Syria urges US to lift all sanctions

Syria yesterday welcomed exemptions from some economic sanctions imposed by the US, but urged a complete lifting to support its recovery, according to a foreign ministry statement on X. European Union sanctions in Syria that obstruct the delivery of humanitarian aid and hinder the country's recovery could be lifted swiftly, France's foreign minister said.

Europe warns Trump over Greenland

European leaders yesterday warned Donald Trump against threatening sovereign borders after the US President-elect refused to rule out military action to take Greenland. Germany's Olaf Scholz said Trump's comments had sparked "notable incomprehension" among EU leaders. Trump has designs on the mineral- and oil-rich Arctic island, an autonomous territory of EU member Denmark. He set off new alarm bells on Tuesday when he refused to rule out military intervention over the Panama Canal and Greenland. Page 11

Cabinet okays stipulations for e-commerce

he Cabinet held its regular meeting yesterday at the Amiri Diwan, chaired by HE the Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman bin Jassim al-Thani. Following the meeting, HE the Minister of Justice and Minister of State for Cabinet Affairs Ibrahim bin Ali al-Mohannadi issued a statement detailing the key decisions and discussions that took place.

The Cabinet also approved, in principle, a draft Cabinet decision on conducting a simplified census and an administrative records-based census for population, housing. and establishments for the year 2025

The Cabinet approved in principle, a draft decision by the Ministry of Commerce and Industry (MoCI) to determine the conditions and regulations for practising e-commerce that do not require a physical location. This draft decision aims to establish a legal framework for e-commerce, fostering an environment that attracts investors and entrepreneurs while safeguarding the rights of consumers and clients.

The Cabinet considered the topics listed on its agenda, as it was informed of the Shura Council's approval of a draft law regulating travel agencies and air cargo

The Cabinet also approved, in principle, a draft Cabinet decision on conducting a simplified

census and an administrative records-based census for population, housing, and establishments for the year 2025. The draft decision aims to meet national needs for statistical information and data efficiently and with a high degree of reliability, and to collect, analyse, and publish social, demographic, and economic data related to the total population, housing, and establishments.

The Cabinet also decided to take the necessary measures to ratify a cooperation agreement on humanitarian aid between the Government of Qatar and the Government of the Republic of Turkiye.

The Cabinet approved a draft agreement on economic, commercial, and technical cooperation between the Government of Qatar and the Government of the Republic of Burundi, as well as a draft memorandum of understanding (MoU) on family policy co-operation between the Ministry of Social Development and Family of the State of Qatar and the Ministry of Culture and Innovation of Hungary. The Cabinet then reviewed six

reports and took the appropriate decisions thereon. These reports included a report on developing a national framework for prevention and safety to address environmental damages and violations, the second report on the work of the technical committee studying the fees for services provided by government entities, the annual report of the State Cases Department for 2024, a report on the strategy of the Qatar Financial Centre (2024-2030), a report on the outcomes of HE Minister of Communications and Information Technology's participation in the 79th session of the UN General Assembly, and a report on the outcomes of the participation of HE Minister of Municipality at the Cityscape Global Exhibition on building future cities.

Gaza truce deal near: Blinken

Qatar, US, Egypt intensify truce efforts •Israeli strikes kill dozens in the Strip

S Secretary of State Antony Blinken said yesterday that a Gaza ceasefire remained close, but reiterated that it may not happen before President Joe Biden hands over power to Donald Trump.

"In the Middle East, we're very close to a ceasefire and hostage deal," Blinken told reporters in Paris.

"I hope that we can get it over the line in the time that we have," said Blinken, who leaves office with Trump's inauguration on January 20.

But if not, he said, "I believe that when we get that deal - and we'll get it - it'll be on the basis of the plan that President Biden put before the world back in May."

A report from Cairo, quoting Palestinian medics said Israeli strikes killed dozens of people across Gaza yesterday, as talks

to halt the fighting continued in Qatar and Israeli troops recovered the body of at least one hostage from a tunnel near the southern city of Rafah.

Palestinian medical workers said an Israeli air strike killed at least 10 people in a multi-storey house in the Sheikh Radwan neighbourhood of Gaza City, while another killed 10 in other parts of the city.

In Deir Al-Balah city in central Gaza, where hundreds of thousands of displaced Palestinians are sheltering, and in Jabalia, the largest of Gaza's eight historic refugee camps, a total of seven people were killed, they said.

Such mass casualties have become a daily occurrence in Gaza, where some 46,000 Palestinians have now been killed in Israel's 15-month-long assault, according to health officials in the enclave.

As Israel continued its bombardments, the United States, Qatar and Egypt were making intensive efforts to reach a ceasefire deal, with one source close to the talks saying this was the most serious attempt to reach a deal so far.

"Things are better than ever before, but there is no deal yet," the source told Reuters.

Trump's Middle East envoy teve Witkoff said overnight hoped to have good things to report about Israeli hostages held by the time Trump is sworn in as president. A deal would also involve the release of Palestinians held in Israeli jails.

As the talks continued on Wednesday, the Israeli military said troops had recovered the body of Israeli Bedouin hostage Youssef al-Ziyadna, along with evidence that was still being examined suggesting his son Hamza, taken on the same day, may also be dead.

The military clarified that the son's body had not been recovered, although "findings were located related to Hamza... which raise serious concerns for his life". Page 7

Wildfires rage out of control near Los Angeles

least two people were killed as a trio of fastgrowing wildfires raged out of control yesterday near Los Angeles, destroying hundreds of buildings, scorching hillsides and prompting officials to order some 70,000 people to evacuate their homes.

Fierce winds were hindering firefighting efforts and fuelling the fires, which have expanded unimpeded since they began on Tuesday.

The biggest blaze had consumed more than 5,000 acres in the picturesque Pacific Palisades neighbourhood, which lies east of Los Angeles between the beach towns of Santa Monica and Malibu and is home to many film, television and music stars. More than 1,000 structures have been destroyed, Los Angeles County Fire Chief Anthony Marrone said.

Another fire, the Eaton fire, had grown to more than 2,000 acres as it burned some 50km inland in Altadena, near Pasadena. Two fatalities were reported there, though officials said they

did not have further details.

The Hurst fire, in Sylmar in the San Fernando Valley northwest of Los Angeles, had exceeded 500 acres. All three fires were 0% contained, officials said.

A "high number" of significant

injuries had occurred among residents who did not need evacuation orders, Marrone said.

Officials warned that the gusty winds were forecast to persist throughout the day.

"We are absolutely not out of

danger yet, with the strong winds that continue to push through the city and the county today," Los Angeles City Fire Chief Kristen Crowlev said.

The skies above Los Angeles glowed red and were blanketed by

thick smoke as the sun rose vesterday.
As the flames spread and resi-

dents began evacuating after the fires broke out on Tuesday, roads were so jammed that some people abandoned their vehicles to escape the fire. Emergency responders were going door to door to press evacuation orders.

California Governor Gavin Newsom declared a state of emergency on Tuesday.

Approximately 100 of the 1,000 public schools in the Los Angeles Unified School District were shut down, Superintendent Alberto Carvalho told the press conference.

Pacific Palisades is one of the most expensive neighbourhoods in the country. A typical home was valued at \$3.7mn as of the end of 2023, according to Zillow.

