

Netanyahu insists that Israel must retain control over the Philadelphi Corridor along the Egypt-Gaza border. Hamas is demanding complete Israeli withdrawal from the area and said Netanyahu's position "aims to thwart reaching an agreement".

The Palestinian group says a new deal is unnecessary because they agreed months ago to a truce outlined by Biden. "We do not need new proposals," Hamas said in a statement.

"We warn against falling into the trap of Netanyahu.. who uses negotiations to prolong the aggression against our people," the group said.

US National Security Council spokesman John Kirby nonetheless said that Washington believes a ceasefire deal is 90% agreed.

But he added that "nothing is negotiated until everything is negotiated, and the things that are still in play right now are very, very detailed... issues, and that's when

things get difficult."

Parliament and former minister for development co-operation and foreign trade of Finland Ville Skinnari stressed that the visit of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani to Finland reflects the active bilateral co-operation relations during the past years, especially after the opening of the Qatari and Finnish embassies in both countries.

In remarks to Qatar News

Agency (QNA), Skinnari said that work has been done to strengthen the partnership between the two countries for decades, seeking to raise bilateral relations to the next level in all fields, including business, investment, education, foreign relations and security, especially since the State of Qatar plays a major role in the world today.

He noted the active level of Qatari-Finnish parliamentary relations, indicating that they are not just joint relations between the parliaments of the two countries, but extend beyond that, being

more diverse and co-operative, especially with regard to strengthening bilateral relations between the two countries on the one hand, and between working on the international arena and multilateral co-operation within the framework of the United Nations (UN) and the European Union (EU) on the other hand.

The member of the Finnish Parliament stressed the importance of the roles played by parliaments in the world, especially at the political level, as they demonstrate a long-term commitment between countries and are important evi-

dence of the level of practical cooperation between them in various fields, pointing to the importance of Qatari-Finnish parliamentary relations and the need to strengthen them.

He praised the role of the State of Qatar and its active efforts in multilateral activities and events, including its support for the work of the UN in a challenging environment, expressing Finland's desire to co-operate and play similar positive roles, which would contribute to achieving positive results and solutions for the region and the world.

Regarding the situation in the Middle East, especially the war in the Gaza Strip, Skinnari said that what the region is witnessing is very unfortunate, adding that the only thing Finland and the EU should do is to send a strong message recognising Palestine as an independent state.

He said that Finland must follow the example of many other European countries that have recognised the State of Palestine, as this is a concrete step forward, stressing the importance of working to bring peace to the region and the He underlined the need to look at the world based on international rules and the entire legislative framework when it comes to international law and the extent of commitment to it, expressing his disappointment at the EU's calm position regarding the events taking place.

Concluding his remarks to QNA, the member of the Finnish Parliament said that Nordic countries like Finland have really paved the way for recognising the State of Palestine, because that is the first step needed to achieve more sustainable solutions.


Minister meets Egypt's deputy PM

mnesty International has urged a war crimes probe into Israel razing homes and farms in eastern Gaza to expand a so-called buffer zone between it and the Palestinian territory.

"Using bulldozers and manually laid explosives, the Israeli military has unlawfully destroyed agricultural land and civilian buildings, razing entire neighbourhoods, including homes, schools and mosques," it said. The London-based rights group said the levelling

The expanded buffer zone covers around 58sq km (22sq miles), or about 16% of the Gaza Strip, it said. More than 90% of buildings within that zone appeared to have been destroyed or severely damaged,

More than half of the agricultural land in the area showed "a decline in health and intensity of crops due to the ongoing conflict", it added.

"Our analysis reveals a pattern along the eastern perimeter of Gaza that is consistent with the systematic destruction of the entire area," said Amnesty's Erika Guevara-Rosas. "The homes were not destroyed as the result of intense fighting. Rather. the Israeli military deliberately razed the land after they had taken control of the area."

Amnesty investigator Barbara Marcolini said the level of destruction was unprecedented: "Once you analyse the context, you understand why these destructions should be investigated as war crimes." -

Six runaway elephants return to South African national park

Six elephants which escaped a renowned South African park through a river returned after a few hours of roaming neighbouring communities.

the country's parks agency said yesterday "The elephants returned overnight" to Kruger National Park, Ike Phaahla, a spokesman for South African National Parks told AFP. On Wednesday, the agency said that the large mammals had left the reserve through a river running through the park whose water levels were low.

The park initially tried to drive the elephants back using a helicopter, but a large crowd of nearby community members blocked the animals from returning, the spokesman said.

"The communities are quite close to the fence and they have plenty of fruit trees which they (the elephants) can smell from a mile away." he

The parks service said police had been deployed to control the situation between the elephants and the residents after it became "dangerous".

Cambodia says China to hand over two warships

Cambodia yesterday said China will soon hand over two warships to improve its defence capabilities, despite US fears about Beijing boosting its military influence in the strategic Gulf of Thailand. Cambodia is a close ally of Beijing and Washington has long harboured concerns about the Chinese-funded renovation of the kingdom's Ream naval base. Maly Socheata, a spokeswoman for the Cambodian defence ministry, said China would send the two new so-called Type O56C corvettes next year, at the earliest. She said the vessels are being built specially for Cambodia, and "are expected to be completed and given to Cambodia in 2025 or later.

Small meteor lights up Philippine sky

A small, bright meteor lit up skies over the northern Philippines early vesterday as it burned up entering the Farth's atmosphere, the European Space Agency and witnesses said. The 3.3-foot space rock, named 2024 RW1. collided with the Earth's atmosphere shortly after midnight and caused a "harmless" but "spectacular fireball" over the Philippines' Luzon island, the ESA said. The meteor, discovered through the Catalina Sky Survey, is only the ninth meteor that humans have ever spotted before impact. Businessman Allan Madelar, 28, said he waited an hour in Gonzaga, a municipality in Luzon, to watch the meteor with a friend.

Malaysia not to stop South China Sea exploration: PM

alaysian Prime Minister Anwar Ibrahim yesterday said the country will not stop its oil and gas exploration in the South China Sea despite claims by Beijing that Malaysia was infringing on its territory.

Anwar, speaking from Russia where he is on an official trip, said Malaysia's exploration activities were within its territory and were not intended to be provocative or hostile towards China, with whom it has friendly relations.

"Of course, we will have to operate in our waters and secure economic advantage, including drilling for oil, in our territory," Anwar said in a televised press conference in

"We have never denied the possibility of discussion (with China). But it doesn't mean we have to stop the operation in our area."

Malaysia's foreign ministry said on Wednesday it would investigate the leak of a classified diplomatic note from the Chinese foreign ministry. In the note, which was carried by a Philippine news outlet, Beijing asserted that Malaysia's oil and gas exploration in the South China Sea breached its territory.

