# Constitutional amendment referendum on November 5

### Amir issues decree inviting citizens to vote

is Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani issued yesterday Decree No 87 of 2024, inviting all citizens aged 18 and above to participate in a general referendum on the constitutional amendments to the Permanent Constitution of the State of Qatar on Tuesday, 3rd Jumada Al-Awwal 1446, corresponding to Nov 5, 2024.

The decree stipulated that the referendum would begin at 7am and end at 7pm, and that the referendum results would be announced within 24 hours of its conclusion. The decree also stipulated the establishment of a general referendum

committee at the Ministry of Interior to organise and manage the referendum and announce its results.

The decree stipulated that the "general referendum committee" would be formed under the chairmanship of the Minister of Interior, with the membership of the Minister of Justice and Minister of State for Cabinet Affairs, the Minister of State for Interior Affairs, a member of the Shura Council chosen by the Speaker of the Shura Council, the undersecretary of the Ministry of Interior, a judge chosen by the president of Supreme Judiciary Council, and the director of Elections Department of the Ministry of Interior.

The decree is effective from its date of issuance, and is to be published in the Official Gazette.

During the Shura Council's regular weekly session on Monday, the Council unanimously approved the draft constitutional amendments after reviewing the report of the special committee studying the amendment of some articles of the constitution.

The session was chaired by HE Speaker of the Council Hassan bin Abdullah al-Ghanem.

Constructive and in-depth discussions took place at the session, with the esteemed members of the Shura Council showing great commitment for enhancing national unity, upholding the principle of justice and the rule of law, and ensuring the country's supreme interest in accordance with the directives of His Highness the Amir.

# 'Israeli massacres proof of disregard for int'l law'

r Majid bin Mohammed al-Ansari, Spokesperson for the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MoFA), expressed his regret that the situation in Gaza has reached a stage where Israeli massacres on a daily basis have outnumbered condemnations, noting that the international community should be ashamed of itself in light of the continuation of the horrific war which has been going on for

more than a year.

Dr al-Ansari reiterated, in a media briefing yesterday, Qatar's clear position on the ongoing crimes of the occupation, whether targeting civilian objects, hospitals, and schools, or targeting the displaced, or starvation and siege imposed on northern Gaza, and at the same time targeting brotherly Lebanon, where more than 2,700 people have so far been martyred, and which is suffering systematic destruction of villages and towns.

He stressed that this is a clear indication of the lack of respect for international human rights law.

He said that Qatar will not fail to play its role in ending this crisis by keeping its mediation and communication channels open, and supporting all regional and international efforts aimed at ending this crisis and stopping the bloodshed despite all the challenges and the ground reality that casts its

dark shadows on negotiations.

Regarding the extent of the impact of the assassinations carried out by the Israeli entity and its targeting of UN offices on the efforts of the negotiation process, Dr al-Ansari stressed that every escalation on the ground is accompanied by "complicating" the success of the mediation. "It is not possible to negotiate successfully with a party, while the other party is targeted and assassinated at every opportunity."

He praised the important role played by the UN Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees (UNRWA) in helping millions not only in Gaza, but also in the West Bank, Jordan, Syria and Lebanon.

Dr al-Ansari warned that stopping support for UNRWA would have disastrous consequences, as well as preventing it from operating in the Palestinian territories, in light of the presence of more than 6mn Palestinians who benefit from the relief services of this agency. **To Page 7**

# 93 Gazans killed in Israeli strike on residential block

### **US voices concern**

The United States voiced concern about a "horrifying" Israeli strike in Gaza that killed a large number of children and said it was asking its ally for answers.

"We are deeply concerned by the loss of civilian life in this incident. This was a horrifying incident with a horrifying result," State Department spokesman Matthew Miller told reporters.



# Qatar condemns Israeli's draft law banning UNRWA activities

atar condemned, in the strongest terms, the Israeli Knesset's approval of draft laws banning the activities of the UN Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA) in the occupied Palestinian territories, considering it a dangerous precedent for the UN and multilateral action, and a terrifying development in the war of genocide waged by the occupation against the defenceless Palestinian people, and a continuation of its systematic targeting of the UN agency and its vital humanitarian

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs stressed, in a statement vesterday. that the Palestinian people besieged in the Gaza Strip have been facing catastrophic humanitarian conditions due to the brutal aggression targeting them for more than a year, the obstruction of the delivery of necessary aid to the areas of the Strip, and the use of food and medicine as a weapon against them, warning in this context that banning UNRWA activities will lead to serious humanitarian and political consequences, especially depriving millions of Palestinians in Gaza, the West Bank, Lebanon, Jordan and Syria of its necessary services, in addition to liquidating the issue of Palestinian refugees and their right to return to their areas and homes, which is guaranteed by international law and relevant UN resolutions, specifically UN General Assembly resolutions 194 and 237.

