50 more massacred in Gaza, many trying to reach food

Israeli fire killed at least 50 them near an aid distribution site run by the US-backed Gaza Humanitarian Foundation. the territory's Health Ministry said, as UN officials denounced Israeli-backed aid delivery methods. Medics said at least 23 of those people were killed and 200 others wounded near an aid distribution site in Rafah, the latest in daily mass shootings that have killed hundreds of Palestinians trying to reach food since Israel imposed a new distribution system after partly lifting a near three-month total blockade. Israel has put responsibility for distributing much of the aid it allows into Gaza into the hands of a new US-backed group, the Gaza Humanitarian Foundation, which operates three sites in areas guarded by Israeli troops. The United Nations has rejected the plan, saying GHF distribution is inadequate, dangerous and violates humanitarian impartiality principles. (Reuters)

G7 leaders struggle for unity at summit

Group of Seven (G7) leaders met yesterday seeking a common approach on wars in Ukraine and the Middle East but faced early challenges as US President Donald Trump said removing Russia from the former Group of Eight over a decade ago had been a mistake. The once tightknit grouping has struggled to find unity as Washington retreats from multilateralism and Trump overtly expresses support for Russian President Vladimir Putin. Page 11

Iran urges Trump to make Israel halt war

n Israeli strike hit Iran's state broadcaster yesterthile the head UN nuclear watchdog indicated extensive damage to Iran's biggest uranium enrichment plant and Iran called on the US to force a ceasefire in the four-day-old aerial war.

Israeli forces have stepped up their bombardment of Iranian cities, while Iran proved capable of piercing Israeli air defences with one of its most successful volleys yet of retaliatory missile

strikes. "If President Trump is genuine about diplomacy and interested in stopping this war, next steps are consequential," Iran's Foreign Minister Abbas Araqchi said on X.

"Israel must halt its aggression, and absent a total cessation of military aggression against us, our responses will continue. It takes one phone call from Washington to muzzle someone like Netanyahu."

Sources told Reuters that Tehran had asked Qatar, Saudi Arabia and Oman to press US President Donald Trump to use his influence on Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and push for an immediate ceasefire. In return, Iran would show flexibility in nuclear negotiations, said the two Iranian and three regional sources.

Netanyahu told troops at an air base that Israel was on its way to achieving its two main aims: wiping out Iran's nuclear programme and destroying its mis-

"We are on the path to victory," he said. "We are telling the citizens of Tehran: 'Evacuate' and we are taking action."

Late on Monday, Israel said it hit Iran's broadcasting authority, and footage showed a newsreader hurrying from her seat as a blast struck. Iran's State News Agency also

reported the strike.

Iran has issued evacuation warnings for Israeli news channels N12 and N14 after Israel attacked the building of Iran's state broadcaster. Iranian media said Iran was preparing for the "largest and most intense missile attack" yet against Israel, including against military and intelligence targets.

Israel says it now has control of Iranian airspace and intends to escalate the campaign in coming

Israel said it hit Iranian F-14 fighter planes at Tehran airport yesterday, and its air strikes have also put at least two of Iran's three operating uranium enrichment plants out of action.

Rafael Grossi, head of the International Atomic Energy Agency, told the BBC yesterday it was very likely all the roughly 15,000 centrifuges operating at Iran's biggest uranium enrichment plant at Natanz were badly damaged or destroyed because of a power cut caused by an Israeli strike.

There had been very limited or no damage at the separate For-

dow plant, he said. Tehran's retaliation is the first time in decades of shadow war and proxy conflict that missiles fired from Iran have pierced Israeli defences in significant numbers and killed Israelis in their homes.

Iran says more than 224 Iranians have been killed, most of them civilians. Media published images of wounded children, women, and the elderly from cities across the country. State TV broadcast scenes of collapsed presidential buildings, burnedout cars, and shattered streets in Tehran. Many residents were trying to flee the capital, describing queues for petrol and bank machines that were out of cash.

Iranian air defences thwarted an attack yesterday on the Iranian South Pars gas field, the world's biggest gas field, the Iranian Fararu news website reported. Iran shares the South Pars gas field with Qatar.

In Israel, 24 people have been killed so far in Iran's missile attacks, all of them civilians. Round-the-clock television images showed rescuers working in ruins of flattened homes.





The Marine Protection Department at the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change has made several achievements throughout the first quarter of this year to protect the local ecosystems and the related sea environment. More than four surveillance and inspection tours were carried out by the deep-sea diving team to ensure the health of underwater environment in the country, more than 33 surprise inspection tours were conducted at various marine sites, and more than 865 regular daily inspection tours were carried out by the various marine unit teams.

The number of violations spotted during this period amounted to 61 of non-standard fishing nets, 28 regarding the use of long lines $\,$

with hooks for fishing, and 14 for using fishing traps. The department was also active in promoting awareness on related issues holding more than two workshops on different issues, took part at three different public activities, carried out more than four beach cleaning campaigns and more than three meetings held on key issues.

The other marine violations spotted during such period included 13 violations of using spotlights at undesignated areas, 13 violations of illegal use of bird hunting tools, and more than seven violations of using non-standard fishing hooks. The department has continued to offer its various public services and undertake its duties to protect the local marine environment, a statement added.

Al-Suwaidi stressed that addressing these challenges requires intensified efforts to rebuild Afghan institutions, ensure continued humanitarian and development assistance for the Afghan people, and maintain dialogue and engagement with all Afghan parties to reach solutions that foster greater stability and growth.

Shura Council discusses proposal to enhance privileges for the elderly

The proposal presented several key recommendations, including the enactment of a dedicated law to grant the elderly distinct privileges and facilities in their daily lives. It also called for the allocat designated parking spaces for the elderly in both public and private areas across the country, ensuring these spaces are located near main entrances and clearly marked with appropriate signage. The proposal further recommended enhancing healthcare services for the elderly by giving them priority in booking medical appointments at public health institutions, with the option to

refer them to contracted private medical centres, in addition to providing a comprehensive health insurance system that fully covers their medical expenses. Additional recommendations included allocating special areas for the elderly in government service centres to streamline their transactions and exempting them from certain public service fees.

