# Kahramaa inks contracts worth QR3.1bn to boost electricity infrastructure

QNA

General Electricity and Water Corp (Kahramaa) has signed conworth about QR3.1bn with four companies to boost Qatar's electricity infrastructure.

HE the Minister of State for Energy Affairs Saad bin Sherida al-Kaabi attended the signing of four strategic contracts with Elsewedy Cables Qatar Company (Qatar), Voltage Engineering Ltd Co WLL (Qatar), Best and Betash Consortium (Turkive), and Taihan Cable & Solution (South Korea).

Under the new deals, seven high-voltage substations will be set up and 212km-long underground cables and overhead lines will be provided to connect the substations.

Senior Kahramaa executives

and representatives of the participating companies were also

present. HE al-Kaabi hailed Kahramaa's efforts in meeting the growing electricity requirements saying: "Today's signings are a reflection of our commitment to implement effective and comprehensive plans for our strategic projects that would ensure our network's continued and sustainable ability to accommodate the unprecedented growth of the power sector and meet the increasing electricity demand".

Kahramaa President Abdulla bin Ali al-Theyab affirmed that the signing of these contracts is an important move towards further developing Oatar's electricity networks infrastructure.

"We are proud to collaborate with highly qualified national and international companies, and to stress our commitment to strengthening strategic partnerships and supporting the local economy. The awarding of the largest share of these contracts to Oatari companies reflects our great confidence in the capabilities of the local private sector and its pivotal role in achieving our development vision and achieving Qatar National Vision 2030,"

Under these contracts, these companies will undertake the construction of electrical substations and the connection of cables and overhead lines, as well as the development of some existing substations to increase their capacity.

In line with Kahramaa's policy of encouraging Qatari companies and in accordance with the state's strategies to promote the private sector, the share of Oatari companies accounts for 58.4% (QR1.8bn) of the total value of these strategic contracts.




## **Deputy Amir chairs QU Board meeting**

#### **US, Israel bomb Houthi targets**

Yemen's Houthis said the United States and Israel struck the port of Hodeida yesterday, hours after a reported US air raid on Sanaa and a day after the Iran-backed rebels targeted Israel's main airport. The Houthi-run Al-Masirah television said that "US-Israeli aggression targets with six strikes the port of Hodeida" on Yemen's western coast, also reporting "US-Israeli aggression on the Bajil district" in the same province. #### Syria state TV relaunched

## Gazans struggling to survive as Israel plans for 'conquest'

srael's plan for the "conquest" of Gaza has sparked renewed fears, but for many of the territory's residents, the most immediate threat to their lives remains the spectre of famine amid a months-long Israeli blockade.

The plan to expand military operations, approved by Israel's security cabinet overnight, includes holding territories in the besieged Gaza Strip and moving the population south "for their protection", an Israeli official

But Gaza residents said that they did not expect the new offensive would make any significant changes to the already dire humanitarian situation in the small coastal territory.

"Israel has not stopped the war, the killing, the bombing, the destruction, the siege, and the starvation - every day - so how can they talk about expanding military operations?" Awni Awad, 39, told AFP.

Awad, who lives in a tent in the southern Gaza city of Khan Younis after being displaced by Israeli evacuation orders, said that his situation was already "catastrophic and tragic".

"I call on the world to witness the famine that grows and spreads every day," he said.

The UN's World Food Programme (WFP) in late April said it had depleted all its foods stocks in Gaza due to Israel's blockade

## US will help on food: Trump

**President Donald Trump** repeated a US pledge to help get food to Palestinians in Gaza when he was asked at the White House yesterday about Israeli plans for an expanded offensive in the territory. Trump did not offer his views on Israel's operations. (Reuters)

on all supplies since March 2. Aya al-Skafy, a resident of Gaza City, told AFP her baby died because of malnutrition and medicine shortages last week.

Umm Hashem al-Sagga, another Gaza City resident, fears her five-year-old son might face a similar fate, but is powerless to do anything about it.

"There is no food, no medicine, and no nutritional supplements. The markets are empty of food, and the government clinics and pharmacies have nothing."

Gaza City resident Mohammed al-Shawa, 65, said that Israel's new military roadmap changes little as it already controls most of Gaza.

The UN's Office for the Co-ordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) estimates that 69% of Gaza has now been either incorporated into one of Israel's buffer zones, or is subject to evacuation orders.

That number rises to 100% in the southern governorate of Rafah, where over 230,000 people lived before the war but which has now been entirely declared a no-go zone.

## Israel dragging US into disaster in region: Iran

> ran's Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi yesterday accused Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu of attempting to drag the United States into "disaster" in the Middle East, warning against any attempt to attack Iran.

"Netanyahu is directly MED-DLING within the US Government to DRAG it into another DISAS-TER in our region," Araghchi said on X, warning against "ANY mistake against Iran".

Araghchi also accused Netanyahu of "attempting to brazenly DICTATE what President (Donald) Trump can and cannot do in his diplomacy with Iran".

Iran's top diplomat cited US support for Israel in its war in Gaza against Palestinian resistance group Hamas.

It also referred to the US retaliatory strikes against the Tehranbacked Houthi rebels in Yemen, who have been targeting Israel and Red Sea shipping throughout the

"LETHAL support for Netanyahu's Genocide in Gaza and waging WAR on behalf of Netanyahu in Yemen have achieved NOTHING for the American people," he said.

On Sunday, Netanyahu blamed Iran and vowed retaliation after the Houthis launched a missile which struck in the area of Israel's Ben Gurion International Airport.

Iran denied any role in the at-Araghchi's remarks also came after the postponement of the lat-

est round of nuclear talks with the

US, which were scheduled for Saturday, with mediator Oman citing "logistical reasons".

The two countries have held three rounds of discussions since April 12, their highest-level contact since Washington withdrew from a landmark deal with Tehran in 2018, during Trump's first term as US president.

Netanyahu has called for dismantling Iran's nuclear programme, saying a credible deal must "remove Iran's capacity to enrich uranium for nuclear weapons" and prevent the development of ballistic missiles.

On Sunday, Trump said he would only accept "the total dismantlement" of Iran's nuclear programme, but also signalled openness to discussing one for ci-

"Now, there's a new theory going out there that Iran would be allowed to have civilian - meaning to make electricity," he told NBC News, adding that he "would be open to hearing" the argument.

Yesterday, Araghchi urged the US to move away from "unrealistic and illogical" positions in order to reach a deal.

In a phone call with EU foreign policy chief Kaja Kallas, Araghchi said Tehran is capable of addressing concerns "related to the possibility of Iran acquiring nuclear weapons", noting that "reaching an agreement is fully within

The Iranian foreign minister also expressed Tehran's willingness to resume diplomatic talks with Britain, France, and Germany, all parties to the collapsed 2015 nuclear deal.



