Stage set for blockbuster semi-finals today

he stage is set for absorbing semi-finals of the FIFA Arab Cup today. The semi-finals are set to be thrilling affairs with three Asian sides looking to lift the coveted

Standing in their way are Morocco, who are aiming to keep the trophy in Africa following the elimination of defending champions Algeria in the quarter-finals.

Morocco vs UAE

UAE showed steely resolve in defeating Algeria in the quarter-finals and will have to produce more

of the same against Morocco. While penalties were needed

to decide UAE's passage to the last four stage, Morocco saw off the challenge of Syria in 90 minutes, winning 1-0. UAE's hero in the 7-6 penalty shootout win was goalkeeper Hamad al-Meqbali, who denied Yassine Benzia and

Mohamed Khacef from the spot. The Shabab Al Ahli shot-stopper paid tribute to UAE head coach Cosmin Olaroiu after his heroics against Algeria.

"We deserved the win, and this success has brought us immense joy despite a tough match. The coach instilled positive energy in us, he motivated us in the right way and showed a lot of faith in us, like we were his own sons. That helped us to fight for our flag, for ourselves and for the coach," said

Meqbali. Morocco will be another tough test but Meqbali, who is normally Khalid Eisa's understudy, and his teammates are looking forward to locking horns with the African

With just days to recover, Lucas Pimenta said it was crucial for UAE to quickly refocus.

"We need to prepare and recover in time to face Morocco, and hopefully we'll manage to win again," said the centre-back.

Saudi Arabia vs Jordan

These are thrilling times for Jordan and they will head into their semi-final against Saudi Arabia with confidence.

Their runners-up finish at the AFC Asian Cup Qatar 2023 was followed by a first-ever qualification for the FIFA World Cup and Jordan are now just two wins away from lifting the FIFA Arab Cup trophy. They showed grit in the 1-0 win against Iraq in the quarter-finals, soldiering on despite losing the creative Yazan al-Naimat to injury in the first half, with his teammates attributing the victory to their determination to continue showcasing Jordanian

"The injury to al-Naimat was a blow to our morale after he had to leave the match so early but everyone showed real responsibility, and in the end we were rewarded with the win," said left-back Mohammad Abu Hashish. "We deserve to be in the semi-finals; we didn't get here by chance. The next match will be tough, and we'll prepare for it properly. We hope to deliver a performance worthy of the Jordanian national team."

Saudi Arabia had to work hard to earn their semi-final spot, needing extra-time to see off the challenge of a resilient Palestine.

Midfielder Mohammed Kanno was the hero for Saudi Arabia, netting the winner in the final minute of the match for his third goal of the tournament.

Head coach Herve Renard has a talent-laden squad at his disposal and will expect to see his side

Saudi Arabia are ready for 'battle' against Jordan

COACH HERVE RENARD SAYS HIS TEAM CAN REACH THE FINAL

oach Herve Renard yesterday said Saudi Arabia are expecting a feisty clash against Jordan in the semi-final of the FIFA Arab Cup today.

Renard, who coached Saudi Arabia at the 2022 FIFA World Cup in Qatar, yesterday also said his players won't adopt half measures against the 2023 AFC Asian Cup finalists.

"After reaching this stage of a tournament, all matches are usually difficult and tough, and require the best effort from every player. And certainly all of my players are aware of this and they are ready for Jordan," Renard said yesterday at a press confer-

"I have confidence in the players' ability to perform at their best and win so we can reach the final," Renard said ahead of the match scheduled to take place at Al Bayt Stadium in Al Khor.

"Our preparations have been good for this match. We will be playing to win so we can play the final," the popular Frenchman

The Saudi coach added: "Our goal is to to get the win in order to please the Saudi fans who have come to Qatar in large numbers to support the team. We will spare no effort to raise the flag of Saudi football here."

Renard, 57, said that he has 'a good relationship' with Jordan's coach Jamal Sellami.

"I know he is focused on working with his own team just like any other coach. I have worked with him for a long time," he said.

Morocco coach Sellami yesterday said: "Our preparations are good, we gave some players a rest yesterday and Sunday will be the final preparation."

The coach added: "We will face a strong and a title favourite team. They have no absences while we have a key player miss-

ing out. For the first time, we will play without Yazan al-Naimat and Musa al-Taamari together. We will have to defend smart in the match." Sellami continued: "We know

the strength of the Saudi national team. We will have to be at our best."

