













Lebanese ex-minister arrested over graft

Lebanon arrested former economy minister Amin Salam yesterday as part of an investigation into corruption linked to contracts deemed suspicious, a judicial source said. Salam, who served in the cabinet of former prime minister Najib Mikati from 2021 to 2025, is the first ex-minister to be arrested since the start of Lebanon's economic crisis in 2019. The source said he was arrested on the orders of prosecutor general Jamal al-Hajjar, after three hours of questioning in connection with alleged "falsification, embezzlement and suspicious contracts".

Musk regrets some of Trump criticism

Elon Musk, the world's richest person and Donald Trump's former adviser, said yesterday he regretted some of his recent criticisms of the US president. after the pair's public fallingout last week. "I regret some of my posts about President @ realDonaldTrump last week. They went too far," Musk wrote on his social media platform X, in a message that was received favourably by the White House. Their blistering break-up was ignited by Musk's harsh criticism of Trump's so-called "big, beautiful" spending bill, which is currently before Congress. White House Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt told reporters that Trump was "appreciative," adding that "no efforts" had been made on a threat to end some of Musk's government contracts. Page 11

Qatar urged to win regional battle for tech workers

¬he Qatar-US economic partnership is poised for explosive growth, with a potential trade volume of \$1.2tn over the next decade, outgoing US ambassador Timmy Davis said in his final press conference in Doha yesterday.

The envoy described the recent visit of US President Donald Trump to Qatar as a success - not just for the \$243bn in deals and Memorandums of Understanding signed, but for the broader vision it represented.

Speaking to reporters in Doha, he argued that to seize this opportunity, Qatar must strategically position itself to win an escalating regional "battle" for high-tech talent in fields like artificial intelligence (AI) and software development.

"I think it will be important to identify sectors that are going to grow, that aren't headline sectors at this point," Davis said, pointing to frameworks like Qatar Vision 2030 and the National Digital Strategy. He stressed that a fierce regional competition is underway for a new kind of labour force.

"One of the things that is going to be in short supply around the region is labour, and I don't mean manual labour, I mean coders, people who understand AI, entrepreneurs," he said. "There is a battle for these workers around the region." Davis underlined the critical role of the press in helping Qatar get a head start by identifying "the ember of the flame that will grow into the sector in the region." By highlighting emerging opportunities in technology, data centres, and ICT, he said the media can inspire local entrepreneurs and, crucially, retain the nation's top graduates.

The envoy lauded Qatar's worldclass higher education ecosystem, not only the six US university campuses in Education City, but also Oatar University, and Hamad Bin Khalifa University, which he said are "putting out some of the brightest minds in t world." The challenge, he noted, is ensuring those minds build their careers in Doha.

"We want those minds to work here in Qatar, we don't want them to think they have to go to Europe to find a job of their dreams. If the press can demonstrate to them that they can follow their dreams here... that they can be a part of that is bigger than themselves, it will make a massive difference," he pointed out.

The envoy said the media can act as a catalyst for economic diversification: by helping to spotlight promising industries, journalists can empower startups, attract foreign investment, and give aspiring Qataris a roadmap to success. This, he suggested, would allow innovators to "hitch their wagon to that star" and ensure that when the race to lead the region in a new technology begins, Qatar is already out in front. Page 7

sraeli gunfire and air strikes killed at least 60 Palestinians in Gaza yesterday, most of them near an aid site operated by the USand Israeli-backed Gaza Humanitarian Foundation in the centre of the enclave, local health officials said.

Medical of pitals said at least 25 people were killed and dozens wounded as they approached a food distribution centre near the former Jewish settlement of Netzarim before dawn.

Later yesterday, health officials at Nasser Hospital in Khan Younis in the southern Gaza Strip said at least 14 people had been killed by Israeli gunfire as they approached another GHF

The death toll from the ongoing Israeli aggression on the Gaza Strip since Oct 7, 2023, has risen to 55,104 martyrs, QNA reported.

The foundation said it was unaware of such incidents but added that it was working closely with Israeli authorities to ensure safe passage routes are maintained, and that it was essential for Palestinians to closely follow instructions.

In a statement, GHF said it distributed 2.5mn meals yesterday, the largest single-day delivery since it began operations, bringing to more than 16mn the number of meals provided since its operations started in late May.

Israel's military campaign has since killed nearly 55,000 Palestinians, most of them civilians, according to health authorities in Gaza.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said on Tuesday there had been "significant progress" in efforts to secure the release of the remaining hostages in Gaza, but that it was "too soon" to raise hopes that a deal would be reached.

Two Hamas sources told Reuters they did not know about any breakthrough in negotiations.


US preparing to partially evacuate Iraq embassy

Baghdad/Washington

he United States is preparing a partial evacuation of its Iraqi embassy and will allow military dependents to leave locations around the Middle East due to heightened security risks in the region, US and Iraqi sources said yesterday.

The four US and two Iraqi sources did not specify which security risks had prompted the decision and reports of the potential evacuation pushed up oil prices by more than 4%.

"The State Department regularly reviews American personnel abroad and this decision was made as a result of a recent review," White House spokeswoman Anna Kelly told Reuters when asked about reports of the partial evacuations, without giving further details.

A White House official said US President Donald Trump was aware of the move.

The partial evacuations come at a moment of heightened tensions in a region already aflame after 18 months of war in Gaza that has raised fears of a wider conflagration pitting the US and Israel against Iran and its allies.

Iranian Defence Minister Aziz Nasirzadeh also said yesterday that Iran would retaliate against US bases in the region if the nuclear talks failed and it was subiected to strikes.

The United States has a military presence in Iraq, Kuwait, Qatar, Bahrain and the United Arab Emirates.

Another US official said that there was no change in operations at Al Udeid Air Base in Qatar, the largest US military base in the Middle East and that no evacuation order had been issued for employees or families linked to the US embassy in Qatar, which was operating as



Cabinet clears draft law for volunteering work in Gulf region

E the Deputy Prime Min-ister and Minister of ■ State for Defence Affairs Sheikh Saud bin Abdulrahman bin Hassan al-Thani chaired the Cabinet's regular meeting held yesterday at the Amiri Diwan. Following the meeting, HE the Minister of Justice and Minister of State for Cabinet Affairs Ibrahim bin Ali al-Mohannadi stated the following:

The Cabinet reviewed the topics on its agenda. It approved - in principle - a draft law issuing a unified system (law) for volunteering work in the Gulf Co-operation Council countries, and a draft of its executive regulations.