# Shura Council clears draft law on combating doping in sports

The Shura Council held its weekly meeting yesterday, under the chairmanship of its Speaker HE Hassan bin Abdulla al-Ghanem. During the session, the Council approved a draft law on combating doping in sports and referred it to the esteemed government after having reviewed the report of the Education, Culture, Sports, and Information Affairs Committee and discussing its details with the members.

The Council also reviewed the esteemed government's statement regarding the Shura Council's proposals on reorganising and monitoring domestic worker recruitment offices. The Council decided to refer it to the Social Affairs, Labour, and Housing Committee for study and to report back on its findings.

The Shura Council had discussed the aforementioned topic in previous sessions and con-

cluded by submitting a proposal to the esteemed government, which included the Council's views on the matter. Moreover, the council reviewed two reports on its participation in two parliamentary events: the meeting of the Coalition of Women Parliamentarians from Arab Countries to Combat Violence against Women, held via videoconferencing in November 2024, and the 37th meeting of the Executive Committee of the Arab Inter-Parliamentary Union (AIPU), held in Cairo last February.

At the end of the session, HE al-Ghanem briefed the members on his participation, leading the Council's delegation to the 38th Conference of the AIPU, which concluded yesterday in Algeria under the theme "The Role of the AIPU in Light of Regional and International Changes".

He explained that the conference discussed the challenges facing the region, as well as a number of issues and challenges facing the Arab nation, foremost among

them the Palestinian cause and the tragic developments it is witnessing in light of the ongoing attacks against the brotherly Palestinian people in the Gaza Strip and the rest of the occupied Palestinian territories. HE al-Ghanem also noted that the conference issued a final statement praising the prominent role played by Qatar in supporting the Palestinian cause, appreciating its efforts to continue delivering humanitarian and relief aid to the Gaza Strip.

HE the Speaker said that the Union, in his statement, also welcomed the memorandum submitted by Qatar to the International Court of Justice regarding its request for an advisory opinion on Israel's obligations regarding the presence and activities of the UN, other international organisations, and third states. He emphasised the importance of this memorandum in supporting relief and humanitarian organisations and ensuring a decent living for the Palestinian people.



# The Maze: new novel to be launched by Qatari Abdulrahim al-Siddiqi

he Maze a new fiction from the Qatari Novel Library is to be launched by the Qatari author Abdulrahim al-Siddiqi at the Doha International Book Fair (DIBF).


Regarding the reason for choosing The Maze as the title for his latest book, Al-Siddiqi said that the Maze is not just a place, but rather a mental and emotional state experienced by the hero, which is reflected in everyone around him.

Al-Siddigi explained that the novel represents a person's journey within themselves, lost between memory and reality, love and betrayal, truth and doubt.

He continued: "The novel tells the story of Talal, who experiences a psychological struggle with his fragmented past and a mind filled with gaps."

He pointed to the interweaving of scenes of love, betrayal, murder, and Alzheimer's disease in a circular narrative that raises questions about who is the victim. Who is the killer? And is the Maze located outside or inside? Regarding the novel's broad outlines, al-Siddiqi emphasised that his new novel is built on two axes: memory and identity. He noted that it poses an existential question: What if it's your memory that has betrayed you, not your feelings?

He emphasised that the novel's message is



that nothing is as it seems; the Maze may be more within us than it is on the city streets.

Al-Siddiqi explained that there are personal motivations behind this novel, indicating that the first is artistic, represented by the desire to break with the traditional pattern of narrative fiction. The second is human, represented by writing about those we judge without understanding them. He pointed to the character of Talal, which he described as a character charged with connotations, belonging to the "gray area."





## Sidra study pioneers genome assembly approach for rare disease research

Researchers at Sidra Medicine, a member of Qatar Foundation, have led a landmark study, published in Nature Genetics, unlocking the genetic causes of difficult-to-resolve rare diseases from diverse Middle Eastern populations.

The study entitled "Near-complete Middle Eastern genomes refine autozygosity and enhance disease-causing and population-specific variant discovery" leverages state-of-the-art de novo genome assembly and long-read sequencing. It also provides a crucial reference resource for precision medicine and population genetics, seeking to address critical gaps in global genomic studies.

De novo genome assembly is a sophisticated computational

technique that constructs entire genetic sequences from scratch rather than relying on pre-existing genome references. By using cutting-edge long-read sequencing technology, which reads large sections of DNA without fragmentation, Sidra Medicine's study delivers the first genome maps with unprecedented completeness and accuracy from the region. The approach enhances the identification of both disease-causing mutations and natural genetic variation.

Head of Medical and Population Genomics and Director of the Neuroscience Research Program at Sidra Medicine, Prof Younes Mokrab, who led the study said: "We used long-read sequencing to gain deep insights into the genomes of Middle Eastern families affected by rare diseases, proving that de novo assembly can uncover pathogenic variants that have remained elusive for years. We also



provide a valuable genome reference for the region. This is a gamechanger for precision medicine in the region, ensuring that our populations are no longer overlooked in genomic research."

The study characterised six Middle Eastern families from Qatar, Sudan, Jordan, Syria and Afghanistan, affected by previously unresolved neurodevelopmental disorders. This resulted in one of the region's most refined genomic datasets to date. The high-quality,

phased genome assemblies obtained, involving fully mapped maternal and paternal DNA sequences, serve as a critical resource for improving clinical diagnostics and advancing rare disease

For his part, Prof Evan Eichler, Professor of Genome Sciences at the University of Washington, USA and co-author of the study, added: "The study is exciting because it works toward understanding the full spectrum of genetic variants underlying disease which will be important for both pathogenic variant discovery and understanding patient phenotypic variability. The approach represents the future of clinical research. Every family with an unsolved case of developmental delay deserves this type of workup." Despite advances in human genetics, many populations are still under-represented in existing genome references.

existing genome references.

Sidra Medicine's study highlights the effectiveness of longread sequencing in creating accurate genome assemblies, which can improve the identification of disease-causing mutations and enhance ancestry-informed analyses. Chief Research Officer at Sidra Medicine and co-author, Prof Khalid Fakhro said: "Sidra Medicine has led regional advancements in genomic research for over a decade. Our latest findings demonstrate that cutting-edge

long-read sequencing technologies are becoming an essential tool for genetic discovery and precision medicine. The ability to identify disease-causing variants previously missed in standard genome references is a major breakthrough for clinical genomics."

The study's novel genetic se-

The study's novel genetic sequences will also contribute to understanding human migration and Middle Eastern population structure, offering insights into evolutionary and anthropological research. In turn, Director of Research and Partnerships at Qatar Precision Health Institute, Dr Hamdi Mbarak said: "As we release a new cohort of over 25,000 whole genomes from Qatar, the arrival of high-quality genome references tailored to Middle Eastern ancestries is both timely and critical. This will help us elucidate population-specific genetic variation and its impact on health and disease."

## Norwegian NGO decries Israel plan to take over Gaza aid

n Israeli plan to take over the distribution of humanitarian aid to Gaza at hubs controlled by the military is "fundamentally against humanitarian principles", the head of the Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC) said yesterday.

