

Meta clears use of 'From the River to the Sea' slogan

Meta's Oversight Board ruled yesterday that the standalone use of the phrase "From the River to the Sea," a slogan popular with pro-Palestinian users, does not violate the company's content policies. The phrase "From the river to the sea, Palestine will be free," has been used as a rallying cry for many since the outbreak of the war in Gaza, with Israel accusing those who use it of anti-Semitism. The board found that the content did not break Meta's rules on hate speech, violence and incitement, or dangerous organisations and individuals, and should not lead to post removal on its platforms.

Four dead in Georgia high school shooting

At least four people were killed in a shooting at a Georgia high school yesterday, CNN reported. In addition to the four killed, dozens of people were injured in the shooting at Apalachee High School in Winder, Georgia, Not all injuries appeared to be gunshot wounds, but rather also people hurt while fleeing. PRIO director: Qatar makes positive, great efforts to build peace

pirector of the Peace Research Institute Oslo (PRIO) Henrik Urdal has praised the great positive efforts made by Qatar to build peace, indicating that the country has succeeded in finding solutions to many prominent issues in the Middle East and the world.

In an interview with Qatar News Agency, Urdal affirmed the importance of finding solutions to deeprooted conflicts in the Middle East, especially the Palestinian-Israeli conflict, highlighting Qatar's role in ensuring mediation efforts.

He expressed deep concern about the current situation in the

Gaza Strip, where the UN said that the actions taken by Israeli forces in Gaza may amount to genocide. He emphasised the need to reach a ceasefire agreement and find political solutions.

Urdal added that political solutions must include all Palestinian territories and a commitment by the Israelis to withdraw from the areas they currently occupy and provide security and political guarantees from neighbouring countries, including Qatar, which plays an important positive role in this conflict. PRIO Director pointed out the importance of ensuring the provision of political solutions

that give people the right to manage and direct their political entities, as this is the reason behind the new momentum for the two-state solution, indicating that Norway recognised the State of Palestine as an important first step towards finding a political solution.

urdal said that Qatar and Norway bear a significant responsibility and have a clear policy to work towards building peace, emphasising the importance for countries like Qatar and Norway to assume this role, given the current huge investment in armament, calling at the same time for investment in diplomacy and mediation to contribute to re-

solving conflicts instead of weapons. Urdal underlined the diplomatic successes achieved by Qatar over the past years in the Middle East and the world, highlighting the mediation efforts in areas such as Afghanistan and Darfur in the past

and now in Ukraine.

He pointed out that Qatar and Norway have many things in common, as the two countries follow the same approach in speaking to all parties to facilitate dialogue between them and encourage them to sit at the negotiating table, in addition to the great bilateral international relations enjoyed by the two countries.

Afterwards, the Cabinet considered the topics on its agenda as follows: First — Approval of a draft law amending some provisions of the Criminal Procedure Code issued by Law No. 23 of 2004, and referring it to the Shura Council. This draft is being prepared within the framework of the National Justice Systems Development Initiative, which aims to achieve prompt justice by developing litigation procedures, enhancing digital transformation, and using modern electronic means in the judicial and justice fields

judicial and justice fields.

Second — Approval of the draft Cabinet resolution to form a committee to host the Web Summit 'Qatar 2024-2028.' Qatar chairs meeting of Gulf labour ministers

he GCC Labour Ministers Committee held its 10th meeting in Doha under the chairmanship of HE the Minister of Labour Dr Ali bin Smaikh al-Marri and in the presence of GCC Secretary-General Jasem Mohamed Albudaiwi.

The ministers explored ways to enhance collaboration in the Gulf labour market, learn from the successful practices of GCC countries, and discuss various issues of common interest to the GCC countries. In his speech during the meeting, HE Dr al-Marri highlighted the impact of the unique circumstances in the Arab region on labour markets, employment, occupational safety, and health, as well as the influ-

ence of the digital revolution on the workforce. He also focused on challenges such as forced labour, human trafficking, and child labour. He emphasised the importance of implementing policies to enhance social protection programmes and preserve workers' rights in the private sector. He underlined the need to update laws to make the job market more efficient and appealing to both national and international tal-

He added that Arab Gulf countries have similar labour laws, wage protection, and occupational safety, which helps to ensure the success of effective decisions and initiatives. He said that the GCC countries require legislative updates in



response to quick labour market shifts. He highlighted the GCC's focus on promoting sustainability and environmental preservation in workplaces through recycling and renewable energy use to mitigate climate change impacts and protect the environment.

GCC Secretary-General Albudaiwi noted that the directives of the leaders of the GCC countries, had a significant impact in advanc-

ing the track to achieve the desired goals, which culminated in the GCC countries achieving great successes in various economic, social, and political fields over the past years. In this context, he pointed to the remarkable progress of the GCC countries in the Global Competitiveness Index for 2023, as well as in the Youth Progress Index.

He said that the GCC countries are among the top 30 countries out of 150 countries covered by this index, and other international indicators that confirm the success of the strategic solutions and initiatives adopted by the GCC countries within their visions and development plans, which requires strengthening these gains and

building on them, guided by the directives of the GCC leaders.

The meeting discussed various topics that would enhance joint Gulf action in the labour market. The key topics that the meeting also addressed were the Gulf framework for combating human trafficking and forced labour, as well as legislation related to women's employment and maternity leave across the GCC. Baladna starts phase 1 of powdered milk production project in Algeria

aladna has announced the B commencement of the first phase of its powdered milk production project in Algeria.