The two drafts' preparation comes within the framework of the Ministry of Social Development and Family's strategy, which aims to enhance social responsibility, spread the culture of volunteering in society, organise volunteering work, ensure its practice with freedom and choice, preserve the rights of volunteers and volunteering organisations, and define the duties of each of them. The Cabinet a draft letter of intent between also approved the draft Cabinet Decision to add a member to the Steering Committee of the Qatar Internet Exchange Point project, established by Decision No 24 of

Prepared by the Communications Regulatory Authority, this draft aims to connect financial institutions subject to the supervision of the Qatar Central Bank to the Internet Exchange Point, in a way that ensures business continuity in the financial sector and supports its vital requirements.

The Cabinet approved a draft agreement between the Government of the State of Qatar and the United Nations Institute for Training and Research (UNITAR) regarding the establishment and financing of a regional office for UNITAR in the State of Qatar; a draft core contribution agreement between the Qatar Fund for Development of the State of Qatar and the United Nations World Food Program for multilateral funding for the years 2025-2026;

the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the State of Oatar and the Federal Department of Foreign Affairs of the Swiss Confederation in the field of mediation and facilitation; a draft memorandum of understanding in the field of Islamic jurisprudence and Islamic affairs between the Ministry of Endowments and Islamic Affairs of the State of Qatar and the International Islamic Fiqh Academy of the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation; and a draft air services agreement between the Government of the State of Oatar and the Government of the Republic of Nauru.

The Cabinet concluded the weekly meeting by reviewing a report on the outcomes of the participation of Qatar's delegation, headed by HE the Minister of Endowments and Islamic Affairs, in the 16th International Economic Forum "Russia-Islamic World: Kazan Forum" (Republic of Tatarstan - May 2025), regarding which it took the appropriate decision. Qatar attends annual Oslo Forum for Peace

TE the Minister of State at the Ministry of Foreign Af-**▲**fairs Dr Mohammed bin Abdulaziz bin Saleh al-Khulaifi participated as a speaker in the Oslo Forum's first high-level session held under the title 'A different future for the Middle East, as part of this year's edition of the annual peace forum that takes place in the Norwegian capital, Oslo.

In his remarks at the session, HE Dr al-Khulaifi said that the Middle East is undergoing rapid changes that require regional actors not only to manage crises but also to play an active role in shaping the future of collective security. HE the Minister of State at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs pointed out that the retreat of certain global power centres and the erosion of some multilateral frameworks compel countries in the region to take the initiative and work together to safeguard regional security and achieve lasting stability.

He described the situation in Gaza as a humanitarian catastrophe, noting that the deliberate targeting of infrastructure and the widespread suffering of civilians violate international law and necessitate serious international action that goes beyond statements to concrete practical steps.

HE the Minister of State at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs highlighted Qatar's role in supporting political and humanitarian efforts in Gaza and several other countries in the Middle East, stressing that dialogue and the peaceful resolution of disputes remain the most effective path to achieving just and lasting peace. He affirmed that shifting from crisis management to solution-building requires activating joint regional action and developing new mechanisms that reflect the region's realities.

ONL launches **Arabic Calligraphy Contest to** celebrate heritage and creativity



WORLD'S LARGEST 3D PRINTED CONSTRUCTION PROJECT COMMENCES IN QATAR.

UCC Holding and Ashghal Launch the 3D-Printed Schools Project





n a global first for large-scale digital construction, UCC Holding, in partnership with the Public Works Authority (Ashghal), has officially commenced the printing phase of the 3D Printed Schools Project—marking the launch of the world's largest construction development using 3D printing technology.

The project involves the construction of 14 public schools, including two built using 3D printing technology, each with a built-up area of 20,000 square meters — totaling 40,000 square meters. This is 40 times larger than the largest 3D-printed building constructed anywhere in the world to date.

The two schools are designed as two-storey buildings on plots measuring 100 by 100 meters each, making this project an unprecedented model for future-ready educational infrastructure in Qatar and across the region.

To realize this unprecedented scale, UCC Holding commissioned COBOD, the world leader in 3D construction printing based in Denmark, to supply two customized BODXL printers, each measuring 50 meters long, 30 meters wide, and 15 meters high—roughly the size of a Boeing 737 hangar—making them the largest construction printers in the world.

Following extensive prepara-

tion-including site development, equipment assembly, and opersimulations-printing operations have officially begun. UCC Holding has assembled a dedicated 3D construction team consisting of architects, civil engineers, material scientists, and printer technicians. Over the past eight months, this team conducted over 100 full-scale test prints using a BOD2 printer at a dedicated trial site in Doha, developing concrete mix designs, validating performance under local climate conditions, and engineering a custom print nozzle to ensure precision and smooth extrusion.

In May 2025, the team completed intensive training alongside CO-BOD engineers, covering printer operation, print sequencing, structural layering strategies, and live quality control. This milestone marks a major leap in Qatar's local capacity for advanced construction technology, solidifying its role as a regional hub for innovation and engineering.

Compared to conventional construction methods, 3D printing offers multiple environmental, social, and economic advantages. It significantly reduces raw material waste and minimizes concrete usage, cutting carbon emissions. Onsite printing also reduces transport needs, mitigates supply chain risks, and accelerates project delivery. With operations scheduled at night to avoid high temperatures, the process also ensures better concrete performance while reducing dust and noise.

Architecturally, the schools are inspired by the natural desert formations of Qatar, with curved, flowing walls resembling sand dunes. This design is only made possible by the geometric freedom that 3D printing offers—enabling organic, parametric forms that would be difficult or cost-prohibitive using traditional construction methods.

The schools are expected to be completed by the end of 2025, reinforcing Qatar's global leadership in sustainable development, innovation, and next-generation public infrastructure.

AlKhater spotlights Qatar's expanding cultural diplomacy through YoC initiative

s the Years of Culture (YoC) initiative celebrates its 15th edition in 2025, Qatar marks a new chapter in cultural diplomacy with its most ambitious programme yet - simultaneous partnerships with two countries in a single year. It invites participation not only from diplomats and policymakers, but also from chefs, students, economists, volunteers, and artists.