Israel's security cabinet said there was "currently enough food" in the territory which has been under full Israeli blockade since March 2, and approved overnight the "possibility of humanitarian distribution" in Gaza.

"We cannot and will not do something which is fundamentally against humanitarian principles," Jan Egeland said.

He said "the United Nations

agencies, all other international humanitarian groups and NGOs have said no to be part of this idea coming from the Israeli cabinet and from the Israeli military."

Israel has accused Hamas of diverting humanitarian aid which Hamas denies - and said its blockade was necessary to pressure the group to release Israeli hostages.

Egeland said the Israeli gov-

ernment wanted to "militarise, manipulate, politicise the aid by allowing only aid to a few concentration hubs in the south, a scheme where people will be screened, where it's a completely inoperable system."

"That would force people to move to get aid, and it would continue the starvation of the civilian population," he said, adding: "We will have no part in that."

"If one side in a bitter armed conflict tries to control, manipulate, ration aid among the civilians on the other side, it is against everything we stand for," he stressed.

Meanwhile, the UN's Office for the Co-ordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA), said the Israeli scheme "will mean large parts of Gaza, including the less mobile and most vulnerable people, will continue to go without supplies." International aid organisations as well as Palestinians in Gaza have for weeks warned of a dire humanitarian situation on the ground.

The UN's World Food Programme (WFP) has said it has depleted its food stocks and that the 25 bakeries it supports in Gaza have closed due to a lack of

# Israeli strikes target Yemen's Hodeidah

The Israeli military said it carried out air strikes against Yemen's Hodeidah Port yesterday, a day after the Houthis fired a missile that struck near Israel's main airport.

The military said in a statement that it attacked what it called Houthi "fighter" targets in Hodeidah and its vicinity.

"The attack was carried out in response to repeated attacks carried out by the Houthi regime against the State of Israel in which surface-to-surface missiles and unmanned aircraft were launched at the territory of the state and its citizens," it said.

More than 10 strikes targeted

Hodeidah Port and the Al Salakhanah and Al Hawak neighbourhoods in Hodeidah City, five residents told Reuters. Four strikes also targeted a cement factory east of Hodeidah.

The port is the second-largest in the Red Sea after Aden and is the entry point for about 80% of Yemen's food imports.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu vowed to retaliate for Sunday's missile attack, which was the first known to have escaped interception by Israel's air defences in a series of attacks since March. The Houthis, who control Yemen, have been firing at Israel and shipping in the Red Sea since the beginning of the war between Israel and Hamas in Gaza, in what they say is solidarity with the Palestinians. A US official speaking on condition of anonymity said that US forces were not actively involved in yesterday's strikes, but there is general co-ordination between the two allies.

Meanwhile, an oil company operated by the Houthis announced it has begun operating an emergency system with regards to supplying cars with fuel, owing to difficulties in unloading cargo at the oil port of Ras Isa.

The company, in a statement, attributed the decision to US strikes on the country, including the port. US President Donald Trump in March ordered largescale strikes against the Houthis saying it was meant to reduce their capabilities and deter them from targeting commercial shipping in the Red Sea. The strikes have killed hundreds of people in Yemen.

## Francis's popemobile converted into clinic for Gazan children

efore his death, Pope Francis donated one of his popemobiles to be converted into a children's clinic in war-torn Gaza, Catholic charity Caritas said yes-

The iconic open-sided vehicle, designed to allow the pontiff to greet crowds of well-wishers, has been transferred to Caritas Jerusalem and will head to Gaza if and when Israel opens a humanitarian corridor.

The car, a converted Mitsubishi, was used by the pope during a 2014 visit to Bethlehem and had since

been on display, gathering dust and rust. It has now been repaired and refurbished as a mobile clinic.

"With the vehicle, we will be able to reach children who today have no access to healthcare children who are injured and malnourished," said Peter Brune, secretary general of Caritas Sweden. Brune said that Sweden's Cardinal Anders Arborelius had asked the late pope, who died on April 21 aged 88, that the spare vehicle be put to use providing essential frontline healthcare to Palestinian children. It will be fitted with medical equipment and a fridge for medicines and be assigned a driver and a team of doctors. "This vehicle represents the love, care and closeness shown by His Holiness for the most vulnerable, which he expressed throughout the crisis," said Anton Asfar, secretary-general of Caritas Terusalem.

It was not clear, however, if or when the aid agency's hoped-for humanitarian corridor would open.

Israel resumed major operations across Gaza on March 18 amid political deadlock over how to build on a two-month ceasefire in its war against Hamas, which was sparked by the fighters' storming of Israel in October 2023. Yesterday, Israel's security cabinet approved an expansion of military operations that would lead to what an official described as the "conquest" of the Palestinian territory.

# **QPC** honours Gaza journalists' sacrifices

The Qatar Press Center (QPC) organised a symposium titled "Journalists in Gaza: Martyrs and Witnesses" as part of the Press Council ses-

The session was held to commemorate World Press Freedom Day. Palestinian journalist Tamer al-Mashal, known for his investigative reports, spoke about the reality of journalistic work in Gaza and the conditions journalists face under the occupation and recurring wars. The session was moderated by journalist Abdullah al-Musalmani.

Tamer al-Mashal emphasised that what is happening in Gaza is a redefinition of the concept of press freedom, the journalist, and the ethics and standards of the profession. He pointed out that what has been happening in Gaza for more than 18 months is nothing short of a massacre. Some 216 Palestinian journalists have been killed and assassinated, and 409 Palestinian journalists have been injured.

He added: "The Israeli occupation has arrested 48 Palestinian journalists who remain missing in prisons, with nothing known about their conditions except for what leaks from some released prisoners."

He said: "The Israeli occupation forces annihilated 28 families of journalists, in addition to directly targeting and completely destroying 44 homes of journal-

Regarding the issue of press and media institutions, Al-Mashal confirmed that 23 d

media outlets, 11 radio stations, 16 satellite channel headquarters, and 27 other media institutions were destroyed in Gaza.

Al-Mashal questioned the celebration of media freedom and the double standards in light of what is happening in Gaza. He said: "The occupation seeks to turn Gaza into a graveyard for journalists."

Al-Mashal spoke about the Israeli forces' sniper fire on all the surveillance cameras installed in front of the Al Jazeera office building in central Gaza, preventing any images from being released.

Al-Mashal recalled the targeting of colleagues Wael al-Dahdouh, Samer Abu Daqqa, Ahmed al-Louh, Hussam Shabat, and their families, emphasising that assassination is a crime, but the greater crime is justifying the assassination.

Al-Mashal explained that the world is witnessing complex crimes that justify the assassination of journalists who do not belong to armed groups, noting that the occupation's fabrications reflect incitement and justification for its ongoing crimes.

He emphasised that Gaza's

journalists are heroes who have redefined the concept of journalism, because the occupying power has been unable to prevent the spread of images, information, and truth.

