Environment minister opens Qatari National Center for Houbara Breeding in Algeria



HE the Minister of Environment and Climate Change Dr Abdullah bin Abdulaziz bin Turki al-Subaie inaugurated the Qatari National Center for Houbara Breeding in El Bayadh Province in Algeria, as part of bilateral co-operation between the countries and in support of joint efforts to protect biodiversity and conserve endangered species.

The inauguration ceremony was attended by the Algerian Minister of Environment and Quality of Life Kaouter Krikou, Qatar's ambassador to Algeria Abdalaziz Ali al-Naami and the Governor of El Bayadh Province Noureddine Belarbi.

The centre is considered one of the main pillars of the sustainable breeding and release programme for the houbara birds. It operates under the supervision of the Qatar External Nature Reserves Office - Houbara Breeding Programme, implementing an integrated annual programme for the production and release of African houbara birds, in accordance with a carefully designed plan aimed at supporting their populations in natural habitats.

In this regard, HE Dr al-Subaie stated, in a speech delivered during the inauguration ceremony, that the opening of the centre represents the fruit of constructive environmental co-operation between Qatar and Algeria, and reflects the depth of the fraternal re-

lations between the countries and their keenness to co-ordinate efforts to confront shared environmental challenges.

His Excellency explained that this environmental project comes within the framework of Qatar's commitment to supporting international efforts aimed at protecting endangered species, foremost among them the houbara, given its environmental and cultural value, adding that this aligns with the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy 2024-2030 through the implementation of specialised programmes for breeding, rehabilitation, and release.

He further noted that since the start of the project's implementation, efforts have been made to involve Algerian national expertise in all stages of management and operation, with the aim of enhancing the sustainability of joint environmental action between the countries, noting that the centre represents an effective initiative that contributes to the protection of biodiversity and supports sustainable development goals at both the regional and international levels.

Director of the Qatar External Nature Reserves Office Mohammed bin Nahar al-Nuaimi explained that, within the framework of the breeding and release programme, the Office carried out, during the preparation and pilot operation phases of the project, the transfer and release of 2,000 African houbara birds in 2023, 2,000 birds in 2024, and 2,000 birds in 2025, bringing the total number of birds produced and released to 6,000.

Al-Nuaimi noted that the programme allocates 1,500 birds annually for release into the natural environment across several provinces in Algeria, with the aim of strengthening natural populations, while 500 birds per year will be incorporated into the production and breeding programme.

He added that the Office continues to implement houbara production and breeding programmes through the establishment and operation of a number of specialised centres inside and outside Qatar. This is in addition to efforts to establish new centres in several countries, while adhering to approved scientific and technical standards in the management of these centres, in co-operation with international entities and expertise specialised in environmental conservation and biodiversity protection. New dialogue platform 'Sada' empowers people with disabilities

Stories, not speeches, took centre stage as 'Sada,' a new national dialogue platform, turned inclusion into action, giving people with disabilities visibility, dignity and real economic opportunities.

Launched on Monday (January 19) by Best Buddies Qatar under the umbrella of Al-Shafallah Centre for Persons with Disabilities, 'Sada' was introduced as a national platform designed to empower people with disabilities through storytelling, dialogue and tangible opportunity.

"It is a national platform that cares about the empowerment of people with disabilities," said Aida al-Sheerawi, media spokesperson for Al-Shafallah Centre, told *Gulf Times* on the sidelines of the event. "But more than that, it is a very humane initiative – one that recognises abilities before limitations."

Supported by Qatar National Bank and Msheireb Properties, the event brought together speakers and decision-makers from government and the private sector, underlining that inclusion is a shared national responsibility.

At the heart of 'Sada' was a clear message: empowerment must go beyond awareness.

"One of the most important goals of this platform is helping people with disabilities find suitable jobs and integrate fully into society," al-Sheerawi said. "It is about recognising their skills, their communication abilities and their professional potential."

That message became reality during the event through the launch of the Mobile Wall of Opportunities – a travelling platform showcasing CVs of job-seeking people with disabilities and connecting them directly with employers.

"The wall represents a personal legacy for each participant," al-Sheerawi explained. "It will move across the country so institutions and companies can see their professional skills and adopt their talents."

One of the most emotional mo-



ments of the event centred on Abdulaziz al-Suwaidei, a May 2025 graduate of Al-Shafallah Centre, who spoke openly about the challenges he faced in securing employment.

"Despite interviews and promises, he faced many obstacles," al-Sheerawi said. "Through this platform, he finally found real interest."

At the event, Doha Bank offered al-Suwaidei a job, making him the first individual to receive a 'Hired' badge on the Wall of Opportunities.

"This moment showed exactly why 'Sada' exists," she added. "It turned hope into action."

The initiative also aligns closely with Law No. 25 of 2025 concerning persons with disabilities, issued by His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani.

"This is not charity, it is a right," al-Sheerawi stressed. "People with disabilities have the right to live with dignity, independence and equal access to employment – economically, socially and culturally."

By bringing decision-makers into the room, organisers said the platform aims to ensure national

legislation translates into lived reality. 'Sada' placed people with disabilities at the centre of the experience, not only as speakers, but as creators and contributors.

Six individuals shared personal stories alongside family members and friends, while event gifts were designed and produced by Best Buddies members themselves, highlighting the message of productivity and capability.

"Participation is empowerment," al-Sheerawi said. "True inclusion happens when people are part of decision-making, not symbolic representation."

The event concluded with the announcement of a global interactive artwork, created using artificial intelligence and responses from Best Buddies programmes in more than 50 countries.

Participants answered a single question: What does inclusion mean to you? Their words were transformed into one collective digital artwork – built not on data, but emotion. "It showed that inclusion is not only a local commitment," organisers said, "but a global responsibility."

Al-Sheerawi revealed ongoing collaboration with the Ministry of Public Health to simplify training and accreditation pathways for people with intellectual disabilities, particularly in the food and beverage sector.

"This is only the beginning. We want every person with a disability in Qatar to have the opportunity to live with dignity and contribute meaningfully to society," she said.

Qatar slams Kabul bombing

Ministry calls upon high-risk category to get RSV vaccine

The Ministry of Public Health (MoPH) urged those most at risk to receive the Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) Vaccine, which is currently available at Hamad Medical Corporation (HMC) hospitals and primary healthcare centres.

This comes as part of the ministry's commitment to protecting the community from infectious diseases and limiting their spread, in addition to updating preventive policies and guidelines in line with the latest scientific developments, including developing health regulations, updating recommendations and incorporating the latest internationally approved vaccines within the national vaccination programme.

The ministry confirmed that the RSV vac-

cine has been approved by international health organisations, due to its high effectiveness in preventing the virus and its complications, especially among high-risk groups.

The vaccine is also characterised by a high level of safety and limited side effects.

It has been included in the national vaccination schedule as a recommended vaccine in Qatar and many countries around the world.

The MoPH explained that the groups most at risk of contracting the virus and who are strongly advised to get vaccinated include pregnant women to ensure the protection of both mother and infant at 28-36 weeks of pregnancy, people aged 60 and over, people between the ages of 18 and 59 with chronic diseases such as heart, lung, diabetes, and

kidneys diseases, and people with weak immune system due to medications or diseases that weaken immunity.

The MoPH urged all target groups, especially pregnant women, to get vaccinated as soon as possible to protect themselves and their infants, noting that the vaccine provides high protection for up to two years.

RSV is a common virus that causes symptoms similar to the common cold.

Still, it can lead to severe lower respiratory tract infections, particularly in infants, the elderly, pregnant women, and those with chronic diseases.

Global statistics indicate that this virus causes more than 100,000 deaths annually worldwide, in addition to 3.6mn hospitalisations.

On Gaza, the premier said that implementing ceasefire arrangements and humanitarian measures was only a first step, warning that without a clear political horizon and reconstruction plan, the risk of renewed escalation would remain high.

He underscored the need for unimpeded humanitarian access and the rapid delivery of aid to civilians, describing the situation on the ground as unsustainable.

The prime minister noted that Qatar was working closely with international partners, including the US, Egypt and Turkiye, to support post-conflict govern-

ance arrangements in Gaza, with a focus on enabling a technocratic administration to restore basic services and stabilise daily life for residents.