The ministry also stressed that the Israeli occupation's disdain for international laws, agreements and

resolutions, its disregard for the activities and goals of international organisations, and its persistence in committing horrific crimes of murder and forced displacement against children, women and the elderly in Gaza and the occupied Palestinian territories, requires international solidarity to end the barbaric war on the Strip immediately, and to exert all efforts to compel Israel to comply with the efforts aimed at achieving a just and sustainable peace in the region.

The ministry renewed Qatar's full support for UNRWA, based on its firm and supportive position towards the legitimate rights of the brotherly Palestinian people, foremost of which is their right to establish their independent state on the 1967 borders, with East Jerusalem as its capital. (QNA)

Meanwhile, Albudaiwi commended the successive achievements of the GCC Public Pros-

ecution Committee since its first meeting in 2007, primarily the rules of co-operation between GCC public prosecutions and attorneys general, the Muscat document on the rules for child protection during investigation, and the ethics document for artificial intelligence (AI) in the work of the public prosecution issued in 2023. with the aim of improving the quality of performance, accelerating decision-making mechanisms, and ensuring the accuracy and efficiency of outputs in a way that enhances justice.

The document is also keen to respect and protect rights and freedoms without prejudice or derogation, in addition to achievements represented in unifying systems and laws, enhancing cooperation in confronting cr prosecuting perpetrators, exchanging information and transferring expertise, and co-ordinating positions between the GCC countries on common issues in a way that strengthens joint Gulf parliamentary co-operation, he added.

He added that the topics included in the 16th meeting in Doha

are important and evidence keenness to advance the joint Gulf action process in a way that achieves more integration among the GCC countries in the judicial field in general and the penal field in par-

The agenda included developing controls and mechanisms for holding interactive seminars, honouring the former public prosecutors and attorneys general, and the mechanism for exchanging visits between members of the inspection departments in the public prosecutions.

The meeting presented the experiences of GCC public prosecutions, including the experience of Qatar's Public Prosecution in the field of AI technology, enhancing electronic services, and facilitating access to legal information. At the end of the meeting, the Qatar Public Prosecution's First Chief Prosecutor Mohammed Rashid al-Binali, along with several GCC public prosecution members, was awarded the Hamed Al Othman Award – a GCC distinction prize for attorneys general, public prosecutors and heads of investigation departments. 



fort to reach a permanent solution to this issue, which is a permanent ceasefire and justice for the Palestinian brothers, by bringing the viewpoints closer together and reaching a common language between the negotiators, he added.

The Lady Justice Imani Daud Aboud, president, African Court on Human and Peoples' Rights, presented the forum's keynote, which highlighted the evolving role of international courts, such as the African Court, in advancing the rule of law, including human rights, and sustainable development President Aboud also participated on a forum panel that focused on judicial transparency in which she addressed the role of courts in society and their engagement

with the public. Dr Damilola S Olawuyi, professor and Unesco chairholder on Environmental Law and Sustainable Development, HBKU, and Lothar Freischlader, ambassador of Germany also provided opening remarks, stressing the importance of the rule of law to the areas to be discussed during the Forum.

Susan L Karamanian, dean, HBKU College of Law, said: "The rule of law is under stress, particularly at the international level in which decisions of international courts and tribunals are being challenged. Yet even in national systems uncertainty abounds due to contemporary developments, such as digitisation, social media, and climate change

Each session featured panels composed of renowned experts hailing from the UN Development Programme, German Federal Ministry of Justice, Egyptian Constitutional Court, Supreme Judicial Council in Jordan, and other legal authorities. Panellists exchanged insights with peers from the private sector, including Siemens Energy, and Ooredoo, along with practicing lawyers and academic experts.

# QT updates regulations for marine tourism transport

atar Tourism (QT) has announced updates to the regulations governing marine tourism transport, including the licensing of marine tourism offices and all categories (A, B, C) of marine transport vessels.

