President Donald Trump said vesterday that the United States would hold nuclear talks with Iran next week. teasing the possibility of a deal even after boasting that recent US strikes had crippled the Islamic republic's atomic programme. Trump credited the unprecedented US attacks with the "total obliteration" of Iran's nuclear capabilities, and said they had set the country's programme back "decades". But leaked US intelligence cast doubt on that assessment.

Young self-declared socialist Zohran Mamdani was on the cusp of stunning victory yesterday in New York City's Democratic mayoral primary - pummelling his scandal-scarred establishment rival in a race seen as a fight for the future of the Democratic Party. Results were not yet final. But Mamdani - who is just 33 and would become the city's first Muslim mayor - had such a commanding lead that his biggest rival, former New York governor Andrew Cuomo, conceded defeat overnight. Affected passengers cleared within 24 hours: Al-Meer



Qatar Airways Group CEO Badr Mohammed al-Meer

Qatar Airways Group CEO Badr Mohammed al-Meer said that all passengers from flights that were diverted as Iran launched a missile attack on the US airbase in Oatar were cleared within 24 hours. About 20,000 passengers in all were affected by the flight diversion, he said in a statement yesterday In a letter to the airline passengers

he said, "Qatar Airways diverted some 90 flights carrying more than 20,000 passengers to Doha due to the "unprecedented closure" of Oatari airspace on June 23 "25 flights diverted into airports across Saudi Arabia, 18 into Turkiye, 15 into India, 13 into Oman, and five into the United Arab Emirates. The remaining aircraft were re-routed to major hubs including London, Barcelona, and others across Europe, Asia, and the Middle East." He said, "This week brought an operational crisis few airlines will ever encounter, and one that challenged the very core of what it means to run a global airline. "At around 6pm local time on Monday, June 23, an unexpected and unprecedented closure of Qatari airspace forced Qatar Airways to suspend global operations with immediate effect. Shortly after, airspace was also closed in Bahrain, the UAE, and Kuwait. To Page 5

HE the Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman bin Jassim al-Thani chaired the Cabinet's regular meeting yesterday at the Amiri Diwan.

The Cabinet hailed the Ministry of Social Development and Family Strategy 2025-2030, launched by HE the Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs, which represents a qualitative leap from the traditional care model to a more comprehensive, empowering, and sustainable approach, based on a realistic understanding of the needs and challenges of the Qatari society.

The strategy is based on five main pillars, namely: strengthening the cohesion of the Qatari family, empowering Qatari women and enhancing their participation in various fields, particularly in leadership and decision-making positions, empowering vulnerable groups, fostering a spirit of participation and solidarity, and improving the standard of living of individuals and families.

Afterwards, the Cabinet considered the topics on its agenda, as it acknowledged the Shura Council's approval of a draft law on lost and abandoned property.

The Ministry of Interior had

prepared this draft law to regulate procedures for dealing with lost and abandoned property and items, with the aim of ensuring the preservation as well as encouraging those who find such to hand over any items they find so that they can be returned to their owners. The Cabinet also acknowledged the Shura Council's approval of a draft law concerning water. Prepared by the Qatar General Electricity and Water Corp (Kahramaa), this draft law seeks to achieve water security, conserve water resources, and The Cabinet approved a draft Cabinet decision establishing a grievance committee related to the expropriation of real estate for public benefit and the procedures for grievances thereof

protect them from depletion, waste, or pollution. It also aims to improve the efficiency of water services and their uses, ensure their quality, and ensure proper maintenance and operation of water facilities.

These drafts, prepared by Kahramaa in co-ordination with the Ministry of Municipality, come

within the framework of the Kahramaa's strategy, which aims to establish rules regulating district cooling works and services, and monitoring their implementation, in accordance with the provisions of Law No. 19 of 2024 regulating district cooling services. The Cabinet reviewed the proposals submitted by the Shura Council regrading the status of persons with disabilities and took the appropriate decision in their regard.

The Cabinet decided to take the necessary measures to ratify an agreement between the governments of Qatar and Russia on co-operation in the fields of healthcare, medical education, and medical sciences.

The Cabinet decided to approve a draft memorandum of understanding (MoU) for twinning between the Doha Municipality and the Guatemala Municipality, a draft MoU in the field of

endowments and Islamic affairs between Qatar's Ministry of Endowments and Islamic Affairs and Jordan's Ministry of Awqaf, Islamic Affairs and Holy Places, a draft MoU for co-operation on human resources management in the civil service between the governments of Qatar and Kazakhstan, a draft executive programme for an MoU for co-operation in the field of endowments and Islamic affairs between the governments of Qatar and Tunisia for the years 2025-2028, and a draft executive programme within the framework of an MoU for co-operation in the field of youth between the governments of Qatar and Turkmenistan for

the years 2025-2026.

The advanced, minimally invasive procedure was conducted by DrJassim Fakhro, consultant in Metabolic and Bariatric Surgery, and the medical director of Qatari physicians at The View Hospital. in the presence of Prof Michel Gagner, a global pioneer in metabolic surgery and the inventor of the magnetic technique.

Unlike conventional surgical approaches that require cutting or stapling, magnetic duodenalileostomy involves placing two rare-earth magnets into the small

intestine - one in the duodenum and the other in the ileum. Over the course of a few days, the magnets gradually compress the tissue between them to form a secure, suture-free connection. This rerouting of the digestive tract enhances hormonal responses that regulate appe-

Qatar adopts a comprehensive approach to battling drug abuse

The International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking is being observed today (June 26). It aims to raise public awareness about the dangers of drug abuse and its negative effects on individuals, families, and communities, as well as to strengthen prevention, treatment, and rehabilitation efforts.

In a message marking the occasion, UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said: "The global illicit drug trade continues to exact a devastating toll: claiming lives, ravaging public health services, and fuelling violence and or-

Guterres added: "Drug trafficking is tearing through communities with substances that are more potent, more dangerous, and more deadly than ever. Meanwhile, criminal networks prey on the most vulnerable – particularly women and youth - as they rake in hundreds of billions annually through the illicit drug trade.

"This year, we shine a light on prevention as the most essential strategy for halting the flow of drugs that fuels organised crime worldwide. We must reduce demand through investing in education, treatment, harm-reduction measures and care."

The way to go about doing this, according to the UN Secretary-General, is by targeting the machinery of production by eliminating illicit laboratories, severing trafficking networks by strengthening global trade routes, and choking the financial flows of criminal

He called for breaking the cycle of suffering and destruction once and for all while always ensuring respect for human

Also to that end, Qatar has adopted a comprehensive and integrated approach to combating drug abuse, in line with national legislation and relevant international conventions. Qatar has updated its laws and regulations related to this issue, formed national and sub-national committees to ensure co-ordination among concerned authorities, and developed a national strategy focused on prevention, rehabilitation, and reintegration. It has also strengthened partnerships and co-operation with relevant regional and international organisations and implemented ongoing awareness programmes targeting all segments of society through various media channels

'Drug problem a global challenge'

Director of the GCC-Criminal Information Center to Combat Drugs (GCC-CICCD) Col Mohammed Abdullah al-Khater said that the drug problem has become a complex global challenge, affecting the lives of millions suffering from substance use disorders and impacting communities dealing with the consequences of organised crime linked to illicit trafficking.