The proposal also called for issuing official identification cards for the elderly by a competent authority, enabling them to access discounts and benefits in collaboration with the private sector. Following a thorough discussion of the report and its recommendations, the Council approved the proposal and

resolved to submit it to the government. The Council also approved a draft law concerning lost and abandoned property and a draft law on water, both in their amended forms. It referred the drafts to the government after reviewing the reports of the specialised committees and discussing their details with the members.

Separately, the Council discussed a draft law amending certain provisions of the Anti-Money Laundering and Terrorism Financing Law, promulgated by Law No 20 of 2019, as referred by the government. The Council decided to forward the draft to the Internal and External Affairs Committee for further study and reporting.

GU-Q students turn interviews into graphic novels

This summer, the library at Georgetown University in Qatar (GU-Q) is the home of an exciting collection of graphic novels about historical events such as war, migration, and political upheaval, outcome of an innovative course taught: History and the Graphic Novel.

Taught by Dr Karine Walther, associate professor of history, the course studies graphic novels as secondary history resources. "Graphic novels can show history, not just describe it. There's a unique emotional weight when you see history unfold through art, it feels more personal and real than just reading facts or dates," said Mohamed Jaski, a culture and politics major with a minor in history, who was one of 12 students enrolled in the class.

Teaching history in novel and interesting ways is not new to Dr Walther, who was voted 'Faculty Member of the Year' by the graduating class at this year's Tropaia senior award ceremony. "I first took Prof Walther during my freshman year for proseminar, and since then, she's remained my absolute favourite professor," said

Another cornerstone of the class was a technical workshop on how to use Canva, Adobe Illustrator and Photoshop, and Artificial Intelligence to generate images and develop storyboards for their graphic novel, taught by associate director of the library, Robert Laws.

"The course introduced us to so many diverse graphic styles, which inspired me to blend techniques in my own way," said Jaski. His graphic novel, titled "Maryam," which explores the loss and grief of war, blends Marvel-style design with a transition to stark black-and-white visuals for a dramatic, immersive feel.



"Seeing the students take ownership of the historymaking process is always the best part of a class," said Dr Walther. "In this class, they interviewed a member of their family or a community member, and translated those memories into a graphic novel. Although I guided them through the process of creatively engaging with their own history in conversation with historical texts, they were the ones who made this class all that it could be."

The course culminated in an exhibit of student work in the library, which, due to its essential role in supporting the class, had become an extension of the

The graphic novels produced were also printed professionally by the GU-Q bookstore and gifted to the students as a tangible reminder of the power of creative expression in academic settings.







Persian-language outlets meanwhile also posted images of hundreds of cars lining roads outside petrol stations in Tehran and its satellite city of Karaj, saying they were filling up ahead of long journeys outside of the city

While air travel is impossible, Iranians can still in theory cross borders by land to go abroad. Footage posted on social media, which has not been verified by AFP, showed hundreds queueing at the Bazargan crossing point in western Iran with Turkiye close to the eastern Turkish city of Dogubayazit.

War-weary Gazans share images of destruction in Israel

esidents of the Gaza Strip have circulated images of wrecked buildings and charred vehicles hit by Iranian missiles in Israeli cities, and some were hopeful the wider conflict could eventually bring peace to their ruined homeland.

Iranian missiles struck Tel

Aviv and the Israeli port city of Haifa before dawn yesterday, killing at least eight people, part of a wave of attacks by Tehran in retaliation for Israel's strikes targeting its nuclear and ballistic missile programmes.

"The Iranian response was a surprise to me, to many Palestinians, and the Israelis too. Everyone thought it would be mild," said Mohammad Jamal, 27, a resident of Gaza City.

Erdogan tells Putin Israel threatens regional security

Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan accused Israel of threatening security in the Middle East during a phone call with Russian counterpart Vladimir Putin yesterday, his office said.

"The spiral of violence that began with Israel's attacks on Iran has put the security of the entire region at risk," Erdogan was quoted as saying.

His office said he told Putin that the "lawless attitude" of Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's government "poses a clear threat to the international system", adding that the Middle East "cannot tolerate

The Kremlin said Putin and Erdogan used the conversation to call for an "immediate" end to fighting between Israel and Iran.

"The leaders called for an immediate end to hostilities and the settlement of contentious issues, including those related to Iran's nuclear programme, exclusively through political and diplomatic means," the Kremlin said in its readout of the call.

Turkiye has stepped up its diplomacy since Israel launched aerial attacks on Iran last Friday and Tehran struck back on the weekend, in their most intense confrontation in history.

'Very scared': Israelis reel from escalating Iran missile fire

fter an Iranian strike early yesterday gouged a gap-Ling hole in his apartment building in central Israel, Idan Bar said he feared for his family as the air war between the longtime foes escalated.

One woman's mouth hung open as she was taken away in a wheelchair. "My building got bombed from Iran," Bar said.

"It was very scary while I have four children, four boys. We're very scared, but everyone is ok." Inside the building, first responders in orange helmets scoured the blown-out apartments. Debris from the blast littered the ground below, where plastic patio furniture lay overturned.

Iran unleashed a missile barrage on Israeli cities after Israel hit deep inside the Islamic republic, pressing a major offensive that began in the early hours of Friday.

On the fourth day of the escalating air war, the death toll in Israel rose to 24 after authorities announced yesterday 11 dead. In Iran, officials said the Israeli attacks had killed at least 224 people since Friday.

The scenes of devastation wit-

nessed in Petah Tikva yesterday are relatively rare in Israel, whose advanced air defence systems usually intercept incoming threats.

The country has long been used to rockets and drones fired by Iran-backed fighter groups like Hamas in the Gaza Strip and Lebanon's Hezbollah, but volleys of ballistic missiles launched from the Islamic republic have left the population feeling vulnerable.

Since Friday, air raid sirens have sent people across Israel running to bomb shelters on a nightly ba-

The latest Iranian attack followed Israeli strikes in central Iran, which Israel's military said targeted surface-to-surface missile launchers.