Legacy is a recurring theme in the op-ed. Examples include the "On the Move" exhibition, which debuted as part of Qatar-MENASA 2022 and later toured in China, and the multi-year collaboration with Moroccan artist Sara Ouhaddou,

which spans exhibitions, capacitybuilding, and the revival of traditional glassmaking techniques in

A recent Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) signed between Qatar and France in 2024 further underscores the programme's longterm policy impact, building on the foundations laid during the Qatar-France 2020 Year of Culture.

The article also reflects on how Qatar is redefining cultural exchange, not as a unilateral export or import of identity, but as a cocreated, evolving dialogue. This is evident in the growing presence of contemporary Qatari art in former partner nations such as Germany, Russia, and China, where young Qatari and Qatar-based artists gain global visibility and form lasting international networks.

Looking ahead, the Years of Culture is poised to expand beyond the model of annual bilateral partnerships into a continuous, multidimensional platform for global engagement.

"Born in Doha, but resonating far beyond," writes HE AlKhater, the programme is now seen as a cultural and intellectual hub, encouraging dialogue, creativity, and mutual respect in an era of shifting global narratives.



'Human impact defines deepening Qatar-US partnership'

n emotional embrace on an airport tarmac, not statistics on trade or energy, highlights the deep human impact of a US-Qatar partnership that has matured into one of the world's most significant diplomatic alliances, outgoing US ambassador Timmy Davis

Speaking to journalists in Doha yesterday, the envoy recounted standing on the tarmac as American citizens freed from detention in Iran arrived in Doha, their freedom secured through

Qatar's intensive mediation.
Davis said he was prepared for a formal handshake, but the first detainee to approach him said, "You're the US ambassador?" "I said 'yes,' and he said: 'Can I give you a hug?'" Davis recalled.

"In that moment, I realised that our relationship with Qatar is more than economics, it is more than education, it is more than energy. In fact, it is built around the idea that we can change people's lives," he said.

That single hug, a picture of which the ambassador keeps, embodied what he described as "the true power of Qatar's efforts at doing good in the world." He said it's a power he has witnessed repeatedly during a three-year tenure that spanned the success of the 2022 FIFA World Cup to the ongoing and challenging efforts to broker a ceasefire in Gaza.

"I have said over and over again how fortunate I am to be the US ambassador in Doha, I am

the luckiest ambassador in the world," Davis said, crediting the trusted partnership with enabling him to advance US priorities while essentially changing lives.

Beyond reacting to crises, Davis argued that the relationship between the two countries is now mature enough to shift from a reactive to a proactive posture. He called for a new chapter where the two nations work together to prevent humanitarian disasters before they

"A lot of our success at mediating conflicts, at providing community assistance, has been somewhat ad hoc," he observed. "I think there's an opportunity for the US and Qatar to take a breath and think about how they want to work together not just to respond to suffering... but how

they want to help forestall, pre-

Davis said he envisions a future where the two "good friends," harnessing their shared expertise and resources through bodies such as the Qatar Fund for Development can identify and solve problems before they escalate into global emergencies.

According to the envoy, while the exact number of lives saved or disasters averted through preventative action cannot be known, the positive outcomes—like the advancement of humanity and a reduction in suffering—are undeniable.

"And if we can work together to stop some of these things before they get started and so I think that's where we should be going and thinking about how we make the world better in the coming years," he said.

Steps to repatriate bodies of Qatar residents killed in Kenya crash

teps are being taken to repatriate the bodies of the five Qatar-based Indian nationals who died in a road accident in Kenya on Monday.

In a post on X, the Indian embassy in Qatar said the postmortem of the victims were completed on Tuesday night. Further formalities for the transportation of the mortal remains are being co-ordinated by the high commission of India in Nairobi.

"All other 23 Indians (in the group) have been shifted to Nairobi and are receiving necessary medical attention. Our high commission is constantly monitoring and providing help," the post said.

"One of the accident victims is in a critical condition. The injured are getting necessary medical attention," an Indian embassy official in Qatar told Gulf Times.

The Indian high commission in Nairobi, in a post on X, said a consular team is on the ground and in close contact with the local authorities to extend all necessary support. The team can be reached at +254 734916532.

"We are deeply saddened by the tragic road accident on Ol Jororok-Nakuru Road in Nyandarua County, in which five Indian nationals have lost their lives. Our heartfelt condolences to the bereaved families. We pray for the swift recovery of the injured," the X post said.

"The mission is providing assistance to the affected," a consular official in Nairobi told Gulf Times. The tragic incident in central Kenya on Monday evening happened as the bus, in which the victims were travelling in overturned during a holiday trip.

The deceased have been identified as Geetha Shoji Issac (58), Riya Ann (41) and her daughter Tyra Rodrigues (8), Jasna Kuttikkattuchalil (30) and Roohie Mehrin (18 months old) – all Qatar residents and natives of various places in Korala

Iran warns will target US bases if conflict breaks out

Iran and the US have recently been locked in a diplomatic standoff over Iran's uranium enrichment, with Tehran defending it as a "nonnegotiable"

ran warned vesterday it will target US military bases in the region if conflict breaks out, while President Donald Trump said he was "less confident" about reaching a nuclear

Tehran and Washington have held five rounds of talks since April to thrash out a new nuclear deal to replace the 2015 accord that Trump abandoned during his first term in 2018.

Since returning to office in Ianuary, Trump has revived his "maximum pressure" campaign on Tehran, backing nuclear diplomacy but warning of military action if it fails.

"All its bases are within our reach, we have access to them, and without hesitation we will target all of them," Iran's Defence Minister Aziz Nasirzadeh said in response to US threats of military action if the talks fail.

"God willing, things won't reach that point, and the talks will succeed," the minister said, adding that the US side "will suffer more losses" if it came to conflict.

Iran and the US have recently been locked in a diplomatic standoff over Iran's uranium enrichment, with Tehran defending it as a "non-negotiable" right and Washington calling it as a "red line".

Trump had previously expressed optimism about the talks, saying during a Gulf tour last month Washington was "getting close" to securing a

But in an interview published yesterday, Trump said he was "less confident" the US and Iran could reach a deal, in response to a question on whether he believed he could stop Tehran from enriching uranium.

Iran currently enriches uranium to 60%, far above the 3.67% limit set in the 2015 deal and close though still short of the 90% needed for a nuclear warhead.

the US and its ally Israel, claim Iran is seeking to acquire atomic weapons, while Tehran insists its nuclear programme is for peaceful purposes.