The Jordan coach admitted Saudi Arabia will be a tough opponent and that his side won't be thinking of the final just yet.

Sellami told reporters yesterday: "My focus is on the next match. We will face a solid team in defence, attack and midfield. They have some of the best players in Asia. They also have Mohammed Kanno, who has returned to his best form.

"The most important thing now is to face Saudi Arabia, and then consider the final.

"I have a good relationship with Herve Renard and there's mutual respect also. He deserves respect and is worthy of it."

"We've faced many tough matches throughout our journey in this tournament and now we are playing another tough team," Olaroiu said yesterday during a press conference.

"A tough match awaits us, we know that. But reaching the semifinals of this major tournament is a significant achievement. The atmosphere within the team is positive. Everyone is ready for this

important game," he added. "Playing against a team as strong as Morocco presents a difficult challenge, and at this stage of the tournament, mental preparation becomes a crucial factor, especially under challenging circumstances. I am confident that the players will give their all to get the win," the Romanian said.

"We will try to impose our control over the course of the match (against Morocco) as much as possible," he said without elaborating. Olaroiu added in the pre-match press conference: "We will also strive to implement our plans in the defence correctly and find solutions for every chance we get (to

Cosmin continued: "When you reach these (knockout) stages (of a tournament) you rely a lot on the mental strength of the players."

UAE midfielder Adel al-Hosani yesterday said that his team's ambitions are high after reaching the semi-finals.

He said yesterday: "We are determined to make our fans happy who have stood by us in this tour-

nament. Everyone is fully prepared to face the challenge against Morocco." Moroccan national team coach

Tarik Sektioui said yesterday the 'Atlas Lions' remained ready for their semi-final against the UAE. At the 2022 FIFA World Cup in Qatar, Morocco topped a group

that included Croatia, Canada and Belgium. Morocco went on to beat Spain and Portugal, becoming the first African and first Arab team to reach a World Cup semi-final. "The Moroccan team is ready. The UAE team has brilliant play-

ers, we are aware of that. But my players know that mental focus has to be sharp and that discipline at the back has to be good as well," Sektioui said. Sektioui added that he has com-

plete confidence in his players to give their best so that the travelling Moroccan fans and the ones residing in Qatar 'are happy with the performance' today.

Sektioui pointed out key striker Abderrazak Hamdallah is ready to be named in the squad after his suspension for two matches due to the red card he received against Oman. Sektioui also confirmed winger Tarik Tissoudali has recovered from a leg injury.

Arshdeep helps India beat SA to take series lead

rshdeep Singh led an inspired bowling attack to help India beat South Africa by seven wickets in the third T20 international yesterday as the hosts took a 2-1 lead in the five-match series.

Left-arm quick Arshdeep returned figures of 2-13 as India bowled out South Africa for 117 after the hosts elected to field first in the Himalayan hill town of Dhar-

Fast bowler Harshit Rana, spiniers Varun Chakravarthy and Kuldeep Yadav also took two wickets

In reply, Indian opener Abhishek Sharma hit 35 off 18 balls as India achieved the target with 25 balls to spare to bounce back from their previous defeat in the series.

"Sport teaches you a lot of things, how you come back is more important," said India skipper Suryakumar Yadav.

"There was a lot of learning after last game in the meeting and then did what we did in Cuttack (opening match) today."

It was the home side's bowlers who set up victory after Arshdeep and fellow quick Rana struck in the first two overs to send back Reeza Hendricks, for a duck, and previous-match hero Quinton de Kock, for one.

Skipper Aiden Markram made a aliant 61 off 46 halls to stem the tide but the visitors continued to lose regular wickets.

Rana bowled Dewald Brevis for two, before pace bowler Hardik Pandya dismissed Tristan Stubbs for nine for his 100th T20 wicket. Chakravarthy rattled the middle order with his mystery spin as he cut short Donovan Ferreira's

knock on 20 and then had Marco

Iansen bowled for two in his next

Arshdeep, who was named player of the match, had Markram out and left-arm wrist spinner Kuldeep took two in the 20th over

England's 2023 fightback a useful Ashes reminder for Australia's Green

■ ngland's fightback to draw the last Ashes series 2-2 is a useful reminder to Australia that they cannot afford to take their foot off the gas with a 2-0 lead this time around, Cameron Green said yesterday.

