Variawa wins eighth stage, al-Attiyah retains overall lead

Sood Variawa won the eighth stage of the Dakar Rally in a South African one-two with Henk Lategan yesterday as Qatar's Nasser Saleh al-Attiyah saw his overall lead cut to four minutes in the Saudi Arabian desert.

Dacia Sandriders driver al-Attiyah finished fifth and one minute and 16 seconds behind 20-year-old Toyota SA driver Variawa, who beat factory entry Lategan by three seconds on the 483km loop around the southern city of Wadi Ad Dawasir.

The Qatari's closest rival Mattias Ekstrom was third for Ford in the longest stage of the 48th edition of the rally.

Last year's Dakar runner-up Lategan moved up to third overall, six minutes and eight seconds off the lead with five stages remaining before Saturday's finish in the Red Sea port of Yanbu.

The one-two was the fourth ever by South African drivers in the car category. Ford's Nani Roma and Carlos Sainz were fourth and fifth respectively. "We made a little mistake close to the finish and we lost around three minutes," said al-Attiyah, a five times Dakar winner. "But OK, I am really happy from the performance. We don't lose a lot of time. I think we did a good job."

Predictions that this year's Dakar would be the closest battle yet were backed up by the top five in the standings, from three

different teams, being separated by 10 minutes and 39 seconds.

Sixth-placed Sebastien Loeb, the nine-times world rally champion driving for Dacia, remained in contention and was within 17 minutes of his leading teammate. Reigning Dakar champion Yazeed al-Rajhi of Saudi Arabia withdrew last week.

ers by 10 seconds with American Honda rider Ricky Brabec third and four minutes 47 seconds off the pace. "These last two stages were a little bit faster and in these conditions I feel really good, I can read the roadbook super well and take really good decisions," said Benavides.

The Dakar began in 1978 as a race from Paris across the Sahara to the Senegalese capital but switched to South America in 2009 for security reasons.

It moved to Saudi Arabia in 2020. The race is the first round of the World Rally-Raid Championship (W2RC) season.

Top-class horses to feature at Sheikh Joaan Rifle Day

The ten-race card will be run on the turf track at Al Rayyan Racecourse on January 17

Qatar Racing and Equestrian Club (QREC) will organise HE Sheikh Joaan Bin Hamad Al Thani Rifle Day on January 17. The ten-race card will be run on the turf track at Al Rayyan Racecourse, with strong participation from owners, trainers and jockeys, all eager to secure top honours in what is regarded as one of the major fixtures of the current domestic racing season.

The meeting comes just weeks ahead of the highly anticipated HH The Amir Sword Festival, scheduled to take place from February 11-14. For the first time, the prestigious festival will be staged over four days, in a new initiative aimed at further developing the event and reinforcing its position on the international racing calendar in line with the highest global organisational standards.

Saturday's programme comprises ten races over varying distances and categories. The opener is run for the Na'ama Trophy for local Purebred Arabian fillies and mares over 1,750m, offering \$100,000. The following contest is the Desert Rose Cup for local Thoroughbred fillies and mares over the same distance, also valued at \$100,000.

The next event on the programme is the HE Sheikh Joaan Bin Hamad Al Thani Sprint Trophy for Thoroughbreds over 1,200m, with \$50,000 on offer. It is followed by another HE Sheikh Joaan Bin Hamad Al Thani Trophy, restricted to three-year-old Thoroughbreds over 1400m, carrying \$50,000. The mid-card contest is the HE Sheikh Joaan Bin Hamad Al Thani Trophy for local Thoroughbreds over 1,750m, worth \$55,000. A later supporting race is the HE Sheikh Joaan Bin Hamad Al Thani Trophy for Thoroughbreds over 1,400m, offering \$50,000. Attention then turns to the HE Sheikh Joaan Bin Hamad Al Thani Trophy for Purebred Arabians over 1,750m, with \$50,000 available, followed by the HE Sheikh Joaan Bin Hamad Al Thani Trophy for Purebred Arabians restricted to four-year-olds over the same distance, valued at \$100,000.

