

Glimpses of Amir's visit to Oman











Qatar, Oman strengthen ties, issue joint communique on occasion of Amir's visit

atar and Oman issued a joint communique yesterday on the occasion of the state visit of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani to Oman. Based on the deep-rooted historical ties between Qatar and Oman, and the close fraternal bonds between His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani and HM Sultan Haitham bin Tariq of Oman, the two countries enhanced bilate eral relations. His Highness headed a high-level delegation during the two-day on Jan 28-29, 2025.

The two sides held extensive bilateral talks and reviewed the progress of joint action and co-operation reflecting the depth of existing ties. The two leaders lauded the growth of relations and mutual interests and stressed the impor-

tance of expanding vistas of cooperation and economic partnership by exploring and developing more opportunities, and encouraging the public and private sectors to diversify areas of economic and investment partnership in a manner that meets the aspirations of the two countries peoples.

The visit saw the signing of a number of memorandums of understanding (MoUs) and executive programmes covering various areas of interest to both sides across a broad range of sectors and domains of partnership. The two sides hailed the success of tasks of the Qatari-Omani Joint Committee and praised its active role in enhancing bilateral co-operation and implementing joint projects that serve the interests of the two countries. They also stressed the

need to press ahead with the committee's efforts to develop new areas of partnership towards the realisation of their common aspirations, including economic and investment initiatives to be undertaken by their respective public and private sectors

and private sectors. The two leaders discussed the progress of the Gulf Co-operation Council (GCC) and the outstanding accomplishments made in terms of joint GCC action, and more cohesion, co-operation and integration among member states in the interest of their peoples. The two sides also discussed a number of regional and international issues and developments of common concern. In this respect, they stressed the importance of settling conflicts and disputes by peaceful means. They underlined the need to enhance dialogue and international cooperation to support efforts aimed at achieving security and stability in the region and the world at large.

The two sides laid emphasis on consolidating consultation intensifying coordination of their stances in a manner that serves their common interests and strengthens the pillars of stability, security and prosperity for all peoples of the region and the world as a whole. The two sides expressed the hope that the two parties to the conflict in Gaza would commit themselves to fully implement the terms of the agreement reached on the exchange of detainees and prisoners. This, they observed, would pave the way for achieving a just and comprehensive peace in the region, and ultimately lead to a permanent ceasefire between the two parties. They also stressed the importance of collaboration of regional and international efforts to ensure the flow of humanitarian aid to the Gaza Strip and contribute to its reconstruction.

The Omani side commended the role of Qatar and its efforts that contributed to reaching this important agreement as part of Oatar's mediation shared with Egypt and the US. It also applauded the Qatari role in achieving a return to sustainable calm in the region. The two sides stressed the significance of respecting the sovereignty, independence and territorial integrity of the Syria. They called for backing all efforts and endeavours aimed to reach a comprehensive and inclusive transitional process that would realise the Syrian

peoples aspirations for stability, development and decent life. They reiterated that Syria's security and stability constitute a fundamental pillar of stability in the region.

The two sides welcomed the steps taken to ensure the safety of civilians, ending the bloodshed, achieve the national interests and safeguard the Syrian states institutions and capabilities. At the conclusion of the visit, His Highness the Amir expressed his sincere thanks and appreciation to HM Sultan Haitham for the warm welcome and hospitality accorded to him and his accompanying delegation. Reciprocally, HM Sultan Haitham expressed his best wishes of continued health and well-being to the Amir. He wished Qatar and the Qatari people further progress and prosperity. (QNA)



common challenges, supporting rapprochement between peoples, promoting dialogue between cultures, and rejecting hate speech. During the session, the two sides also discussed ways to enhance partnership in facing global challenges such as climate change, food security, the use of artificial intelligence, and legislation related to

Cabinet reviews workforce planning in govt agencies

E the Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman bin Jassim al-Thani chaired the Cabinet's weekly meeting at the Amiri Diwan yes-

After the meeting, HE the Minister of Justice and Minister of State for Cabinet Affairs Ibrahim bin Ali al-Mohannadi issued the following statement: The Cabinet considered the topics on its agenda, where it took note of the Shura Council's approval of a draft law on extending the port management concession granted to the Qatar Ports Management Company pursuant to Decree Law No 17 of 2009.

The Cabinet also took note of the implementation of the strategic planning program for the workforce in government agencies, which was prepared by the Civil Service and Government Development Bureau. This programme

is based on three basic objectives. which are: establishing a unified approach to workforce planning in all government agencies, identifying opportunities to raise the efficiency of workforce utilisation through data-based analysis, and applying an evidence-based approach to identifying and forecasting workforce needs over a fiveyear period.

The preparation and implementation of this programme comes within the framework of working to achieve the goals of the Third National Development Strategy 2024-2030.

The Cabinet decided to approve the proposal for the Police College to join the Interpol Global Academy Network, and a draft memorandum of understanding for co-operation in the field of nuclear safety and radiation protection between Qatar's Ministry of Environment and



Climate Change and Saudi Arabia's Nuclear and Radiological Regulatory Commission.

They also approved a draft memorandum of understanding to enhance co-operation in cybersecurity between Qatar's National Cybersecurity Agency and Kuwait's National Cybersecurity Centre, a draft MoU for twinning between the Doha Municipality and the Muscat Municipality, and a draft MoU for co-operation in the field of justice and law between the minis-

tries of justice in Qatar and Egypt.

Other approved draft memorandums of understanding in the field of technical, vocational and technical training and education between the governments of Qatar and Algeria; for co-operation

in the field of labour between the ministries of labour in Oatar and and Vietnam; for co-operation in legal fields between the governments of Qatar and Rwanda, and a draft supplementary agreement to a basic agreement between the government of Qatar and the UN Children's Fund.