Al-Mashal said: "Unfortu-nately, the United Nations has not protected the people in order to protect journalists in Gaza." He emphasised that Gaza is a very serious wound. People are being killed in tents and on live television, with no support.

Al-Mashal said: "The targeting of journalists, people, and stones did not begin on October 7, but rather began with the occupation. People in Gaza have been without food or drink for weeks. Elderly people are being killed right in front of their tents." He emphasised that this is not humane. "Now, in this war, we are facing a test of conscience, humanity, morals, journalism, and freedom of the press."

He said: "We realise that the pulse of the people, the pulse of the street, and the pulse of the free people of the world is with Palestine. Al Jazeera has done a tremendous job in conveying the truth to the world, despite the great sacrifices?

Amnesty International called on all international actors, particularly the European Union, to take serious steps to stop Israel's genocide against Palestinians in the Gaza Strip. whether through the use of military weapons or starvation policies that have rendered the Strip "completely foodless." In a press statement, Amnesty International Secretary-General Agnes Callamard called on all relevant parties to pressure Israel to allow the entry of food,

Gaza Strip, and to work to hold accountable those responsible for genocide and war crimes. She spoke about the deteriorating humanitarian situation in Gaza, based on her observations and field monitoring of the ongoing 19-month war of extermination, which has intensified with Israel's imposition of a comprehensive blockade on the Palestinian Strip since March 2. In this context, Callamard noted the "alarm bells" in the Gaza Strip due to the depletion of food and all essentials of life, especially after Israel resumed its war of extermination last March.

She said, "We know that people are suffering from severe shortages of food, water, and medicine. The World Food Organisation, the World Health Organisation, and all other UN and humanitarian organisations are sounding the alarm: There is no more food in Gaza.'

## Missing Uganda opposition activist charged and remanded: lawyer

leader Bobi Wine and his lawyer said.

Eddie Mutwe, whose real name is Edward Ssebuufu, and who also acts as the chief bodyguard for Bobi Wine, went missing on April 27 after being grabbed close to the capital Kampala by armed men, according to his party, the National Unity Platform.

In a series of posts on X last

week, Muhoozi Kainerugaba, Uganda's military chief and son of Uganda's long-serving President Yoweri Museveni, said he had captured Mutwe "like a grasshopper", was holding him in his basement and threatened violence against him. Kainerugaba is widely seen as being groomed to succeed his 80-year-old father who has ruled Uganda since 1986.

## Armed bandits kill 19, rustle livestock in northeast Nigeria

At least 19 people were killed in a suspected bandit ambush and livestock rustling operation in Bauchi state, northeast Nigeria, the police and residents said

Bauchi police command said in a statement that the attack took place early on Sunday morning when a local security patrol in Gwana district was ambushed. The police said civilians from a nearby village were also killed while attempting to flee the attack. "A team of operational tactical teams was dispatched to the scene, where they recovered bodies of casualties," Bauchi police commissioner

Sani-Omolori Aliyu said in the statement. Gangs of heavily armed men, have wreaked havoc across northwest Nigeria in recent years, kidnapping thousands, killing hundreds and making it unsafe to travel by road or farm in some areas. Ibrahim Hussaini, an eyewitness, said a gun battle ensued between the security team and the bandits which caused multiple fatalities among the vigilante team and some residents. The attackers rustled a large number of cattle and sheep from the district after overpowering the local security team, said Mohammed Umar, a vigilante. (Reuters)

## Kenya police officers plead not guilty over baby's death in 2017 poll unrest

our Kenyan police officers pleaded not guilty yesterday to the killing of a sixmonth-old girl during bloody riots that erupted over a presidential election in 2017.

The death of Samantha Pendo became for many Kenyans a symbol of unchecked police brutality during the disputed election, the first in the country's history to be annulled.

Murder, abuse and torture charges against civilians were read out to the four officers in a Nairobi court vesterday. They pleaded not guilty to all counts. The charges against seven others were dropped by the prosecutor at the last minute."At least now I know that the justice I was crying for from the beginning, I am going to get it," Samantha's father Joseph Oloo Abanja told reporters outside the court. Samantha died after she was allegedly beaten by police officers during a raid on her house as protests flared in the western city of Kisumu.

On the day of the incident, police allegedly fired tear gas into their house and battered down the door before raining blows on the couple with batons while the

mother held Samantha in her arms. An autopsy showed that she suffered acute head injuries. The case has dragged on, with

repeated court delays and the disappearance of one of the main suspects nearly five years ago. "Today I felt good," Samantha's

mother Lensa Achieng said. "It has not been an easy journey

for us. Because each time this case comes up, we always feel traumatised," she said.

Amnesty International's Kenya director Irungu Houghton said the case was setting a precedent in the country that "elections should not come with death, trauma and injuries". But Amnesty joined 29

Samsung becomes the second major foreign company in recent months to challenge an Indian tax demand. Volkswagen has sued the government in court for a record demand of \$1.4bn for misclassifying its component imports.

In the Samsung case, tax authorities in January asked Samsung to pay \$520mn for evading the 10-20% tariffs by misclassifying imports of a key mobile tower equipment, which it then sold to billionaire Mukesh Ambani's telecom giant, Reliance Jio, from 2018-2021.

In its 281-page challenge at the Customs Excise and Service Tax

Appellate Tribunal in Mumbai, Samsung said Indian authorities for being "fully aware" of the business model as Reliance had a "long-established practice" of importing the same equipment without any tariff payments for three years until 2017.

Samsung's India unit says it discovered during an Indian tax investigation that Reliance had been warned about the practice way back in 2017, but Reliance did not inform the South Korean company about it and tax officials never questioned Samsung. "The classification adopted by the appellant (Samsung) was known to the authorities, however the same was never questioned... The department was fully aware," Samsung said in its April

17 filing. "Reliance Jio officials did not inform" Samsung about the tax warning of 2017, it added.

Samsung and India's tax authority did not respond to queries.

Further details of Reliance's 2017 warning from tax authorities are not public and were not disclosed in the Samsung filing. Reliance didn't respond to queries.

# India 'starts work on hydro projects after suspending treaty with Pakistan'

India has begun work to boost reservoir holding capacity at two hydroelectric projects in Kashmir, sources with knowledge of the matter said, after fresh tension with Pakistan led it to suspend a watersharing pact.

The work represents the first tangible step by India to operate outside agreements covered by the Indus Waters Treaty, unbroken since 1960 despite three wars and several other conflicts between the the two countries

Last month, however, New Delhi suspended the pact that ensures supply to 80% of Pakistani farms after an attack in Kashmir killed 26, and it identified two of the three assailants as Pakistani.

Islamabad has threatened international legal action over the suspension and denied any role in the attack, warning, "any attempt to stop or divert the flow of water belonging to Pakistan... will be considered as an act of war".

