
Marc Marquez wins Qatar Grand Prix

Qatar, Egypt share cultural, artistic and heritage ties

The cultural relations between Qatar and Egypt are witnessing a remarkable development, reflecting the historical relations between the two brotherly countries, as they share common cultural, artistic and heritage ties, stemming from the depth of Arab culture and its roots extending throughout history.

The cultural activities between the two countries consolidate brotherhood and understanding, in light of the two countries' constant aspiration for more cultural and artistic co-operation, as seen in their mutual participation in various cultural events, which in turn contributes to strengthening rapprochement and the exchange of experiences and expertise based on cultural depth, artistic movement, and heritage roots that the two countries posses.

The cultural co-operation between the two countries was evident in the Egyptian Cultural Week, hosted by Qatar at Darb Al Saai in January. The event marked a new milestone in cultural co-operation between the two countries, with the Egyptian Ministry of Culture presenting various aspects of Egyptian life to the Qatari public, including art, music and popular Egyptian cuisine, attracting a large number of citizens and residents.

The Egyptian Ministry of Culture participated in a similar event in 2010, during which Doha was selected as the Arab Capital of Culture for the year 2010. The week-long event featured a theatrical performance, a visual arts exhibition, and literary seminars on Egyptian culture and its commonalities with its Qatari counterpart, with the participation of a select group of creatives from both countries.

The two countries support joint Arab efforts to preserve heritage and achieve Arab integration through digital projects and regional workshops, particularly the joint co-operation with the Memory of the World (MOW) Committee for the Arab region, which was launched at the conclusion of the regional conference 'Memory in Heritage: Fostering Co-operation on Documentary Heritage in the Arab Region,' organised by Qatar National Archives in January, in co-operation with the UN Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (Unesco).

In this context, among the heritage files that reflect the depth of the heritage roots between the two countries is the co-operation to register Arab heritage elements on the Unesco's Intangible Cultural Heritage list, such as the palm tree files, Arabic calligraphy, and others. There is also a current co-operation towards nominating 'Sanbuk — Traditional Sailing Boats' as a joint Arab file. Doha witnessed the second meeting for the purpose of preparing this file in February.

To enhance cultural co-operation between the two countries, the Egyptian Ministry of Culture previously announced that Qatar will be the guest of honour at the 58th edition of the Cairo International Book Fair in 2027, which reflects the depth of the cultural relations shown through their mutual participation in book

Creatives from both countries are keen to participate in various cultural and artistic events, including art shows and exhibitions, as well as photography exhibitions, and literary conferences and seminars. This reflects the exchange of diverse creative experiences and expertise, based on the solid cultural foundations that unite the two countries.

Egyptian creatives participate in numerous cultural awards launched by Qatar, and have won many high ranks. These awards include the Sheikh Hamad Award for Translation and International Understanding, the Katara Prize for Qur'an Recitation, the Katara Prize for Arabic Novel, the Katara Prize for Prophet's (peace be upon him) Poet, and others. QSO launches national initiative on uveitis

atar Society of Ophthal-mology (QSO) yesterday officially launched the first hadonal initiative of its kind in Qatar to provide comprehensive, specialised care for uveitis patients, under the title "uveitis for all."

The initiative was launched in collaboration with the uveitis team at Hamad Medical Corp (HMC) during the QSO's inaugural symposium on uveitis under the auspices of the Qatar Doctors Association.

QSO's officials indicated that the initiative aims to enhance co-operation between healthcare providers in Qatar in the field of diagnosing and treating uveitis.

President of QSO and Senior Consultant in Ophthalmology at HMC, Dr Faisal al-Naqadan, said that the "uveitis for all" initiative is building partnerships with regional and international institutions of excellence to implement the best methods of prevention, diagnosis, treatment, and awareness. The initiative also serves as a basis for joint research, clinical training, and extended awareness campaigns.

Speaking to reporters dur-

ing the national initiative launch symposium, he noted that the "uveitis for all" initiative is not just a medical project, but rather represents a strategic framework that reflects national priorities in providing advanced specialised care and transitioning from traditional treatment models to an integrated community approach that enhances patient support throughout the disease's stages.

In turn, Vice-President of QSO and Head of Ophthalmology Department at Al Wakra Hospital Zamzam al-Baker said that the national initiative is working to develop modern strategies and comprehensive treatment guidelines that ensure the continued provision of high-quality healthcare services to patients, in line with global developments and standards.

The initiative focuses on national partnerships that include HMC, the Ministry of Public Health, the Primary Health Care Corp, Sidra Medicine, Qatar Charity, Qatar Red Crescent, and private sector ophthalmology providers to ensure comprehensive and equitable access to ophthalmic services.

Qatar condemns bombing of Al Ahli Baptist Hospital in Gaza

Qatar has condemned in the strongest terms the bombardment of Al Ahli Baptist Hospital in Gaza, considering this act a brutal massacre and a heinous crime against defenceless civilians, as well as a brazen encroachment upon the provisions of international humanitarian law.

In a statement yesterday, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs stressed Qatar's unequivocal

rejection of the Israeli attacks on civilian objects, including hospitals, schools, and population assembly points in the Gaza Strip. The ministry warned of the crumbling health system in the Gaza Strip, along with the expansion of the conflict cycle in the region due to the unabated Israeli atrocities, calling on the international community to uphold its responsibilities in protecting defenseless civilians.

In addition, the ministry reiterated Qatar's enduring position in supporting the Palestinian cause and the resilience of the brotherly Palestinian people, based on international legitimacy resolutions and the two-state solution to ensure the establishment of the independent Palestinian state on the 1967 borders, with East Jerusalem as its capital. 

Shura Council Speaker meets Italian Chamber of Deputies president





Israeli missiles strike Gaza hospital, patients evacuated

wo Israeli missiles hit a major Gaza hospital yesterday, knocking out the emergency department and damaging other structures, medics said, in a strike which Israel said was aimed at Hamas fighters exploiting the facility.

Health officials at the Al-Ahli Arab Baptist Hospital evacuated patients after a phone call from someone who identified himself as Israeli security shortly before the attack.

No casualties were reported in the strike. The Israeli military said in a statement it had taken steps to reduce harm to civilians before it struck the compound, which was being used by Hamas fighters to plan attacks. Hamas rejected the accusation as "lies" and called for an international investigation.