In a statement, the company stated it has initiated the early stages of the project by drilling exploratory water wells in various areas of the allocated land to support the cultivation of grains and fodder necessary for raising

The project was signed on April 24 last year between the Algerian Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development and Baladna for the production of powdered milk, with a value of \$3.5bn.

The ceremony marking the start of the project was attended by Qatar's ambassador to Algeria Abdulaziz Ali al-Naama along with several senior officials in Algeria and representatives from the Baladna Food Industries.

The company mentioned that the drilling of the wells aims to study the nature of the groundwater and to reach the optimal design, with the goal of ensuring the sustainability of water resources for the project and future generations.

The company confirmed that it intends to use the best techniques to monitor and enhance the efficiency of groundwater usage by integrating data from weather stations and satellite imagery.

Governor of the Adrar Province in Algeria Al Arabi Bahloul said the project would represent a true launch for vital food sectors and dairy products, making it a pivotal step toward achieving food



security.

Additionally, the project is expected to contribute to lowering the prices of locally manufactured food products, thus aiding in the development of the Algerian economy and reducing import costs.

Ali al-Ali, a representative of Baladna, expressed his happiness with the commencement of the preliminary work for the project, adding that what is now a desert will transform into a beacon of excellence and innovation, housing the world's largest integrated vertical farm, with more than 270,000 head of cattle, producing approximately 1.7bn litres of milk annually. He said the company will use the latest technologies, agricultural automation, and cattle breeding and dairy production methods, adhering to the highest standards of quality and environ-

mental sustainability. He pointed out that Baladna will implement the best irrigation methods to minimise excessive water use during all phases of the project. As part of its efforts to develop integrated mechanisms for water conservation, Baladna will use sensors to measure soil moisture and salinity to determine the exact amount of water needed for each crop.

Ramez al-Khayyat, a member of Baladna's board of directors, emphasised the importance of this strategic project, saying the pioneering project is a new link that strengthens the bonds of cooperation between the two countries. He added that today sees the launch of the project's preliminary steps, highlighting its strategic importance to the company given that it allows it to transfer its expertise and leadership in the dairy production sector to fulfil the Algerian government's vision of achieving self-sufficiency.

Earlier this year, Baladna announced the signing of an agree-ment with the Algerian government, represented by the National Investment Fund, to implement the project, which is expected to cover 50% of Algeria's powdered milk needs. The project, consisting of three phases, begins with the reclamation of fodder farms, followed by the establishment of a cattle breeding farm, and finally the construction of a powdered milk production facility. The project aims to reduce Algeria's reliance on powdered milk imports, create over 5,000 job opportunities, increase local red meat production, and localise milk production to achieve self-sufficiency. Ministry organises open field day on drying dates

The Ministry of Municipality's Agricultural Research Department organised an instructive field day at the Rawdat Al-Faras Research Station on Tuesday on the topic "Drying of Dates in Modified and Advanced Drying Rooms".

Suwaid al-Maliki, head of the Plant Research Section, alongside several palm farm owners, engineers, agricultural advisors from farms and private companies, and date farmers were present.

Engineer Amer Fayyad al-Kehais, from the Agricultural Research Department, gave an explanation of the most important pre-harvest, harvest, and postharvest practices. He reviewed all the stages that have been studied on drying methods from 2006 until now, and how the drying process has evolved to the use



of drying rooms covered with a polycarbonate material. He further discussed the de-

velopment of drying rooms, starting from the regular drying room and the multi-purpose drying room (which can be used as a nursery for vegetable crops), to the advanced drying room (with increased capacity for drying dates), and finally to the mobile solar dryer powered by solar energy (clean energy). The event included a field visit to the drying rooms to observe the different rooms and the mobile dryer.

The participants discussed ways to enhance collaborative efforts, develop integrated response strategies that address the complex and interconnected nature of current humanitarian challenges, and to build frameworks that enable more co-ordinated and effective crisis responses.

The conference concluded with the issuance of the "Amman Declaration 2024: A unified call for future-prepared Mena humanitarian action", which included a number of commitments and recommendations for Mena National Societies.

On the sidelines of the conference, al-Emadi received a special honouring from Kate Forbes, president of IFRC, in recognition of QRCS' active contributions to humanitarian response globally. He held co-ordination meetings with Red Crescent and Red Cross senior officials/leaders, including Dr Hossam al-Sharkawi, regional director of IFRC - Mena, to discuss

mechanisms of joint action and to review the humanitarian situation, especially in Gaza.

Prior to the conference, Tahani Saleh al-Feaidi, head of Community Development at QRCS, participated in the online meeting of youths and volunteers from 11 Mena National Societies, who shared insights as leaders and partners in shaping the future of the region's humanitarian action.

Al-Emadi attended the emer-

gency plenary session of the Arab Red Crescent and Red Cross Organisation (ARCO), during which Dr Abdullah bin Suhail al-Muhaidli was elected as secretary-general of ARCO, succeeding Dr Saleh bin Hamad al-Tuwaijri.

Al-Emadi congratulated Dr al-Muhaidli for his new position, wished him good luck, and promised full co-operation on all issues and understandings that serve the shared humanitarian goals.

Polio vaccines give Gaza families all too brief respite from war

nxious parents lining up with their children for a polio vaccine in central were counting down the hours until a pause in fighting ends in the area yesterday, threatening more death and destruction in the 11-month-old war.

As health officials administered the doses, Gazan mother Huda Sheikh Ali wondered what good the polio vaccination campaign could do when her children would soon face more Israeli air strikes and shelling.

"There is no protection for them, in just a short few hours the ceasefire will end and we will return to seeing children bombed and killed. There is no protection from these things," she said.