Israel has said that its surprise attack launched on Friday - after decades of enmity and a prolonged shadow war - targets Iran's nuclear programme and military facilities. The deaths in Iran have included top military commanders, nuclear scientists and civilians, according to authorities. AFP images showed fires blaz-

ing next to gutted buildings and charred cars in the coastal hub of Tel Aviv, after the military warned people to take cover from incoming Iranian missiles.

Henn, a Petah Tivka resident who declined to give his last name, said he ran to take shelter after hearing sirens.

The 39-year-old said he heard a loud explosion, "and after a few minutes we saw all the damage, all the houses broken".

Israeli officials said four people were killed in Petah Tivka and some 35 others taken to hospital with injuries.

Uganda passes law to try civilians in military courts

Ugandan President Yoweri Museveni yesterday

signed a new law allowing civilians to be tried in military courts that critics said could be used against opposition leaders ahead of next year's election, AFP reported from Kampala. The new law comes despite a ruling by the Supreme Court in late January that it was unconstitutional for civilians to be tried in military courts as was the case for opposition leader Kizza Besigye. Besigye, 69, was abducted by armed men in Nairobi in November and re-emerged a few days later at a military court in Uganda, where he was charged with treason, which carries a potential death penalty. Following the Supreme Court ruling, his case was moved to a civilian court. But the new law provides for "exceptional circumstances" under which civilians can be subjected to military law, including the "unlawful possession of arms, ammunition or equipment," one of the other charges Besigye is facing. The signing of the law was announced by Uganda's parliament on X. Besigye's lawyer Erias Lukwago told AFP the law was designed to facilitate the "illegal detention and trial of Besigve and others". Besigve has been in jail for more than the six-month legal limit for detention without trial.

UK commits £8bn to flood defences

Britain government has announced plans to invest almost £8bn (\$11bn) on flood defences over the next 10 years, citing growing risks posed by climate change. The funding forms part of an infrastructure strategy this week due to outline the government's long-term plan to invest billions of pounds on delivering major infrastructure projects. The government said new funds will "protect hundreds of thousands of homes, small businesses, and vital infrastructure from the growing threat of flooding". The Climate Change Committee, an expert group that advises the government, warned in April that Britain is not properly prepared for severe floods and heatwaves.

Cambodia threatens to ban Thai fruits, vegetable imports

Cambodia's former leader Hun Sen yesterday issued an ultimatum to Thailand to lift border crossing restrictions or his country will ban all Thai fruit and vegetable imports in the latest round of the border spat between the two countries. One Cambodian soldier was killed on May 28 as troops exchanged fire in a disputed area known as the Emerald Triangle, where the borders of Cambodia, Thailand and Laos meet. In an address to the nation, Hun Sen - father of current Prime Minister Hun Manet - threatened to ban all fruit and vegetables from Thailand unless Bangkok lifted all border crossing restrictions within 24 hours.

Nepal begins commercial power export to Bangladesh

Nepal said it has begun commercial electricity exports to Bangladesh, marking its entry into the international power market. The Himalavan nation started transmitting 40 megawatts (MW) of electricity to Bangladesh via India on Sunday under a five-year agreement. "Nepal will continue supplying electricity to Bangladesh during the monsoon season from mid-June to mid-November," Rajan Dhakal, spokesperson at Nepal Electricity Authority, said. In October, the country signed a tripartite power export deal with the Bangladesh Power Development Board and India's NTPC Vidyut Vyapar Nigam, which is facilitating access to the transmission line

Crisis-hit Sri Lanka vows reforms as growth slows

Sri Lanka's president yesterday vowed to press ahead with unpopular reforms, including the closure of loss-making state institutions, as official data showed economic expansion slowing down. President Anura Kumara Dissanayake said maintaining the country's 1.5mn-strong public service was unsustainable and that there would be cutbacks. Addressing an IMF-backed review of the country's economic recovery from the unprecedented meltdown of 2022, the president said he has identified several state institutions to be shut down. "We have already decided that certain state institutions should be closed," Dissanavake said.

US 'pushes Vietnam firms to decouple from Chinese tech'

The US is pushing Vietnam in tariff talks to reduce the use of Chinese tech in devices that are assembled in the country before being exported to America, three people briefed on the matter

Vietnam is home to large manufacturing operations of tech firms such as Apple and Samsung, which often rely on components made in China. Meta and Google also have contractors in Vietnam that produce goods such as virtual reality headsets and smartphones.

The Southeast Asian nation has been organising meetings with local businesses to boost the supply of Vietnamese parts, with firms showing willingness to co-operate but also warning they would need time and technology to do so, according to one person with knowledge of the discussions.

The Trump administration has threatened Vietnam with crippling tariffs of 46% which could significantly limit access for Vietnammade goods to their main market and upend the country's exportoriented growth model.

Vietnam has been asked "to reduce its dependency on Chinese high-tech," said one person familiar with the discussions. "That is part of the restructuring of supply chains and would in turn reduce US dependency on Chinese components," the person added.

The ultimate objective is to speed

up US decoupling from Chinese high-tech while increasing Vietnam's industrial capacity, a second person said, citing virtual reality devices as an example of Vietnamassembled products that are too dependent on Chinese technology.

All sources declined to be identified as the discussions were confidential. Reuters was not able to learn if the US has proposed numerical targets such as caps on Chinese content for "Made in Vietnam" goods or different tariff rates based on the amount of Chinese content.

Samsung, Meta and Apple, Google did not reply to requests for comment.

As the US-imposed deadline of July 8 nears before the tariffs take effect, the timing and scope of a possible deal remain unclear.

All sources stressed that while the US has made broader requests for Vietnam to reduce its reliance on China, tackling the issue of Chinese high-tech content in exports was a key priority.

Last year, China exported around \$44bn of tech such as electronics components, computers and phones to Vietnam, about 30% of its total exports to the country. Vietnam shipped \$33bn of tech goods to the US or 28% of the US-bound exports. Both flows are on the rise this year, according to Vietnam's customs data.

Vietnam's trade ministry did not reply to requests for comment. Separate sources have previously said that US demands were seen as "tough" and "difficult" by Vietnamese negotiators.