Before the fire started, the National Weather Service had issued its highest alert for extreme fire conditions for much of Los Angeles County from Tuesday through Thursday.

With low humidity and dry vegetation due to a lack of rain, the conditions were "about as bad as it gets in terms of fire weather." the service said. Page 11









Qatar has strongly condemned the alleged historic maps of Israel published by official accounts affiliated with the occupation government, which reportedly include parts of the occupied Palestinian territories, as well as Jordan, Lebanon and Syria; considering the publication of these maps a flagrant violation of international legitimacy resolutions and the provisions of international law. In a statement yesterday, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs warned that the publication of the alleged maps would hinder the chances of peace in the region, particularly amid the ongoing brutal war on the Gaza Strip. The ministry emphasised the need for the international community to fulfil its legal and moral responsibilities by pressuring the Israeli occupation to comply with international legitimacy resolutions and confront its expansionist ambitions in Arab lands. It reiterated Oatar's firm stance on the justice of the Palestinian cause, the legitimate rights of the brotherly Palestinian people, and the establishment of an independent Palestinian state based on the 1967 borders, with East Jerusalem as its capital.

PHCC records 5.2mn visitors in 2024: official



he Primary Health Corporation (PHCC) received 5.2mn visitors in 2024 while extending various healthcare services at its facilities. Dr Samya al-Abdulla, executive director of operations, senior family medicine consultant at PHCC and deputy national lead for Mental Health and Wellbeing, told local Arabic daily Arrayah that these visitors were recorded in various specialities within the corporation.

The major share of the visits was recorded by Family Medicine Clinics where more than 3.2mn visitors availed services.

availed services.

The Emergency Care Units for adults and children recorded more than 217,000 while Dental Clinics recorded more than 350,000 visits. Visitors sought services in various dental specialities. These included general dentistry, gum diseases, root canal treatment, oral and dental surgery and dental paediatric treatment. While Eye Clinics recorded nearly 100,000 visits, Ear, Nose and Throat Clinics recorded nearly 50,000 visits



and Dermatology Clinic recorded nearly 50,000 visits.

"There has been an increase in the rate of demand for virtual consultations (phone or video), as this year there have been more than 410,000 virtual consultations with an increase of approximately 10% that was marked in 2023," she said.

According to the data, absenteeism rates in PHCC clinics mark a significant variation between different specialities. Family Medicine Clinics recorded 28% while dental clinics had the lowest absenteeism rate at 17% with a total absenteeism rate of 29% across all clinics.

"This reflects the importance of increasing awareness among patients about the importance of the appointment system. The Opera-

tions Department is taking several measures to improve adherence to appointments including reevaluating and delivering appointments. The department also raises awareness of the importance of adherence and improves communication with patients through reminder messages, which contributes to providing more effective and quality healthcare to patients," she noted.

"PHCC is one of the main pillars of the health system in Qatar. It provides a diverse and integrated range of health services through 31 health centres distributed geographically to cover the needs of citizens and residents in Qatar," she said noting that the corporation has achieved many distinguished accomplishments in the field of healthcare.



He pointed out that the course aims to develop patience and confidence, and enhance physical, psychological, and mental capabili-


ties by training recruits in military discipline and organisation.

Lebanon to hold presidential vote

Lebanon's parliament will try to elect a president today, with officials seeing better chances of success in a political landscape shaken by Israel's war with Hezbollah and the toppling of the group's ally Bashar al-Assad in neighbouring Syria, Reuters reported from Beirut. The post. reserved for a Maronite Christian in the country's sectarian powersharing system, has been vacant since Michel Aoun's term ended in October, 2022. None of the political groups in the 128-seat parliament have enough seats to impose their choice, and they have so far been unable to agree on a consensus candidate. The vote marks the first test of Lebanon's power balance since the Hezbollah emerged badly pummelled from the war with Israel. It takes place against a backdrop of change in the wider Middle East, where the Assad-led Syrian state exercised sway over Lebanon for decades, both directly and through allies such as Hezbollah.

Air strike kills two children in West Bank

Palestinian officials said two children were among three people killed in an Israeli air strike on the occupied West Bank yesterday which the military said targeted fighters.

Ahmad Asaad, governor of the northern West Bank city of Tubas, told AFP that the strike hit nearby Tammun village, killing a 23-year-old man and two children, aged eight and 10, all from the same family.

The Palestinian foreign ministry in Ramallah condemned the deadly strike, accusing Israel of harming civilians "under the pretext" of fighting fighters.

The Israeli military said the air force "struck a fighter cell" in the Tammun area.

The Tubas governor said Israeli forces, which have operated in Tammun in recent days, took the bodies of the three Palestinians killed.

They later handed them back, the Red Crescent said.

The governor identified the dead as Adam Bsharat, 23, Hamza Bsharat, 10, and Reda Bsharat, eight.

He said they were killed in front of their house, which an AFP journalist said was damaged by shrapnel.

Relative Jalal Bsharat said they had been at home when "the Israeli occupation army targeted them".

pation army targeted them". He said the strike showed Palestinians are not safe, even in their own homes. By midday, hours after the strike, Israeli forces were no longer seen in Tammun, the AFP journalist said. It was the second Israeli air strike to hit Tammun in as many days.

On Tuesday, the military said it killed two people in a strike on an "armed fighter cell" that opened fire on Israeli forces who were conducting a raid in the village.

Cambodian police arrest suspect in politician's Bangkok shooting

Police in Cambodia arrested a former Thai marine yesterday over the fatal shooting of a Cambodian opposition politician in a brazen attack in downtown Bangkok. Exiled Cambodian opposition figurehead Sam Rainsy accused the country's powerful former leader Hun Sen of ordering the killing of Lim Kimya, who was also a French

Lim Kimya was shot dead on Tuesday by a gunman on a motorbike as he arrived in the Thai capital from the Cambodian city of Siem Reap by bus, accompanied by his French wife. Thai police issued a warrant for the suspected shooter on Wednesday, and in the evening Cambodia said the man had been detained at 1:50pm in Battambang province, which borders Thailand.

"The gunman is a Thai national, and a former Thai marine," Cambodian National Police spokesman Chhay Kim Khoeun told AFP. Cambodian police named the suspect as Ekkalak Pheanoi - though some Thai media gave his name as Ekkalak Paenoi - and said he would be returned to Thailand, without giving a timetable.

Earlier, Sanong Sangmanee, police chief for the area of Bangkok

where the shooting happened, told AFP they had little information about the suspect except that he worked as a motorbike taxi driver.

Scores of Cambodian opposition activists have fled to Thailand in recent years to avoid alleged repression at home. Some were arrested and deported back to the country. Hun Sen ruled Cambodia with an iron fist for nearly four decades, with rights groups accusing him of using the legal system to crush opposition to his rule. He stepped down and handed power to his son Hun Manet in 2023 but is still seen as a major power in the kingdom. On Tuesday, Hun Sen called for a new law to label anyone who at-

tempts to topple Hun Manet's government as "terrorists".

Sam Rainsy, Hun Sen's long-time rival, accused the former Cambodian leader of being behind the killing. "Hun Sen's hand can be seen behind the assassination of Lim Kimya, just as it has been behind the countless political crimes in Cambodia that have always gone unpunished," Sam Rainsy said in a statement posted on his Facebook page. He alleged "the motive is the same, as is the modus operandi". Cambodian government spokesman Pen Bona told AFP the killing was in Thailand "so Thai authorities will handle the case".