Australia go into the third Test, which starts in Adelaide on Wednesday, looking firmly in control of the five-match series after victories by eight wickets in Perth and the day-nighter in Brisbane.

The memories of 2023 in England, when the hosts came back from a similar deficit to level the series, were a cautionary tale for Green, however, as Australia look to lock up series honours with two matches to spare.

"That's a really good reminder for our team," the all-rounder told reporters at Adelaide Oval yesterday.

"It's a good reminder for us to stay really level. I think you can at times look a bit far ahead, but that's a great reminder for us to stay as good as we can be and finish it off."

Former Australia paceman Mitchell Johnson wrote this weekend that England could avoid a 5-0 series sweep but they would need to change their mindset to do so.

Green, though, does not ex-

pect England to change their aggressive approach to batting even with the series on the line, regardless of what kind of wicket or weather Adelaide serves

"I think they've been really consistent the last three years with how they want to go about it, so I don't think conditions or heat really changed that," he

"I always think that the heat probably plays into our hands a little bit better. I think it's the same for when we go over to England, it's really cold."

Local TV, always eager to spot any signs of disgruntlement in the England camp, has been broadcasting footage this weekend of a cameraman being ushered away from England players by security as they headed to their flight to Adelaide on Saturday

Media have been repeatedly told that neither team will be available for interviews while in transit between matches during the series, and that any video should be "captured from a respectful distance".

Green said he had some sym-

pathy for the England players.
"You never like getting filmed, especially when you want to get away from it all," he said. "So there's always sympathy for anyone in life that's getting filmed in public or in a private space. It's never a nice feeling."

England coach McCullum doubles down again with Ashes on the line

rendon McCullum said there will be no major changes to England's approach in the third Ashes test with the coach hoping for better execution from his players in what he expects to be more conducive conditions in Adelaide.

New Zealander McCullum has come under fire for his aggressive approach to the game after England slumped to losses by eight wickets in two days in Perth, and four days in Brisbane.

Another defeat in Adelaide, where the third Test starts on Wednesday, means the end of England's hopes of wresting back the Ashes and exposes the tourists to the possibility of the dreaded 5-0 whitewash. "We came here with high hopes and high expectations. We had a plan that we felt was going to give ourselves the best chance of being successful," McCullum told reporters at Adelaide Oval yesterday.

"We haven't quite executed that so far, and Australia has seized those key moments and hence they sit 2-0 up. It doesn't mean that we throw that plan out. We just need to chisel away at some of the things we haven't got quite right and make sure that we still have that conviction of what we're trying to achieve.

"I think these conditions should suit our style a little bit better as well ... this is probably more at-

tuned to our best style of cricket." Several of England's batters have struggled for runs in Australia but McCullum said wholesale changes to the line-up for Adelaide were highly unlikely.

"We've had a top seven now for a period of time, and we've been reasonably successful with it," he said. "We know we haven't got enough runs so far in the series ... but for us to go on and win the series, it's not about throwing out what's been successful.

"It's about having more conviction. It's about making sure that we have our plans and our disciplines around it. Just screw it down a touch more. Knee-jerk reactions and chopping and changing settled batting line-ups is not really our thing."

McCullum, who took over as a coach in May 2022, said the last thing on his mind was the security of his own job. "You do the job to the best of your ability. You have conviction in what you're doing,

and whatever happens, happens," he said.

"I certainly don't coach to protect a job. I coach to get the best out of people ... and that won't be changing this week, just because the prize is at its highest.

"I firmly believe if we play our best cricket, we're a massive chance in this Test match. If we do that, then the narrative changes, the series momentum changes."

McCullum also addressed an incident at the airport over the weekend when team security ushered Australian media away from the players. "I think we've been very respectful right throughout this tour," he said.

"We knew that the scrutiny ... would be more extreme than we're used to and I think over the last few weeks, I think we've dealt with it really well."



ENGLAND'S ASHES HOPES HANG BY A THREAD AS 'BAZBALL' BACKFIRES

England arrived in Australia with genuine hopes of a first Ashes series win "Down Under" since 2010-11 and seeking their first series triumph home or away against their oldest rivals in a decade. But after just six days of cricket they are 2-0 down with three matches to play, with their "Bazball" style of ultra-attacking cricket under fire following crushing eight-wicket defeats in Perth and Brisbane

AFP Sport looks at what has gone wrong for England so far.