In line with international best practices, QT has issued a new classification guide for marine tourism transport vehicles owners and operators and outlined the technical requirements and specifications necessary for operating these vessels. These updates are in accordance with the Tourism Reg-

ulation Law No. (20) of 2018. Category (A) vessels that do not meet the classification standards and technical requirements outlined in Version 1.1 of the 2024 Classification Guide will not be permitted to operate, be present, or dock at the Doha Corniche area until all specified requirements are fulfilled. The categories of maritime transportation means: Category (A) - refers to boats used for short trips only; they operate within the Corniche area; Category (B) - refers to boats used for long trips and operate beyond the Corniche area: Category (C) - refers to boats used for long trips offering accommodation and meals (premium and luxury boats such as yachts).

Individuals can only operate Category (A) while both Categories (B) and (C) should be operated by licensed tourism companies. Owners and managers of marine

tourism transport offices, as well as vessel owners and operators, were required to ensure compliance with the new regulations within the allocated timeframe (August 25th, 2024), and a grace period of three months has been extended across the different categories. QT regulates and develops the tourism industry, fostering private sector investment and setting the strategic direction for the sector.

In a press statement, QT's licensing director Hassan al-Abdelmalek said: "In co-ordination with the relevant authorities, including the Private Engineering Office, the Ministry of Transport, the General Directorate of Coasts and Borders Security, and the Ministry of Municipality, it has been decided to adopt procedures and standards for practicing tourist maritime transport.

"These standards are designed for marine means of transport designated for carrying tourists on sea trips and have been developed in accordance with the best global principles and standards. This initiative aims to enhance transparency, unify the sector, support Qatar's maritime strategy, and advance service excellence across the country, ultimately providing an exceptional and safe experience for users of these service

As part of its mandate, QT oversees the implementation of its tourism strategy 2030 with the goal of diversifying the country's tourism offerings and increasing visitor spending. Through these efforts, QT is strengthening Qatar's global presence and enhancing the overall tourism sector.

# QRCS delegation in Lebanon to supervise aid distribution

Qatar Red Crescent Society (QRCS) delegation aboard the Qatari Amiri Air Force aircraft arrived in Beirut, carrying a new shipment of humanitarian aid to support people affected by the recent military escalation in Lebanon.

The delegation includes Dr Mohamed Salah Ibrahim, director of Relief and International Programmes Division; Mohamed Ahmed al-Bishri, director of Communication and Fundraising Division; and a specialist relief team to supervise aid processing.

They met Mohamed Kahil, acting head of QRCS' office in Lebanon; Nasser al-Qahtani, chargé d'affaires of the Qatar embassy in Lebanon; Dr Nabil Itani from the Lebanese Red Cross; and Hisham Fawaz, adviser to Lebanon's Minister of Public Health (MoPH).

The meeting finalised all customs clearing procedures for the shipment, including 42 tonnes of medications, medical supplies, and equipment to be delivered to the hospitals of Lebanon's Ministry of Public Health and the Lebanese Red Cross, the two strategic partners in QRCS' relief and development activities for refugees and the host community.

Together with Kahil, the delegation visited Georges Kettaneh, secretary-general of the Lebanese Red Cross. They emphasised QRCS' full support for their bilateral strategic partnership, especially in relation to the ongoing emergency response.

Another meeting was held with Lebanon's Minister of Public Health Dr Firass Abiad, discussing



QRCS' current key emergency interventions, as well as the projects jointly implemented with Lebanon's MoPH.

The delegation visited Lebanon's Government Palace to meet Dr Nasser Yassin, co-ordinator of the Government Emergency Committee, tackling the most urgent needs to be met by QRCS and the Lebanese Red Cross.

From day one, QRCS responded to the critical humanitarian situation in Lebanon, by allocating QRImn from its Disaster Response Fund for the initial emergency intervention, providing food and non-food items for 1,000 displaced families.

Together with Qatar ambassador to Lebanon Sheikh Saud bin Abdulrahman al-Thani and senior Lebanese government officials, QRCS' personnel in Lebanon received HE Lolwah bint Rashid Alkhater, Minister of State for International Co-operation, during her visit to Lebanon to inaugurate

the Qatari humanitarian airlift. In recent weeks, the team received several Qatari relief shipments airlifted to Beirut. These shipments contained medical supplies, food, and shelter materials to urgently assist the Lebanese people facing a severe humanitarian crisis.