"We managed to take a breather for a few hours, for our child...imagine what it would be like with a

permanent ceasefire. The children are dying every single day and they are giving us some vaccines for polio?" The campaign was prompted by the discovery of a case of polio in a baby boy last month, the first in the Gaza Strip for 25 years. Israel and Hamas fighters agreed to daily pauses of eight hours in the fighting in pre-specified areas to allow the vaccination programme. No violations have been reported.

But a permanent end to the war is not in sight. Diplomatic efforts to secure a ceasefire, release hostages held in Gaza and return many Palestinians jailed by Israel have faltered.

Most of Gaza's 2.3mn people have been uprooted from their homes and many families have moved repeatedly up and down the Gaza Strip in search of safe

The UN agency for Palestinian refugees said yesterday it was making good progress in rolling out a polio vaccine, but called for

a permanent ceasefire to ease humanitarian suffering.

UNRWA said that three days into the campaign in areas of central Gaza, around 187,000 children had received the vaccine. The campaign will move to other areas of the territory in the second

Palestinians say a key reason for the return of polio is the collapse of Gaza's health system and the destruction of most of its hospitals during the war. Israel accuses Hamas of using hospitals for military purposes, something the group denies.

Hadeel Darbiyeh, who brought her infant daughter for the polio vaccination, said she shared the pessimism of other parents in

"Instead of bringing the vaccines, bring us a solution to stop the war," she said. "Bring us a solution for the oppressed people who have all been forced to flee their homes and into tents.

Teen musician sings for children who endure the horrors of conflict

raving the constant threat of air strikes and bombings, 15-year-old Youssef Saad, a Gazan oud player, rides his bicycle through the war-ravaged streets of northern Gaza's Jabalia refugee camp, his instrument strapped to his back.

Saad sings for children who have endured daily horrors in 11 months of conflict, trying to offer them a little joy or distraction. "The homes in my city were once full of dreams," Saad said, gazing at the rubble of the decades-old urban refugee camp, which before the war was builtup and heavily populated.

"Now, they're gone," he says. Saad was studying at the Edward Said National Conservatory of Music in nearby Gaza City before it was reduced to ruins in the war that has devastated much of the enclave.

Now, living with relatives after his own home was destroyed, he is one of five siblings whose futures have been upended.

His father, a government employee with the Palestinian Authority, always supported Saad's dream of becoming a musician.

But now, Saad's focus has shifted. He spends his days at a Jabalia day centre, playing his oud and singing for children traumatised by war.

The latest bloodshed in the



the Israel-Hamas conflict, in Jabalia refugee camp in the northern

decades-old Israeli-Palestinian conflict was triggered in the first week of October when Palestinian Hamas group stormed Israel.

Israel's subsequent assault on Hamas-governed Gaza has since killed more than 40,800 Palestinians, according to the Hamasrun health ministry, displaced almost the entire population and laid the besieged enclave to waste.

"Every house holds a tragedy," Saad said. "Some have lost their mother, others their father, their neighbour, or their friend."

Despite the danger, Saad is determined to continue his mission. "We try to help improve their mental health, even if it means putting myself at risk," he said. "This is my duty to the children."

And he refuses to give up on his dreams for the future: "We. the children of Palestine, strive to stay resilient, even in the face of genocide."

Saad says he lives by a saying that carries him through the darkest days: "If you live, live free, or die standing like trees."

Sisi makes first presidential visit to Turkiye in 12 years

urkish President Tayyip Erdogan and Egyptian counterpart Abdel Fattah al-Sisi discussed the Gaza war and ways to further repair the long-frozen ties between the regional powers during talks in Ankara, in the first such presidential visit in 12 years.

Relations between Ankara and Cairo collapsed in 2013.

Ties between the two countries began thawing in 2020 when Ankara launched a diplomatic drive to ease tensions with

its estranged regional rivals. Last year, Ankara and Cairo mutually reappointed ambassadors and Turkiye said it would also provide Cairo with armed drones. Erdogan travelled to Cairo in February for his first trip to Egypt since 2012. He met al-Sisi at Ankara airport yesterday and the two then travelled in the same car to the presidential palace for around two hours of talks.

"With a win-win mindset, we will carry our multi-dimensional ties forward," Erdogan said, add-

ing Ankara particularly wanted to deepen ties with Egypt on natural gas and nuclear energy.

Ministers from the two countries signed 18 memorandum of understanding on co-operation in energy, defence, tourism, health, agriculture, finance, culture, education, and transport.

Speaking at a joint press conference, Erdogan reiterated that Turkiye and Egypt wanted to boost annual trade by \$5bn to \$15bn in the next five years.

He added that Ankara and Cairo shared a "common stance" on the Palestinian cause, while al-Sisi said they were both calling for a ceasefire in Gaza and an end to violence in the West Bank.

Turkiye, which has condemned Israel for its war against Hamas in Gaza, has sent thousands of tonnes of aid to Egypt for Palestinians and praised Cairo's humanitarian efforts and role as negotiator in the talks on a ceasefire and hostage deal.

Tunisia presidential candidate Zammel remanded: reports

Tunisian court yesterday remanded in custody presidential candidate Ayachi Zammel pending an investigation into suspicions of forging ballot signatures, his lawyers said.

Zammel, 43, is one of only two candidates approved by the electoral authority, ISIE, to challenge

President Kais Saied in the October 6 poll. He was heard "in a number of cases related to charges involving presidential endorsements" that were "brought before the public prosecution", which ordered his remand, his lawyers said.