The Cabinet concluded its meeting by reviewing three reports and taking the appropriate decisions regarding them. They included the work of the National Committee for the Prohibition of Weapons for the period of 09/01 to 12/31/2024, a report on the results of the participation of HE the Minister of Environment and Climate Change in the ministerial meeting of the Green Middle East Initiative, and a report on the results of the participation of HE the Minister of Justice in the 34th meeting of Ministers of Justice of GCC countries.





The ministry, in collaboration with Skyline Automotive, announced the recall of Hyundai Santa Fe, Equus, and Veracruz models manufactured between 2009 and 2014 as an electrical short circuit in the HECU module may rarely occur, and could increase

the risk of an engine compartment fire. The ministry, in collaboration with Doha Marketing Services Company (Domasco), also announced the recall of Honda City, Civic, Accord, CR-V, Pilot, Odyssey, and Jazz models manufactured between 2017 and 2020 as the fuel pump might fail, and result in sudden stop of the car and lead to accidents.

This initiative is part of the ministry's continuous efforts to ensure vehicle distributors comply with monitoring and repairing vehicle defects to protect consumer rights.

The ministry has confirmed that it will co-ordinate with the company's authorised distributor to oversee maintenance and repair operations and to communicate with customers to ensure the necessary corrective measures are implemented for the affected vehicles.

Hospital in Jordan offers injured Gazans hope for recovery

aram Nawjaa, 17, was so badly injured when an Israeli strike hit his home in Gaza nearly a year ago that his own cousin, pulling him from the rubble, did not recognise him.

After rushing Karam to hospital he returned to continue searching for his cousin all night in the rub-

In that strike on Feb 14, 2024, Karam lost his mother, a sister and two brothers. As well as receiving serious burns to his face and body, he lost the ability to use his arms and hands.

Now, the burns are largely healed and he is slowly regaining the use of his limbs after months of treatment at a hospital run by Doctors Without Borders (MSF) in the Jordanian capital Amman which operates a programme of reconstructive surgery.

"I only remember that on that day, February 14, there was a knock on our door... I opened it, my brother came in, and after that... (I remember) nothing," he

"Before the war I was studying, and thank God, I was an outstanding student," Karam said, adding that his dream had been to become a dentist. Now he does not think about the future.

"What happened, happened... you feel that all your ambitions

have been shattered, that what happened to you has destroyed you." Karam is one of many patients from Gaza being treated at Amman's Specialised Hospital for Reconstructive Surgery, Al-Mowasah Hospital. He shares a room there with his younger sister and

"All these patients are war victims... with complex injuries, complex burns... They need very long rehabilitation services, both surgical but also physical and mental," said Moeen Mahmood Shaief, head of the MSF mission in Jordan.

"The stories around those patients are heartbreaking, a lot of them have lost their families" and require huge support to be reintegrated into normal life, he added.

Israel's 15-month offensive in Gaza has killed almost 47,000 Palestinians, according to Hamas-run Health Ministry figures, and left the coastal enclave a wasteland of rubble that will take years to rebuild. Most of the population was displaced.

The campaign was launched after Hamas fighters stormed southern Israel in October 2023. Displaced Palestinians have been returning to their mostly destroyed homes this week after a ceasefire came into effect on January 19.

UNRWA Lebanon says not impacted by US aid freeze or new Israeli law

The director of the United Nations agency for Palestinian refugees in Lebanon said yesterday that the agency had not been affected by US President Donald Trump's halt to US foreign aid funding or by an Israeli ban on its operations.

"UNRWA currently is not receiving any US funding so there is no direct impact of the more recent decisions related to the UN system for UNRWA," Dorothee Klaus told reporters at UNRWA's field office in Leba-

US funding to UNRWA was suspended last year un-

til March 2025 under a deal reached by US lawmakers and after Israel accused 12 of the agency's 13,000 employees in Gaza of participating in the Oct 2023,

Hamas storming of Israel that triggered the Gaza war. The UN has said it had fired nine UNRWA staff who may have been involved and said it would investigate all accusations made.

Klaus said that UNRWA Lebanon had also placed four staff members on administrative leave as it investigated allegations they had breached the UN principle of neutrality.

One UNRWA teacher had already been suspended last year and a Hamas commander in Lebanon - killed in September in an Israeli strike - was found to have had an UNRWA job.

Plane crash in South Sudan kills 20 oil workers

Bipal gave no more details on the circumstances. Media reports had initially put the death toll at 18 but Bipal told Reuters two survivors had later died. One person survived.

Several air crashes have occurred in war-torn South Sudan in recent years. In September 2018, at least 19 people died when a small aircraft carrying passengers from Juba to the city of Yirol crashed.

In 2015, dozens of people were killed when a Russian-built cargo plane with passengers on board crashed after taking off from Juba airport.

Joy turns to despair as Gaza returnees struggle to settle in enclave's north

The joy of thousands of Palestinian families who made it back home in north Gaza after a ceasefire with Israel is turning to despair as the cold reality of uninhabitable, bombed-out homes and dire shortages of basic supplies sets

Many have begun complaining about a lack of running water that forces them to queue for hours to fill plastic containers for drinking or cleaning. With most homes now heaps of rubble as far as the eye can see, returnees have scoured whatever useful items remain from their property to erect makeshift tents

At night, residential districts laid to waste by Israeli airstrikes and shelling sink into darkness for lack of electricity or fuel to operate standby generators.

"There is nothing, no life, no water, no food, no drink, nothing for living. Life is very, very hard. There is no Jabalia camp," said Hisham El-Err, standing next to the rubble of his multi-storey house in the biggest and mostly densely populated of the Gaza Strip's eight historic cinderblock refugee camps.