Under phase one of its emergency response in Lebanon, QRCS and the Lebanese Red Cross distributed blankets, mattresses, food, hygiene supplies, and drinking water to 5,675 displaced and affected people in Aley, Chouf, and other districts of Mount Lebanon.

At the same time, preparations are in progress to launch phase three of the emergency response, at a cost of QR5mn. It will involve distributing diverse food parcels and securing potable water for 27,500 affected families.

These interventions are in line with the essential needs identified in the emergency appeal coissued by the Lebanese Red Cross and the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies.

# Qatar Charity distributes new food assistance to Yemen flood victims

As part of its ongoing efforts to aid those affected by floods in Yemen, Qatar Charity (QC), with support from the Start Fund, has distributed a new batch of aid including food baskets and personal hygiene kits.

This aid has benefitted about 1,100 individuals in the Hajjah and Al Hudaydah governorates, bringing the total number of beneficiaries from QC's assistance to around 23,000 people, a statement said.

QC is preparing to distribute further aid to flood victims in several areas, which will include 3,500 food baskets, each containing essential food supplies sufficient for one family for a month, and 3,500 personal hygiene kits.

This initiative comes amid the worsening humanitarian crisis that Yemen has been facing for several years, characterised by increasing food insecurity and the ongoing cholera outbreak since March of this year, especially following the recent floods:

Data from UN organisations has reported nearly 186,000 suspected cholera cases in the past six months, with 680 fatalities. An increase in cases is expected following the recent heavy rains across Yemen. Children suffering from malnutrition, pregnant women, and the elderly with chronic illnesses are particularly at risk for cholera.

The aid provided has been instrumental in addressing the urgent basic needs of those affected by the floods, particularly





in terms of food and personal hygiene, leaving a positive impact on the beneficiaries.

Zahra Abkar, 80 years old, said: "We thank Qatar Charity for their assistance, which we

desperately need."
From August to the end of

September, QC distributed relief aid to flood victims in the Al Hudaydah, Hajjah, and Marib governorates, which included 3,250 food baskets, 2,100 personal hygiene kits, and 1,150 shelter kits, benefiting a total of 22,750 people, the statement added.

# Mercedes-Benz, Maybach models recalled

The Ministry of Commerce and Industry (MoCI) in co-operation with Nasser Bin Khaled and Sons Automobiles, has announced the recall of Mercedes-Benz E-Class, GLC, S-Class, Maybach, and CLE, 2024 model, as the 48-volt battery module (BMS) control unit software does not correspond to the current series production configuration. It is, therefore, possible that the battery's state is calculated incorrectly caus-

ing Malfunction Indicator Lamp (MIL) to incorrectly display in instrument cluster.

The MoCI said the recall campaign comes within the framework of its ongoing efforts to protect consumers and ensure that car dealers follow up on vehicle defects and repairs.

The MoCI said it will co-ordinate with the dealer to follow up on the maintenance and repair works and will communicate with customers to ensure that

the necessary repairs are carried out.

# Brics expansion gains ground with higher growth potential

The world economy is set to rely even more heavily on the Brics group of emerging economies to drive expansion, rather than their wealthier Western peers, according to the International Monetary Fund (IMF)'s latest forecasts.

Compared with its last round of predictions six months ago, the IMF now expects a bigger share of growth over the next five years to come from powerhouse Brics economies like China, India, Russia and Brazil, according to forecasts based on purchasing power parity.

By contrast, the expected contribution of Group of Seven members like the US, Germany and Japan was revised down.

The Brics group of emerging-market powers — the acronym stands for Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa - has gone from a slogan dreamed up at an investment bank two decades ago to a real-world club that controls a multilateral lender.

It almost doubled in size in 2024, to include Iran, the United Arab Emirates, Ethiopia and Egypt. Saudi Arabia was also announced as a new member, though the kingdom has yet to take a final decision

Dozens more countries have expressed interest in joining its

The expansion push has been driven largely by China, now the world's pre-eminent industrial power, which is trying to boost its global clout by courting nations traditionally allied with the US. South Africa and Russia have backed the expansion.
India was initially hesitant because it was concerned that a

bigger Brics would transform the group into a mouthpiece for China, while Brazil was worried about alienating the West although both governments eventually agreed to an enlargement.

In a global context, the addition of major fossil-fuel producers may give the bloc more scope to challenge the dollar's dominance

# The Brics grouping almost doubled "more about pointics and less about economics," according in size in 2024, including Iran, the UAE. **Ethiopia and**

in oil and gas trading by switching to other currencies, a concept referred to as dedollarisation.