The penultimate race on the card is an international contest, the HE Sheikh Joaan

The finale, and main event of the meeting, is run for the HE Sheikh Joaan Bin Hamad Al Thani Rifle for Thoroughbreds (Class 1) over 2,200m, carrying \$100,000. Victory in this race secures qualification for the Shalfa race at the HH The Amir Sword Festival next month.

AAFOOR LAST SEASON'S RIFLE WINNER

Last season's renewal of this meeting was staged at Al Uqda Racecourse for the first time, rather than at Al Rayyan as is customary. The feature race, run for the HE Sheikh Joaan Bin Hamad Al Thani Rifle, was won by Aafoor, owned by Al Jeryan Stud, in the Class 1 contest for Thoroughbreds aged four years and above over 2200m. The winner was trained by M H K al-Attiyah and ridden by Szczepan Mazur. Earlier in the programme, Abbes delivered another highlight when the Wathnan Racing runner claimed the HE Sheikh Joaan Bin Hamad Al Thani Trophy for Purebred Arabians, the four-year-old international contest over 2,200m, extending his winning streak in the Group 3 PA race to a third consecutive success under James Doyle for trainer Alban de Mieuille.

Swiatek insists ‘everything is fine’ after back-to-back defeats

Iga Swiatek insists “everything is fine” despite back-to-back losses in the lead-up to the Australian Open, with the world number two “super sore” but confident of recovering for the season-opening Grand Slam.

The Polish star crashed 3-6, 6-0, 6-3 to Switzerland’s Belinda Bencic in the mixed-teams United Cup final in Sydney on Sunday, which came on the back of a lacklustre 6-4, 6-2 defeat to Coco Gauff in the semi-finals.

A shellshocked Swiatek lost seven games in a row against Bencic, including a rare set to love, with a racquet toss and tears at the end of the match summing up her frustration.

It was uncharacteristic for the six-time Grand Slam winner, who rarely loses consecutive matches.

She most recently did so at the WTA Finals in Riyadh in November, falling to Elena Rybakina and Amanda Anisimova. Before that, her previous back-to-back defeats were in 2021.

“Everything is fine,” she said after the final, which Poland won 2-1 courtesy of Katarzyna Kawa and Jan Zielinski clinching the deciding mixed doubles.

“Just super sore. I guess first

“I’ll just get good recovery, couple days off.

“Also I know these team events. I love them but they really take a lot of energy from you. I still need to figure out how to balance that maybe in the future.”

Swiatek, who picked up solid wins over Eva Lys, Suzan Lamens and Maya Joint before meeting Gauff and Bencic, admitted she physically was not in the second set against the Swiss.

“I think it was a mix of me losing the intensity, and I wasn’t feeling so sharp with movements and with my legs. I wasn’t so precise any more physically I would say,” she said.

With the Australian Open starting at Melbourne Park on Sunday, Swiatek has little time to iron out her technical issues after 36 unforced errors to Bencic’s 10 on Sunday. “We’re going to work now to improve some elements that didn’t work this week,” she said.

“Still not a lot of time for that if I also want to have some recovery days. This is how tennis is. You got to go with the flow. We’ll see.”

The Australian Open is the only Grand Slam title to evade the 24-year-old, who has made the semi-finals twice but never gone

further. She lost in the last four in 2025 to eventual champion Madison Keys.

In-form Bencic back in top 10 for first time since having baby

Belinda Bencic powered back into

the top 10 yesterday for the first time since having a baby, with the in-form Swiss brimming with confidence ahead of the Australian Open.

The 28-year-old won all five singles matches at the season-

opening United Cup in Perth and Sydney, including victories over world number two Iga Swiatek and seventh-ranked Jasmine Paolini.

She finished 9-1 for the tournament, with her only defeat coming in the final mixed-doubles de-

cider against Poland on Sunday. It earned Bencic the event’s most valuable player award and propelled her inside the world’s top 10, somewhere she has not been since giving birth to daughter Bella in April 2024. “Of course, a big confidence booster,” she said of her form ahead of the opening Grand Slam of the year in Melbourne, starting on Sunday.

