Qatar F1 GP: Sheikh Joaan crowns Verstappen champion



HE Sheikh Joaan bin Hamad al-Thani, President of the Qatar Olympic Committee, yesterday crowned Max Verstappen, Red Bull Racing driver as the winner of the Qatar Airways Formula 1 Grand Prix 2025. Held at Lusail International Circuit, the Qatar Grand Prix served as round 23 and the penultimate race of the Formula 1 World Championship season. Joining HE Sheikh Joaan in the podium ceremony were, Mohammed Ben Sulayem, President of the Fédération Internationale de l'Automobile (FIA), Badr Mohammed al-Meer, CEO of Qatar Airways, Abdulrahman al-Mannai, President of the Qatar Motor and Motorcycle Federation, and Abdulaziz al-Mohannadi, CEO of Lusail International Circuit. The Dutch driver clinched first place after completing the 57-lap race in a time of 1:24:38.241 hours, finishing ahead of Australia's Oscar Piastri of McLaren, who took second place, while Spain's Carlos Sainz of Williams secured the third place. The death toll from floods and landslides triggered by Cyclone Ditwah rose sharply to 334 yesterday, Sri Lanka's disaster agency said, with nearly 400 missing and more than 1.3mn people across the island affected by the record rains. President Anura Kumara Dissanayake, who declared a state of emergency to deal with the disaster, vowed to build back with international support. "We are facing the largest and most challenging natural disaster in our history," he said. Page 11

US-Ukraine talks productive: Rubio

ending Russia's war in Ukraine.

"There are a lot of moving parts, and obviously there's another party involved here that will have to be a part of the equation, and that will continue later this week, when Mr Witkoff travels to Moscow, although we've also been in touch in varying degrees with the Russian

side, but we have a pretty good understanding of their views as

well," Rubio told reporters. Rubio yesterday hosted high stakes talks with a Ukrainian delegation on Washington's plan to end Russia's war with its neighbour - discussions a source close to Kyiv's team characterised as "not easy."

The talks in Florida come as Kyiv faces mounting military and political pressure, along with the fallout from a corruption scandal. They could set the stage for next week's visit to Moscow by President Donald Trump's envoy Steve Witkoff, who is expected to discuss Ukraine diplomacy.

"This is not just about peace deals. It's about creating a pathway forward that leaves Ukraine sovereign, independent and prosperous," Rubio said at the start of the negotiations.

Witkoff and Trump's son-inlaw Jared Kushner were also attending the meeting in Hallandale Beach, north of Miami. Page 11

to participation or trying out some players. Rather, we aim to win, develop, and prepare for the upcoming stages."

Influential player Afif will lead the home charge today. Afif is not only a star of the Oatar Stars League; he is one of the most influential players in the Arab A mercurial attacking threat, the versatile forward is a two-time winner of the AFC Player of the Year award and also claimed MVP honours as Qatar tasted continental success last year.

Palestine, coached by Ehab Abu Jazar, last week qualified for the 16-team Arab Cup with a sensational play-off win against Libya in Doha. Palestine will hope Oday Dabbagh, 26, fires for the Arab side. Powerful, quick, strong in the air and on the ground, Dabbagh boasts European experience in the Portuguese, Belgian and Scottish leagues and is sure to be central to his nation's hopes of progression in Qatar.

platform that connects students with their national values and strengthens their sense of belonging to their country and its leadership," she stressed.


"What makes this operetta truly special is that it gives students the opportunity to express their love for Qatar through art, whether through singing, movement, or

theatrical scenes that highlight the unity of our school community," al-Derham added.



They also called for accelerated legislation and oversight, harmonising laws with international standards, boosting transparency, governance and data protection, building parliamentary capacities, launching national dialogues and clear ethical frameworks, raising public awareness, establishing specialised regulatory bodies. and sharing expertise through international co-operation.

Justice minister lays out four strategic pathways to advance legal services

The minister further elaborated on the legislative and regulatory developments throughout 2024, which included devising novel sectors that had substantially helped upgrade performance and empower the national workforce, as well as advance systems and programmes that promoted the services offered to stakeholders. He pointed out that the ministry has been granted several recognition awards in support of its development efforts.

Throughout the meeting, HE al-Mohannadi laid out four strategic pathways that keep up with the execution of the ministry's strategic plan 2025-2030. The first one pertains to serving the public and is laser-focused on promoting justice services, particularly those related to real estate registration and documentation, to ensure the provision of a smooth and integrated experience.

The second pathway pertains to legal services offered to public entities, including advancing legal



training conducted by the Centre for Legal and Judicial Studies and Agreements and International Cooperation Services, in addition to developing the services of managing the nation's cases after restructuring, thereby contributing to achieving justice and enhancing the quality of legal outputs and litigation mechanisms, HE al-Mohannadi said.

The third strategic pathway, he outlined, is dedicated to the advancement of legal professions, with the objective of elevating the standards of legal practice and reinforcing support and collaboration with its members, who serve as essential partners within the justice system.

The fourth pathway prioritises the ministry's internal operations by strengthening interdepartmental collaboration, empowering national personnel, enhancing the workplace environment, and advancing the digital transformation agenda.

HE al-Mohannadi said digital transformation has become an indispensable option. He reviewed a host of projects being commissioned by the ministry, including the Agreements and International Co-operation Services, Experts, Lawyers, and Arbitration Project, which introduces 100 new elec-

tronic services as part of the ministry's digital transformation pathway.