However, expansion is "more about politics and less to analysts at Bloomberg Economics.

The biggest achievements of the group have been financial. The countries agreed to pool \$100bn of foreign-currency reserves, which they can lend to each other during emergencies. That liquidity facility became operational in 2016.

They founded the New Development Bank – a World Bankinspired institution that has approved almost \$33bn of loans - mainly for water, transport and other infrastructure projects since it began operations in 2015. By comparison, the World Bank committed \$72.8bn to partner countries in fiscal 2023.

Trade among the bloc's first five members surged 56% to \$422bn between 2017 and 2022. The natural resources of Brazil, Russia and Iran make them natural partners for Chinese demand.

India and China have weaker trade connections with each other, partly due to their geopolitical rivalry and an acrimonious border

There's still interest in emerging markets. But Brics is largely irrelevant as an investment theme today due to geopolitical changes and the members' different economic trajectories.

US-led sanctions have put Russia off limits for most foreign investors, and some sectors in China – especially technology companies - have also been sanctioned or face potential investment bans. China also is a maturing economy, increasingly separated from other emerging markets and facing a structural

Brazil's economy slowed markedly following the end of a global commodity boom about a decade ago. South Africa's economy has been hamstrung by rolling power blackouts and logistics snarls, although it's recently made some tentative progress in tackling

India is still a growth story that investment banks compare with China 10 or 15 years ago, though it's unclear if it can follow China's manufacturing-led model.

In a wider sense, Brics membership is also a way of signalling increasing frustration with the US-led international order and key institutions that remain firmly in the control of Western powers, like the World Bank and International Monetary Fund.

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# Trump's relentless fraud about election fraud

hile speaking at a rally in Michigan on October 3, former US president Donald Trump insisted, as he has countless times since losing the 2020 election, "We won, we won. It was a rigged election." And, just like every other time, Trump offered no evidence.

A few days before that, Trump's running mate, J D Vance, refused at the vice-presidential debate to say whether he thought Trump had lost, and then declined five opportunities to do so in an interview with the New York Times. Not long after, though, Vance fell in line, stating unequivocally that Trump did not lose in 2020. He, too, failed to provide any proof

Precipitating this latest cycle of denial was the release of a brief by special prosecutor Jack Smith that reveals damning evidence of Trump's efforts to overturn the 2020 presidential election in the weeks and months that followed. But whenever critics shine a spotlight on these misdeeds, Trump and his loyalists repeat their claims of fraud and omit the facts, and the US media and public move on to the next controversy.

Trump offers no proof that he was cheated of victory in 2020 for the simple reason that he has none. In fact, there is ample evidence that there was no election fraud that

In 2022, eight Republican lawyers and jurists, including Theodore Olson, the former US solicitor general who represented George W Bush in Bush v Gore in 2000, reviewed the 64 cases that Trump's lawyers filed in state and federal courts alleging violations of election laws. Fourteen were withdrawn, while the state and

lower federal courts dismissed 18 more. Of the 30 cases decided on the merits, Trump's legal team prevailed in only one, on a minor matter. The US Supreme Court declined to hear two of Trump's

"There is absolutely no evidence of fraud in the 2020 presidential election on the magnitude necessary to shift the result in any state, let alone the nation as a whole," the review concluded. "In fact, there was no fraud that changed the outcome in even a single precinct." Tellingly, at least four of the Trump campaign's attorneys, including former New York City Mayor Rudy Giuliani, have been disbarred or sanctioned for knowingly presenting false claims in a court of law.

In Georgia, the Republican secretary of state, Brad Raffensperger, courageously refused Trump's demand that he "find 11,780 votes" to reverse the outcome, even after a hand recount of the state's presidential ballots confirmed Joe Biden's victory. In five other battleground states - Arizona, Michigan, Nevada, Pennsylvania, and Wisconsin legislative and executive officials conducted reviews and audits of the 2020 balloting, finding no proof of fraud or tampering. In Arizona, the state senate turned the Maricopa County ballots over to Cyber Ninjas, a firm recommended by the Trump campaign, for review. These "ninias" likewise failed to show a stolen election, instead finding 99 additional votes for Biden and 261 fewer votes for Trump.