The Chinese foreign ministry said it was "astonished" by the Philippine media report, saying there was an "ulterior motive" to it.

"As countries directly concerned in the South China Sea issue, China

and Malaysia have maintained close communication on properly handling their differences and disputes,"

Anwar said it was a matter of Malaysia's "economic survival" that the exploration continued.

China claims sovereignty over almost the entire South China Sea, including parts of the 200 nautical mile exclusive economic zones (EEZs) of the Philippines, Brunei, Malaysia, Taiwan and Vietnam, complicating energy exploration efforts by several of those countries.

Under international law, an EEZ does not denote sovereignty, but grants a country sovereign rights to extract natural resources from those

Malaysian state energy firm Petronas, or Petroliam Nasional Berhad, operates oil and gas fields in the South China Sea within Malaysia's EEZ and has in recent years had several encounters with Chinese vessels. Anwar said China has sent "one or two" protest notes to stop Malaysia's oil exploration activities, without specifying details, but stressed that the government would continue to explain to Beijing its position.

"We have said that we will not transgress other people's borders. That is our stringent policy and principles," he said.

"They know our position.... They have claimed that we are infringing on their territory. That is not the case. We say no, it is our territory.

"But if they continue with the dispute, then okay, we will have to listen, and they will have to listen?

Bangladesh ex-PM should 'keep quiet' until trial: Yunus

angladesh's ousted premier Sheikh Hasi-Banghatesh sousted premier shear has na should "keep quiet" while exiled in India until she is brought home for trial, interim leader Muhammad Yunus told Indian media yesterday.

Hasina, 76, fled to India by helicopter one month ago as protesters marched on her palace in a dramatic end to her iron-fisted rule of

An interim government led by Nobel laureate Yunus has been under public pressure to demand her extradition and trial over the hundreds of demonstrators killed during the weeks of unrest that ultimately toppled her.

"If India wants to keep her until the time Bangladesh wants her back, the condition would be that she has to keep quiet," Yunus, 84, told the Press Trust of India news agency. "Sitting in India, she is speaking and giving

instructions. No one likes it. It's not good for us or for India." Hasina has remained in India, her former

government's biggest patron and benefactor, since her August 5 overthrow, inflaming tensions between the two South Asian neighbours. She made a public statement the week after

her arrival calling for Bangladeshis to gather in Dhaka to mark the 1975 assassination of her father, independence hero Sheikh Mujibur Rah-

Hasina's comments were seen as a provocative effort to galvanise members of her Awami League party and undermine law and order in the fragile first days after Yunus took office.

The gathering was prevented by a counterdemonstration outside her childhood home in the capital by a mob that beat suspected Awami League supporters with sticks and rods.

Yunus did not say whether a formal extradition request had been made to India. His government has avoided committing itself to demanding her return.

Hasina's government was accused of widespread human rights abuses, including the mass detention and extrajudicial killing of her political opponents.

Numerous criminal cases have been lodged against Hasina and senior Awami League figures over the deaths of protesters in a police crackdown on the student-led uprising that ultimately ousted her.

Thousands attended a demonstration in Dhaka to mark one month since Hasina's toppling and to remember those killed during the unrest, with some chanting demands for the hanging of the "killer Hasina".

Japan to resume trial removal of Fukushima debris

The operator of Japan's stricken Fukushima nuclear power plant said it aims to carry out a trial removal of highly radioactive debris next week, after a previous attempt was suspended. Thirteen vears after an earthquake and tsunami hit Fukushima-Daiichi in one of the world's worst nuclear accidents, around 880 tonnes of extremely hazardous material remain inside. Late last month, Tokyo Electric Power Company had to suspend a removal procedure after a technical problem involving the installation of the necessary equipment. "It will take several days for us to prepare for a resumption... and we will be able to resume next week if all goes well as scheduled," a Tepco spokesman said. Three of Fukushima-Daiichi's six reactors were operating when a tsunami hit on March 11, 2011, knocking down cooling systems and sending them into meltdown in what became the worst nuclear disaster since Chernobyl.

China assures Wellington after spy report concerns

hina yesterday insisted it did not pose a threat to New Zealand's national security, after the country's spy service singled out Beijingbacked groups as a "complex intelligence concern".

New Zealand's security intelligence service levelled unusually candid criticisms at China in its annual threat report, released this week, saying ongoing foreign interference efforts were "complex and deceptive".

China's embassy in New Zealand hit back yesterday, branding such claims "entirely baseless" and "a figment of imagination or sheer fabrication".

"There is no competition to speak of between the two countries, and China is not a threat

to New Zealand," an embassy spokesperson said in a statement. Beijing was accused of infiltrating local groups, replacing authentic community views with those approved by the ruling party.

In one example, a Chineselanguage community news outlet was accused of regurgitating government talking points.

"The report's blatant attempts to discredit the Chinese diaspora and students are nothing but an effort to sow discord, create fear, and foster division," replied China's embassy spokesperson.

"This is highly irresponsible, reckless, and deeply unfair to the Chinese community." China's embassy suggested external forces - likely a veiled reference to the US - had been meddling to undermine relations between the trading partners.

China nears peak emissions as climate envoy meets US counterpart

s climate envoys from the world's top two greenhouse gas producers meet in Beijing this week, experts say China's emissions may finally be nearing their peak.

US climate envoy John Podesta will be looking to solidify Beijing's commitments - which include topping out its planet-warming emissions by 2030 - as he meets this week with counterpart Liu Zhenmin.

But with Beijing installing renewable capacity at record speed, and a construction slump dragging down emissions-heavy steel production, there are signs China could hit the peak early, though uncertainties remain.

"So much clean electricity... is being added that China can peak its emissions right now, if those additions are maintained and if overall energy demand growth moderates," said Lauri Myllyvirta of the Centre for Research on Energy and Clean Air (CREA).

China is building almost twice as much wind and solar energy capacity as every other country combined, data showed earlier this

That breakneck installation saw

it hit a target for wind and solar capacity in August, six years ahead of schedule.

And while coal remains king in China's electricity system, there are signs the world's second-biggest economy may be weaning itself off the fossil fuel.

Coal power permits fell 83% in the first half of this year, and no new coal-based steelmaking projects were approved in the same period.

China is the world's top emitter and biggest consumer of coal. making its progress central to global climate goals, said Myllyvirta. "Whether China's emissions

growth continues or turns into a

our ability to peak global emissions and start reducing them towards net zero," he said. In addition to solar and wind,

decline is absolutely decisive for

China's clean energy mix includes a significant amount of hydro and nuclear power.

China is the world's fastest growing nuclear power producer, according to the International Atomic Energy Agency, and last month alone approved plans for 11 new nuclear reactors.

But despite the growth in noncarbon energy sources, China's demand for coal still jumped last year,

helping drive a global increase. And coal-fired power generation

is projected to grow again this year in China, albeit at the lowest rate in almost a decade, according to the International Energy Agency.