In addition, it includes the launch of the new SAK portal, the enhancement of the Qatar Legal Portal (Al Meezan), and the Official Legal & Judicial Magazine and Official Gazette Digital Portal.

The initiative, he clarifies, focuses on the digitisation of legal profession services through dedicated electronic portals for lawyers, arbitrators, and experts, as well as the digitalisation of the State-Cases Programme, carried out in collaboration with the Supreme Judiciary Council.

These projects contribute to shoring up performance quality, streamlining procedures, and achieving electronic integration with public agencies, offering integrated legal services for a wide diversity of the state institutions, HE al-Mohannadi explained.

The minister further emphasised that optimising the workplace is a core pillar of the ministry's strategy, recalling the advancement of the occupational pathways within the new organisational structure, thereby strengthening the role of the national workforce and growing its capability in the legal field. s part of its humanitarian efforts to assist communities impacted by natural disasters, Qatar Charity (QC) has signed a Contingency Project Co-operation Agreement (CPCA) with Unicef Pakistan.

The agreement aims to strengthen emergency response systems and ensure the timely delivery of relief services during crises across the country.

The partnership focuses on implementing Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) interventions alongside nutrition services during emergencies, with a strong emphasis on supporting vulnerable groups, particularly women and children.

Under this collaboration, QC and Unicef launched a Nutrition in Emergencies initiative in four districts of Punjab – Rajanpur, Jhang, Muzaffargarh and Multan – to support those affected by the 2025 floods.

The initiative seeks to improve access to treatment for acutely malnourished children as well as pregnant and lactating women.



The programme includes the provision of micronutrient supplements for children aged 6-59 months and breastfeeding women, along with counselling on maternal nutrition, nurturing care, early childhood development, and Infant and Young Child Feeding practices. It also incorporates capacity building, co-ordination, and information management to strengthen emergency nutrition systems. A WASH emergency project has been activated to assist flood-affected communities. It aims to provide climateresilient sanitation facilities for 20,000 people, including toilets, bathing areas, and washing points designed to be culturally sensitive, gender-appropriate and disability-inclusive.

Additionally, 100,000 people will benefit from improved awareness of key hygiene practices, disaster risk reduction messaging, and the effective use of hygiene kits. Furthermore, 5,000 children will gain access to safe drinking water and sanitation facilities in 20 schools, 10 temporary learning centres, 10 child-friendly safe spaces and 10 health facilities.

Awsaj Academy marks International Day of Solidarity with Palestinian People

Qatar Foundation's Awsaj Academy marked the International Day of Solidarity with the Palestinian People through a cultural and humanitarian event that brought together its students and several Palestinians evacuated from Gaza. The initiative sought to deepen awareness of Palestinian heritage and highlight the stories of resilience demonstrated by the people of the Gaza Strip. Held at Awsaj Academy's theatre and surrounding outdoor areas, the event drew a wide audience of students' families, the school community, and visitors. through direct experience. "The International Day of Solidarity with the Palestinian People provided a valuable opportunity to instil the values of empathy and responsibility, and to broaden students' understanding of what communities around the world are going through. "This event also highlighted how art, culture, and storytelling can serve as bridges that bring people together and promote respect for human diversity. We believe that such activities strengthen our students' sense of belonging and humanity, broaden their perspectives, and nurture their social and emotional development." Al-Subaie emphasised that the significance of the event extended beyond celebrating heritage, as it helped instil a sense of responsibility in students.

QRCS offers equipment, medical supplies to Niger eye clinics

atar Red Crescent Society (QRCS) implemented a project to support the Nigerien Ministry of Health (MoH) by supplying ophthalmology equipment and eye care medications to health centres across the country.

Implemented under a partnership agreement with MoH's National Eye Health Programme (NEHP), this initiative was aimed at enhancing vital eye health care services in underserved areas. It involved five ophthalmology clinics at health centres in Loga, Dioundiou, and Tibiri, as well as the maternal and childhood centre (Dosso Region), and another in Gazoua (Maradi region). Five pharmacies at

these centres were supplied with medications and medical consumables for eye diseases.

A joint field delegation from QRCS' office in Niger and NEHP delivered medical equipment and pharmaceutical supplies recently. In terms of pharmaceutical supplies, the target clinics were provided with a various stock of ointments, eye drops, examination tools, corrective lenses, and other medical supplies.

By giving the locals access to specialised medical services without having to travel long distances, it helps reduce the rates of blindness and visual impairment resulting from treatable conditions such as cataracts.

Medical examinations and surgeries are also

in progress as part of QRCS' medical convoy for ophthalmology in Niger. Co-implemented with Hamad Medical Corporation and NEHP, the mission involves medical examinations for a total of 6,000 patients, 1,436 cataract surgeries, distribution of medications for free, and eye health education programme.

QRCS is planning to launch a new medical convoy focused on school students. To raise the required QR400,000, donations can be received via QRCS' website (www.qrcs.qa), mobile app (QRCS), donor service (66666364), home donation collection (33998898), or donation collection points at malls and shopping centres.

QM launches 'JEDARIART' initiative as part of Qatar-Argentina and Chile 2025 Year of Culture

Pears of Culture and Qatar Museums' Public Art Department have launched the JEDARIART initiative in Buenos Aires, the Argentine capital, as part of the Qatar-Argentina and Chile 2025 Year of Culture.

The project arrived in Chile and Argentina, transforming public spaces into open-air galleries that celebrate friendship, hospitality, and the universal language of art.