In a statement marking the International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking, observed annually on June 26, Col al-Khater said this year's theme "The evidence is clear: invest in prevention" highlights the importance of prevention, healthcare, community support, and international solidarity. He called for the adoption of effective, evidence-based policies that respect human rights and consider the social, economic, and health-related aspects of

Col al-Khater explained that the GCC-CICCD has intensified its efforts to

combat this scourge by exchanging intelligence on trafficking and distribution operations to dismantle criminal networks that pose a threat to the safety of GCC societies. He noted the centre's growing co-operation with several regional and international organisations, in addition to the competent national authorities in friendly countries. These efforts have contributed to intercepting criminal networks attempting to smuggle drugs into GCC countries, as part of a comprehensive strategy based on co-ordination and integration among anti-narcotics agencies. Col al-Khater emphasised the centre's role in capacity building and enhancing the efficiency of personnel working in drug control across GCC countries through specialised training programmes and ongoing workshops tailored to the needs of security and customs agencies in member states.

The country has also adopted a comprehensive health, psychological, and social policy to protect individuals from falling into addiction, through monitoring, analysis, evaluation, and developing effective operational plans to curb the spread of this phenomenon, provide early intervention in this regard.

The centre operates on a set of core values reflected in all its services: dignity, by respecting the individual regardless of their past; compassion, by delivering care with a human touch; trust, by building a safe relationship between the beneficiary and the professional; teamwork, by ensuring integrated roles within the therapeutic team; and excellence and leadership, by adhering to the highest standards of quality. Moreover, the patient is placed at the centre of care, with treatments designed to suit individual needs, and hospitality is emphasised by providing a supportive and reassuring treatment environment.

Similarly, and as part of the Gulf Cooperation Council's (GCC) commitment to strengthening joint efforts against drug abuse, the GCC General Secretariat held special activities for the Gulf antidrug week, held from June 22-26, which coincided with the International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Traffick-

ing.
This initiative reflected the GCC countries' dedication to unified action in combating drug abuse and raising awareness in Gulf societies, affirming that prevention is a collective responsibility requiring the co-operation of all sectors. (QNA)

Affected passengers cleared within 24 hours: Al-Meer

"Hamad International Airport, one of the world's busiest and most connected global hubs, was brought to a standstill, with almost 100 aircraft en route to Doha, several already on approach to our runways, and others lining up for departure.

"In the moments that followed. a missile attack was launched from Iran on Al-Udeid Air Base in Oatar. As missiles entered the skies above Oatar, air defence systems were activated and the State of Qatar's Armed Forces took swift, decisive action to protect its people, defend its territory, and ensure the safety of everyone within its borders."

Al-Meer continued, "All departures from Doha were suspended until 00:01 on June 24 at the earliest. Our routine, seamlessly synchronised global operation was, in an instant, scattered into dozens and dozens of disrupted flight scenarios across continents, each with their own complexities and requirements.

"Inside Hamad International Airport, over 10,000 passengers were already in transit, expecting to depart when the escalation occurred. They found themselves caught in the middle of one of the most severe and complex operational challenges in modern aviation history.

"Around the world, some of our flight crews had timed out of legal operating hours. Most of our fleet, including A380s carrying more than 450 passengers each, were now out of position, some grounded at airports with curfews. Several flights had to wait for clearance to re-enter restricted regional airspace.

Aircraft routing plans were rewritten in parallel with passenger itineraries. Over 151 flights were immediately disrupted. Every part of the operation had to adapt in real time without precedent, and without

"The priority for us was clear: to care for our passengers impacted by the unprecedented situation that continued to unfold, and to restore our global operations as safely and swiftly as possible.

"Once airspace reopened shortly after midnight on Tuesday, June 24,

diverted aircraft began returning to our Doha hub over the course of several hours - each arrival a step towards reassembling our operation. As these aircraft and their passengers disembarked at Hamad International Airport, the number of passengers in transit surged to over 22,000 by 5am local time. "As an airline, our business conti-

nuity plans were activated, and our teams co-ordinated on hard resource planning, catering, ground transport, hotel accommodation, and real-time alignment with passenger movements, immigration, customs, and every airport stakeholder. "Over 4,600 customers were pro-

vided hotel accommodation, using approximately 3,200 rooms across Doha. Many of these passengers received onward boarding passes for their rescheduled flights before even leaving the terminal – allowing for a smoother re-entry once our operations resumed.

"Teams from across the airline group stepped into transit areas to assist passengers directly, rebooking journeys, prioritising medical cases, supporting families and elderly travellers, and manually rebuilding complex travel itineraries, some involving other airlines, and expired visas. Over 35,000 meals were distributed, and water, comfort kits, and reassurance were offered face to face, flight by flight.

"We increased capacity to destinations with high volumes of displaced passengers. Contact centre resources were scaled up to cope with global demand. We quickly established a flexible travel policy, allowing passengers who had not yet started their journeys to make changes or refund their bookings without fees.

"Across our global stations, ground handlers and partners moved quickly, supported by live co-ordination between our airport and airline operations control centres.

"A severe geopolitical escalation had forced the shutdown of our global hub, but our focus was to stay agile, adapt, and continue to deliver for our passengers.

By Tuesday, June 24, Qatar Airways operated a total of 390 flights as we worked to rebuild our network

and restore schedule integrity.

All passengers from diverted flights - approximately 20,000 in total - were cleared within 24 hours. More than 11,000 resumed their journeys during the morning wave on June 24, with the remainder departing through the evening wave and morning bank on 25 June. As of today, there are no passengers from diverted flights left stranded.

'Within just 18 hours, our scheduled operations had resumed. Wave by wave, the system began to stabilise. By the end of Tuesday, more than 58,000 passengers had departed Doha - moved not by chance, but by a co-ordinated effort from across the Qatar Airways Group to fulfil our responsibility during this unprec-

edented disruption."
Al-Meer added, "Today, June 25, our operation has stabilised even further, with 578 scheduled flights operating. This scale and speed of recovery reflects the depth of experience, planning, and commitment we're proud to uphold at Qatar Air-

"To everyone who travelled with us during this difficult time – to those who waited patiently in long queues, to those who faced uncertainty, and to those who showed understanding in the face of a worrying and rapidlyevolving crisis - I thank you. We are deeply grateful for your patience and trust as we worked to take you to your destination as safely and smoothly as

"My sincere appreciation goes to our teams across the airline, and to our partners around the world, for their immense efforts around the clock over the past few days. Faced with an extraordinary challenge, we came together to support our passengers, recover our network, and return our operations to normal. The professionalism and unity on display reflect the very best of what our airline group and our partners stand for.

"Millions place their trust in Qatar Airways to carry them across borders, continents, and time zones, and that trust is not taken lightly. It is earned, through action, through responsibility, and a readiness to act when it matters most. Thank you for continuing to place that trust in us."