He denied the government was

involved with the killing, saying opposition figures "always accuse the government of everything groundlessly and without any evidence".

Lim Kimya became an opposition member of Cambodia's parliament following an election in 2013 in which Hun Sen's ruling party almost lost to its then-rival, the Cambodia National Rescue Party (CNRP). The CNRP, which was founded in 2012 by Sam Rainsy and Kem Sokha and was once considered the sole viable opponent to the ruling Cambodian People's Party (CPP), was dissolved by court order in 2017.

Scores of opposition politicians and MPs, including Lim Kimya, were banned from political activities following the party's dissolution. The now-dissolved CNRP said in a statement it was shocked by "the heinous and inhumane" killing of Lim Kimya. It condemned "the brutal act that badly threatens political freedom".

Elaine Pearson, the Asia director of Human Rights Watch, urged Thailand to carry out a "thorough independent investigation" into the killing. "What has happened in the last 24 hours really sends a chill down the spine for any Cambodian political activists that Bangkok is not a safe place," she told AFP. The French embassies in Bangkok and Phnom Penh have so far declined to comment on the killing.

ore than 400 people trapped by rubble in earthquake-stricken Tibet have been rescued, Chinese officials said on Wednesday, with an unknown number still unaccounted for in freezing weather a day after a strong tremor rocked the Himalayan foothills.

The epicentre of Tuesday's magnitude 6.8 quake, one of the region's most powerful tremors in recent years, was located in Tingri in China's Tibet, about 80km north of Mount Everest, the world's highest mountain. It also shook buildings in neighbouring Nepal. Bhutan and India.

Twenty-four hours after the temblor struck, those trapped under rubble would have endured a night in sub-zero temperatures, adding to the pressure on rescuers looking for survivors in an area roughly the size of Cambodia. Temperatures in the high-altitude region dropped as low as -18C overnight. People trapped or those without shelter are at risk of rapid hypothermia and may only be able to live for five to 10 hours even if uninjured, experts say.

Footage broadcast on state television CCTV showed families huddled in rows of blue and green tents quickly erected by soldiers and aid workers in settlements surrounding the epicentre, where hundreds of aftershocks have been recorded. At least 126 people were known to have been killed and 188 injured on the Tibetan side, state broadcaster CCTV reported. No deaths have been reported in Nepal or else-

where. The quake was so strong part of the terrain around the epicentre slipped as much as 1.6m over a distance of 80km, according to an analysis by the United States Geological Survey.

Chinese authorities have yet to announce how many people are still missing. In Nepal, an official told Reuters the quake destroyed a school building in a village near Mount Everest, which straddles the Nepali-Tibetan border. No one was inside at the time.

German climber Jost Kobusch said he was just above the Everest base camp on the Nepali side when the quake struck. His tent shook violently and he saw several avalanches crash down. He was unscathed. "I'm climbing Everest in the winter by myself and ... looks like basically I'm the only mountaineer there, in the base camp there's nobody," Kobusch told Reuters in a video call.

His expedition organising company, Satori Adventure, said Kobusch had left the base camp and was descending to Namche Bazaar on Wednesday on the way to Kathmandu. No avalanches have been observed on Everest so far from the Chinese side, state-run Xinhua news agency reported on Wednesday, citing Chinese scientists.

But damage round the epicentre was extensive. An initial survey showed 3,609 homes had been destroyed in the Shigatse region, home to 800,000 people, state media reported late on Tuesday. More than 14,000 rescue personnel had been deployed. More than 46,500 people affected by the quake have been relocated, and 484 tourists in Tingri have been safely transported to the city of Shigatse, local officials said at a press conference on Wednesday.

Home to some 60,000 people, Tingri is Tibet's most populous county on China's border with Nepal and is administered from Shigatse, the traditional seat of the Panchen Lama, one of the most important figures in Tibetan Buddhism. No damage has been reported to Shigatse's Tashilhunpo monastery, state media reported, founded in 1447 by the first Dalai

The 14th and current Dalai Lama has said he was deeply saddened by the quake, speaking from exile in India where he fled in 1959 after a failed uprising against Chinese rule. China routinely rejects criticism from exiles and rights groups of its rule in Tibet, saying it has

brought much-needed development to a remote region and that it respects Tibetan culture and religion. Russian President Vladimir Putin and Taiwan President Lai Ching-te have also expressed condolences to the earthquake's victims. Southwestern parts of China, Nepal and northern India are often hit by earthquakes caused by the collision of the Indian and Eurasian tectonic plates pushing up an ancient sea that is now the Qinghai-Tibetan plateau. As of noon on Wednesday, 646 aftershocks with magnitudes of up to 4.4 continued to jolt the area

around the epicentre.

Over the past five years, there have been 29 quakes with magnitudes of 3 or above within 200km of the epicentre of Tuesday's temblor, according to local earthquake bureau data. Analysis shows a magnitude 5 to 6 quake could occur in the same area in the near future, Meng Hui, deputy head of Tibet's earthquake administration, said at the news conference.

Tuesday's quake was the worst in China since a 6.2 magnitude earthquake in 2023 that killed at least 149 people in a remote northwestern region. In 2008, an 8.0-magnitude earthquake hit Sichuan, claiming the lives of at least 70,000 people, the deadliest quake to hit China since the 1976 Tangshan quake that killed at least 242,000.

China says Taiwan 'hyped' sea cable damage claims

hina yesterday accused Taiwan's ruling party of having "deliberately hyped" an incident in which a Chinese-owned ship was suspected of damaging a subsea telecoms cable. Taiwanese authorities this week said they were investigating a Chinese-owned cargo ship suspected of dragging its anchor over an international subsea telecoms cable northeast of the island.

"DPP authorities have... out of thin air deliberately hyped the subsea cable incident as a socalled 'grey-zone threat' from the mainland, fully showing they will not let go of unscrupulous 'anti-China counter-China' tricks," state broadcaster CCTV quoted Taiwan Affairs Office spokesman Chen Binhua as saying, referring to the island's ruling Democratic Progressive Party. Taiwan's top China policy body, the Mainland Affairs Council, hit back Wednesday, saying the prosecutors' investigation was "based on relevant evidence" and there was no "an ti-China" issue.

The Cameroon-flagged Shunxing39 was intercepted by Taiwan's coast guard on Friday after Chunghwa Telecom reported damage to a subsea cable that is part of the Trans-Pacific Express Cable System.

Coast guard personnel were unable to board the ship due to rough seas and it was allowed to sail for South Korea. "An analysis of the ship's historical trajectory has yet to reveal its true intent", Taiwan's coast guard said on Tuesday.

"However, the possibility of a Chinese-flag of convenience ship engaging in grey-zone harassment cannot be ruled out", it added, referring to tactics that fall short of an act of war. Taiwan Affairs Office spokesman Chen dismissed the allegations, saying damage to subsea cables was "a common maritime occurrence" with "more than a hundred incidents" in the world each year.

Hundreds rally for South Korea's Yoon as new arrest bid beckons

Lundreds of supporters of South Korea's impeached President Yoon Sukyeol rallied outside his residence Wednesday as investigators prepared a fresh attempt to arrest him.

Yoon has refused questioning and resisted arrest since his bungled December 3 martial law decree plunged South Korea into its worst political crisis in decades.