Qatari artists Aisha al-Fadhala and Mubarak al-Malik joined forces with Chilean collaborators through a partnership with Edgar Endress, Professor at George Mason University, and a member of the Institute for Public Art (IPA). Together, they painted large-scale murals on the Municipality Building of Valdivia and the Architecture Department at Universidad Austral de Chile, filling its walls with symbols of Chilean nature and Qatari tradition.

Al-Malik's mural, Love and Hospitality, captured the heart of this collaboration. Known for his use of the battoollah, the traditional face mask worn by Qatari matriarchs, al-Malik combined Qatari motifs such as the mabkhara (incense burner) with Chilean wildlife, featuring the strong-voiced and elusive chucao bird. He incorporated textile patterns worn by Qatari women alongside the copihue flower,

uniting Valdivia's natural colours with Qatari designs to create an easy fusion of

Aisha al-Fadhala, known artistically as ALFA, worked with the University to develop a piece that reflects the culture and beauty of Valdivia. Often described as the gateway to Chilean Patagonia, Valdivia is surrounded by dramatic landscapes and stunning natural scenery, elements that deeply influenced her mural A Sip of Cultures.

Inspired by the region's mountains, sunsets, and intense colour palette, ALFA placed the traditional Qatari ghawa cup at the heart of the composition, encircled by Valdivia's natural motifs.

Henna-inspired patterns, shaped by her research into textiles from the Los Ríos region, appeared across the design, merging Qatari and Chilean aesthetics. Additional elements included the dandurria bird soaring across the backdrop and delicate chilco flowers draping from the corners.

A few days later, JEDARIART moved eastward to Buenos Aires, where two Qatari artists, Abdulla Alemadi and Abdulla al-Sallat, worked in an up-and-coming neighbourhood of Buenos Aires.

Alemadi's mural visualised the meeting of cultures at the centre of this exchange: beneath the shade of a date palm, Argentina's Sun of May, its national emblem, is draped in a Qatari bisht, sharing coffee and mate, the beloved herbal drink of

Latin America, with the rufous hornero, Argentina's national bird.

An empty chair was originally placed in the scene to invite viewers to join, symbolising welcome, generosity, and cultural connection.

The mural then evolved into a true collaboration when Argentinian artist Lucho Montolivo, known as Olivo, joined the project. Olivo's contribution featured his signature character, a travelling boy. By incorporating this character, Olivo added a sense of wander and shared storytelling to the mural.

His fellow artist, al-Sallat, took a more introspective approach. His mural, titled for the roses is a deeply personal piece inspired by the Andalusian philosopher Ibn Hazm al-Andalusi. "It suggests that meaning lies not on the surface, but in what can be felt or understood by those who truly seek. Just as poetry reveals itself differently to every reader, this mural offers each viewer the chance to discover their own version of its story," al-Sallat said.

"JEDARIART has always been about creating conversations through art," said Dimitrije Bugarski, Public Art Planning Specialist at Qatar Museums. "Through the Years of Culture initiative, we're taking that dialogue beyond Qatar, allowing artists to immerse themselves in new environments and exchange ideas with local communities. These murals in Argentina and Chile are stories told through colour

Part of a wider, ongoing initiative, the December programme brings together architects, designers, and students from around the world through lectures, workshops, and public events, nurturing cross-generational collaboration and global dialogue on contemporary questions in architecture and design

Throughout the month, visitors can enjoy a rich lineup of screenings in collaboration with the Doha Film Institute (DFI), expert-led lectures, and panel discussions that offer new perspectives on today's designscape.

The cultural programme at Al Riwaq offers a diverse series of film screenings, architectural lectures, and discussions throughout December 2025. The series begins on December 4 with a screening of *ButoHouse*, directed by Ila Bêka and Louise Lemoine, from 8pm.

On December 8, the DFI presents an engaging celebration of regional storytelling at 7pm. The showcase features seven short films, including Maysaa al-Mumin's *And I Was Left Behind* and Jassim al-Rumaihi's *The Palm Tree*

The lineup also includes *Emsahar* by Hassan al-Jahni; *Makhbz* by Aisha al-Muhannadi; Rawda al-Thani's dreamlike *I Have Been* Watching You All Along; Amal al-Muftah's adventurous Sh'hab; and Voices from the Urbanscape by Shaima al-Tamimi and Mariam Salim. The creators will be present to share insights into their work.

The programme continues on December 11 with a screening of *Rehab From Rehab* from 7pm to 8.30pm, hosted by experts Bêka and Lemoine. This sensitive, personal film examines how hospitals design spaces for the vulnerable. Architectural theory takes centre stage on December 14 with RGB, a lecture by Elena Manferdini from 7pm.

Manferdini returns on December 15 for a two-part event. She will deliver the lecture Something Old, Something New, Something Borrowed, Something Blue, examining the impact of artificial intelligence on design through the lens of the 2025-26 Rome Opera House project. This is followed by a panel discussion at 8pm, where Manferdini will be joined by Alfredo Cramerotti and Amal Ali.

The month concludes on December 25 with a second DFI showcase at 7pm. This session features four films centred on local culture: Tarek Abu-Esber's animation *Doha:* Al Muqana3; Treasures of the Past by Rawan al-Nassiri and Nada Bedair, which celebrates traditional crafts; Khurshid by Mazen Shafea and Mohamed Elamin, a narrative on the life of a goldsmith; and AJ al-Thani's Kashta, a desert narrative about a father's lesson turned tragedy. The filmmakers will be in attendance for a post-screening discussion.