The US also wants Vietnam to crack down on the practice of shipping Chinese goods to America with misleading "Made in Vietnam" labels that draw lower duties - which Vietnam is also trying to

The ministry said on Sunday that a third round of talks last week in Washington ended with progress, but critical issues remain unresolved.

Vietnam's ruling Communist Party chief To Lam intends to meet US President Donald Trump in the US. possibly in late June, officials with knowledge of the matter said. No date has been announced for the trip.

The White House and Vietnam's foreign ministry did not respond to requests for comment on the possible visit.

Local firms attending meetings organised by the trade ministry in recent weeks expressed a general willingness to adapt, but many warned that instant changes "would destroy business", according to one of the sources.

Vietnam has been slowly developing an industrial ecosystem with local suppliers but it has a long way to go before it can match China's advanced supply chains and cheaper pricing, industry executives say.

"Vietnam is about 15-20 years behind China in somewhat fully replicating its supply chain scale and sophistication, but it's catching up fast, especially in key sectors like textiles and electronics," said Carlo Chiandone, a Vietnam-based supply chain expert.

India expects EU trade deal by year-end as Cyprus vows support

ndia expects to finalise a free trade agreement with the Eu-■ropean Union by the end of this year, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said yesterday, while Cyprus, which assumes the EU presidency in 2026, said better ties would be its priority.

Modi, on an official visit to the east Mediterranean island, said there were unlimited possibilities

in expanding economic ties with Cyprus in a visit aimed at pushing forward India's global trade agenda. "We are working on finalising a mutually beneficial India-EU trade agreement by the end of this year," Modi said in joint remarks with Cypriot President Nikos Christodoulides. India is pursuing a trade link by sea and rail known as the India-Middle East-Europe Corridor, but the visit is being held in the shadow of an escalating cri-

sis in the Middle East. "We agree the India-Middle East Europe Corridor will pave the way for peace and prosperity in the region," Modi said.

Cyprus, which has close relations with India through its shared membership of the Commonwealth, is offering facilities to be a first point of entry to Europe and a transhipment hub, Christodoulides said. "A strengthening of EU-India relations will be among the priorities of the Cypriot EU presidency," Christodoulides said. Cyprus assumes the rotating six-month presidency of the bloc in early 2026.

Fugitive jeweller Choksi accuses India of orchestrating kidnap

Fugitive jeweller Mehul Choksi accused India of orchestrating his kidnapping to extradite him on fraud allegations, with his lawyers telling London's High Court yesterday that only India had the motivation and resources to do so. Choksi - who was arrested in Belgium in April - is wanted in India over his alleged involvement in one of India's biggest bank frauds at Punjab National Bank, which in 2018 announced it had discovered alleged fraud worth \$1.8bn. The Indian government has since sought to extradite Choksi, who faces charges alongside his nephew Niray Modi, who has been in custody in

Britain since 2019. The pair deny any wrongdoing. Choksi is separately suing the Indian government in London, arguing that the state was responsible for his kidnapping in Antigua in 2021, when he says he was abducted and taken to Dominica in an attempt to extradite him to India. India's lawyer Harish Salve said in court filings that "there is no evidence of India having anything to do with the alleged events". Choksi alleges he was beaten in a failed attempt to extort a false confession and implicate India's political opposition, which he says points to state involvement in the incident.

UK to toughen laws to halt child grooming gangs

The UK government yesterday announced it would bring in tough new laws to "root out the scourge" of grooming gangs suspected of sexually exploiting thousands of girls and young women. Authorities have launched a nationwide crackdown on the

The announcement, by Interior minister Yvette Cooper, came as a damning report written by member of the upper house of the UK parliament Louise Casey was published. Prime Minister Keir Starmer on

India's monsoon back on track, heatwave to ease

rndia's monsoon has revived after stalling for more than a fortnight, and rains are set to cover central parts of the country this week, bringing relief from the heatwave in the grain-growing northern plains, two senior weather officials said yesterday.

The monsoon, the lifeblood of the country's nearly \$4tn economy, delivers nearly 70% of the rain that India needs to water farms and replenish aquifers and reservoirs.

Nearly half of India's farmland, which has no irrigation, depends on the annual June-September rains for crop growth.

The monsoon has revived after a fortnight as a favourable weather system has developed in the Bay of Bengal, which would help the monsoon to cover entire central India this week, an official of the India Meteorological Department (IMD) said.

Monsoon rains yesterday covered almost entire western state of Maharashtra and entered into neighbouring Gujarat and central state of Madhya Pradesh, the official said. The monsoon's onset over Kerala occurred on May 24 and quickly covered southern, northeastern and some parts of western India ahead of its usual schedule, but its progress has stalled since May 29, according to an IMD chart that tracked the monsoon's progress.

The monsoon has gained the required momentum, and heavy rainfall is likely over west coast, central and some parts of north India in the next 10 days, which will significantly bring down temperatures, another weather official said.

Crash should drive effort to build safer airline: Air India chief

ir India's chairman N Chandrasekaran yesterday told staff that last week's plane crash that killed at least 271 people should be a catalyst to build a safer airline, urging employees to stay resolute amid any criticism.

In a town hall held at the headquarters of the Tata Group-owned airline near New Delhi and attended by 700 staff. Chandrasekaran said the crash was the "most heartbreaking" crisis of his career, a spokesperson said.

"I've seen a reasonable number

of crises in my career, but this is the most heartbreaking one," he said, according to a Tata Group spokes-

"We need to use this incident as an act of force to build a safer airline," Chandrasekaran told the meeting.

The Boeing 787-8 Dreamliner with 242 people on board bound for Gatwick Airport south of London began losing height seconds after take-off in Ahmedabad on Thursday, and erupted in a huge fireball as it hit buildings below.

All but one on board were declared dead in the world's worst aviation disaster in a decade, and around 30 people died on the ground.

Top Boeing executive Pope visits Air India HQ The head of Boeing Commercial

Airplanes, Stephanie Pope, met the chairman of Air India yesterday in India, two sources said, as the companies seek to find the cause of last week's fatal crash. How to let Zelensky attend Nato meet but not provoke Trump

Officials organising a Nato summit in The Hague this month are expected to keep it short, restrict discussion of Ukraine, and choreograph meetings so that Volodymyr Zelensky can somehow be in town without provoking Donald Trump.