The hospital – an institution of the Anglican Church – was knocked out of operation, according to Gaza's health ministry

try.
"Hundreds of patients and injured people had to be evacuated in the middle of the night, and many of them are now out in the streets without medical care, which puts their lives at risk," said ministry spokesperson Khalil al-Degran.

Yesterday's strikes came as Hamas leaders began a fresh round of talks in Cairo in a bid to salvage a stalled ceasefire agreement with Israel, with Egypt, Qatar, and the United States attempting to bridge gaps between the sides.

Images on social media, which Reuters could not immediately verify, showed dozens of people leaving the hospital, with some assisting patients in their beds. Reuters footage showed signif-

icant destruction in and outside the hospital compound's church, and patients who couldn't leave.

"The scene was scary. From last night until now, I haven't slept a single minute out of fear. All night, glass was shattering over us inside," said an injured man, Mohammed Abu Nasser.

The Baptist Church in Jerusalem said the warning to evacuate the hospital came 20 minutes before the strike that destroyed the two-storey Genetic Laboratory, and damaged the Pharmacy and Emergency Department buildings and other surrounding structures.

"We call upon all governments and people of goodwill to intervene to stop all kinds of attacks on medical and humanitarian institutions," the church said in a statement.

The Palestinian foreign ministry and Hamas condemned the attack, saying Israel was destroying Gaza's healthcare system.

Israel says Hamas systematically exploits civilian structures, including hospitals, which the group denies. Israeli forces have carried out numerous raids in medical facilities in Gaza.

In October 2023, a deadly blast at a parking lot in the compound of Al-Ahli hospital was blamed by Hamas on an Israeli air strike. Israel said a failed rocket launch by the Palestinian Islamic Jihad group had caused the blast.

The fighter group denied it was responsible. An investigation by Human Rights Watch concluded the explosion was most likely caused by a failed Palestinian rocket launch.

Separate strikes in the enclave yesterday killed at least 30 Palestinians, including the head of a police station in Khan Younis, in the southern part of the Hamas-run enclave, according to Hamas and health authorities. Six brothers were killed when an Israeli strike hit their car in Deir Al-Balah in central Gaza Strip, medics said.

The war in Gaza was triggered by Hamas' October 2023 storming of southern Israel.

Red Crescent says missing Gaza medic in Israeli custody

he Palestine Red Crescent Society said yesterday that a medic who had been missing since an Israeli attack on ambulances in Gaza was "forcibly abducted" by troops and is being held by Israeli authorities.

"We have been informed by the International Committee of the Red Cross that medic Asaad al-Nsasrah is being held by the Israeli occupation authorities," the PRCS said in a statement.

"His fate had remained unknown since he was targeted along with other PRCS medics in Rafah," it said, referring to the attack that left 15 medics and rescuers dead.

When contacted for comment on the PRCS's latest announcement, the Israeli military referred AFP to an earlier statement noting that army chief Lieutenant General Eyal Zamir had ordered a thorough investiga-

tion into the attack.

"We call on the international community to pressure the occupation authorities to immediately release our colleague, medic Asaad, who was forcibly abducted while carrying out his humanitarian duties,"

the PRCS said.

"He and his colleagues came under heavy gunfire, which led to the killing of eight of them — a grave violation of international humanitarian law."

The killings occurred in the southern Gaza Strip in the early hours of March 23, days into a renewed Israeli offensive in the Hamas-ruled territory.

They have since sparked international condemnation, with Israel insisting there were fighters in the ambulances. The PRCS has charged that Israeli soldiers gunned down the team with bullets to their upper body with "intent to kill".

Eight staff members from the Red Crescent, six from the Gaza civil defence agency and one employee of the UN agency for Palestinian refugees were killed in the attack, according to the UN humanitarian office

OCHA and Palestinian rescuers.

Their bodies were found buried near the site of the shooting in the Tal al-Sultan area of Rafah city, in what OCHA described as a mass grave.

The team was ambushed while responding to distress calls from Palestinians in an area near Rafah that had been struck by an Israeli air strike, the PRCS had said. The Israeli attack appears to have occurred in two phases on that morning.

One of the victims of the attack, medic Rifaat Radwan, captured video and audio of the second assault, which targeted his convoy of ambulances and a firetruck, before he was killed.

An Israeli military official told journalists that the soldiers who fired at the ambulances "thought they had an encounter with fighters".

But Radwan's video, released by the Red Crescent, contradicted this account.

The footage from the phone found on Radwan's body shows ambulances moving with their headlights and emergency lights clearly switched on, while the military official had said that the lights on the vehicles

The sole survivor, medic Mundhir Abed, witnessed the first attack. He said he was initially detained and beaten by the soldiers before being released.

"It's a day I'll never forget because of the torment I witnessed and lived through," he told AFP.

UAE president says wants to support Syria reconstruction

he president of the United Arab Emirates said his country wants to support Syria's reconstruction as he met yesterday with interim President Ahmed al-Sharaa in Abu Dhabi.

Sheikh Mohamed bin Zayed al-Nahyan "affirmed the UAE's keenness to support... Syria to confront the challenges of the transitional phase and rebuild Syria" during the meeting, the official Emirati news agency WAM reported.

Sharaa has sought Gulf financial support for war-devastated Syria since he led a lightning offensive that toppled longtime ruler Bashar al-Assad in December.

But nearly a week after the fighters toppled Assad, UAE presidential adviser Anwar Gargash said his government found the affiliation of Syria's new rulers "quite worrying".

In mid-January Sharaa spoke

by phone with the UAE president about ways to reinforce ties and "ensure the stability and development of the region", Syria's state news agency SANA said at the time. "Syria's stability and enhanced security are in the interest of the entire region," the UAE president was quoted as saying yesterday.

He added that the Gulf country would "spare no effort in providing all possible support to Syria and its brotherly people in the coming period".

Iran says talks with US to focus solely on N-issue, lifting sanctions

Tran's foreign ministry said yesterday that talks with the United States slated for next weekend will remain "indirect" with Omani mediation, and focused solely on the nuclear issue and lifting of sanctions.

Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi and US Middle East envoy Steve Witkoff held talks Saturday in Muscat, marking the highest-level Iran-US nuclear negotiations since the collapse of a 2015 accord. They agreed to meet again in seven days.