Arab Book Award arrives at 48th Kuwait International Book Fair

The Arab Book Award, headed by Dr Hanan al-Fayyad, the award's media adviser, and including Dr Imtinan al-Samadi, a member of the media committee, participated in one of the 48th Kuwait International Book Fair's cultural events with a critical session titled: "Literary Awards: Between Honouring Creativity and Building Presence."

Dr al-Samadi pointed out that literary awards are not merely a matter of honouring and recognising an individual, but extend to a broader and more far-reaching framework, transcending mere celebration to exert a real influence on the cultural landscape. Serf music and its alternatives

For a glimpse of what our AI-driven future could be, consider what is happening in the music business. It was through music that the market for non-rare products and services began, where remuneration for the works of the mind was first imagined. JS Bach had to hold coffeehouse concerts to support his vast family, but with the Industrial Revolution, mass production, and the extreme division of labour that it brought, much larger markets became available.

The digital economy took this further. Musicians who once relied on the lords who commissioned them, then on the bourgeois consumers who bought concert tickets, and finally on the record companies that paid them royalties, today are remunerated by streaming services and other online

Now, AI is turning the industry on its head. Generative AI tools can produce music without human composers, using the immense catalogue of existing works to train themselves. The virtual band The Velvet Sundown passed the one-million mark in streams on Spotify in a matter $\,$ of weeks, and Heart on My Sleeve, posted to TikTok by an anonymous user who "used AI to make a drake song ft. the weeknd," has racked up millions

One can also find artificial DJs capable of hosting a party like a human, complete with speeches and playlists, as well as AI-generated film soundtracks and voiceovers that imitate artists' voices and styles. In each case, pretty much anyone can generate low-cost music and audio for use across a broad range of applications.

The evolution is dizzying. The International Confederation of Societies of Authors and Composers (CISAC) expects the market for music and audiovisual content created by generative AI to skyrocket, from around €3bn (\$3.5bn) currently to €64 billion by 2028, with generative AI music possibly accounting for approximately 20% of streaming platforms' revenues. CISAC also notes that creators' revenues are at risk; for music, the total could fall by about 24% by 2028.

To protect artists' copyrighted material, policymakers in some jurisdictions are beginning to take legislative action. The European AI Act requires those who publish and distribute J-generated materia sources. There are also several European projects exploring watermarking and blockchain-based solutions to identify source material and automatically pay out

micro-royalties. But such protections will likely prove illusory. The artists of tomorrow will have to be remunerated in other ways. The arrival of a new kind of economy means everything must change.

After all, anyone with a computer or mobile phone can create, arrange, mix, master, and produce a music video, or adapt their own works for video games, interactive advertising, marketing campaigns, and other uses. One possibility, then, is that generative AI will further enable some artists to forego arrangements with record companies and other traditional intermediaries. In doing so, they may try to maintain a personalised dialogue with their fans, whom they can offer customised experiences.

Sensing the changes that are coming, music distribution platforms are trying to get ahead of the game by allying themselves with legacy record companies, which are themselves in grave danger of extinction. For example, Spotify has signed an agreement with three major record companies promising to use AI with and for human artists, thus guaranteeing them transparency, consent, remuneration, and protections against cloned voices. But these legacy players will be unable to keep their promise, because the remuneration mechanisms provided for in these agreements will be largely illusory: too small and without real control.

Thus, if artists are not careful, the upheaval introduced by AI will amount to a change of master: after the feudal lord, the bourgeois, and the all-powerful record company will come the triumph of the algorithm. Copyright protections will evaporate, and musicians will become mere employees of the algorithm, if not its slaves. The only way that artists can escape this fate is by becoming entrepreneurs of their own creations, harnessing AI's formidable potential themselves, and also capitalising on the irreplaceability, already visible and lasting, of the in-person concert

Meanwhile, consumers, who could become passive subjects of algorithmic control, could assert themselves. They could become cocomposers, determining the form to be given to the work they listen to (by choosing the music style, the instruments, and the singers) and, like the artist, privileging the actual, direct, living, irreplaceable exchange of the concert performance.

The only true freedom, in music as elsewhere, is to create and control the fruit of one's creation. AI could amplify this freedom if we act now by focusing on the development of creativity at school and elsewhere. But as matters stand, it seems well on its way to doing the opposite. - Project Syndicate

Hong Kong's deadliest fire in decades followed a year of safety complaints

esidents of the housing complex that was engulfed in Hong Kong's deadliest blaze in seven decades were told by authorities last year that they faced "relatively low fire risks" after complaining repeatedly about fire hazards posed by ongoing renovation works, the city's Labour Department told Reuters. People living at Wang Fuk Court in northern Hong Kong had raised concerns over maintenance activity in September 2024, including about the potential flammability of the protective green mesh contractors had used to cover the bamboo scaffolding raised around the buildings, a department spokesperson said in an emai

The department subsequently reviewed safety certification for the mesh, which was used as a net for falling debris, and told residents the material's "flame-retardant performance" met standards, said the agency, which helps enforce construction standards set by the Building Department.

Hong Kong police said on Thursday, however, that the exterior walls of the complex's buildings "had protective nets, membranes, waterproof tarpaulins, and plastic sheets suspected of not meeting fire safety standards." Three people associated with renovation contractor Prestige Construction have been arrested on suspicion of manslaughter.

The exact cause of Wednesday's inferno, which has claimed at least 128 lives, has not been determined.