WCM-Q study highlights Qatar's excellence in cancer care and research

Researchers at Weill Cornell Medicine-Qatar (WCM-Q) have conducted a comprehensive study of Qatar's pioneering national cancer care and research strategy, highlighting the significant achievements in improving prevention, detection and treatment.

The report, published in the UK medical journal Lancet Oncology, notes the remarkable success of Qatar's investments in advanced clinical and research infrastructure, cutting-edge technologies, and recruitment of highly skilled healthcare professionals over the past two decades, which have transformed the country into a regional leader in cancer care.

Areas of particular strength in Qatar's system of cancer care – shaped by the National Cancer Strategy (2010) and the Qatar Cancer Plan (2023-26) – include special expertise in precision and personalised medicine, early detection, and robustly evidence-based cancer management following diagnosis, leading to improved survival rates.

The research, titled 'Qatar

search: pioneering strategies for global health excellence; also highlights areas where some challenges still exist, including late-stage diagnosis, low health literacy relating to cancer among some demographic groups in Qatar, and data collection and long-term analysis.

WCM-Q's Dr Lotfi Chouchane, professor of genetic medicine and professor of microbiology and immunology, is the senior author of the paper.

The report, and a subsequent paper also published in *Lancet*.

Oncology, additionally highlights the potential for establishing beneficial regional and global collaborations on cancer care and research, particularly with Saudi Arabia and Jordan.

The subsequent paper, titled 'Bridging borders for resilience in cancer control in the Middle East: a strategic alliance of Saudi Arabia, Qatar, and Jordan' also provides an epidemiological breakdown of patterns of cancer burden in the three countries.

Dr Murugan Subramanian, senior research associate, is a co-first author of the paper, with Dr Chouchane serving as a co-senior author.

Other researchers who contributed include Sheikh Dr Mohammed bin Hamad al-Thani. director of the Public Health Department at the Ministry of Public Health and associate professor of Clinical Healthcare Policy and Research at WCM-Q and Qatar University; Dr Salha Bujassoum, senior consultant at the National Centre for Cancer Care and Research; Dr Khalid Rashid al-Rumaihi, head of the Department of Urology at Hamad Medical Corporation; and Dr Hilal Lashuel, research development and innovation

adviser to the chairperson of Qatar Foundation and executive director of RDI at the chairperson's office.

Dr Chouchane said: "This research shows very clearly that the past two decades have been a huge success story for Qatar in its efforts to establish a truly world-class cancer care and innovation infrastructure. Looking ahead, we identified some challenges to overcome in the areas of community health literacy; cultural sensitivities surrounding important cancerprevention measures; language barriers; data collection, digitisation and long-term analysis; issues around healthcare equity; and the growing global challenge of unhealthy lifestyle choices, which can increase cancer risk."

The research also draws attention to Qatar's efforts to prioritise the integration of cutting-edge precision and personalised medicine protocols into clinical practice – a measure which is already having a significant positive impact on survival rates.

Research by Dr Chouchane's lab at WCM-Q has been at the forefront of precision medicine approaches to cancer care.



WISH panel at Osaka Expo addresses attacks on health in armed conflict

eading voices in global healthcare spotlighted the escalating attacks on health amid armed conflict globally at the Osaka Expo, during a panel session hosted by Qatar Foundation's global healthcare initiative, World Innovation Summit for Health (WISH).

Held at the event's Qatar Pavilion, the panel – titled 'Protecting Health in Armed Conflict'-brought together representatives from Médecins Sans Frontières, the World Health Organisation (WHO), UNRWA, and the International Committee of the Red Cross, as well as WISH.

The panel built on WISH's ongoing efforts to raise global awareness of attacks on health, following a recent official side event at the 78th World Health Assembly in Geneva and the release of a joint report on the issue by WISH and WHO. The discussion at the Osaka Expo is part of a broader WISH strategy to foster a coalition of organisations and experts to protect

health workers and facilities in conflict zones.

Speaking during the panel, Dr Slim Slama, CEO of WISH, said: "An attack on healthcare is an attack on the very foundation of humanity. Each strike not only destroys hospitals and endangers health workers, but also robs entire communities of safety, dignity, and hope. Protecting medical care in conflict is a legal and moral obligation – when we fail to act, we allow suffering to multiply and justice to fade."

Alongside Dr Slama, panelists included Chika Suefuji, advocacy director, Médecins Sans Frontières; Dr Rick Brennan, former WHO EMRO regional emergency director; Dr Akihiro Seita, medical director, UNRWA, and Hitomi Makabe, head of communications, International Committee of the Red Cross.

The discussion was moderated by Dr Sunoor Verma, director of partnerships and outreach, WISH.



Erdogan appeals for permanent Iran-Israel ceasefire, Gaza truce

urkish President Tayyip Erdogan told leaders at a Nato summit yesterday that a ceasefire between Israel and Iran needed to be made permanent, his office said, and called for a ceasefire in Gaza to alleviate the humani-

Nato member Turkiye has been fiercely critical of Israel and its assault against Palestinian Hamas fighters in Gaza, which has been reduced to rubble after two years of war and had its population displaced.

Ankara has also said Israel's "state terrorism" against Iran - with which it shares a 560-kilometre border - heightened the risks of a wider conflict, and welcomed the ceasefire between the two.

At the Nato summit in The Hague,

Erdogan held talks with the leaders of France, Germany and Britain on regional tensions, bilateral ties and relations with the EU, and defence industry co-operation. Erdogan met US President Donald Trump late on Tuesday.

"Our President said he welcomed the ceasefire between Israel and Iran, that the de facto situation needs to turn into lasting calm as soon as possible, that the humanitarian crisis in Gaza is increasingly

continuing, and that a lasting ceasefire is also needed there urgently," Erdogan's office said after his meeting with French President Emmanuel Macron. He repeated that call to German Chancellor Friedrich Merz, adding that a solution needed to be found to the humanitarian crisis in Gaza.

Erdogan also told British Prime Minister Keir Starmer that "these tensions must not leave the humanitarian crisis in Gaza which has reached a disastrous level -

forgotten". Erdogan said the problems between Tehran and Washington could only be solved through diplomacy, adding that evervone must contribute to achieving lasting peace in the Middle East.

"We welcome the ceasefire achieved through the efforts of US President Trump," he told a press conference following the summit. "We expect the parties to unconditionally abide by the call of

Palestinians say Israeli fire kills West Bank teenager

The Palestinian health ministry said Israeli troops shot dead a 15-year-old boy in the occupied West Bank yesterday, the second teenager killed there in three days.

"The child Rayan Tamer Houshiyeh was killed after being not in the neck by soldiers in the town of Al-Yamoun, northwest of Jenin," the Ramallah-based ministry said. Earlier yesterday, the Palestinian Red Crescent said that its teams had handled "a very critical case" in Al-Yamoun involving a teenager, before pronouncing him dead. The army told AFP that it was "looking into" the events in Al-Yamoun.

The Red Crescent later said that a 30-year-old man also suffered a "serious head injury" in an attack by settlers in the town of Kafr Malik, northeast of Ramallah.

On Monday, the health ministry ad said Israeli fire killed a 13-vea old it identified as Ammar Hamayel, also in Kafr Malik.