In the years since Biden assumed the presidency (notwithstanding Trump supporters' violent attempt to derail the transition of power), private watchdogs and state and local prosecutors - many of them Republicans - have investigated allegations of voter fraud and found only a few cases of small-scale wrongdoing. In Arizona, only six people - of the nearly 3.4mn who voted in the 2020 election were convicted of casting illegal ballots, two of whom submitted absentee ballots for relatives who had died before election day. In Pennsylvania, a man confessed to having applied for an absentee ballot on behalf of his deceased mother and casting "her" vote for

The day after the 2020 presidential election, I explained why there was almost no chance of large-scale fraud changing the outcome of the race, not least

because of the unrealistic level of planning, coordination, and secrecy it would require. In the nearly four years since then, Republican election officials and prosecutors have not unearthed any evidence of such fraud, even though doing so would make them heroes in Trumpworld.

There is likewise no evidence nor any prospect - that fraud will prevent Trump from prevailing in this year's presidential election. Trump's claims to the contrary are aimed at intimidating his opponents by threatening to prosecute them for activities both legal and necessary - because of his prior actions - to ensure a free and fair election.

They may also be an attempt to suborn his supporters who hold positions in election administration into committing fraud, with the unspoken understanding that, like he wannabe insurrectionists who stormed the Capitol on January 6, 2021, they will be protected and rewarded if he wins. On October 3, the same day that Trump repeated his fact-free allegation of electoral fraud, a Colorado judge sentenced the former county clerk of Mesa County to nine years in prison for giving an associate of the Trump ally Mike Lindell access to the county's voting machines.

Trump has revived his complaints of massive voter fraud for a simple reason: to obscure his own malfeasance after he lost the 2020 election, the extent of which is now coming to light. — Project Synidcate

# Japan's electoral stalemate

apan's general election has dealt a major blow to Iapanese Prime Minister Ishiba Shigeru, whose raing Liberal Democratic Party (LDP) and its coalition partner, Komei, lost their parliamentary majority for the first time since 2009, plunging the country into political uncertainty.

While the LDP and Komei won 215 seats in the Diet (the lower house of parliament) down from 279 - the opposition Constitutional Democratic Party (CDP), led by former prime minister Yoshihiko Noda. secured 148 seats, up from 98. The remaining seats were divided among smaller opposition parties, most notably the Democratic Party for the People (DDP), which

made gains, and the Ishin Party, which lost six seats.

With the LDP and Komei falling well short of the 233 seats needed for a majority, Japan's ruling bloc faces an uphill battle to regain control, even if it manages to recruit former LDP members now serving as independents. Meanwhile, the left-leaning CDP is equally unlikely to achieve a majority by forging an alliance with the centre-right Ishin and DDP.

This adds a new layer of uncertainty to the upcoming prime ministerial election in the Diet, which will begin on November 11 in a session expected to last four days. Barring an unexpected coalition forming around one of the two largest parties, the LDP and Komei are set to back Ishiba, while the CDP and other opposition parties will probably support their respective leaders.

With no-one receiving a majority, the Diet will hold a

runoff between the two leading candidates - most likely Ishiba and Noda. Unless the CDP can reach a deal with smaller opposition parties, Ishiba will be re-elected, albeit as the head of a minority government.

Such a scenario would leave Ishiba's administration on shaky ground, reliant on ad hoc negotiations with Ishin and the DDP and continually forced to make policy concessions. By the next election of the House of Councilors (the upper house) next summer, Ishiba may already be on his way out.

Previous LDP losses triggered significant shifts in Japan's political landscape. In 1993, internal disputes drove some LDP members to break away and establish their own parties. In the subsequent election, the LDP lost its majority, and these splinter groups joined forces with other

opposition parties to form a non-LDP, non-Communist coalition, elevating Morihiro Hosokawa to the premiership and marking the first time that the LDP had lost power since its founding in 1955.

Hosokawa's coalition, however, lasted only one year, and the LDP eventually regained power in 1994 in partnership with the Socialist Party, its long-time rival, and allowing Socialist leader Tomiichi Murayama to become prime minister. Though Murayama stepped down after less than two years, the alliance survived until 1998. – Project Syndicate

# 16th Global Humanitarian Aviation Conference opens

# NHRC holds first 'Business and Human Rights Dialogue' in Arab region

ational Human Rights Committee (NHRC) chairperson and Global Alliance of National Human Rights Institutions (GANHRI) president Maryam bint Abdullah al-Attiyah has said that Arab countries are witnessing tremendous and unique opportunities as well as major challenges, with accelerating economic transformations accompanied by pressing concerns about the environmental, social

and human rights impacts of business activities.