Approach

Coach Brendon McCullum and captain Ben Stokes injected fresh energy into an England side that had won just one of 17 Tests when they joined forces in 2022, urg ing players to play fearless cricket. Yet Bazball has at times morphed from a guiding ethos into something nearing a dogma, with a self-defeating inflexibility

at times. Early success has been replaced by more modest results - England have won 13 and lost 14 of their 29 matches in the World Test Championship (WTC) since June 2023. A bristling Stokes last month labelled former players critical of England's approach as "has-beens", drawing a

"They are up their own backsides convinced that Test cricket has changed so much that only they know anything about the modern game," England multiple Ashes winner Geoffrey Boycott wrote in the Daily Telegraph.

England managing director Rob Key has long believed in the need for sheer pace on typically hard Australian pitches. "I don't care how many wickets you take," he said last year. "I want to know how hard you are running in, how hard you are hit-

ting the pitch and are you able to sustain pace at 85 to 88 miles per hour?" Veteran Australia fast bowler Mitchell Starc has shone for the home side, taking 18 wickets in the series so far. But the surfaces in the opening two Tests have also rewarded traditional English-style seam bowling, with Australia's Michael Neser, averaging just above 80mph, taking 5-42 in the second innings at Brisbane.

Preparation

McCullum was ridiculed following defeat in the pink-ball clash in Brisbane after saying England had trained too much and were over-prepared.

The tourists played only one pre-series warm-up fixture and wicketkeeper Jamie Smith, along with others, had never appeared in a pink-ball Test before the match in Brisbane. England's lack of match practice came back to haunt them as they

dropped five catches in the first innings. Stokes' men also opted against having a tour game between Brisbane and next week's third Test in Adelaide

"Nowhere in a million years has preparation been right," said former England captain and Ashes winner Michael Vaughan.

England have been found wanting in basic disciplines, with batsmen taking unnecessary risks and bowlers unable to maintain an accurate line and length.

Stokes' team have also ignored repeated warnings about the dangers of trying to clear the bigger boundaries of Australian grounds and the need to minimise risk when facing Starc. After their defeat in the second Test, Stokes demanded his players toughen up, insisting his England team is "not a place for weak men".

But it may be too late to turn the tide after

Australia triumphed in Brisbane despite being without three senior bowlers - skipper Pat Cummins, Josh Hazlewood and Nathan Lyon - who have more than 1.100 Test wickets between them.

Selection

England have indulged certain players to an extent previously unthinkable. Opener Zak Crawley has been retained despite averaging a modest 33.7 in WTC matches since June 2023 in the belief he would come good in Australia, reflecting a unhealthy obsession with the Ashes to the exclusion of all else. Fellow top-order batsman Ollie Pope averages a mere 31.8 over the same period, vet Jacob Bethell. the man next in line, has yet to make a first-class hundred, "This lot aren't even afraid of getting dropped, which is why we see the same old failings, particularly in the batting," said an exasperated Boycott.

Saudi, Iraq to host AGCFF U-15, U-23 tournaments

inister of Sports and Youth and AGCFF President HE Sheikh Hamad bin Khalifa bin Ahmed al-Thani yesterday chaired AGCFF's General Assembly meeting in Doha.

The meeting approved Saudi Arabia and Iraq as hosts for the Gulf Cup tournaments for under-15 and under-23 age groups, with dates to be determined later after referral to the federation's Competitions Committee.

Several items, topics, and proposals submitted by member states were discussed, with the agenda adopted and the financial and administrative report reviewed. The meeting also addressed Saudi Arabia's hosting of the 27th Gulf Cup, scheduled from September 23 to October 6, 2026.

The Executive Office of the Gulf Federation emphasised the need to continue Gulf football's successes and further develop tournaments, especially at the youth level. The Federation also praised Qatar for its successful hosting of the Under-17 and Under-23 Gulf Cup tournaments, noting the organisation left a positive impression on all teams.

Jassim al-Rumaihi, Secretary-General of the Gulf Football Federation, said during a press conference after the meeting that the key decisions included Iraq organising the under-23 Gulf Cup in Basra, and Saudi Arabia hosting the under-15 Gulf Cup, with dates to be set later by the Competitions Committee according to the international calendar. Al-Rumaihi also commended the efforts of all Gulf federations in developing competitions and exploring the possibility of inviting teams from outside the Gulf region in the future.