Earlier this month, the army confirmed it had killed a 14-year-

old who threw rocks in the town of Sinjil. In a similar incident in April, a teenager who held US citizenship was shot dead in the neighbouring town of Turmus Ayya, with the Israeli military saying it had killed a "fighter" who threw rocks at cars.

Israel has occupied the West Bank since 1967, and violence in the territory has soared since the Hamas storming of Israel in October 2023 that triggered the Gaza war. Since then troops or settlers have killed at least 941 Palestinians, including many fighters, according to the health ministry.

Ugandan opposition party leader to run for president

ganda's main opposition party said yesterday its leader Bobi Wine would run in upcoming presidential elections, likely pitting the popular musician-turned-politician against President Yoweri Museveni.

The east African nation is expected to hold elections in January, with the opposition facing a mounting crackdown as activists and politicians are intimidated, abducted and detained.

Octogenarian leader Museveni declared earlier this week he would seek re-election, hoping to extend almost four decades of rule.

The National Unity Platform (NUP) said Wine, real name Robert Kyagulanyi, had "submitted the expres-

sion of interests to contest for the President of Uganda". NUP secretary-general Lewis Rubongoya told AFP he had submitted the papers to the party, and while the process was internal, "we shall rally behind him this time round for change in Uganda".

Wine previously contested the 2021 election, which was marred by widespread allegations of voting irregularities and state violence.

He has been arrested numerous times, with Museveni's son and heir-apparent, General Muhoozi Kainerugaba, repeatedly threatening on social media to behead him.

Wine's announcement comes as authorities increasingly crack down on the opposition.

Last year, Kizza Besigye, another longtime Museveni opponent, was abducted from Kenya and brought to Uganda, where he now faces a possible death penalty in a treason trial.

Israeli attacks causing collapse of Palestinian health sector

alestinian medical sources confirmed yesterday that the ongoing Israeli aggression and the occupation's policies of obstructing the efforts of international organisations are pushing the health sector towards complete collapse and putting the lives of thousands of patients and wounded individuals at risk of death.

Medical sources in the Gaza Strip reported that the remaining hospitals operating in the Strip are threatened with closure at any moment, with severe overcrowding in the inpatient, intensive care, and emergency departments, and an increase in critical injuries that exceed the hospital's capacity. They noted that only 45 out of 312 operating rooms remain operational, with limited capabilities,

and are unable to perform urgent and complex surgical interventions. Meanwhile, hospitals are suffering from a severe shortage of medicines and medical supplies, which has particularly affected services for cancer and heart pa-

The sources announced that 47% of the list of essential medicines has been completely depleted, while the shortage of medical supplies has reached 65%. Only nine 9 of the 34 oxygen stations are still partially operational and do not cover the needs of hospitals. In addition, diagnostic imaging equipment is out of order, and there is a shortage of fuel needed to operate 49 electric generators, which deepens the crisis in vital departments. They added that patients are prevented from travelling to receive treatment, while 338 cancer patients have died while waiting for treatment referrals.

Another 11,000 have been deprived of treatment opportunities after specialised centres were destroyed, and they were prevented from leaving. In addition, 513 patients have also died because the Occupation forces prevented them from travelling to receive treatment outside the Strip. Regarding kidney patients, the same sources confirmed that 41% of those afflicted with the disease have died, while patients in the northern Gaza Strip are suffering from a complete lack of medical care following the destruction

of hospitals. They said blood banks are also suffering from a severe shortage of units, while community donation campaigns have become ineffective due to the spread of anaemia and malnutrition, particularly among children and infants, resulting from lack of therapeutic milk and the absence of nutritional sources and clean water.

Hezbollah hails Iran's 'divine victory' over Israel

ebanese armed group Hezbollah yesterday hailed what it called its ally Iran's victory over Israel after 12 days of war, declaring it the start of a "new historical phase".

In a statement, Hezbollah offered its "most sincere congratulations" to the Islamic republic praising its "glorious divine victory". The victory, it said, was "manifested in the precise and painful strikes it launched" against Israel, as well as "the lightning response to the American aggression against its nuclear facilities". On Sunday, the United States struck Iranian nuclear facilities in response to the conflict, but a classified intelligence report concluded the attacks would only set back Tehran's nuclear programme by a few months.

"This is nothing but the beginning of a new historical phase in confronting American hegemony and Zionist arrogance in the region," Hezbollah said.

Hezbollah, which fought a devastating war against Israel last year, expressed its "firm and unwavering support for the Islamic Republic, its leadership and people," emphasising that "any surrender, subservience, or concession will only increase our enemies' arrogance and dominance over our region".

Israel on June 13 launched a major bombardment campaign targeting Iranian nuclear and military sites and killing top officials. The Iranian health ministry reported at least 610 civilians killed and more

16 deaths recorded in Kenya protests

ixteen people died during nationwide anti-government protests in Kenya yesterday, most of them killed by police, the head of Amnesty Kenya said, a year after deadly demonstrations against a tax bill culminated in the storming of parliament.

Thousands of Kenyans took to the streets to commemorate last year's demonstrations, in which more than 60 people died, with police firing tear gas and water cannons to disperse them in the capital Nairobi, according to local

media and a Reuters witness. Some protesters clashed with police, and 16 people were "verified dead as of 8:30", Amnesty Kenya's executive director Irungu

Houghton told Reuters, adding that the figures were verified by the global rights watchdog and the Kenva National Commission on Human Rights (KNCHR).

"Most were killed by police," Houghton said, adding that at least five of the victims had been shot dead. The governmentfunded KNCHR earlier said eight deaths had been reported across the country, all "allegedly from gunshot wounds".

"Over 400 casualties have been reported, including demonstrators, police officers and journalists," KNCHR said in a statement shared on its official X account.

The watchdog noted heavy police deployment and "allegations of excessive use of force, including rubber bullets, live ammunition and water cannons, resulting in numerous injuries".

sources said yesterday. Armed "bandits", as they're known in the west African country, stormed a base in Nigeria state Tuesday, overrunning it after a gun battle with troops stationed to combat criminal gangs and militants operating in the region, the

sources said. The military put the toll at 17.

The state is part of a region in central and northwestern Nigeria that has for years been terrorised by criminal gangs who carry out deadly raids on villages, conduct kidnappings for ransom and burn homes after looting them.

In Tuesday's raid, armed men stormed a base outside the town of Bangi in Mariga district in the early morning.

'We lost 20 soldiers and several injured in the well-co-ordinated attack on the base," a military of-

ficer said. Some attackers were also killed

in the raid, the military officer said, without giving a toll.



King Charles to host Trump in second UK state visit

King Charles will host US President Donald Trump for his unprecedented second state visit to Britain later this year, Buckingham Palace confirmed yesterday. Trump accepted an invitation from Charles for a second state visit in February, making the US president the first elected political leader in modern times to be hosted for two state visits by a British monarch.