A "reservoir flushing" process to remove sediment began on Thursday, carried out by India's biggest hydropower company, state-run NHPC Ltd, and authorities in the federal territory of Jammu and Kashmir, the three sources said.

The process initially results in sediment-laden waters being re-

leased downstream from the reservoirs, potentially causing sudden inundation, followed by a reduced flow of water as the reservoirs are

refilled, one of the sources said.

The work may not immediately threaten supply to Pakistan, which depends on rivers flowing through India for much of its irrigation and hydropower, but it could eventually be affected if other projects launch similar efforts.

There are more than half a dozen such projects in the region.

India did not inform Pakistan about the work at the Salal and Baglihar projects, which is being done for the first time since they were built in 1987 and 2008-09, respectively, as the treaty had blocked such work, the sources added.

They spoke on condition of anonymity as they were not authorised to talk to the media.

India's NHPC and the neighbouring governments did not reply to emails seeking comment.

The flushing operation ran for three days from May 1, the sources said. "This is the first time such an exercise has taken place and will help in more efficient power generation and prevent damage to turbines," one of the sources said. "We were also asked to open the adjustable gates for cleaning, which we did from May 1," the source said, adding that the effort aimed to free dam operation from any restrictions.

eration from any restrictions.

People living on the banks of the

Chenab river in Kashmir said they noticed water had been released from both Salal and Baglihar dams from Thursday to Saturday. Videos shared by locals show some sections of the river in full flow while others were partly blocked by massive sediment deposits.

The flushing of hydropower projects requires nearly emptying a reservoir to force out sediments whose build-up is a major cause of decline in output.

For example, two of the sources said, power delivered by the 690-MegaWatt Salal project was far below its capacity, because Pakistan had prevented such flushing, while silting also hit output at the 900MW Baglihar project.

"Flushing is not a common thing because it leads to a lot of water wastage," said one of the sources. "Downstream countries are expected to be informed in case it leads to any inundation."

Building both projects had required extensive back and forth with Pakistan, which worries about losing out on its share of water.

Under the 1960 treaty, which split the Indus and its tributaries between the neighbours, India had also shared data such as hydrological flows at various spots on the rivers flowing through India and issued flood warnings.

India's water minister has vowed

to "ensure no drop of the Indus river's water reaches Pakistan".

# Putin accepts Modi's invitation to visit India

Russian President Vladimir Putin has accepted an invitation from Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi to visit the country, the Kremlin said yesterday.

The Kremlin yesterday called for de-escalation between India and Pakistan.

"We hope that the parties will be able to take measures (...) that will reduce tensions," Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters, adding that "we are following with great concern the tense atmosphere that has developed on the border".

Putin told Modi during the phone call that the "particularly privileged partnership" between Moscow and Delhi was "not subject to external influence and continues to develop dynamically in all areas", the Kremlin said in a statement.

Moscow last week said it was ready to mediate after Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov held calls with both sides last week.

Russia has historically had close ties to India, dating back to the Soviet Union, and is the country's biggest weapons supplier.

"India is our strategic partner. Pakistan is also our partner. We value our relations with both Delhi and Islamabad," Peskov said.

Meanwhile, Iran's Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi will visit India on Thursday, its embassy in New Delhi said, days after visiting Pakistan where he held talks with senior government officials.

Iran has offered to act as a mediator between India and Pakistan as tensions between the two neighbours surge after an attack in Kashmir.

# Fourteen children arrested in UK after bov dies in fire

British police have said 14 children aged between 11 and 14 were arrested in a northeastern English town after a teenage boy died in a fire at an industrial park. Eleven boys and three girls were arrested on suspicion of manslaughter, Northumbria police said.

The victim was confirmed as

14-year-old Layton Carr whose body was found inside the building in Gateshead, near Newcastle, after he was reported missing on Friday.

"Sadly, following searches...
a body believed to be that of
14-year-old Layton Carr was
located deceased inside the
building," a police spokesman
said.
Police were alerted about the fire

on Friday night, and said inquiries were still at an early stage. "This is an extremely tragic incident where a boy has sadly lost his life," said detective chief inspector Louise Jenkins.

# China ship conducting illegal survey within EEZ: Philippines

The Philippines has deployed a coast guard vessel and an aircraft to challenge and escort a Chinese research ship it said was conducting illegal marine scientific research activities within the country's exclusive economic zone.

The Chinese Research Vessel (CRV) Tan Suo 3 was detected entering the country's EEZ on May 1, 2025, around 92 nautical miles off the Philippines' northern Ilocos coast, the PCG said in a statement yesterday.

"Their irregular movements were deemed inconsistent with the freedom of navigation and indicative of marine scientific research activities, which violate the sovereign rights of the Philippines," the PCG said.

It said it launched a maritime law enforcement operation to challenge the Chinese vessel's presence, and had prevented the vessel from continuing its "unlawful activities."

During the operation, the PCG reported spotting a manned deep-sea submersible, named the Shenhai Yongshi or Deep-Sea Warrior, which was retrieved by the Chinese vessel.

The submersible is capable of diving to 4,500 metres and is typically deployed for deep-sea exploration and scientific missions, the PCG said.

It said it also observed a Rigid Hull Inflatable Boat recovering a yellow-coloured, unidentified piece of equipment potentially linked to marine research.

"These actions of the CRV serves as clear evidence that the People's Republic of China are conducting illegal marine scientific research activities within the Philippines' exclusive economic zone, lacking the legal authority to undertake such activities in this area," the PCG said.

# UK celebrates 80th anniversary of end of World War II

or history teacher Martin Rizcki, the emotion of UK celebrations marking 80 years since the end of World War II became too much when Winston Churchill's words boomed out of loudspeakers to thousands outside

Buckingham Palace.
Rizcki was one of the many who defied chilly weather and flocked to central London's Union Jack-lined Mall for the start of four days of events marking VE Day.

"It's not often that we are reminded of the courage of an entire

generation," said the man in his 40s, whose parents fled Poland shortly before the war began.

"No matter where we come from we can all feel and understand the significance of this day." Preparations began at dawn for

some, including Patrick Beacon and his wife Catherine, both 76.

They travelled from Coventry in central England and had stationed

central England and had stationed themselves on the street leading to Buckingham Palace with camping chairs and a flask of coffee by 7am.

They wanted to get the "best view" of the military parade kickstarting celebrations, which will run until the official anniversary of Victory in Europe Day on Thursday,

and which are set to be the last major commemoration with a significant WWII veteran presence.

"It's so emotional to be here," said Patrick, who was born after the war but has vivid memories of Coventry devastated by Nazi air raids.

"Eighty years of peace and peace of mind, I don't know if we understand what an achievement it is. Where would we be without them?

"For me, it's a moral imporative to

"For me, it's a moral imperative to be here especially at a time when war is raging," he said.

King Charles III, Prime Minister Keir Starmer and thousands of spectators watched as Nato personnel from the US, France and Germany, along with a small number of

Ukrainian troops, joined the procession.