“You start the year, and you’re just trying to get matches in. Obviously it’s been great playing match after match, but being pushed so much from everyone.

“Also super happy to be in the top 10 now. It’s been a huge goal, a huge ride after the whole comeback, to come back and prove this to myself, that it’s possible.”

Bencic was ranked 421 at the start of the 2025 season, but making the last 16 at the Australian Open a year ago convinced her she could return to the upper echelons of tennis.

Titles in Abu Dhabi and Tokyo saw her race up the rankings to finish the season at world number 11, with another crack at an elusive Grand Slam title now her focus.

“I’m always serious about the Australian Open,” said the 2021 Tokyo Olympic gold medalist, who reached a career-high number four in February 2020.

“Just super excited to play the first Slam.”

Canada’s former world No 3 Raonic hangs up his racket

Canada’s former world number three Milos Raonic announced his retirement from tennis at the age of 35 on Sunday after winning eight ATP tour titles and more than \$20 million in prize money over a decade and a half on the circuit.

Notable for a powerful serve which earned him the nickname “Missile”, Raonic’s career peaked in 2016 when he reached the semi-finals of the Australian Open and the final at Wimbledon, losing to Andy Murray in both contests.

“This is a moment you know will come one day, but somehow you never feel ready for it. This is as ready as I will ever be. Tennis has been my love and obsession for most of my life,” Raonic wrote in a post on social media platform X.

“I have been the luckiest person to get to live out and fulfil my dreams. I got to show up every day and focus on just getting better,

seeing where that will take me.”

Born in former Yugoslavia during the violent breakup of the country in the early 1990s, Raonic and his family moved to Canada when he was three.

He turned professional in 2008 and won his first ATP title at the Pacific Coast Championships three years later, beating Fernando Verdasco in the final.

Raonic played in four Masters 1000 finals from 2013-2020 and lost them all, the first at the Canadian Open to Rafa Nadal and the other three to Novak Djokovic.

His loss to Djokovic at the 2020 Cincinnati Masters was his last trip to an ATP final and his last tour-level event was his first-round loss to German Dominik Koepfer at the 2024 Paris Olympics.

“What’s next? I won’t be slowing down,” Raonic added in his social media post.

“There is so much more life to live, and I am as motivated and hungry as I was in 2011, when I broke through on tour.”

Teenage super sub Mbaye could prove decisive for Senegal

Senegal’s 17-year-old **Ibrahim Mbaye** has emerged as a potential future star for African football, and his role as a super substitute at the Africa Cup of Nations could yet prove decisive for his team.

One of a number of exciting new players on display over the last three weeks at the tournament in Morocco, Mbaye has made the biggest impact, featuring in each of Senegal’s matches off the bench.

As they prepare to face Egypt in tomorrow’s semi-final in Tangiers, his impact will be part of the planning as Senegal look to advance to Sunday’s final. His powerful and pacy running, dribbling skills, and a sharp nose for goal have given Senegal a serious addition to their already much-vaunted attack.

“He’s a gem, and we need to nurture him,” said coach Pape Bouba Thiaw. “We know what he can bring to this team, and we will do everything we can to ensure he thrives and is at his best.”

Mbaye netted in Senegal’s 3-1 win over Sudan in the round of 16, officially becoming, at 17 years, 11 months, and 11 days, the second youngest scorer in tournament history. The youngest is Chiva Nzigou of Gabon, who was allegedly 16 when he scored in the 2000 finals, but has since admitted being an age cheat, although the record is not expunged.

Mbaye won his first cap in November, in a friendly against Brazil, having one month previously played for France’s under-19 team

Mbaye, who turns 18 this month, was close to a goal in Senegal’s second group game against the Democratic Republic of Congo when he was brought on a minute after the Congolese took the lead in Tangiers. Eight minutes later, a surging run down the right led to him firing off a shot that the goalkeeper could not hold, allowing Sadio Mane to equalise.