Investigators secured a new arrest warrant Tuesday after an initial seven-day order expired. Several hundred members of his base rushed to the presidential residence in central Seoul in response, braving sub-zero temperatures. "A large number of people are coming out to join us. Despite the cold weather, many stayed up all night last night, braving the chill," Lee Hye-sook, a 57-year-old Yoon supporter, told AFP outside the residence. "Wit-

nessing their resilience against the wind and cold, I am confident that President Yoon Suk-yeol will return, and we will prevail."

Some supporters left flow-

ers outside and ribbons with the Trump-style slogan "Make Korea Great Again", while others waved American flags at the gates of the compound from where the suspended leader has resisted arrest. Despite a cold weather warning that temperatures were expected to fall to -10C, the suspended president's supporters were defiant, shouting "impeachment is invalid". Rival protesters calling for Yoon to be punished waved glowsticks - commonly seen at K-pop concerts - and held placards that read, "Detain, arrest insurrectionist Yoon Sukyeol".

Yoon's legal team said yesterday he remains inside the residential compound, after investigators cast doubt a day earlier on his whereabouts. "Last night, I personally visited the official residence, met the president there, and left," said his lawyer Yoon Kap-keun, who is unrelated. The Corruption Investigation Office (CIO), which is leading the probe into the president, has kept secret the duration of the new warrant. Yoon would become the first sitting South Korean president to be arrested if investigators are able to detain him.

Yoon's legal team said they would not comply with the current warrant, but only a stronger one from a different court if approved, accusing investigators of targeting an allegedly liberal-leaning judge for the initial orders. An AFP journalist saw Yoon's guards walking behind rows of buses and locked entrance gates covered in barbed wire at the residential compound on Wednesday.

on Wednesday. CIO chief Oh Dong-woon said on Tuesday the force would "prepare thoroughly" to make sure their second arrest attempt was successful. Acting president Choi Sangmok warned against violence in the event of another standoff. "Under no circumstances should there be any injuries to citizens or conflicts among government agencies. Please ensure every precaution is taken," Choi said in a meeting with officials. South Korea's Constitutional Court has slated January 14 for the start of Yoon's impeachment trial, which would proceed in his absence if he does not attend. His legal team said he planned to attend the trial at some stage and lawyer Yoon Kap-keun told reporters on Wednesday "the president's position... remains unchanged".

"Of course, issues related to security and safety must be resolved in advance," he said. National Assembly Speaker Woo Won-shik wrote on X it was distressing to watch Yoon mobilise force to stop his arrest because the "whole world" was watching. Investigators are trying to work out how to tackle an expected wall of security after being stopped by hundreds of Presidential Security Service (PSS) guards last week.

"The number of PSS personnel cannot be disclosed as it is confidential information," a service spokesperson told AFP. On Wednesday parliament voted down two bills to investigate Yoon and his wife for different charges, failing to get the two-thirds majority they needed

British universities join retreat from Musk's X, citing misinformation

niversities and other higher education establishments have joined a retreat among British institutions from Elon Musk's X social media platform, citing its role in spreading misinformation that fuelled race riots last year.

A Reuters survey on Tuesday showed several universities have scaled back usage of X to the bare minimum or quit completely, following scores of academics who

have left the platform. The role of X, formerly Twitter, came under the spotlight in Britain last year during violent racial disturbances.

Musk - a close aide to US President-elect Donald Trump - has since called for Prime Minister Keir Starmer to be jailed and for anti-Muslim activist Stephen Yaxley-Lennon, who co-founded the far-right English Defence League and is known as Tommy Robinson, to be released from prison.

Reuters surveyed X accounts of over 150 universities, their colleges and art conservatoires and contacted those that had made little or

no posts in recent months.

They cited concerns over misinformation, content that promotes violence and declining engagement. "London Business School continually reviews its communications channels and decides which to use based on levels of effective audience engagement," LBS told Reuters

It last posted to its 182,000 followers on X in September. It is one of the top-ranked business schools in the world. Reuters was first to report in October that several British police forces had quit X or cut their usage.

The university survey points to a broader withdrawal among public institutions, even though many universities still post regularly to X. At least seven of the University of Cambridge's 31 colleges have stopped posting to X.

"We know this platform is becoming increasingly toxic, so we will continue to assess our presence on X and monitor emerging alternatives," said Homerton College, the university's largest in terms of student numbers. The University of Cambridge told Reuters it continued to use X alongside other channels.

At Oxford, Merton College - the university's top-ranked college academically - has deleted its X account. It did not respond to a request for comment, Harris Manchester - another Oxford college - last posted on Nov 15 and asked followers to find it on other plat-

The University of East Anglia said its audience engagement on X

had plunged by 80%. X did not respond to a request for comment. Falmouth University last posted to X in September, while Plymouth Marjon University said it will no longer use it. London Metropolitan University cited falling engagement for no longer actively posting.

Buckinghamshire New University said \bar{X} was "no longer a place where we want to encourage conversations with our university".

Some top arts conservatoires have also stepped away. The Royal Northern College of Music said it was "consciously channelling its energy elsewhere", while London's performing arts conservatoire Trinity Lab deleted its X account.

The Royal Central School of Speech and Drama hasn't posted since August.

US, Canadian and Australian travellers now face UK entry fee

risitors to the UK from dozens of countries, including the United States, Canada and Australia, must now pay to enter Britain after a new visawaiver entry system took effect on Wednesday. The Electronic Travel Authorisation (ETA) scheme similar to the ESTA system in the United States - requires visitors who do not need a visa to enter Britain to acquire pre-travel authorisation.

Costing £10 (\$12.50) and allowing stays of up to six months at a time over two years, it first launched in 2023. Now, it has been expanded to include citizens of around 50 more countries and territories, from Argentina, Brazil and New Zealand to Japan, South Korea and Caribbean nations.

With the system kicking in for them on Wednesday, they have been able to apply since last No-

The scheme, aimed at tightening horder security will next be extended to dozens of EU and European countries and territories on April 2.

Those citizens covered by the scheme will be able to apply for the new ETA - which is digitally linked to the traveller's passport via an app, from March 5. Around

6mn people from the United States, Canada and Australia visit Britain each year, according to the UK government. Eligible travellers will need one even if they are just using the UK to connect to an onward flight abroad. ETA also applies to children and babies.

Naila Hadi, a US woman in her fifties, told AFP at London's Heathrow Airport that the new system was "easy" to navigate. "We did it on our phones and they just scanned the passport, because this passport has a chip,... and within 20 minutes we got our approval," said Hadi, who had arrived from New Jersey with her daughter.

Jackie Day, a 77-year-old arriving from Vancouver, said: "My only quibble is that when I selected the country I was applying from, Canada, I had to pay in US dollars." "I had to scan the passport, I had to scan my face plus take a picture of my face and fill out basic information about where I live, nothing complicated," she added.

However, Northern Ireland conomy minister Conor Murphy warned that ETA will have a "devastating" impact on tourism in the British province, given that its neighbour the Republic of Ireland is not involved with the scheme. Murphy fears that the cost and red tape will deter international tourists visiting

the Republic from making the journey across the land border to visit Northern Ireland, and has called for a time-limited exemption for people visiting up to seven days.