Last week, Iran's supreme leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei said enrichment is "key" to Iran's nuclear programme and that Washington "cannot have a sav" on the issue.

During the interview with the New York Post's podcast "Pod Force One", which was recorded on Monday, Trump said he was losing hope a deal could be reached.

"I don't know. I did think so, and I'm getting more and more - less confident about it. They seem to be delaying and I think that's a shame. I am less confident now than I would have been a couple of months ago," he said.

"Something happened to them but I am much less confident of a deal being made... May be they don't wanna make a deal, what can I say? And may be they do. There is nothing final."

Dozens arrested over love scam ring

ndonesian police have arrested dozens on the popular resort island of Bali for allegedly running a love scam syndicate targeting American men, they said yes-

Police made the arrests after being tipped off about suspicious activity at a rented home in Denpasar, the island's capital.

A total of 38 suspects, seven of them women, were arrested.

"The suspects arrested worked as operators whose job is to find the love scam victims, they targeted Americans who have a Telegram account," Bali police chief Daniel Adityajaya told a press conference.

"They pretended to be women by using women's pictures and fake identity to ensnare their vic-

The suspects confessed they were working for someone who controlled the business from Cambodia to lure American men to hand over sensitive information. Daniel said.

They chatted up their victims through the Telegram messenger app and sent them fake links.

The suspects were paid \$200 each per month to steal the victims' data and information, Daniel said.

Police initially detained nine suspects together, leading to the arrest of the others accused of a role in the syndicate.

The suspects, all Indonesians, face up to 12 years in prison if found guilty of violating the country's electronic transaction law.

Police had previously said many scammers had moved to Indonesia and other Southeast Asian countries after China cracked down on domestic networks.

Muhammed Sajjad moved from India to the UAE a decade ago, he missed his native Kerala's monsoon season, so he embarked on an unlikely quest: finding rain in the desert.

Using satellite imagery, weather data and other high-tech tools, the amateur meteorologist tracks potential rainfall spots across the desert country and, along with other Indians nostalgic for the monsoon season, chases the

clouds in search of rain.

"When I came to UAE in 2015. in August, it... was peak monsoon time" in Kerala, the 35-year-old estate agent said, adding that he had struggled to adjust to the change of climate.

"So I started to search about the rainy condition in UAE and I came to know that there is rain happening in UAE during peak summer," he said, adding: "I started to explore the possibility to chase the rain, enjoy the rain."

Each week, he forecasts when and where rain might fall and posts a suggested rendezvous to the 130,000 followers of his "UAE

Weatherman" page on Instagram. He regularly posts footage of his rain expeditions out into the desert, hoping to bring together

"all rain lovers who miss rain". Last weekend, he headed out into the desert from Sharjah at the head of a convoy of about 100 ve-

India attempts to tow burning ship 'to prevent ecological disaster'

The Indian Coast Guard yesterday was attempting to tow a cargo ship that caught fire off the coast of the southern state of Kerala containing hazardous cargo to prevent a potential ecological disaster, India's defence ministry said in a statement.

The Singaporean-container vessel MV Wan Hai 503 is carrying 120,000 metric tonnes of fuel and hundreds of containers, including hazardous cargo, the ministry said.

The vessel, which was bound for India's financial capital Mumbai, met with an accident about 144km off the coast of the southern Indian state of Kerala on Monday, leading to multiple explosions and fires erupting on the ship and causing 40 containers to fall into the Arabian Sea.

Firefighting efforts have significantly reduced visible flames, but the fire remains active in the inner decks and near fuel tanks, the defence ministry said. "With the fire yet to be fully extinguished, efforts to establish a towline and pull the vessel away from the coast are underway to prevent a potential ecological disaster," the Ministry of Defence said in the statement.

Last month, a container vessel sank in another accident off the Kerala coast, releasing 100 cargo containers into the Arabian Sea, and leaving authorities in the state scrambling to contain an oil spill. That vessel, owned by Cyprus-based MSC Ship management, was carrying 640 containers, including 13 with "hazardous cargo" and 12 with calcium carbide.

Gaza-bound activist convoy reaches Libyan capital

undreds of pro-Palestin-ian activists in a Gazabound convoy reached the Libyan capital of Tripoli yesterday as they drive eastward in a bid to break Israel's blockade of the Palestinian territory.

The Soumoud convoy - meaning steadfastness in Arabic - set off from Tunis in buses and cars on Monday, hoping to pass through divided Libya and Egypt, which organisers say has yet to provide passage permits, to reach Gaza.

It was launched the day Israel intercepted an aid ship also attempting to breach its blockade on Gaza, which was carrying 12 people, including campaigner Greta Thunberg and European parliament member Franco-Palestinian Rima Hassan.

The land convoy was welcomed by hundreds in Tripoli and escorted through the capital by police

Tripoli-based Prime Libya's Minister Abdulhamid Dbeibah hailed the convoy as a "fraternal humanitarian initiative" that Libyans "embraced in warmth and solidarity".

"This is another example of Libya's commitment and generosity in support of the people of Gaza under siege and attack," the premier said in a statement.

After 20 months of war, Israel is facing mounting international pressure to allow more aid into Gaza to alleviate widespread Activists, heading towards Gaza by land with the aim of breaking the

The United Nations has said the Palestinian territory was "the hungriest place on Earth".

"It's a great feeling," she added. "I feel like I'm not in Libya, but in Gaza, united with my Palestinian brothers." Organisers have said a dozen buses and around 100 other vehicles were part of the convoy, adding that they expected the

number of participants to grow along the way.

Algerian, Mauritanian, Moroccan and Libyan activists were also among the Soumoud group, which is now set to cross eastern Libya, a region controlled by a different administration than Tripoli.

This has cast doubt on whether the activists would reach the border crossing with Egypt, which has yet to grant clearance for the activists to cross.

Convoy spokesman Ghassen Henchiri told Tunisian media yesterday discussions were ongoing with Egyptian authorities regarding a permit to cross, "but as of now, we haven't received an offi-

Sudan paramilitaries overrun key zone bordering Egypt, Libya

udan's paramilitary Rapid Support Forces said yesterday its fighters seized a strategic zone on the border with Egypt and Libya, as the regular army announced its withdrawal from the region.

The announcements came a day after the army cused forces loval to eastern Libvan commander Khalifa Haftar of launching a cross-border attack alongside the RSF, the first allegation of direct Libyan involvement in the Sudanese war.