Migrant workers, women and other vulnerable groups, she said, often bear the brunt of irresponsible business practices, which requires consolidating collective efforts to protect their rights.

Addressing the opening session of the "Business and Human Rights Dialogue" on Monday, al-Attiyah said that this inaugural

dialogue is an important step in ensuring that the Arab region does not fall behind the global trend of implementing the UN Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights, which provide a basic framework for such efforts.

These principles, she said, also emphasise the need for states to protect human rights, the need for companies to respect those rights, and enabling victims to access

effective means of redress.

Al-Attiyah stated that by virtue of their unique and powerful mandate, national human rights institutions (NHRIs) are trailblazers in promoting and protecting human rights in the context of business activities, in addition to their role as bridges of communication between governments, companies, civil society and affected com-

She said that this contributes to facilitating dialogue, promoting accountability and establishing the foundations of a human rights-based approach to business operations.

Al-Attiyah went on to say that NHRIs also play a key role in ensuring the effective implementation of the United Nations Guiding Principles and translating them into concrete facts, by providing guidance to states and companies; contributing to the development of laws, policies and practices that are consistent with international human rights standards; monitoring and tracking the impacts of business activities on human rights; investigating and reporting violations; and holding states and companies accountable for human rights violations.

Arab Network for National Human Rights Institutions (ANNHRI) secretary-general Sultan bin Hassan al-Jamali has meanwhile emphasised the importance of dialogue, noting that it puts everyone on the path to protecting human rights in business in the Arab region.

He said that the dialogue on business and human rights is aimed at charting a course for responsible business practices in the Arab region, based on the principle of the universality, interconnectedness, interdependence, and indivisibility of human rights = ONA





### Not holding war crimes perpetrators accountable 'a betrayal to its victims'

ational Human Rights Committee chairperson Maryam bint Abdullah al-Attiyah, who is also the chairperson of the Global Alliance of National Human Rights Institutions (GANHRI), has stressed that impunity and ignoring the accountability of perpetrators of war crimes is a betrayal of the victims, especially children.

During her meeting with the Special Representative of the Secretary-General of the UN on Violence against Children, Najat Maalla Mjid, al-Attiyah pointed out that the GANHRI issued has a memorandum to end violence against children to prevent perpetrators of crimes against humanity from escaping punishment.

She expressed her deep sorrow for the situation of children in Gaza, stressing that what is happening in the Arab region, especially in Gaza, affects the success of human rights issues in general and the peoples of the Middle East in particular, especially since children are at the forefront of those affected by conflicts and wars.

Al-Attiyah also met Bahrain's Human Rights Institution chairman engineer Ali Ahmed Alderazi on the sidelines of the inaugural dialogue on Business and Human Rights in Arab Region.

They discussed ways to enhance co-operation on issues of common interest and exchange best experiences and best practices in human rights issues. – **QNA**

With organisations representing government, nonprofit, and private sectors, and a strong representation from countries including India, Nigeria, and Qatar, the competition attracted submissions addressing inclusive learning, artificial intelligence (AI)-powered tools, voice-generated learning, tailored approaches for neurodivergent learners, and teacher development.

Finalists demonstrated capability to solve the challenge through evidence-based innovation, coupled with a well-structured minimum viable product proposal and timeline, clear resource allocation, and considerate manpower planning.

AprendoEnCasa Connecta by Fundacion ReImagina supports effective teacher-student interactions by providing a range of digital resources and tools designed to bridge



educational and digital gaps, helping students thrive in a rapidly changing digital landscape.

AprendoEnCasa will pilot in Latin America, focusing on improving teacher engagement and learning outcomes in Chile, Ecuador, and Mexico.

Bonocle by Bonocle is an innovative solution leveraging technology to improve Braille literacy for visually impaired individuals.

Through tactile feedback and gamified learning, Bonocle

makes education accessible, engaging, and enjoyable for the visually impaired globally.

Darsel by Darsel uses AI-powered personalised learn-

Darsel by Darsel uses AI-powered personalised learning algorithms to improve numeracy for middle school students via accessible messaging platforms like SMS and WhatsApp.

The solution is aimed at students in low-resource settings, and plans to expand its reach to primary school learners in Africa and the Middle East.