The spectacle also intrigued tourists, including 52-year-old Ludivine Batthelot from southern France.

"We came out of curiosity because it's the kind of celebration that the English do so well," she said. "It's folklore - we wanted to be in the mood and live the experience."

Yesterday's march of around 1,000 troops was followed by a fly-past featuring aerobatic team The Red Arrows as well as current and historic military aircraft, which the 76-year-old king watched alongside Queen Camilla and other royals from the balcony of Buckingham

# US, Ukraine face long road to minerals payoff

The financial payoff from a new minerals deal between Ukraine and the US is likely to take a decade or longer as investors face many hurdles to getting new mines into production in the war-ravaged

Developing mines that produce strategically important minerals in countries with established mining sectors such as Canada and Australia can take 10-20 years, mining consultants said on Thursday (May 1,2025). But most mineral deposits in Ukraine have scant data to confirm they are economically viable. Investors may also baulk at funnelling money into a country where infrastructure such as power and transport has been devastated by Russia's three-year-old fullscale invasion and future security is not guaranteed.

"If anyone's thinking suddenly all these minerals are going to be flying out of Ukraine, they're dreaming," said Adam Webb, head of minerals at consultancy Benchmark Minerals Intelligence.

"The reality is it's going to be difficult for people to justify investing money there when there are options to invest in critical minerals in countries that are not at war."

While the financial benefits from the deal are uncertain, officials in Ukraine hailed it as a political breakthrough: They believe it will help shore up US support for Kyiv that has faltered under President Donald Trump.

Ukraine needs US support - especially weapons and cash - to withstand Russia's military invasion. On the US side, Trump heavily promoted the deal, especially the access it provides to Ukraine's deposits of rare earth elements which are used in everything from cellphones to cars. So government policy could hasten investment.

The US does not produce significant amounts of rare earths and has ramped up a trade war with China, the world's top supplier.

The text of the deal signed in Washington showed that revenues for the reconstruction fund v fees and production-sharing agreements.

The text mentions no financial terms, saying that the two sides still have to hammer out a limited partnership agreement

between the US International Development Finance Corp and Ukraine's State Organisation Agency on Support for Public-Private Partnership. The text details 55 minerals plus oil, natural gas and other hydrocarbons. According to Ukrainian data, the country has deposits of 22 of the 34 minerals identified by the European Union as critical, including rare earths, lithium and nickel.

"The transition from a discovered resource to an economically viable reserve requires significant time and investment, both of which have been constrained, not only since the onset of the war but even prior to it," said Willis Thomas at consultancy CRU.

Ukrainian finance ministry data showed that in 2024, the Ukrainian state earned 47.7bn hryvnias, or around \$1bn, in royalties and other fees related to natural resources exploitation.

But the joint fund created under the deal will only get revenue from new licences, permits and production-sharing agreements concluded after the accord comes into force.

Ukraine was slow to issue new natural resources licenses before Russia's 2022 full-scale invasion. From 2012-2020, about 20 licences were issued for oil and gas, one for graphite, one for gold, two for manganese and one for copper, according to the Ukrainian geological service. There are 3,482 existing licenses in total.

Since the agreement creates a limited partnership, the two countries may be looking at direct government investment in a mining company, analysts said. Chile, the world's biggest copper producer and owner of state mining company Codelco, could be an example they follow, Webb said. Another hurdle is that some potentially lucrative projects are on land occupied by Russia, and the agreement does not include any security guarantees. Washington has said the presence of US interests would deter aggressors.

Seven of 24 potential mining projects identified by Benchmark are in Russian-occupied parts of Ukraine and include lithium, graphite, rare earth elements, nickel and manganese.

An official of a small Ukrainian company that holds the licence for the Polokhivske lithium deposit, one of the largest in Europe, told Reuters in February it would be tough to develop without Western security guarantees.

"The deal ties the US more closely into Ukraine in that now they've got a bit more of a vested interest in this war coming to an end so that they can develop those assets," Webb said. - Reuters



# Regionalism: The ogre threatening Sudan's stability and its search for a policy framework

aution is warranted in the use of the term 'marginalisation". Today, it is not only Darfur, Eastern Sudan and the Nuba Mountains that speak of marginalisation; communities in Northern Sudan are increasingly voicing similar grievances, pushing hack against narratives t them as historically privileged or

disproportionately developed. That perception began to erode following a visit to the region by the late John Garang, who observed first-hand the stark poverty of northern villages and towns, describing them as deprived and underprivileged.

Residents of Khartoum contend that if the term denotes a lack of access to hospitals and schools, unreliable electricity, the absence of running water, uncollected rubbish piling up in the streets, and soaring unemployment, then they, too, fall within its scope. Ironically, Khartoum - often regarded as "The Centre" against which regional grievances are directed - shares many of the same hardships. In today's political discourse, "marginalisation" is often used as a euphemism to avoid invoking "regionalism", a term weighed down by negative connotations and deemed politically incorrect. Yet increasingly, it is regionalism - rather than marginalisation per se - that lies at the heart of Sudan's fractured politics.

I find myself reflecting on Sudan's precarious strives for peace and stability. To me, one of its most significant challenges is today's rise of regionalism, which threatens to undermine any peace-building efforts. In Sudan, regionalism is not merely a push for local governance but a destabilising force that could further fracture an already fragile national framework.

Like many war-torn nations. Sudan is deeply divided providing fertile ground for regionalist tensions. Driven by a desire for greater control over resources and political power, these tensions stem from an appalling legacy of absent statesmanship and the total collapse of a unifying national vision, compounded by the political class's unmatched governing fiasco.

We all agree that we are witnessing, as never before, a surge in strong regional sentiments that cannot be ignored. Rooted in historical tribalism, ethnicity and sectarianism, today's tensions are further exacerbated by entrenched political divisions. This growing wave of regionalism threatens Sudan's national identity, political stability and social cohesion, undermining prospects for long-term peace.

The most pressing concern is the fragmentation of the state. Long-standing divisions have led to violent regional movements, with groups - such as the semiautonomous administration in the Nuba Mountains - creating

parallel power structures competing for control over territory and resources.

The economic consequences of regionalism are equally concerning. Sudan's recovery is heavily reliant on international aid and foreign investment. However, the movements that undermine the country's unity deter potential external partners. The instability they foster makes Sudan a risky proposition for international investors and aid agencies. This perception of instability risks becoming selffulfilling prophecy, leaving Sudan without the financial support it so urgently needs to rebuild its economy

I am reminded of how other war-torn nations have grappled with the resurgence of regionalism. In Somalia, the collapse of the central government in 1991 left the country deeply fragmented, with regional divisions - most notably in the autonomous region of Puntland and the selfdeclared republic of Somaliland - undermining efforts to restore stability. Libya, too, offers a cautionary example: since the fall of Muammar Qaddafi in 2011, the country has been riven by rival governments, militias and regional powerbrokers, each competing for influence and control over strategic and oil-rich territories. Iraq has similarly struggled, with Kurdish aspirations for autonomy straining relations with Baghdad and exacerbating tensions among the country's ethnic and

sectarian groups. In all three cases, regionalism has deepened existing fault lines, rendering the pursuit of peace and national cohesion ever more elusive.