"As part of its defensive arrangements to repel aggression, our forces today evacuated the triangle area overlooking the borders between Sudan, Egypt and Libya," army spokesman Nabil Abdallah said in

Since April 2023, the war in Sudan has pitted army chief Abdel Fattah al-Burhan against his erstwhile ally Mohamed Hamdan Daglo, who leads the RSF. The RSF said in a statement its fighters "liberated the strategic triangle area", adding that army forces had retreated southward "after suffering heavy losses". It also said the operation would have broad implications "across several combat fronts, especially in the northern desert".

A military source said on condition of anonymity that clashes in the border triangle "started three days ago" when the RSF and Libyan forces loyal to Haftar attacked the army-aligned Joint Forces.

The triangle area, a mountain range spanning about 1,500 square kilometres, has long been known for mining activity and cross-border trade.

A former army officer told AFP on condition of anonymity that RSF control of the area gives it "leverage over supply routes" running across the Libyan-Sudanese border. He added that the nearest military presence of the Sudanese army to the northeast lies about 400 kilometres from the tri-

"This distance could pose a threat to areas in northern Sudan," he added.

In its statement, the RSF called the area "a central hub for trade and transport between northern and eastern Africa", claiming that it "contains rich natural resources, including oil, gas and minerals".

The area is also situated north of El-Fasher, the capital of North Darfur, where fighting between the army and the RSF has escalated in recent weeks. El-Fasher, the only state capital in the western

Darfur region still under army control, and its nearby displacement camps have been heavily attacked since the army took control of Khartoum in March.

Since the fall of Khartoum, the RSF has adopted a twin strategy of long-range drone strikes on army-held cities plus counter-attacks to recapture territory in the south. The army on Tuesday called the RSF's co-ordinated attack with Haftar's troops on its border positions "a blatant aggression against Sudan" and part of a broader foreign-backed "conspiracy".

Attacks in central Nigeria kill at least 20

ttacks in north-central Nigeria's Plateau state have killed at least 20 people this week, local government and humanitarian sources aid vesterday, in the region's latest flare-up of violence.

The three separate assaults across the Mangu local government area followed a series of attacks and reprisals that appear to have started while people were mining in the tin-rich region, local government council chairman Emmanuel Bala said.

Fulani nomadic herders have long clashed with settled farmers in Plateau, over access to land and resources.

Attacks in the region often fall across ethnic and religious lines, leading to indiscriminate sectarian reprisals.

"Sometime ago the natives were mining, they were attacked" with machetes, though no one died, Bala said.

Following a series of retaliations and counter-retaliations, three attacks took place Monday and Tuesday, leaving at least 20 dead, Bala said.

Torrential rain, flooding claim 49 lives in South Africa

orrential rains unleashed flooding and landslides that claimed at least 49 lives in South Africa's Eastern Cape province, including four children on a school minibus that was swept away, provincial authorities said yesterday.

The death toll after the severe winter storm struck on Monday was likely to rise and it was not even clear how many people were missing in the largely rural and underdeveloped province, they said. "As of now, the stats have escalated to 49" deaths, Eastern Cape premier Lubabalo Oscar Mabuyane told reporters.

They included four children on a school minibus carrying 13 people that was swept away by a flood near the city of Mthatha, Mabuy-

"Sadly, four of those learners have been confirmed to be de-

ceased, together with the driver and the conductor of the minibus taxi," he said.

"Four learners are still missing and are still being looked for." Three others had been found

alive, he said. Much of South Africa has been struck by heavy rainfall and bitterly cold conditions in the past days, with snowfalls in several areas and strong winds causing damage. The Eastern Cape, which

stretches from the Indian Ocean into high inland mountains, has been particularly hard hit. "We have never seen this kind of combination of snow and tor-

rential rains in winter simultaneously." Mabuvane said. Authorities did not give details of the other victims of the disaster

and said the situation was evolving. "Now we are busy with the rescue operation. So we are trying to get figures, our people out of that situation, dead or alive," the

"What we would not know, besides the four kids, is to how many people are we looking for," provincial transport minister Xolile Ngatha told the same press conference, confirming the death toll of 49 was likely to increase.

Images from the remote area have shown informal settlements under water. On Tuesday, three children were rescued after spending hours in trees to escape rising waters, authorities said.

Hundreds of families were sheltering in community centres in the bitter cold. There had also been significant damage to infrastructure, including power and water supply, provincial officials said.

Mabuyane told public broadcaster SABC News earlier that only one helicopter was available in the province.

Strike by nurses in Ghana disrupts medical services

egotiations aimed at ending a strike by nurses in Ghana that has disrupted medical services collapsed yesterday, prompting the union to press on with the stop-

Around 85% of all nurses and midwives across Ghana are taking part in the strike, called by the Ghana Registered Nurses and Midwives Association (GRNMA) on June 2.

Despite government overtures, talks hit a fresh impasse yesterday when a scheduled truce meeting collapsed.

The nurses are demanding the full implementation of an agreement reached with the government in May last year.

It included an annual bonus equivalent to a month's salary, fuel and medical allowances, rural posting incentives and support for licence renewal terms. But the demands have not

been included in the 2025 budget, officials said. Hospitals around the country are already reeling from the impact of the strike.

Local media quoted mortuary workers at the 1,600-bed Korle Bu Teaching Hospital in the capital Accra as saying there had been an increase in the rates of preventable deaths, with up to 25 daily fatalities. Accra resident Agyarkor Kesse told AFP that his 18-year-old son died on Tuesday after hospitals declined to attend to him due to the strike.

"I took my son to Kpone government hospital first. When we got to the hospital, we were told the nurses were on strike. We

were helpless," Kesse said. GRNMA general secretary David Tenkorang-Twum defended the strike action. "Our demands are not above the roof... Our key demands... can be met without delay," he said.

Redesigning carbon borders: A new look at the EU's CBAM

As the climate crisis escalates, the European Union and the United Kingdom are moving forward with their Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism, promoting it as a landmark tool linking trade and climate policy. But the CBAM's ambitious aims are now meeting a growing backlash.

The CBAM puts a price on the carbon content of emissions-intensive imports like steel, aluminium, and cement. The goal is to reinforce the EU's Emissions Trading System (ETS) and create a level playing field between domestic and foreign producers, thereby incentivising greener production practices worldwide.