He added that the timing of the 27th Gulf Cup, from September 23 to October 6, 2026, was chosen to accommodate Saudi Arabia's hosting of the 2027 Asian Cup.

The Gulf Football Federation's inspection committee will make several visits to Saudi Arabia in the next phase to monitor preparations, assess the host country's readiness, and review alternatives as customary.

Late Kane penalty saves Bayern point against Mainz

DORTMUND HELD AT FREIBURG AFTER BELLINGHAM SEES RED

arry Kane converted a penalty with three minutes remaining to save Bayern Munich's blushes in a 2-2 home draw against lastplaced Mainz in the Bundesliga vesterday.

Mainz came from a goal down to snatch the lead thanks to an excellent Lee Jae-sung header, putting Bayern on track for a first league defeat since March.

So often Bayern's saviour this season, Kane won and converted the penalty to keep Vincent Kompany's side undefeated and extend their lead atop the table to nine points.

Borussia Dortmund's draw at Freiburg earlier on Sunday had given league leaders Bayern a chance to go further ahead of their rivals with victory over a Mainz side, who have just one win all season and coach Urs Fischer making his league debut in the dugout.

Bayern's teenage forward Lennart Karl continued his impressive form, turning in a Serge Gnabry cutback to give the hosts the lead

on 29 minutes.

Mainz won a free-kick just before the break and William Boving floated in a clever cross right to Kacper Potulski, who powered an unstoppable header in from close

range Midway through the second half, Mainz's Lee then headed his side into an unlikely lead.

As he did when scoring to snatch Bayern a draw against Union Berlin in November – the only previous time the defending champions had dropped points this season – England captain Kane was again the late difference-maker for the Bayarians. Kane went down in the box under a challenge and coolly converted for his 18th league goal this season and his 29th for Bayern in all competitions.

Borussia Dortmund missed a chance to climb to second in the Bundesliga past RB Leipzig, conceding an equaliser in a 1-1 draw at Freiburg after Jobe Bellingham saw red

Ramy Bensebaini's 31st-minute goal had Dortmund in front but Bellingham was sent off for a professional foul shortly after halftime.

The hosts made the most of their one-man advantage, camping out in Dortmund's half and levelling things up thanks to an acrobatic Lucas Hoeler strike.

"We're definitely disappointed," Dortmund's Gregor Kobel told DAZN.

"If the red card doesn't happen, the result would look different. We had the game under control and were very dominant."

Dortmund striker Serhou Guirassy missed a header while unmarked in the box five minutes in, continuing his recent dry spell.

Guirassy scored 38 goals in all competitions last season but has just one in his past 10 Bundesliga matches

Dortmund took the lead when Bensebaini smashed in a lofted Yan Couto free-kick from close range.

The visitors had looked comfortable but lost control of the match when Bellingham, as the last man, felled an on-rushing Philipp Treu on the edge of the box.

With Freiburg peppering the Dortmund goal, Kobel made a string of impressive saves but could not keep out Hoeler's curling strike.

Saudi and Iraq enter U-23 Gulf Cup final

Iraq defeated Qatar 7-6 on penalties after the match ended 1-1 in regular time. The final will take place tomorrow at the iconic Stadium 974 – the first fully demountable covered football stadium in FIFA World Cup history, which hosted matches during the 2022 tournament.

"I am so, so happy. This is a great honour," said the 30-year-old Higa. "I just love playing golf. That's what it's about. I can't wait to get home to see my family." Higa also earned an exemption into the British Open for his achievement. The ultra-consistent Higa started the year with three top 10s in the Philippines, India and New Zealand.

Second round of Qatar Drift Championship concludes

fter a break of more than six weeks, drifting competitions returned to the spotlight with the second round of the Qatar Drift Championship for the 2025/2026 season.

The round was held under the patronage Qatar Racing Club Chairman HE Sheikh Khalid bin Hamad al-Thani and witnessed a large crowd that filled the club's grandstands, alongside the participation of an elite group of drift champions from the Gulf countries and the wider region.

City smash Palace to fire title warning, Villa beat West Ham

Forest beat Tottenham to move five points clear of danger zone

thumped Crystal Palace 3-0 yesterday to climb back to within two points of Premier League leaders Arsenal as Aston Villa twice came from behind to beat West Ham.