Heathrow has also opposed the scheme, saying its rollout has reduced the number of passengers transiting through the UK, and that it makes the country "less competitive" and harms economic growth. The new requirement does not apply to British and Irish citizens, those with passports from British overseas territories and legal UK residents.

It does not change the requirements for citizens of countries who need a visa to visit Britain, such as Chinese, Ecuadorian and South African travellers. Previously, most visitors not requiring a visa could arrive at a British airport and proceed through immigration control with their passport. The new UK entry scheme mirrors the imminent ETIAS scheme for visa-exempt nationals travelling to 30 European countries, including France and Germany which will cost seven euros (\$7.40) and last three years.

The European Commission expects the system - which will apply to around 60 countries, including the United States, Canada. Brazil and the UK - to become operational in the middle of this

Britain sanctions neo-Nazi entity 'Blood and Honour'

ritain yesterday froze the assets of international neo-Nazi group Blood and Honour, the first use of the UK's counter-terrorism sanctions to target a far-right entity.

The finance ministry said it ad "reasonable grounds" to suspect that Blood and Honour was "promoting and encouraging terrorism, seeking to recruit people for that purpose and making funds available" for terror activities. Under the order, all assets and economic resources in the UK owned or controlled by

Blood and Honour and its aliases, including the violent Combat 18 group, must now be frozen. No person or entity in Britain is allowed to deal with any funds or economic resources belonging to the far-right entity or make funds, financial services or resources available to it unless they obtain a licence.

"The designation of Blood and Honour is a clear signal that the UK works proactively to stop terrorist financing and will take action against any who try to exploit the UK financial system for this activity," the ministry added.

The group emerged in England in 1987 from the skinhead music scene, according to The Counter

Extremism Project (CEP), a nonprofit policy organisation working to combat extremist ideologies.

Founded by Ian Stuart Donaldson, who died in a 1993 car crash, it has since spread across Europe, Russia, Australia, and North America, the CEP noted. Rightwing extremist Anders Behring Breivik, who carried out Norway's deadliest peacetime attack when he killed 77 people in 2011 told a court there in 2022 he was merely a "foot soldier" for the Blood and Honour movement.

Canada designated it and its violent offshoot Combat 18 as terrorist groups in 2019, while several European countries have banned them.

India names rocket scientist as new space agency chief

ndia appointed rocket scien-

tist V Narayanan as the new head of the Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO), the government said, a key role as India works to become a space superpower.

Narayanan takes over from S Somanath, who became chairman in 2022 and has been credited with making the 54-year-old space agency more approachable and opening it up to engage with the next generation.

Former colleagues describe Narayanan, who joined ISRO in 1984, as a mild mannered but "strict" scientist with a track record of getting things done. "The appointment is a surprise

because we were expecting an extension for Somanath, but the choice makes sense, given Narayanan's track record," said a former ISRO scientist and colleague, who did not want to be named because he is not authorised to speak to the media.

Narayanan, who has a doctorate in aerospace engineering, will take charge as ISRO sets sights on building its own space station by 2035, and putting an Indian on the moon by 2040.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi has called on ISRO to make India a profitable space superpower, and the agency has responded by looking to work with the private sector. The Indian government estimates its share of the market is currently just \$8bn, but it is aiming to increase that to \$44bn over the next decade.

The \$400bn global commercial space market is expected to be worth \$1tn by 2030.

Somanath and Narayanan did not immediately respond to requests for comment. Narayanan, who has worked on the key rocket launches such as ISRO's Polar Satellite Launch Vehicle and led the centre that designs and develops liquid propulsion systems for the agency, will take over on Jan 14

for a two-year term. He was also the head of the analysis committee tasked with looking into the failure of Chandrayaan-2, where ISRO lost contact with a spacecraft it was trying to land on the moon.

The agency eventually launched the Chandrayaan-3 mission in 2023, becoming the first country to land on the rugged, unexplored south pole of the moon.

Bangladesh orders banks to assist Britain minister graft probe

angladesh money laundering investigators have ordered the country's big banks to hand over details of transactions relating to British anti-corruption minister Tulip Siddiq in an ongo-

ing graft probe, officers told AFP. Siddiq is the niece of former

Bangladeshi premier Sheikh Hasina, who fled abroad last August after a student-led uprising against her iron-fisted tenure. Last month the national anti-corruption commission launched a probe into the alleged embezzlement by Hasina's family of \$5bn connected to a Russian-funded nuclear power plant.

Two officials from the Bangladesh Financial Intelligence Unit (BFIU), speaking to AFP on con-

dition of anonymity, confirmed that Bangladeshi banks had been instructed to furnish any financial records relating to Siddiq. A BFIU document issued Tuesday and seen by AFP showed that banks had also been told to provide transaction records for Hasina, her son and daughter, Siddig's two siblings and her mother Sheikh Rehana.

The kickback allegations relate to the \$12.65bn Rooppur nuclear plant, which was bankrolled by Moscow with a 90 percent loan. "The claims of kickbacks, mismanagement, money laundering, and potential abuse of power raise significant concerns about the integrity of the project and the use of public funds", the anti-corruption commission said last month when announcing the probe.

The order came a day after British Prime Minister Keir Starmer

revealed that Siddiq had referred herself to his standards adviser. Siddiq insists she has done nothing wrong and a spokesman for Starmer said he retains "full confidence" in her. The referral came after the Sunday Times and Financial Times newspapers reported that she had lived in properties linked to her aunt Sheikh Hasina's administration. "In recent weeks I have been the subject of media reporting,

much of it inaccurate, about my financial affairs and my family's links to the former government of Bangladesh," Siddiq wrote in her letter to ministerial standards watchdog Laurie Magnus.

"I am clear that I have done nothing wrong," she added. "However, for the avoidance of doubt, I would like you to independently establish the facts about these matters?

'New' Syria is up against economy ravaged by war

Syria's economy has been decimated by more than a decade of civil war and sanctions that have severed it from the global financial system. Below is a round up of the current state of the economy and how the conflict has reshaped trade and government finances.

The economy more than halved between 2010 and 2021, official Syrian data cited by the World Bank in spring 2024 showed. However, this was likely an underestimate, the bank said. Its calculations using nighttime light emissions - a proxy for overall economic activity indicated a sharper 84% contraction between 2010 and 2023.

The World Bank reclassified Syria as a low-income country in 2018. More than 90% of the 23mn Syrians live below the poverty line, according to UN agencies.

World Bank data estimated Syria's economy was \$23.63bn in 2022 roughly on par with Albania and Armenia, which each have fewer than 3mn inhabitants. Syria's economic crunch worsened in 2019 when neighbouring Lebanon, with which it has extensive economic and financial ties, descended into crisis. Syria then introduced a plethora of exchange rates for different transactions to safeguard access to scarce hard currency. Following the new rulers' takeover in December, the central bank pledged to adopt an official unified exchange rate.

Central bank data on Monday showed the official rate at 13,065. That compares to a rate of around 47 to the dollar in March 2011 - as civil war engulfed the country, LSEG data showed.

FX tracking website from Karam Shaar Advisory showed that black market rates soared to 22,000 around Assad's fall, but on Monday stood at 12,800. The new government appointed Maysaa Sabrine as governor of the central bank on Sunday - the first woman at the helm in its more than 70-year history.