Zammel was arrested Monday and is set to appear in court today, according to media reports. A littleknown businessman and former parliamentarian. he headed Azimoun, a small liberal party, until late August, when he stepped down to run for the top post as an independent candidate. His arrest came hours before ISIE gave a final list of presidential hopefuls including himself, Saied, and former parliamentarian Zouhair Maghzaoui.

Wounded Ugandan opposition leader out of hospital

Ugandan opposition leader Bobi Wine was discharged from hospital yesterday after undergoing surgery for a leg wound suffered during a confrontation with police, AFP reported from Kampala. The outspoken critic of President Yoweri Museveni was injured in the fracas on Tuesday in the town of Bulindo, around 20 kilometres north of the capital Kampala. Initially, Wine's National Unity Platform (NUP) said the 42-year old, whose real name is Robert Kvagulanvi, had been shot in the leg by police and described it as "another attempt on the life" of the party leader. But the NUP later said Wine had been hit by a tear gas canister and he was taken to a hospital in Kampala. "He underwent a surgery where the fragments of a canister were removed from his leg and he has stabilised and is on the way out of hospital now," Kampala mayor Erias Lukwago told AFP. Images posted on social media showed Wine, wrapped in a cream blanket with a bandage on his leg. being pushed in a wheelchair by hospital staff. Wine and his NUP have long been a thorn in the side of Museveni, who has ruled Uganda for nearly 40 years.

Xi hosts two dozen African leaders at China's biggest summit in years

hinese leader Xi Jinping will host over two dozen ■ African leaders at a lavish dinner in Beijing, kicking off the city's biggest summit in years with promises of co-operation in infrastructure, energy and education.

China, the world's number two economy, is Africa's largest trading partner and has sought to tap continent's vast troves of natural resources including copper, gold, lithium and rare earth minerals. It has also furnished African countries with billions in loans that have helped build much-needed infrastructure but also sometimes stoked controversy by saddling governments with huge debts.

Twenty-five African leaders have arrived in Beijing or confirmed attendance at this week's China-Africa forum, according to an AFP tally, including some

whose countries face a rising risk of debt distress.

The forum kicked off yesterday evening with a family photo and a lavish dinner in the Great Hall of the People — followed by an opening ceremony at which Xi will deliver a speech the next day. Chinese state media has this week lauded Xi as a "true friend of Africa", claiming Beijing's ties were reaching "new heights"

under his stewardship. As of yesterday, the Chinese leader had held talks with over a dozen African counterparts in Beijing, a tally of state media reporting showed.

Meeting Tuesday with Bola Tinubu, president of Nigeria one of China's biggest borrowers on the continent — Xi called for great co-operation in the "development of infrastructure. energy and mineral resources", state news agency Xinhua said.

And in talks with Zimbabwean President Emmerson Mnangagwa that same day, he promised co-operation in "investment, trade, infrastructure,

mineral resources" and others. He also backed Zimbabwe in its struggle against "illegal sanctions" - imposed by the United States in response to corruption and human rights abuses by the country's leadership.

Analysts say that Beijing's largesse towards the continent is being recalibrated in the face of economic trouble at home.

HEALTH First mpox vaccines due in **DR Congo today**

The first delivery of almost

100,000 doses of mpox vaccines will arrive in the Democratic Republic of Congo today, the African Union's health watchdog said, AFP reported from Kinshasa. The vast central Africa country of around 100mn people is at the epicentre of the mpox outbreak, with cases and deaths rising. "We are very pleased with the arrival of this first batch of vaccines in the DRC," Jean Kaseya, head of the Africa Centres for Disease Control and Prevention, told AFP. adding that more than 99.000 doses were expected. More than 17.500 cases and 629 deaths have been reported in the country since the start of the year, according to the World Health Organisation (WHO). The vaccine doses will be transported onboard an aeroplane leaving the Danish capital Copenhagen on Wednesday evening and are due to arrive at Kinshasa's international airport on Thursday at 1100 GMT. The Congolese National Institute of Public Health, which is in charge of managing the country's mpox response, indicated that it was still waiting for details on the origin of the vaccines contained in the first delivery.



20 missing after boat mishap on Myanmar-Laos border

At least 20 people are missing, feared dead, following a boat mishap on the Mekong river in the "Golden Triangle" area between Laos, Myanmar and Thailand. officials said yesterday. The incident happened late Monday during "strong currents" on the river that divides the three countries. Manop Senakul, the police chief in Thailand's northern Chiang Rai province, said. "At least 20 people are missing," he said, adding that a further 16 Myanmar nationals had been rescued. Myanmar media reported the boat had been carrying people to Myanmar from Laos when it got into difficulties after its engine failed

Ex-minister Patel eliminated from UK Tory leadership race

Former UK interior minister Priti Patel was eliminated from the Conservative leadership contest vesterday after registering the fewest votes of the six candidates vving to succeed ex-premier Rishi Sunak. The leadership race is seen as crucial in determining the future direction of the party. Former immigration minister Robert Jenrick won the first round, picking up 28 votes of fellow Tory MPs. The bookmakers' favourite and right-winger Kemi Badenoch was second on 22. Shadow ministers James Cleverly, Tom Tugendhat and Mel Stride made it through to the next week's second round of voting but Patel dropped out after securing only 14 votes.