"However, there is significant uncertainty concerning the availability of hydropower and the growth in power demand," it

Even as coal permits fell, construction began on more than 41 gigawatts of coal projects during the first half of 2024, CREA and Global Energy Monitor said.

That nearly equalled 2022 levels and accounts for over 90% of new coal construction worldwide.

India's economic growth slowed to 6.7% year-on-year in the April-June quarter, below the polled estimate of 6.9% and the Reserve Bank of India's projection of 7.1%, as a decline in government spending during national elections weighed.

"Fundamental growth drivers of

the Indian economy are not slowing, they are gaining momentum and this gives us confidence to say that the Indian growth story remains intact," Das said in a speech at the annual FIBAC banking conference. Das said agriculture should perform better during the rest of the year due to a good monsoon and aid a further pick-up in rural demand,

while strong investment activity would also see a further boost from government capex picking up pace.

"It is evident that India is on a sustainable growth path. Consumption and investment demand, the two main drivers of growth, are growing in tandem. Overall, the RBI's projection of GDP growth at 7.2% for 2024-25 does not appear

out of place." Das said currently the balance between inflation and growth is well poised but reiterated the need to maintain price stability to support growth over the medium to longer term.

The pace of disinflation has been frequently interrupted by volatile and elevated food inflation, the chief said. "It is the headline infla-

tion that matters. It is the headline inflation with food inflation having a weight of 46% that the people understand." Das said.

He, however, added that with the monsoon progressing well there is greater optimism that the food inflation outlook could become more favourable over the course of the

UK moves to oust hereditary peers from upper house

The UK government yesterday introduced legislation to axe seats in the House of Lords retained for hereditary lawmakers as it moves to reform parliament's unelected upper cham-

The bill will remove the 92 seats reserved for peers who inherited their position as a member of an aristocratic family.

They hold titles such as duke, earl, viscount and baron. Britain is an anomaly among western governments in having such lawmak-

The move was a manifesto commitment of Prime Minister Keir Starmer's Labour party ahead of its landslide general election win in July, which returned it to power for the first time in 14 years.

It revives reform of the Lords that started under Tony Blair's Labour government in the late 1990s.

"This is a landmark reform to our constitution." Constitution Minister Nick Thomas-Symonds said in a statement.

"The hereditary principle in law-making has lasted for too long and is out of step with modern Britain.

"The second chamber plays a vital role in our constitution and people should not be voting on our laws in parliament by an accident of birth," he added. The legislation will easily pass the House of Commons lower chamber due to Labour's massive majority before it will have to be approved by the

It is not clear when exactly it will become law.

Lesotho in southern Africa is the only other country in the world with a hereditary element in its legislature, according to UK offi-

The scrapping of the hereditary peers has been described by Labour as a "first step in wider re-


The government says it wants to ultimately replace the Lords with an alternative second chamber that is more representative of the

The Lords comprises around 800 members, most of whom are appointed for life.

They include former MPs, typically appointed by departing prime ministers, along with people nominated after serving in prominent public- or private-sector roles, and senior Church of England clerics, including the Archbishop

of Canterbury. The primary role of the centuries-old chamber is to scrutinise the government.

It cannot override legislation sent from the popularly elected House of Commons, but it can amend and delay bills and initiate new draft laws.

India, Singapore sign deal to co-operate on semiconductors

Singapore, City

The leaders of India and Singapore yesterday signed an agreement to partner and co-operate in semiconductors, in a deal aimed at giving Singaporean firms a greater role in supply chains in the Indian market, the two countries said.

A memorandum of understanding (MoU) was signed during Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi's two-day visit to Singapore, his fifth overall and first since 2018.

"Singapore and India will leverage complementary strengths in their semiconductor ecosystems and tap on opportunities to build resilience in their semiconductor supply chains," Singapore's trade ministry said in a statement. "This will include governmentled policy exchanges on ecosystem development, supply chain resilience, and workforce development.

Tiny Singapore has long punched above its weight in the sector, accounting for 11% of the global semiconductor market, with 20% of global semiconductor equipment manufactured in the country. Semiconductors are a key plank of India's

business agenda, with a \$10bn package in place to boost the industry's push to compete in future with countries like chipmaking heavyweight Taiwan. India expects its semiconductor market to be worth \$63bn by 2026.

In February, it gave the go-ahead to construction of three semiconductor plants worth over \$15bn by firms including Tata Group and CG Power, with plans to manufacture and package chips for sectors including defence, autos and telecommunication. Modi met Singapore Prime Minister Law-

rence Wong, President Tharman Shanmugaratnam and former premier Lee Hsien Loong during the visit. Three other agreements were also signed, on digital technologies, education and skills development and on health and medicine, according to India's foreign ministry. India and Singapore yesterday also called for the peaceful resolution of all maritime disputes in the South China Sea in accordance with international law, without use of force.

"Both sides also called on all parties to resolve disputes through peaceful means without threat or use of force and exercise selfrestraint in the conduct of actions that could escalate tensions in the region," they said in a ioint statement.

Royal Navy says one killed in helicopter crash

Britain's Royal Navy yesterday said one person had been killed following an incident in which a helicopter was forced to ditch into the Channel during a training exercise.

"It is with great sadness that we must report a member of the Royal Navy has died following a training incident on Wednesday night," the Navy said in a statement on X

"A full investigation will take place. The incident involved a Merlin Mk4 helicopter in the **English Channel near Dorset** that ditched while conducting night flying exercises with HMS Queen Elizabeth. There were no other fatalities or serious iniuries.

Prime Minister Keir Starmer said he was deeply saddened by the death and paid tribute to those involved in the search operation. "My thoughts are with the family and loved ones during this painful time," he posted on X.

UK retailer to bring back 100-year old price pledge

ritish department store John Lewis is reintroducing its 100-year old "Never Knowingly Undersold" promise for customers on Monday, two years after it dropped it, hoping a revamped version of the price guarantee will help drive growth.

The employee-owned retailer, which also operates Waitrose supermarkets, returned to annual profit in March after three difficult years, and the new head of its department stores hopes the commitment to value will boost revenue. "It gets us back on the front

foot," executive director Peter Ruis told reporters yesterday. John Lewis has struggled

in recent years after investing

heavily to compete with online rivals at a time when a cost-ofliving crisis has affected the incomes of its typically more affluent customers.

But a turnaround effort is already underway, ahead of former Tesco executive Iason Tarry joining in mid-September as its new chair before incumbent Sharon White steps down.

Ruis said removing the price promise had caused customers to believe John Lewis had become more expensive.

Under the refreshed pledge, John Lewis will match prices on branded goods with 25 online and high street retailers including Amazon, Apple, Argos and rival department store House of

If customers find the same product more cheaply elsewhere within seven days they can claim the difference back.