Though the Ukrainian president is widely expected to attend the summit in some form, Nato has yet to confirm whether he is actually invited. Diplomats say he may attend a pre-summit dinner but be kept away from the main summit meeting.

Whether the brief summit statement will even identify Russia as a threat or express support for Ukraine is still up in the air.

The careful steps are all being taken to avoid angering Washington, much less provoking any repeat of February's White House blow-up between Trump and Zelensky that almost torpedoed the international coalition supporting Kyiv.

Nato's European members, who see Russia as an existential threat and Nato as the principal means of countering it, want to signal their continued strong support for Ukraine. But they are also desperate to avoid upsetting a volatile Trump, who stunned them at a summit seven years ago by threatening to quit the alliance

Diplomats say Ukraine leader may attend a pre-summit dinner but kept away from the main summit meeting

If Zelensky does not attend in some form, it would be "at least a PR disaster", acknowledged a senior Nato diplomat.

Since Russia's invasion three years ago, Zelensky has regularly attended Nato summits as the guest of honour, where alliance members pledged billions in weapons and condemned Russia for an illegal war of conquest. Leaders repeatedly promised that Ukraine would one day join Nato. But since Washington's shift under

Trump towards partly accepting Russia's justifications for the w and disparaging Zelensky, the 32-member alliance no longer speaks with a single voice about Europe's deadliest conflict since World War Two. Trump has taken Ukraine's Nato membership off the table, unilaterally granting Moscow one of its main demands. After dressing down Zelensky in the Oval Office in February, Trump

cut vital US military and intelligence support for Ukraine for days. Since then, the two men publicly mended fences in a meeting in St Peter's Basilica for the funeral of Pope Francis. But mostly they have spoken remotely, with Zelensky twice phoning the White House on speakerphone while surrounded by four friendly Europeans - Britain's Keir Starmer, France's Emmanuel Macron, Germany's Friedrich Merz and Poland's Donald Tusk.

Trump is expected to come away from The Hague with a big diplomatic victory as Nato members heed his longstanding complaints that they do not spend enough on defence and agree a much higher target. They are expected to boost their goal for traditional military spending to 3.5% of economic output from 2%. A further pledge to spend 1.5% on related expenses such as infrastructure and cyber defence would raise the total to 5%

demanded by Trump. But the summit itself and its accompanying written statement are expected to be unusually short, minimising the chances of flare-ups or disagreements. A pledge to develop recommendations for a new Russia strategy has been kicked into the long grass.

Meanwhile, Zelensky may have to be content with an invitation to a pre-summit dinner, hosted by Dutch King Willem-Alexander, diplomats say. Unlike at Nato's previous two annual summits, the leaders do not plan to hold a formal meeting of the Nato-Ukraine Council, the official venue for talks between the alliance and Kyiv. The senior Nato diplomat said a working dinner with either foreign ministers or defence ministers could instead serve as an NUC.

Last Wednesday, Nato boss Mark Rutte said he had invited Ukraine to the summit, but sidestepped a question on whether the invitation included Zelensky himself.

After meeting Rutte on Monday, Zelensky said on X that it was "important that Ukraine is properly represented" at the summit. "That would send the right signal to Russia," he said.

US and Ukrainian officials did not reply to questions about the nature of any invitation to Ukraine. Some European countries are still willing to say in public that they hope to see Zelensky invited as the head of the Ukrainian delegation.

Estonian Defence Minister Hanno Pevkur said he would like to see a "delegation led by President Zelensky". Asked about an invitation for Zelensky, German Defence Minister Boris Pistorius said "I, for my part, strongly welcome the invitation" without giving further details. - Reuters



mid growing trade tensions and rise in protectionist policies on the international landscape, the inaugural Asean-GCC-China Summit, hosted under Malaysia's Asean chairmanship for 2025, has drawn significant international attention. This gathering marks yet another step forward in Global South co-operation, with implications for both regional development and global growth.

Foundations for partnership

The three parties share deep historical and economic ties. Centuries ago, the Silk Road facilitated cultural and commercial exchanges among their peoples. Today, China remains a pivotal trade partner for both Asean and the GCC. Recent advancements, such as the full conclusion of China-Asean Free Trade Area 3.0 egotiations, underscore one efforts to deepen economic integration. These longstanding relationships, nurtured through bilateral and multilateral frameworks, provide a robust foundation for expanded cooperation.

By leveraging these complementary strengths, the partners will benefit from reduced energy and resource costs, accelerated logistics, and more efficient financial services. These synergies will enhance all three parties' competitiveness and resilience while enabling more secure and sustainable development, which are indispensable for navigating challenges in today's volatile global markets and maintaining growth amidst trade uncertainties

Synergy in scale: 1+1+1>3 The trilateral co-operation

has already registered positive progress. Chinese Premier Li Qiang announced at the summit that China has decided to offer five-year multiple-entry visas to eligible applicants from Southeast Asian countries for business and other purposes, and to effectively

give all GCC countries visafree status. And with a regional business council in conception, the three parties have charted a united course for co-operation in areas including economic integration, connectivity, energy security and sustainability, digital transformation and innovation, food and agriculture, and peopleto-people exchanges.

Collectively, Asean, China, and the GCC account for nearly a quarter of the world's population and global GDP. Their collaboration signals a growing preference for co-operative and open regionalism in addressing shared challenges, such as trade disputes and supply chain disruptions. By improving infrastructure connectivity and streamlining trade, this partnership could foster synergies that multiply rather than simply add their individual strengths.

A model for South-South cooperation

By pooling together the three important forces in the world, this innovative, inclusive and pragmatic model represents a shared commitment to the rules-based multilateral trading system with the WTO at its core, and marks a concrete step toward a peaceful, prosperous and equitable future.