"Your country is a fantastic country and it'll be our honour to be there," Trump said after Prime Minister Keir Starmer handed him a handwritten letter from Charles in the Oval Office, describing the king as "a

No date was set at the time for the event which Britain hopes will help cement close ties between the two allies at a time of global upheaval, and one that is always marked by lavish displays of pomp and

"His majesty has known President Trump for many years and looks forward to hosting him and the First Lady later this year," a Palace aide said. Last week, the "Manu Regia", an official signed invitation from the monarch which signals the start of formal planning, was hand-delivered to the White House by British representatives, with confirmation of the exact date for the trip to follow.

UK premier defiant as welfare rebellion grows

ritish Prime Minister Keir Starmer vowed to lead his party into the next general election and rejected suggestions he was failing to listen to the concerns of his party yesterday, as he faces a growing rebellion from lawmakers over welfare reform.

Lawmakers from Starmer's Labour Party have spearheaded an effort to kill the government's welfare plan at a vote due next week, saying it failed to provide support for disabled people and those with long-term health conditions.

More than 100 lawmakers have vowed to vote for an amendment that would halt the proposed reforms, in what would be a major political embarrassment for the prime minister.

Starmer insisted he "can read the room" in response to a question at a press conference about whether he had the political skill to lead Britain. Taking questions at the Nato summit in The Hague, Starmer said the same criticism was made in the run-up to last year's general election, before he led his party to one of the largest parliamentary majorities in modern British history.

"Is it tough going? Are there plenty of noises off? There always are, there always have been. there always will be," Starmer said. "I'm comfortable with reading the room and delivering the change the country needs." Due to rising welfare spending, which had been on course to top £100bn (\$129bn) by 2030, Labour said in March it planned to cut more than £5bn from its welfare budget by 2029-30. Asked if he was confident he

would lead his party into the next election, due in 2029, Starmer said "very", adding: "we were voted in absolutely clearly saying we need a decade of national renewal."

Some of his lawmakers say the bill contains "dangerous and counterproductive cuts to entitlements aimed at disabled people" and lacked "measures to take proper account of the needs of people with ... long-term conditions". Starmer insisted that the vote would go ahead on July 1 and said his party was "pretty united" about the need to reform the welfare state and the question was how to do it.

"We're committed to reforming our welfare system. It doesn't work, it traps people, and it has to be reformed," Starmer said. "It's really important I lead from the front and take the long-term decisions for the future of UK?

Flying anxiety peaks in India after fatal Air India crash

etired Air Force officer Dinesh K has seen a surge in demand for his \$500 therapy course to help people overcome their fear of flying since Air India flight 171 crashed moments after take-off from Ahmedabad two weeks ago.

Dinesh uses a combination of flight simulation and counselling at his Cockpit Vista centre for "fear of flying solutions" in Bengaluru, the only one in India.

The centre has received more than 100 enquiries since the disaster, compared to a previous average of about 10 a month.

"Fear of flying is typically to do with things happening on an aeroplane - the sounds, motion, vibrations \dots exposure the rapy is the only solution," Dinesh, 55, said during a tour of the facility where he demonstrated how cockpit controls relate to movements that often worry passengers. The centre has a simulator for a Boeing and Cessna plane to help people experience how landings and takeoffs appear from the cockpit and understand that not every vibration or sound during a flight signals danger. WhatsApp messages Dinesh received, and shared with Reuters, showed individuals complaining about "losing confidence" after the crash while others said it was "too hard on the brain".

A chilling 59-second CCTV clip showing the crash of the Boeing 787-8 Dreamliner, which killed 260 people, has been widely shared on social media and TV channels since the June 12 accident, which aviation and mental health experts said had led to an unusually high number of counselling requests.

Some travellers are becoming more choosy in selecting their airline and aircraft – Boeing or Airbus - while others are so anxious they are taking more drastic steps by rescheduling or cancelling their air travel plans altogether.

"I am filtering on the basis of not having to fly a Boeing ... I'm terrified currently, and I don't want to get back on a flight," said London-based Indian marketing consultant Nidhi Bhatia, 25, who flew to Mumbai in an Air India Boeing 777 plane a day before the Ahmedabad crash.

Unlike India, Western countries

have many more formal setups to help people tackle their fear of flying, in its most intense form known as aerophobia, as fatal crashes often spike worries among travellers across the world.

Days after an American Airlines plane collided with a helicopter in Washington, killing more than 60 people, a survey of 1,000 US consumers by research firm Prodege found 55% of travellers had higher anxiety, while 38% had reconsidered or cancelled travel plans.

Google Trends data shows searches for the term "flying fear" in India hit "peak popularity" a day after the Air India crash, and the phrase was still being widely searched.

Flying is typically seen as a safe mode of transport, and crashes during takeoff are especially rare. The International Civil Aviation Organisation said there were 1.87 accidents per million departures in 2023, its most recent annual air safety report.

Of the nine hull loss accidents without fatalities recorded in 2024, only two occurred on take off, according to Airbus' website.

The airport CCTV recording from Ahmedabad shows the Air India plane rose to a height of 650 feet after it took off, but suddenly lost altitude, crashing in a fireball into a nearby building - all within 60 sec-

The disturbing footage was a key cause of the panic among Indian travellers, five mental health experts

People were seeking help because they had developed insomnia or become obsessed with flight updates, they said.

Others were scared of letting their loved ones travel on planes, complaining of "debilitating anxiety" for their relatives in transit "to an extent where they have been unable to focus on their daily chores" because they are constantly checking messages to see if they have landed, said psychologist Pankti Gohel.

In Bengaluru, the \$500 Cockpit Vista course is spread over 14 hours and led by Dinesh, who oversaw ground operations during the undeclared 1999 Kargil war between India and Pakistan and retired as an Air Force wing commander in 2014. He also offers to accompany worried clients on the first flights they take after completing the course.

Since the crash, many travellers fear travelling with Air India and are seeking alternative airlines, according to Jaya Tours, a mid-sized booking agency in Mumbai.

Taken over by the Tata Group from the Indian government in 2022, Air India continues to face criticism for poor service and an outdated fleet. This year, the airline was also warned about flying three Airbus planes which lacked mandatory inspection checks on escape slides.

The Indian Association of Tour Operators, which represents more than 1,600 agents, said overall flight bookings dropped by 15%-20% soon after the Air India crash, while 30%-40% of booked tickets were also cancelled.

"We are getting very unusual questions about aircraft type. Earlier passengers didn't really care about what kind of aircraft it is," said the group's president, Ravi Gosain.

"People don't want to hear about Dreamliners."

China calls CIA videos an 'absurd' bid to recruit spies

Beijing yesterday accused the US Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) of making an "absurd" attempt to recruit Chinese citizens via videos posted to social media. China's ministry of state security (MSS) said the placement of what amounted to job advertisements on social media platform X was an "amateurish gambit" to convince people to spy for the Americans. "These two painstakingly crafted 'job ads', riddled with clumsy rhetoric and slanderous claims, lay bare the absurd logic and paranoid delusions of American intelligence agencies," the ministry said in a statement posted to its official WeChat account. "Once again, the self-proclaimed 'world's top intelligence power' has turned itself into an international laughingstock through its baffling incompetence," it added. CIA director John Ratcliffe said that the videos posted last month - which implored the sharing of state secrets - were aimed at "recruiting Chinese officials to help the US"

Flood-hit China braces for cyclone

S Korea court rejects arrest warrant for ex-president

South Korean court vesterday rejected a request to issue an arrest warrant for former president Yoon Suk-yeol related to an investigation into his short-lived attempt to impose martial law, his lawyers said. South Korea's special prosecu-

tor had asked the court on Tuesday to issue an arrest warrant for Yoon as an investigation intensified over the ousted leader's botched bid to declare martial law.

