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Sheikha Moza, PM to take part in Web Summit Qatar 2026

The Permanent Web Summit Organising Committee announced that Her Highness Sheikha Moza bint Nasser, Chairperson of Qatar Foundation for Education, Science and Community Development, will participate in the 3rd edition of Web Summit Qatar 2026, taking place from February 1-4 at the Doha Exhibition and Convention Center. In a statement yesterday, the Committee said: "The participation of Her Highness Sheikha Moza bint Nasser will advance the Summit's discussions, particularly around the role of technology in serving society, strengthening education systems through innovation, and empowering communities amid rapid digital transformation". The Committee also confirmed the participation of HE the Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman bin Jassim al-Thani in Web Summit Qatar 2026, the region's largest and fastest-growing technology event. The Committee mentioned: "Web Summit Qatar 2026 will also feature Qatari industry leaders, including HE the Chairperson of Qatar Museums Sheikhha Al Mayassa bint Hamad bin Khalifa al-Thani; HE the Minister of Justice and Minister of State for Cabinet Affairs Ibrahim bin Ali bin Issa al-Hassan al-Mohannadi; and HE the President of the Civil Service and Government Development Bureau and Secretary-General of the National Planning Council Dr Abdulaziz bin Nasser bin Mubarak al-Khalifa". The statement added: "Qatari senior executives will also participate in the Summit's programme, including HE the Managing Director of the Supreme Committee for Delivery and Legacy Hassan bin Abdullah al-Thawadi; CEO of Invest Qatar Sheikh Ali bin Alwaleed al-Thani; Chairman of Qai Abdulla bin Hamad al-Misnad; Director General of Al Jazeera Media Network Sheikh Nasser bin Faisal bin Khalifa al-Thani; and Secretary-General of the Qatar Research and Development (QRD) Council Engineer Omar Ali al-Ansari". Web Summit Qatar 2026 is expected to host 30,000 participants, more than 1,600 startups, over 800 investors, over 180 global partners, and more than 400 speakers from around the world. The Summit will also receive extensive international media coverage, with over 600 media professionals attending, making it the largest edition of the global event to be hosted in Qatar. **(QNA)**

Doha braces up for a February to remember

Doha is gearing up for a packed February as Qatar prepares to host a line-up of major global events that underline its emergence as a regional and international centre for exhibitions, conferences, and world-class sporting and cultural gatherings. The month's agenda spans technology, energy, art, agriculture, and sport – together illustrating the diversity and global reach of Qatar's economy and society. The curtain rises with Web Summit Qatar 2026 (Feb 1-4) at the Doha Exhibition and Convention Center (DECC). Returning after a successful debut, the event will bring together thousands of technology leaders, entrepreneurs, and investors to discuss advances in artificial intelligence, sustainability, and the future digital economy. Close on its heels comes the 21st International Conference & Exhibition on Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG 2026, Feb 2-5), widely regarded as the premier global meeting for the LNG industry. Qatar's role as the world's largest LNG exporter gives special prominence to this edition, which is expected to feature discussions on cleaner energy technologies and climate-aligned growth in the energy sector. From Feb 5-7, Doha will host



two significant events reflecting Qatar's growing influence in science and culture. The first Qatar International Reproductive Medicine Conference will gather leading medical researchers and practitioners to explore breakthroughs in fertility and women's health. Running concurrently, Art Basel Qatar will spotlight contemporary artists from the region and around the world, expanding Doha's profile as a leading art destination following recent international exhibitions at M7 and Qatar Museums. The action shifts courtside from Feb 8-14 with the Qatar TotalEnergies Open 2026, which brings top WTA players to compete at the Khalifa International Tennis and Squash Complex. The tournament is consistently recognised for attracting some of the game's biggest names early in the tennis season. The prestigious HH The Amir's Sword International Equestrian Festival (Feb 11-14) follows, uniting the world's elite riders at Al Rayyan Racecourse. Qatar launches project to protect fragile ecosystems

The Ministry of Environment and Climate Change (MECC), through its Wildlife Development Department, yesterday launched the Rawda Fencing Project at Rawdat Selaimi Al Bambara, situated north of the Al Atouriya area, as part of an ongoing drive to safeguard Qatar's vulnerable ecosystems. The event was attended by senior ministry officials, representatives from partner institutions, and stakeholders from the environmental and financial sectors. According to the Ministry, the project – implemented in collaboration with Masraf Al Rayan – seeks to strengthen environmental



awareness, conserve natural rawdas (grassland depressions), and encourage responsible engagement with Qatar's natural landscapes. The initiative supports the nation's long-term vision of achieving environmental sustainability and ensuring the prudent use of natural resources. Speaking about the initiative, Adel Mohammed al-Yafie, Head of the Wild Plant Life Section at MECC, described it as a strategic environmental tool designed

to protect the natural habitats of wild plants and reduce human encroachments that threaten vegetation cover and biodiversity. "Fencing these rawdas creates a safe environment for wild plants to grow and regenerate naturally," he said, adding that the measure helps restore ecological balance, especially in areas that have suffered from environmental stress in recent years. Al-Yafie noted that the Ministry applies a scientific and carefully structured approach tailored to the ecological characteristics of each specific site. The Rawda Fencing Project, he explained, forms a core component of a broader national framework for the conservation and protection of Qatar's terrestrial natural resources. **To Page 4**

Qatar's timeless dhows keep maritime legacy afloat

For centuries, the graceful silhouette of the dhow has defined Qatar's coastline – a symbol of endurance, craftsmanship and a maritime spirit that once linked the nation to faraway ports. Today, even amid modern skylines and sleek yachts, these traditional wooden vessels remain afloat, cherished by those determined to preserve Qatar's seafaring soul. The legacy of traditional dhow boats in Qatar is deeply rooted in the nation's history of pearling, fishing, sea transport, sailing and trade. Enthusiasts and professionals alike continue to maintain and operate these vessels, both

for leisure and for business. Wooden ship expert and appraiser for the Ministry of Justice and Qatari courts, Khalid Ali Abdulnoor Abdul Jabbar, has been passionate about dhows since his teenage years. "I have carried this

passion for traditional dhows since I was fourteen. Once I set foot on a dhow, I would not leave except to sleep at night when it returned to its anchorage," he told *Gulf Times*. Jabbar, the only legal expert in this field in Qatar, explained, "I have been

appointed on several missions to appraise dhows – whether to assess their value for sale or purchase, for the government or private citizens, and to advise on the best type of maintenance and its cost." He emphasised the high value of these boats, which are traditionally made from rare teak wood – a species protected by law in India. "Dhow builders must comply with strict regulations to apply for teak export permits, as the trees are safeguarded from overexploitation after being heavily logged by craftsmen in the past," he said. Jabbar runs his own traditional dhow-building workshop. "The construction of each dhow is a project in itself," he explained. "The advantage of teak wood at

sea is its longevity – a well-maintained dhow can last between sixty and one hundred years. We use natural materials for sealing and insulation, such as dammar batu (a tree resin mixed with oil for a hard, water-resistant coating), particularly on submerged sections during annual maintenance." Today, the process begins in Indian shipyards, where the hull frame and main structure are cut from teak. The long-held tradition of building dhows without blueprints – relying solely on the inherited knowledge of master craftsmen – continues. Once assembled, the vessel is sailed or transported from Kolkata to Doha in a fifteen-day journey, before completing its interior fittings in Qatar. **To Page 4**

Attorneys' Admission Committee holds first meeting following reconstitution

The Attorneys' Admission Committee, chaired by HE the Minister of Justice and Minister of State for Cabinet Affairs Ibrahim bin Ali al-Mohannadi, convened yesterday at its permanent headquarters in the Ministry of Justice.

At the outset of the meeting, HE the Minister welcomed the new members of the committee following the issuance of the ministerial decision No. 10 of 2026 to reconstitute it. He stressed the importance of the topics entrusted to the committee within its jurisdiction to develop the legal profession and consider new registration applications submitted, and to expedite their resolution,

which reflects the role played by the legal profession in embodying the vision of the wise leadership to consolidate effective justice and advance the Qatari legal system, and the legal effort undertaken by lawyers as assistants to the judiciary.