Sudan can still avoid the worst effects of regionalism through comprehensive reconciliation, inclusive governance, and a real commitment to addressing its root causes. Power-sharing that includes all groups may ease tensions and prevent conflict, but it must be guided by merit avoid weakening the civil service. Sudan can still avoid the worst effects of regionalism through comprehensive reconciliation, inclusive governance, and a real commitment to addressing its root causes. At the same time, tackling economic grievances through fair resource distribution and investment in neglected areas is key to addressing the drivers of discontent. I also recognise the importance of fostering a shared national identity. The challenge will not be solved by simply devolving power to the regions; Sudan must unite its diverse population under a common identity. National education programmes, media campaigns, and community-building initiatives could play a crucial role in transcending ethnic, regional, or sectarian divisions, fostering a sense of belonging and solidarity across the country.

I am convinced that international organisations can play a key role in mediating disputes between the central government and regional actors. Diplomatic support and the facilitation of negotiations can ensure that regional movements are addressed in a manner that promotes peace rather than exacerbating conflict. International engagement, when done thoughtfully, can help Sudan navigate the delicate balance between regional autonomy and national unity.

I close by affirming that Sudan's future depends on overcoming regionalism through inclusive governance, fair resource distribution, comprehensive reconciliation, and a strong national identity. Addressing the roots of regionalism is key to achieving lasting peace and stability.

# France, EU seek to lure US researchers

rench President Emmanuel
Macron and European Commission head Ursula von der Leyen took aim at Donald Trump's policies on science yesterday, as the European Union seeks to encourage disgruntled US researchers to relocate to Europe.

Von der Leyen told a conference at Paris's Sorbonne university that the EU would launch a new incentives package worth €500mn (\$567mn) to make the 27-nation bloc "a magnet for researchers".

"We have to offer the right incentives," she said.

Without mentioning Trump directly, von der Leyen told the "Choose Europe for Science" conference that the role of science was being put in question "in today's world" and condemned such views as "a gigantic miscalcula-

Universities and research facilities in the United States have come under increasing political and financial pressure under Trump, including with threats of massive federal funding cuts.

"Nobody could have imagined

that this great global democracy, whose economic model depends so heavily on free science,.. was going to commit such an error," Macron said.

He added: "We refuse a diktat consisting of any government being able to say you cannot research this or that."

In the context of "threats" against independent research and "global apprehension", Macron said, "Europe must become a sanctuary."

In the United States, research programmes face closure, tens of thousands of federal workers have been fired and foreign students fear possible deportation for their political views.

European commissioners, scientists, academics and ministers for research from EU member countries took part in yesterday's conference, as did representatives from non-EU members Norway, Britain and Switzerland.

The French president has already appealed to foreign, notably US, researchers to "choose France".

Last month he unveiled plans for a funding programme to help universities and other research bodies cover the cost of bringing

foreign scientists to the country. Aix Marseille University in the south of France announced in

March it would open its doors to US scientists threatened by cuts. It says its "Safe Place for Science" scheme has already received a flood of applicants.

Last week, France's flagship scientific research centre, the CNRS, launched another initiative aimed at attracting foreign researchers

whose work is threatened. It is also seeking to tempt back French researchers working abroad, some of whom "don't want to live and raise their children in Trump's United States", according to CNRS

President Antoine Petit.

An official in Macron's office said yesterday's conference came "at a time when academic freedoms are retreating and under threat in a number of cases".

One obstacle, experts say, is the fact that while EU countries can offer competitive research infrastructure and a high quality of life, research funding and researchers' remuneration both lag far behind

But the CNRS's Petit said last week he hoped the pay gap would seem less significant once the lower cost of education and health, and more generous social benefits were taken into account.

Macron's office said France and the European Union were targeting researchers in a number of specific sectors, including health, climate, biodiversity, artificial intelligence and space.

Macron said his government would earmark "an additional" €100mn to help attract foreign

The French government could finance up to 50% of selected research projects, an official in the presidential office said, while assistance could also be offered in the form of tax incentives.

## **Pro-EU Romania** PM resigns after vote fiasco

Romania's pro-EU Prime Minister Marcel Ciolacu vesterday announced his resignation. deepening political turmoil a day after a far-right candidate topped the first round of a tense presidential vote rerun. Far-right EU critic George Simion topped Sunday's election first round, while the ruling coalition's candidate narrowly lost out to Bucharest's mayor, Nicusor Dan, for the second spot. With the ruling coalition's candidate Crin Antonescu knocked out of the running, Ciolacu would likely have been

replaced by the new president, who appoints the premier. Ciolacu said his party would leave the ruling coalition but would probably hold on until after the election run-off, scheduled for May 18 and which is being closely watched by Brussels and Washington.

Romania, which borders wartorn Ukraine, is an EU and Nato member. His Social Democrats (PSD) party leaving the ruling coalition "implicitly leads to my resignation as prime minister Ciolacu, 57, told reporters after a party meeting

"We saw how Romanians voted Sunday, which means that the ruling coalition has no legitimacy, at least in this formula," he added. Once the PSD leaves the

governing coalition, it would no longer have a parliamentary majority. Ciolacu said that his party's ministers would discuss with their coalition partners whether or not they would remain in the government on an interim basis

"The future president would have changed me anyway," Ciolacu said. Ciolacu's resignation "comes at the worst possible moment, adding political risks and fears" in a country already struggling with the highest deficit in the FU. 9.3% at the end of 2024, according to political analyst Radu Magdin.

"The political system will re-stabilise after we have political clarity as regards the new president of Romania," Magdin told AFP, adding that

the resignation "gives a boost to Simion who is better than Dan at capitalising on political chaos". Ciolacu said his party would not publicly support either Simion or Dan, instead asking their party supporters to "vote as they wish, according to their own

The Social Democrats' coalition partners said they were supporting Dan. In Sunday's first round, Simion, who leads the nationalist AUR party, gained almost 41% of votes, double the score of the pro-EU Dan, an independent. Dan narrowly edged out Antonescu.

AUR and other far right parties hold around a third of the votes in parliament.

# Pakistan conducts second missile test

akistan conducted a second missile test and India ordered civil defence drills in an escalating stand-off over contested Kashmir that the UN said on Monday has brought the two nations to the brink of war.

New Delhi blames Islamabad for backing an attack on tourists last month — the deadliest against civilians on the Indian-administered side of the Himalayan territory for years - sparking a series of heated threats and diplomatic tit-for-tat measures.

Pakistan rejects the accusations, and the two sides have exchanged nightly gunfire since April 24 along the de facto border in Kashmir, the militarised Line of Control, according to the Indian

UN chief Antonio Guterres vesterday said relations between Pakistan and India had reached a "boiling point", warning that "now is the time for maximum restraint and stepping back from the brink" of war.