A spokesperson for the Seoul Central District Court and the prosecution office did not immediately respond to requests for comment. A senior member of the special prosecutor's team of investigators said on Tuesday that the arrest warrant was on a charge of obstruction and accused Yoon of refusing to respond to summons for questioning.

Lawyers representing Yoon

criticised the special prosecutor for what they said were attempts to summon the former president "based on superficial and secondary matters that invited suspicion the probe was politically driven".

Nonetheless, his legal team said Yoon would comply with another summons and appear for questioning on Saturday.

The special prosecutor had said it would consider seeking another arrest warrant if Yoon failed to turn up for questioning on Saturday, the Yonhap News Agency reported.

Yoon, who is already facing a criminal trial on revolt charges for issuing the martial law declaration, was arrested in January after resisting authorities trying to take him into custody, but was released after 52 days on technical grounds.

The former president is fighting the charges against him that include masterminding the revolt, which is punishable by death or life in prison.

Australia prepares for verdict in mushroom murder trial

The trial of an Australian woman accused of murdering three of her estranged husband's elderly relatives using toxic mushrooms entered its final stages yesterday, with the jury soon to begin its deliberations in a case that has gripped the nation.

Erin Patterson, 50, is charged with the murders of her motherin-law Gail Patterson, father-inlaw Donald Patterson and Gail's sister, Heather Wilkinson, along with the attempted murder of Ian Wilkinson, Heather's husband, in July 2023.

The prosecution accuses her of foraging for poisonous death cap mushrooms and knowingly adding them to individual portions of Beef Wellington that she served to her guests at her home in Leongatha, a town of about 6,000 people some 135km southeast of Mel-

Patterson denies the charges, which carry a life sentence, with her defence calling the deaths a "terrible accident".

Justice Christopher Beale, the presiding judge, began his second day of instructions to the jury yesterday at the Latrobe Valley Magistrates Court in Morwell, a former coal mining town whose best known tourist attractions until the trial were a rose garden and a regional art gallery.

Beale has said the process will take until at least the end of the day, meaning the 14-member jury will retire to consider their verdict today at the earliest. Their decision must be unanimous. Outside, despite the winter cold and rain, members of the public began queuing for the limited seats in the court hours before proceedings

"I am a true crime fanatic," said Philip Mayers, a social worker who got up at 5am and drove two hours from Melbourne, the state capital, to get his place in the court. "It's the uniqueness of it, you

don't hear it every day."

The trial has caused a sensation in Morwell, where Patterson requested to be tried rather than

Melbourne. Laura Heller, the owner of Jay Dee's Cafe across the road from the modest two-storey court building, said business had tripled since the trial began on

"Even though it's not great circumstances, it has been very good for our community because it's brought people from outside the area," she said.

Journalists, podcasters and documentary crews from domestic and international media have descended on the town for the proceedings, which British magazine The Spectator dubbed "Australia's trial of the century".

Public broadcaster ABC's daily podcast on the trial is currently the most popular in Australia, while streaming platform Stan says it will soon be airing a documentary on the trial and "media frenzy surrounding the case. The Cedar Lodge Motel next to

the court is fully booked, unusual outside the peak summer season, duty manager John Nicoll said.

"It has been a bit of a boom for the motel and for the area in general," he said.

US defence firms chase European military spend wave

US defence giants, backed by a strong Congressional delegation from Washington, used the Paris Airshow to showcase cutting-edge technologies and court European partners as they seek to tap into rising regional military spending.

Many European nations have pledged to significantly increase defence budgets in response to Russia's invasion of Ukraine and as US President Donald Trump's administration has threatened to scale back military support for the region.

That tension has been notably absent at this week's Paris Airshow, where US lawmakers and arms manufacturers pledged greater transatlantic partnership as Europe ramps up spending on everything from artillery shells and fighter jets to missile defence systems.

"We understand that our allies and partners are a force multiplier, so we are stronger when we are working together," US Senator Jerry Moran, a member of Trump's Republican party, told reporters at the show, the world's largest aerospace and defence gathering.

National sovereignty matters but fragmentation is detrimental'

Moran, whose delegation was supporting US weapons makers, said it was in Paris to send a message that the US "is a dependable and reliable partner".

The conciliatory tone stands in stark contrast to the Trump administration's recent string of disparaging remarks about Europe and its defence industry.

"I think antagonising our allies does not make us stronger,

Democrat Senator Jeanne Shaheen told reporters in Paris, expressing her desire to cement defence relations with Europe.

Despite pledges by many European nations to boost military self-sufficiency, the continent remains heavily reliant on US defence manufacturers. For instance, Europe buys American-made fighter jets and missiles from Lockheed Martin, Patriot missile defence systems from Raytheon Technologies and military jets and helicopters built by Boeing. In emerging military areas, like artificial intelligence, drones and satellite constellations, US tech firms like Anduril, Palantir and Elon Musk's SpaceX are far ahead. US firms are hoping to press home their advantage as European military spending surges, including through partnerships which are a way to soften any potential diplomatic tensions, delegates said. US drone-maker Anduril and German defence giant Rheinmetall said last Wednesday they will link up to build military drones for European markets, in a sign of Europe leveraging American technology to boost military capabilities.

Thomas Laliberty, president of Land & Air Defense Systems at Raytheon, said there were no easy replacements for its weapons in Europe and he expected the firm to maintain a long-term footprint on the continent, including through new partnerships. Laliberty said Raytheon was close to announcing a plan to manufacture Stingers - a lightweight air defence missile used by Ukrainian forces against Russia – in Europe.

"For immediate needs, Raytheon is well positioned to support the European demand," Laliberty told reporters in Paris.

"We have a very bright future here."

Boeing, which won a contract from Trump's administration to develop the next-generation F-47 fighter jet this year, said Europe and the US would remain long-term partners despite political wobbles, partly to hold off the Chinese threat.

"Nobody can do it themselves — maybe the Chinese can try, but certainly the rest of us, we are going to have to work together," said Turbo Sjogren, Boeing's general manager for government services.

"To do otherwise takes too long and will be unaffordable." The chairman of Italian aerospace and defence group Leonardo, Stefano Pontecorvo, added that US participation in some European programmes would be "unavoidable" in coming years due to the defence technologies available to them. European rivals were bullish about their future growth prospects but said budget constraints and a lack of regional alliances were holding back progress, conceding that they would continue to need significant US support.

"National sovereignty matters but fragmentation is detrimental. We need to find a way to hit a balance," Leonardo CEO Roberto Cingolani told reporters last week. Jean-Brice Dumont, head of air power, defence and space at Airbus, said Europe's dependence on the US was "very high".