During the meeting, the committee reviewed the topics on its agenda, including the restructuring of its subcommittees, witnessed eight new lawyers taking the legal oath, and considered applications from several business owners to register as practicing lawyers.

The committee also considered the requests of a number of new lawyers whose training period had ended, and approved the minutes of previous subcommittees, reviewing requests to transfer the registration of lawyers to the reg-

ister of lawyers practicing before the Court of Cassation, and approving requests of lawyers under training, in addition to a number of organisational topics and controls for the work of the legal profession, including discussing a proposal to develop tests for lawyers applying for registration and practicing the profession, and appropriate decisions were made regarding them.

The committee emphasised the need for the participants of the 16th mandatory programme for lawyers in training to adhere to the approved programme within the specialised legal training plan for 2026, and to commit to discipline in attending lectures according to the dates announced in the lecture schedule as stipulated in the training regulations of the Center for Legal and Judicial Studies.

Qatar partakes in Middle East Green Initiative ministerial council meeting

Qatar participated in the second meeting of the Ministerial Council of the Middle East Green Initiative, held in the city of Jeddah, Saudi Arabia, with the attendance of Their Excellencies the Ministers and representatives of the participating countries. Qatar was represented at the meeting by HE the Minister of Environment and Climate Change Dr Abdullah bin Abdulaziz bin Turki al-Subaie. In the State of Qatar's speech during the meeting, HE al-Subaie affirmed the strategic significance of the Middle East Green Initiative for the region, noting that it represents an important



transformation that can turn environmental and climate challenges into real opportunities benefiting current and future generations. He also considered that the success of the initiative reflects the spirit of solidarity

and co-operation among the countries of the region, and confirms the collective ability to actively contribute to shaping environmental and climate solutions, thereby supporting the achievement of a safer and more sustainable future. **(QNA)**

Qatar approves three Egyptian universities for PG courses

Qatar's Ministry of Education and Higher Education has added three Egyptian universities to its list of approved institutions for postgraduate (PG) study abroad, allowing students to pursue master's and doctoral degrees at their own expense.

The newly approved universities are Cairo University, Ain Shams University, and The American University in Cairo, according to a statement issued by the ministry.

The decision forms part of the ministry's regular updates to its list of recognised higher education institutions, which are used to regulate overseas study and ensure academic quality. The approval applies exclusively to postgraduate programmes (master's and PhD) and only for full-time, on-campus study.

Officials said the updated lists were prepared in line with internationally recognised academic ranking criteria, while also taking into account the needs of stu-

dents seeking to continue their higher education outside Qatar.

The ministry stressed that obtaining prior approval remains a mandatory requirement for all students wishing to study abroad, whether self-funded or sponsored by an employer. This approval is also a key condition for the recognition and equivalency of academic qualifications after graduation.

Director of the Department of Equivalency of University Degrees, Jaber Ahmed al-Jaber, said the updates aim to safeguard students' academic pathways and ensure that qualifications align with Qatar's educational standards and national priorities. He added that the approval process helps ensure the quality of educational outcomes and supports the country's broader development goals.

The revised lists now include 19 approved Arab universities

across seven countries: Jordan, Lebanon, Oman, Kuwait, Tunisia, Iraq, and Egypt. The expansion followed a review of the institutions' standings in recognised academic ranking systems.

Students must apply for prior approval through an online service on the ministry's website and adhere to several academic conditions.

These include not changing the country of study, university, specialisation, or degree level without new approval, and completing all coursework and examinations at the institution's main campus.

The ministry also requires students to begin in-person study within six months of approval. Failure to do so renders the approval invalid, requiring a fresh application. Only one prior approval is permitted per academic degree. The update comes as part of Qatar's efforts to regulate higher education pathways and enhance academic outcomes, in line with Qatar National Vision 2030, which places human development and investment in national talent at the centre of its strategy.

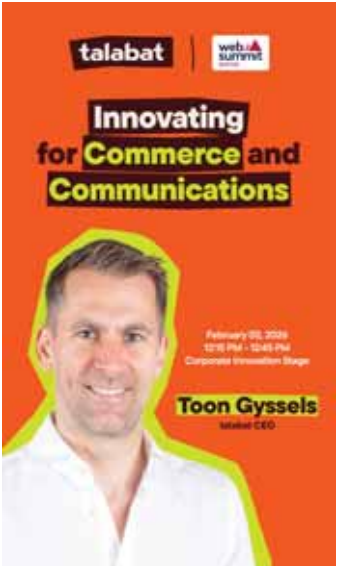

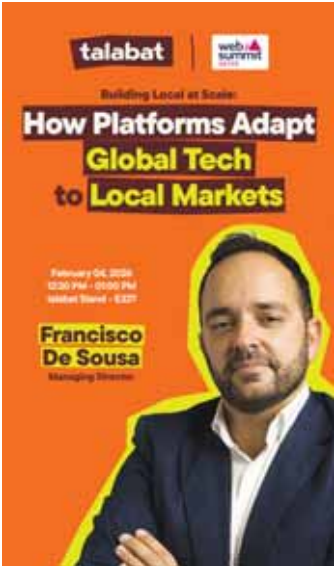

Each project takes between three and five years from start to finish.

After registration at Doha Port, the dhow is customised according to the owner’s preference.

In Qatar, dhows are classified into various types, including the Jalboot, Sambuk, Shayui, Baghlah, Boom, and Bagarah, with lengths ranging from 30’ to 200’.

“Those who once owned transport dhows were like airline owners today,” Jabbar noted. “They carried people, their luggage, and goods across the Gulf and beyond.”

He added that the Museum of Islamic Art (MIA) maintains around 13 traditional dhows at its

harbour, some more than a century old.

“I conduct their annual maintenance appraisal to preserve them in mint condition,” he said with pride.

Tourists today can enjoy dhow cruises along the Doha Corniche and Old Doha Port, offering sightseeing opportunities and cultural performances.

Jabbar noted that these smaller dhows, ranging from 10’-50’, travel at speeds of about 5.4 nautical miles (10kph).

Luxury dhows, which can cost between QR10mn and QR45mn, meanwhile reach speeds of up to 16.2 nautical miles (30kph), depending on their size rather than engine power.

Most are built to order for Qa-

taris or maritime enthusiasts.

“The government supports this legacy by offering annual maintenance subsidies to private owners,” Jabbar said. “His Highness the Father Amir Sheikh Hamad bin Khalifa al-Thani also exempted imported wooden dhows from customs duty – a decision that encouraged citizens to keep this heritage alive.”

Centuries after they first sailed Qatar’s azure waters, the dhow endures – not merely as a vessel of trade or travel, but as an enduring emblem of national pride and identity.

US border chief says no let-up on crackdown

Donald Trump's border chief has vowed to press on with the immigration crackdown in Minneapolis while acknowledging the mission needed to improve and promising to hold agents to account.

"We're going to make sure we do targeted enforcement operations," Tom Homan told reporters in the Minnesota city. "We are not surrendering our mission at all. We're just doing it smarter."

"President Trump wants this fixed," he said. "And I'm going to fix it."

The border czar called on Minnesota's residents to turn down the temperature and stop what he called "hateful rhetoric" against federal agents carrying out immigration raids. Minneapolis has been gripped by weeks of protests against the roundup of migrants.

Two Americans demonstrating against the sweeps have been shot dead by federal agents.

Homan struck a conciliatory tone at his first press conference, a marked difference from the Border Patrol commander who was previously heading the mission on the ground and has since been removed.

"One thing everybody I talked to agreed on was that community safety is paramount," Homan said.

"The mission is going to improve because of the changes we're making internally," he said. "President Trump and I, along with others in the administration, have recognised that certain improvements could and should be made."

"That's exactly what I'm doing here," he said.