A powerful boost to globalisation

In an era of interconnected economies and shared global challenges, globalisation retains its transformative potential - but only if nations choose collaboration over isolation. As an innovative co-operation mechanism among Global South partners, the Asean-GCC-China Summit demonstrates how diverse regions can align interests to strengthen multilateral frameworks and advance equitable

Milei seeks legislative leverage amid IMF demands and public discontent

rgentina's firebrand right-wing President Javier Milei has largely tamed runaway inflation with a ruthless austerity plan and he aims to solidify power when his party and its allies take on a divided opposition in legislative elections in October. The trash-tweeting economist, who famously handed tech billionaire Elon Musk a chainsaw at an event in Washington earlier this year, has overseen a steady dollar-peso peg but relies on legislative allies in Congress to pass his agenda. Many of the changes he has implemented have been through presidential decrees, like his ideological ally, US President Donald Trump, who called Milei his favourite president.

Voters will choose about half the seats in the lower chamber of Argentina's Congress and a third of the upper Senate on October 26. A big victory would not give Milei a legislative majority, but it would offer him leverage to make deals to sell off government-owned companies, cut social spending, change tax and

labour policy and embrace social conservatism. That plan is in stark contrast to the programme of the parties that are the ideological descendants of General Juan Peron, who ruled the country from 1946-1955 and 1973-1974, and his wife Evita. Their governments nationalised industries, unveiled pro-labour policies and rolled out social programmes including free healthcare.

The economic stability spurred by Milei. who took power in late 2023 and quickly slashed spending as part of a shock therapy

programme to pull the South American country out of a deep crisis, has not translated into across-the-board improvements. Prices of basic goods like jeans and tennis shoes are reportedly double what they are in other parts of the Americas.

Pensioners continue to protest the cost of living, and anger over the relatively poor salaries of healthcare workers at a respected paediatric hospital has turned into a monthslong saga. Nearly 40% of Argentines remain in poverty, and many of them reject Milei's

"I'm not a Peronist, but I'll vote for them because I'd vote for anyone before Milei," said Jorge, a 42-year-old "cartonero" who collects cardboard for recycling, an extremely poor living. The man, who declined to give his last name, said one of his four children was treated at the paediatric hospital where staff are protesting. Posing another threat

to Milei's popularity is the possibility that he may in coming months have to further tighten economic policy to meet the terms of a \$20 billion International Monetary Fund loan that has boosted Argentina's reputation among investors, whose dollars the country desperately needs.

'Rupture is inevitable'

Up for grabs in the election is the vast province surrounding the capital, Buenos Aires, which is the geographic heart of Peronism and home to 40% of the country's voters. A government source told reporters Milei has vowed to defeat Peronist Governor Axel Kicillof there.

Milei's candidate unexpectedly placed first in a recent Buenos Aires local election, and consulting firm Observatorio Electoral shows Milei's Libertad Avanza party with a slim 37%-36% advantage over the centre-left Peronists. Nationally, 42% of voters favour Milei against 23% for the Peronists. Beating the standardbearers of Juan Peron's legacy would have seemed impossible a few years ago, but with inflation down to a projected 30% this year, from 118% last year, and Milei credited with cutting corruption, some voters are ready to give the political firebrand more power.

"I'll vote for Milei again because he's achieved a degree of normality in the economy," said Federico Segovia, a 22-vear-old university student who blamed the last Peronist president, Alberto Fernandez, for leaving the economy in disastrous shape. A recent survey by the consulting firm Synopsis found that the share of those who viewed Milei positively rose to 43.4% in May from 40.9% in April. - Reuters

France shuts controversial Israel weapons booths at Paris Air Show

Geopolitical tensions roiled the opening of the Paris Air Show vesterday as French authorities sealed off Israeli weapons industry booths amid the conflicts in Iran and Gaza, a move that Israel condemned as "outrageous"

The decision added drama to the major aerospace industry event, which was already under the shadow of last week's deadly crash of Air India's Boeing 787 Dreamliner.

Black walls were installed around the stands of five Israeli defence firms at the trade fair in Le Bourget, an airfield on the outskirts of Paris.

The booths displayed "offensive weapons" that could be used in Gaza – in violation of agreements with Israeli authorities, a French government source told AFP. The French government has not given its exact definition of "offensive" weapons.

The companies - Israel Aerospace Industries (IAI), Rafael,

Uvision, Elbit and Aeronautics make drones and guided bombs and missiles.

French Prime Minister Francois Bayrou defended the decision during a press conference at the air show.

"The French government's position was very simple: no offensive weapons at the arms exposition," he said. "Defensive weapons were perfectly acceptable."

Bayrou cited the ongoing conflict in Gaza as the rationale behind

"Given the situation in Gaza... which is extremely serious from a humanitarian and security point of view. France was keen to make it clear that offensive weapons should not be present at this exposition," Bayrou said. Israeli President Isaac Herzog said he was shocked by the "outrageous" closure of the pavilions and said the situation should be "immediately

The Israeli defence ministry said in a statement that the "outrageous and unprecedented decision reeks of policy-driven and commercial considerations". "The French are hiding behind supposedly political considerations to exclude Israeli offensive weapons from an international exhibition weapons that compete with

French industries," it said. The presence of Israeli firms at Le Bourget, though smaller than in the past, was already a source of tension before the start of the Paris Air Show, because of the conflict in Gaza.

A French court last week rejected a bid by NGOs to ban Israeli companies from Le Bourget over concerns about "international

G7 leaders from Britain, Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, and the US, along with the European Union, are convening in the resort area of Kananaskis in the Canadian Rockies until tomorrow

Speaking alongside Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney, Trump said the former Group of Eight had been wrong to kick out Russia in 2014 after it annexed

"This was a big mistake," Trump said, adding he believed Russia would not have invaded Ukraine in 2022 had Putin not been ejected.

"Putin speaks to me. He doesn't speak to anybody else ... he's not a happy person about it. I can tell you that he basically doesn't even speak to the people that threw him out, and I agree with him," Trump said.

His comments raise doubts about how much Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky can achieve when he meets the leaders today. European nations say they want to persuade Trump to back tougher sanctions on Moscow.

Zelensky said he planned to dis-

cuss new weapons purchases for Ukraine with Trump.