Indians demand justice in candlelight march for slain doctor

ast crowds of Indians bearing candles marched through the streets of Kolkata early yesterday, demanding justice nearly one month on since the rape and murder of a doctor.

The discovery of the 31-year-old doctor's bloodied body at a staterun hospital in Kolkata on August 9 has stoked nationwide anger at the chronic issue of violence against

"We want justice", read one message spelt out in flickering candles and clay lamps.

"Let there be light, let there be justice", a sign held by protesters

The brutal murder has triggered protests across India - and repeated strikes by medics - demanding safer conditions for women.

While many protests and strikes have since calmed in the rest of India, regular demonstrations continue in the sprawling megacity of

Kolkata. Police said as many as 100,000 took part in the rally in Kolkata. Similar but smaller rallies were also held in the capital New Delhi.

"The heart of the entire nation is torn," said protester Rubina

Thousands gathered late on Wednesday evening, joining hundreds of doctors who are maintaining a strike, linking arms to form a human chain in a protest to "reclaim the night".

Many lights were turned out for an hour, plunging a swathe of the city into darkness, with protesters bearing flaming torches lighting up the city's night sky like fireflies.

"We will take back the night, time and again, until justice is delivered," said 35-year-old housewife Smita

Traffic ground to a halt in Kolkata's usually bustling main city streets, as women blocked the route with a mass sit-in, waving a sea of Indian flags.

At times, crowds shouted in anger, chanting "We Want Justice".

But they also paused in quiet reflection as the candles were lit, before softly singing.

The father of the murdered doctor also spoke at the rally outside the hospital where her battered body had been found, talking of his family's "broken hearts" and how they had been "shocked to the core" by the killing.

Demonstrators have given the murdered doctor the nickname "Abhaya", meaning "fearless".

One man has been detained for the murder, but West Bengal's government has faced public criticism for the handling of the investigation. The father spoke in fury at what

he said had been "so much pressure" on his family to rapidly cremate her

"We wanted to keep her body... What was the hurry to cremate her? Mystery shrouds her death", he said.

He also dismissed a state law passed on Tuesday - that could lead to the execution of rapists - as noth-

ing "but a populist sham". The protests were largely peaceful, although in places, small scuffles between the protesters and supporters of West Bengal state's ruling party, the All India Trinamool Congress

(AITC), broke out. "Justice delayed is justice denied", said schoolteacher Parbati Roy, 54, holding a candle.

"We are wanting to shed light on the investigation into the rape of the murder of the junior doctor."

India's Supreme Court has ordered a national task force to examine how to bolster security for healthcare workers, saying the "horrific" killing had "shocked the conscience of the nation".

The gruesome nature of the attack has invoked comparisons with the horrific 2012 gang rape and murder of a young woman on a Delhi bus.

It became a major political issue. and was seen as one factor in the ruling Bharatiya Janata Party's (BJP) subsequent success in elections.



Haiti's state of emergency now covers entire territory

aiti has expanded its state of emergency to cover the entire nation's territory, a spokesperson for Prime Minister Garry Conille said on Wednesday, as the Caribbean country battles violent gangs that have taken over much of the capital and started expanding into nearby regions.

Haiti's populous Ouest department, where the capital Port-au-Prince is located, was put under a state of emergency on March 3 under the administration of Conille's predecessor Ariel Henry, as a dramatic escalation in violence paralysed the capital and thousands of inmates escaped in two prison breaks.

The state of emergency was repeatedly renewed and other departments were later added, including the farming region of Artibonite that has suffered some of the worst violence, the Centre department and Nippes, on the southern peninsula.

Earlier on Wednesday, Conille said he had helped distribute materials and weapons for the Haitian army and national police in order to recover territories taken by gangs.

The announcement comes a day ahead of a planned visit to the Caribbean nation by US Secretary of State Antony Blinken.

The US is the largest funder of a UN-backed security mission that Henry requested in 2022 to help fight the gangs and reclaim terri-

A first contingent of 400 Kenyan police officers arrived in June and July, while a handful of other countries have pledged at least 2,500 more troops.

These have yet to arrive and the mission's mandate is set to expire at the start of October.

Nearly 580,000 people have been internally displaced by the conflict, hundreds of thousands deported back to Haiti, and close to 5mn people are facing severe hunger. - Reuters

Brazil expects more fires amid extreme low humidity

More than a thousand Brazilian municipalities were on alert yesterday due to very low humidity as the country is gripped by a drought that has fuelled wildfires. Flames reached a protected forest on the outskirts of the capital Brasilia, which was enveloped in smoke for the second time in two weeks, and where it has not rained in 130 days.

The National I Meteorology (Inmet) said in a report that Brasilia, as well as the southeast with its highly populated states of Sao Paulo and Minas Gerais, were among the worst affected by a "relative humidity of less than 12%".

This was a "very dangerous" situation due to the "great risk of forest fires"

Such low humidity also impacts residents' health and can cause pulmonary disease or headaches. In several dozen municipalities, the humidity level has fallen below the 10% threshold, even reaching 7%. a level "as low" as that seen in the Sahara, said Ana Paula Cunha, a researcher at the National Centre for Natural Disaster Monitoring (Cemaden). - AFP

Nicaragua releases 135 political prisoners after US negotiations

he United States has secured the release of 135 political prisoners in Nicaragua on humanitarian grounds, the White House said yesterday, adding that they will go to Guatemala before seeking to lawfully move to the United States or other

The release follows "months of negotiations between the US and Nicaragua", the US and Guatemala said in a joint statement.

Those released are all Nicaraguan citizens, the White House said, and include members of a Christian evangelical organisation, Catholic lay people, and students.

Last year, more than 200 Nicaraguan political prisoners were freed and flown to the United States.

At the time, President Daniel Ortega who has launched a crackdown on dissent

in recent years - described the release as a push to expel criminals who were working to undermine Nicaragua.

His administration did not immediately comment on the latest release.

The plane carrying the Nicaraguans arrived in Guatemala early yesterday morning, Guatemalan President Bernardo Arevalo's office said.

Those freed will stay in Guatemala, where they will have the opportunity to lawfully request to go to another country. The US provided their transport and will

feed and house them as well, it said in the statement with Guatemala. "Thank you to everyone for my freedom. Long live a free Nicaragua!" Francisco Arteaga told reporters as he raised his fist

"It is heartbreaking to know that people who we consider family are sitting in prison for sharing the Gospel," Mountain Gateway President Jon Britton Hancock said in a March statement.

Ortega has accused church leaders of looking to overthrow his government after the Catholic Church tried to mediate talks between the administration and anti-gov-

ernment protesters in 2018. The mass street protests were met with a violent counterattack from Ortega's security forces in which more than 300 civilians were killed, according to rights groups and international observers.