Despite the European Parliament's support for recent proposals to simplify the CBAM, its current design and pace of implementation risk undermining its legitimacy. Rather than advancing a fair and equitable energy transition, it could stoke trade tensions and fuel economic fragmentation, exacerbate inequality, and deliver only limited climate benefits.

The transition phase, which began in October 2023, requires importers to report carbon dioxide emissions associated with their goods, but does not require them to pay. That will change in January 2027, when the CBAM's levies on carbon-intensive imports take effect.

Most countries in the Global South - particularly major exporters to the EU - are unprepared for this shift, because they lack the technical capacity to track and report embedded CO2 emissions, the institutional infrastructure to verify them, and the fiscal space to absorb the costs of compliance. These are some of the symptoms of a deeply unequal global system in which the burdens of climate action have not been fairly distributed.

The CBAM risks deepening global inequality unless reformed to support developing countries and promote inclusive climate action

However commendable the CBAM's stated goals may be, its inherent asymmetries must not be overlooked. Applying a uniform carbonpricing regime to countries with vastly different capacities undermines the principle of a just energy transition and erodes the legitimacy of global climate action by placing a disproportionate burden on those least responsible for the crisis. Many developing nomies are still reco

from the Covid-19 pandemic and struggling with rising public debt, in addition to being acutely vulnerable to climate shocks. Now, they are expected to comply with EU and UK standards despite lacking access to robust emissions data systems, clean technologies, regulatory infrastructure, and adequate climate finance.

Compounding the problem, revenues generated through the CBAM will be directed to the budgets of the EU and the UK rather than to international climate finance or support for affected countries. This design flaw reinforces the perception that the CBAM is not a genuine effort to advance global climate goals but an instrument of trade protectionism. Many countries, particularly outside Europe, have voiced such concerns, viewing the mechanism as a unilateral trade measure cloaked in green rhetoric.

The geopolitical consequences could be dire. The CBAM has emerged at a time of fraving multilateralism and escalating trade tensions. Without broader participation and tangible support for affected exporters, it risks fuelling economic fragmentation and undermining global trust - just when international climate cooperation is most critical and official development assistance is being slashed. But the CBAM is not beyond repair. With thoughtful reforms, it can evolve from a rigid policy tool into a catalyst for an equitable climate transition. To achieve this, the EU and the UK should consider postponing the start of financial enforcement until at least 2028, thereby giving developing countries time to prepare and adapt.

This pause must be anchored in a strategic partnership framework that directs resources toward establishing emission-tracking systems, strengthening regulatory capacity, developing carbon-credit markets, and accelerating green industrial investment in climate-vulnerable economies.

Moreover, a portion of CBAM revenues should be allocated to international climate partnerships. This would make the mechanism more equitable, build trust with developing countries, and ensure that carbon pricing serves as an incentive rather than a penalty. Most importantly, the CBAM must not be framed as a final destination, but as a step toward a more coordinated and inclusive carbon-pricing framework. Mutual recognition of national systems, policy flexibility, and transitional thresholds could help prevent fragmentation and promote international alignment.

While the EU and the UK have both the capacity and the influence to help shape global standards, climate leadership demands more than bold policy ambitions; it requires solidarity, partnership, and the recognition of shared but differentiated responsibilities. Rather than simply decarbonising imports through a transactional approach, policymakers must focus on facilitating low-carbon development.

That goal cannot be achieved through border measures alone. If rushed, the CBAM could become just another divisive international levy.

The fight against climate change will not be won through exclusion. A sustainable future depends on building systems that bring others along. A well-designed CBAM could play a vital role in that effort. -**Project Syndicate**

Right name for Gulf of Mexico

S President Donald Trump's executive order renaming the Gulf of Mexico as the Gulf of America is an act of geographical chest-thumping. But imagine if he added a key word and called it the Gulf of North America. That simple tweak would trigger a meaningful shift in perspective.

The gulf's current name dates to the mid-sixteenth century, coined by Spanish cartographers mapping the waters of New Spain, then a colony that encompassed much of present-day Mexico and parts of the southern United States. It is, in other words, a legacy of European imperialism. True to his worldview, Trump envisions a new American imperialism, extending from Panama to Greenland.

Geographically, the claim is a draw: depending on how you measure it, the US and Mexico have roughly the same amount of coastline along the gulf. What is clear is that the body of water is essentially enclosed by North America - an integral part of the Western hemisphere. Renaming it the Gulf of North America would serve as a reminder of that. It would also be a historic way for Trump to mark the first FIFA World Cup hosted by the three Nor American countries - Mexico, the US, and Canada - in 2026.

To understand the Americas' strategic importance in the twenty-first century, we must begin with their people. By midcentury, nearly one in three US residents will trace their heritage to Latin America, just as many once traced theirs to Europe. Economically, culturally, and politically, Americans of Hispanic origin will be more oriented toward Latin America, rather than toward Europe or Asia.

Nearly 60% of Latinos in the US are of Mexican descent, laying a foundation for greater cross-border integration. While Trump has issued an executive order designating English as the official language of the US, Spanish is certainly not going away. Hundreds of millions of people in countries with close ties to the US speak it - Miami, for example, is often described as Latin America's economic capital. In states like Texas, California, and Florida, Spanish-English bilingualism is often a

practical necessity for business, education, and governance.

Ironically, Trump has helped advance North American economic integration by accelerating the turn toward industrial policy that began with President Barack Obama's auto-industry bailout and \$90bn investment in clean energy. To be sure, Trump's version relied on a different strategy: tariffs, tax cuts, and deregulation. His successor, Joe Biden, combined these approaches - retaining Trump's tariffs while rebuilding infrastructure and subsidising green and high-tech industries. Both Trump and Biden encouraged nearshoring in response to geopolitical rivalry with China and post-pandemic supply-chain shocks. Now, Trump is doubling down on his firstterm trade and economic policies.

Mexico has been a major beneficiary of this shift. In 2023, it overtook China to become the largest US trade partner, with their total goods trade reaching nearly \$800bn. In 2024, Mexico received more than \$35bn in foreign direct investment, part of a larger nearshoring trend in Latin America. US firms are increasingly investing in Mexico, as well as countries in Central and South America, because of their proximity, but also because they are young, digitally connected, and economically ambitious. Even with rising US protectionism, the region's geographic and cultural alignmen make it a better bet than Europe or Asia for companies producing goods and services for the US market.