Addressing wider regional dynamics, he called for a rethinking of the Middle East's security architecture, saying that long-term stability required confidence-building measures and mechanisms that reduce threat perceptions among neighbouring states.

He said dialogue remained the only viable path to preventing further fragmentation in the region.

The prime minister also touched on Syria, noting that more than a decade of conflict had severely weakened state institutions and social cohesion, making re-

construction contingent on inclusive governance and sustained international engagement.

In remarks linked to global geopolitics, the premier reiterated Doha's position that de-escalation and communication were essential in managing tensions involving Iran and other regional actors, warning that miscalculation could have far-reaching consequences.

The Davos discussion reinforced Qatar's longstanding role as a mediator in regional and international conflicts, with the prime minister emphasising that small and medium-sized states could play a constructive role by facilitating dialogue and humanitarian coordination rather than pursuing zero-sum strategies.

Qatar's participation, he said, demonstrates its sustained contribution to global efforts to end the war in Gaza.

"Qatar is not an isolated actor," he said. "Its involvement forms part of a global effort to support the Palestinian people."

Decisions concerning Doha's participation in the Gaza Peace Council announced by the White House, he added, will be made collectively with partners, not unilaterally.

Al-Ansari clarified that the Gaza Peace Council, Executive Council, and Technocratic Committee were estab-

lished through international consensus led by the US – not through unilateral Qatari initiative.

He said these entities form the core of the ceasefire's second phase, urging Israel to honour its commitments and allow their work to proceed.

Al-Ansari acknowledged obstacles such as ceasefire breaches and restrictions on the entry of administrative teams into Gaza, but said these challenges are being addressed through ongoing mediation within the framework of the Trump plan.

Addressing Israel's obstruction of the UN Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA),

he warned that hindering the agency's operations worsens humanitarian suffering and undermines multilateral cooperation.

Qatar, al-Ansari confirmed, continues to provide all support to the UNRWA and calls on global partners to do the same.

Turning to broader regional tensions, particularly between the US and Iran, al-Ansari said any escalation could have grave regional consequences, as seen in previous years.

He reaffirmed Qatar's commitment to diplomacy, noting that communication with both Washington and Tehran remains "close and constructive".

He said the region had avoided escalation "thanks to the responsible stance of the US", while Qatar continues to maintain open channels.

Al-Ansari revealed that HE the Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman bin Jassim al-Thani has been in direct contact with Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi, US officials, and regional leaders, pushing for dialogue and restraint.

"The focus should not be on who convinced whom," he said of reports about a possible US strike on Iran. "What matters is that reason prevailed."

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

Inclusion takes centre stage at Al Dash Cup tournament

At the Education City Stadium, Al Dasha Cup turned football into a powerful statement on inclusion, confidence and possibility, as children of all abilities competed on one of Qatar's grandest stages.

For the children taking part, the tournament became a defining moment where confidence, belonging and ambition mattered as much as the final score.

Organised through Qatar Foundation (QF)'s Ability Friendly Programme, the event brought together children with disabilities and special needs, offering them the opportunity to compete in a world class sporting venue and, more importantly, to be seen first as athletes.

"This tournament is all about building players' confidence to compete. What they learn through competition is how to win and how to lose and those are life skills, not just sporting ones," said Kathleen Bates, head of Ability Friendly at the QF.

For Bates, the value of Al Dasha Cup runs deeper than performance on the pitch.

"They're learning how to work as a team, how to win as a team, how to lose as a team and good sportsmanship overall," she said. "Those are three very important things we're taking away from this tournament."

The competition forms part of

a natural progression within the Ability Friendly Programme, which has spent more than eight years expanding access to sport for people with disabilities.

"We've provided many opportunities to learn sport and advance in sport. Competition is a very natural pathway. This is where they take what they've learned and show it off," Bates explained.

Playing inside Education City Stadium added a layer of meaning.

"You get a chance to have some glory on you," she said. "You're playing in a beautiful stadium, with a real competitive feel."

The transformation among players was visible on and off the field.

"This is a tremendous boost to their confidence," Bates said. "We've had people scoring goals and people cheering for them and they're so proud."

She noted that the impact extends beyond the players themselves. "It's incredibly motivating for their families and support groups to keep bringing them to sessions and to keep pushing them to develop their athletic abilities."

Perhaps most significantly, the tournament allows participants to redefine how they see themselves.

"They can go back to school or work as a footballer, not somebody with a disability," she said. "Sports is such a unifier. That sense of camaraderie and companionship is so important."

Ryan Moignard, a senior supervisor with the Ability Friendly Programme, described Al Dasha Cup as both a sporting and a cultural event.

"This event is deeply rooted in culture," he said. "The idea around inclusion is that everyone is involved, of all abilities."

The tournament welcomed players of different ages and genders, but its core focus remained clear.

"Every child taking part over these days is a disabled child or a special needs child," Moignard said. "This platform gives them a pathway to develop their skills and improve everything they've achieved so far."

For Moignard, one of the most powerful aspects of the event is its setting.

"They're playing in one of the few World Cup stadiums in the world," he said. "Previously, children with disabilities might not have had that opportunity. Now, they're playing where their icons once played."

Addressing families' hesitation, Moignard stressed the importance of understanding and adaptation.

"It's about learning what sup-

ports each child best," he said. "We build personal profiles, understand triggers and strengths and adapt sessions accordingly."

Small-group environments help build more than just technical skills. "They develop social circles, self-esteem and self-confidence," he said. "That improves overall wellbeing and it comes from close collaboration with families."

Both Bates and Moignard see the programme as part of a broader shift in Qatar towards inclusion.

"The country is evolving and becoming more accessible," Bates said. "There's a huge demand and we hear it from families every day."

Moignard's message to the public was simple and direct.

"We can all achieve our dreams," he said. "Many of these children were once told they wouldn't play football. The evidence is here. They're competing, and they're achieving."

As the final whistle blew at Education City Stadium, Al Dasha Cup left behind more than memories.

It left proof that when opportunity meets belief, inclusion becomes not an idea but a lived reality.

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Qatar slams Israel's commencement of demolition operations at UNRWA site

Qatar strongly condemned the Israeli occupation authorities' commencement, with the participation of the Israeli minister of national security, of demolition operations inside the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA) complex in occupied Jerusalem, considering it a blatant violation of international humanitarian law and a flagrant challenge to the international will.

In a statement yesterday, Qatar's Ministry of Foreign Affairs warned that Israel's systematic targeting of the UNRWA ultimately aims to elimi-

nate it and deprive millions of Palestinians in the Gaza Strip, the West Bank, Jordan, Syria and Lebanon of its essential services, stressing the need for the international community to assume its responsibilities and firmly confront illegal Israeli measures to avoid their catastrophic consequences.

The ministry reiterated the Qatar's full support for the UNRWA, based on its firm stance in support of the legitimate rights of the Palestinian people, particularly their right to establish their independent state on the 1967 borders, with East Jerusalem as its capital. - QNA

Katara opens registration for inaugural 'Noorani Qaida' course for women

Big Piph presents hip-hop in Doha as a language of storytelling and cultural connection

US hip-hop artist Big Piph used performance and conversation in Doha to show how hip-hop's storytelling roots can build understanding, empower communities, and connect cultures through shared human experience. Hip-hop, often framed purely as a musical genre, was presented instead as a cultural language of listening and storytelling during a workshop-performance led by Big Piph at the Music Lab in Doha yesterday. Blending live performance with open discussion, he explored how hip-hop's foundations in rhythm, narrative and social expression allow it to travel across borders while remaining deeply personal.

In a diverse setting such as Qatar, he stressed that cultural exchange must begin with humility.

"For me, cultural exchange is always about listening and learning first," Big Piph said. "You should never go to a place thinking that what you've learned is what everybody else does. You come in, listen, learn about people individually, and understand the culture as a whole."

He explained that hip-hop does not arrive as a fixed formula.

Instead, it adapts to the communities it encounters. "If artists in a place have already been experiencing hip hop, then it's about building from there. If not, it's about starting from the foundation. The first thing is always listening and learning."

Central to his approach is storytelling drawn from lived experience.

Yet Big Piph is clear that his work is not driven by a desire to instruct or motivate. "I don't sit down thinking, 'Let me inspire others! I'm just trying to write my life and story as honestly as possible and hope other people find parts of it relatable."

That honesty, he believes, is what allows hip-hop to resonate across cultures. Through workshops and performances in educational and community settings worldwide, he has observed how perceptions of the art form can shift.

