of academic materials, joint conferences, seminars and workshops, and student exchange.

There are regular political consultations between the foreign ministries of the two countries. There is co-ordination between the two countries in international forums considering that they share visions on the idea of assuming responsibility in global crises.

Within the context of mutual visits, HE the Minister of State for International Co-operation at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs Lolwah bint Rashid AlKhater visited Sweden. The visit included meetings with several senior Swedish officials, during which the two sides discussed ways of co-operation, especially in the field of development as well as joint efforts in the areas of security, peace and humanitarian aid, and ways to enhance co-operation between relevant Qatari institutions and the Swedish Institute of International Affairs.

At the parliamentarian level and within the context of exchanged visits between Doha and Stockholm, HE the Deputy Speaker of the Shura Council Dr Hamda bint Hassan al-Sulaiti visited the Swedish Parliament in July 2022, during

which the Qatari delegation was briefed on the Swedish Parliament's experience in parliamentary work with the aim of exchanging expertise in this field.

At the commercial level, trade discussions are held between Qatar and Sweden on a regular basis, and trade and economic relations between the two countries have developed in recent years. Trade exchange between the two countries has witnessed a growth of 79% in 2023, reaching roughly QR1.55bn, compared to QR866mn in 2022.

In May, Qatar Chamber (QC) discussed trade and industrial cooperation relations with Sweden, and ways to enhance partnership, especially in the sectors of food, agriculture, energy, information technology, and others. During that meeting, Chairperson of QC Sheikh Khalifa bin Jassim al-Thani met with a delegation of Swedish businesspersons and urged Swedish companies to invest in Qatar, highlighting its position as a leading global hub for investment and business, given that Oatar owns a world-class infrastructure, a pro-investment environment, and stimulating economic legislation that allows non-Qatari investors to own 100% capital in most economic sectors.

She explained in this regard that the slogan of this forum, "Family is The Treasure of a Nation", is not just a slogan but a tangible reality that we live every day, as long as the family is considered the first nucleus of society. Through it, we instil the values of belonging and citizenship and enhance the spirit of co-operation and solidarity among individuals so that supporting the family is an investment in the future of our nations and peoples, she added.

She pointed out that the societies are currently facing many challenges that affect the stability and cohesion of families ranging from economic and social changes to the effects of modern technology, all of which require close co-operation and joint efforts to overcome them, considering that the forum is a golden opportunity to exchange experiences and best practices between the countries to develop innovative strategies



that guarantee stability and prosperity for the families.

She stressed the importance of this forum as a station for thinking and planning for the future in order to discuss and exchange ideas and initiatives that can contribute to strengthening the role of the family as a source of real wealth in the societies, while hoping for tangible results that translate into policies and programmes to support the family and enhance its

position in the society. For his part, HE head of the human and environmental affairs sector at the GCC General Secretariat engineer Abdullah bin Ali al-Rubaie praised the efforts of the GCC leaders, their wise directives and their support and assistance for all matters related to the GCC family, which is the basic building block for preparing and raising a righteous generation that contributes to the advancement and development of the GCC countries.

Al-Rubaie appreciated the ministry's efforts in presenting the initiative to celebrate the Gulf Family Day and organising the Gulf Family Forum 2024.

He pointed out that the GCC countries approved September 14

of each year as the Gulf Family Day. Al-Rubaie said the leaders of the GCC countries attach great importance to family affairs in all its

categories, and they ordered that a study be conducted to evaluate the reality and programmes of children's culture and how to develop them, in addition to their directives to give attention to women who are the backbone of the family entity as well as to pay attention to the elderly and provide all means of comfort

that guarantee them a decent life. He explained that the GCC countries are in continuous development and keep pace with the goals of sustainable development in all fields, especially in the field of the family in all its categories, noting that the GCC countries have focused on caring for the child who is the basic building block for the advancement of the GCC countries.

He stressed that the GCC countries are keen to provide basic services in their schools for free, including the Internet, textbooks, computers for educational purposes, an appropriate infrastructure for students with disabilities, and basic health facilities, while revealing that the percentage of schools that provide these services reached 100% in all GCC countries and in all services, except for the service of providing infrastructure for people with disabilities, which reached 60% of the total schools in the GCC countries.

Director of the Family Development Department at the Ministry of Social Development and Family of Qatar Dhabia Hamdan al-Maqbali said that the forum seeks to achieve the required integration and enhance the status of the Gulf family and its developmental role by involving those interested in social affairs, universities, research centres and centers concerned with the family, in addition to the most prominent figures at the local and Gulf levels, and experts in Gulf and international organisations concerned with the family to discuss future opportunities and challenges for the family, as well as the impact of family values in preparing a more effective generation to face the future challenges of the Gulf family.

For her part, acting secretarygeneral of the supreme council for family affairs in Kuwait Iman Saleh al-Enezi stressed that the Gulf family is facing modern development that represents a challenge to the cohesion of the family and its traditional function as a source of social and educational support.

Executive Director of the Medeem initiative in the United Arab Emirates Mona Majid Mohamed al-Mansouri addressed the UAE's initiative in the Emirati Family Growth Support Programme through the initiative, which was launched within the framework of the Abu Dhabi Family Wellbeing Strategy.

During the session held on the sidelines of the Gulf Family Day Forum, head of the family development department, department of centres, family and childhood development at the Bahraini ministry of social development Maryam Hassan Yousef, and head of the women's committee at the family affairs council in Saudi Arabia Lana bint Hassan bin Saad bin Saeed reviewed the importance of the initiatives and qualitative efforts made for the sake of family development, confronting all challenges and finding appropriate solutions, in addition to empowering family groups. Beyond developing intercultural communication skills, ambassadors form lifelong connections with one another and stay engaged with Doha Debates after


the programme concludes, participating in the organisation's debates, podcasts, town halls, and other special events.