Politically, however, Trump often paints the region as a cesspool of criminality, focusing on gangs and drug trafficking. He is pressuring Mexican President Claudia Sheinbaum to stop the flow of drugs and people over the border, using his 25% tariff on Mexican auto, steel, and aluminium exports as a powerful bargaining chip.

Moreover, Trump frames problems in a way that allows him to step in with "solutions" that suit his interests and, crucially, can be easily spun into political wins. For example, by emphasising the China-Mexico fentanyl pipeline - where China supplies precursor chemicals that Mexican cartels use to manufacture the drug - Trump justifies his trade war on both countries.

Likewise, Trump has focused his ire on the relatively small number of illegal immigrants in the US who have committed crimes - a problem that he can "address" with dramatic mass deportations of alleged Latin American gang members. Once this performative phase ends, Trump will almost certainly revive and take credit for the package of immigration reforms contained in last year's bipartisan bordersecurity bill, which the Republicans killed at Trump's behest, so that he could continue campaigning on illegal immigration.

These reforms could lay the groundwork for a US-Mexico migration agreement that would create a more fluid visa system for provisional workers. But decreasing immigration in the long term requires strengthening the Mexican economy and improving the government's ability to fight corruption and protect its citizens.

Meanwhile, demographic forces will continue to do their work. American Latinos will build businesses that connect communities across the Western hemisphere. Cultural and educational exchanges will grow organically. Even as many governments implement stricter visa rules, US citizens can still travel, study, and retire in Mexico and other Latin American

When Chicago-born Cardinal Robert Prevost became Pope Leo XIV, US newspapers trumpeted the first American pope. But the Vatican News heralded the rrival of the "second Roman Pontiff after Pope Francis - from the Americas". The point was not that Prevost had spent decades in Peru and had become a naturalised Peruvian citizen. It was that Pope Francis was from South America, and Pope Leo "is from the northern part of the continent". Viewing the Americas as one continent is a useful way to see the world an outlook that will probably gain ground

Trump is unlikely to accept my suggestion about the Gulf of North America. But his successor might. Regardless of the name, it is the geographic and economic reality. -Project Syndicate

Musk regrets some of his Trump criticisms, says they 'went too far'

lon Musk, the world's richest person and Donald Trump's former advisor, ■ said yesterday he regretted some of his recent criticisms of the US president, after the pair's public falling-out last

"I regret some of my posts about President @realDonaldTrump last week. They went too far," Musk wrote on his social media platform X, in a message that was received favorably by the White House.

Musk's expression of regret came just days after Trump threatened the tech billionaire with "serious consequences" if he sought to punish Republicans who vote for a controversial spending bill.

Their blistering break-up -- largely carried out on social media before a riveted public since Thursday last week was ignited by Musk's harsh criticism of Trump's so-called "big, beautiful" spending bill, which is currently before Congress. Some lawmakers who were against the bill had called on Musk -- one of the Republican Party's biggest financial backers in last year's presidential election -- to fund primary challenges against Republicans who voted for the legislation.

"He'll have to pay very serious consequences if he does that," Trump, who also branded Musk "disrespectful," told NBC News on Saturday, without specifying what those consequences would be.

Trump also said he had "no" desire to repair his relationship with the South African-born Tesla and SpaceX chief, and that he has "no intention of speaking to him." But after Musk's expression of regret, White House Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt told reporters that Trump was "appreciative," adding that "no efforts" had been made on a threat by Trump to end some of Musk's government con-

"The president acknowledged the statement that Elon put out this morning, and he is appreciative of it," Leavitt said.

According to the New York Times, Musk's message followed a phone call to Trump late on Monday night.

Vice President ID Vance and Chief of Staff Susan Wiles had also been working with Musk on how to broker a truce with Trump, the report said. In his post yesterday, Musk did not specify which of his criticisms of Trump had gone "too far."

The former allies had seemed to have cut ties amicably about two weeks ago, with Trump giving Musk a glowing sendoff as he left his cost-cutting role at the so-called Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE). But their relationship cracked within days, with Musk describing the spending bill as an "abomination"

that, if passed by Congress, could define Trump's second term in office. Trump hit back at Musk's comments in an Oval Office diatribe and from there the row detonated, leaving Washington stunned.

Trump later said on his Truth Social platform that cutting billions of dollars in subsidies and contracts to Musk's companies would be the "easiest way" to save the US government money. US media have put the value of the contracts at \$18bn.

With real political and economic risks to their falling out, both already appeared to inch back from the brink on Friday, with Trump telling reporters "I just wish him well," and Musk responding on X: "Likewise."

Pakistan's plan to sharply increase growth faces headwinds: analysts

akistan is aiming to sharply increase economic growth under its annual federal budget unveiled on Tuesday, but analysts are sceptical about the country's ability to meet its ambitious goals.

The budget targets higher revenues and a steep fiscal deficit cut under International Monetary Fund (IMF) backed reforms. Yet, defence spending was hiked 20%, excluding military pensions, after last month's conflict

with India. Finance Minister Muhammad Aurangzeb said in a post-budget press conference vesterday that customs duties have been cut or removed on thousands of raw materials and intermediate

"Industry here has to be competitive, competitive enough to export," he said.

But growth drivers remain unclear. The government is targeting 4.2% GDP growth in fiscal 2026, up from 2.7% this year, which was revised down from an

initial 3.6% as agriculture and large-scale manufacturing underperformed.

GDP "Pakistan's growth projection of 4.2% appears ambitious given recent performance, and overly optimistic assumptions may place tax targets out of reach," said Callee Davis, senior economist at Oxford Economics.

Pakistan's past growth spurts were consumption-led, triggering balance-of-payments crises and IMF bailouts.

The government says it now wants higher-quality, investment-driven growth.

Aurangzeb said structural reforms are underway, pointing to East Asia-style pro-market transitions. "This is an East Asia moment for Pakistan," he

The 17.57tn rupee (\$62.24bn) budget comes as Pakistan remains under a \$7bn IMF programme. Revenues are projected to rise over 14%, driven by new taxes and broadening the tax base. The fiscal deficit is targeted at 3.9% of GDP, down from this year's 5.9%.

Key reforms include taxing

agriculture, real estate, and retail, and reviving stalled privatisations. But revenue shortfalls this year have raised doubts, with both agriculture income tax and retail collections missing targets. Only 1.3% of the population paid income tax in 2024, government data shows.