"Negotiations will continue to be indirect. Oman will remain the mediator, but we are discussing the location of future negotiations," foreign ministry spokesman Esmaeil Baqaei said in an interview with state TV.

He said the talks would only focus on "the nuclear issue and the lifting of sanctions," and that Iran "will not have any talks with the American side on any other issue."

Analysts had said the US would push to include on the agenda

discussions over Iran's ballistic missile programme along with Tehran's support for the "axis of resistance" – a network of groups opposed to Israel. Tehran has, however, main-

tained it will talk only about its nuclear programme. Donald Trump in 2018 pulled

Donald Trump in 2018 pulled out of the 2015 nuclear deal between Iran and world powers during his first term as US president.

He reimposed sweeping economic sanctions against Iran, which continued to adhere to the agreement for a year after Washington's pullout but later began rolling back its own commitments.

Iran has consistently denied seeking to acquire nuclear weapons.

Saturday's rare negotiations came weeks after Trump sent a letter to Iran's supreme leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei urging nuclear talks while warning of possible military action if Iran refuses.

Iran and the US separately described Saturday's discussions as "constructive".

Iran said the talks were held indirectly with Oman's foreign minister acting as intermediary.

Provisional results reveal Gabon junta chief wins presidency

abon's junta chief Brice Oligui Nguema has won the presidential election with 90.35% of the vote, according to provisional results released yesterday by the interior ministry.

Oligui, who ended more than five decades of corruption-plagued rule by the Bongo family in August 2023, assuming the role of transitional president, had promised to return the country to democratic rule.

Earlier yesterday, Gabon 24 television had reported that he was "well ahead" in several of the central African country's provinces. On Saturday, voters had flocked to the ballot boxes to have their say in an election marking the end of military rule. The latest provisional figures from the interior ministry put the participation rate at 70.4%.

The day after voters poured into polling stations, the streets of the capital Libreville were

calm – in contrast with previous elections in 2016 and 2023 marked by tensions and unrest.

"I hadn't voted in a long time, but this time, I saw a ray or something that made me go out and vote," 58-year-old Catholic Olivina Migombe said while en route to church yesterday.

"I believe in change this time," the professed Oligui voter added. Whoever wins will have to reckon with the oil-rich country's litany of problems, from crumbling infrastructure to widespread poverty, all while labouring under a crushing mountain of debt.

If Oligui is elected president "he will have lots of work to do," said Patrick Essono-Mve, a 48-year-old unemployed technician, also on the way to mass.

Oligui has sought to shed his military strongman image and even ditched his general's uniform to run for a sevenyear term.

Togo accepts AU mediator role in DR Congo conflict

Togo's leader has accepted a role

as the African Union's mediator in the conflict in eastern Democratic Republic of Congo, the Togolese foreign ministry said yesterday, AFP reported from Nairobi. President Faure Gnassingbe will take over from Angolan President Joao Lourenco, who last month relinguished the role he was appointed to in 2022. There has been little headway in repeated attempts to pacify the protracted conflict involving the M23 armed group, which recently launched a lightning offensive and seized large swathes of land in mineral-rich eastern DRC. Yesterday, Togolese Foreign Minister Robert Dussey shared an AU statement saying Gnassingbe had been appointed "as Mediator for the AU engagement between the Democratic Republic of Congo and Republic of Rwanda in the context of protracted insecurity in the Eastern part of the DRC". An AU spokesperson verified the statement to AFP. Dussey thanked the African Union and member states for "the confidence expressed" in Gnassingbe. adding he will "actively contribute to the search for sustainable peace, reconciliation and stability in the Great Lakes region".

UK demands answers after MP denied Hong Kong entry

ritish Foreign Secretary David Lammy yesterday said he was deeply concerned after a UK lawmaker was denied entry to Hong Kong, and said he would be urgently raising the issue with the Chinese authorities.

Wera Hobhouse claimed she was the first British MP to be refused entry on arrival in Hong Kong since the former British colony was handed over to China in 1997.

Hobhouse is a member of the Inter-Parliamentary Alliance on

"IPAC unites lawmakers world-

wide, promoting democracy and addressing threats to the rulesbased and human rights systems posed by the rise of China," the group says on its website.

The Sunday Times newspaper said Hobhouse, 65, flew to Hong Kong on Thursday on a personal

trip to visit her newborn grandson. It said she had her passport confiscated, was asked about her job and the purpose of her visit, had her luggage searched and was then taken to the boarding gate.

"When I was given the decision my voice was shaking and I was just saying: 'Why, please explain to me?" the British weekly quoted her as saying. Hobhouse said on Bluesky: "I am the first MP to be refused entry on arrival to Hong Kong since 1997. Authorities gave me no explanation for this cruel and upsetting blow. I hope the foreign secretary will recognise that this is an insult to all parliamentarians and seek answers." It comes a week after two British MPs from the governing Labour Party were blocked from entering Israel and deported.

Looser food standards off the menu in any **US-UK trade deal: Britain**

China is no longer welcome

ritain will not relax its food safety standards as part of any deal to secure lower tariffs on its exports to the US, Business Minister Jonathan Reynolds said yesterday.

US President Donald Trump has imposed 10% tariffs on most imports of British goods to the US and a higher 25% rate on imports of cars, steel and aluminium.

Although the tariffs imposed on Britain are at the lower end of the US' scale - reflecting broadly balanced trade flows between the two countries - Reynolds said he still viewed the greater trade barriers as "disappointing".

Earlier this month, just after the tariffs were announced, Reynolds told the BBC it was "not inaccurate" to say the US and Britain had agreed the broad outline of a possible deal, though Trump had not

However, there has been little sign of progress since and last week Finance Minister Rachel Reeves said she intended to meet US Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent "shortly".

Attempts to strike a bilateral trade deal during Trump's first term in 2017-21 ran into opposition from Britain's Conservative government at the time over measures to lower animal welfare and environmental

Reynolds said yesterday that looser food standards remained off the table for the Labour administration, as he viewed that as breaching promises made in 2024's election campaign.