Homan also said he would reduce the 3,000-strong force of agents deployed to the city if he received "co-operation" from state and local leaders, noting that he has had productive meetings with Minnesota Governor Tim Walz and Minneapolis Mayor Jacob Frey, both vocal critics of the surge.

"We can do better," he said, in a rare acknowledgment from a Trump official that the opera-

tion has not been perfect. "We made some significant gains, significant co-ordination and co-operation, and you're going to see some massive changes occurring here in this city."

Homan said any federal agents who breach codes of conduct "will be dealt with".

The two agents involved in the latest shooting – that of 37-year-old Veterans Hospital nurse Alex Pretti – have been placed on leave pending an investigation.

Trump has scrambled to stem outrage across the political aisle over the killing, saying on Tuesday that he wanted to "de-escalate a little bit" in Minneapolis.

However, the president on Wednesday accused mayor Frey of "PLAYING WITH FIRE" for refusing to rally local police to enforce the federal immigration sweeps.

The political battle could soon move to Congress, where Democrats are threatening to hold up authorisation for swathes of government funding if reforms are not made to rein in the sprawling military-style immigration agencies.

Frey responded on Wednesday to Trump ramping up his rhetoric, writing on X: "The job of our police is to keep people safe, not enforce federal immigration laws."

In another challenge to Trump's crackdown, a federal judge ruled on Wednesday to halt the detention of refugees in Minnesota awaiting permanent resident status and ordered the release of those in custody.

Another federal judge has slammed Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) chief Todd Lyons, claiming that he "has likely violated more court orders in January 2026 than some federal agencies have violated in their entire existence".

The White House initially justified Saturday's fatal shooting of Pretti, an intensive care nurse, whom Homeland Security chief Kristi Noem described as a "domestic terrorist".

However, a widespread backlash forced Trump to shuffle leadership of immigration operations in Minneapolis, replacing Border Patrol commander Greg Bovino with Homan.

WFP ends all staff contracts in Houthi-controlled Yemen

The World Food Programme (WFP) is ending the contracts of all 365 staff in Houthi-controlled Yemen, a UN official told AFP yesterday, effectively ending operations in a zone gravely afflicted by hunger.

The United Nations agency suspended work in rebel-held areas in late August after the Iran-backed Houthis detained 38 employees in a series of raids, the official said, requesting anonymity.

"These circumstances, combined with a challenging funding environment, have resulted in the need for WFP to end the contracts of 365 staff members" from the end of March, he said.

The 365 Yemeni employees constitute "all the WFP members in the areas under the control of the de facto Houthi authorities", the official added. International staff have already been pulled out.

Around 19.5mn people in Yemen – more than half the population – were in need of humanitarian assistance in 2025, according to UN figures.

Most Yemenis live under Houthi rule.

In November, the WFP and the UN's Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) named Yemen as one of the countries with populations at "imminent risk of catastrophic hunger".

However, the Houthis have repeatedly targeted UN agencies as part of a crackdown on alleged Israeli espionage rings since the start of the war in Gaza.

"Work stopped at our facility on August 25 due to the campaign of arbitrary arrests," the official said.

Sixty-nine UN staff have been detained altogether, the official said, with the world body having strongly rejected allegations of spying.

The Houthis seized the capital, Sanaa in 2014, forcing out the internationally recognised government.

The war, largely on hold since a UN-brokered ceasefire in 2022, left hundreds of thousands dead and created one of the world's worst humanitarian crises.

The global aid sector is grappling with a sharp drop in funding, with key donor countries led by the United States slashing their contributions. — AFP

Alexandria tramway prepares to shut ahead of overhaul

As the blue-and-white tram carriages rattle into a large square in the heart of Alexandria, doors creak open to a crush of passengers, many of whom can recite every stop by heart.

However, the clatter of single and double-deck trams along this century-and-a-half-old line – a source of civic pride and transport alike for tens of thousands of daily commuters in Egypt's second city – is soon to be stopped.

Next week, authorities are starting a sweeping renovation aimed at replacing the nearly 14km (nine-mile) line's worn but beloved trams with a digitally controlled light rail system, one of the latest projects in a broader push to revamp Egypt's road and rail networks under President Abdel Fattah el-Sisi.

The National Authority for Tunnels says the renovations should roughly double current speed, cutting end-to-end travel time along a similar route by over half an hour, and boost passenger capacity.

While some commuters welcome the renovation plan, others worry that construction could ensnarl narrow streets, that ticket prices could jump, or that works, planned over two years, might have to be extended.

Some are mourning the loss of one of the Mediterranean city's most treasured features.

"It's not just a means of transport," said Fatma Hussein, 63, a retired agricultural engineer who has

ridden the tram since her school days. "It's our memories... our history. You can develop it, but why stop it? Why deprive employees, students and the people who use it all the time?"

Launched in the 1860s, the Raml line is a rare holdout of double-decker trams.

Wide carriage windows frame Alexandria's tree-lined streets, dilapidated apartment blocks and historic villas.

With standard tickets costing just five Egyptian pounds (about \$0.10), it also remains an affordable option for workers, students and pensioners amid rising living costs.

Alexandrian novelist Alaa Khalid, who grew up near the tramline, recalls how he used to make rides into a game with his father, climbing between the tram's floors to see the city from different angles.

"Even now, I still take the whole journey and gaze at the villas and trees as a window onto the history of the city, or just sit down and read," he said.

Architect and urban mobility specialist Yasmin Kandil said she worried that the light rail project, which includes elevating parts of the line to bypass intersections, will prioritise vehicles and speed while distorting the city's aesthetics.

Residents' concerns have been fuelled by the recent suspension of the local Abu Qir rail line for conversion into a metro line, which commuters say worsened congestion and left travellers scrambling for alternatives.

Authorities say they will deploy

replacement buses during the construction of the light rail to limit disruption.

The National Authority for Tunnels, which manages the tram and its renovation, did not respond to a Reuters request for comment.

The European Investment Bank is providing €138mn (\$165mn) for the project and lists the total cost at about €592mn (\$708mn).

France's development agency is also providing financing.

Alexandria has another tram line, the City Line, which has newer trams and has yet to be slated for renovations.

However, the loss of the Raml line will be "painful", said 52-year-old tram driver Mahmoud Ramadan, who has worked on the tram network since 1997 and said he met his wife on the job.

"Not everyone will understand," he said. "It's your home and your life for 30 years."

South Africa drops Melania just ahead of release

South Africa's main cinema houses have pulled a documentary about US First Lady Melania Trump just ahead of its release, with the distributor citing "the current climate", local media reported.

Melania was not listed on the websites of the Nu Metro or Ster Kinekor theatres yesterday, the day before its international release on January 30.

News24 media reported on Wednesday that the South African distributor Filmfinity had abruptly dropped the film.

"Given the current climate, the film will no longer be releasing theatrically in (the) territory," the site quoted the distributor's head of marketing, Thobashan Govindarajulu, as saying.

It was not clear what "climate" he was referring

to and AFP could not immediately reach a company representative for details.

Nu Metro confirmed to AFP yesterday that it had been told by Filmfinity to withdraw the film.

"The rights sit with Filmfinity, and it's at their request that we are not releasing it," Nu Metro said in a statement.

The South African government has strained ties with the administration of President Donald Trump, which has criticised Pretoria's position on a range of domestic and international policies.

Trump has notably repeated false claims that Pretoria is behind a "genocide" of the white Afrikaans community, which he has invited to settle in the US.

US threatening late-night and daytime talk shows, says FCC member

A Democratic member of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) said yesterday that the Trump administration is threatening major broadcast networks by issuing new guidance on equal time rules for late-night and daytime talk show interviews with political candidates.

The Republican-led FCC said

last week that daytime and late-night TV talk shows are not considered "bona fide" news programmes that are exempt from equal time rules that require them to give airtime to views of opposing candidates.

FCC Commissioner Anna Gomez, a Democrat, said at a press conference that the announcement last week was an improper threat aimed at news reporting and urged networks not to "be cowed into stopping your independent reporting of what is

happening to this country".