"In places where people don't know much about hip hop, they often see it as something completely different from themselves," he said. "But when they learn where it came from, and understand that it's not just music but a culture that can overlap with their own experiences, their perspective changes."

The most powerful moments, he added, come when that realisation takes hold. "The biggest surprise is seeing people realise they actually have access to hip hop, even when they didn't think they did. It expands their understanding beyond just a music genre and helps them see hip hop as

a form of community and empowerment." By reframing hip hop as a shared cultural practice rather than a distant art form, Big Piph's session highlighted how storytelling, empathy and openness can turn creativity into connection, and performance into meaningful dialogue.



AZF to hold meeting with Qatar's Strongest Man 2026 qualifiers

The organising committee of Qatar's Strongest Man 2026 Championship, held in its first edition of the GCC Challenge, is preparing to organise a technical meeting with 11 competitors who have qualified for the final stage of the competition.

Culture ministry taking part in 57th Cairo International Book Fair



He also conducted a television production and presentation course at the Center on May 19, 2024, in collaboration with the Media Development Department.

The late author earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Arabic Language from Beirut Arab University in 1976, followed by a master's degree in educational media from the State University of New York at Buffalo in the United States in 1983, and a PhD in Journalism from the University of Wales in the United Kingdom in 1989.

He began his career as a broadcaster at Qatar Television in 1972, progressing through several positions, including head of the Script and Translation Unit, and then head of the News Department in 1976.

Dr al-Hamadi also served as director of media affairs for the Gulf Co-operation Council from 1993-1999 and worked as an adviser to the National Council for Culture, Arts and Heritage.

On the academic front, he served as an associate professor of media studies at Qatar University from 1983-2004, and then as an associate professor at the Community College in 2014.

The journalist was among the first to write for the Qatari press, starting with *Al-Urouba* magazine.

Dr al-Hamadi continued his journalistic writing from 1970 onwards, leaving behind a rich literary and cultural legacy that includes six

novels, four short story collections, and approximately 30 books in the fields of culture, literature, and media.

UAE president accepts US invite to join 'Board of Peace'

The UAE's president has accepted an invitation to join US President Donald Trump's "Board of Peace", the foreign ministry said yesterday, the body meant to oversee post-war reconstruction in Gaza. "Sheikh Mohamed bin Zayed al-Nahyan, President of the United Arab Emirates, has accepted the invitation from the US to join the Board of Peace," the ministry said in a statement. Emirati Foreign Minister Abdullah bin Zayed said: "The UAE's decision reflects the importance of fully implementing President Donald J Trump's 20-point peace plan for Gaza, which is critical for the realisation of the legitimate rights of the Palestinian people." - AFP

King Salman chairs cabinet meeting: Saudi state TV

Saudi Arabia's 90-year-old King Salman chaired in person a cabinet meeting yesterday, Saudi state TV reported, days after he left hospital where he was undergoing medical tests. King Salman went to a hospital in Riyadh on Friday for the medical tests and left on the same day. Saudi TV published a video dated January 20 that showed the king chairing the cabinet and reading files with his ministers. The state news agency said that in the meeting King Salman had welcomed US President Donald Trump's "Board of Peace" initiative, which aims initially to end the conflict in Gaza but could then be expanded to tackle conflicts elsewhere. - Reuters

Togo expels ex-Burkina Faso leader after coup plot claim

Togo has arrested and expelled Burkina Faso's former president to his home country after officials there accused him of attempting a coup, two sources said. Paul-Henri Damiba came to power in 2022 after a coup against Burkina Faso's civilian government, which had lost support over rising violence. Damiba's failure to stop the militant groups angered the ranks of the armed forces in the country, and he was ousted in a coup later that same year by Ibrahim Traore, who continues to head the government. Earlier this month, Burkina Faso announced it had disrupted a plot to kill Traore allegedly orchestrated by Damiba. - AFP

31 civilians killed in militant attack in Niger

An armed attack has killed at least 31 civilians in western Niger near the borders with Burkina Faso and Mali, local sources said yesterday. The assailants struck on Sunday in a village lying in the Tillaberi region, located in the so-called tri-border area - a flashpoint zone where the frontiers of Niger, Burkina Faso and Mali converge. Militants linked to Al Qaeda and the Islamic State group have made the region a fiefdom. "On Sunday, armed individuals killed 31 of our residents in Bosie; 30 died on the spot, and one of the five wounded succumbed at a health centre," a resident said. - AFP

Israel bulldozes UNRWA buildings in occupied East Jerusalem

Israel demolished structures inside the UN Palestinian refugee agency's East Jerusalem compound yesterday after seizing the site last year, in an act condemned by the agency as a violation of international law.

Surrounded by Israeli forces, bulldozers razed several large buildings and other smaller structures inside the United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA) compound, where dozens of agency staff once worked.

UNRWA, which Israeli authorities accuse of bias, has not used the building since the start of last year after Israel ordered it to vacate all its premises and cease its operations.

UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres condemned Israel's action yesterday.

"The secretary-general urges the government of Israel to immediately cease the demolition of the UNRWA Sheikh Jarrah compound, and to return and restore the compound and other UNRWA premises to the United Nations without delay," deputy UN spokesperson Farhan Haq told reporters.

A spokesperson for UNRWA, Jonathan Fowler, said Israeli forces

entered the compound around 7am (0500GMT), forced out the compound's security guards and then brought in bulldozers to begin demolishing buildings inside.

UNRWA chief Philippe Lazzarini condemned the demolition in a statement on X, calling it "a new level of open and deliberate defiance of international law".

He said it was the latest in a series of Israeli actions against UNRWA, including a raid on a medical clinic this month and a plan to cut power and water to UNRWA facilities in the coming weeks.

Some former UNRWA staff said the structures demolished yesterday had been used to store aid for the Israeli-occupied West Bank and the Gaza Strip.

"The destruction by the Israeli occupation is another message to the world that Israel is the only country that can demolish international law and get away with it," said Hakam Shalwan, former UNRWA chief of staff in East Jerusalem.

Israel's parliament passed a law in October 2024 banning the agency from operating in the country and prohibiting officials from having contact with the agency.

Israel's far-right National Security Minister Itamar Ben-Gvir posted a video on social media standing in front of the UNRWA compound as a

bulldozer began to tear it down.

In his statement, Lazzarini said that Israel had conducted "a large-scale disinformation campaign" against UNRWA.

Israel's Jerusalem municipality raided the compound last year, saying UNRWA had failed to pay property taxes after multiple warnings.

UNRWA said the agency had no debts to the municipality.

Meanwhile, Palestinian officials and civil institutions yesterday called out the takeover of the UNRWA premises by the Israeli occupation.

In a statement, the institutions slammed the razing operations carried out by Israeli bulldozers at the main UNRWA building.

The statement deemed the razing and raiding operations, as well as the displaying of Israeli might, as a move intended to eliminate the agency's operations and the right of Palestinian refugees to return under UN Resolution 194.

These operations are part of the ongoing episodes by the Israeli occupation targeting Palestinian tents in the northern West Bank, the statement acknowledged.

It called on the world to spring into action to halt these crimes and amplify the voice of the UN, which founded the agency and has been operating under its umbrella for 77 years.

Baby dies from cold in Gaza



The family of three-month old Palestinian baby Shatha Abu Jarad, who died of cold weather according to medics, Mohammed Abu Jarad, 42, his wife Hiba, 30, Zeina, 10, twins Zein and Yazid, 3, and Nada, Shatha's twin sister, mourn her death in Gaza City yesterday. Day-to-day living conditions for the vast majority of Gaza residents remain extremely precarious, with more than 80% of infrastructure destroyed, according to the United Nations. Several humanitarian and UN workers said while the situation has improved in some areas since the ceasefire, the humanitarian response remains insufficient due to access restrictions imposed by Israeli authorities. Water and electricity networks, as well as waste management, no longer function.

Powell should not attend Cook case hearing: Bessent

US Treasury Secretary Scott Powell yesterday said it would be a mistake for Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell to attend Supreme Court arguments in a case about President Donald Trump's attempt to fire a central bank governor.

The Supreme Court justices will today consider the legality of Trump's bid to remove Fed Gov-

ernor Lisa Cook, who the courts have allowed to continue serving on the Fed while Trump's attempt to fire her is litigated.