Since then, the government has arrested or expelled scores of Catholic priests and shuttered several thousand civil society groups, most accused of financial crimes.

Ortega, a 78-year-old former leftist guerrilla who battled US-backed forces in the 1980s, returned to power in 2007 and initially had been seen as more moderate.

However, he has since lifted presidential term limits and seized control of all branches of government and instituted a sweeping crackdown on groups seen as threats to his

rench President Emmanuel Macron has named the European Union's E Brexit negotiator Michel Barnier as new prime minister, counting on the veteran politician to end two months of political deadlock after snap elections.

Barnier, 73, the oldest premier in the history of modern France, has been tasked with forming "a unifying government in the service of the country", the presidency said.

In a striking contrast, the former foreign minister succeeds Gabriel Attal, 35, a man less than half his age and who served only eight months in office during a period of political turbulence unprecedented in recent Macron's move towards "cohabitation"

with Barnier, a member of the right-wing Republicans (LR) party and not affiliated to the president's centrist faction, was greeted with dismay by the left which will now seek to topple him with a no-confidence motion.

Controversially, the president appears to be counting on the far-right National Rally (RN) of Marine Le Pen to keep Barnier in power by voting against such a motion.

A left-wing coalition emerged as France's biggest political force after the elections earlier this summer, but with not enough seats for an overall majority in an imbroglio that has taken weeks to unravel.

Macron's centrist faction and the far-right make up the two other major groups in the National Assembly, with the RN as the single largest party. The president had considered a string of

none of whom mustered enough support to guarantee a stable government. Macron believes Barnier can find a major-

ity in the fractured National Assembly, according to the presidency. "The president believes the prime minister and the future government can meet the

The former foreign minister and EU commissioner is "Macron-compatible" and would not be immediately voted out by parliament, an advisor to the president told AFP, asking not to be named.

As well as two stints as an EU commissioner and handling the thorny negotiations on Britain's exit from the bloc, Barnier served as a minister under the right-wing administrations of presidents Jacques Chirac and Nicolas Sarkozy.

EU Commission President Ursula von der Leyen welcomed his nomination, saying that she knew Barnier had "the interests of Europe and France at heart".

With a half century career behind him, Barnier who proudly extols his origins in the French Alps rather than Paris, first become a member of parliament aged just 27.

The composition of the new cabinet - set to be announced in the coming days - will be closely watched for signs of concessions to Macron's political foes.

Hard-left leader Jean-Luc Melenchon, whose Unbowed party (LFI) and allies belong to a left-wing bloc, said Macron naming Barnier meant the election had been "stolen from the French".

US judge temporarily blocks new Biden student debt relief plan

US judge has temporarily blocked President Joe Biden's administration from implementing its latest student debt forgiveness plan, just days after seven Republican-led states filed a lawsuit seeking to halt the measure.

US District Judge J Randal Hall in Augusta, Georgia, said the states had established a likelihood of proving the Education Department lacked authority to cancel student loans under the plan, which the states alleged it was on the verge of doing.

Hall issued a temporary restraining order after Republi-

can state attorneys-general filed a lawsuit on Tuesday over a proposed Education Department rule in April that would benefit an estimated 27.6mn borrowers with federal student

The state attorneys-general said they had obtained documents showing that the department had instructed federal loan servicers to begin cancelling hundreds of billions of dollars of loans as soon as this week, before the rule was

At least \$73bn in loans could be cancelled overnight, their lawsuit said, and billions in further debt relief could follow.

The states argue that the Education Department has no authority to carry out such debt forgiveness.

Hall, an appointee of Republican former president George W Bush, said that he decided to "hastily" issue the order pausing the policy pending a September 18 hearing in order to preserve the status quo.

Small-island solidarity and climate common sense

While efforts to mitigate and adapt to climate change will remain a top international priority for decades to come, the most urgent risks from global warming require immediate action and new ideas. As UN Secretary-General António Guterres said at the Pacific Islands Forum in Tonga last month, "If we save the Pacific, we save the world."

Since the Paris climate agreement was signed eight years ago, much progress has been made to create a more sustainable economy, with new technological solutions allowing countries to maintain strong growth while also reducing carbon-dioxide emissions. Governments, businesses, and households are increasingly determined to support climate investments. Renewable energy is becoming businesses first choice for electricity generation. Innovation is boosting the competitiveness of green alternatives. And financial institutions are allocating more than \$1tn each year to green projects.

In this context, sustained and concerted action at a global level will be the key to success. Yet the progress has been too slow for the world's most vulnerable regions. For people living on small islands and grappling with rising sea levels, extreme weather, and ocean warming. climate change is already an existential threat. Despite their minimal carbon footprints, these regions are at the forefront of the problem. Their challenges today will become the global crises of tomorrow.

For small islands, adaptation is critical. Caribbean and Pacific Island states, along with parts of Latin America, Africa, and Asia, face many more severe climate-related problems than other parts of the world. They also are more vulnerable financially. Whether borrowing money to recover from natural disasters or investing to strengthen their resilience

to climate change, they face higher interest rates, and these additional costs come at the expense of investments in

health and education. As the world leader in humanitarian and development aid, the European Union is one of the closest partners that small island states and other vulnerable regions have in

combating climate change. Under the EU's Global Gateway investment strategy, we have put our money where our mouth is, because our commitment reflects both genuine solidarity and common sense.

We know that the costs of a disorderly green transition would far exceed the costs of investing in climate adaptation and mitigation right now. The gradual, credible changes that we make today are what will spare us the massive economic, social, and environmental damage caused by unchecked climate change. A few recent examples illustrate our commitment. In Kiribati, a small island state in the central Pacific, rising sea levels may render many islands uninhabitable within a few decades. So, the EU and its financial arm, the European Investment Bank, are working with the World Bank and other international financial institutions to study the possibility of building a new seaport, which will help relocate people from smaller islands to safer ground. Such projects can be a beacon of hope for vulnerable populations everywhere.

In the Caribbean, where violent storms and rising temperatures are straining water infrastructure and the surrounding seas and marine ecosystems, an EU-backed water management and clean oceans programme will provide expert support to launch water projects in 15 Caribbean countries. This work will improve water security, sanitation, solid-waste management, and flood protection, as well as helping to preserve our oceans. The EU and EIB are also pooling resources to transform the way Cabo Verde (an island country off the coast of West Africa) uses and produces energy. This ambitious project will assist the government's plan to phase out fossil fuels by 2040. By focusing on renewable energy and storage, it will cut pollution and significantly benefit Cabo Verde's water sector, which relies heavily on desalination – a highly energy-intensive process. With far-reaching environmental and economic benefits, such investments will make Cabo Verde a model for sustainable development across the region.