"Pakistan's budget keeps the IMF and investors happy, even if it comes at a near-term cost to growth," said Hasnain Malik, head of equity strategy at Tellimer. "The political setup, with the military firmly in charge, also lowers the risk of protests."

While overall spending will fall 7%, defence will rise after the worst fighting between the nuclear-armed neighbours in decades. Including pensions, defence spending will total \$12 billion, 19% of the federal budget or 2.5% of GDP, matching India's share, per World Bank data.

The hike was enabled by a sharp drop in interest payments, as the central bank cut policy rates from 22% to 11% over the past year, easing domestic debt servicing costs. Aurangzeb said cuts in subsidies also helped create fiscal space.

The last large parade in Washington was in 1991 after the first Gulf War. The Trump administration is painting the protests as a violent threat to the nation, requiring military force to support regular immigration agents

Trump on Tuesday cited a "full-blown assault on peace, on public order and national sovereignty" from a "foreign enemy."

Protesters and the beleaguered Democratic opposition party say Trump is manufacturing a crisis that has little to do with expelling criminals in the US illegally.

Argentina's convicted ex-leader Kirchner seeks house arrest

rgentina's ex-president Cristina Kirchner has asked to serve her six-year prison sentence for corruption under house arrest. her lawyer said yesterday, a day after the Supreme Court upheld her conviction and ban on holding

The ruling by the top court brought the curtain down on the career of a giant of the Argentine left and a leading critic of libertarian President Javier Milei. Given her age -72 – Kirchner has the right to request that she serve her sentence at her home in Buenos Aires. "We are requesting the house arrest granted to people over 70," her lawyer Carlos Beraldi

Kirchner, who served two terms as president between 2007 and 2015, heads the leftist Peronist movement founded by post-war president Juan Peron and his wife Eva.

She claims the case is part of a right-wing political plot to scupper her career.

Another of her lawyers, Gregorio Dalbon, travelled to the Dutch city of The Hague to file a complaint at the International Criminal Court.

Writing on X. Dalbon said Kirchner was the victim of "lawfare," which aimed "to disqualify the woman who has won most often at the polls since the return to democracy" after a 1976-1983 dicta-

He said he would also appeal the verdict to the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights.

She has called the three Supreme Court judges who rejected her leave to appeal her 2022 conviction to the top court "puppets acting on orders from above." The downfall of a woman who inspires reverence on the left and revulsion on the right has divided Argentines.

UK's Reeves sets out over £2tn of spending to revive government

ritish finance minister Rachel Reeves prioritised B spending on health, defence and infrastructure projects to drive economic growth in a bid yesterday to reboot the Labour government's offer of a brighter future to increasingly disillusioned voters.

Setting out day-to-day budgets for government departments from 2026 to 2029 and investment plans out to 2030, Reeves said the priorities of her spending review were those of the "working people" whose interests Labour has said it will focus on.

Keen to promote capital spending on housing, transport and cleaner energy projects, Reeves wanted to show the Labour government was delivering on its plan for change. But with more money going to health and defence, day-to-day spending in other areas of government will be squeezed. "The priorities of this spending review are the priorities of working people - to invest in Britain's security, in Britain's health and to grow Britain's economy so that working people are better off," she told a noisy session of parliament.

N Ireland politicians urge end to racially motivated riots

oliticians from across divided Northern Ireland joined forces yesterday to call for calm after two nights of riots targeting foreigners, as UK Prime Minister Keir Starmer denounced the "mindless" violence.

The unrest that injured 15 police officers on Monday and 17 on Tuesday has included rioters

throwing petrol bombs, fireworks and bricks at homes and busi-

It was triggered by the arrest of two teenagers accused of attempting to rape a young girl. The pair appeared in court on Monday where they asked for a Romanian interpreter.

"We strongly condemn the racially motivated violence witnessed in recent days and make an urgent appeal for calm across society," ministers from every party in the province's power-sharing executive said in a joint statement.

Residents had been "terrorised" and police injured, they added, urging people to reject the "divisive agenda being pushed by a 'destructive" minority.

"There can never be any justification for the violence that has taken place in recent days," said the leaders.

Traditional foes such as the republican Sinn Fein and pro-UK

Democratic Unionist Party joined

in the statement. Northern Ireland's First Minister Michelle O'Neill, the Sinn Fein vice-president, called the riots "abhorrent", while Starmer condemned them as "mindless attacks".

Six people were arrested during the second night of riots in Ballymena, around 48 kilometres northwest of Belfast, and other

Police will not confirm the ethnicity of the two teenagers who remain in custody.

Ashghal completes roads, infrastructure project in Al Kharaitiyat and Izghawa

The Public Works Authority (Ashghal) announced the completion of works of the third package of the Roads and Infrastructure Development Project in Al Kharaitiyat and Izghawa, which the Ashghal is implementing within four development packages with the aim of enhancing road network and infrastructure services to serve citizens' lands in the area.

Head of North Areas Section of the Roads Projects Department at Ashghal engineer Abdulla al-Naemi said that the third package of the project aims to achieve extensive improvements which, upon completion, will serve about 1,383 plots in the area through the development of internal streets and construction of shared pedestrian and cycling paths, in addition to developing infrastructure facilities such as rainwater and groundwater drainage networks and other networks to provide integrated infrastructure services and improve the quality of life of the area residents.

For his part, Project Engineer Jassim Kano explained that this package of the Al Kharaitiyat and Izghawa project provides about 42km of roads, with the installation of 1,783 street lighting poles and traffic safety elements, and the provision of 7,300



parking spaces designated for cars.

Within the scope of the project, infrastructure networks were also developed, which include a surface and groundwater drainage network with a total length of 33km, a treated water network with a length of 13km, in addition to a wastewater drainage network with a length of 32km, in addition to 6.5km of power line works and 19km of telecommunications lines, he added.

The project's planting works cover an area of 9,250sq m, and the shared pedestrian and cycling paths will extend over 84km.

Local materials and manufacturers were

relied upon in most of the project work, with the local component reaching 70% of the total materials used, as local Qatari sources were relied upon, which include, for example, lighting poles, drainage pipes, precast manholes, electrical cables, directional signs, and interlocking.

To minimise inconveniences that may result from development works to residents to the greatest extent possible, the geographical scope of the project was divided into four areas to be worked on in successive phases when commencing the project works. (QNA)