The Pakistani military said yesterday it had tested a surfaceto-surface missile with a range of 120km, a launch "aimed at ensuring the operational readiness of troops". The missile test comes as Iran's top diplomat Abbas Araghchi was in Islamabad for talks with Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif yesterday, ahead of a visit to India on Thursday.

Tehran has offered to mediate between the two nuclear-armed neighbours, and Araghchi will be the first senior foreign diplomat to visit both countries since the April 22 attack sent relations into a tailspin.

"We will spare no effort to help de-escalate the situation between the two countries," Iranian foreign ministry spokesperson Esmaeil Bagaei said. Pakistan announced a previous test on Saturday of a surface-to-surface missile with a

range of 450km - about the distance from the Pakistan border to New Delhi.

It has not said where either of the tests took place. Sharif, who cancelled a visit to Malaysia scheduled for Friday, said the launch "clearly shows that Pakistan's defence is in strong hands". Indian information ministry

officials said that several civil defence "mock drills" would take place tomorrow, preparing people to "protect themselves in the event of a hostile attack".

Muslim-majority Kashmir, a region of around 15mn people, is divided between Pakistan and India but claimed in full by both.

Rebels in the Indian-run area have waged an insurgency since 1989, seeking independence or a merger with Pakistan. India regularly blames its neighbour for backing gunmen behind the in-

Hindu nationalist Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi has said India will "identify, track and punish every terrorist and their backer" who carried out the attack at Pahalgam last month, and will

"pursue them to the ends of the Earth."

Pakistan's government has denied any involvement in the shooting and vowed that "any act of aggression will be met with a decisive response". No group has claimed responsi-

bility for the April 22 killing of 26 mainly Hindu men in the tourist hotspot of Pahalgam, but Indian police are seeking at least two Pakistani citizens they allege are among the alleged gunmen.

International pressure has been piled on both New Delhi and Islamabad, who have fought several wars over the disputed Kashmir

Russia's Kremlin spokesperson Dmitry Peskov told reporters yesterday that Moscow was "following with great concern the atmosphere that has developed on the border", calling for both nations to "reduce tensions"

On the Pakistani side, emergency drills have been carried out on playing fields, residents have been told to stock up on food and medicine, and religious schools

## **US pushes \$1.000 incentive for self-deportation**

The Trump administration will offer a \$1,000 stipend and travel assistance to migrants who elect to voluntarily "self deport" from the US, the Department of Homeland Security said vesterday. The stipend and potential airfare for migrants who voluntarily depart would cost less than an actual deportation, the agency said. The average cost of arresting, detaining and deporting someone without legal status is currently about \$17,000,

according to DHS. President Donald Trump, a Republican, took office in January pledging to deport millions of people but so far has trailed deportations under his Democratic predecessor Joe Biden. Biden's administration faced high levels of illegal immigration and quickly returned many caught crossing the border. The Trump administration has deported 152,000 people since January 20, according to DHS, lower than the 195.000 deported from February-April last year under Biden. Trump's administration has tried to encourage migrants to leave voluntarily by

threatening steep fines, trying to strip away legal status, and deporting migrants to notorious prisons in Guantanamo Bay and El Salvador.

"If you are here illegally, self-deportation is the best. safest and most cost-effective way to leave the United States to avoid arrest," Homeland Security Secretary Kristi Noem said in a statement. In March, the administration launched a rebranded app called CBP Home to facilitate self-deportation. The app, previously called CBP One, was used by the Biden administration to allow migrants to enter the US legally. Trump previewed the stipend plan in April, saying the US would consider allowing migrants to

"If they're good, if we want them back in, we're going to work with them to get them back in as quickly as we can," he said.

In the announcement yesterday, DHS said people who choose to leave "may help preserve" the ability to return legally, but did not cite any specific pathway or programme.

## Russian reporter critical of Ukraine war escapes to France

A Russian reporter critical of Moscow's invasion of Ukraine said yesterday she had fled to France after Reporters Without Borders helped co-ordinate her

Speaking in an interview with AFP at the media watchdog's headquarters in Paris, Ekaterina Barabash, 64, said she even considered suicide to avoid going

"I began looking for some poison," said Barabash, who faces up to 10 years in prison for criticising Moscow's army. "Russian prison, it's not a life. It is worse than death." Since Russia invaded Ukraine in February 2022, Moscow has launched an unprecedented crackdown on media freedoms, making it illegal to criticise the army and its war against Ukraine. Barabash was arrested in February on allegations of spreading "false information" about the Russian armed forces in several posts she made on social media. The journalist

was detained soon after attending the Berlinale film festival.

She fled house arrest in April. Speaking to a news conference earlier in the day, Barabash said her journey to France lasted around two-and-a-half weeks. "It was very difficult," she said. Reporters Without Borders, known by its French acronym RSF, helped bring her to safety. The journalist, whose only son lives in Ukraine, had written for several news outlets, including the Russian service of Radio France Internationale

Her 96-year-old mother stayed behind in Moscow. Barabash said "many" people were involved in her escape, including Leonid Nevzlin, an ally of self-exiled Kremlin critic Mikhail Khodorkovsky, who "financed" her evacuation.

"I crossed all borders by myself," said Barabash, who was born in the Ukrainian city of Kharkiv when it was still part of the Soviet Union.

RSF earlier helped the escape of former Russian state television journalist Marina Ovsvannikova, who protested against the Ukraine conflict during a live broadcast

in 2022. Barabash said she removed her electronic bracelet when she fled house arrest. "It's somewhere in the Russian forest," she said, smiling. She said she hid "for two weeks" during

her escape and crossed the border on her birthday on April 26 RSF director Thibaut Bruttin praised her resilience. "It has been a long and exhausting journey that has come to an

end in the last few days and hours," he

"Several times, we thought she had been arrested or was in danger of being arrested. Several times, the plan changed. Once, we thought she was dead.' Bruttin said it had become more difficult to help journalists escape Russia after the media watchdog smuggled out Ovsvannikova. He also said Barabash's escape was a "message of hope" for

Russian reporters "There are forces that are willing to help you in your difficult situation," he said.

"There is no despair, there is no inevitability and RSF stands with all those who embody independent journalism." Both RSF and Barabash said they could not disclose all the details of her escape. "I am going to ask for political asylum," she said, adding that she hoped to continue working for RFI. Barabash has been an outspoken critic

of Moscow's military offensive against Ukraine. In 2022, she wrote on Facebook that Russia had "bombed the country" and "razed whole cities to the ground". Days before her arrest, she wrote of her "hatred, hatred for those who started all this"

"So many lives have been destroyed, so many families torn apart," she said on Facebook. Barabash said yesterday she was optimistic, even though she would have to start a new life in a foreign country from scratch.

"I don't know a single person who has died of starvation in exile," she said.