Elsewhere, Nottingham Forest demolished Tottenham 3-0 while Sunderland saw off local rivals Newcastle 1-0 thanks to a Nick Woltemade own goal.

Arsenal, who have set the pace in this season's Premier League, squeaked home on Saturday with a 2-1 win against bottom-club Wolves, thanks to two own goals.

That put the pressure back on City, who have been showing ominous signs that they are finding their feet in recent weeks.

Pep Guardiola's men braced for a tough task at Selhurst Park against high-flying Crystal Palace and Oliver Glasner's side were the more dangerous team in the first half. But Palace failed take their chances, with Yeremy Pino hitting the crossbar with only goalkeeper Gianluigi Donnarumma to beat.

Erling Haaland had largely been on the periphery of the game but scored his 101st Premier League goal when he headed a pinpoint Matheus Nunes cross across Dean Henderson and into the net shortly before the break.

Palace again started the second half brightly but could not break through and paid the price when Phil Foden swept home from distance after receiving the ball from Rayan Cherki. It was the sixth goal in four Premier League games for the forward, being watched at Selhurst Park by England manager Thomas Tuchel.

City made certain of the three points when Haaland thundered a penalty past Henderson after Savinho was taken down by the goalkeeper following a surging run down the middle late in the game. Villa started their match at the London Stadium as the form team in the league, with nine wins in 10

league matches. But they fell behind after just

ootball icon Lionel Messi's second day in India passed smoothly yesterday, after a cha-otic opening to his three-day tour, as the World Cup winner kicked balls into the crowd and met cricket legend Sachin Tendulkar.

Messi greeted excited fans decked out in Argentina football jerseys at a packed Wankhede stadium in India's financial hub Mumbai, as supporters chanted

The 38-year-old Argentina and Inter Miami superstar took centre stage in the presence of India's sporting royalty including Tendulkar and football star Sunil Chhetri.

Messi along with his Inter Miami teammates Luis Suarez and Rodrigo de Paul are part of a so-called GOAT Tour of a cricket-crazy nation.

Cricket great Tendulkar presented Messi with his iconic number 10 jersey from India's 2011 World Cup triumph at the same venue.

"I have spent some incredible moments here," said batting star Tendulkar.

"Mumbai is a city of dreams and number of dreams have seen the finish line here on this very venue and without your support we could never have seen those golden moments in 2011.

"And today having all three greats of game here is indeed a golden moment for Mumbai, Mumbaikars and India."

Although a cricket power-

house, the nation of 1.4 billion struggles on the football pitch and are 142nd on the FIFA rank-

"Thank you for being here and encouraging youngsters," said Tendulkar. "I hope football here in India also reaches the heights that we all aspire."

The Mumbai event went smoothly compared to Saturday's in the eastern city of Kolkata where heavy security left fans struggling to catch a glimpse of Messi.

Frustrated fans, many having paid more than \$100 for tickets, broke down barricades and stormed the pitch after the superstar abruptly left the arena.

irgil van Dijk wants Mohamed Salah to stay at Liverpool despite the Egyptian star's incendiary rant about the club, but the Reds captain admits he does not know what will happen over the next few weeks.

Salah came off the bench against Brighton on Saturday for his first appearance since claiming he had been "thrown under the bus" by the club following last weekend's 3-3 draw with Leeds. The forward also said in the same interview at

Elland Road that he had no relationship with Liverpool manager Arne Slot, who had named him as a substitute for three straight games. Salah was then omitted from the midweek Cham-

pions League trip to Inter Milan, a 1-0 win for Liverpool, but he was back in action as a first-half substitute against Brighton. The 33-year-old provided an assist for Hugo Ekitike's second goal in a much-needed 2-0 win, but

will now jet to the Africa Cup of Nations (AFCON) and could be absent for five weeks. After the match, Slot said there was "no issue to resolve" with his star forward, but speculation con-

tinues to rumble over the player's future. Van Dijk is adamant that he wants Salah to stay and said he had told him so. "I would love to have him around because he is one of the leaders, but the fact is he is going to AFCON. We will be in contact over the next days and weeks like we always are and let's see," the Dutch defender said.

"I wish him absolutely all the best - and (to) come back, hopefully. I have no control over that.

"We hope he will be absolutely successful there and we all hope he will be coming back to be important for the rest of the season. But, on the other side of it, we all know football and have no idea what is going to happen."