President Donald Trump has repeatedly pushed FCC Chair Brendan Carr to take action against US broadcasters.

Trump has criticised news coverage and said he will have a role in whether a proposed merger between Netflix and Warner Bros. Discovery should proceed.

Until now, talk shows have qualified for the equal opportunities exemption as genuine news interviews, ever since the FCC's Media Bureau granted an exemp-

tion to the interview portion of Jay Leno's *Tonight Show* in 2006.

Networks have relied on the ruling as a precedent for recent interviews with political candidates.

Carr said networks were improperly relying on that ruling.

"If you are Fake News, you're not going to qualify," he said at a separate press conference, noting one factor is whether there were partisan motivations in airing interviews.

The FCC said last week that

networks or specific shows could petition for a commission ruling that they qualify for an exemption.

Carr said the FCC has not yet received any petitions.

The rules do not apply to what are called bona fide news programmes and are typically in effect 90 days before a political candidate's nomination via convention or caucus.

The major broadcast networks – NBC, CBS, ABC and Fox – have not commented.

Afghanistan launches \$100mn food security programme backed by UN, ADB

Afghanistan will roll out a \$100mn food security project, the UN said yesterday, as it contends with a worsening hunger crisis driven by deportations of Afghans from neighbouring states,

foreign aid cuts and economic crisis.

Afghanistan's humanitarian situation is deteriorating sharply, with millions pushed into hunger by the loss of remittances, limited job opportunities and a sharp reduc-

tion in international assistance.

The two-year programme, backed by the UN and Asian Development Bank (ADB), will support more than 151,000 families.

The director of the UN's Food and Agri-

culture Organisation, Qu Dongyu, said the project would address immediate food security needs but also aim to close Afghanistan's food production gap and create space for private sector recovery. — Reuters

China warns US attempts to contain it ‘doomed to fail’

Beijing yesterday said attempts to contain it are “doomed to fail”, days after the US defence department announced it would prioritise curbing China this year while maintaining respectful ties. “Facts have proven that any attempt to contain or block China is doomed to fail,” defence ministry spokesman Jiang Bin said. But he added that Beijing was “willing to work with the US side” to promote ties, with President Donald Trump expected to visit China in April for talks with his counterpart Xi Jinping. The US’ 2026 National Defence Strategy, released last week, said Washington would “deter China in the Indo-Pacific through strength, not confrontation”. - **AFP**

Thai military plane crash kills two pilots

A military plane crashed in a forested area of northern Thailand during a training flight yesterday, killing the two pilots on board, the air force said. “Two pilots died in an aircraft accident involving a light attack aircraft AT-6TH yesterday morning during training,” air force spokesman Jackkrit Thammanvichai said. The two-seater plane crashed in Chiang Mai province at around 10.20am (0320GMT) during a combat search and rescue training mission, the air force said in a statement. The crash “did not affect local residents or cause damage to civilian property”, the statement said. Authorities were investigating the cause of the crash, it added. - **Reuters**

Japan PM’s party ‘seen gaining majority in election’

Japanese Prime Minister Sanae Takaichi’s Liberal Democratic Party is likely to increase seats and gain a majority in the lower house in a general election on February 8, a preliminary survey by the *Nikkei* newspaper showed yesterday. Prime Minister Takaichi called the snap general election to seek a mandate to gear up her expansionary fiscal policy. While still early in the race, the LDP is gaining momentum and likely to see its seats exceed the 233 majority of 465 up for grabs in the lower house, up from 198 seats it holds before the election, the *Nikkei* said. - **Reuters**

Preparations for March 5 elections on track, says Nepal

Nepal’s election commission said it is ready to hold elections as planned, despite concerns over weather conditions in high-altitude regions when the vote takes place on March 5. The poll follows anti-corruption protests in September that toppled the previous government, prompting an accelerated election schedule and an unusual early-year date for voting. “We are prepared to conduct the election in all locations,” the commission’s assistant spokesman, Prakash Nyaupane, said adding logistical, administrative and security arrangements were progressing as planned. - **Reuters**

Britain, China hail reset in ties as Starmer seeks ‘sophisticated’ relationship

Britain and China hailed a reset in relations yesterday, after Prime Minister Keir Starmer and President Xi Jinping pledged greater co-operation on trade, investment and technology to the mutual benefit of both countries.

With Western leaders reeling from the unpredictability of US President Donald Trump, Starmer became just the latest to head to China, where he called for a “more sophisticated relationship” with improved market access, lower tariffs and investment deals.

Hosting a British leader for the first time in eight years, Beijing agreed to 30 days’ visa-free access for Britons and to halve Chinese tariffs on spirits, while UK drugmaker AstraZeneca announced a \$15bn investment into China.

Starmer spent around three hours with Xi at a formal summit and a lunch, during which the pair discussed trade and security, the war in Ukraine, and also soccer and Shakespeare.

Starmer, whose centre-left Labour government has struggled to deliver the economic growth it promised, has made improving relations with the world’s second-largest economy a priority.

That has drawn criticism from some British and US politicians who accuse China of waging industrial levels of espionage and of abusing human rights.

The British premier held up a plan by AstraZeneca to pioneer new medicines by investing heavily in its Chinese operations as proof of the benefits that could flow to both countries.

But he also said the closer ties would enable Britain to engage in “frank dialogue” when there was disagreement.

“China is a vital player on the global stage, and it’s vital that we build a more sophisticated relationship where we can identify opportunities to collaborate, but of course, also allow a meaningful dialogue on areas where we disagree,” Starmer told Xi at the start of their meeting.

Xi said China was ready to develop a long-term partnership with Britain following “twists and turns” in the relationship that did not serve the interests of either country.

“We can deliver a result that can withstand the test of history,” Xi told Starmer, flanked by his top ministers, at their summit at the Great Hall of the People.

Starmer later told reporters he had a “respectful discussion” with Xi about the case of Jimmy Lai, the former Hong Kong media tycoon and British citizen who was convicted in December of national security crimes.

Starmer’s visit comes amid Trump’s on-off threats of trade tariffs and pledges to grab control of Greenland, an autonomous territory of Denmark, which have rattled long-standing US allies such as Britain.

German Chancellor Friedrich Merz is expected to travel to China soon and Trump himself has said he will visit in April.

While Starmer has so far not secured the scale of trade deals that were struck on a recent visit by Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney, he has gone some way to rebuilding ties that had deteriorated under previous Conservative governments.

Under them, Britain curbed some Chinese investment over national security worries and expressed concern over a crackdown on political freedoms in Hong Kong.

Kemi Badenoch, the leader of Britain’s opposition Conservative Party, said on Wednesday she would not have gone to China because of the security risks the country poses.

British security services say China routinely spies on the government. China denies the claims.

Starmer, who was accompanied by more than 50 business leaders, said the relationship with China was now in “a strong place” and said he saw Xi as someone he could do business with.

He described the meeting as warm and constructive, adding that the pair chatted about English Premier League soccer, which has a massive fan base in China, as they dined on roasted cod and sweet rice dumplings.

He gifted Xi a ball from a recent match between Manchester United, the Chinese president’s favoured team, and the British premier’s team Arsenal.

Chinese Commerce Minister Wang Wentao said after meeting British Business Minister Peter Kyle that Beijing wanted to deepen their services trade, import high-quality UK products, and, in return, enjoy a predictable investment environment in Britain.

Starmer, who has also agreed deals to improve trade with the US, the European Union and India, is also seeking Beijing’s help to bolster security, announcing that the countries would jointly tackle gangs involved in trafficking illegal migrants.

China executes 11 linked to Myanmar scam compounds

China yesterday executed 11 people linked to telecom scam operations, state media reported, as Beijing toughens its response to the sprawling, transnational industry.

Fraud compounds where scammers lure internet users into fake romantic relationships and cryptocurrency investments have flourished across Southeast Asia, including in the lawless borderlands of Myanmar.

Initially largely targeting Chinese speakers, the criminal groups behind the compounds have expanded operations into multiple languages to steal from victims around the world.