China 'no longer welcome in UK steel sector'

in Britain's steel sector after the government had to pass emergency legislation on Saturday to ensure control of Chinese-owned British Steel **Business Minister Jonathan** Reynolds said yesterday. Reynolds said the refusal of China's Jingye Group to accept a roughly £500mn (\$654mn) government aid package last week to stop irrevocable damage to blast furnaces left the government with no alternative to intervening directly. British Steel was not immediately available for comment outside office hours. Against a backdrop of global

overcapacity in much of the steel industry and challenges from US tariffs, Jingye wanted to import steel from China for further processing in Britain, Reynolds said in an interview with Sky

But the closure of blast furnaces at the British Steel plant in Scunthorpe - which need to be constantly fuelled and are losing £700.000 a day - would have left Britain as the only major

economy unable to produce socalled virgin steel from iron ore. coke and other inputs. Previous British governments had been "naive" to allow Chinese companies to be involved in the steel sector, Reynolds said. Large industrial companies such as Jingye Group had direct links to the Chinese Communist Party and China's government would understand why Jingye's proposal was unacceptable to Britain, he

"You've got to be clear about what is the sort of sector where we can promote, co-operate; and ones, frankly, where we can't. I wouldn't personally bring a Chinese company into our steel sector. I think steel is a very sensitive area," he said. Jingye bought British Steel from the government in 2020 after the company became insolvent. Since coming to office in 2024, the Labour government has stepped up engagement with China after tensions under previous Conservative governments over human rights. Hong Kong and latterly restrictions on investment over security concerns.

"We will never change our SPS (sanitary and phytosanitary) food standards. We've made that perfectly clear to the US," he told Sky News in an interview.

Common US and Canadian practices such as washing raw chicken in chlorinated water or feeding growth hormones to cattle are banned in Britain and the European

However, parts of the US food industry did meet British standards, Reynolds said, hinting at a possible

area for negotiation on tariffs. Last week Britain's culture minister ruled out any changes to its new Online Safety Act, which can fine big, predominantly US, tech companies up to 10% of their global turnover if they do not moderate content to British regulators' liking.

Growth risks 'to nudge RBI towards deeper rate cuts'

he Reserve Bank of India's rate-cutting cycle could be deeper than expected as downside risks to growth and a benign inflation outlook could prompt the central bank to be more accommodative, econo-

Growth in Asia's third-largest economy, which is under threat from slowing urban consumption and tepid private investment, could worsen because of the escalating US-China trade war and the spectre of steep US

India hopes to seal a trade deal with the US after President Donald Trump paused "reciprocal" tariffs on dozens of countries, including India, while hiking levies on China.

"With growth below potential, falling oil prices and inflation durably aligned to target, policy rates will need to move into the accommodative zone. Hence, we are lowering our terminal rate forecast to 5% from 5.50% earlier," Nomura economists Sonal Varma and Aurodeep Nandi said.

On Wednesday, the RBI cut

the key policy repo rate by 25 basis points to 6% and softened its policy stance to "accommodative" from "neutral". The central bank also lowered its growth and inflation forecasts by 20 basis points each to 6.5% and 4%, respectively.

Analysts say the downside on growth and price rise could be larger. Nomura expects another 100 basis points of rate reductions this year with 25-bp cuts in June, August, October and December. The tariffs have exacerbated uncertainties but quantifying the impact on growth is difficult, RBI governor Sanjay Malhotra said.

UK pledges £20bn to help firms amid **US tariff turmoil**

The UK pledged £20bn (\$26bn) yesterday to help exporters including those affected by US tariffs, as President Donald Trump's sweeping stop-start import taxes roil global markets. Britain's finance ministry said the move would expand the UK's export finance package by £20bn to a total of £80bn, with "thousands of UK businesses affected by tariffs set to benefit." Up to £10bn of that support will be used specifically for firms "impacted in the short term by the current situation," it said. Finance Minister Rachel Reeves said the move would help companies weather difficulties ahead. "The world is changing, which is why it is more important than ever to back our worldleading businesses and support them to navigate the challenges ahead," she said. The finance ministry said small businesses will also be able to access loans of up to £2mn as part of the package.

Australia premier's party launches poll campaign

The centre-left party of Australian Prime Minister Anthony Albanese vesterday pledged to help more wouldbe home buyers as it launched a campaign for the May 3 election shaping as a tight race with the conservative opposition.

Albanese's Labor government, which is running neck-andneck with the Liberal-National coalition, has promised to build 1.2mn homes by 2030, to ease cost pressures that have sparked dissatisfaction with a lack of affordable housing. "In Australia home ownership should not be a privilege to inherit if you're lucky," Albanese said at the launch of Labor's campaign in Perth.

His government pledged that, if re-elected, it would guarantee part of a first-home buyer's home loan, allowing the purchase with a deposit of 5%. It would also spend A\$10bn (\$6.29bn) on grants and loans to build up to 100,000 homes to help would-be home buyers get on the property ladder, it added. "If you are looking to buy your first time, Labor has got your back," he added at the launch.

Liberal leader Peter Dutton, the defence minister in the last Liberal-National government, has also been campaigning on the so-called housing crisis, that he says puts home ownership out of reach for many in the country of about 26mn.

At yesterday's launch of the coalition's campaign in Sydney, capital of the state of New South Wales, Dutton pledged tax relief and a rival housing plan allowing first-time buyers of new homes to deduct mortgage payments from income taxes

World Expo opens in Japan in rocky times

orld Expo opened yesterday with 160 countries and regions showcasing their technology, culture and food, with host Japan hoping to provide the world with some much-needed

Highlights at the show in Osaka until mid-October include a Mars meteorite, a beating artificial heart grown from stem cells and Hello Kitty figures in algae form.

Surrounding most of the pavilions - a chance for architects' fancies to run wild - is the world's largest

wooden structure, the "Grand Ring". Prime Minister Shigeru Ishiba said the event would help bring a sense of unity in a "divided society".

But with conflicts raging and US President Donald Trump's tariffs causing economic turmoil, that may

Russia was absent from the Expo. "We are the ones who create, not the ones who destroy," Tatiana Berezhna, deputy minister of economy of Ukraine, said.

The US building has the theme

"America the Beautiful", focusing not on politics but landscapes, AI and space. The nearby Chinese pavilion, evoking a calligraphy scroll, focuses on green technology and features lunar samples brought by the country's Moon probes.

France's pavilion is enveloped in immense white drapes and is inspired by the Japanese legend of "Akai Ito", an invisible red thread representing shared values.