The Associated Press and other media reported on Monday that Powell planned to attend the court's oral arguments, a potent symbol of the administration's ongoing clash with the Fed following US department of justice threats to pursue a criminal investigation of him.

Powell called the threat a "pretext" to pressure him over monetary policy. The effort

to fire Cook over alleged misstatements on mortgage documents has been similarly slammed as cover for administration efforts to either get interest rates lowered or open more seats on the Fed's Board of Governors for Trump to fill.

"I actually think that's a mistake," Bessent said in an interview with CNBC, referring to Powell's plan to attend the hearing. "If you're trying not to politicise the Fed, for the Fed chair to be sitting there, trying to put his thumb on the scale, is a real mistake."

US spending deal to fund 2,500 air traffic controllers

A bipartisan spending deal announced by US lawmakers yesterday provides funding for 2,500 air traffic controllers and \$2.4bn for US passenger railroad Amtrak, while cutting funds for electric vehicle charging and high-speed rail. The congressional funding deal also includes \$514mn to subsidise air services to rural communities, known as the Essential Air Service programme, rejecting a White House proposal to cut the programme by 50%, and boosts annual funding to modernise air traffic control towers by \$824mn.

The budget bill provides \$2mn for an independent study on the airspace in the Washington, DC area after a January 2025 crash between a US army helicopter

and American Airlines passenger jet killed 67 people and exposed significant weaknesses in aviation safety. The Federal Aviation Administration is about 3,500 air traffic controllers short of targeted staffing levels.

Congress last year approved \$12.5bn to modernise the ageing US air traffic control system, but Transportation Secretary Sean Duffy wants another \$19bn to complete the project.

The bill also redirects \$879mn in electric vehicle charging network funds approved under then-president Joe Biden to other infrastructure priorities, and cuts \$928mn in high-speed rail grants.

It also provides \$100mn for supplemental support for transit agencies in the 11 US host cities for the 2026 FIFA World Cup and \$94mn for transportation assistance relating to the 2028 Olympic Games.

Criticism about ICE's use of force appears to have diminished the ability of Republican candidates to pivot away from economic pessimism among voters by stressing the party's traditionally strong standing on crime and security. Democrats could benefit, despite the party's historic weakness on border security issues, if voters decide Trump has moved beyond what they elected him to do, said Nathan Gonzales, editor of analysis firm Inside Elections.

The polling data has raised Republican concerns that souring public views of ICE operations could cloud Trump's success at securing the US-Mexico border. Record numbers of migrants flowed into the US under former

president Joe Biden, a topic Republicans view as a key campaign asset.

But with some Democratic candidates calling for ICE's abolition, Democratic groups are concerned that voters worried about immigration and security could turn against them come November.

Republicans control both the Senate and the House of Representatives but face voter frustration over high prices and the economy in an election cycle that often punishes the ruling party as voters cast ballots for all 435 House seats and 35 of the 100 Senate seats.

"This is kind of a fluid situation that we're in right now that reminds me a bit of where we were after George Floyd, where public opinion moved pretty dramatically," said Amy Walter, editor-in-

chief of the Cook Political Report.

The 2020 police killing of Floyd in Minneapolis spurred nationwide anger that brought about reforms in many US states but also proved to be a political liability for both Republicans and Democrats. Members of the public have expressed outrage over immigration enforcement tactics such as ICE agents wearing masks, zip-tying children and arresting and injuring or killing US citizens. Over the weekend in Minneapolis, a naturalised US citizen said immigration agents with guns drawn broke down his door and dragged him into the snow wearing shorts and Croc shoes. ChongLy Thao, 56, who goes by the name Scott, said he was returned home later without explanation or apology. The department of homeland security has said ICE officers,

whom it oversees, have also faced violence. Analysts say Democrats are in a strong position to gain control of the House and could cut into the 53-47-seat Republican Senate majority, if not seize the chamber outright.

Losing either chamber would hinder Trump's ability to enact his agenda and also would enable congressional investigations into administration policies and actions.

"Is ICE an issue that people care enough to vote on? I don't know," Senate Majority Leader John Thune told reporters last week. The Trump administration is poised to ramp up immigration enforcement this year with funds Congress gave ICE to hire thousands of agents, detain more than 100,000 migrants at any given time and expand surveillance to track down possible immigration

offenders. The push is expected to include more enforcement against employers, a move that could pressure businesses in sectors known to hire workers who are in the US illegally.

In the coming months, ICE's aggressive tactics could undermine Republican support among Latino voters and influence toss-up Senate races in Democratic-leaning states such as Maine and Michigan, Walter said.

Senator Susan Collins of Maine, the most vulnerable of this year's Republican incumbents, criticised what she considered "excessive" ICE tactics, including wearing masks and targeting immigrants without criminal records, which she said have been ordered by Homeland Security Secretary Kristi Noem.

UK unemployment at near five-year high, says official

Britain's unemployment rate remained at 5.1% at the end of last year, official data showed yesterday, as companies trimmed staff amid UK budget uncertainty. The near five-year high rate for the three months to the end of November was unchanged from the quarter ending October 31, the Office for National Statistics said in a statement. The latest unemployment reading, matching analyst expectations, covered the period ahead of the Labour government's budget in late November which saw businesses cut staff ahead of expected tax rises. Yesterday's figures also updated the situation regarding wages. - Reuters

UK minister 'not minded' to intervene in *Telegraph* sale

British Culture Minister Lisa Nandy yesterday said she was "not minded" to intervene in the sale of the *Telegraph* newspaper for £500m to *Daily Mail* owner DMGT. The *Telegraph* has been in limbo since 2023 when RedBird IMI - a joint venture between US-based RedBird Capital and Abu Dhabi's International Media Investments - tried to buy it, but it was unable to take control when Britain limited foreign ownership of newspapers. "It is important to note that I have not taken a final decision on intervention at this stage," Nandy said adding her 'minded to' letter allowed parties to respond by January 26. - Reuters

Shark bites surfer in Australian state's fourth attack in 48 hours

Swimmers and surfers were yesterday warned to steer clear of beaches in parts of eastern Australia after four shark attacks in the space of 48 hours. Heavy rains stirring up murky waters have been blamed for the unusual spate of attacks in the state of New South Wales. Surf Life Saving New South Wales said the turbid waters were ideal for bull sharks, urging people to stick to the pool. "We have such poor water quality that's conducive to bull shark activity," the water safety body said. "Just go to a local pool, because at this stage, we're advising that the beaches are unsafe."

Indonesia revokes permits of many firms after deadly floods

Indonesia stripped more than two dozen permits from forestry, mining and hydroelectric companies in Sumatra yesterday, a government minister said, just weeks after deadly floods devastated parts of the island. Environmentalists, experts and the government said deforestation played a role in last year's disaster that killed more than 1,000 people across three provinces on the island, according to a National Disaster Mitigation Agency tally. A task force audited companies in the three provinces and presented its findings to President Prabowo Subianto during a teleconference on Monday. - AFP

Australia passes tougher laws on guns, hate crimes

Australia has enacted new laws for a national gun buyback, tighter background checks for gun licences and a crackdown on hate crimes in response to the country's worst mass shooting in decades last month.

Two bills for stricter gun control and anti-hate measures passed the House of Representatives and Senate late yesterday during a special sitting of parliament.

The gun control laws passed with the support of the Greens party despite opposition from the opposition conservative Liberal-National coalition.

The anti-hate laws passed with support from the Liberal party.

Introducing the gun reforms, Home Affairs Minister Tony Burke said individuals with "hate in their hearts and guns in their hands" carried out the December 14 attack at the famed Bondi Beach that killed 15 people.

"The tragic events at Bondi demand a comprehensive response from government," Burke said. "As a government we must do everything we can to counter both the motivation and the method." The father and son gunmen allegedly behind the attack on used powerful firearms that were legally obtained, despite the son being previously examined by Australia's spy agency.

Prime Minister Anthony Al-

banese recalled parliament early from its summer break for this week's special two-day session to toughen curbs after a shooting that shocked the nation and prompted calls for more action on gun control.

The proposed gun control measures enable the largest national buyback scheme since a similar campaign after a 1996 massacre in Tasmania's Port Arthur, in which a lone gunman killed 35 people.