His extended family is now huddling in tents, which offer scant protection from Gaza's mid-winter chill.

By late on Tuesday, Gaza's Hamas authorities said most of the 650,000 people displaced from the north by the war had reentered Gaza City and the north edge of the enclave from areas to the south where fighting was less intense and destructive.

Many of those returning, often laden with what personal possessions they still had after months of being shunted around as battlegrounds shifted, had trekked 20km or more along the coastal highway.

Fahad Abu Jalhoum returned with his family to Jabalia from the Al Mawasi area in south Gaza but the destruction they found was so pervasive they had been forced to go back south.

"It's just ghosts without souls

(in the north)," Abu Jalhoum told Reuters back in Al Mawasi. "We all missed the north but when I went there I was shocked. So I returned to (the south) until we get relief from God."

A Hamas official who spoke on condition of anonymity said smaller amounts of fuel, cooking gas and tents had been brought into Gaza than what had agreed in ceasefire negotiations.

The Hamas-run Gaza government media office put the initial need of tents at 135,000, but the Hamas official said only around 2,000 had got in since the deal took effect on Jan 19.

He also said work to rehabilitate hospitals and bakeries knocked out by the fighting had not begun, contrary to the deal.

"All of this has led to dissatisfaction within the (Palestinian) resistance and may affect the smooth implementation of the agreement," he told Reuters, declining to elaborate. "We urge the mediators and guarantors to make the utmost effort to fulfil the terms of the agreement."

Officials in Israel, which controls all entry points into Gaza, did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

Residents cautiously started venturing from their homes yesterday as calm returned to the provincial capital of one million people wedged between Lake Kivu and the Rwandan border.

"Today we are not afraid," Goma resident Jean de Dieu told AFP by telephone. "There is hunger in Goma. We have to go get water from the lake and we have no medicine," another resident Kahindo Sifa said. Despite international pressure

to end the crisis, Congolese President Felix Tshisekedi declined to attend talks with his Rwandan counterpart Paul Kagame yester-

However, Tshisekedi is scheduled to speak publicly for the first time since the crisis began.

Angola, which mediated talks that fell through last month, called for the Congolese and Rwandan leaders to urgently meet in Luanda.

The Democratic Republic of Congo has called on the world to stop the advance in its mineralrich east, which has been wracked by decades of conflict that can be partly traced back to the 1994 Rwandan genocide.

Lebanon media reports Israeli strike in south

Lebanese official media said an

Israeli strike hit south Lebanon yesterday, the second consecutive day to see such a raid despite a fragile ceasefire between Israel and Hezbollah, AFP reported from Beirut. "An enemy drone" carried out a strike targeting a house that "had been destroyed in a previous raid" in south Lebanon's Yohmor al-Shageef, the National News Agency said. The report came a day after Lebanon's health ministry said Israeli strikes on the southern town of Nabatiyeh al-Fawqa wounded 20 people, while another on the neighbouring town of Zawtar wounded four. Israeli military spokesman Avichay Adraee had confirmed Tuesday's strikes, saying they targeted Hezbollah vehicles transferring weapons in south Lebanon. The November 27 truce in Lebanon came after more than a year of hostilities between Israel and Hezbollah.

Britain backs third Heathrow runway in growth takeoff bid

London

ritain's Labour government yesterday backed building a third runway at London's busy Heathrow airport, with finance minister Rachel Reeves saying it would help grow the economy while respecting climate goals.

"I can confirm today that this government supports a third runway at Heathrow and is inviting proposals to be brought forward by the summer," Reeves said in a speech, adding a new airstrip "would unlock growth". Despite opposition from environmentalists, the London mayor and some Labour MPs, Prime Minister Keir Starmer is determined to deliver major infrastructure projects to grow a UK economy that has struggled to take off since the party came to power in July.

Writing in The Times newspaper, Starmer said the government would "kick down the barriers to building, clear out the regulatory weeds and allow a new era of British growth to bloom'

Heathrow, Europe's busiest airport by passenger numbers, welcomed a record 83.9mn travellers last year with the global aviation sector having recovered from the turbulent Covid years. "A third runway and the infrastructure that comes with it would unlock billions of pounds of private money to stimulate the UK supply chain during construction," Heathrow chief executive Thomas Woldbye

Following years of legal wrangling, Britain's Supreme Court ruled at the end of 2020 that Heathrow could build a third runway, overturning a legal decision to block construction on environmental grounds. While the Conservative

'Very sad' west Londoners oppose airport expansion

In the historic west London village of Harmondsworth, Justine Bayley pointed to where Heathrow Airport's new boundary would likely sit once a third runway is built just yards from her home.

"I'd need to put my ear defenders on every time I opened the front door," said the 74-yearold, her neat garden dotted with green signs that read "Stop Heathrow Expansion". Harmondsworth – about an hour's train ride from central London - has a quintessential English village feel, with its 12th-century church, grocery store, green and two pubs. But this 1,500-strong community and the neighbouring hamlet of Longford face an uncertain future after UK finance minister Rachel Reeves announced vesterday that the government backs a new runway at Heathrow. Prime Minister Keir Starmer's Labour government hopes extending capacity at Europe's busiest airport will help spur muchneeded economic growth for the country. Previous plans for extending the site have proposed bulldozing several hundred homes across the twin villages, which date back to the Anglo-Saxon period. "It's disruptive," said Jennion, who like many people in the area has a job related to the airport. "You hear plates rattling in your cupboards and various ornaments on shelves, and doors rattling with the vibrations." He says his home is almost certain to be demolished if the third runway goes ahead and added he would be "very sad" to leave

announcement will finally lead to some certainty after proposals to expand Heathrow have been mooted for the best part of two decades. "I don't want to be having a threat around me anymore," said the father of a teenage child. "I just want to be able to go and, not restart my life, but just continue it somewhere decent." Outside The Five Bells pub, 18-year-old student Fletcher Rodger said he has "mixed feelings" about the plans for runway number three. "If it provides as much economic growth as the government says it's going to then unfortunately I have to say I don't mind too much. "There's always winners and there's always losers," he said. Opposition lawmakers and some analysts have blamed the lack of growth on a decision by Reeves in her inaugural budget to hike taxes.