"Zero dependency on the US, I believe is a dream. We have a need for interoperability that drives some US needs," said Dumont, whose firm makes the Eurofighter Typhoon fighter jet with Britain's BAE Systems and Italy's Leonardo, as well as Earth observation satellites and drones.

Italian Defence Minister Guido Crosetto said Europe had "too much bureaucracy" compared to the US and needed to adapt to a new military era of faster, cheaper and more nimble technology.

"Either Europe adapts its industry to these new parameters different from those with which it has lived until four years ago - or it will have huge competitors, and not only the American ones," he said. – Reuters

Qatar deserves global thanks - and a whole lot more

Qatar deserves the Nobel Peace Prize. Not because it helped end a war between Iran and Israel, but because no other country is so singularly dedicated to peace. It's the ideas behind its actions that make them special: that a country should not only refrain from seeking out conflict, should not only keenly avoid conflict unless necessary, but should also actively seek to prevent, shorten, and/or mitigate conflict among other countries as well. What could be more noble -



Israel-Iran ceasefire is just latest example of Nobel-worthy diplomacy

ost of the world is watching and waiting, hoping and/or praying that a hastily arranged ceasefire between Israel and Iran will hold. If it does, there will be sighs of relief virtually everywhere; if it does not, the State of Qatar should still be considered for the Nobel Peace Prize.

Yes, you read that correctly: even if the ceasefire that it helped to secure falls apart, Qatar should be considered for what many regard as the most prestigious prize on Earth.

I believe this b more important than any other cause on Earth, and pound-forpound, no country does more than Qatar to promote peace. Peace is more than a photo opportunity, more than a process that often allows belligerents to let their guns fall silent, more even than the gratitude of those whose lives and livelihoods are spared. It also serves other useful purposes, too, including as a commodity that promotes stronger growth and better socioeconomic development, and frees up resources for investment in education, healthcare, and transport infrastructure. Accordingly, achieving peace means more than simply not being at war: it means having

the chance to better one's own situation by leaps and bounds. By extension, anyone who provides such a chance to anyone else deserves deep admiration.

By this measurement alone, Qatar's case for a Nobel is rocksolid - and has been for years, long before the world's most powerful county asked it to obtain Iranian consent to a ceasefire. A quick glance at Qatar's track record reveals a foreign policy focused almost entirely on the peaceful resolution of differences. Over the past quarter-century, Qatari diplomacy has helped to resolve or mitigate multiple crises, disputes, and conflicts in too many places to count, including Afghanistan, Darfur, Gaza, Eritrea, Iraq, Lebanon, Russia and Ukraine, Sudan and South Sudan, and Yemen. These feats have included the winding down of one all-out civil war and the prevention of another, the brokering of several exchanges involving thousands of prisoners/hostages, the securing of temporary fires, the resolution of dangerous constitutional deadlocks, and most importantly - the kindling

of hope in the hearts of millions. Not surprisingly, Qatar's diplomatic corps is almost constantly and relentlessly engaged in one form or another of peacemaking. It does not always succeed, but its investments - both political and financial – in this mission pay dividends in other ways, too. Repeated successes are their own reward, but even "failure" both raises Qatar's profile and reaffirms its commitment to dialogue and peace. In addition, both the leadership and the professional diplomats learn important lessons from each

and every engagement, making Oatari intervention increasingly effective over time. Just as importantly, this increasing effectiveness contributes to Qatar's growing reputation as an honest and capable broker, and that perception gives it still more influence, leverage, and flexibility going forward.

There are critics, of course. Many American officials, for instance, have criticised Doha for maintaining friendly relations with entities such as Hamas, the Taliban, and, indeed, the Islamic Republic of Iran. But when Washington and Paris wanted to end the presidential vacuum in Beirut, they turned to Qatar and other brotherly nations, which then helped to gain the acquiescence of Iran and Hezbollah. When Washington wanted to negotiate the release of Israeli soldiers and civilians held in Gaza, it was Qatar that made it happen. When the first Trump administration wanted a negotiated exit from Afghanistan, it was Doha that made the contacts and hosted the talks. And when the current Trump administration decided it was time for Israel and Iran to end hostilities, it was the Qataris who delivered the Iranians - and this despite the fact that Iran had just retaliated against US air strikes by lobbing missiles at a US air base inside Qatar!

In effect, the peninsula is now a platform for peace promotion, and not by accident. As impressive as they are, even Oatar's obvious enthusiasm and evident aptitude for dialogue and diplomacy cannot account for the unprecedentedly large role it has come to play on the world stage.

Instead, today's Qatar is the product of a bold strategy rooted in both purpose and principle. Led by His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani, the country's entire leadership views respect for international law and the maintenance of international peace and stability as existential objectives for Qatar and its population.

The Amir inherited some of this strategy from his father, but he has expansively built on it, adding both breadth of vision and depth of commitment. Even - and perhaps especially - when this approach has carried dire risks, His Highness the Amir has refused to waver, and his steadfast pursuit of fraternal relations among nation-states has continued. That resolve has been noted by state and non-state actors alike, and some former antagonists have even come to embrace and even emulate much of the Qatari approach.

That's why Qatar deserves the Nobel Peace Prize. Not because it helped end a war between Iran and Israel, but because no other country is so singularly dedicated to peace. It's the ideas behind its actions that make them special: that a country should not only refrain from seeking out conflict, should not only keenly avoid conflict unless necessary, but should also actively seek to prevent, shorten, and/ or mitigate conflict among other countries as well.

What could be more noble and therefore more Nobel-worthy - than that?

Trump claims 'win' amid Nato nod for major spending hike

ato countries agreed yesterday to massively ramp up their defence spending to satisfy US President Donald Trump, who hailed it as a "monumental win" for America - and reaffirmed his country's commitment to protect its European al-

Trump cut a jubilant figure after Nato's 32 countries agreed to his headline target of five percent of GDP on defence spending following two days of talks in The Hague.

Taking credit for a "fantastic" outcome that "no-one really thought possible", Trump described the spending hike as "a monumental win for the United States".

"They said you did it, sir," he told a news conference. "Well I don't know if I did it — but I think

In a reassuring move for Euro-

pean allies worried over the threat from Russia, Trump signed off on a final leaders' declaration confirming "our ironclad commitment" to Nato's collective defence pledge that an attack on one is an attack on all.

Nato allies backed the spending increase to help counter a growing threat from Russia but also - crucially - to keep Trump engaged, with the US leader repeatedly suggesting Washington could withhold protection from lower-paying allies in Europe.

The deal appeared – for now at least — to have laid those gripes to

The compromise hatched by Nato sees countries promise to dedicate 3.5% of GDP to core military spending by 2035, and a further 1.5 to broader security-related areas such as infrastructure.

While signing off on the target on paper, Spain has said it thinks it can fulfil Nato's demands while spending less – earning a fresh rebuke vesterday from Trump, who

in response. But the pledge endorsed in The Hague allows Trump to claim triumph, while in practice providing some wiggle room for cashstrapped governments in Europe.

threatened to hit its trade interests

Diplomats said that behind closed doors Trump had given strong assurances of Washington's commitment as an ally and urged others to spend some of the new money on US weaponry.