The new rulers are working to determine what is left in state coffers. Caretaker Prime Minister Mohammad al-Bashir said FX reserves were very low. Sources told Reuters there are roughly \$200mn left

in central bank vaults, plus 26 tonnes of gold, worth \$2.2bn at current $\,$ market prices. That is significantly below the \$18.5bn in reserves estimated by the IMF in 2010 and the three months' import-cover deemed a minimum safe threshold.

Western governments have frozen hundreds of millions of dollars in Syrian assets since the war began, but the exact size and location of these are unclear. Switzerland's government said some 99mn Swiss francs (\$112mn) worth of frozen Syrian assets are currently in the country. The Syria Report newsletter estimated in April that £163.2mn (\$205.76mn) of frozen assets were in the UK.

Despite the central bank sanctions, Western governments allowed Syria to use frozen funds for humanitarian purposes, such as medicine and food. The new government has said it expects to retrieve up to \$400mn in frozen assets abroad to help fund some reforms, including

salary increases of 400% for some public sector employees next month. Dwindling oil and tourism revenues decimated Syria's exports from \$18.4bn in 2010 to \$1.8bn in 2021, according to the World Bank. Imports also fell, but by a smaller margin - from \$22.7bn to \$6.5bn due to reliance on imported fuel and food.

The widening gap pressured government finances, prompting it to pay for some imports with illicit cash from sales of an addictive amphetamine-like stimulant commonly known as captagon, or from fuel smuggling, experts said.

Captagon production has become the most valuable economic sector, according to the World Bank, which estimates the total market value of the drug originating from Syria as high as \$5.6bn.

In 2010, Syria exported 380,000 barrels per day (bpd) of oil. This source of hard-currency revenue evaporated after the conflict began in 2011. Various factions - including Islamic State and Kurdish fighters - seized oilfields, while the latter signed deals with US companies. Sanctions made legitimate exports difficult.

The loss left Syria reliant on energy imports - mostly from allies Russia and Iran. Rachel Ziemba, senior adviser on sanctions with risk consultancy Horizon Engage, said the roughly 1-3mn barrels of fuel per month Syria had been getting from Iran stopped in late December as

She added that lack of access to global banking, due to sanctions and the designation of leading rebel group Hayat Tahrir al-Sham (HTS) as a terrorist organisation, complicates commercial fuel purchases.

Conflict and drought reduced the number of farmers, damaged irrigation and cut access to seeds and fertilisers. Agricultural production sank to record lows in 2021 and 2022, with wheat alone falling to a quarter of the around 4mn tonnes per year pre-war. Syria imported around 1mn tonnes of cereal annually from Russia, but flows stopped after the new rulers took control. Ukraine has signalled willingness to supply, but it is unclear how Syria could pay.

No penalties for UK firms that used deadly building material

hen the deadly Grenfell Tower blaze in 2017 led to revelations that high-rise public housing buildings across Britain were wrapped in flammable cladding, the government vowed the building contractors responsible would pay for their negligence.

Seven years on, contractors who fitted cladding panels that didn't meet fire-safety standards in place when installed have largely escaped financial liability, according to a Reuters review of more than 100 buildings.

Cladding is a skin of insulating materials applied to the walls of a new or existing building to improve its thermal performance. The Grenfell Tower blaze, which killed 72 people, raised public awareness that thousands of buildings in the UK were clad in flammable materials.

To quickly tackle the problem, the British government put up much of the money to allow the replacement of flammable cladding on subsidised public housing. Then, to recoup the taxpayer money spent, the housing ministry said it would work with the buildings' own encourage legal claims against contractors who installed defective cladding.

Under UK law, the owner of a property that has been refurbished in a way that doesn't meet building regulations in place at the time, can sue the contractors and designers responsible, and in some cases the manufacturer of the materials used, for the costs of remediation.

The Reuters review identified 103 public housing buildings, owned by 26 local councils and not-for-profit housing associations, which had cladding of a type deemed to be noncompliant by the government, the courts or the public inquiry into the Grenfell fire.

Only five of the 26 owners - responsible for 25 of the 103 buildings - said they had sought some compensation from the companies that installed their flammable cladding. Three were successful in recovering some money while two are still in mediation with contractors in cases that haven't reached court. The total money recovered comprised just 13% of the over £260mn (\$325mn) it cost to reclad the 103 buildings, Reuters found.

Four lawyers who have represented both building owners and contractors in post-Grenfell cladding cases told Reuters that the rules of the funds the government created to disburse money for remediation inadvertently created disincentives to sue errant builders. If public housing bodies win litigation against contractors. the proceeds must be given to the government, under the rules, while the legal costs of a losing

battle have to be shouldered alone. The National Housing Federation, which represents social housing bodies across Britain, said the government could have increased the number of claims by covering litigation costs and providing legal guidance.


Reuters found no evidence of a deliberate plan by the government to discourage compensation

Still, the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government said its national recladding scheme prioritised rapid removal of dangerous cladding over the recovery of costs from contractors. It declined to comment on the criticism that its rules disincentivised lawsuits against those responsible or answer questions about the level of claims against construction firms. It also didn't comment on whether it would amend the rules of its cladding schemes to facilitate more claims to help recoup taxpayer funds. The Reuters analysis is the first broad review of the extent to which contractors have contributed to the recladding of public housing buildings to which they attached non-compliant cladding, and reveals how few cases have been brought against contractors.

Giles Grover, co-lead of the End Our Cladding Scandal campaign, which comprises groups representing tenants affected by the national crisis, said the low number of compensation claims identified by Reuters came as a disappointment.

"It's frustrating that contractors have not paid to fix these blocks, despite all the promises from the government that it would make them pay," he added.

The Grenfell disaster in Kensington killed dozens of residents when the building's plasticfilled exterior panels turned a small fire in one apartment into an inferno that consumed the 24-storey high rise in West London.

The government said in 2017 the panels used did not comply with the regulations in place when installed. The official inquiry, which published its final report in September, agreed and noted that none of the companies responsible even argued that the cladding met the regulatory requirements. After the fire, inspections by local councils and housing associations, which provide subsidized housing to lower-income families, found that similar panels, and other forms of cladding that didn't meet fire regulations, had been installed on buildings across the country.

Over 700 public housing buildings had their cladding replaced following the Grenfell disaster, while about 1,800 still need to be made safe, the government's spending watchdog said in November. The total cost of remediation will exceed 4 billion pounds, according to government figures.

The watchdog noted that as the public housing owners don't have the cash available, the government may be on the hook for the bill.

The alternative to public money being used to pay for the remediation is for the owners to sue the building contractors, designers or manufacturers responsible for the original cladding, said Chris Leadbetter, a lawyer at Clyde & Co which has defended building contractors in dozens of cladding cases

Reuters identified buildings in need of recladding using council statements, media reports, social media posts and other sources. Reuters then established whether the original cladding was compliant when installed using statutory financial accounts, satellite imagery, planning documents, freedom of information requests, minutes of local council meetings and discussions with dozens of lawyers, housing groups and local councils.

Suzannah Nichol, chief executive of Build UK, which represents building companies, said the industry accepted that non-compliant cladding should not have been installed but said contractors did not have the financial strength to cover all the costs of remediation alone. She said others including designers and product manufacturers were partly to blame and so, should share the financial burden.

"I don't think any business is going to step up and pay for something if it's not confident that it's accountable," she added.