At least 30 dead in India festival stampede

pre-dawn stampede at the world's largest religious gathering killed at least 30 people in India yesterday, with many more injured after a surging crowd spilled out of a police cordon and trampled bystanders. Deadly crowd incidents are a frequent occurrence at Indian religious festivals, including the Kumbh Mela, which attracts tens of millions of devotees every 12 years to the northern city of Prayagraj.

As pilgrims rushed to participate in a sacred day of ritual bathing, people sleeping and sitting on the ground near the rivers told AFP they were trampled by huge swells of devotees coming towards them in the darkness. "The entire crowd fell on top of me, trampling me as it moved forward," pilgrim Renu Devi, 48, told AFP. "When the crowd surged, elderly people and women were crushed, and no one came forward to help."

Rescue teams carrying victims from the accident site weaved through piles of clothes, shoes and other discarded belongings. Police were seen carrying stretchers bearing the bodies of victims draped with thick blankets. "Thirty devotees have unfortunately died," senior police officer Vaibhav Krishna told reporters during an evening news conference at the festival. "Ninety injured were taken to the hospital." Krishna's briefing came nearly 18 hours after the stampede and was the first official death toll given by authorities. Festivities had otherwise been allowed to continue almost as normal during the day, with millions still trekking to the riverbanks to immerse themselves in the water.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi called the stampede "extremely sad" and offered his "deepest condolences" to relatives of those killed. "I wish for the speedy recovery of all injured," he added.

S Korea airplane fire leaves seven injured

even people sustained mostly minor injuries in Tuesday's airplane fire in South Korea, authorities said yesterday, with local media suggesting the blaze may have been caused by a portable battery stored in the overhead bin. The Air Busan plane, an Airbus A321, was set to fly to Hong Kong from Gimhae International Airport in southeastern Busan but caught fire in the rear section on Tuesday night, according to the country's transport ministry.

A total of 169 passengers and seven flight attendants and staff were evacuated down inflatable slides, it said. Authorities initially reported three injuries but revised the number to seven yesterday. One of them is currently hospitalised, the ministry added.

The accident left nearly half of the fuselage burnt but its wings and engines on both sides remain undamaged, it said, adding that the cause of the fire is currently under investigation. "It is unclear when we will be able to disclose the investigation findings on the cause of last night's fire," the ministry spokesperson told AFP.

Dramatic images and footage from local media on Tuesday night showed the aircraft engulfed in flames, with thick smoke appearing to billow from the interior of the plane. Images from yestrday morning revealed that the upper half of the fuselage was burned away, leaving a huge

While the ministry did not comment on the possible cause of the fire, Yonhap News Agency reported that the blaze began to spread after black smoke emerged from the overhead compartment in the back row.

"It seems that a fire broke out when a passenger's portable battery, stored in the overhead bin as carry-on luggage, became compressed," local daily JoongAng Ilbo reported, citing an unnamed per-

son affiliated with Air Busan. "As the smoke filled the cabin, a passenger seated near the emergency exit opened the door, and the flight attendant opened the opposite one, allowing others to start evacuating," a passenger recounted, as quoted by Yonhap. "It was... chaotic and terrifying."-



Pentagon strips Trump foe of security detail

Defence Secretary Pete Hegseth is removing the security detail for former top US military officer Mark Milley (pictured above) — a foe of President Donald Trump — and suspending his security clearance, the Pentagon said.

The retired general, who reportedly once labelled Trump a "fascist" to a journalist, is the latest official-turned-critic to see their security protection pulled since Trump began his second term last

Hegseth informed Milley "that he is revoking the authorisation for his security detail and suspending his security clearance as well, Pentagon spokesman John Ullyot said in a statement late Tuesday. Milley was named by Trump during his first administration as the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, but their relationship deteriorated sharply.

Milley is believed to be under threat from Tehran for overseeing the 2020 US drone strike ordered by Trump that killed powerful Iranian general Oasem Soleimani. "The secretary may determine

whether it is appropriate to reopen his military grade review determination." Ullvot added. Milley retired as a four-star general, but that process could see him demoted in retirement.

Trump has repeatedly promised "retribution" against his opponents and threatened some with criminal prosecution.

Trump was enraged after Milley told journalist Bob Woodward that the Republican was "fascist to the core" and a "dangerous person." Milley also revealed he had secretly called his Chinese counterpart after the January 6, 2021 attack on the US Capitol by Trump's supporters to reassure Beijing that the United States remained "stable" and had no intention to attack China. Trump subsequently wrote

on his Truth Social network that

"in times gone by, the punishment would have been DEATH!" for Milley. The general stepped down as chairman in 2023 at a ceremony in which he took a final swipe at Trump.

"We don't take an oath to a king, or queen, or a tyrant or a dictator," Milley said of American troops. "And we don't take an oath to a wannabe dictator."

Milley's portrait honouring his service as chairman of the Joint Chiefs was taken down at the Pentagon on the day that Trump was sworn in.

The removal of the painting came after former president Joe Biden preemptively pardoned Milley and other Trump opponents in one of his last acts in office.