They also toughen firearm import laws as well as background checks for firearm licences issued by Australian states, making use of information from the Australian Security Intelligence Organisation.

Australia had a record 4.1mn firearms last year, the government said on Sunday, with more than 1.1mn of those in New South Wales, its most populous state and the site of the Bondi attack.

"The sheer number of firearms currently circulating within the Australian community is unsustainable," Burke said. The bill passed without the support of the opposition coalition, with a vote of 96-45 in the lower house, and 38-26 in the senate.

"This bill reveals the contempt the government has for the million gun owners of Australia," said shadow attorney-general Andrew Wallace of the Liberals. "The prime minister has failed to recognise that guns are tools of trade for many Australians."

A second bill steps up penalties for hate crimes, such as jail terms

up to 12 years when a religious official or preacher is involved, and allows bans on groups deemed to spread hate. The bill, which also provides new powers to cancel or refuse visas for those who spread hate, passed the lower house by a 116-7 margin and the senate 38-22.

It won support from Liberal party lawmakers after ruling Labor struck a deal to include changes such as a requirement the government consult the opposition leader on the listing and delisting of extremist organisations.

The Liberals' coalition partners abstained from the vote and the Greens opposed it, arguing it would have a "chilling effect" on political debate and protest.

"This bill targets those that support violence, in particular violence targeted at a person because of their immutable attributes," said attorney-general Michelle Rowland. Such conduct is not only criminal but sows the seed of extremism leading to terrorism, she added.

Police say the alleged Bondi gunman were inspired by the Islamic State group. The measures were originally planned for a single bill, but backlash from both the coalition and the Greens forced the government to split the package and drop provisions for an offence of racial vilification.

In its own reforms, New South Wales limits individuals to possession of four guns, and beefs up the power of police to curb protests during designated terrorist attacks.

UK approves China plan for mega embassy

Britain's government yesterday gave approval for China to build its largest embassy in Europe in London, hoping to improve ties with Beijing despite British and US politicians' warnings that it could be used as a base for spying.

China's plans to build a new embassy on the site of the two-century-old Royal Mint Court near the Tower of London have stalled for three years over opposition

from local residents, lawmakers and Hong Kong pro-democracy campaigners in Britain.

The decision was announced before an expected visit to China by Prime Minister Keir Starmer this month, the first by a British leader since 2018. Some British and Chinese officials said the trip was dependent on the embassy being approved.

Despite security concerns, Britain's intelligence agencies, which were involved in the approval process, said any threat could be mitigated.

"National security is our first

duty," a government spokesperson said in a statement.

But the years-long process might not quite have reached its end. Local residents said they would seek a legal challenge, saying the decision would be unlawful if British officials privately gave China assurances the project would be approved before the planning process had been completed. The Chinese government purchased Royal Mint Court in 2018 but its requests for planning permission to build a new embassy on the site were rejected by the local council in 2022.

BJP elects youngest-ever president

Prime Minister Narendra Modi's Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) yesterday chose a little-known legislator from India's poorest state as the party's youngest president, a generational shift in the effort to retain young voters. Nitin Nabin, 45, takes over from outgoing president J P Nadda, 65, months before key state elections, one of them in the eastern state of West Bengal, which the BJP has never won and is strongly focused on. A five-time lawmaker from the eastern state of Bihar, Nabin was elected unopposed as the party's 12th president after Modi and other leaders proposed him. Hundreds of workers watched at party headquarters in New Delhi as Nabin took the oath of office before Modi and four past presidents. "When it comes to the party, I am a worker and he is my boss," Modi, 75, said in his remarks, pointing to Nabin, who will serve a three-year term.

North Korea's Kim sacks vice-premier

North Korean leader Kim Jong-un has fired his vice-premier, compared him to a goat and railed against "incompetent" officials, state media said yesterday, in a rare and very public broadside against apparatchiks at the opening of a critical factory.

Vice-Premier Yang Sung-ho was sacked "on the spot", the state-run Korean Central News Agency (KCNA) said, in a speech in which Kim attacked "irresponsible, rude and incompetent leading officials".

"Please, Comrade Vice-Premier, resign by yourself when you can do it on your own before it is too late," Kim reportedly said.

"He is ineligible for an impor-

tant duty," he added.

"Put simply, it was like hitching a cart to a goat - an accidental mistake in our cadre appointment process," the North Korean leader explained. "After all, it is an ox that pulls a cart, not a goat."

Nuclear-armed North Korea, which is under multiple sets of sanctions over its weapons programmes, has long struggled with its moribund state-managed economy and chronic food shortages.

Kim has been quick to scold lazy officials for alleged mismanagement of economic policy but such a public dismissal is very rare.

Touring the opening of an industrial machinery complex on Monday, Kim blasted cadres who for "too long been accustomed to defeatism, irresponsibility and passiveness".

Beckham family feud erupts as Brooklyn rules out reconciliation

Brooklyn Peltz Beckham, the oldest son of David and Victoria Beckham, accused his "controlling" parents of trying to ruin his marriage and said he did not want to reconcile with them, laying bare his family feud for the first time in public.

Brooklyn, 26, said his parents had placed "countless lies" in the media to preserve the facade of a perfect family when in fact the family's "Brand Beckham" business always came first.

David Beckham, attending the

Davos meeting of global elites yesterday, declined to comment to reporters about Brooklyn's allegations.

Reports of tension between Brooklyn and his parents started soon after he wedded actress Nicola Peltz, the daughter of US billionaire businessman Nelson Peltz, in 2022.

Brooklyn said for years he had made "every effort" to keep the matter private, but he now had no choice but to "tell the truth about only some of the lies that have been published".

He said his parents had been "trying endlessly to ruin my relationship since before my wed-

ding" and had pressurised him to sign away the rights to his name, a step he had refused.

In one of the most damaging accusations, he said his mother, former "Spice Girl" and fashion designer Victoria, had hijacked his first dance with his wife at his wedding.

Brooklyn's post tossed a grenade into "Brand Beckham", the multi-million-pound family business that traces its origin back to his soccer star father making his debut for Manchester United at the age of 17 in 1992.

David Beckham cemented his position in the British establishment last year when he was

awarded a knighthood at the age of 50 for his contribution to sport and charitable causes.

He won six league titles, two FA Cups and the Champions League with the club, before playing for Real Madrid, LA Galaxy, AC Milan and Paris Saint-Germain. He also captained England, winning 115 caps.

His 1999 marriage to Victoria Adams, "Posh Spice" in the Spice Girls, united football with pop music to create "Posh and Becks", a celebrity couple rivalled only by Britain's royals in tabloid appeal.

The couple, who have four children - Brooklyn's younger brothers Romeo and Cruz and sister

Harper Seven - have expanded their brand to encompass sport, fashion, endorsements and media.

Speaking to CNBC at Davos in a general discussion about the risks of social media, David Beckham said he had tried to educate his children about the online world.

"Children are allowed to make mistakes, that's how they learn. So that's what I try to teach my kids," he said. "But you know, you have to sometimes let them make those mistakes as well."

The rift between Brooklyn and his family echoes a split between Britain's Prince Harry and the royal family, with similar accusations of dysfunctional relation-

ships and anonymous briefings to the press.

Harry said last year he would "love reconciliation" with his family. Brooklyn, however, made clear he was not looking to mend any fences.

"I do not want to reconcile with my family. I'm not being controlled, I'm standing up for myself for the first time in my life," he said in his Instagram post.

He said the anxiety he had suffered all his life had disappeared since stepping away from his family. "I wake up every morning grateful for the life I chose, and have found peace and relief," he said.

Climate change: Clear and present danger for global economy

Climate change is real, mostly caused by humans, and is getting worse; it's the long-established consensus in the scientific world. Last year was among the planet's third warmest on record, the World Meteorological Organisation said last week. European Union scientists also confirmed average temperatures have now exceeded 1.5C of global warming for the longest since records began.

The WMO, which consolidates eight climate datasets from around the world, said six of them - including the EU's European Centre for Medium-Range Weather Forecasts (ECMWF) and the British national weather service - had ranked 2025 as the third warmest, while two placed it as the second warmest in the 176-year record.

The US National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration also confirmed in data released last week that 2025 was the third-warmest year in its global temperature record, which dates back to 1850. All eight datasets have confirmed that the last three years were the planet's three hottest since records began, according to the WMO. The warmest year on record was 2024.