Trump spoke on Saturday with Putin and suggested the Russian leader could play a mediation role between Israel and Iran.

French President Emmanuel Macron dismissed the idea, arguing that Moscow could not be a negotiator because it had started an illegal war against Ukraine.

A European diplomat said Trump's suggestion showed that Russia was very much on US

European officials said they hoped to use today's meeting with Zelensky and Nato Secretary-General Mark Rutte and next week's Nato summit to convince Trump to toughen his stance.

"The G7 should have the objective for us to converge again, for Ukraine to get a ceasefire to lead to a robust and lasting peace, and in my view it's a question of seeing whether President Trump is ready to put forward much tougher sanctions on Russia," Macron said.

With an escalating Israel-Iran conflict, the summit in Canada is seen as a vital moment to try to restore a semblance of unity among democratic powerhouses.

In another early sign the group may struggle to reach agreement on key issues, a US official said Trump would not sign a draft statement calling for de-escalation of the Israel-Iran conflict.

A Canadian official, though, said the conflict would come up in bilateral meetings throughout the day and it was too early to speculate on the outcome of those conversations. A senior European diplomat echoed those comments, saying Trump had yet to make a decision.

Canada has abandoned any ef-

fort to adopt a comprehensive communique to avert a repeat of the 2018 summit in Quebec, when Trump instructed the US delegation to withdraw its approval of the final communique after leav-

Leaders have prepared several draft documents seen by Reuters, including on migration, artificial intelligence, and critical mineral supply chains. None of them have been approved by the United States, however, according to sources briefed on the documents.

Europeans are on the same page on most issues, a European diplomat said. But without Trump, it is unclear if there will be any declarations, the diplomat said. The first five months of Trump's second term upended foreign policy on Ukraine, raised anxiety over his closer ties to Russia, and resulted in tariffs on US allies.

Talks on Monday w around the economy, advancing trade deals, and China, Efforts to reach an agreement to lower the G7 price cap on Russian oil, even if Trump decided to opt out, were complicated by a temporary surge in oil prices since Israel launched strikes on Iran on June 12, two diplomatic sources said. What's not being discussed as Trump shapes agenda

Gender equality, climate change, biodiversity, poverty, health, and more - the list of issues missing at the Canada G7 from past summits is long. The G7 gathering has been carefully planned to ensure US President Donald Trump agreed to attend at all and Canada is keen to avoid a public dust-up. Official agenda items are the global economic outlook and energy security, with organisers naming priorities as critical mineral supply chains and Al adoption, as well as "international peace and

Last year's Group of Seven summit in Italy, when Joe Biden was US president, ended with a joint declaration promising better ties with Africa, action on poverty, and determination to tackle "the triple crisis of climate change, pollution, and biodiversity

Such subjects are almost totally absent at the G7 talks this year in order to placate Trump, said John Kirton of the G7 Research Group at the University of Toronto. "There's no point in putting them on the agenda if

the Americans will just refuse to discuss them. And if you put too many of them on, Trump wouldn't even come," he said.

Kirton added that the schedule was also crowded out by crises from Ukraine to the Middle East, with G7 nations increasingly concerned with defence spending rather than development aid.

For the G7 – founded 50 years ago by the world's leading economies at the time – such a lurch in priorities poses major questions about the club's purpose and future.

But, for the Trump administration, the group is just returning to its original function of promoting global economic stability and growth.

"Canada knows its audience and if it wants a unified outcome of this year's G7 leaders summit then it should stick close to traditional G7 values while avoiding controversial topics," said Caitlin Welsh of the Washington-based Center for

Strategic and International Studies. The impact on the ground has alarmed many campaigners who say the G7 reduction of foreign aid is hitting millions of world's poorest, threatening food supplies, water, education and health. "The G7's retreat from the world is unprecedented

and couldn't come at a worse time," said Oxfam International Executive Director Amitabh Behar. "Rather than breaking from the Trump administration's cruel dismantling of USAID and other US foreign assistance, G7 countries like the UK, Germany and France are instead following the same

Oxfam calculated that G7 nations, which provide three-quarters of all official development assistance, are cutting aid by 28 percent between 2024 and

No joint communique is expected at the end of the summit today to avoid the potential failure for all members to agree on the text.

But there is one way that the non-US members of the G7 are fighting back — discreetly. An unexpected item on the agenda is to "boost

collaboration to prevent, fight and recover from The wildfire issue "allows us to talk about climate

Embattled Spain premier dares opposition to file no-trust motion

panish Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez yesterday challenged the conservative opposition to submit a no-confidence vote against his minority coalition government as a corruption scandal rocks his ruling Socialists.

The case against a top Socialist official increases legal and political pressure on Sanchez, one of Europe's longest-serving leftist leaders whose inner circle faces several ongoing investigations.

The main opposition Popular Party (PP) and far-right Vox have demanded that Sanchez resign after a judicial report published last week suspected Socialist heavyweight Santos Cerdan of accepting kickbacks in the al-

leged improper awarding of public contracts.

After an hours-long crisis meeting with top Socialist officials at party headquarters in Madrid, Sanchez hit back at the two opposition parties, who do not command a parliamentary majority.

"They should present a noconfidence motion and tell parliament and the citizens what model of country they want for Spain," Sanchez said.

The report also implicated Jose Luis Abalos, a former transport minister and once a member of Sanchez's inner circle, and his ex-adviser Koldo Garcia.

Cerdan, the Socialists' third-highest ranked figure, resigned as its organisation secretary last week. Yesterday, he relinquished his position as MP and the party definitively expelled Abalos. who sits in parliament as an independent.

Defending the Socialists' response to the case, Sanchez said his party was "clean" and would not "cover up the corruption that emerges in our ranks, however painful it may

Sanchez again ruled out quitting or holding early elections, saying that he would conduct discussions this week with the far-left and Basque and Catalan separatist parties who backed his government.

The PP reiterated its demand for Sanchez's resignation and early elections, with party spokesman Borja Semper telling reporters that "the only possible, dignified future is giving the Spanish people their say".