Finally, in Barbados, we are supporting investments to help deal with floods and hurricanes. One project, in partnership with the Inter-American Development Bank, will improve sewage treatment and groundwater management, and we are also supporting a system to recycle wastewater for agricultural use. To enable these investments, we are funding a "debt for climate conversion" programme that responds to Barbados's particular financial needs in the bond market.

These projects demonstrate what meaningful support for small island states looks like. The Global Gateway programme is helping not only with adaptation and water security, but also with renewable energy, digital innovation, education, health care, and green transportation. -Project Syndicate

What a Trump victory would mean for the US economy

he US presidential election in November is critical for many reasons. At stake is not just the survival of American democracy, but also sound stewardship of the economy, with far-reaching implications for the rest of the world.

American voters face a choice not only between different policies, but between different policy objectives. While Vice-President Kamala Harris, the Democratic nominee, has yet to detail her economic agenda fully, she likely would preserve the central tenets of President Joe Biden's programme, which include strong policies to maintain competition, preserve the environment (including reducing greenhouse-gas emissions), reduce the cost living, maintain growth, enhance national economic sovereignty and resilience, and mitigate inequality.

By contrast, her opponent, former president Donald Trump, has no interest in creating a more just, robust, and sustainable economy. Instead, the Republican ticket is offering a blank check to coal and oil companies and cozying up to billionaires like Elon Musk and Peter Thiel. It is a recipe for making the US economy weaker, less competitive, and less equal.

Moreover, while sound economic stewardship requires setting goals and designing policies to achieve them, the ability to respond to shocks and seize new opportunities is no less important. We already have a sense of how each candidate would perform in this regard. Trump failed miserably in responding to the Covid-19 pandemic during his previous administration, resulting in more than a million deaths. At a

time when the United States was desperately in need of leadership, he suggested that people should inject bleach.

Responding to unprecedented events requires difficult judgment calls based on the best science. In Harris, the US has someone who would be thoughtful and pragmatic in weighing the trade-offs and devising balanced solutions. In Trump, we have an impulsive narcissist who thrives on chaos and rejects scientific expertise.

Consider his response to the challenge posed by China: a proposal to introduce blanket tariffs of 60% or more. As any serious economist could have told him, this would increase prices - not just for the goods imported directly from China, but also for the innumerable other goods containing Chinese inputs. Thus, lower- and middle-income Americans would bear the brunt of the cost. As inflation r the US Federal Reserve is forced to raise interest rates, the economy would be hit by the triple whammy of slowing growth, rising inflation, and higher unemployment.

Making matters worse, Trump has adopted the extreme position of threatening the Fed's independence (which is not surprising, considering his committed efforts to undermine the independence of the judiciary and the civil service). Another Trump presidency thus would introduce a persistent source of economic uncertainty, depressing investment and growth, and almost certainly increasing inflation expectations.

 $\overline{\text{Trump's proposed tax policies}}$ are equally fraught. Recall the 2017 tax cut for corporations and billionaires, which failed to stimulate additional investment and merely encouraged share buybacks. Although Republicans have never seen a tax cut for the rich that they didn't love, a few at least recognized that the policy would increase budget deficits, and therefore added a sunset clause, which begins to take effect in 2025. But Trump, ignoring the evidence that "trickle-down" tax cuts don't work and don't pay for themselves, wants to renew and then deepen the 2017 cut in ways that would add trillions of dollars to the national debt.

While populist demagogues like Trump do not care about deficits, investors in the US and abroad should be worried. Ballooning deficits from non-productivityenhancing spending would further add to inflation expectations, undercut economic performance, and exacerbate inequality.

Equally, repealing the Biden administration's signature Inflation Reduction Act would not only be bad for the environment and US competitiveness in critical sectors vital for the country's future; it also would eliminate provisions that have lowered the cost of pharmaceuticals, thus increasing the cost of living. Trump (and the business-

oriented judges he appointed) also wants to roll back the Biden-Harris administration's strong competition policies, which - again - would increase inequality and weaken economic performance by enshrining market power and stifling innovation. And he would scrap initiatives to increase access to higher education through better designed income-contingent student loans, ultimately diminishing investment in the sector that the US most needs to meet the challenges of a twentyfirst-century innovative economy.

This brings us to the features of Trump's agenda that are most troubling for America's long-term economic success. First, another Trump administration would slash funding for basic science and technology, the source of America's competitive advantage and rising

living standards over the past 200 years. (It should go without saying that the country's economic strength does not lie in casinos, golf courses, or gaudy hotels.)

During his previous term, Trump proposed major cuts to science and technology almost every year, but non-extremist congressional Republicans blocked these budget reductions. This time, however, would be different, because the Republican Party has become Trump's personal cult. Worse, the party has declared a jihad against US universities, including leading institutions that advance the frontiers of knowledge, attract the best talent from around the world, and sustain the country's competitive advantage.

Even worse, Trump is committed to undermining the rule of law, both domestically and internationally. Trump's long track record of refusing to pay vendors and contractors speak to his character: he is a bully who will use whatever power he has to rob whoever he can. But it becomes an even bigger problem when he openly supports violent insurrectionists. The rule of law is not just something which we should treasure for itself: it is critical for a well-functioning economy and democracy.

Heading into the fall of 2024, it is impossible to know what shocks the economy will face in the next four years. But this much is clear: the economy of 2028 will be much stronger, more equal, and more resilient if Harris gets elected. -Project Syndicate

Islamic position on contagion, pessimism

believers in Allah and His messenger! Fear Allah and glorify Him as He deserves to be. Know that this life is nothing except a very short period of time, so act righteously herein. He who does so will have a great and pleasant consequence by the mercy and favour of Allah and he who is neither conscious nor fearful of Allah will not have a way out of his hardships and will have an evil end.

Servants of Allah! Abu Hurairah, may Allah be pleased with him, narrated that the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said: "No contagion, no pessimism, no Haammah and no Safar." (Bukhari). The meaning of this *Hadith* is as follows: Haammah is a type of bird; the pre-Islamic Arabs used to think that whenever this bird landed on anyone's house, somebody who lived in that house would definitely die. This is of course a type of superstition. As for Safar, this is another type of superstition; one group of Islamic scholars held the view that the pre-Islamic Arabs were highly superstitious regarding the month of Safar while another group held the view that Safar is in fact a worm which used to dwell in the bodies of some animals (as a disease) and that this disease was contagious.

In this Hadith the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, negated and refuted the prevalent belief of the disbelievers at that time. These false beliefs would affect the hearts of the people so greatly that it would weaken their reliance on Allah and lead them to doubting Him and even attributing evil to Him. Also, these beliefs would lead people to attribute deficiencies to Allah, either by them claiming that He has incapabilities or by them ascribing partners to Him in acts of worship, or in controlling destiny.