Construction firms responsible for the non-compliant cladding identified by Reuters, on the 103 public housing buildings reviewed, included British-based companies Willmott Dixon and Alumet, Paris-listed Bouygues SA and United Living, which is owned by US private equity group Apollo. Willmott Dixon, Bouygues and Apollo declined to comment on cladding contracts while Alumet didn't respond to queries.

Most public housing providers declined to outline their reasons for pursuing or not pursuing cases.

But the rules of the cladding remediation funds the government set up following the Grenfell disaster offer an answer, according to the National Housing Federation and lawyers interviewed.

The government established the first of its funds in 2018 to ensure cash-strapped public housing owners could make their buil fast as possible. The government said it expected fund recipients to pursue reasonable cases against contractors and repay the government with any compensation received.

The oldest fund, created in 2018, has so far handed out 300 million pounds of taxpayer money to councils and housing associations, official data show. This fund has received less than a million pounds back as a result of compensation claims, according to a Freedom of Information request.

In one case, Sheffield Council decided against suing London-listed Morgan Sindall, which the council said installed non-compliant polyethylene core panels - like the ones used at Grenfell - on its Hanover Tower building.

The council said in a 2020 report that there might be "a public interest" in establishing the facts in court, but that since the government had already covered the costs of recladding, spending money on what would likely be expensive litigation was not in council taxpayers' interests.

Eric Johnstone, legal director at Brodies solicitors in Edinburgh, said the fact the government didn't fund litigation but wanted to collect the proceeds of any litigation created a "huge disincentive" for social housing providers to sue.

Morgan Sindall told Reuters it didn't believe it had any liability regarding Hanover Tower, without elaborating. Sheffield declined to comment on the case.

Just three of the 26 building owners reviewed by Reuters said they had actually received compensation from contractors in respect of cladding claims. The first, Newport City Homes Housing Association in south Wales, initiated its claim before the government established its first cladding fund. Newport City Homes sought the cost of making three buildings safe from building contractor Wates Group, which had installed polyethylene core panels as part of a 2013 refurbishment. The housing association received a 4-million-pound settlement from Wates without even going to court, its accounts show. Wates said it did not knowingly install non-compliant products. It declined to answer questions about Newport or any of the 23 other high rise buildings where Reuters found the company installed polyethylenecore cladding panels.

John Cawthorne, a former firefighter who has lived in Hanover Tower in Sheffield for 33 years, told Reuters he was furious that builders who installed non-compliant cladding on blocks like his across the country weren't being held to account. Cawthorne said tenants were haunted by the fact that they could have died as easily as the victims of Grenfell.

"I live on the 15th floor of this building. I'm right on top," the 68-year-old said. "The same thing could have happened here. There's no question about that. We could have all died." - Reuters

Greenland independence possible but joining US unlikely, asserts Denmark

reenland may become independent if its residents want, but is unlikely to become a US state, Denmark's foreign minister said yesterday after US President-elect Donald Trump refused to rule out force to take control of the Arctic island.

Greenland's leader met with the Danish king in Copenhagen, a day after Trump's remarks thrust the fate of the mineral-rich and strategically important island, which is under Danish rule, to the top of world headlines.

Trump, who takes office on January 20, said on Tuesday he would not rule out using military or economic action to make Greenland part of the United States. The same day, Trump's eldest son, Donald Trump Jr, made a private visit to

Greenland, part of Nato through the membership of Denmark, has strategic significance for the US military and for its ballistic missile early-warning system since the shortest route from Europe to North America runs via the Arctic island.

president-elect has in-The dicated he would pursue a more combative foreign policy that disregards traditional diplomatic for-

Greenland, the world's biggest island, has been part of Denmark for 600 years although its 57,000 people now govern their own domestic affairs. The island's government led by Prime Minister Mute Egede aims for eventual independ-

"We fully recognise that Greenland has its own ambitions. If they materialise. Greenland will become independent, though hardly with an ambition to become a federal state in the United States," Danish foreign minister Lars Lokke Rasmussen said.

He told reporters the United States' heightened security concerns in the Arctic were legitimate following increased Russian and Chinese activity in the region.

"I don't think that we're in a foreign policy crisis," he said. "We are open to a dialogue with the Americans on how we can possibly cooperate even more closely than we

do to ensure that the American am-

bitions are fulfilled." Still, although Denmark itself played down the seriousness of Trump's threat to its territory, the returning president's openly stated ambition to expand US borders has jolted European allies less than two weeks before he takes office.

France's foreign minister, Jean-Noel Barrot, said Europe would not let other nations attack its sovereign borders, although he did not believe the US would invade.

German Chancellor Olaf Scholz expressed surprise at Trump's comments about Greenland and Canada, underlining that European partners unanimously uphold the inviolability of borders.

Greenland's relations with Denmark have lately been strained by allegations of mistreatment of Greenlanders. Egede has said the island is not for sale, while in his New Year speech he stepped up his push for independence. Denmark says the territory's fate can be decided only by Greenlanders.

Greenland's Finance Minister Erik Jensen repeated that Greenland is not for sale. "Our wish is to become independent one day. But

our ambition is not to go from being governed by one country to an-

Danish Prime Minister Mette Frederiksen said on Tuesday she could not imagine Trump's ambitions would lead to US military intervention in Greenland. Denmark's military capabilities there are limited to four inspection vessels, a Challenger surveillance plane and dog sled patrols.

Responding to Trump's threat of tariffs against Denmark, which according to analysts at Danske Bank could potentially be "quite harmful to Danish companies, Frederiksen said she did not think a trade war with the United States was a good way forward.

Denmark is home to Novo Nordisk, Europe's most valuable company, which makes weight-loss drug Wegovy that has become hugely popular in the United States, the Nordic country's biggest trading partner. The Danish royal palace gave no details of King Frederik's meeting with Greenland's Egede.

While many Greenlanders dream of independence from Denmark, the king remains popular on the island, having spent extended periods there, including a four-month expedition on the ice sheet. Last month, the royal court modified its coat of arms, enlarging a polar bear that symbolises Greenland.

"He's popular in Greenland. So he can clearly be helpful to the Danish-Greenlandic relationship." Damien Degeorges, a Reykjavikbased consultant specialising in Greenland, told Reuters.

Trump already raised the issue of the US taking over Greenland during his first presidency, but his latest remarks still left many Danes

"I find it extremely ridiculous," said Jeppe Finne Sorenson, a data engineer in the Danish capital. "We have an alliance, we're allies. So this doesn't really respect that."

Blinken dismisses Trump bombast in swan song

Signing off as America's top diplomat, Antony Blinken was feted vesterday by ally France – and forced to brush aside bombastic remarks by incoming president Donald Trump.

Blinken, on a farewell tour less than two weeks before Trump takes office, visited Paris where President Emmanuel Macron was presenting him with the Legion of Honor, France's highest order of merit. "I would like to tell you that you show the face of the America that we love," French Foreign Minister Jean-Noel Barrot told Blinken before the ceremony. But as Blinken looked to highlight President Joe Biden's efforts to nurture alliances, the secretary of state was asked to address threats by Trump against Greenland.

The president-elect has made clear his designs on oil-rich and strategically placed Greenland, an autonomous territory of European Union member Denmark, and refused to rule out military action. Asked about the remarks at a news conference with Barrot, Blinken, without using Trump's name, said: "The idea expressed about Greenland is obviously not a good one, but maybe more important, it's obviously one that's not going to happen."