Higher temperatures are seen to worsen poverty and inequality.

A 1C increase in temperature causes headcount poverty increases of 0.63–1.18 percentage points, using the daily poverty lines of \$2.15 (corresponding to 8.3% and 15.6% increases), and increases in the Gini inequality index of 1.3–1.9%, according to the *Nature* journal.

These poverty estimates equal a projected increase of global poor by 62.3mn–98.7mn people by 2030 compared with a scenario without climate change. Poorer countries - particularly those in Sub-Saharan Africa - are more vulnerable to climate change, as are countries with higher agriculture shares in the economy, according to the journal.

Governments pledged under the 2015 Paris Agreement to try to avoid exceeding 1.5C of global warming, measured as a decades-long average temperature compared with pre-industrial temperatures. But their failure to reduce greenhouse gas emissions means that the target could now be breached before 2030 - a decade earlier than had been predicted when the Paris accord was signed in 2015, according to ECMWF.

Exceeding the long-term 1.5C limit would lead to more extreme and widespread impacts, including hotter and longer heatwaves, and more powerful storms and floods. Already in 2025, wildfires in Europe produced the highest total emissions on record, while scientific studies confirmed specific weather events were made worse by climate change, including Hurricane Melisa in the Caribbean and monsoon rains in Pakistan, which killed more than 1,000 people in floods.

Despite these worsening impacts, climate science is facing political pushback. US President Donald Trump, who has called climate change "the greatest con job", last week withdrew from dozens of UN entities including the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change.

Environmental concerns are now being de-prioritised in the short term, according to the World Economic Forum's Global Risks Report 2026. All environmental risks also declined in severity score for the two-year time horizon compared with last year's findings.

But in the next 10 years, environmental risks have retained their ranking as the most severe, with extreme weather events identified as the top risk and half of the top 10 risks being environmental in nature, according to the WEF report. Natural disasters caused \$220bn in global economic losses in 2025, according to projections by reinsurer Swiss Re, while Munich Re put the losses around \$224bn.

Despite the proliferation of governments' and companies' climate targets, CO2 emissions remain stubbornly high. Every 1C rise in global temperature is generally estimated to cause a 12% decline in global GDP, while in extreme scenarios - if temperatures rise by 3C by 2100, some studies predict global GDP could plummet by 40% to 50% relative to a world without climate change.

Almost \$200tn of investment is needed by 2050 to reach net-zero emissions, according to a BloombergNEF estimate in 2023.

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
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As US orders fade, Chinese salespeople face tough grind in new markets

China sold more goods to the world than ever in 2025, but export saleswoman Aimee Chen says it was the hardest of her roughly two-decade career. After US President Donald Trump's tariff hikes led to US orders plunging by a third, Chen's pet products company moved to diversify geographies, chasing new and often lower-income markets like South America.

The response mirrored China's official trade policy, which led to a record \$1.2tn surplus for 2025 despite new trade barriers. Reuters interviews with 14 salespeople working on the frontlines of China's export diversification push, however, reveal the costs and caveats behind the rosy headline trade figures.

Four of the salespeople said that orders from the new markets were often smaller in volume and less lucrative than US sales, resulting in lower commissions and pay. Government data show profits at China's industrial firms fell 13.1% year-on-year in November, the fastest pace in over a year.

Many of the employees also described longer working hours as well as greater intensity and uncertainty amid the export boom.

"I'm very anxious," said Chen, adding that she had recently experienced stress symptoms like hair loss and insomnia.

Mingwei Liu, director at the Center for Global Work and Employment at Rutgers

University, said that China's export strategy in alternative markets depended on firms chasing high volumes of cheap orders. Companies that succeed often give clients longer payment cycles and bear higher default risks, he said. "This market reorientation increases the labour intensity, the emotional burden and income uncertainty faced by workers in export sales," Liu said.

China's commerce ministry and human resources ministry, as well as the office which manages the cabinet's media queries, did not respond to requests for comment.

NEW MARKETS, NEW PROBLEMS

China and the US have grown increasingly interconnected since Beijing's 2001 accession to the World Trade Organisation. Their relationship has also become more imbalanced, with their respective economic policies favouring production in the former country and consumption in the latter.

Some American retailers and Chinese producers have said they developed relationships that were so close that they could anticipate each other's needs and red lines, making deals feel almost automatic. Chen, for instance, described her past interactions with US retailers in largely glowing terms. Clients in the world's largest economy were often "easy-going" and signed deals quickly, she said.

By contrast, customers in new markets like to haggle on price, she said.

Chinese shipments to the US fell 20% in 2025, though it remains a top export destination. Shipments rose 25.8% to Africa,

7.4% to Latin America, 13.4% to Southeast Asia and 8.4% to the European Union last year.

While Washington and Beijing have had previous trade disputes, tensions escalated after Trump took office at the start of 2025. He raised tariffs to over 100% in April, before partially reversing and settling for a fragile detente. His re-election sent China's export-oriented industrial complex into a rat race for foreign demand across the world.

Monica Chen, who has been selling auto parts for more than a decade in the eastern Zhejiang province, had long relied on email to keep business going. But with US tariffs in place, she's had to fight harder to win business. That means ramping up business travel to as much as three times a month and cold-calling prospects. "It's very hard to develop new markets, they are basically saturated," said Monica, who isn't related to Aimee Chen.

Her company ultimately responded by cutting prices to undercut other Chinese firms that are also looking for buyers abroad. The firm's orders were down a third in value from 2024, Monica said.

WORK HARDER, EXPECT LESS

With profits falling, companies have placed pressure on their sales agents. Cici Lv, 24, who has sold electric bicycle batteries since 2022 from the southern city of Shenzhen, earns about 5,000 yuan (\$717) per month - not much more than workers in the factories that produce such units.

But while workers' shifts come to an end, Lv said she is constantly on the clock talking to foreign clients.

One of her peers, Rowan Wang, a sales rep for an exporter of agricultural equipment in eastern China, summed up the demands as "if we're alive, we have to reply." Five of the salespeople also described struggles to manage less-affluent clients in markets with which they have little familiarity.

Lv said she traded messages with one client for months, discussing everything from news events to lunch choices and religion. He eventually ordered just one battery, earning Lv a commission of less than \$2. A review of the top 100 most liked export-related posts on social media platform RedNote in the six months to mid-January found 37 that raised complaints about heightened job stress. Another six complained about unprofessional client interactions.

"Sometimes it messes with your mind," said Lv, who said she's fielded relationship proposals.

The hardship described by the sales staff may be an early warning that China's trade diversification success in 2025 could be hard to replicate in the years ahead, said Chen Bo, senior research fellow at the National University of Singapore's East Asian Institute.

Economists have long argued that China has to develop local markets if it wants to end its deflationary cycle. Weak consumption pushes Chinese producers to compete overseas, often against each other, which brings revenue into the economy but erodes profits, Chen said.

China "can't maintain sustainable economic growth by relying on foreign markets," the academic said.

France PM forces part of budget through parliament

French Prime Minister Sébastien Lecornu yesterday rammed part of the 2026 budget through parliament without a vote, exposing himself to a no-confidence motion, after negotiations reached an impasse. Lecornu will have to repeat the measure twice more to enact the full budget into law, facing multiple no-confidence votes tabled by opposition parties. "Things are now at an impasse. The text can no longer be voted on. And we believe France must have a budget," the prime minister told the National Assembly. Lecornu is now counting on the support of the Socialists, a key swing group in the lower chamber, to survive no-confidence votes. - AFP

Spain opposes plan for asylum centres outside EU

Spain opposes a push by some European Union countries to control migration by opening camps for asylum-seekers outside the bloc, calling instead to focus on curbing irregular migration at the source, its interior minister said. Fernando Grande-Marlaska said external processing centres, such as Italy's plan to detain migrants in Albania, were "no magic solution" as they posed significant legal challenges and could strain relationships with third countries. Meanwhile, Spain's strategy of working with transit nations before arrivals occur was proving effective, he said. Irregular arrivals to Spain fell 42% last year - to around 36,000. - AFP

Portuguese police arrest 37 suspected ultra-right militants

Portuguese police yesterday arrested 37 people suspected of belonging to an ultra-right group responsible for hate crimes, with links to similar international groups, in a large operation that involved around 300 officers. "Those detained ... promoted Nazi ideology, inherent to the national-socialist culture and the radical and violent extreme right, acting out of racist and xenophobic motives with the aim of intimidating, persecuting and assaulting ethnic minorities, namely immigrants," the Judicial Police said in a statement. Searches found weapons of different kinds and neo-Nazi propaganda materials. - AFP

Irish skier dies following Swiss avalanche

A 53-year-old Irishman died overnight, Swiss police said yesterday, following injuries sustained in one of several recent deadly avalanches in the Alps. Police in southwest Switzerland's Wallis canton said the avalanche took place on January 13 at an altitude of around 8,628 feet in an off-piste area of Six Noir, above the village of Ovronnaz. Three ski tourists were coming down the east face when the avalanche occurred, sweeping one of the group away. The other two alerted the rescue services and located the missing man via avalanche transceivers, Wallis police said, adding that two rescue helicopters were dispatched. - AFP

Trump calls UK's Chagos deal with Mauritius 'stupid' and 'weak'

US President Donald Trump lambasted Britain's deal to cede sovereignty of the Chagos Archipelago - including an island with an important US-UK air base - as an act of "total weakness" and "great stupidity" that underlines why he wants to acquire Greenland.