What is clear, however, is that the fire spread rapidly through the renovation infrastructure outside, said Jiang Liming, a fire-safety expert at Hong Kong Polytechnic University who reviewed video footage of the blaze.

Jiang said early observations of the fire did not take into account the foam boards over

Prestige, which secured a HK\$330mn (\$42.4mn) renovation contract for the complex in January 2024, did not respond to repeated calls. The three arrested people, who authorities have not named, could not be reached. Metal shutters were pulled down

over the entrance of Prestige's office when a reporter visited on Friday morning.

Asked about the Labour Department's review of the mesh's safety certification, Hong Kong police referred to a Thursday statement in which it said it would "gather evidence and conduct a thorough investigation to ascertain the cause of the fire" once the blaze was fully extinguished.

The Labour Department told Reuters that when it told residents they faced low fire risks as long as processes like welding were avoided, that did not mean that potential hazards were ignored. It also said it had reminded the contractor to implement fire-prevention

The agency added that it had carried out 16 safety inspections at Wang Fuk Court between July 2024 and November 2025. The department issued six improvement notices to he contractor over its work at the complex and initiated three prosecutions, it said, without providing further specifics.

Reuters could not determine the outcome of those proceedings or the firm's response. Wednesday's blaze spread at shocking speed.

Firefighters were first alerted to fire at one of Wang Fuk Court's towers at 2:51pm. Within the five minutes it took them to reach the site, the blaze had scattered across the scaffolding, entered the interior of the building and spread to other towers in the complex, according to a fire department statement.

In about four hours, seven of the complex's eight 32-story towers were engulfed in flames. Thick smoke made it hard for first responders to reach higher floors.

Hundreds of the 4,600 people living in the complex were placed in temporary shelter. About 200 were missing as of Friday.

Jiang, an assistant professor at Polytechnic University's department of building environment and energy engineering, compared the blaze to London's 2017 Grenfell public-housing fire, in which 72 people died.

A subsequent investigation revealed failings by the British government, the construction industry and firms involved in fitting the building's exterior with flammable cladding.

"It's a very similar kind of fire travelling mechanism: from the facade, the fire then entered the rooms" of apartments, he said.

Hong Kong leader John Lee has said the government will review the use of bamboo scaffolding. The Building and Labour departments separately said Thursday that they would be conducting emergency checks on buildings undergoing renovations to ensure that scaffolding and nets meet fire-safety

standards.

Police on Wednesday also said they had discovered foam at the complex that might have been responsible for the fast expansion of the fire.

Facebook user Peter Leung had posted photos of burning white material on the "Wang Fuk Court Resident Exchange" group in September 2024, alongside the caption: "the window insulation is flammable?

Leung did not respond when contacted by Reuters via Facebook.

Foam "burns quickly and produces thick. vic smoke." Chan Sze Ki Hong Kong Construction Industry Employees General Union, told Reuters.

The material can help prevent dust and glass damage to windows during construction, he said, but "did the management team and site supervisors consider this risk?"

called them," said the 58-year-old truck driver. His parents were rescued and are in a stable condition in hospital.

Chris Wong, who on Thursday was still waiting for news of her 72-year-old mother, who she believes remains trapped, expressed anger at how her apartment's windows were blocked with foam.

"The government has laws, but do they enforce on the quality of materials and safety? I have my doubts."

A Reuters review of the minutes of meetings held over the past year between homeowners and building management revealed additional fire-safety concerns.

Management told the homeowners' committee in October 2025 that among the items needing repair or maintenance in the complex were fire water inlets, hose components such as fire nozzles, fire alarm bells, fire extinguishers and fire hose reels, as well as lighting fixtures with batteries.

In July 2025, the committee was also told that "some hoses inside the fire tanks showed signs of aging and corrosion during waterproofing work." Meeting participants recommended replacing the hoses.

And in November 2024, the committee expressed concern that the number of solar panels on the towers' rooftops "might violate fire safety regulations." It suggested consulting the fire department. Reuters could not determine if action had been taken to address those concerns. Hong Kong Security Chief Chris Tang said on Friday fire alarms in the complex had not been working properly, confirming earlier complaints from some residents.

The management of Wang Fuk Court did not respond to calls and an e-mail.

Residents have also complained about contractors smoking around the scaffolding.

Jacky Cheung, who described himself as a former resident in the complex, sent Reuters a video he said he had taken that depicted a construction worker smoking next to the scaffolding. The news agency was able to verify that the video was shot at Wang Fuk Court, but not the exact date it was taken.

Cheung said he had complained about smoking incidents and sent management the video in February, but that they did nothing in response. – Reuters

Indonesia, Thailand race to find missing as flooding toll tops 600

Indonesian and Thai authorities raced yesterday to clear debris and find hundreds of missing people as the death toll from devastating floods and landslides across Southeast Asia topped 600.

Heavy monsoon rain overwhelmed swaths of Indonesia, Thailand and Malaysia this week, leaving thousands of people stranded without shelter or critical supplies.

At least two areas of Indonesia's worst-affected Sumatra island were still unreachable yesterday, and authorities said they had deployed two warships from Jakarta to deliver aid.

Central Tapanuli and Sibolga city "require full attention due to being isolated", National Disaster agency head Suharyanto said in a statement, adding that the ships were expected in Sibolga today.

The death toll in Indonesia rose

to 442, while 402 were still missing, according to a tally published yesterday by the disaster authority.

It said at least 646 people had been injured. In Sungai Nyalo village, about

In Sungai Nyalo village, about 100km from West Sumatra's capital Padang, floodwaters had mostly receded yesterday, leaving homes, vehicles and crops coated in thick grey mud.