After enjoying the view atop the Grand Ring's "skywalk", hungry visitors can stop by the world's longest sushi conveyor belt or meet manyeved Expo 2025 mascot Myaku-Myaku. Among the more bizarre displays are 32 sculptures of Hello Kitty dressed as different types of algae - to symbolise the plant's many uses - and a "human washing

machine". Elsewhere are demonstrations of drone-like flying vehicles, and the tiny artificial heart made from induced pluripotent stem cells (iPS) shown in public for the first time.

"It has an actual pulse," Byron Russel of Pasona Group, which runs the exhibit, said.

Themes of sustainability run through the Expo, including at the bauble-like Swiss pavilion, which aims to have the smallest ecological footprint. But Expos have been criticised for their temporary nature, and after October Osaka's man-made island will be cleared to make way for a casino resort. According to Japanese media, only 12.5% of the Grand Ring will be reused.

Expo is also known as a World's Fair, and the phenomenon, which brought the Eiffel Tower to Paris, began with London's 1851 Crystal Palace exhibition and is held every five years.

Osaka last hosted the Expo in 1970 when Japan was booming and its technology the envy of the world. It attracted 64mn people, a record until Shanghai in 2010.

But 55 years on, Japan is less of a trendsetter and opinion polls show low levels of enthusiasm among the public for the Expo, particularly after it went 27% over budget.

So far 8.7mn advance tickets have been shifted, below the pre-sales arget of 14mn.

Japan is also experiencing a record tourism boom, meaning accommodation in Osaka - near hotspot Kyoto - is often fully booked with prices sky-high. But early visitors at the venue voiced their excitement despite persistent rain on day one. Local resident Emiko Sakamoto,

who also visited the Expo in 1970, was determined to return to the site repeatedly to see all the pavilions.

"I think the Expo is meaningful" in this chaotic time, she said. "People will think about peace after visit-

Dire wolf resurrection sparks scientific awe and controversy

In an age when conservationists are concerned that the disappearance of thousands of wildlife species is imminent due to human irresponsibility, the recent claim by a US biotechnology company of resurrecting the long-extinct dire wolf through genetic engineering has created excitement as well as shock. The species was native to the Americas but went extinct some 10,000-12,000 years ago, probably because their megaherbivore prey also disappeared around this time. Dallas-based Colossal Laboratories & Biosciences, said it is "a scientific breakthrough for global conservation efforts" and is even trying to bring back the extinct woolly mammoth by 2028.

Dire wolves lived in a variety of habitats including plains and mountainous areas of North America and arid areas of South America. Fossils have been found in the asphalt pits at Rancho La Brea in Los Angeles and in paleontological sites in the midwestern US, according to the Illinois State Museum. Colossal said two of the dire wolves were born late last year, while the third arrived in early 2025. All three live in a secure 2,000-acre nature preserve at an undisclosed location. "This massive milestone is the first of many coming examples demonstrating that our end-to-end deextinction technology stack works," said Ben Lamm, Colossal's cofounder and CEO, in a news release. "Our team took DNA from a 13,000-year-old tooth and a 72,000-year-old skull and made healthy dire wolf puppies."

But many scientists are crying foul. What Colossal has done, they point out, is edited some of the genes of the not-very-closely related grey wolf to make it resemble their distant cousin. "Colossal has introduced a small number of changes to the genetic material of a grey wolf to produce grey wolf pups with dire wolf features such as pale coats and a potentially larger size," says Philip Seddon, a professor of zoology at the University of Otago in New Zealand. Nic Rawlence of the same university's Palaeogenetics Laboratory wonders how the pups will learn how to be dire wolves. "Currently, they're wolves running around in a paddock. And does the ecosystem it once lived in still exist?"

But Colossal firmly rejects the many criticisms that have been made. Chief science officer Beth Shapiro says it doesn't matter that the two species are not closely related. "When Colossal successfully edited 20 carefully chosen genetic variants into grey wolf DNA - 15 of them extinct variants that haven't existed for over 12,000 years we were attempting to resurrect key features tied to the functional essence of an extinct species," she adds. Those features, it says, include being 20-25% larger than a grey wolf and having more muscle

mass and an Arctic white coat. On the issue of how these animals will learn to be dire wolves, Shapiro says Colossal has created management strategies modelled on red wolf and Mexican grey wolf reintroduction programmes. "Those strategies include a stepwise approach to reducing human intervention, mimicking wild diet types and increasing the difficulty in which food items are presented to encourage the expression of wild behaviours," she says. Colossal has become well-known for its pioneering approach to gene-editing extant, living species to make them more closely resemble related extinct ones – it is also attempting this with both the thylacine and the woolly mammoth, but what it has called the Colossal dire wolf is its first actual success

A number of experts say that bringing back extinct animals will not solve any conservation problems and that efforts would be better spent trying to find ways to save current critically endangered or vulnerable species. Worldwide, more than 41,000 species are currently threatened with extinction and more than 16,300 are considered endangered, according to the International Union for Conservation of Nature's Red List of Threatened Species.

atar and Egypt share deep-rooted, historical fraternal ties built on mutual respect, shared and a common vision for the future. These relations, grounded in unity of purpose and destiny, continue to grow and thrive thanks to the shared commitment of both countries leadership to further develop and diversify bilateral co-operation. Their aim is to elevate these ties into a model of strategic partnership and investment that sets a standard for collaboration between brotherly nations.


In line with the shared commitment of the Oatari and Egyptian leaderships to strengthen operation and co-ordination between Doha and Cairo, President Abdel Fattah al-Sisi of Egypt is embarking on an official visit to Qatar. This visit to Doha carries significant weight amid the current regional and global developments, which call for enhanced consultation and co-ordination between the two countries.

These efforts aim to address the latest developments and issues impacting Arab security, the legitimate aspirations and rights of Arab peoples, and to foster Arab unity, security, and stability in the region and beyond serving the collective interests and positions of Arab nations on various international platforms.

The Qatari-Egyptian summit in Doha reflects the high level of excellence reached in bilateral relations and underscores the shared determination of both leaderships to deepen co-operation and co-ordination across all levels for the benefit of the two countries and their brotherly nations.

Qatar-Egypt relations witnessed a dynamic momentum, marked by reciprocal visits between the two leaders. In June 2022, His Highness the Amir paid an official visit to Egypt, during which he discussed with President al-Sisi ways to strengthen and expand bilateral ties, particularly in the fields of investment, energy, defence, culture, and sports. The talks also touched on a range of current regional and international issues, with both leaders exchanging views especially regarding developments in the Middle East.