No suicidal thoughts link to diabetes, obesity drugs: UK

Britain's health regulator said the available data does not establish a link between a popular class of diabetes and obesity drugs, including Novo Nordisk's Wegovy, and suicidal thoughts. The Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency began a review of safety data for the class of drugs more than a year ago after some patients reported suicidal or self-harming thoughts. "We conclude that the available data does not support a causal association between GLP-1 receptor agonists and suicide, suicidal ideation, self-injury and depression, and therefore no updates to the product information is warranted at this time," it said

Japanese island eradicates rabbit-killing mongoose

Japan has wiped out all mongooses on a subtropical island, officials said, after the animals ignored the venomous snakes they were brought in to hunt and preyed on endangered local rabbits instead. About 30 of the venom-resistant predators were released on Amami Oshima, a Unesco World Heritage site, in the late 1970s to keep down the population of habu, a pit viper whose bite can be deadly to humans. However, the snakes are mostly active at night when mongooses prefer to sleep and the toothy mammals turned their ravenous appetites to local Amami rabbits, drastically

UK Grenfell Tower fire inquiry blames avoidable deaths on incompetence, greed

public inquiry into the devastating 2017 London Grenfell Tower blaze that killed 72 people blamed the disaster on failings by the government, construction industry and, most of all, the firms involved in fitting the exterior with flammable cladding.

The fire ripped through the 23-storey social housing block in one of London's richest areas during the early hours of June 14, 2017. It was Britain's deadliest blaze in a residential building since World War II.

"The simple truth is that the deaths that occurred were all avoidable," said inquiry chair Martin Moore-Bick.

In its long-awaited final report, the inquiry laid most responsibility for the disaster on the companies involved in the maintenance and refit of the apartment tower, failings by local and national authorities as well as companies which had dishonestly marketed combustible cladding materials as safe.

There was also widespread criticism and blame levelled at the thengovernment, the local authority of Kensington and Chelsea, the industry, regulatory groups, specific individuals and an ill-prepared fire brigade for years of inaction over fire safety in high-rise blocks.

"Not all of them bear the same

degree of responsibility for the eventual disaster, but as our reports show, all contributed to it in one way or another, in most cases, through incompetence, but in some cases, through dishonesty and greed," Moore-Bick said.

The inquiry report, which ran to almost 1,700 pages, said the inferno was the culmination of "decades of failure", with profits put before peo-

"The duty of government should be to safeguard life, whilst protecting us from corporate greed," said Grenfell United, a group representing some survivors and bereaved families. "But for too long, they have aided corporations, facilitating them to profit and dictate regulation." While British police have said 58 people and 19 firms and organisations are under investigation, prosecutions - including for corporate manslaughter and fraud - remain vears away because of the complexity and need to consider the inquiry's report. Prime Minister Keir Starmer apologised to the relatives of victims and survivors on behalf of the British state, saying they had been failed

for years "It should never have happened. The country failed to discharge its most fundamental duty, to protect you and your loved ones," he said in parliament where some bereaved relatives watched on. "Today is a long awaited day of truth, but it must now lead to a day of justice?

An earlier report by the inquiry team in 2019, which focused on the events of the night, found an electrical fault in a refrigerator in a fourth floor apartment started the fire.

Flames then spread uncontrollably, mainly because the tower had been covered during a 2016 refurbishment with cladding - exterior panels designed to improve appearance and add insulation - made of flammable aluminium composite material that acted as a source of

The harrowing accounts, including recordings from those who perished while awaiting rescuers and having followed official guidance to stay put, prompted fury and national soul-searching over building standards and the treatment of lowincome communities.

The inquiry, headed by retired judge Martin Moore-Bick, found a litany of failings; lessons had not been learned from past high-rise tower blazes and testing systems were inadequate.

The most overt blame was laid at the feet of those involved in the refurbishment of the tower with the flammable cladding. The inquiry said architect Studio E, principal contractor Rydon, and cladding sub-contractor Harley all bore considerable responsibility for disaster.

Fire safety inspectors Exova were also blamed for the building being left "in a dangerous condition on completion of the refurbishment".



The London Fire Brigade tackled a blaze at a residential tower block in the south east of the capital yesterday. There were no reports of any injuries. "Ten fire engines and around 70 firefighters tackled a fire at a block of flats on Rosenthal Road in Catford. Two flats were alight. There are currently no reports of any injuries," the fire brigade said in a statement. The cause of the fire was under investigation.

World Bank hikes India's economic growth forecast

'ndia should focus on labourintensive exports to boost employment, the World Bank said, noting that the country's manufacturing industry has not fully seized opportunities from China's exit from these sectors.

"India should also try to conquer less advanced markets," said Auguste Tano Kouame, World Bank country director, during the release of the "India Development Update" report.

He said there was a lot of untapped demand for Indian goods, such as textiles and footwear in Africa and Latin America.

India's high-tech exports, including mobiles and services, have grown significantly over the past decade but the country has lost ground in low-skilled sectors like apparel, leather, and textiles to Bangladesh and Vietnam, which

benefited from China's withdrawal from labour-intensive manufacturing, the report said.

"With rising costs of production and declining productivity, India's share in global apparel exports has declined from 4% in 2018 to 3% in 2022," the report said. The World Bank also raised its economic growth forecast for India to 7% for the current fiscal year, from an earlier estimate of 6.6%, helped by government spending on infrastructure.

India supports policy of development, not expansionism: Modi

India supports a policy of development and not expansionism, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said in Brunei yesterday, though he did not name any country. Brunei is located south of the South China Sea. which is claimed almost entirely by Beijing. Ties between India and China have been strained since 20 Indian and four Chinese troops were killed in a border clash on their Himalavan frontier in 2020. Modi also said India supports freedom of navigation and overflight under international laws similar to the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea, which provides a framework for global maritime navigation and regulates use of marine resources. Modi later arrived in Singapore to "deepen strategic partnership" at the invitation of his Singaporean counterpart Lawrence Wong after wrapping his visit to Brunei. Modi was slated to meet Singapore President Tharman Shanmugaratnam and ex-prime ministers Lee Hsien Loong and Goh Chok Tong during the trip, his fifth to Singapore.