Authorities had not yet begun clearing roads, residents told AFP, and no outside assistance had arrived.

"Most villagers chose to stay; they didn't want to leave their houses behind," said Idris, 55, who, like many Indonesians, goes by one name.

Across the island towards the north coast, an endangered Sumatran elephant lay buried in thick mud and debris near damaged buildings in Meureudu town.

In Thailand, where at least 162 people were killed in one of the worst floods in a decade, authorities continued to deliver aid and

clear the damage.

Relief measures rolled out by the Thai government include compensation of up to 2mn baht (\$62,000) for households that lost family members.

However, there has been growing public criticism of Thailand's flood response, and two local officials have been suspended over their alleged failures.

Two people were killed in Malaysia after floods left stretches of northern Perlis state underwater.

The annual monsoon season, typically between June and September, often brings heavy rain, triggering landslides and flash floods.

A tropical storm has exacerbated conditions, and the tolls in Indonesia and Thailand rank among the highest in floods in those countries in recent years.

Climate change has affected storm patterns, including the duration and intensity of the season, leading to heavier rainfall, flash flooding and stronger wind

Lanka floods, landslides death toll rises to 334

The death toll from floods and landslides triggered by Cyclone Ditwah rose sharply to 334 yesterday, Sri Lanka's disaster agency said, with many more still missing.

It is the worst natural disaster to hit the island in two decades, and officials said the extent of damage in the worst-affected central region was only just being revealed as relief workers cleared roads blocked by fallen trees and mudslides.

The Disaster Management Centre (DMC) said the death toll had risen to 334, up from 212 earlier yesterday, with nearly 400 missing and more than 1.3mn people across the island affected by the record rains.

President Anura Kumara Dissanayake, who declared a state of emergency to deal with the disaster, vowed to build back with

international support.

"We are facing the largest and most challenging natural disaster in our history," he said in an address to the nation. "Certainly, we will build a better nation than

what existed before."
The losses and damage are the worst since the devastating 2004
Asian tsunami that killed around 31,000 people and left more than

a million homeless.
Rain had subsided across Sri
Lanka but low-lying areas of the
capital were flooded on Sunday
and authorities were bracing for a
major relief operation.

A Bell 212 helicopter carrying food for patients stranded at a hospital just north of Colombo crashed into a river last evening. All five crew members were taken to a nearby hospital.

Another helicopter sent from India rescued 24 people yesterday, including a pregnant woman and a man in a wheelchair, marooned in



area, following Cyclone Ditwah in Kelaniya yesterday. (**Reuters**)

the central town of Kotmale, about 90km northeast of Colombo, officials said.

Pakistan was also sending rescue teams, the Sri Lankan Air Force said, while Japan will also send a team to assess Sri Lanka's immediate needs and has pledged assistance.

The air force said two infants and a 10-year-old child had also been rescued from a hospital in the northern town of Chilaw, which was submerged on Saturday. Authorities said flood levels in the capital would take at least a day to recede, while dry weather was also forecast. Cyclone Ditwah moved north towards India on Saturday.

Selvi, 46, a resident of the Colombo suburb of Wennawatte, left her flooded home yesterday, carrying four bags of clothes and valuables.

"My house is completely flooded. I don't know where to go, but I hope there is some safe shelter where I can take my family," she told AFP. Receding water levels in the town of Manampitiya, 250km northeast

of Colombo, revealed massive destruction.

"Manampitiya is a flood-prone town, but I have never seen such a volume of water," said 72-year-old resident S Sivanandan. He told the local News Centre portal that businesses and property had been extensively damaged. A car had flipped upside down in front of his shop, he said. A woman in central Wellawaya said she heard a loud noise and went outside to see boulders rolling down a mountainside before stopping near her home. "I saw trees falling and moving with the boulders. We are afraid to go back to our homes," she told reporters after moving to a shelter on safer ground.

The National Blood Transfusion Service said supplies were short even though there have been relatively few injuries.

The National Building Research Organisation, which monitors the stability of hills, said there was a high risk of further landslides because mountain slopes were still saturated with rainwater.

Netanyahu seeks pardon in corruption cases

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, on trial facing corruption charges, announced yesterday he had submitted a pardon request, saying the long-running cases were tearing the country apart. US President Donald Trump wrote to Israeli President Isaac Herzog earlier this month, asking him to pardon Netanyahu, who has repeatedly denied wrongdoing in the proceedings.

"The trial in my case has been ongoing for nearly six years, and is expected to continue for many more years," Netanyahu said in a video statement, without admitting guilt. He explained he wanted to see the process through until acquittal, "but the security and political reality — the national interest — dictate otherwise. The State of Israel is facing enormous challenges."

"The continuation of the trial is tearing us apart from within, arousing fierce divisions, intensifying rifts," he added.

The cases against Netanyahu have exposed divisions in Israeli society between his supporters and opponents.

The premier and his wife Sara are accused in one case of accepting more than \$260,000 worth of luxury goods such as cigars and jewellery from billionaires in exchange for political favours.

He is also accused of attempting to negotiate more favourable coverage from two Israeli media outlets in two other cases.

Netanyahu said the demand for him to testi-

fy three times a week had "tipped the scales", calling it an "impossible requirement".
"An immediate end to the trial will greatly help to lower the flames and promote the broad reconciliation that our country so desperately needs."