Trump has also revoked security from former secretary of state Mike Pompeo and former national security advisor John Bolton, believed to be facing the same threat from Iran.

Bolton has become one of Trump's most outspoken critics since leaving the White House, while Pompeo briefly considered a Republican run for president, reportedly annoying Trump. The president has also removed security protection from Anthony Fauci, who led the country's fight against Covid-19 starting in Trump's first term, and has received death threats over his handling of the pandemic.

Senior Republican senators have urged him to reconsider. But the White House remained defiant over the decision vesterday. with Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt echoing comments from Trump that officials were not entitled to security protection and clearances for life.

"The individuals you're mentioning are quite wealthy, I understand, so they can get their own private security if they wish," she told

Dutch police arrest three after brazen artefact heist

Dutch police yesterday arrested three men in connection with a brazen heist of ancient Romanian artifacts at a museum in northeastern Netherlands after an intensive four-day hunt.

The break-in on Saturday in which the thieves used explosives to get into the Drents Museum in Assen has angered Romania and prompted Dutch police to scramble to track down the culprits.

The treasures were on loan from the National History Museum of Romania in Bucharest and the incident has cost its director his job. "The suspects are held under strict conditions and are being questioned about their role in the heist," Dutch police said in a statement, adding "further arrests are not being excluded."

The stolen artifacts have not yet been recovered, said the Drents Museum. The thieves made off with four important Romanian artifacts including the approximately 2,500-year-old golden Helmet of Cotofenesti, a famous piece from the Dacian civilisation.

Three gold bracelets dating from around 50BC were also taken. The pieces were of "special cultural and symbolic importance" and their disappearance created great anguish in Romania, Bucharest's foreign affairs minister Emil Hurezeanu said.

Dutch police launched a large-scale probe into the heist and earlier yesterday released a photograph of another suspect wanted in connection with the case.

Facing legal challenges, White House revokes spending freeze

resident Donald Trump's administration pulled back a proposed spending freeze that threatened to disrupt hundreds of billions of dollars in aid to US programmes, a White House official said yesterday.

The first major domestic policy reversal of the Republican president's new term came after one federal judge had temporarily blocked the freeze and before another judge was due to hear a separate legal challenge. The proposal had thrown the federal government into chaos and disrupted payments to medical and childcare providers.

Separately, the White House said Trump will target pro-Palestinian student protesters for deportation in a sign that he is broadening his immigration crackdown to include people based on their political views.

The White House said Trump will sign an executive order that would revoke student visas for college students and other noncitizens who took part in anti-Israel protests that roiled college campuses last year.

"We will find you and we will deport you," Trump said in a statement. Trump has been a vocal supporter of Israel during its war with Hamas.

Trump's immigration crackdown until now has focused on deporting migrants who don't

have a legal basis to stay in the United States. This order, if implemented, would target those who are in the country legally.

It was the latest boundarypushing move for a president who has moved quickly to assert power since taking office on January 20. He has halted wide swaths of foreign aid, pardoned supporters who attacked US Capitol police and offered buyouts to thin the ranks of civil-service workers.

Trump also will seek to cut off federal aid to public schools that teach critical race theory - a concept that racial bias is baked into US institutions - White House spokesperson Karoline Leavitt said on Fox News.

Democrats in Congress say Trump has repeatedly broken the law since returning to power, but his Republican allies have shown little interest so far in defying

Republican-controlled Senate has confirmed all of his appointees so far, even Defence Secretary Pete Hegseth who squeaked by in a 51-50 vote after facing accusations of sexual assault and alcohol abuse. Hegseth has moved aggressively to implement Trump's agenda by banning transgender troops and diversity programs.

Yesterday, he revoked security protections for Mark Milley, who served as the top US military official during Trump's first 2017-2021 term in office before emerging as a prominent critic.

Republican loyalty is being

tested by Trump's pick for health secretary, Robert F Kennedy Jr, who holds unorthodox views that could alienate both liberals and conservatives.

At a contentious confirmation hearing yesterday, the former Democrat came under attack for his anti-vaccine views. But most Republicans at the hearing appeared to support him.

Other nominees have encountered less resistance.

Trump's attorney general nominee Pam Bondi won approval from a Senate committee, clearing the way for a confirmation

Trump loyalists have already remade the Justice Department, firing lawyers who worked on his two criminal prosecutions and sidelining dozens of senior nonpartisan officials.

His pick for Commerce Secretary, Howard Lutnick, faced a largely friendly reception from lawmakers as he echoed Trump's support for tariffs and his complaints about Canada's trade practices.

Republican lawmakers said they were unfazed by Trump's attempt to freeze hundreds of billions of dollars in aid, a dramatic move that would undercut Congress' control over the \$6.75tn federal budget.

Trump has said he has the power to refuse to spend money for programmes he doesn't like, though legal experts say that could violate the US Constitution.

"I, for one, am glad to have a

president in the White House who is delivering on his promise to get our fiscal house in order," said Tom Emmer, the No 3 Republican in the House of Representatives, at a retreat in Miami.

The spending freeze threw the government into chaos as the White House ordered 55 federal agencies to examine more than 2,500 grant programmes in an effort to cut off support for diversity programs and other policies opposed by Trump.

A federal judge in Washington blocked the freeze from taking effect until at least Febraury 3, siding with advocacy groups who sued to block it. Another federal judge was due to consider a separate lawsuit from Democratic state attorneys general yesterday.

Even though it did not take effect, Trump's order appeared to shut down payments for those who depend on federal aid to cover their expenses.

The Medicaid health plan for lower income Americans had resumed payments vesterday, according to an association of state agencies. The payment system for housing authorities was still not functioning, said Democratic Senator Patty Murray.