Those conducting the scams are sometimes willing on artists, and other times trafficked foreign nationals forced to work.

In recent years, Beijing has stepped up co-operation with regional governments to crack down on the compounds, and thousands of people have been repatriated to face trial in China’s opaque justice system.

The 11 people executed yesterday were sentenced to death in September by a court in the eastern Chinese city of Wenzhou, state news agency Xinhua said, adding that the court also carried out the executions.

Crimes of those executed included “intentional homicide, intentional injury, unlawful detention, fraud and casino establishment,” Xinhua said.

The death sentences were approved by the Supreme People’s Court in Beijing, which found that the evidence produced of crimes committed since 2015 was “conclusive and sufficient”, the report said.

Bodies pulled from sea as Philippine ferry toll rises to 29

Eleven more bodies were pulled from waters off the southern Philippines yesterday, the coast guard said, days after a ferry capsized and threw hundreds of people into the sea. The discovery brought the confirmed death toll to 29, officials said in a statement, three days after the MV Trisha Kerstin 3 went down off southwestern Mindanao in the early hours of Monday. The ferry was carrying at least 344 passengers and crew, most of whom were rescued in the immediate aftermath. Rescuer Yushrina Julkanain said yesterday the latest casualties had mostly been found in the vicinity of Baluk-Baluk Island, near where the ferry sank. “They have been turned over to the coast guard,” she said, adding that some had been discovered by fishermen. A video uploaded to Facebook showed a fisherman pulling a victim, still wearing her life jacket, from the water with a hook. Another video showed what appeared to be a small child. - **AFP**

Philippines posts worst economic growth since ’11

The Philippines economy grew at its slowest non-pandemic pace in 14 years in 2025, data showed yesterday, as it was swiped by a corruption scandal and climate change-fuelled weather woes.

The 4.4% expansion was well below a June projection of 5.5%-6.5%, which was already a downgrade that took into consideration the imposition of US tariffs and “global uncertainties”.

The full-year figure was the worst since a 3.9% rate in 2011 – though it contracted 9.5% in 2020 during the Covid crisis.

The data also showed just 3% growth in October-December, compared with 5.3% the year before, marking the second straight quarter that targets have been missed.

Economic Planning Secretary Arsenio Balisacan told reporters

yesterday that a spiralling scandal over bogus infrastructure projects had weighed heavily on short-term growth.

“Admittedly, the flood corruption probe scandal weighed on business and consumer confidence,” Balisacan said of alleged fraud that is believed to have cost taxpayers billions of dollars.

Construction spending has cratered since the scandal over bogus flood control projects erupted in July, when President Ferdinand Marcos made it the centrepiece of a speech. Scores of officials, lawmakers and construction firm owners have now been implicated.

Balisacan yesterday said that even normal figures from the sector would have improved 2025’s growth numbers dramatically.

“If public construction (had not been) been flat, GDP for 2025 would have actually increased from 4.4% to 5.5%,” he said of a 0.24% dip for the year.

Thailand urges ‘calibrated engagement’ with Myanmar’s next govt

Myanmar’s Southeast Asian neighbours should adopt a “calibrated engagement” with its military-controlled post-election government while still pressing for an end to conflict, Thailand said yesterday, signalling a possible softening in stance.

At a meeting of foreign ministers from the 11-nation Association of Southeast Asian Nations, hosts and chair the Philippines also said

the bloc saw some potential positives in the vote even if it did not endorse it.

Myanmar’s military-backed Union Solidarity and Development Party is set to lead government after winning the poll held over three rounds on December 28, January 11 and January 25 that was not contested by opposition groups amid a civil war triggered by a 2021 coup.

With rights groups, the UN and the UK denouncing the vote as a sham to perpetuate the military’s grip, junta chief Min Aung Hlaing said the people’s vote provided

legitimacy, regardless of international postures.

Thai Foreign Minister Sihasak Phuangketkeow said that despite Asean’s bar on Myanmar’s military leaders since 2022, the vote may lead to engagement if some requirements are met like expanding aid access and reducing violence.

“We think that we have to engage with the regime in Naypyitaw, the new one. They’re going to form a government probably in March,” Sihasak said in the interview on the sidelines of the meeting, adding that hopefully Myanmar would

respond with positive steps.

“We don’t anticipate Myanmar returning (to Asean) right away. So that’s why we’re proposing that there will be a sort of calibrated re-engagement where we have benchmarks.”

Myanmar has been in turmoil since the 2021 overthrow of the elected civilian government of Nobel laureate Aung San Suu Kyi, triggering pro-democracy protests that morphed into a widening armed rebellion that has taken over swathes of the country.

Philippine Foreign Affairs Sec-

retary Ma. Theresa Lazaro told a press conference after the ministerial retreat that some Asean members were still looking into the results of the election.

“It’s not an expression of support, but with a view that these elections might be something positive,” Lazaro said.

Asean’s engagement with Myanmar remains guided by the “five-point consensus” that includes a cessation of violence, dialogue among concerned parties and provision of humanitarian assistance, the official added.

While reaffirming Asean’s call for a free, fair and inclusive election, “even a certain compliance in the implementation of the Five-Point Consensus is something that will make things move,” Lazaro said.

The Philippines recently hosted a dialogue among opponents of Myanmar’s ruling junta to try and assist dialogue and aid. Lazaro also said the Philippines will push to finish this year a long-delayed code of conduct for the South China Sea, where Manila and Beijing dispute some territory.



India’s gold demand likely to fall in 2026: WGC

India's gold demand is likely to fall in 2026 following a drop of 11% last year, as a surge in prices dampens jewellery sales and offsets an uptick in investment buying, the World Gold Council (WGC) said

yesterday. Demand for gold could stand between 600 metric tonnes and 700 metric tonnes, compared to 710.9 tonnes last year, which was the lowest in five years, Sachin Jain, chief executive of the WGC’s Indian operations, said.
Jewellery buyers prefer stable prices of gold, but the volatile rising prices of recent months have far

outstripped consumer budgets, Jain said.
“Inflow into exchange-traded funds (ETFs) will continue to grow,” he said. “The stock market hasn’t performed very well in 2025, so investors are looking for better returns from gold.”
Inflows into gold ETFs jumped 283% in 2025 from a year earlier to a

record Rs429.6bn (\$4.67bn).
Domestic gold prices surged 76.5% in 2025, while India's benchmark Nifty 50 has risen 10.5% in 2025.
Jewellery demand in 2025 fell 24% from a year earlier to 430.5 metric tonnes, its lowest in nearly three decades except for 2020, when the Covid-19 pandemic dis-

torted figures, the WGC said in a report published yesterday.
By contrast, investment demand rose 17% in 2025 to 280.4 tonnes, its highest since 2013, the WGC said. Investment demand accounted for a record roughly 40% of India's total gold consumption in 2025, up from a usual share of about a quarter.
“Equities may stay subdued and

less attractive amid high valuations, tariffs, and foreign outflows,” the WGC said. “A gradual shift from jewellery to pure investment demand should continue to support bars and coins.”
Higher gold prices have historically spurred Indians to sell jewellery and coins, in a category called scrap supplies.

India sees 6.8%-7.2% economic growth next year, flags risks from geopolitics

India's economy is forecast to grow between 6.8% and 7.2% in the fiscal year starting in April on the back of strong domestic demand, the government said yesterday, even as global volatility weighs on the outlook.
The finance ministry's forecast in the annual economic survey represents a slowdown from this fiscal year's 7.4% projection.

The annual economic survey, presented in parliament by Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman, says the outlook for the domestic economy “is one of steady growth amid global uncertainty, requiring caution, but not pessimism”.

The government projects this fiscal year's growth at 7.4%, beating the 6.3%-6.8% forecast range from last year's survey.

For India, global conditions translate into uncertainties rather than immediate macroeconomic stress. Slower growth in key trading partners, tariff-induced disruptions to trade and volatility in capital flows could intermittently weigh on exports and investor sentiment, the report says.