FastTrack+ by AREAi addresses literacy and numeracy

challenges by leveraging offline, self-assisted technology. The program, which utilises a digital pen, equipped with audio capabilities, and multilingual instructional materials, helps learners in refugee camps in Western and Central

Africa to achieve higher literacy levels.

FastTrack+ has shown significant success in improving reading and numeracy skills in pilot studies, with more than 80% of learners gaining basic literacy.

Meanwhile, iqrali.jo by Queen Rania Foundation, a Jordan-based initiative, focuses on parental behaviour change to improve early childhood literacy through shared reading practices.

The iqrali platform, currently in beta, provides resources and community support for parents of children aged under five, including refugee families.

TUMO Path automates the learning process for teenag-

ers through hyper-personalised AI-driven learning journeys.

Already operational in 10 countries, the programme will

expand further with the integration of new AI modules in Armenia, targeting more than 80,000 users by 2027.

Over the next 12 months, WISE and its chosen pro-

gramme partner Dalberg Advisors will offer a range of capacity building opportunities and personalised mentorship to the chosen finalists.

In addition, WISE offers a conditional grant of \$125,000

to each team to support the development of their MVP (minimum viable product) during this year-long commitment.

The winning solution(s), chosen by an external jury of international education experts, will be awarded the \$1mn WISE Prize for Education at the WISE12 Summit in 2025, where the winner will be announced live.

# HMC unveils first neurovision rehabilitation programme

amad Medical Corporation (HMC)'s Corporate Rehabilitation Therapy Services has introduced Qatar's first dedicated Neurovision Rehabilitation services to address the needs of both adult and paediatric patients with vision impairments caused by neurological conditions such as neurodevelopmental disorders, stroke, and Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI).

This initiative aligns with the HMC's strategic vision to provide excellence in service delivery and patient experience, as envisioned in Qatar's Third National Development Strategy.

Vision impairments are common in neurological disorders, with global research showing that approximately 73% of stroke survivors and 74% of TBI patients experience some form of neurovision deficit.

In children, cortical visual impairment is also prevalent, particularly among those with neurological conditions, occurring at a rate of 10 per 10,000 people.

Patients with neurovision impairments often report seeing double, experiencing blurry vision, difficulties perceiving one side of their visual field or frequently knocking over objects.

These symptoms are often overlooked due to limited understanding of neurovision rehabilitation.

This initiative was launched under Dr Hanadi al-Hamad, the deputy chief for Rehabilitation, Long-term, and Geriatric Care, and lead of Corporate Rehabilitation Therapy Services.

"Our aim is to establish a dedicated, evidence-based neurovision rehabilitation programme at the HMC that supports the overall recovery of our patients," Dr

al-Hamad explained.

To build the necessary skills and knowledge among health-care professionals, a three-day workshop on Vision Rehabilitation in Neurorehabilitation Settings was held at the HMC's Qatar Rehabilitation Institute.

Led by international expert Robert L Constantine, a registered occupational therapist from the US, the workshop provided intensive training for 23 allied health professionals, including optometrists, occupational therapists, and physical therapists from various HMC hospitals.

Dr Hanadi said that improving vision is critical to enhancing cognitive and physical function, particularly during the crucial six-month post-stroke or TBI recovery period.

"By equipping our interdisciplinary team with neurovision assessment and treatment techniques, we can significantly improve the functional outcomes of patients and offer the highest standard of care," she said.

Sultan Salim Hammam al-Abdulla, assistant executive director of Clinical Services for Occupational Therapy Services at the HMC, said: "This workshop is a major step forward in addressing neurorehabilitation. Through interdisciplinary collaboration, we can begin to fill the gap in neurovision rehabilitation services in Qatar."

The workshop concluded with the development of a process flow for implementing vision rehabilitation services across both paediatric and adult settings.

This strategic plan will serve as a roadmap for the successful integration of neurovision services into the HMC's rehabilitation framework.



### **Education City Tram marks 3mn passengers milestone**



The Education City Tram at Qatar Foundation has marked a major milestone, reaching 3mn passenger journeys. The tram network commenced operations with the launch of the Blue Line in December 2019, followed by the Yellow Line in October 2020, and most recently the Green Line in July 2023. The Education City Tram is an integrated and sustainable public transportation system that connects key venues within the Education City community, including Al Shaqab, the Education City Stadium, Oxygen Park, Minaretein, and the Ceremonial Court.