As well as the Cerdan affair, legal investigations are ongoing against Sanchez's wife, brother and the country's Socialist-appointed top prosecutor.

World faces new N-arms race: researchers

Most of the world's nuclear-armed states continued to modernise their arsenals last year, setting the stage for a new nuclear arms race, researchers warned yesterday.

The Stockholm International Peace

Research Institute (SIPRI) said nuclear powers including the United States and Russia – which account for around 90% of the world's stockpile - had spent time last year "upgrading existing weapons and adding newer versions". Since the end of the Cold War, old warheads have generally been dismantled quicker than new ones have been deployed, resulting in a decrease in the overall number of warheads. But SIPRI warned that the trend was likely to be reversed in the coming

"What we see now, first of all, is that the number of operational nuclear warheads is beginning to increase," SIPRI Director Dan Smith told AFP. This was especially the case with China, which SIPRI said had about 600 nuclear warheads and had added 100 new warheads in 2023 and 2024. "China is increasing its nuclear force steadily." Smith said, adding that the country could reach 1.000 warheads in seven or eight years. While that would still be well short of

Russian and US arsenals it would make

China "a much bigger player", said Smith. He said the world faced new threats "at a particularly dangerous and unstable moment" for geopolitics, adding: "We see the warning signs of a new nuclear arms race coming.' SIPRI counted a total of 12,241 warheads in January 2025, of which 9,614 were in stockpiles for potential use. The institute noted in its report that both Russia and the United States had "extensive programmes under way to modernise and replace their nuclear warheads"

The United Kingdom was not believed to have increased its number of warheads in 2024, but SIPRI said that given the country's 2021 decision to raise its limit on the number of warheads from 225 to 260, it was likely to increase in the future.

Similarly, while France's arsenal was believed to have remained steady at around 290, "its nuclear modernisation programme progressed during 2024". India and Pakistan both "continued to develop new types of nuclear weapon delivery systems in 2024". India had a "growing stockpile" of about

180 nuclear weapons at the start of

2025, the institute said, while Pakistan's

arsenal remained steady at about 170 warheads. SIPRI also noted that North Korea's nuclear weapons programme remained "central to its national security

strategy", estimating that it had around 50 warheads and was believed to possess "enough fissile material to reach a total of up to 90 warheads". Israel – which does not acknowledge its nuclear weapons - is also believed to be modernising its arsenal, which SIPRI estimated was about 90 warheads at the start of the year. Smith stressed that the looming nuclear arms race would not just be about "the numbers of warheads".

"It's an arms race which is going to be highly technological," Smith said. He added that it would be both in "outer space and in cyberspace" as the software directing and guiding nuclear weapons would be an area of competition.

Qatar sees 'significant progress in protecting domestic worker rights'

atar has made significant progress in protecting the rights of domestic workers guaranteed in the Permanent Constitution, a senior official of National Human Rights Committee (NHRC) stated yesterday.

"Qatar has made significant strides in protecting and promoting the rights of domestic workers which is reflected in the legal reforms culminating in the enactment of Law No (15) of 2017 regarding domestic workers," said Dr Mohammed bin Saif al-Kuwari, vice-chairman, NHRC.

He was addressing an event organised by NHRC and the International Organisation for Migration (IOM) to mark the International Domestic Workers' Day, observed annually on June 16.

Held under the theme 'Advancing Access to Justice for Domestic Workers: Enhancing Legal Support and Strengthening Accountability Mechanisms,' the event saw several discussions with participants from the Ministry of Labour and the Ministry of Interior along with several experts.

Dr al-Kuwari said: "There are about 168,626 individuals performing domestic work in Qa-

tar, according to the 2022 Labour Force Survey report issued by the Planning and Statistics Authority in 2023. These individuals represent 8.39% of the total non-Qatari workforce, which has made this work an integral part of our economic and social life in Qatar. We continue our efforts in education, awareness and advocacy with our partners and stakeholders."

He highlighted that these workers have left their communities in search of livelihood opportunities that ensure a decent life for them and sustainable development for their communities.

"From our perspective, protecting the rights of domestic workers is a protection of human rights guaranteed in the Permanent Constitution of Qatar, which stipulates that Qatari society 'is based on the pillars of justice, benevolence, freedom, equality, and noble ethics.' These are the fundamental components that reflect

Qatari society's vision of domestic workers as an integral part of the Qatari family, based on values of giving, respect and goodness for all its members," he explained.

Roula Hamati, in charge of IOM Mission in Qatar, in her address emphasised the importance of the event, the first joint event of its kind between NHRC and IOM.

Hamati said: "Qatar has made

remarkable progress in legis-lation aimed at protecting the rights of migrants in general, and domestic workers in particular. The labour policy reforms implemented by Qatar since 2020, starting with ensuring freedom of movement in the labour market, changing employers, and the minimum wage, have constituted a qualitative leap in working and living conditions for hundreds of thousands of workers including domestic workers." The event included three accompanying sessions. The first session addressed legal pathways and institutional frameworks, with presentations by Nasser Marzouq Sultan al-Marri, director of the Legal Affairs Department, NHRC who provided a presentation from the Committee, and Captain Mohammed Nasser al-Jaber, from the Research and Follow-up Department at the Ministry of Interior, whose speech included a presentation on the

protection and redressal mechanism for domestic workers in vulnerable situations.

Dr Lena Moller from Qatar University's College of Law discussed the challenges and opportunities in implementing the 2017 Domestic Workers Law and international best practices and Margaret Kabue, chairperson of the Kenyan Domestic Workers Association also presented her perspectives at the session. The second session focused on enhancing accountability mechanisms; improving law enforcement and strategic co-ordination for legal assistance and identifying policy and recommendations to promote justice. The session saw the participation of several officials and experts. The closing session covered a summary of the main points of the discussion, compilation of its outcomes, reaffirmation of stakeholder commitments, and identification of next steps and concluding remarks by the IOM and NHRC.



'Qatar: Close to My Soul' is organised into three sections, exploring how artists drew inspiration from the landscape, portrayed society, and experimented with abstraction and hurruffiya (art incorporating Arabic letterforms), providing deep insight into the nation's cultural evolution. 