The report's growth assessment is broadly consistent with recent analyses on India's momentum by

international agencies.
The report is a precursor to the federal budget on Sunday, which will seek to bolster fast economic growth and buffer the country from geopolitical shocks and the tariff uncertainty from Washington that has upended global trade.

President Donald Trump in August slapped a 50% tariff on some Indian goods entering the US.

In recent months, New Delhi has raced to diversify its market and struck a long-pending trade deal with the European Union, as well as deals with New Zealand and Oman.

Since Trump imposed the levies, the rupee has fallen 5% and is now, according to the economic survey, “punching below its weight”.

“The rupee's valuation does not accurately reflect India's stellar economic fundamentals,” the report says, but the “undervalued” currency “offsets to some extent the impact of higher American tariffs on Indian goods.”

The weaker rupee does not hurt at a time when inflation in India is exceptionally low, but “it does cause investors to pause”, the survey says, adding that “investor reluctance to commit to India warrants examination”.

The rupee fell to a record low

91.9850 per dollar yesterday. Foreign investors withdrew a record \$19bn from Indian equities in 2025 and have remained sellers in January.

Yesterday's report was authored by chief economic adviser V Anantha Nageswaran and his team, which is separate from the group compiling Sunday's budget.

Investment and consumption are likely to gain strength as firms respond to recent reforms including consumption-tax cuts, the overhaul of labour laws and steps to open up the tightly controlled nuclear-power sector, the survey says.

“Ongoing trade negotiations with the US are expected to conclude during the year, which could help reduce uncertainty on the external front,” the report says.

The IMF, in its latest global outlook, raised India's growth forecast for the coming fiscal year by 0.7 percentage point to 7.3%, while the World Bank upgraded its forecast by 0.9 point to 7.2%.

The Reserve Bank of India, in its January bulletin, said high-frequency indicators point to sustained buoyancy in demand as the new year begins. The central bank has cut interest rates by 125 basis points since February 2025, the most aggressive easing since 2019.

Goa govt mulls social media ban for children

India's top tourist state of Goa is considering a social media ban for children similar to one implemented in Australia, as concerns grow over mental health risks in a nation with more than a billion Internet users.

Among the top markets for tech giants such as Meta, Google's YouTube and X, India is thought to have many users aged under 18 but has imposed no national curbs on social media and there are no indications the fed-

eral government plans to do so.

Authorities in Goa are examining Australia's law to study how to regulate minors' access to social media platforms, said Rohan Khaunte, the state's infotech minister.

“If possible, (we will) implement a similar ban on children below 16 for usage of social media,” he told reporters this week. “Details will follow.”

The southern state of Andhra Pradesh, with a population of more than 53mn, has said it is looking into similar measures. Goa, by contrast, is the smallest state by area, with a population

estimated at over 1.5mn.

India's IT ministry did not immediately respond to a request for comment. Google and X also did not immediately respond to a request for comment on the plan. Meta said it supports laws which require parental oversight but that “governments considering bans should be careful not to push teens toward less safe, unregulated sites.”

“We'll comply with social media bans, but with teens using 40 apps weekly, targeting a handful of companies won't keep them safe,” a Meta spokesperson said in an e-mail.

London opera chief steps in for ailing tenor

A theatre boss – still dressed in his everyday workwear of jumper and chinos – stepped in mid-performance to make sure the show went on at London's Royal Opera house after its star tenor was taken ill, a report said yesterday.
Off-stage drama at the world-famous Covent Garden venue, at which tickets can cost hundreds of pounds, meant French singer Roberto Alagna was unable to continue after completing the second act of Tuesday's performance of Puccini's “Turandot”.
With no time to get a replacement for the demanding role, a swift substitute was found in the form of the Royal Opera's head of music Richard Hetherington, a renowned pianist and conductor, *The Times* daily reported. Before the curtain went up for the start of the third act a member of staff appeared on stage to explain that the performance would resume but with the lead role of Prince Calaf performed out of sight by someone who was not an opera singer. Hetherington, still dressed for a regular work day behind the scenes, took over and the performance continued with him singing from the wings and the show's choreologist covering his moves on stage in costume. - **AFP**

UK immigration officers accused of misconduct

Five British immigration officers appeared in court yesterday charged with misconduct in public office and conspiracy to steal from migrants who had arrived in Britain on small boats.

John Bernthal, 53, Ben Edwards, 45, Lee-Ann Evanson, 42, Besmir Matera, 36, and Jack Mitchell, 33, are charged with stealing from migrants between August 2021 and November 2022.

All five are also charged with one count of misconduct in public office and one count of money laundering.

They sat in the dock at London's Westminster Magistrates' Court as prosecutor Rosalind Earis said the five worked on Britain's south coast “dealing with recent arrivals on small boats across the Channel”.

The crossings of small boats carrying migrants from France, the most visible sign of arrivals, have become a focal point for British voters and has helped

propel Nigel Farage's anti-immigration Reform UK party into a commanding opinion poll lead.

Earis told the court that “many of these people arrive with relatively large sums of money in cash on their person”. When the defendants discovered this “they worked together to take that money for themselves and share it”, Earis added.

Matera is also charged with entering or remaining in Britain by deception and possession of three identity documents – a British passport and a full and provisional driving licences – in a false name.

Earis said Matera applied for asylum in 2003, claiming he was from Kosovo and had arrived in Britain in the back of a lorry. But, Earis said, Matera was from Albania and arrived in Britain on a school trip.

A sixth defendant, 43-year-old David Grundy, is only charged with one count of money laundering.

All six defendants were granted bail ahead of their next hearing at Southwark Crown Court in February.

Documentary showcases King Charles’ work as nature campaigner

Britain's King Charles hosted the first film premiere at a royal palace on Wednesday when a documentary chronicling his lifetime work of championing nature was shown at his historic Windsor Castle home.

Filmed over seven months last year, *Finding Harmony: A King's Vision*, which will be shown on Amazon Prime next month, is

billed as providing a deeply personal insight into the 77-year-old monarch's decades of environmental activism and the philosophy which has motivated him.

It shows Charles wistfully reflecting on his experiences, from being dismissed as crazy for talking to plants to his hope that his vision of sustainability, which is being taken up in projects across the world, will save the planet.

“It all boils down to the fact that we are actually nature ourselves, we are a part of it, not apart from it,

which is really how things are being presented for so long,” Charles says in the film, which was made in collaboration with the King's Foundation, a charity he founded in 1990.

“Maybe, by the time I shuffle off this mortal coil, there might be a little more awareness ... of the need to bring things back together again.”

From organic farming to architecture and town planning, the king has long been outspoken on how human behaviour needs to

be in harmony with nature, drawing both praise for being ahead of his time on green issues as well as ridicule and charges of inappropriate meddling from a man constitutionally required – first as Prince of Wales and now as king – to be above politics.

“All this sort of thing was considered completely bonkers,” he says with a chuckle at one point, while in another scene he is shown collecting eggs from a hen coop bearing the name “Cluckingham Palace”.

Among those who contributed to the documentary is former US vice-president Al Gore, while actors Kate Winslet, who narrates the film, Judi Dench and Kenneth Branagh were among the guests joining Charles and Queen Camilla at the 1,000-year-old castle where a cinema has been set up for the occasion.

While the documentary aims to convey a message of hope on the environment, it also comes at a time when US President Donald Trump, who is not mentioned in the film,

has described climate change as “the greatest con job” in the world. “It's rapidly going backwards. I've said that for the last 40 years but anyway, there we are,” Charles ruefully says on the battle to save the planet. “So, that's why I get a bit, anyway ... I can only do what I can do, which is not very much.”

The documentary will be available globally to viewers on Amazon Prime from February 6.

“It would be nice to try and see if we can get through to people, but who knows?” Charles says.