Again, in November 2023, His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani made a fraternal visit to Egypt. During the visit, His Highness and President al-Sisi held official talks at Al-Ittihadiya Palace in Cairo. Discussions focused on further enhancing bilateral relations across various sectors, as well as reviewing pressing issues on the regional and international stages. Chief among these were the situation in occupied Palestinian territories and joint efforts to end the aggression on Gaza, de-escalate tensions, and facilitate the urgent delivery of humanitarian aid aimed at protecting civilians and contributing to regional stability.



Both sides reaffirmed their unwavering and continuous support for the Palestinian cause and the legitimate rights of the Palestinian people particularly their right to establish an independent Palestinian state based on the 1967 borders, with East Jerusalem as its capital, in accordance with the two-state solution. They also strongly condemned all violations against the Palestinian people, their land, and their holy sites, which undermine efforts to reach a just resolution to the issue.

In September 2022, President al-Sisi paid an official visit to Qatar. His Highness the Amir and the Egyptian president held official talks, during which they discussed the close bilateral relations and explored ways to strengthen and develop them across various fields, particularly in investment, transport, and social affairs. The talks also covered several regional and international issues of mutual concern. During the visit, the Amir and the president witnessed the signing of several memorandums of understanding between the governments of Qatar and Egypt in the fields of investment, ports, and

social development. President al-Sisi extended an invitation to Qatari business leaders to visit Egypt and explore the wide range of investment opportunities available across all economic sectors. Speaking at the opening of the Qatari-Egyptian Business Forum, he emphasised that sectors such as agriculture, commerce, real estate, and industry are all open for investment whether in partnership with the government or with Egypt's private sector.

He also expressed Egypt's readiness to offer genuine investment opportunities to Qatari private enterprises, highlighting Egypt's progress in modernising infrastructure such as new road networks, power plants, and modern public transport systems as well as legal and regulatory reforms that meet investors expectations and pave the way for sustainable growth.

As part of the ongoing highlevel exchanges between the two countries, HE the Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman bin Jassim al-Thani, has made several visits to Egypt including a visit in March 2022 and again in November 2024. In turn, Prime Minister of Egypt, Dr Mostafa Madbouly, paid an official visit to Qatar in February 2023 and returned to Doha in December to participate in the 2024 Doha Forum.

In March last year, Doha hosted the fifth session of the Qatar-Egypt Joint Supreme Committee. The session reviewed the growing cooperation between the two nations and explored ways to further develop their ties particularly in the areas of trade, investment, diplomacy, social affairs, education, youth, and sports. In this regard, both sides reaffirmed their shared commitment to strengthening bilateral relations in a way that also contributes to broader Arab co-

operation. The discussions also addressed the latest developments in Gaza and occupied Palestinian territories, with both sides emphasising the urgency of reaching an immediate ceasefire, ensuring the protection of civilians under siege, and guaranteeing the uninterrupted delivery of humanitarian aid into Gaza. During the session, a number of memorandums of understanding and executive cooperation programs were signed between the two sides in areas such as investment, diplomacy, social affairs, public education, youth,

Qatar-Egypt relations have seen significant progress on the economic front over the past three years particularly in the area of investment which helped boost bilateral trade and expand mutual investments.

The volume of trade between the two countries rose to approximately \$1.2bn in 2024, up from \$890mn in 2022. This growth is attributed to several factors, including streamlined

investment procedures, removal of customs barriers, and strengthened

collaboration on joint projects. There has also been a flurry of activity in mutual visits by trade and economic delegations between the two countries, with a strong focus on enhancing investment co-operation particularly in sectors such as tourism, healthcare, real estate, oil, and gas. Multiple Egyptian delegations visiting Doha briefed Qatari business leaders on Egypt's ongoing economic renaissance and its landmark development projects, including New Administrative Capital, new ports, and expansive road networks, as well as the range of incentives offered to foreign investors. They also highlighted a wealth of investment opportunities across various sectors, including industry, agriculture, tourism, healthcare, ducation, hospitality, gree energy, food processing, automotive manufacturing, pharmaceuticals, and port development. These efforts are backed by Egypt's advanced infrastructure, favourable legislation, streamlined procedures, and access to export markets. The country is also expanding its network of free zones currently home to nine with additional zones in the pipeline.

In turn, the Qatari business sector invited Egyptian companies and investors to explore investment opportunities in Qatar, which has emerged as a leading investment destination both regionally and globally. This position is underpinned by a progressive legal and administrative framework that allows 100% foreign ownership across a wide range of economic and commercial activities. Besides to a world-class infrastructure designed to meet the full spectrum of investor needs. Key logistical advantages include Single Window platform for business registration, a network of free zones, Hamad International Airport, and Hamad Port.

There are about 261 Qatari companies operating in Egypt, with Qatari investments totalling \$2.165bn. Of this, \$249mn is in the tourism sector, around \$208mn in construction, and about \$36mn in the industrial sector. In March 2022, Qatar announced investments worth \$5bn on the sidelines of the visit of HE the Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman bin Jassim al-Thani to Cairo.

Several Egyptian companies are actively operating in the Qatari market, while Qatar also maintains significant investments in Egypt. Notably, Qatar Investment Authority holds investments estimated at around \$3.317bn in resorts and tourism projects within Egypt.

Reflecting the deep-rooted fraternal ties between Qatar and Egypt, Doha hosted the Egyptian Cultural Week in January, 2025. The event showcased a wide array of creative expressions from visual arts and music to traditional crafts, folklore performances, and cultural exhibitions highlighting the richness of Egypt's contemporary cultural scene as well as its heritage

Bernie Sanders fights apathy on American left

Bernie Sanders is emerging as one of the most vocal opponents to US President Donald Trump, with the 83-year-old senator drawing tens of thousands of people to his "fighting oligarchy" rallies around the country.

Supporters packed the Gloria Molina Grand Park in Los Angeles on Saturday as guests including politicians, union representatives and musical acts took to the stage before speeches by Sanders and Democrat representative Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez.

"There are some 36,000 of you, the largest rally that we have ever had," Sanders told the cheering crowd.

"Your presence here today is making Donald Trump and Elon Musk very nervous."