Netanyahu's statement was accompanied by a 111-page letter his lawyers submitted to Herzog which likewise did not admit culpability. Herzog's office confirmed it had received Netanyahu's request.

"This is an extraordinary request which carries with it significant implications. After receiving all of the relevant opinions, the president will responsibly and sincerely consider the request," the head of state's office said in a statement.

US officials host crucial Ukraine talks in Florida

S Secretary of State Marco Rubio held high stakes talks with a Ukrainian delegation in Florida yesterday, as the United States pushes to end Russia's war against its neighbour.

The negotiations come as Kyiv faces mounting military and political pressure, along with the fallout from a corruption scandal. They could set the stage for next week's visit to Moscow by President Donald Trump's envoy Steve Witkoff, who is expected to discuss Ukraine diplomacy.

"This is not just about peace deals. It's about creating a pathway forward that leaves Ukraine sovereign, independent and prosperous," Rubio said at the start of the negotiations.


Witkoff and Trump's son-in-law Jared Kushner were also attending the meeting in Hallandale Beach, north of Miami.

Ukraine's security council secretary Rustem Umerov led Kyiv's delegation, which also included Andrii Hnatov, the chief of staff of Ukraine's armed forces, and presidential adviser Oleksandr Bevz.

"We are discussing about the future of Ukraine, about the security of Ukraine, about no repetition of aggression of Ukraine, about prosperity of Ukraine, about how to rebuild Ukraine," Umerov said as the talks kicked off.

The US talks come amid turbulence for Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky and his government. A blockbuster corruption probe forced him to sack his chief of staff and top negotiator, Andriy Yermak, on Friday.

Rubio had met with Yermak only a week ago during another round of

talks in Geneva that both sides hailed as "constructive". In a separate post on the platform X, Umerov said he was in "constant contact" with Zelensky as the Florida meeting progressed.

"We have clear directives and priorities: safeguarding Ukrainian interests, ensuring substantive dialogue, and advancing on the basis of the progress achieved in Geneva," Umer-

ov wrote.

"We are working to secure real peace for Ukraine and reliable, long-term security guarantees. The delegation will report to the president of Ukraine following the conclusion of today's meetings."

Washington has put forward a plan to end the nearly four-year conflict and is seeking to finalise it with Moscow and Kyiv's approval.

An initial 28-point proposal drafted without input from Ukraine's European allies - would have seen Kyiv withdraw from its eastern Donetsk region and the United States de facto recognise the Donetsk, Cri-

mea and Lugansk regions as Russian.
The United States pared back the original draft following criticism from Kyiv and Europe, but the current contents remain unclear.

After the Florida negotiations, French President Emmanuel Macron is set to host Zelensky for talks in Paris today.

Separately next week, Rubio is set to skip a meeting of Nato foreign ministers despite allies' concerns about the US plan for Ukraine. However, Witkoff is expected in Moscow to discuss Ukraine diplomacy.

The flurry of diplomacy comes as the war — which has killed tens of thousands of civilians and military personnel and displaced millions of Ukrainians — shows no sign of easing.

Ahead of the Florida talks, Russia's forces targeted Ukraine's capital and the region for two nights in a row as they advanced on the front line.

Pakistan rejects UN warning over lifetime immunity for military chief

Pakistan dismissed yesterday a warning by the UN rights chief of potential "farreaching consequences" for the rule of law in granting the head of the all-powerful military legal immunity.

The foreign ministry said Pakistan was "fully committed to protecting... basic freedoms and the rule of law as enshrined in the constitution", responding to criticism from UN rights chief Volker Turk.

A constitutional amendment approved by parliament earlier this month, shielding Field Marshal Asim Munir and other top officials from prosecution for life, has raised alarm among rights group.

The change also created a new Federal Constitutional Court, stripping the Supreme Court of some of its powers and tightening oversight of judges.

"These changes, taken together, risk sub-

jugating the judiciary to political interference and executive control," Turk said in a statement on Friday.

He warned of a risk of "far-reaching conse-

quences for the principles of democracy and rule of law which the Pakistani people hold dear".

In its statement yesterday, the foreign minis-

try in Islamabad called the remarks "baseless" and said "it is regrettable that Pakistan's views and ground realities were not reflected".

Pakistan, a nuclear-armed nation of more than 250mn people, has long struggled to balance civilian authority with the military's role in politics.

Widely seen as Pakistan's most powerful institution, the military has governed the country for nearly half its existence via a series of coups since independence in 1947.

Swiss reject compulsory civic duty, climate tax for super rich

wiss voters yesterday resoundingly rejected a proposal to replace the current men-only military conscription with a compulsory civic duty for all and another on taxing the super-rich to fund the climate fight.

Final results from across the country's 26 cantons showed voters spurning the initiatives, which had generated significant discussion in the wealthy Alpine nation

The so-called Civic Duty proposal, which called for requiring every Swiss cit-

izen, regardless of gender, to do national service in the army or in a civilian capacity, was snubbed by a whopping 84% of voters nationally.

The "initiative for a future", which called for a new climate tax on big inheritances, was meanwhile rejected by over 78% of voters, official results showed.

The Swiss government and parliament had come out against both items, arguing that they would entail huge costs and could threaten the economy.

Recent opinion polls had also indicated the proposals had little chance of passing, but the extent of the rejection in the vote, in which 43% of eligible voters took part, still came as a surprise. Both landed among the worst results in a quarter century among popular votes held every few months under Switzerland's direct democratic system.