Steps in Sha‘baan to prepare for Ramadan

The Messenger of Allah, sallallaahu `alaihi wa sallam, said about Sha‘baan: “That is a month concerning which the people are heedless, between Rajab and Ramadan. It is a month in which good deeds are taken up to the Lord of the worlds, and I would like my deeds to be taken up when I am fasting.” [An-Nasaa’i; Al-Albaani; Hasan]

If you observe the habits of the successful people in different walks of life, you would notice that they strive hard to prepare and get ready for their tasks. A student who excels prepares for his studies before the year begins; a good runner prepares for the race long before it starts and there other numerous examples in our daily life.

Not everyone who prepares gains the fruit of his endeavours or reaches the peak of success. People vary even in the success of their preparation and each one attains success according to the effort they exert. Keeping this in mind, we must ask ourselves: how can one attain any fruits without preparation, or rather without any concerns whatsoever to prepare for it?

The month of Sha‘baan is the last stage in the preparation of entering the month in which one can be saved from Hellfire, i.e. the month of Ramadan, the month of the Qur’an and the month of mercy. So, contemplate the conditions of those who seek to win worldly competitions and the effort they exert to achieve that. What then should be the case with those who seek the reward of the Hereafter? Indeed, there is no point of comparison between them. Is not the reward of the Hereafter more deserving of our effort?

Immediately after Ramadan, our Salaf (righteous predecessors), may Allah have mercy upon them, used to ask Allah The Almighty for six months to accept Ramadan from them and then for the next six months, they would ask Him to enable them to live until the next Ramadan. This is the degree of importance they accorded Ramadan and its precious days.

Allah willing, what we aim for and prepare for are acts of worship from the Sunnah (Prophetic tradition), not innovated acts, but our objective is to increase the frequency of performing these acts.

Allah The Almighty Says (what means): *{And hasten to forgiveness from your Lord and a garden as wide as the heavens and earth, prepared for the righteous.}* [Qur’an 3: 133]

{So for this let the competitors compete.} [Qur’an 83: 26]

We must be determined to make the best use of Ramadan by the will of The Most Gracious. Do not let its days slip by like any other days; the days of Ramadan are precious, if they lapse they may never come back again. How many people do not reach or witness Ramadan? How many people were not destined to reach the upcoming Ramadan? From now on, put down a plan with an objective and a sincere intention to prepare for Ramadan. Hence, if death overcomes you before reaching Ramadan, then you will die with a sincere intention and a righteous deed, Allah willing.

Let us take a look at some of the plans of preparation for Ramadan during the days of Sha‘baan. However, before that, keep in mind the importance of time, do not let even a minute in Sha‘baan pass



without benefiting from the preparation for Ramadan.

What would you do if you were to expect an important guest, while your home is in a mess and needs to be cleaned? Would you start decorating it in its unclean state or start cleaning before anything else?

Begin by setting right your obligations, adhere to the limits of Allah The Almighty, and hold yourself accountable for the sins you committed throughout the last 11 months since the past Ramadan. Repent from the past sins of the year before receiving the new month of Ramadan. Purify your heart of any doubts or desires, repent from every forbidden glance, or sins involving hearing, or any misdeed your hand committed and your feet walked towards. Remember that Allah The Almighty feels jealous (which implies His wrath) when the matters He The Exalted has forbidden are violated. Beware of putting off repentance or procrastinating in this matter. Do not be deceived by the patience of Allah The Almighty and His concealment of your sins. Indeed, Allah The Almighty gives respite to the oppressor, but when He finally seizes him, He does not let him escape.

Do not start a deed unless you have a sincere intention. Your deed will not be accepted unless it is done with a sincere intention in accordance with the rulings of the religion (Islam). Therefore, you should learn the rulings of fasting and teach them to your family and acquaintances starting now.

Discipline yourself and be committed to righteous deeds as of now, for Ramadan is the school of the righteous. Allah The Almighty Says (what means): *{O you who have believed, decreed upon you is fasting as it was decreed upon those before you*

that you may become righteous.} [Qur’an 2: 183] And the Prophet, sallallaahu ‘alaihi wa sallam, said: “Whoever does not give up false speech and ignorance and acting accordingly, Allah has no need of his giving up his food and drink.” [Al-Bukhari]

Make haste to maintain the ties of kinship and beware of severing them.

Be keen on having a clean heart from now on, clearing it to be occupied by Ramadan and nothing else. The Messenger of Allah, sallallaahu `alaihi wa sallam, was asked who is the best of people. He answered: “The one with a pure heart and a truthful tongue”. They said: “The one with a truthful tongue we know, but who is the one with a pure heart?” He, sallallaahu `alaihi wa sallam, replied: “He is pious and pure with no sin nor injustice nor grudge nor envy (against anyone).” [Ibn Maajah]

Hasten to make up for the days of fasting you missed in the past Ramadan for a legitimate excuse.

In Ramadan, most people are keen to make a complete recitation of the Noble Qur’an. In order to make the recitation and completion become easy and swift for you, begin reciting in the month of Sha‘baan, increasing the time of recitation gradually, so if you are accustomed to recite one part daily let it be two or even three – in fact, why not complete a full recitation every 10 days?

In Ramadan, different voluntary prayers are performed such as Taraweeh (night prayer that takes place after the prayer of ‘Isha), Qiyaam (standing in supererogatory prayer at night), and other supererogatory prayers. In order to get used to long periods of standing without any fatigue or exhaustion, dedicate a longer time for night prayer starting in Sha‘baan. Begin by dedicating an hour, increase it gradu-

ally, and start getting used to long bowing and prostrating.

Accustom yourself to dedicating a longer period of time for supplicating Allah The Almighty, and memorise some of the authentic supplications of the Prophet, sallallaahu `alaihi wa sallam, for they include precise words with comprehensive meanings, and they are better, more blessed, and more likely to be answered, Allah willing.

Accustom yourself to spending more time in the Masjid (mosque) after performing congregational prayer to prepare for I’tikaaf (staying in seclusion in the mosque with the intention of worship) in the last 10 days of Ramadan, Allah willing. If you cannot perform full I’tikaaf, you could prolong your stay in the masjid, which is also considered I’tikaaf, as there is no minimum stipulated time limit for it.

Get used to fasting so that you do not feel worn out while fasting the first couple of days in Ramadan. Fast on alternate days or in the most of the days of Sha‘baan. Imam al-Bukhari, may Allah have mercy upon him, reported that ‘Aa’ishah, may Allah be pleased with her, said: “The Prophet, sallallaahu ‘alaihi wa sallam, did not fast in any month more than he did in Sha‘baan, and he used to fast all of Sha‘baan.”

Be prepared to feed the poor and needy, and provide meals for the fasting people to break their fast. Increase the quantity of food you prepare for dinner, for instance, and give out the extra food to the poor. The Messenger of Allah, sallallaahu `alaihi wa sallam, said: “Whoever gives Iftar (the meal to break the fast) to one who is fasting will have a reward like his, without that detracting from the reward of the fasting person in the slightest.” Give alms on a daily basis in the month

of Sha‘baan, so that you may get used to daily charity in Ramadan and to be among those mentioned in the Hadith narrated by Abu Hurairah, may Allah be pleased with him, that the Messenger of Allah, sallallaahu ‘alaihi wa sallam, said: “There is no day on which the people get up but two angels come down and one of them says, ‘O Allah, give in compensation to the one who spends (in charity);’ and the other says, ‘O Allah, destroy the wealth of the one who withholds.’” [Al-Bukhari and Muslim]

If it was your habit to give charity in other than Ramadan, then increase the quantity you give out in Sha‘baan whenever you can. Ibn ‘Abbaas, may Allah be pleased with him, said: “The Messenger of Allah, sallallaahu ‘alaihi wa sallam, was the most generous of people, and he was at his most generous during Ramadan, when Jibreel (angel Gabriel) met him. Jibreel used to meet with him every night and teach him the Qur’an. The Messenger of Allah, sallallaahu ‘alaihi wa sallam, was the most generous person, even more generous and faster in spending than a strong blowing wind.” [Al-Bukhari and Muslim]

Know that if you remain seated (in the masjid) after Fajr prayer until sunrise and perform two Rak’ahs (units of prayer) you would receive the reward of a complete Haj and ‘Umrah. Anas ibn Maalik, may Allah be pleased with him, narrated that the Prophet, sallallaahu `alaihi wa sallam, said: “Whoever prays Fajr in congregation then remains sitting (in the masjid) remembering and mentioning Allah until the sun rises, then prays two Rak’ahs (15 minutes after the sun rises), will have a reward like that of performing Haj and ‘Umrah, complete, complete, complete.”