So the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, was addressing all those who truly believe in Allah and in His control over everything by saying: "No contagion, no pessimism, no Haammah and no Safar." The words "No contagion" mean that contagion is not independently effective, because the pre-Islamic Arabs used to believe that contagion was itself a characteristic of a disease and that it had no external control over it. They also believed that there was nothing that could prevent contagion from occurring and that nothing could eliminate

When the Prophet, sallal-"No contagion" he certainly did not mean that contagion itself does not exist, nor did he mean that diseases and sicknesses do not spread from one person to another due to them coming into close contact, rather, this is something that obviously occurs. However, what the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, was doing was refuting the belief that

the disbelievers had which was that if a sick person happened to come close enough to a healthy person, then sickness would definitely be passed onto the healthy person. The disbelievers used to believe that this transfer was beyond the control and will of Allah and that it was bound to happen. Therefore, what the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, was explaining was that sickness does not spread simply by mixing healthy people with sick ones, rather, it happens with the decree and command of Allah; contagion may or may not occur because it is not necessarily the case that every contagious disease will spread from a sick person to a healthy one unless and until Allah permits this to occur. If Allah does not permit it to happen then it cannot and will not ever occur, because that is by the decree and command of Allah.

Contagion is nothing but a means that will only have an effect if Allah decrees for it to occur, it is not something that necessarily takes place. Abu Hurairah, may Allah be pleased with him, reported that the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said: "A sick one should not go into the presence of a healthy one, nor should a healthy one go into the presence of a sick one." (Muslim) He, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said this regarding camels because allowing them to mix is a means of spreading disease among them. Therefore in this Hadith, the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, proves that contagion actually exists, but he, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, only proved its existence as a means and not as an end.

This is exactly the same as saying, for example, that if a person were to do something that could result in his death, then by doing it, he would die - if Allah decreed leprosy and ate with him from

that to happen. It is also the same as saying, for example, that if a person were to eat and drink then he would satisfy his hunger and quench his thirst. In reality, these actions are nothing but means to an end that will only occur if Allah has decreed it to do so. Abu Hurairah, may Allah be

pleased with him, narrated that the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said: "Run away from a person with leprosy as you would run away from a lion." (Ahmad and Bukhari). This is because mixing with such a person is a means of spreading the sickness from a person with leprosy to a healthy one. So this Hadith of the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, explains that although these are nothing but means and that their effect will not take place without the decree of Allah, we still have to exert our utmost efforts in avoiding these means that may result in disease, destruction or tribulations. Moreover, we must rely on Allah in all cases.

This is why on one occasion the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, sat next to a man who had

the same plate, he even put his hand in the same food that the man was eating from to prove to people that diseases spread only if Allah wills for them to do so. He, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, also did this to show that it is not a must that contagious sicknesses will spread and that it is only Allah who gives the ability for these means to take effect. Then, after eating, he said: "No contagion and no pessimism."

He, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said: "No pessimism" because during Jaahiliyyah, or the pre-Islamic period of ignorance, the disbelievers were extremely pessimistic about everything. Ibn Mas'ood, may Allah be pleased with him said that "Each one of us had this (i.e., pessimism), but Allah replaced it with our reliance on Him." (Abu Daawood & Tirmidhi) This saying means that at that time, the people's hearts were full of pessimism. For example, people used to feel pessimism when they felt the wind blowing strongly, or if some of them intended to set out on a journey and subsequently saw something

that they disliked, they would be sure that they would meet a calamity or even death during the forthcoming trip, so they would be overcome by pessimism.

However, a believer must completely rely on Allah as Ibn Mas'ood, may Allah be pleased with him, said: "Allah replaces pessimism with reliance on Him." Pessimism is a false and futile concept; it has no effect in determining events because they are all under the control and decree of Allah. This is why the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, used to hate pessimism and love optimism; for one who is always optimistic has a high opinion of his Lord, which the believer is commanded to have. As for pessimism, this leads a person into thinking evil of his Lord, which was the belief of the people during Jahiliyyah. Due to these reasons, the Prophet, sallallaahu ʻalaihi wa sallam, forbade us from being pessimistic by saying: "No pessimism."

Then, he, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said "No Haammah" which refers to the bird already mentioned which the disbelievers had false beliefs about. For example, they believed that a person who was murdered would have this bird in his grave screaming for revenge. They also thought that the Haammah bird contained the soul of a dead person and flew it between different neighbourhoods. There were countless other false beliefs which were prevalent at that time, so the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, had to refute and negate them because these beliefs were contrary to the sound creed that a Muslim is commanded to have. The Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, clarified the concept that everything occurs due to the decree and command of Allah and

Another falsehood which the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, wanted to eliminate from its roots was regarding the month of Safar. Many scholars are of the view that Safar was a month in which the pre-Islamic Arabs were particularly pessimistic. Therefore, when the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said, "No Safar", this was an indication that he sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam wanted to refute and negate all the false beliefs that the disbelievers used to harbour regarding that month. The disbelievers used to think that during the month of Safar, all problems, disasters, calamities and other evils would occur. Therefore they would avoid getting married in this month as they thought that such a union would be doomed; nobody would trade during this month as they thought that it would be fruitless; they also thought that all other endeavours during that month would end in problems, hardships and even death. These are the types of beliefs that the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, countered due to their

Safar is just one of 12 months that Allah has given us; nothing happens in this month except what Allah has decreed to happen within it, Allah did not specify a certain month of the year where all difficulties, hardships and calamities would afflict people. In fact, if one looks at history, he will discover that many conquests and victories occurred during the month of Safar for the Muslims; it may be that some people are ignorant of this and therefore it becomes incumbent on us to pay attention to facts like these and convey them to the masses. By doing this we are going back to the fundamentals and bases of these false concepts and cutting them off from their roots.

Therefore, in this particular case, we know that believing that Safar as an "unlucky" month is a false and frivolous belief, both from the words of the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, and by practical experience of the fact that there has been a lot of goodness in this month throughout history. Therefore, all forms of pessimism regarding minutes, hours, days and months are negated by Islam - our faith must be sound and distinct from that of the disbelievers.

The Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, exerted all possible efforts in explaining these concepts to us. He, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, made it clear that we need to purify our hearts from thinking evil of our Lord or being pessimistic regarding places, times or dates. For example, we must refute and negate the belief that some have which is to think that Wednesday is a day on which all evil takes place, so they avoid doing certain things on that day.

Dear believers! We must pay close attention to such matters, our belief must be sound and correct, and we must not allow our hearts and minds to be invaded by such falsities. We must not be pessimistic regarding specific times and places because the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, forbade us from doing this. Also, it goes against the sound belief that we are required as Muslims to possess. I ask Allah to guide me and you all and to make us among those who always think highly of their Lord.