Washington last year gave its blessing to the deal, which gave the Indian Ocean islands to Mauritius but retained UK control of the Diego Garcia base under a 99-year lease.

But Trump reversed that with a typically blunt Truth Social post saying: "Shockingly, our 'brilliant' Nato ally, the United Kingdom, is currently planning to give away the Island of Diego Garcia, the site of a vital US Military Base, to Mauritius, and to do so for no reason whatsoever."

He added: "There is no doubt that China and Russia have noticed this act of total weakness ... The UK giving away extremely important land is an act of great stupidity, and is another in a very long line of National Security reasons why Greenland has to be acquired."

Trump's attack heaps new strain on relations with Prime Minister Keir Starmer, who this week spoke out against his ambition to take over Greenland by any means to counter the encroaching presence of rivals China and Russia.

Responding to Trump's Chagos comments, the British government

said the deal was made precisely for national security reasons. "We acted because the base on Diego Garcia was under threat after court decisions undermined our position and would have prevented it operating as intended in future," a spokesperson said.

The Chagos' six main atolls, among more than 600 islands, lie 500km south of the Maldives and halfway between Africa and Indonesia, with about 4,000 people stationed there.

Britain forcibly displaced up to 2,000 indigenous Chagossians in the late 1960s and 1970s to establish the base on the Diego Garcia atoll, but has given sovereignty to former colony Mauritius which it is paying £101mn (\$136mn) per year to secure the installation.

Responding to Trump's remarks, Mauritius attorney general Gavin Glover said that his country's sovereignty over the archipelago had been unequivocally recognised by international law, and it "should no longer be subject to debate".

"We expect the implementation of the treaty (deal with Britain) within the shortest possible time frames, in accordance with the commitments undertaken," Glover said in a statement.

Recent operations launched from Diego Garcia include humanitarian aid deployments to Gaza and attacks against Taliban and Al Qaeda targets in Afghanistan in 2001.

British senior minister Darren Jones said the Chagos deal was already done and he could not see how it might be changed.

EU moves to ban foreign suppliers from telecoms networks

The EU executive yesterday proposed banning third-country companies from European mobile networks if they are deemed a security risk, in a move seen as targeting China. The European Commission did not name any country or company as a target but Brussels has previously sought to restrict Chinese suppliers in the sensitive field. The step builds on actions taken in 2023 when the EU executive urged states to exclude Huawei and ZTE from their mobile networks due to security risks. The EU has taken an increasingly tough line on trade issues with China, but there are also security concerns - often raised by Washington. The EU will evaluate which states or suppliers to ban and, once identified, telecoms providers will have three years to phase them out from their networks. Brussels has taken the step after the 2023 voluntary measures failed to yield enough change across the 27-country bloc. - Reuters



Trump vows 'no going back' on goal to control Greenland

US President Donald Trump yesterday said there was "no going back" on his goal to control Greenland, refusing to rule out taking the Arctic island by force and rounding on allies as European leaders struggled to respond.

Trump's ambition - spelled out in social media posts and mock-up AI images - to wrest sovereignty over Greenland from fellow Nato member Denmark has threatened to blow apart the alliance that has underpinned Western security for decades.

It has also threatened to reignite a trade war with Europe that rattled markets and companies for months last year, though Trump's Treasury

Secretary Scott Bessent pushed back against what he called "hysteria" over Greenland.

"As I expressed to everyone, very plainly, Greenland is imperative for National and World Security. There can be no going back - On that, everyone agrees!" Trump said after speaking to Nato secretary-general Mark Rutte. To drive home the message, Trump posted an AI image of himself in Greenland, holding a US flag. Another showed him speaking to leaders next to a map showing Canada and Greenland as part of the US.

Separately, he leaked messages including from French President Emmanuel Macron, who questioned what Trump was "doing on Greenland".

Trump, who has vowed to impose tariffs on countries that stood in his way, had earlier threatened to hammer French spirits with a 200% tariff.

Danish Prime Minister Mette Frederiksen said

she would not yield to Trump's demands. "I am certainly not going to abandon Greenland, I made that decision a long time ago as Danish prime minister," she told reporters in Copenhagen.

"The American president has unfortunately not ruled out the use of military force. And therefore the rest of us cannot rule it out either, so it is a natural consequence of what the American president has said and has not said," she added.

An agreement on sharing responsibility for the security of the Arctic and the North Atlantic could offer a way out of the stand-off, Lithuanian President Gitanas Nausėda said at the World Economic Forum in the Swiss ski resort of Davos.

Also speaking in Davos, Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney said his country strongly opposed the imposition of any US tariffs linked to the Greenland issue.

Half of Kyiv without heat, power after Russian attack

An overnight Russian bombardment on Kyiv left thousands of residential buildings and parliament without heating and water in -14C temperatures yesterday, just as the Ukrainian capital was scrambling to restore vital utilities destroyed in earlier attacks.

The barrage of hundreds of drones and missiles, which targeted energy facilities across Ukraine, killed at least one 50-year-old man near Kyiv.

More than half a million people have evacuated from the capital this month, when Russia unleashed its strongest attack on the capital's energy infrastructure in the war, the city's mayor, Vitali Klitschko, said.

Journalists in the capital heard air raid sirens and explosions as Ukrainian air defence systems

responded to the drones and missiles.

Sheltering in a metro station in the centre of Kyiv, Marina Sergiienko, a 51-year-old accountant, said she thought the repeated Russian strikes, which have left millions in the cold and dark over recent weeks, had a clear purpose.

"To wear down the people, push things to some critical point so there's no strength left, to break our resistance," she said, taking cover alongside dozens of other Kyiv residents bundled in hats and coats.

Foreign Minister Andriy Sybiga lashed out at Russian President Vladimir Putin, saying: "War criminal Putin continues to wage a genocidal war against women, children and elderly."

He said Russian forces had targeted energy infrastructure overnight in at least seven regions, and urged Ukraine's allies to bolster its air defence systems.

UN report declares global state of 'water bankruptcy'

The world is entering an era of "global water bankruptcy" with rivers, lakes and aquifers depleting faster than nature can replenish them, a United Nations research institute said yesterday.

It argues that decades of overuse, pollution, environmental destruction and climate pressure had pushed many water systems so beyond the point of recovery that a new classification was required.

"Water stress and water crisis are no longer sufficient descriptions of the world's new water realities," read a new report by the UN University Institute for Water, Environment and Health (UNU-INWEH).

These terms were "framed as alerts about a future that could still be avoided" when the world had already moved into a "new phase", it said.

The report proposes the alternative term "water bankruptcy" - a state in which long-term water use exceeds supply and damages nature so severely that previous levels cannot realistically be restored.

This was reflected in the shrinking of the world's large lakes, the report said, and the growing number of major rivers failing to reach the sea for parts of the year.

The world has lost enormous proportions of wetlands, with roughly 410mn hectares - nearly the size of the European Union - disappearing over the past five decades.

Groundwater depletion is another sign of this bankruptcy.

Around 70% of major aquifers used for drinking water and irrigation show long-term declines with rising "day zero" crises - when de-

mand exceeds supply - the "urban face" of this new reality.