"The chaos, I'm here to tell you, has not died down this morning," Murray said at a press conference. "We will fight this in the courts, yes, but President Trump needs to back down from this reckless order that is hurting Americans and just follow the law as Congress

Facing Trump and China, EU unveils pro-business roadmap

he EU unveiled a muchanticipated blueprint to revamp Europe's economic model yesterday, marking a shift towards a more business-friendly Brussels after five years of heavy focus on green goals.

With US President Donald

Trump promising tariffs and a n artific al intelligen push, and China rising in key industrial and digital sectors, the 27-nation bloc is under pressure to make life easier for the companies driving its own growth.

"We need to reignite Europe's innovation engine," EU chief Ursula von der Leyen told a news conference to present the "competitiveness compass" - the first major initiative of her second mandate.

The European Commission's recent priorities of climate change and business ethics left many firms complaining about excessive regulation compounding high energy costs and weak investments.

Heeding their call, the EU hopes to get back in the race by turning recommendations made last year by former Italian leaders Enrico Letta and Mario Draghi into a tangible plan of action.

But von der Leyen vowed the bloc remained committed to reaching carbon neutrality within 25 years to reduce dangerous cli-

mate change - while also slashing

"The goals are cast in stone that we have by 2050," she said, although Europe would need to be "flexible" on how to reach them.

In particular, the blueprint said "possible flexibilities" should be on the cards for Europe's struggling carmakers who are facing steep emission fines in 2025.

Under the plan, dozens of laws will be revised, with rules on environmental and human rights supply chain standards, corporate sustainability and chemical safety all facing a trim.

The "simplification shock" – as billed by commission vice-president Stephane Sejourne - has set alarm bells ringing with environmentalists.

"Under the guise of 'simplification, this initiative will dismantle essential safeguards for European citizens, the environment and the climate," warned Kim Claes at Friends of the Earth Europe.

But Markus Beyrer, director general at the EU-wide lobby group BusinessEurope, welcomed the plan as "a clear signal that the EU is committed to strengthening Europe's economy".

A new category of mid-sized company will be created to reduce the regulatory burden for thousands of firms, according to the

A European legal regime, distinct from the 27 member states' national jurisdictions, is to be set up to allow innovative companies to benefit from a single, harmonised set of rules on insolvency, labour law and taxation.

Europe is suffering from energy costs that are much higher than those of its international competitors after the war in Ukraine cut off supplies of cheap Russian gas. Von der Leven told a gathe

of the world's elite in Davos last week the bloc must "continue to diversify our energy supplies" and expand clean power sources including nuclear — once a Brussels

The "compass" plan also recommends facilitating long-term power purchase agreements and boosting investment in the energy

"Targeted, simplified aid" will encourage industrial decarbonisation, with Sejourne hoping the priority goes towards greening the "top 100 CO2-emitting sites", which alone account for more than half of Europe's industrial emis-

The plan also envisages the creation of labels to spur demand for low-carbon products - such as "green" steel, which Brussels is keen on but is in low demand due to its prohibitive costs.

Specific plans are to be drawn up for troubled sectors such as chemicals, steel and automotive.

Lion cub gifted to YouTube star causes wedding chaos

A Pakistani YouTube star who was gifted a lion cub on his wedding day has avoided jail after promising a judge to upload animal rights videos for a year. Rajab Butt has one of the largest online followings in the South Asian country and his week-long nuptials in late December were plastered over celebrity gossip websites.

When a sleepy lion cub, resembling young Simba from the 2019 Lion King film, was presented to him in a gold-chained cage in front of thousands of guests who partied late into the night in the eastern megacity of Lahore, pictures spread rapidly online. Butt captioned a video of the event "it's raining gifts", racking up nearly

10mn views. The morning after, police raided his house, confiscated the cub and kept the newly-wed in custody

overnight. "We found out about the lion cub through social media," said Faisal Mushtaq, an inspector from the Punjab provincial wildlife department.

Police officers went to Butt's house and found the lion cub roaming around the garage, he said. "It was in a poor condition, as it was very cold," said Mushtaq. Last week, Butt pleaded guilty to owning an undocumented wild animal but the judge waived a possible fine and prison sentence

of up to two years for a more tailored punishment. Every month for one year, he must post a five-minute video dedicated to animal rights, said the order by judge Hamid UI Rahman Nasir. The social media influencer agreed to the conditions, after admitting in a court statement that he "set a poor example" by accepting the gift and going on to "glorify it". Butt is one of the country's highestpaid YouTube stars, according to the platform, and usually posts

videos about his family's daily

life, from arguments to new car

Tanvir Janjua, a veteran wildlife official in Punjab, said the cub was likely bought for between Rs700,000 and 800,000 (\$2,500-2,900).

"It is so wrong, morally and legally, to take away such a small cub from its mother." which was likely still feeding it, he told AFP.

A week after the YouTuber was arrested, an adult lion escaped from his cage, running through the narrow streets of a Lahore neighbourhood as residents clambered to their rooftops. The full-grown adult male was eventually shot dead by a security guard, prompting heated outrage on social media about the dangers of keeping a big cat in a residential Big cats are imported and bred

across Pakistan, seen as symbols of wealth and power to the elite that own them. Last year, Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz, which rules the government, banned supporters from bringing lions – the symbol of the party - to political rallies. However, stringent new regulations banning private ownership of big cats in residential areas are currently making their way through Punjab's provincial

government. Breeders would have to buy a licence and have at least 10 acres (four hectares) of land on a site approved by wildlife officials. The gifted lion cub, which hasn't been named, is now enjoying the winter sun in an open pen at Lahore's sprawling Safari Zoo on the edge of the city, under the

watchful eye of a handler.