Everything was choreographed at the gathering in The Hague to keep the volatile US president on board: from chopping back the official part of the meeting to putting him up overnight in the royal palace.

Underpinning the leaders' discussions on defence was Moscow's invasion of Ukraine, and in another sop to the demands of allies the United States allowed Nato to refer to the "long-term threat posed by Russia to Euro-Atlantic security" in the communique.

Though its language was wa-

tered down from previous years, the declaration also said allies would continue to support Ukraine "whose security contributes to ours" and could use money from the new spending pledge to fund military aid for Kyiv.

Ukraine's Volodymyr Zelensky played a less central role here than at previous summits - with leaders wary of any bust-up after his infamous Oval Office shouting match with Trump.

But the US president did meet the war-torn country's leader on the summit sidelines, declaring afterwards the encounter "couldn't have been nicer" and Zelensky hailed a "substantive"

Trump also said he was talking to Russian President Vladimir Putin about the war, saying: "I think progress is being made.

That said, despite the insistence by Nato chief Mark Rutte that Ukraine's bid for membership remains "irreversible", the summit statement avoided any mention of Kyiv's push to join after Trump ruled it out.

Trump had rattled allies on the summit's eve by appearing to cast some doubt on the validity of Nato's mutual defence clause known as Article Five of the alliance treaty. But the pledge was reaffirmed unequivocally in the summit's final statement - and Trump drove the point home at his closing press conference.

"I came here because it was something I'm supposed to be doing," Trump said in closing remarks to the press, when pressed on the mutual defence clause known as Article Five

"But I left here a little bit differently," said the US leader - who was visibly delighted at the red carpet welcome and the praise lavished on him by Nato's Rutte among others.

"Without the United States, they couldn't really have Nato. Wouldn't work," Trump said. "It will in the future, because now they're paying much more money."

All Nato, including US, 'totally committed' to Ukraine fight: Rutte

The whole of Nato, including the United States, is "totally committed" to keeping Ukraine in the fight against Russia's invasion, alliance Secretary-General Mark **Rutte told Reuters** in an interview vesterday. Speaking at the end of a summit of Nato leaders in The Hague, Rutte also said nobody in Nato was naive about Russia and all alliance members "have more or less the same assessment" of Moscow. **US President** Donald Trump's more conciliatory stance towards Russia in his efforts to bring an end to the war in

Ukraine has prompted questions about US commitments to Kyiv. 'The whole of Nato, including the United States, is totally committed to keep Ukraine in the fight, to make sure that if there is a peace deal, that peace deal – or the ceasefire – will be lasting, will be durable," Rutte said.

He said the clear direction of travel was that Europeans would be responsible for more of the military aid to Ukraine. But he said the United States would still be "very much involved with intelligence-sharing, with also practical military support"

including potentially air defence systems. "I think there will still be a huge, big American involvement,"

Rutte said. The Trump administration has also told Europeans that they must take over primary responsibility for their own security, rather than relying on the United States through Nato. Rutte said this process would be possible as Europeans had committed to spending more on defence, and it would be "wellorganised" to avoid any gaps that Russia could exploit. "I've had these discussions in Washington over the last couple of

months," he said. 'For years, the US has said 'we have to pivot more towards Asia'. Now that the Europeans are stepping up, that also makes it possible," he said.

You will see that what the US is delivering to Nato in terms of capabilities will gradually come down. But there's also total clarity from the US that they don't want any capability gaps to emerge in Europe," Rutte said.

Upstart stuns ex-governor in NYC mayoral primary

7oung self-declared socialist Zohran Mamdani was on the cusp of stunning victory yesterday in New York City's Democratic mayoral primary -pummelling his scandalscarred establishment rival in a race seen as a fight for the future of the Democratic Party.

Results were not yet final. But Mamdani - who is just 33 and would become the city's first Muslim mayor - had such a commanding lead that his biggest rival, former New York governor Andrew Cuomo, conceded defeat overnight.

Mamdani's success was seen as a rebuke to Democratic centrists who backed the powerful Cuomo, as the party flails nationally in search of a way to counter Republican President Donald Trump's hard-right movement.

The Ugandan-born Mamdani was behind Cuomo in polls until near the end, surging on a message of lower rents, free daycare and other populist ideas in the

notoriously expensive US city. "Tonight we made history," he said in a victory speech to supporters. New Yorkers "have stood up for a city they can afford."

Cuomo, a 67-year-old political veteran vying to come back from a sexual harassment scandal, told supporters: "Tonight was not our

"I called him, I congratulated him," he said. Mamdani had taken 43% of the

When no candidate wins 50% of the vote outright, election officials start the time consuming process of eliminating the lowest-ranking candidates and retabulating.

Cuomo had big money and near universal name recognition in the city, as a former governor and son of another governor.

However, he was weighed down by having quit in disgrace four years ago after multiple women accused him of sexual harass-

ment. He was also accused of

mismanaging the state's response to the Covid pandemic.

Even so, Mamdani's success was stunning. The son of Indian-origin im-

migrants, he is backed by the Democratic Socialists of America party – the kind of niche, leftist affiliation that many Democratic leaders believe their party needs

The fact that Mamdani speaks out for Palestinians and has accused Israel of "genocide" also makes him a prime target for Trump, a fellow New Yorker.

His supporters include two favourite Trump foils - fiery leftist Senator Bernie Sanders and progressive congresswoman Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, who both congratulated Mamdani.

"Billionaires and lobbyists

poured millions against you and our public finance system. And you won," Ocasio-Cortez wrote on X.

Sanders posted: "You took on the political, economic and media Establishment – and you beat

Curtis Sliwa, the Republican candidate, called Mamdani "too extreme for a city already on

And Texas Senator Ted Cruz, a Republican, told New Yorkers "who are not Communists: Come to Texas!

Currently a New York state assemblyman representing the borough of Queens, Mamdani's eyecatching policy proposals include freezing rent for many New Yorkers, free bus service, and universal childcare.

In a city where a three-bedroom apartment can easily cost \$6,000 a month, his message struck a chord.

"What's at stake is primarily the affordability of New York," he

At least 11 people were killed, including a teenager, and more wounded in a Tuesday night shooting in the central Mexican city of Irapuato, authorities said yesterday. The attorney general's office in Guanajuato,

the violence-plaqued state where Irapuato is located, said that 20 others were hospitalised with aunshot wounds.

Mexican President Claudia Sheinbaum said earlier yesterday that the victims included

children, although the attorney general's office later confirmed only one casualty was a minor, aged 17.

"It is very unfortunate what happened. An investigation is under way," Sheinbaum said. Local media reported the shooting happened during an evening party celebrating a Catholic holiday, the Nativity of John the Baptist. A video circulating on social media showed people dancing in the patio of a

housing complex while a band played in the background, before gunfire erupted. Reuters was not immediately able to verify the video. Guanajuato has been for many years one of the most violent regions in the country, where criminal groups fight over routes to price drugs and commit other crimes. On Tuesday five other people were killed in other parts of the state, according to the attorney general's