“He has this spark within him. He’s young, but you don’t notice that on the pitch. Every time he comes on, he brings something

extra,” said Senegal teammate Krepin Diatta. Mbaye won his first cap in November, in a friendly against Brazil, having one month previously played for France’s under-19 team, with Thiaw visiting him at Paris St Germain to persuade him to switch allegiance.

“It was easy to convince the player. Ibrahim wanted to play for Senegal,” said the coach.

They had been tracking him from last season when PSG used him as a starter for their opening match of the Ligue 1 campaign. He was an unused substitute in the Champions League final against Inter Milan in May and this season has started eight times for the French giants, including October’s Champions League win at Barcelona.

Thiaw says the experience of rubbing shoulders with Senegal’s top players will be beneficial for Mbaye.

“He is in a squad where he has the chance to work with players like Sadio Mane, who has won everything and can guide him, like Kalidou Koulibaly and Gana Gueye, who are familiar with the highest level. Now, we need to protect him properly,” added the coach.

Alonso leaves Real Madrid, Arbeloa named as coach

Alonso's tenure marred by poor results and internal discord

Real Madrid said that coach Xabi Alonso has left the Spanish giants by mutual consent, to be replaced by Alvaro Arbeloa. A day after the team lost the Spanish Super Cup final against Barcelona, the club parted ways with the Basque coach eight months after his arrival and immediately appointed former Madrid player Arbeloa, who was coaching the reserve side.

"Real Madrid announces that, by mutual agreement between the club and Xabi Alonso, it has been decided to bring his tenure as first-team coach to an end," said the Los Blancos in a statement.

In a separate statement Madrid then announced Arbeloa would take Alonso's place, without specifying the length of the 42-year-old's contract. "Arbeloa has been the coach of Castilla since June 2025 and has developed his entire coaching career in Real Madrid's academy since 2020," said Los Blancos.

Arbeloa's first match at the helm is a Copa del Rey last-16 visit to face second-tier Albacete tomorrow. The Spaniard played 238 times for Madrid between 2009-2016, winning two Champions League titles and La Liga once, among other silverware.

Arbeloa also lifted the World Cup with Spain in 2010, as well as the European Championship in 2008 and 2012, playing alongside Alonso for club and country. Alonso joined in June, replacing veteran Carlo Ancelotti, but Madrid struggled to find consistency under the Basque coach and are second in La Liga, four points behind Barcelona.

Los Blancos were outplayed in a 3-2 defeat in Saudi Arabia on Sunday by Hansi Flick's side, the 44-year-old's last at the helm. Alonso was close to the sack towards the end of 2025 but a run of five consecutive wins kept him in his position, until the Super Cup defeat.

Alonso had signed a three-season deal at the Bernabeu after leaving German side Bayer Leverkusen, with whom he won the Bundesliga in 2024. Real Madrid were thrashed 4-0 by Paris Saint-Germain in July in the Club World Cup semi-finals, which was an early setback for the coach.

A 5-2 drubbing by Atletico Madrid in September was another blow for Alonso, although it was the team's only league defeat until December. Despite a Clasico win over Barcelona in October, it appeared president Florentino Perez had not fully warmed to Alonso, who had intended to bring a modern coaching ap-

proach to the team. While Ancelotti, who led Madrid to three Champions League wins across two spells in charge, was hailed for his man-management, Alonso was appointed for

his tactical nous. Early on during his time in charge Alonso said the "rock'n'roll" was about to begin, but it never came, with few entertaining attacking displays, despite the superb output of French superstar Kylian Mbappe, La Liga's top scorer.

Madrid struggled through a run of poor form amid an injury crisis, losing at home against Celta Vigo, and away at Liverpool in Europe, as well as drawing several domestic games. In that period many of the tactical ideas Alonso had tried to implement, including high pressing, faded away, amid reports some star players had fallen out with him.

Brazilian wingers Vinicius Junior and Rodrygo Goes dropped out of form, going several months without finding the net. Spanish media also said Alonso would be ousted if they failed to beat Manchester City in the Champions League in December.