The committee behind the Civic Duty initiative had argued that requiring men and women alike to serve the nation would strengthen social cohesion.

The initiative aimed for "true equality", committee head Noemie Roten told AFP before the vote.

She described the current system as dis-

She described the current system as discriminatory — for men, but also for women, who are largely excluded from useful networks and experiences obtained during

Opponents of the initiative had denied

it would enhance equality, pointing out that women already accounted for the vast majority of unpaid tasks in Swiss society, and insisting it was unfair to require them to do more.

"Women of course continue to have the option to perform military or civilian service if they wish," Defence Minister Martin Pfister told reporters after the vote.

The government had also argued that doubling the number of recruits would far outstrip the needs and would double the costs of Switzerland's current conscription system.

As the results began flooding in, Roten told public broadcaster RTS that she was "proud" to have helped "put fundamental

questions on the table".

She pointed out that it often takes time for big societal projects to gain ground in Switzerland, pointing to the first effort to push through women's right to vote, which was rejected by 67 percent of voters in 1959, only to finally pass by nearly 66% in 1971.

"The idea of a civic duty is not dead with today's vote. It will continue and I think it will win out in coming decades," she said

The "initiative for a future", put forward by the youth wing of Switzerland's Socialist Party, had meanwhile called for a 50-percent inheritance tax on fortunes above 50mn Swiss francs (\$63mn) - estimated to affect some 2,500 households.



Students at QF schools envision greener future





tudents at Qatar Foundation (QF) schools are showing how small, practical actions can create lasting environmental change – and help build a cleaner, greener future.

At Qatar Leadership Academy, part of Qatar Foundation's Pre-University Education, a group of students are giving cooking oil, expired olive oil, and food waste a new purpose by using it to make ecofriendly soap and compost - turning everyday waste into products that benefit both their school, and

Saoud Abdulaziz al-Muraikhi, a 15-year-old student from Qatar, explains the recycling process. "First, we filter and clean the oil, then mix it with lye - sodium hydroxide for solid soap and potassium hydroxide for liquid soap," he says. "Then we add natural fragrances made from basil, lemon, and rosemary leaves, and let the mixture rest until it becomes soap. Once it's ready, we use the soap for cleaning in our school and share it during environmental awareness

He and his peers now hope to expand the project in collaboration with local partners, including farmers, to recycle larger quantities of waste, and to establish it as a model initiative for other schools nationwide.

are cultivating herbs and vegetables, like lavender, tomato, mint, and lettuce, in their on-site garden through the 'Greenhouse Initiative? Entirely student-led, its young participants collaborate to decide what to plant and how to care for the garden, while also monitoring growth and recording observations. They are encour-

learnings with others, and propose new initiatives.

The 'Greenhouse Initiative' has also become an integral part of QAS's Units of Inquiry, connecting learning across subjects. Students are applying science and math concepts in real-life contexts - exploring plant life cycles and sustainability, measuring growth, and representing data. Language and art lessons are supporting reflection and creativity through writing, sharing ideas, and designing projects with recycled materials. Next semester, the school aims to launch the Greenhouse Café to link learning with healthy, environmentally conscious food choices.

Maria Dahmali, aged 8, explains why she decided to join the programme, saying: "I got involved in the project because I love the idea of helping the earth and learning how things grow. One of our values at Qatar Academy Sidra is sustainability, so I wanted to live this value and do something positive for the environment.

"Working in the garden helps us appreciate how much effort goes into growing food, so we waste less. It shows us that scraps can become useful again. It makes us care more about the environment because we can see how plants and insects all work together to keep nature healthy."

Sara Dawood, a teacher at QAS Primary School and part of the 'Greenhouse Initiative', added: "Our school, being an International Baccalaureate school, plays a key role by providing experiences that connect knowledge to action, through activities like gardening, recycling projects, and eco-workshops. Students learn that their choices matter, and, by doing this, schools can also nurture leadership,



QBG develops unique mudball for FIFA Arab Cup 2025

The Qur'anic Botanic Garden (QBG), a member of Hamad Bin Khalifa University, has developed a unique mudball to commemorate the FIFA Arab Cup 2025 taking place in Qatar from December 1-18.

This initiative aligns with the QBG's mission to highlight Qatar's natural environment and deepen public engagement with nature through creative experiences that blend heritage with environmental awareness.

QBG partnered with the design company taking the opportunity to showcase Qatar's reputation for innovation, excellence, and sustainable practice.

Beyond the technical aspects, the project offers a distinctive environmental experience. Each fan receives a clay ball they can plant in their garden or personal pot. As the ball naturally dissolves in water, the basil seeds inside begin to sprout, creating a vibrant connection that extends beyond the tournament.

Fatima Saleh al-Khulaifi, director, QBG, said: "This project emOBG. Our contribution to developing the mudball is not simply an artistic endeavour, it is a message to the world that Oatar's environment carries a heritage that can be creatively and compellingly reimagined. This initiative also reflects QBG's role in preserving plant resources, raising environmental awareness, and offering models that connect society with nature within the context of a major international sporting event."

Mohamed Hassona, horticulturist at QBG, and lead developer of the mudball, added: "The primary challenge was the ball's weight, as clay is naturally heavy and unsuitable for general handling. Also, maintaining the seed viability during the shaping process, which required precise moisture control and drying techniques to ensure it remained capable of germination without affecting the ball's structure posed a challenge. To overcome these, we used modern materials such as biochar, various lightweight fibrous soils, and Qatari clay to produce one of the lightest clay balls used in planting applications."