Also, we must know that favours and bounties cannot be attained except by being obedient to Allah and that hardship, calamities and problems can be reduced if not terminated by supplicating to Allah or by being obedient to Him. Therefore whoever relies on Allah, He is sufficient for him. Allah says that which translates as: "...And whoever fears Allah - He will make for him of his matter ease." (At-Talaaq: 4). Nothing can avert the decree and command of Allah except supplication. Destruction and calamities cannot be stopped except through obedience to Allah.

Why do we delay repentance?

epentance is ultimately the goal that we all seek. All sane people are conscious of their numerous sins, and those who believe in Allah and His Messenger, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam (may Allah exalt his mention), recognise that they will be held accountable for their sins, and therefore desire to be free of the evil consequences of their misdeeds. Islam offers man the ideal way by which he may be released from the burden of his sins.

The word Tawbah (repentance) in Arabic literally means 'to return'. In an Islamic context, it refers to the act of leaving what Allah has prohibited and returning to what He, Almighty, has commanded.

The subject of repentance is one that concerns all people who believe in Allah, and is vital for the Muslims to understand because our salvation in the Hereafter depends on our repentance to Allah, as Allah commands (what means): "...And turn to Allah in repentance, all of you, that you might succeed." [Qur'an 24:31] Allah also Says (what means): "...In-

deed, Allah loves those who are constantly repentant and loves those who purify themselves." [Qur'an 2:222]

One may have a real intention to repent, but there may be some obstacles to the path of repentance. If this is the case, then he needs to act without hesitation and remove those obstacles to clear the way to

The postponement of repentance may be the result of either a deliberate desire to prolong the illicit pleasure derived from the sin, or doubt on the part of an ignorant sinner whether or not Allah would accept his repentance.

However, we have to be certain that Allah will guide us to success and safeguard us against our malice. We also must be confident that Allah forgives our sins and

that He, and only He, can judge us. It is only His Judgment that is worthy of our worry and anxiety. So we should fear Him only because sincere repentance removes all sins and disobedience.

The door of repentance is always open, until...

The door to repentance is always open and will not be closed in the face of any repentant person, regardless of his sins. Expect this gate to have two locks: death and the approach of the Day of Judgment. The first was mentioned in the *Hadith*: "Allah accepts a slave's repentance unless his death approaches." [At-Tirmithi]

The other was mentioned in the *Hadith*: "Whosoever turns to Allah in repentance before the sun rises in the West, Allah will forgive him." [Ahmad]

Allah Says in the Qur'an what means: "But repentance is not [accepted] of those who [continue to] do evil deeds up until, when death comes to one of them, he says: 'Indeed, I have repented now,' or of those who die while they are disbelievers..." [Our'an 4:18]

O heedless soul! Hasten to repent before the knock of death sounds and the time of repentance runs out. Do not get caught dying in a state of disobedience to your Most Merciful Lord. Satan gives you long hope and empty promises; he delays your repentance until your heart becomes as callous as a rock by being adamant in sin and disobedience, and you would therefore meet your Lord in a wretched state. If the door of repentance is closed to you, it will never open to you again.

What keeps us from repenting? 1. Taking sins lightly:

The problem with many of us today is that we do not fear Allah, which means that we do not think seriously about

disobeying Him and therefore fall into sin, without giving any real thought to it. Hence, we should think about the statement which Ibn Mas'ood, may Allah be pleased with him, made: "A believer sees his sins as if he were sitting under a mountain which he is afraid may collapse on him, whereas the wicked person considers his sins as flies passing over his nose which he just drives away like this (and he waved his hand across his face to illustrate this)." [Al-Bukhari]

The Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said: "Take caution against minor sins, because such sins are like a group of people who temporarily settled in the middle of a valley. Then, they decided to make a fire, so each one of them brought a stick until they were able to make it, so they baked their bread. Thus, minor sins (when they accumulate) may destroy the one who commits them." [Ahmad]

2. "What is the point? I will only end up doing it again"

Such an approach is the result of a misunderstanding. Indeed, one of the conditions of repentance is having a real intention not to return to the same sin. This, however, does not mean that Satan will never tempt you to commit the same sin again. Thus, if you have failed yourself, and you returned to the same sin, it does not mean that your first repentance was a lie. You should hasten to make additional repentance, with a real intention not to return to this sin, keeping in mind that Allah's mercy extends over everything.

3. "Allah is forgiving, so let me sin"

When reminded of repentance and the hideousness of disobedience, some people would respond that Allah is Oft-Forgiving, Most Merciful. An atheist once said in sarcasm: "You should commit as many

sins as you can because you are heading towards the Lord who is Most-Generous." There is no doubt that such a view is complete ignorance of the religion of Allah, because Allah's mercy is close to the righteous and not to the wrongdoers.

4. "I am destined to be a sinner"

Some people may choose to blame Al-Qadr (fate) for their sins. For example, if you ask any of them, "Why do you not perform the Prayers? Why do you not fast? Why do you drink or smoke? Why do you not repent from your disobedience?" They would respond by saying: "This is Allah's Qadr" or: "I am doomed to do this."

This is definitely a grave misconception and an evasion of the truth. Believing in Al-Qadr does not mean that one is destined to commit sins. It is true that Allah has written all human beings' deeds, good or bad, and only He knows the unseen, but the believer is not forced to perform a good deed, nor is he forced to commit any disobedience. Instead, he has been granted the ability to reflect, reason and then make a decision freely. Al-Qadr is only responsible for the calamities and blessings that an individual may confront because he can do nothing about them. For example, if a couple were to marry and have three children, then this is their Qadr. It is impermissible to fault Al-Qadr for our sins and disobedience because doing so is akin to being in confrontation and showing dissatisfaction with Allah.

Repentance wipes out all sins, major and minor:

Being confused, some people may think that repentance is only required for major sins. It should be noted that repentance from all sins is obligatory.

Even the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa

sallam, who was sinless, asked Allah to forgive him on a daily basis. The Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, is reported to have said: "O people! Make repentance to Allah. I swear by Allah that I make repentance to Him more than seventy times every day." [Al-Bukhari]

Therefore, we all need to fear Allah, ask His forgiveness and be aware that there is no sin that is minor with persistence, and no major sin with seeking Allah's forgiveness (i.e. if the minor sin is repeated many times it becomes a major one.) Thus, sincere repentance wipes out all commit-

Never despair!

Someone might say: "I want to repent but my sins are too many." But Allah Says what means: "Say: 'O my slaves who have transgressed against themselves [by sinning], do not despair of the mercy of Allah. Indeed, Allah forgives all sins. Indeed, it is He who is the Forgiving, the Merciful." [Qur'an 39:53]

Therefore, we should never lose hope or stop asking for Allah's forgiveness. Its importance is shown to us in the Hadith in which the Prophet, sallallaahu 'alaihi wa sallam, said: "O people! Turn to Allah in repentance and seek His forgiveness, for I make repentance to Him a hundred times every day." [Muslim]