Madrid lost against Pep Guardiola's side but the performance enough of an improvement that Alonso was given more time to try and save his job. However, the defeat by Barca in Jeddah was the final straw for Madrid, who agreed a deal with Alonso for him to depart.

Barca's Flick hails 'unbelievable' Raphinha mentality

Barcelona coach Hansi Flick commended Raphinha's mindset after the forward struck twice to help his team beat Real Madrid and retain the Spanish Super Cup on Sunday.

The Brazilian winger has seven goals in his last five matches, including a brace in the 3-2 win over Los Blancos in Saudi Arabia. Raphinha was out injured for around two months as Barca's form dipped in October and November, but has come back strongly. "His mentality is unbelievable, his dynamic affects the whole team," Flick told reporters.

Raphinha missed a fine chance in the first half but almost immediately fired Barca into the lead in Jeddah. Then with the score tied at 2-2, the 29-year-old struck the winner from outside the area, with the help of a deflection.

"He missed the first chance but the second one, he was there and (scored) the first goal, and it gave the team more confidence," continued Flick. "This is what Raphinha brings on the pitch, it's a lot of intensity and we need this."

Barca won the Spanish Super Cup against Real Madrid last season on their way to claiming a domestic treble. Flick said he hoped the victory would help the La Liga leaders achieve their other ambitions this season.

"We are in a good mood, we have a lot of confidence now," said Flick,

after Barca's 10th consecutive victory across all competitions. "This final was very important for us because against Real Madrid it's always something special. Again we won a final, and this is fantastic."

Flick has won all eight finals he has competed in as a coach, including two last season against Madrid. "When we are focused, we concentrate and play like we did today, I have a really good feeling with the team, because it's important," added Flick.

The coach brought on defender Ronald Araujo in the final stages, after the Uruguayan took a mental health break of around a month.

"To be on the pitch and to win this title means a lot for him," said Flick. "I'm really happy that he's back, and happy that it seems like it's okay - we will support him all ways."

Barcelona striker Lewandowski expressed his happiness after winning the Spanish Super Cup. The Polish striker said: "I am very happy. We have won another title. Beating Real Madrid is always a great feeling. We played well in both halves. The most important thing is that we won."

He added: "Real Madrid played with a very compact defence, and we tried to find spaces to score. We need to be patient. Sometimes they find opportunities through crosses. I am very happy with the win."

Regarding Rafinha's brilliance, he said: "He is always present at the right moments, very dangerous. We won as a team."

French coach and football pundit Courbis dies at 72

Paris: Roland Courbis, a former French player and coach often called in to rescue teams from relegation who became an outspoken media pundit, has died aged 72. Courbis won the French title three times as a player, with Marseille in 1972 and then Monaco in 1978 and 1982.

He spent two years as coach of Marseille during a colourful career in which he coached for more than 500 games in Ligue 1 and went to jail twice over financial issues at his club at the time. Courbis also managed Toulon, Toulouse, Bordeaux and Montpellier, ending his coaching career at Caen in 2019.

By then he had become a well-established media commentator on French radio and television for RMC with an opinionated style that broke the mould in France. France coach Didier Deschamps said French football had lost "an endearing, warm personality with a strong character," a "true enthusiast" who had "chosen to share his passion in recent years, behind a microphone, with a unique way of expressing himself".

Marseille paid tribute to Courbis in a statement calling him "an emblematic coach and a key personality in French football".

SIMEONE APOLOGISES TO VINICIUS AFTER SUPER CUP ROW

Atletico Madrid coach Diego Simeone apologised to Real Madrid winger Vinicius Junior after the pair squared off in the Spanish Super Cup. Simeone bickered with Vinicius both during Atletico's 2-1 semi-final defeat on Thursday and after the Brazilian was substituted.