Janjua, also the zoo's deputy

director, has conducted hundreds of raids against owners, breeders and poachers over the past 33 years to confiscate wild animals, including lions which often had their teeth and claws removed. "Look at these YouTubers who use these animals to get clicks. What kind of a message are they spreading by being cruel to these animals?" he said, scornful of those who parade them in their cars and at political rallies

"They can never be your pet. For two or three months it won't say anything but after that, it will turn aggressive."

As he nears retirement, Janjua says attitudes towards animals have worsened throughout his career. Laws, however, have improved,

"Now wildlife officials have dedicated uniforms, weapons and we will get our own courts," he told AFP.

"The courts that already exist are now strict about animal cruelty."

DeepSeek founder puts focus on China's innovation

Liang Wenfeng, the 39-year-old founder of Chinese AI startup DeepSeek, has in the matter of weeks become the face of China's tech industry and its hope of overcoming an ever-tightening noose of export controls imposed by the United States. Liang had kept an extremely low profile until January 20, when he was one of nine individuals asked to give a speech at a closed-door symposium hosted by China's Premier Li Qiang. He gave two rare media interviews to Chinese media outlet Waves last year and in 2023, but apart from that has stayed mostly out of the public eye. DeepSeek did not respond to a request for an interview.

At the symposium, the millennial's youthful appearance contrasted with the grey-haired academics, officials and state-owned conglomerate heads sat around him, pictures and video published by Chinese broadcaster CCTV showed.

But the fact Liang was invited to share his opinions on Chinese government policy highlights Beijing's recognition of DeepSeek's role in potentially upending the global AI order, in China's favour. DeepSeek launched a free AI assistant last week that the firm says uses less data at a fraction of the cost of current services, triggering a global selloff in

Last year, Baidu CEO Robin Li spoke at a similar symposium chaired by the Chinese premier. Li, who announced China's first ChatGPT rival in March 2023, said in an interview that same year China would never recreate Microsoft-backed OpenAI's success and that Chinese firms should focus on applying existing AI models for commercial purposes.

Under Liang's leadership, DeepSeek deliberately avoided app-building. Instead, it concentrated research talent and resources on creating a model that could match, or better OpenAI, and it hopes in the future to continue focusing on cutting-edge models that will be used by other companies to build consumer and enterprise-facing AI products.

in a Chinese tech industry that was used to taking innovations

from abroad, from smartphone apps to electric vehicles, and quickly scaling them up, often much faster than the countries where the

inventions were first made. "China's AI can't be in the position of following forever. We often say that there is a gap of one or two years between China's AI and the United States, but the real gap is the difference between originality and

imitation," Liang said in an interview with *Waves in July last year. Liang's interviews reveal a belief that China's tech industry had reached a crossroads where it lacked the confidence but not the capital needed to engage in fundamental R&D breakthroughs.

"In the past thirty years, (China's tech industry) has only emphasised making money, and ignored innovation. Innovation is not solely driven by business, it also needs curiosity and a desire to create," he said in July. DeepSeek has taken the decision to make all its models open-source,

unlike its US rival OpenAI. In open-source models, the base code is publicly available for any developer to use and modify at will. Liang's interviews reveal he has bought into the open-source culture that US tech insiders previously argued was one reason the US's Silicon

Valley held an edge over its Chinese counterparts. "Even if OpenAI is closed-source, it cannot stop others from catching up... Open-source is like a cultural practice, rather than a business practice... a company that does this will have soft power."

Liang grew up in the southern province of Guangdong, which during the 80s and 90s led the country in adopting market capitalism. Liang said back then he was surrounded by people who valued starting a

business over studying, but he was more academically inclined. He would go on to enrol in the elite Zhejiang University at age 17, majoring in Electronics and Communication Engineering before pursuing a master's degree in Information and Communication

Engineering, which he completed in 2010. Liang then co-founded a quantitative hedge fund in 2015, which uses complex mathematical algorithms for trading as opposed to human analysis. The fund's portfolio totalled over 100bn yuan (\$13.79bn) by the end of 2021 but in April 2023, it announced on its WeChat account that it would expand its remit beyond the investment industry and concentrate resources to "explore the essence of AGI". DeepSeek was

OpenAI defines AGI (artificial general intelligence) as autonomous systems that surpass humans in most economically valuable tasks. DeepSeek's employees are mainly graduates and PhD students from China's top universities, whom Liang believes prefer to work for

DeepSeek because it is tackling the biggest challenges in AI. "What attracts the best talent is obviously the solving of the world's

hardest problems," he said in July. "Our goal is still to go for AGI." - Reuters

What's DeepSeek and why is it disrupting AI sector?

hinese startup DeepSeek's launch of its latest AI models, which it says are on a par or better than industry-leading models in the United States at a fraction of the cost, is threatening to upset the technology world order.

The company has attracted attention in global AI circles after writing in a paper last month that the training of DeepSeek-V3 required less than \$6mn worth of computing power from Nvidia H800 chips.

DeepSeek's AI Assistant, powered by DeepSeek-V3, has overtaken rival ChatGPT to become the top-rated free application available on Apple's App Store in the United States.

This has raised doubts about the asoning behind some US tech companies' decision to pledge billions of dollars in AI investment and shares of several big tech players, including Nvidia, have

Below are some facts about the company shaking up the AI sector

Why is DeepSeek causing a stir?

The release of OpenAI's ChatGPT in late 2022 caused a scramble among Chinese tech firms, who rushed to create their $own\ chatbots\ powered\ by\ artificial$ intelligence.