Climate change was compounding the problem, spurring the loss of more than 30% of the world's glacier mass since 1970 and the seasonal meltwater relied upon by hundreds of millions of people.

The consequences were visible on every inhabited continent, but not every country individually was water bankrupt, UNU-INWEH director and report author Kaveh Madani said.

Madani said the phenomenon was a "warning" that a policy rethink was essential.

Instead of approaching water scarcity as something temporary, governments must "be honest" and "file for bankruptcy today rather than delaying this decision", he said.

"Let's adopt this framework. Let's understand this. Let us recognise this bitter reality today before we cause more irreversible damages," Madani added.

The report draws on existing data and statistics and does not provide an exhaustive record of all water problems, but attempts instead to redefine the situation.

It is based on a peer-reviewed report, soon to be published in the journal Water Resources Management, that will formally propose a definition of "water bankruptcy".

The report "captures a hard truth: the world's water crisis has crossed a point of no return", Tim Wainwright, chief executive of the WaterAid charity, wrote in a state-of-the-art declaration.

Some scientists not involved in the report welcomed the spotlight on water but warned that the global picture varied considerably and a blanket declaration might overlook progress being made at a local level.



MENC eyes defence diplomacy

The Middle East Naval Commanders Conference (MENC) opened yesterday at the Qatar National Convention Centre, convening senior naval commanders, defence officials, diplomats, strategic experts and academics to tackle pressing maritime security challenges under the theme 'Defence Diplomacy and Maritime Security Challenges'.

The event forms a key part of the ninth edition of the Doha International Maritime Defence Exhibition and Conference (Dimdex 2026), held under the patronage and presence of HE Sheikh Saud bin Abdulrahman bin Hassan bin Ali al-Thani, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of State for Defence Affairs.

Organised in collaboration with the Joaan Bin Jassim Academy for Defence Studies, the conference drew HE Lt Gen (Pilot) Jassim bin Mohammed al-Mannai, Chief of Staff of Qatar Armed Forces, plus high-level delegations including ministers, ambassadors, naval commanders and maritime specialists from across the globe.

In his keynote address, HE Sheikh Saud emphasised the inadequacy of military power alone against contemporary threats. "Recent experiences demonstrate that military strength cannot address regional conflicts, transnational threats, cybersecurity, terrorism or risks to maritime routes and global supply chains," he stated.

Defence diplomacy, he argued, provides essential platforms for dialogue, partnership-building and co-operation based on mutual respect and shared interests, thereby reducing escalation risks

and building trust among defence institutions even during tensions.

The Deputy PM highlighted Qatar's strategic approach, which balances military readiness with diplomatic engagement. "Regional security demands dialogue and genuine partnerships grounded in sovereignty, good neighbourliness and international law," he said.

"Qatar has long served as a venue for resolving disputes through negotiation, diplomacy and peaceful means, fostering co-operation and trust on the international stage."

Brigadier General (Dr) Rajeh Mohammed bin Aqeel al-Nabat, President of the Joaan Bin Jassim Academy for Defence Studies, delivered the welcome address, affirming that Qatar's Armed Forces regard maritime security as a collective responsibility. "This demands parallel co-ordination, trust-based partnerships and ex-

pertise exchange to ensure regional stability," he said.

Modern challenges, he noted, are transnational and interconnected, necessitating comprehensive strategies that integrate hard power with diplomatic tools and emphasise multilateral coordination. "This conference will yield actionable insights to bolster maritime systems and co-operation among partners," Brig Gen al-Nabat added.

The opening session, moderated by broadcast journalist Adrian Finighan, featured prominent contributions from HE Dr Mohammed bin Abdulaziz bin Saleh al-Khulaifi, Minister of State at Qatar's Ministry of Foreign Affairs. "Maritime security today transcends naval power – it integrates diplomacy, defence, trade, food security and regional stability," HE Dr al-Khulaifi declared. He cited Qatar's model of seamless co-ordination between its Ministries of Foreign Affairs and

Defence, alongside sustained partner co-operation and mediation commitments, as essential for safeguarding sea lanes amid complex, borderless conflicts.

Other panellists included Rear Admiral Hughes Lyne, Commander of French Joint Forces in the Indian Ocean, who described maritime threats as increasingly sophisticated – from shadow fleets to illicit operations undermining security – and stressed the need for political dialogue and relationships with coastal states beyond naval might alone.

Luciano Zaccara, Visiting Professor at Georgetown University in Qatar, and Commodore Dan Thomas, Component Commander of the UK Maritime Component Command in the Arabian Gulf and Deputy Commander of the Combined Maritime Forces, rounded out the session with insights on regional dynamics.

Dimdex conference tackles maritime security challenges

A second session examined technological constraints and operational lessons. Brigadier General Ramzan Hamad al-Naimi, Head of Qatar's Nato OCC Program, joined David B Des Roches, Professor of Practice at the Near East South Asia Center for Strategic Studies, to analyse recent naval setbacks.

Ali Baker, Professor of International Affairs, Security and Defence at Qatar University, addressed hybrid maritime threats and global domain security. The discussion closed with Dr Hassan Jouni, Retired Brigadier General at the American Institute for Anti-Corruption in the Middle East, who assessed threats to strategic sea lanes and their cascading effects on global supply chains and energy markets.

Sustainability takes centre stage on February 1 with Angus Campbell of Foster + Partners, who discusses adaptive reuse and retrofitting as critical tools in achieving net-zero goals, drawing on major international projects from the British Museum to Battersea Power Station. February continues with *The Infinite Happiness*, an architectural film by Ila Beka and Louise Lemoine, screening on February 5. Fourth National Human Rights Forum kicks off

The fourth National Human Rights Forum, organised by the National Human Rights Committee (NHRC) in partnership with the Ministry of Interior (MoI), commenced yesterday under the theme 'Human Rights at the Heart of Combating Drugs: Challenges and Prospects for Sustainable Solutions'.

The two-day forum is being held in co-operation with the Ministry of Social Development and Family, Ministry of Education and Higher Education, and Ministry of Public Health, and with the participation of the Public Prosecution, the National Planning Council, the National Cybersecurity Agency, the GCC Criminal Information Centre for Drug Control, the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime, and other relevant official bodies, in addition to the participation of specialised UN agencies, and civil society.

The opening session was attended by HE Ibrahim bin Ali al-Mohannadi, Minister of Justice

HE al-Attiyah noted the emergence of new patterns of transnational drug crimes resulting from the illicit use of artificial intelligence and emerging technologies. This has contributed to increased social, economic, and security threats and undermined human rights, including the right to life, health, and an adequate standard of living. This necessitates

adopting a comprehensive, human rights-based approach to all measures, grounded in the principle that the most effective and sustainable solutions prioritise the preservation of human dignity and the protection of human rights.

She expressed her appreciation for the legislative measures, public policies, and procedures adopted by the State of Qatar to

address the dangers of drugs and their repercussions. These measures have contributed to achieving the highest levels of safety and freedom from serious risks associated with drugs and dangerous psychotropic substances, according to international reports and indicators.

She emphasised the need to review national measures to enhance their flexibility and responsiveness to emerging challenges, particularly digital challenges. This requires empowering youth and children with the right to a safe digital environment free from drug risks, and further promoting rehabilitation and reintegration, as well as protection from stigma and discrimination.

She commended the pivotal role of MoI in protecting society from this destructive scourge, expressing her appreciation for the efforts of all national bodies involved in prevention, rehabilitation, and reintegration.

"We emphasise the necessity of involving civil society, the media, and other stakeholders in policy development and implementation, based on our belief that social

responsibility is the fundamental guarantee for the sustainability of efforts to combat, recover, and reintegrate addiction, in accordance with a human rights approach," HE al-Attiyah said.

The NHRC chairperson continued: "We place great importance on the participation of young people in the work of this forum, listening to their perspectives, and encouraging them to invest their energies in awareness initiatives and peer support, not only as targets of prevention but also as partners in shaping solutions and a fundamental pillar in efforts to combat, recover, and break the cycles of addiction."

She emphasised that this is a battle to protect what is most precious to us – human dignity – and to safeguard the future of our generations. She called for the forum's outcomes to serve as a roadmap for restoring hope to victims and protecting society from the dangers posed by this scourge, thereby solidifying Qatar's pioneering model in this field and contributing to the realisation of the goals of Qatar National Vision 2030.