The Argentine coach also said sorry to Real Madrid president Florentino Perez, after appearing to tell Vinicius that the Los

Blancos chief would kick him out of the club. "I would like to apologise to Mr Florentino and Mr Vinicius for the episode we saw," Simeone told a news conference ahead of Atletico's Copa del Rey last 16 visit to face Deportivo La Coruna today. "It was not good of me to put myself in that position and I accept I didn't do the right thing. Beyond that the team that deserved to win went through, they deserved it."

Vinicius scored a fine solo goal in the Spanish Super Cup final but Madrid lost 3-2 against Barcelona. The winger's contract expires in June 2027 and as of yet he has not agreed a new deal with Real Madrid.

ABERDEEN FAN JAILED FOR THROWING SEAT THAT INJURED PLAYER

An Aberdeen fan who permanently disfigured one of the club's players after throwing

part of a seat was jailed for 18 months.

David Gowans, 32, hurled the object onto the pitch following Aberdeen's 2-1 loss away to Dundee United at Tannadice on May 17 last year.

It struck Aberdeen defender Jack MacKenzie, who was thanking travelling Dons fans for their support in the Scottish Premiership fixture. MacKenzie suffered a deep laceration to his left eyebrow and an abrasion below his eye.

Gowans, who had been a member of the Aberdeen ultras supporters' group, admitted culpable and reckless conduct in October. Gowans was sentenced to 18 months in prison and handed a banning order, barring him from attending football matches for 10 years.

He had already received a lifetime ban from Aberdeen Football Club.

Rosenior plots long Chelsea stay as Arsenal loom in League Cup

New Chelsea boss **Liam Rosenior** said he would love to be at the club for six years or longer as he prepares for a blockbuster League Cup semi-final against Arsenal.

The Englishman, who swapped Strasbourg for Stamford Bridge last week, took charge of his first game on Saturday - a 5-1 FA Cup win at Charlton.

But tomorrow he faces a challenge of a different order when he comes up against Premier League leaders Arsenal in the first leg of the League Cup semi-final.

Rosenior last week replaced Enzo Maresca, who became the fourth permanent manager to leave Chelsea since the American-backed BlueCo consortium took control in May 2022. The Italian won the UEFA Conference League and Club World Cup in his only full season in charge.

Rosenior, who has signed a six-and-a-half year deal with the London club, told his pre-match press conference that he would like



"I'd love to be here for six years and longer," said. "I'd be here as long as possible. But I'm aware in order for that to happen, I need to win. It's as simple as that. I understand every club has a different project. This word project comes out a lot now in football. But the idea in any project is that every game you play, you're trying to win it."

Rosenior said he believed Chelsea were strong enough to make an impact this season. "I've got ideas about what I want the team to look like in a year's time, two years, three years' time," he said. "But I think I've got enough resources and enough tools with me now... I've made that clear to the players. We're going to give it our best shot on Wednesday."

Rosenior was questioned whether the clash at Stamford Bridge would be one of the biggest games of his brief managerial career, which included a spell at English second-tier club Hull before his time at Strasbourg. "I don't see it that way," he said. "I think every session that I take, every meeting that I take, every game that we play is the most important thing. I live in the now. So it is the most important game because it's the next one. I mean that. If you start to prioritise games or think something's more important than the other, then you're not focused."

Newcastle take on Manchester City in the other League Cup semi-final, with the final taking place at Wembley on March 22.

Guardiola downplays trophy talk as he focuses on Man City growth

London: Pep Guardiola says he cares more about how Manchester City "grow up" than winning trophies as he prepares his side for the first leg of their League Cup semi-final away to Newcastle today. City ended last season without a major trophy for the first time in eight years, though they did lift the Community Shield at

the start of the campaign, beating Manchester United on penalties. Guardiola, asked at his pre-match press conference if he felt extra pressure after missing out on the big prizes last season, insisted he was not focused on silverware. "It's not about winning or not winning trophies, it's about how the team grows up, how the team is

better," the City manager said. City won the League Cup for four seasons in a row from 2018, with the competition proving a launchpad for a decade of domination under Guardiola. Last season they were dethroned as Premier League champions by Liverpool and they trail leaders Arsenal by six points in the current campaign.