Bangladesh factories close after protests, say police

ore than 80 factories in Bangladesh closed yesterday, including in the key garment sector, over security fears as protests hit industrial areas near the capital Dhaka, police

The closures come as the new interim government seeks to reassure investors after mass studentled protests that toppled ex-premier Sheikh Hasina last month.

Bangladesh's 3,500 garment factories account for around 85% of its \$55bn in annual exports but the unrest last month resulted in significant disruption to the linchpin industry.

Maintaining supply chains for the garment trade is one of the major challenges faced by Mohamed Yunus, the Nobel Peace Prize laureate asked to lead an interim government after Hasina fled to India on August 5.

Hundreds of people protested in front of factories vesterday morning demanding jobs and better pay, prompting several other factories in the industrial districts of Savar, Ashulia and Gazipur to shut for security reasons.

"Workers of some factories... started protesting and calling fellow workers from other factories to join the protest," said Sarwar Alam, a senior officer in the industrial police unit in Ashulia and Savar, told AFP.

Alam said "around 80 factories" then told workers to take a day off.

Union leader Taslima Akhter said some demands made by the workers were "just" but also said elements were seeking to stir up trouble to "utilise the opportunity of discontent".

Protesters made a range of demands including better overtime pay, as well as for more men to be hired in a female-dominated in-

Indonesia to deport to Philippines fugitive ex-mayor

ndonesia will deport to the Philippines a fugitive former mayor accused of ties to Chinese criminal syndicates and money-laundering to the tune of more than 100mn pesos (\$1.8mn), Jakarta's law minister said yesterday.

Alice Guo, also known as Chinese national Guo Hua Ping, is wanted by the Philippine senate for refusing to appear before a congressional investigation into

the alleged criminal ties.

Guo, who says she is a naturalborn Philippine citizen, has denied the accusations, calling them "malicious".

The Indonesian minister said Guo would be deported to the Philippines, but the timing of her return had yet to be fixed.

"(The timing) depends on the police investigation results," the minister, Supratman Andi Agtas,

Guo was arrested along with a Chinese monk and was helped by a former Chinese police officer during her escape from the Philippines, Supratman said, but gave no

details. Her lawyer of record, Stephen David, did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

The case comes at a time of growing suspicion in the Philippines about China's activities, amid increasingly tense disputes over their claims in the busy waterway of the South China Sea.

Authorities in Manila, including justice and immigration officials, had earlier confirmed Guo's arrest in Tangerang, near the Indonesian capital of Jakarta.

"The close co-operation between our two governments has made this arrest possible," Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. said in a statement, adding that Guo's return was being finalised yesterday.

"The arm of the law is long and it will reach you," he said, warning that wrongdoers' efforts to escape justice would prove futile.

After her return, Guo, who cut her hair short in an attempt at disguise, will be handed to law enforcement and then the senate, Jaime Santiago, director of the National Bureau of Investigation, told a press conference.

Philippine law enforcement agencies, including the Anti-Money Laundering Council (AMLC), last month jointly filed multiple counts of money laundering against Guo and 35 others to the justice department.

They accused Guo and her coconspirators of having laundered criminal proceeds amounting to more than 100mn pesos (\$1.8mn).

Guo ran for office as a Philippine citizen but her fingerprints

were later found to match those of a Chinese national, Guo Hua Ping.

Removed from office as mayor of Bamban town in the province of Tarlac, Guo fled the country in July, travelling on her Philippine passport to neighbouring Malaysia and Singapore, before going to Indonesia in August, the anti-crime agency says.

The senate launched an investigation in May after a casino raid in Bamban in March uncovered what law enforcement officials said were scams run from a facility built on land she partly owned.

Inside 'golden age' of alien hunting

Nestled between mountains in a secluded corner of West Virginia, a giant awakens: the Green Bank Telescope begins its nightly vigil, scanning the cosmos for secrets. If intelligent life exists beyond Earth, there's a good chance the teams analysing the data from the world's largest, fully steerable radio astronomy facility will be the first to know.

"People have been asking themselves the question, 'Are we alone in the universe?' ever since they first gazed up at the night sky and wondered if there were other worlds out there," says Steve Croft, project scientist for the Breakthrough Listen initiative.

For the past decade, this groundbreaking scientific endeavour has partnered with a pioneering, US government-funded site built in the 1950s to search for "technosignatures" - traces of technology that originate far beyond our own solar system.

The search for extraterrestrial intelligence, or "SETI," was long dismissed as the realm of eccentrics and was even cut off from federal funding by Congress thirty years ago. But today, the field is experiencing a renaissance and seeing an influx of graduates, bolstered by advances in artificial intelligence and machine learning, as well as recent discoveries showing that nearly every star in the night sky hosts planets, many of

"It feels to me like this is something of a golden age," says Croft, an Oxford-trained radio astronomer who began his career studying astrophysical phenomena, from supermassive black holes to the emissions of exploding stars. The story of the "National Radio Quiet Zone" dates back to 1958, when the US federal government designated a region in West Virginia to help astronomers shield their sensitive equipment from interference. This means no radio signals, no cellphone coverage, and limited Wi-Fi for the surrounding community. Even the vehicles transporting staff to and from the telescope must run on diesel, as gas cars' spark plugs generate electrical interference.