But after the release of the first Chinese ChatGPT equivalent, made by search engine giant Baidu, there

was widespread disappointment in China at the gap in AI capabilities between US and Chinese firms.

The quality and cost efficiency of DeepSeek's models have flipped this narrative on its head. The two models that have been showered with praise by Silicon Valley executives and US tech company engineers alike, DeepSeek-V3 and DeepSeek-R1, are on par with OpenAI and Meta's most advanced models, the Chinese startup has said. They are also cheaper to use. The DeepSeek-R1, released last week, is 20-50 times cheaper to use than OpenAI o1 model, depending on the task, according to a post on DeepSeek's official WeChat account.

But some have publicly expressed scepticism about DeepSeek's success story.

Scale AI CEO Alexandr Wang said during an interview with CNBC on Thursday, without providing evidence, that DeepSeek has 50,000 Nvidia H100 chips,

which he claimed would not be disclosed because that would violate Washington's export controls that ban such advanced AI chips from being sold to Chinese companies. DeepSeek did not immediately respond to a request for comment on the allega

Bernstein analysts on Monday highlighted in a research note that DeepSeek's total training costs for its V3 model were unknown but were much higher than the \$5.58mn the startup said was used for computing power. The analysts also said the training costs of the equally-acclaimed R1 model were not disclosed.

Who is behind DeepSeek?

DeepSeek is a Hangzhoubased startup whose controlling shareholder is Liang Wenfeng, co-founder of quantitative hedge fund High-Flyer, based on Chinese corporate records.

Liang's fund announced in March 2023 on its official WeChat

account that it was "starting again", going beyond trading to concentrate resources on creating a "new and independent research group, to explore the essence of AGI" (Artificial General Intelligence). DeepSeek was created later that year.

ChatGPT makers OpenAI define AGI as autonomous systems that surpass humans in most economically valuable tasks.

It is unclear how much High-Flyer has invested in DeepSeek. High-Flyer has an office located in the same building as DeepSeek, and it also owns patents related to chip clusters used to train AI models, according to Chinese corporate records.

High-Flyer's AI unit said on its official WeChat account in July 2022 that it owns and operates a cluster of 10,000 A100 chips.

How does Beijing view

DeepSeek's success has already been noticed in China's top political circles. On January 20, the day DeepSeek-R1 was released to the public, founder Liang attended a closed-door symposium for businessman and experts hosted by Chinese premier Li Qiang, according to state news agency

Liang's presence at the gathering is potentially a sign that DeepSeek's success could be important to Beijing's policy goal of overcoming Washington's export controls and achieving self-sufficiency in strategic industries like AI.

The AI revolution has come with assumptions that computing and energy needs will grow exponentially, resulting in massive tech investments in both data centres and the means to power them, bolstering energy stocks.

Data centres house the highperformance servers and other hardware that make AI applications

So might DeepSeek represent a less power-hungry way to advance

Investors seemed to think so, fleeing positions in US energy companies on Monday and helping drag down stock markets already battered by mass dumping of tech shares. Constellation Energy, which is planning to build significant energy capacity for AI, sank more than 20%.

"R1 illustrates the threat that computing efficiency gains pose to power generators," wrote Travis Miller, a strategist covering energy and utilities for financial services firm Morningstar.

"We still believe data centres, reshoring, and the electrification theme will remain a tailwind," he added.

But "market expectations went

too far." In 2023 alone, Google, Microsoft and Amazon ploughed the equivalent of 0.5% of US GDP into data centres, according to the

International Energy Agency (IEA). Data centres already account for around 1% of global electricity use, and a similar amount of energyrelated greenhouse gas emissions,

far moderated consumption despite growth in data centre demand. But the IEA projects global electricity use by data centres

could double from 2022 figures by

the IEA says. Efficiency improvements have so next year, to around Japan's annual consumption. That growing demand is

unevenly spread.

Data centres accounted for about 4.4% of US electricity consumption in 2023, a figure that could reach up to 12% by 2028, according to a report commissioned by the US Department of Energy.

Last year, Amazon, Google and Microsoft all made deals for nuclear energy, either from so-called Small Modular Reactors or existing facilities.

Meta meanwhile has signed contracts for renewable energy and announced it is seeking proposals for nuclear energy supplies.

For now though, data centres generally rely on electricity grids that are often heavily dependent on fossil fuels.

Data centres also suck up significant amounts of water, both indirectly due to the water involved in electricity generation, and

directly for use in cooling systems. "Building data centres requires lots of carbon in the production of steel and also lots of carbonintensive mining and production processes for creating the computing hardware to fill them," said Andrew Lensen, senior lecturer in artificial intelligence at

Victoria University of Wellington.

"So if DeepSeek was to replace models like OpenAI's... there would be a net decrease in energy requirements."

However, increasing efficiency in technology often simply results in increased demand - a proposition known as the Jevons paradox.

"Jevons paradox strikes again!" Microsoft CEO Satya Nadella wrote on X on Monday.

"As AI gets more efficient and accessible, we will see its use skyrocket, turning it into a commodity we just can't get enough of," he added.

Lensen also pointed out that DeepSeek uses a "chain-ofthought" model that is more energy-intensive than alternatives because it uses multiple steps to answer a query. These were previously too expensive to run, but could now become more popular

because of efficiencies. Lensen said DeepSeek's impact might be to help US companies learn "how they can use the computational efficiencies to build even larger and more performant models".

"Instead of making their model 10 times smaller and efficient with the same level of performance, I think they'll use the new findings to make their model more capable at the same energy usage." - AFP

In addition, the arbitrators must be highly qualified and have extensive experience, as they are carefully selected by the organisation, in order to ensure the integrity of the competitions, maintain the structure