"So we probably shouldn't waste a lot of time talking about it," Blinken said. Blinken, a longtime Democratic Party policymaker and aide to Biden who generally has steered clear of electoral politics, also played down statements by Elon Musk, the technology entrepreneur joined at the hip with Trump for months.

The South African-born billionaire, who has been tasked by Trump with an initiative to curb government spending, has rattled European politicians by championing the far right in Germany and Britain. "Private citizens in our country can say what they want," Blinken said. "He, like any American, has the right to express his views."

Mexico president trolls Trump in history lesson: Mexican America 'sounds nice'

Mexico President Claudia Sheinbaum yesterday suggested North America including the United States could be renamed "Mexican America" - an historic name used on an early map of the region - in response to US President-elect Donald Trump's pledge to rename the Gulf of Mexico the "Gulf of America".

"Mexican America, that sounds nice," Sheinbaum joked, pointing at the map from 1607 showing an early portrayal of North America.

The president, who has jousted with Trump in recent weeks, used her daily press conference to give a history lesson, flanked by old maps and former culture minister Jose Alfonso Suarez del

"The fact is that Mexican America is recognised since the 17th century... as the name for the whole northern part of the (American) continent," Suarez del Real said, demonstrating the area on the map.

On the Gulf of Mexico, Suarez del Real said the name was internationally recognised and used as a maritime navigational reference going back

Trump floated the renaming of the body of water which stretches from Florida to Mexico's Cancun in a Tuesday press conference in which he presented a broad expansionist agenda including the possibility of taking control of the Panama Canal and Greenland.

Sheinbaum also said it was not true that Mexico was "run by the cartels" as Trump said. "In Mexico, the people are in charge," she said, adding "we are addressing the security problem.'

Despite the back and forth, Sheinbaum reiterated that she expected the two countries to have a positive relationship.

"I think there will be a good relationship," she said. "President Trump has his way of communicating."

Political chess or true beliefs? Zuckerberg's surprise Trump pivot

he clean cut hair has grown, his college kid's hoodie is now a gold chain, and his

politics have swerved hard right. Mark Zuckerberg, the boss of Facebook and Instagram, on Tuesday accused governments and so-called legacy media of pushing censorship, and vowed to take his world-dominating platforms back to their "roots."

"We're restoring free expression on our platforms," he asserted in a video posted on his social networks on Tuesday, in which he announces the end of fact-checking in the US.

The out-of-the blue pivot to Trumpian talking points has perplexed many of Zuckerberg's closest watchers, but the tech pioneer's sudden alignment with the right wing is not the first time he has moved to preserve his dominance of social media.

And it also might reflect a position that is closer to his political instincts. Since the earliest days of Facebook, Zuckerberg has always been eager to move unencumbered when it comes to advancing the interests of Facebook, Instagram, WhatsApp and now Threads.

From the outset Zuckerberg has surrounded himself with Silicon Valley's libertarian voices, including long-time advisors Peter Thiel and Marc Andreessen, the latter being Meta's longest-serving board member.

But the success of Facebook as it grew from a college networking site to the world's primary communication platform quickly brought scandal and forced Zuckerberg to act to fend off government inter-

Fact-checking and tighter content controls, which Zuckerberg said he was "getting rid of" on Tuesday, were born of such scandals. After the 2016 US presidential election, widespread criticism about misinformation on the platform, particularly regarding foreign interference and viral false stories, prompted Facebook to implement a fact-checking program.

"The bottom line is: we take misinformation seriously," Zuckerberg wrote at the time. This initiative represented a

significant shift in Facebook's approach to content moderation, which had always been an afterthought, or even a source of scorn, for the disruptors of Silicon Valley.

The subsequent Cambridge Analytica scandal in the late 2010s, which revealed the unauthorized harvesting of millions of Facebook users' personal data, further intensified scrutiny and resulted in Zuckerberg's being hauled before Congress and a beefing up of Facebook content policies.

Since then, Zuckerberg has demonstrated increasing political acumen, managing to avoid significant US government regulation while appearing co-operative with politicians and contrite with an angry public.

And despite the bad headlines, usership of the sites platforms has only increased over the years.

To some Tuesday's shock announcement is still a play to keep the government at bay, except this time the political tide has turned to Trump, who has made repeated threats against Zuckerberg, accusing him of being too supportive of liberal causes.

"This is a case of kissing the ring," said tech analyst Carolina Milanesi. "He's doing what it takes

to make sure that Trump is going to leave him alone."

A more surprising turn is that his pivot rightwards puts Zuckerberg in line with Elon Musk, who has become a close associate of Trump but is a rival to Zuckerberg.

Quite recently, the two men pledged to fight each other in a mixed martial arts cage fight, as their chest-beating rivalry veered into the ridiculous.

"There is kind of this huge, technocratic billionaire meeting of the minds with Trump and the right, and this buying into this idea of censorship," Kate Klonick, Associate Professor of Law at St. John's University Law School, told a Lawfare panel.

Others suggest that Zuckerberg is afraid Musk will get Trump all to himself.

"There's potentially a bit of billionaire jealousy," said Andrew Selepak, media professor at the University of Florida. The stakes are huge, especially as Zuckerberg competes with Musk and other tech giants in advancing artificial intelligence.

But for Selepak, Zuckerberg "seems more sincere" when it comes to Tuesday's U-turn.

"It looks like he's making a political shift, a bit like Musk," who had previously supported Democrats, mainly out of concern about climate change.

Movie, TV stars flee homes as LA wildfires burn

Film and television stars including Jamie Lee Curtis, Mandy Moore and James Woods were among those forced to evacuate and left wondering whether their homes survived the out-ofcontrol wildfires burning around Los Angeles. The day after Woods evacuated his house in Pacific Palisades, an affluent neighbourhood that sits between

the beach towns of Santa Monica and Malibu, he described the scene as an "inferno" where "every house around us was on fire." "We were literally in the exact epicentre of the fire as it started," Woods, an award-winning actor known for roles in Salvador, Ghosts of Mississippi and Any Given Sunday, said on CNN yesterday. "There was so much chaos. It was like an inferno." Strong, dry

winds have fanned the blaze burning around Pacific Palisades, and the area's narrow, winding streets combined with the rush of thousands of people ordered to evacuate have created long delays and traffic jams for those trying to escape the wildfire. Some evacuees abandoned their

cars on Tuesday. Among those caught in the traffic was actor Eugene Levy of the television series Schitt's Creek. "I couldn't see any flames but the

smoke was very dark," he told the Los Angeles Times. Mandy Moore, known for her role in the television series This is Us,

posted on Instagram that she and her family had evacuated because of the proximity of the flames. "So gutted for the destruction and loss," she said. "Don't know if our

place made it." Reality TV stars Spencer Pratt and Heidi Montag lost their Pacific Palisades home in the wildfire, according to TMZ. which added that the couple was able to safely evacuate with their children earlier in the day. Pratt shared a video on Instagram earlier in the day of a plane dropping water on a mountainside engulfed with smoke. Pacific Palisades, dotted with palatial hillside estates, is bordered by the Pacific Ocean and buffeted by the Santa Monica Mountains. With its median home price of

\$4.5mn, it is home to many film and music stars as well as the Getty Villa, one of the most popular museums in Los Angeles. Several other fires - along with the Palisades blaze - are burning around the city.