"I think the community takes a certain pride in having a premier scientific facility right here," says Paul Vosteen, who has worked at the observatory for the past eight years.

The search for intelligence was long dismiss as the realm of

Standing on the highest platform of the 100m giant dish, Vosteen gestures toward the Allegheny Mountains, which act as a natural barrier for radio signals in this bowl-shaped valley. Radio astronomy began by happy accident when American physicist Karl Jansky discovered radio waves coming from the centre of our galaxy, the Milky Way, in 1933.

Since then, it has allowed astronomers to peer beyond the planets, stars, and dust visible through optical telescopes.

From discovering pulsars to conducting sensitive observations of atomic hydrogen that shed new light on galaxy formation - and more recently, detecting fast radio bursts - radio astronomy has been key to numerous advances. There's also a long-standing theory that if other civilisations exist, they might emit radio waves, just as ours has since the dawn of radio communication in the 19th century.

In Carl Sagan's novel Contact, humanity is first alerted to extraterrestrial presence by a retransmission of Adolf Hitler's opening speech at the 1936 Summer Olympics — the first TV signal strong enough to escape Earth's ionosphere.

A framework for estimating the number of detectable civilisations scattered across the galaxy is found in the Drake Equation, devised by the legendary astronomer Frank Drake. Now one of the most recognised formulas in science, it's even a popular tattoo and T-shirt choice among alien enthusiasts. Each year, for a week in late spring, Breakthrough Listen's team from the University of California, Berkeley, makes a pilgrimage to the telescope during a period of track maintenance for the 17-million-pound structure.

"It's a relaxing time; every time I'm here, it's nice being in the National Radio Quiet Zone because there's no cellphone, no television - it's a kind of focused environment," says Matt Lebofsky, lead system

"Sometimes we need to metaphorically kick the tires, do things ourselves to get a ground truth about how our servers are behaving? Inside the server room, the sound of 6,000 whirring hard drives holding 40 petabytes of data-equivalent to 40,000 laptops-makes it impossible to speak without shouting.

"We're essentially looking for 'weird things' in the data," Croft explains, something that suggests life forms might be trying to reach out, or that scientists are picking up their accidental transmissions.

There have been a few moments of heightened excitement in the SETI community, including the 1977 detection of the so-called "Wow!" signal from the constellation Sagittarius, which remains unexplained.

More recently, in 2020, the team identified Breakthrough Listen Candidate 1 from the nearest star system, Proxima Centauri, but after extensive analysis, it was concluded to be human radio interference.

"It's not deflating at all," insists Lebofsky. On the contrary, he feels more optimistic than ever, given the vast amounts of data now being collected and processed compared to the early days. "I feel like the chances are improving exponentially every year."

US finds probable launch site of new N-powered Russia missile

wo US researchers say they have identified the probable deployment site in Russia of the 9M370 Burevestnik, a new nuclear-powered, nuclear-armed cruise missile touted by President Vladimir Putin as "invincible".

Putin has said the weapon dubbed the SSC-X-9 Skyfall by Nato - has an almost unlimited range and can evade US missile defences. But some Western experts dispute his claims and the Burevestnik's strategic value, saying it will not add capabilities that Moscow does not already have and risks a radiationspewing mishap.

Using images taken on July 26 by Planet Labs, a commercial satellite firm, the two researchers identified a construction project abutting a nuclear warhea storage facility known by two names By Jonathan Landay

Washington Vologda-20 and Chebsara - as the new missile's potential deployment site. The facility is 295 miles north of

Reuters is the first to report this development.

Decker Eveleth, an analyst with the CNA research and analysis organisation, found the satellite imagery and identified what he assessed are nine horizontal launch pads under construction. They are located in three groups inside high berms to shield them from attack or to prevent an accidental blast in one from detonating missiles in the others, he said.

The berms are linked by roads to what Eveleth concluded are likely buildings where the missiles and their components would be serviced, and to the existing complex of five nuclear warhead storage bunkers.

The site is "for a large, fixed missile system and the only large, fixed missile system that they're (Russia) currently developing is the Skyfall," said Eveleth.

Russia's defence ministry and Washington embassy did not respond to a request to comment on his assessment, Burevestnik's strategic value, its test record and the risks it poses.

A Kremlin spokesman said these were questions for the defence ministry and declined further comment.

The US State Department, the CIA, the Office of the Director of National Intelligence and the US Air Force National Air and Space Intelligence Center declined to comment.

The identification of the missile's probable launch site suggests that Russia is proceeding with its deployment after a series of tests in recent years marred by problems, said Eveleth and the second researcher, Jeffery Lewis, of the Middlebury Institute of International Studies at Monterey.

Lewis agreed with Eveleth's assessment after reviewing the imagery at his request. The imagery "suggests something very unique, very different. And obviously, we know that Russia is developing this nuclear-powered missile," he said.

Hans Kristensen of the Federation of American Scientists, who also studied the Vologda imagery at Eveleth's request, said that it appears to show launch pads and other features "possibly" related to Burevestnik. But he said he could not make a definitive assessment because Moscow does not typically place missile launchers next to nuclear warhead storage.

Eveleth, Lewis, Kristensen and three other experts said Moscow's normal practice has been stockpiling nuclear payloads for land-based missiles far from launch sites - except for those on its deployed Intercontinental Ballistic Missile (ICBM) force.

But deploying the Burevestnik at Vologda would allow the Russian military to stockpile the nuclear-armed missiles in its bunkers, making them available to launch quickly, said Lewis and

Deputy Foreign Minister Sergei Ryabkov said Russia will make changes to its guidelines on the use of nuclear weapons in response to what it regards as Western escalation in the war in Ukraine, state news agency TASS reported on Sunday.