The self-described socialist, an independent who has never been a member of the Democratic Party, has been attracting crowds over the past two months on his nationwide "fighting oligarchy" tour.

His progressive, leftist rhetoric has resonated with people opposed to Trump's policies and with those disappointed in established Democrats' lack of political resistance to Trump. Folk rock legend Neil Young led the LA crowd on Saturday in chanting Take America Back! while he played the electric guitar.

Feminist singer-songwriter Maggie Rogers dubbed the event "Berniechella," a nod to the massive Coachella music festival taking place in the Californian desert.

Alex Powell, a 28-year-old art teacher in the audience, said Americans "need hope."

"I'm really disappointed by the Democrats' response, I want more action on their part, more outrage," she told AFP.

"Donald Trump's new term is distressing, it's really scary," Powell said, describing how some of her middle school pupils were "traumatised" after one of their parents was deported from the United States under Trump's antimmigrant campaign.

Sanders addressed a litany of grievances, including Trump's massive cuts to government funding and threats to healthcare and research.

Mentions of Elon Musk, the owner of Tesla and X, drew boos from the crowd.

The South African billionaire has been tasked by Trump with dramatically reducing government spending, and is for many Sanders supporters a symbol of the corrupting influence of wealth in politics.

Sanders was "right the whole time," 27-year-old Vera Loh told AFP.

"The collusion of money and politics has had terrible effects."

Loh, a housekeeper, said she was stunned by the apathy of many Democrat leaders since Trump's defeat of presidential candidate Kamala Harris in November.

"The party put too much focus on minorities," Loh said. "If people don't see it as a class

war, then we just get lost with the identity politics."

She told AFP she wanted politi-

cians to remember "we want high-

er pay, we want housing, we want to be able to afford things."

"We are living in a moment where a handful of billionaires control the economic and political

life of our country," Sanders said

Trump is moving the United States "rapidly toward an authoritarian form of society," he said.

The senator from Vermont hopes to encourage new independents to run for office without the Democrat label, at a time when the party is at an all-time low in the polls.

Sanders has no ambitions to run for president in 2028, but has taken rising progressive Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez under his wing.

"No matter your race, religion, gender, identity or status, no matter if you disagree with me on some things... I hope you see that this movement is not about partisan labels or purity tests, but it's about class solidarity," the 35-year-old congresswoman told the crowd on Saturday.

"She would make a good presidential candidate," Lesley Henderson, a former Republican supporter, told AFP.

Depressed by the news since January, the 52-year-old nursing assistant was attending the first political rally of her life with her husband. "I just hope it's not too late," she said, alarmed by Trump's talk about ruling an unconstitutional third term.

"If no-one's standing up and saying anything now, what makes us think that there might even be midterms, or a next presidential election?"

Ecuador votes in razor-tight runoff

Cuadorans were voting yesterday in a too-close-to-call presidential election that pits incumbent Daniel Noboa against a charismatic leftist challenger, after a campaign plagued by drug-related violence.

The 37-year-old president narrowly won February's first round, but not by enough to avoid another duel against a resurgent Luisa Gonzalez, who is bidding to become Ecuador's first woman president.

The election has been dominated by anger over the lacklustre economy and cartel violence that has transformed Ecuador from one of the safest countries in Latin America into the most deadly. In the volcanoringed capital Quito, early voters wrapped up against the Andean morning chill and flocked to the polling stations. In total about 13.7mn Ecuadorans are obliged to vote.

to vote.

"I think Ecuador is divided, but I think we all understand we are in a situation where we have to unite, whoever is leading the government" said 21-year-old architecture student Camila Medina. On the eve of the ballot, Noboa declared a 60-day state of emergency in the capital and several provinces, underscoring the tense state of affairs.

This once-peaceful nation averaged a killing every hour at the start of the year, as cartels vied

for control over cocaine routes that pass through Ecuador's ports. Noboa, the guitar-strumming son of a billionaire banana magnate, has staked his political fortunes on "iron fist" security policies designed to snuff out the

He has deployed the military to the streets, captured drug capos and invited the United States to send special forces.

By contrast, 47-year-old single mother Gonzalez has pitched herself as a political everywoman, born to a humble family and laser-focused on improving the lot of poor Ecuadorans.

She may have a growing constituency. Rampant bloodshed has spooked investors and tourists alike, fuelling economic malaise and swelling the ranks of Ecuador's poor to 28% of the population. Ecuador faces two very different paths depending on which candidate wins.

A Noboa win would likely see him double down on hardline security policies and further nurture a budding bromance with US President Donald Trump.

If Gonzalez wins, it would signal a sharp shift to the left and a likely cooling of Ecuador's relations with the United States.

Gonzalez is closely allied with ex-president Rafael Correa, who delighted in lobbing barbs at Washington during his decade in office. He now lives in exile in Belgium, avoiding a corruption conviction he claims is politically motivated. He remains a deeply polarising figure in his homeland.

Separatists kill 8 Pakistanis in Iran

Separatists killed eight Pakistanis in Iran, Islamabad said yesterday, across the border from Pakistan's Balochistan province where there are regular deadly attacks.

Pakistan has been battling a decades-long insurgency in Balochistan, which militant groups claim is being exploited by outsiders, with wealth from its natural resources syphoned off with little benefit to the local population. Pakistani Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif yesterday condemned the "brutal killings of eight Pakistanis", calling on Tehran to "immediately arrest the culprits, give them appropriate punishment, and make the reasons behind this brutal act public". The Baloch Nationalist Army (BNA), a Pakistani separatist group, and Jaish al-Adl (Arabic for Army of Justice), a Baloch jihadist group that is based in Pakistan but is also active in Iran, claimed responsibility for the attack. The eight men killed were from Pakistan's most populous province, Punjab, according to the Associated Press of Pakistan news agency.

Armed separatists in the area have in recent months intensified attacks on workers from other provinces, particularly Punjabis who are viewed as having strong links to the military.

Russian strike on Ukraine's Sumy city centre kills 34

Russian missile strike yesterday in the city centre of Ukraine's city of Sumy killed at least 34 people, Kyiv said, with European and US officials condemning the attack — one of the deadliest in months.

Kyiv said Moscow hit the northeastern city, close to the Russian border, with two ballistic missiles yesterday morning and that the attack also wounded nearly 120 people.

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky, stressing that the attack occurred on Palm Sunday, flayed the attack.