A 2020 report by the United States Air Force's National Air and Space Intelligence Center said that if Russia successfully brought the Burevestnik into service, it would give Moscow a "unique weapon with intercontinental-range

But the weapon's chequered past and design limitations raised doubts among eight experts interviewed by Reuters about whether its deployment would change the nuclear stakes for the West and other Russian foes.

The Burevestnik has a poor test record of at least 13 known tests, with only two partial successes, since 2016, according to the Nuclear Threat Initiative (NTI), an advocacy group focused on reducing nuclear, biological and emergent technology risks.

The setbacks include a 2019 blast during the botched recovery of an unshielded nuclear reactor allowed to "smolder" on the White Sea floor for a year following a prototype crash, according to State Department reports.

Russia's state nuclear agency Rosatom said five staff members died during the testing of a rocket on August 8. Putin presented their widows with top state awards, saying the weapon they were developing was without equal in the world, without naming the Burevestnik.

Pavel Podvig, a Geneva-based expert on Russia's nuclear forces,

Lewis, Eveleth, and other experts said it will not add capabilities that Moscow's nuclear forces already do not have, including the ability to overwhelm US missile defences. Moreover, its nuclear-

powered engine threatens to disgorge radiation along its flight path and its deployment risks an accident that could contaminate the surrounding region, said Chervl Rofer, a former US nuclear weapons scientist and other experts.

"The Skyfall is a uniquely stupid weapon system, a flying Chernobyl that poses more threat to Russia than it does to other countries," agreed Thomas Countryman, a former top State Department official with the Arms Control Association, referring to the 1986 nuclear plant disaster.

NATO did not respond to questions about how the alliance ould respond to the weapon's deployment.

Little publicly is known about the Burevestnik's technical details.

Experts assess that it would be sent aloft by a small solid-fuel rocket to drive air into an engine containing a miniature nuclear reactor. Superheated and possibly radioactive air would be blasted out, providing forward thrust.

Putin unveiled it in March 2018, saying the missile would be "low flying," with nearly unlimited range, an unpredictable flight path and "invincible" to current and future defences.

Many experts are sceptical of Putin's claims.

The Burevestnik, they say, could have a range of some 15,000 miles - compared to more than 11,000 miles for the Sarmat, Russia's newest ICBM - while its subsonic speed would make it detectable.

"It's going to be as vulnerable as any cruise missile," said Kristensen. "The longer it flies, the more vulnerable it becomes because there is more time to track it. I don't understand Putin's motive here."

The Burevestnik's deployment is not banned by New START, the last US-Russian accord limiting strategic nuclear weapon deployments, which expires in February 2026.

A provision allows Washington to request negotiations with Moscow on bringing the Burevestnik under the caps but a State Department spokesperson said no such talks had been sought.

Citing the war in Ukraine, Russia has spurned US calls for unconditional talks on replacing New START, stoking fears of an all-out nuclear arms race when

Podvig said Moscow might use the missile as a bargaining chip if talks ever resume.

He called the Burevestnik a "political weapon" that Putin used to bolster his strongman image before his 2018 re-election and to telegraph to Washington that it cannot dismiss his concerns over US missile defences and other issues.

Sectors such as telecommunications, energy, navigation, aviation, and tourism represent promising investment opportunities in Finland. Forests are an important economic resource in the country, as they are a source of wood, paper, and chemical industries. Wood plays a significant role in Finnish exports. Agriculture is prevalent in the southern region, where wheat and beets are grown. 4 dead in US school shooting in Georgia

A t least four people died and nine were wounded in a high school shooting in the US state of Georgia yesterday, law enforcement authorities said, with a suspect taken into custody.

After the latest chapter of America's gun violence crisis — nearly 400 mass shootings this year alone, by one tally — people gathered at a sports field outside Apalachee High School, some forming a circle with their arms linked.

The Georgia Bureau of Investigation said four people had been killed. There was no immediate word on a motive.

"An additional nine taken to various hospitals with injuries. Suspect in custody and alive. Reports that the suspect has been 'neutralised' are inaccurate," the bureau said in a social media post.

Earlier, school authorities were reported to have sent a message to parents saying they were enforcing a "hard lockdown after reports of gunfire."

After the all-clear was given, parents were invited to the school to be reunited with their children, with long lines of vehicles visible outside.

A student told local media that he saw blood on the floors and a body as he was led out of the building by authorities. "I heard gunshots go off... I thought it

was fake until I heard more gunshots and screaming," said the student, whose name was not given by the Fox 5 News channel.

The school is near the town of Winder,

about 45 miles northeast of Atlanta, the state capital.

US President Joe Biden said he was

mourning the dead.

"Students across the country are learning how to duck and cover instead of how to read and write. We cannot continue to accept this as normal," he said, referring to the frequen-

cy of such attacks across the country.
School shootings have become a sadly regular occurrence in the United States, where about a third of adults own a firearm and regulations on purchasing even powerful military-style rifles are lax.

Polls show a majority of voters favour stricter controls on the use and purchase of firearms, but the powerful gun ownership lobby is opposed to additional restrictions and lawmakers have repeatedly failed to act.

Speaking at a campaign event in New Hampshire after the shooting, Vice-President Kamala Harris said it was time to end the "epidemic of gun violence."

Local television footage showed ambulances driving across a school field about two hours after the attack was first reported, and scores of vehicles parked around the school

A crowd of people was visible on the football field, with some gathered in a circle with their arms linked.