US President Donald Trump's special envoy to Ukraine, retired lieutenant general Keith Kellogg, said on X that the attack by Russian forces on civilian targets "crosses any line of decency".

The strike came two days after US envoy Steve Witkoff travelled to Russia to meet with President Vladimir Putin and push Trump's efforts to end the war.

The local emergency service in its latest bulletin that 34 people died, including two children, and 117 were wounded, including 15 children.

and 117 were wounded, including 15 children. That revised upwards a previous toll of 32 dead and 99 wounded.

Bodies were seen covered in silver sheets at the scene of the strike in the centre of the city, with a destroyed trolleybus. Rescuers worked through the rubble of a building.

The head of Ukraine's GUR military intelligence, Kyrylo Budanov, said on Telegram that Russia used two Iskander-M/KN-23 ballistic missiles on Sumy.

One woman told AFP she heard two explosions.

"A lot of people were very badly injured. A lot of corpses," she said, struggling to speak. It was the second Russian attack this month to

cause a large civilian death toll.

Trump has previously voiced anger at Moscow for "bombing like crazy" in Ukraine.

Zelensky called on the United States and Europe to give a "strong response" to Russia, adding: "Talking has never stopped ballistic missiles and bombs."

French leader Emmanuel Macron said the strike showed Russia's "blatant disregard for human lives, international law and the diplomatic efforts of President Trump".

British Prime Minister Keir Starmer said he was "appalled" by the attack, which Italian counterpart Giorgia Meloni described as a "cowardly" act by Russia.

The fact the bloodshed fell on Palm Sunday outraged several leaders.

It was "a barbaric attack, made even more vile as people gathered peacefully to celebrate Palm Sunday," European Commission chief Ursula von der Leyen said on X.

on der Leyen said on X. "The Russian version of a ceasefire. Bloody Palm Sunday," said Polish Prime Minister Donald Tusk, while Danish leader Mette Frederiksen said the "missile attack on civilians gathered on Palm Sunday... shows Russia's true face". German Foreign Minister Annalena Baerbock

said the killing "as many people made their way to prayer on Palm Sunday" demonstrated that "Putin underscores with blood that he seeks not peace but destruction".

Dutch premier Dick Schoof urged more air de-

Dutch premier Dick Schoof urged more air defences "so that Ukraine can defend itself against this violence".

Russia did not immediately comment on the strike. Moscow has refused a US-proposed unconditional ceasefire in Ukraine.

Local authorities in Sumy published footage of bodies strewn on the street and people running for safety, with cars on fire and wounded civilians on the ground.

Trump plans separate levy on exempted electronics

US Commerce Secretary Howard Lutnick said yesterday that smartphones, computers and some other electronics, just exempted from steep tariffs on imports from China, would face separate new duties along with semiconductors within the next two months.

Lutnick's comments on ABC's *This Week* on critical technology products were the latest twist in President Donald Trump's tariff plans, which have upended the global trading order and roiled financial markets since they were announced on April 2, which Trump branded as "Liberation Day."

Late on Friday the Trump administration

granted exclusions from the steep reciprocal tariffs on smartphones and a set of other electronics products, which was seen as a big break for technology firms such as Apple and Dell Technologies that rely on imports from China. Lutnick's comments yesterday suggested that reprieve won't last long.

Trump's back-and-forth on tariffs has ratcheted

Trump's back-and-forth on tariffs has ratcheted up the uncertainty faced by investors and businesses, prompting the wildest swings on Wall Street since the Covid pandemic of 2020. The benchmark Standard & Poor's 500 index is down more than 10% since Trump took office on January 20. Lutnick said Trump would enact "a special focus-type of tariff" on smartphones, computers and other electronics products in a month or two, alongside sectoral tariffs targeting semiconductors and pharmaceuticals. The new duties would fall outside Trump's so-called reciprocal tariffs, under which levies on Chinese imports climbed to 125% this week, he said.

"He's saying they're exempt from the reciprocal tariffs, but they're included in the semiconductor tariffs, which are coming in probably a month or two," Lutnick said in the interview on ABC, predicting that the levies would bring production of those products to the United States. "These are things that are national security, that

Lutnick's comments appeared to go beyond what was communicated on Saturday, when a White House official told media that Trump would launch a new national security trade investigation into semiconductors soon that could lead to other new tariffs.

to 125% on Friday in response. Yesterday, before Lutnick's comments, China said it was evaluating the impact of the exclusions for the technology products implemented late on Friday. "The bell on a tiger's neck can only be untied by the person who tied it," China's Ministry of Commerce said.

Billionaire investor Bill Ackman, who endorsed Trump's run for president but who has criticised the tariffs, on Sunday called on him to pause the broad and steep reciprocal tariffs on China for three months, as Trump did for most countries last week.

If Trump paused Chinese tariffs for 90 days and cut them to 10% temporarily, "he would achieve the same objective in causing US businesses to relocate their supply chains from China without the disruption and risk," Ackman wrote on X. Sven Henrich, founder and lead market strategist for NorthmanTrader, was harshly critical

of how the tariff issue was being handled yesterday.

"Sentiment check: The biggest rally of the year would come on the day Lutnick gets fired," Henrich wrote on X. "I suggest the administration figures out who controls the message, whatever it is, as it changes every day. US business can't plan or invest with the constant back and forth." US Senator Elizabeth Warren, a Democrat, criticised the latest revision to Trump's tariff plan, which economists have warned could dent economic growth and fuel inflation.
"There is no tariff policy — only chaos and cor-

ruption" Warren said on ABC's *This Week*. In a notice to shippers late on Friday, the US Customs and Border Protection agency published a list of tariff codes excluded from the import taxes. It featured 20 product categories, including computers, laptops, disc drives, semiconductor devices, memory chips and flat panel displays. For the Chinese imports, the exclusion of the tech products applies only to Trump's reciprocal tariffs, which reached 125% this week. Trump's prior 20% duties on all Chinese imports that he said were related to the fentanyl crisis

In an interview on NBC's Meet the Press, White House trade adviser Peter Navarro said the United States has opened an invitation to China to negotiate, but he criticised China's connection to the lethal fentanyl supply chain and did not include it on a list of seven entities — the United Kingdom, the European Union, India, Japan, South Korea, Indonesia and Israel — with which he said the administration was in talks.