Organise your time and make a timetable to evaluate your performance and the acts of worship you schedule for yourself. This is not an innovation in the religion, but is only a practical measure to monitor your acts of worship and to attain Paradise, Allah willing, which is your chief aim.

From this moment on, engage your tongue to be moist with the remembrance and mention of Allah The Almighty; do not slacken in the remembrance and mention of Allah The Almighty, seeking forgiveness, glorifying Allah The Almighty and reciting Takbeer (i.e. Allahu Akbar). It is an easy form of worship with a heavy and great reward from Allaah The Almighty.

Revise what you have memorised of the Noble Qur’an or memorise some new Surahs (chapters) in Sha‘baan so that you could recite it in your supererogatory prayers in Ramadan. How happy is the one who prays and supplicates with verses he knows by heart!

This was an attempt to provide some guidelines to follow during the month of Sha‘baan in preparation for the blessed month of Ramadan. However, one can custom make his own list and add to this whatever he/she sees more suitable for his/her own situation.

Causes and cure of ostentation

There is an abundance of proof in the Qur’an and Sunnah regarding the impermissibility of ostentation; and those who show off are often dispraised, as when Allah The Almighty Said (what means): {So woe to those who pray*[But] who are heedless of their prayer ~*those who make show [of their deeds]} [Qur’an 107:4-6]; and, {So whoever would hope for the meeting with his Lord - let him do righteous work and not associate in the worship of his Lord anyone.} [Qur’an 18:110]. Allah The Almighty also says, in a Divine Hadith: “I have absolutely no need of partners; and he who performs a deed wherein he associates others with Me, I will forsake him and his partner.”

The Prophet, sallallaahu ‘alaihi wa sallam (may Allah exalt his mention), said: “What I fear most for you is minor Shirk (associating partners with Allah The Almighty).” The Companions, may Allah be pleased with them, asked what that was, so he replied: “Ostentation.”

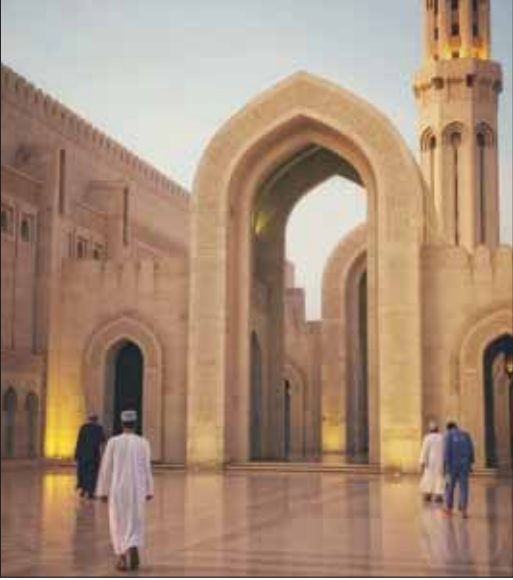
Further, on the Day of Judgment, when Allah The Almighty will judge people for their deeds, He will tell them to: “[go] to those whom you used to impress, in order to gain their praise; see if you will find your recompense there.”

That is why, when Abu Umamah, may Allah be pleased with him, saw a man weeping in prostration in the mosque, he asked him: “Would you do the same if you were at home?”

Causes of ostentation

In Arabic, ostentation is Riyaa; which is derived from the noun Ru’yah, which means vision. Perhaps that is so, because the essence of pretension is seeking praise and high status in the eyes of people, by showing them one’s good characteristics. This is manifest in many, but chiefly five, external aspects, which include every action by which a person tries to be admired by others: in one’s body, clothing, words, deeds and friends.

If we consider religious ostentation, then a person shows off by his or her body, by having a bony figure, so as to seem to people as persevering in worship, being seriously concerned with matters of religion and deeply fearing the Hereafter. As for appearance and clothing, a person may sometimes keep his or her hair unkempt, lower the head while walking, have a slow gait that suggests humbleness and make sure to retain the mark on the forehead that is caused by prostration. In speech, people’s pretension is apparent when they may constantly admonish people regarding matters of their religion; they may also utter words of



wisdom to show their concern with the affairs of the righteous and move their lips in Thikr (remembrance of Allah The Almighty) in the presence of people. An example of ostentation in deeds occurs when a person lengthens the standing, bowing or prostration in prayers, or lowers the head in apparent submission and absolute concentration, such that he or she does not look around while praying. Many may also show off their acquaintances, by, for instance, hosting a scholar, so that people talk about the visit.

Objectives of the ostentatious

A flamboyant person always has an ulterior motive for his or her behavior, whether it is to obtain a certain status or some other purpose. It may be of varying degrees:

He or she may be showing off in order to gain power that enables him or her to commit sins. For example, a person may appear to be pious and conscious of Allah The Almighty, in order to be known for trustworthiness, and consequently assume a position of authority over the treasury, so that he or she could steal as much of it as feasible. This is the most detested kind of ostentation in the sight of Allah The Almighty, because it takes obedience as a pretext to disobedience.

Obedience may be exhibited to obtain a lawful pleasure of this life, such as wealth or marriage. A person with such a behaviour pretends to have

knowledge and piety, to encourage people to marry him or her or trust him or her with their wealth. This is also forbidden, though on a lesser scale than the previous one, because the person seeks the permitted pleasures of the worldly life by means of showing obedience to Allah The Almighty.

A person may not aim at obtaining the pleasures of life such as money or marriage, but worships Allah The Almighty in front of people, to prevent them from looking down on, or thinking of, him or her as being inferior and not as distinguished in worship as ascetics, but as only one of the common people.

Hidden ostentation

Pretension can be either apparent or hidden. The evident kind is what motivates and urges man to do good deeds, even if he desires by them the reward of Allah The Almighty as well. The hidden type is the ostentation that does not actually motivate one to perform an act of worship which was originally intended for the Sake of Allah The Almighty, but makes it easier. For instance, a person may be accustomed to performing voluntary prayers every night, while feeling that it is heavy and difficult; however, when a guest visits, the same worship seems lighter and a person feels more active.

Another manifestation of unseen ostentation is when people conceal their worship but love that others meet them with smiles and reverence, praise them, hasten in fulfilling their needs, show partiality to them in trade by offering special prices and make place for them; and if that is not done for them, they become greatly offended.

Sincere worshippers, however, fear this type of pretension and attempt to conceal their worship more than sinners try to hide their immorality and wrongdoings. Their every effort is based in the hope that they are sincerely performing their good deeds for the Sake of Allah The Almighty, hoping for His reward for that, being fully aware that such deeds are the only type accepted by Him on the Day of Resurrection, when they will be in dire need of Him.

Cure of ostentation

Since ostentation invalidates good deeds and causes the pretentious person to be detested by Allah The Almighty, it is one of the destructive sins a person should try his or her best to cure within oneself. Indeed, anything with such serious consequences must be treated, so a Muslim must do one of two things:

Uproot the foundation of ostentation, namely, love of praise, abhorrence of criticism and the desire

to obtain what others possess. These three factors that prompt people to become affected, can only be treated when a person realises the harm of pretension, which is that it causes a decline in the righteousness of the heart and deprivation from success in the worldly life and of an honorable status with Allah The Almighty in the Hereafter; this, along with the inevitability of punishment, His abhorrence as well as people’s and evident disgrace. Thus, when we compare the pleasure we will obtain from the attitudes of people toward us, with what we will have to forego in the Hereafter and the invalidation of our good deeds, abandoning ostentation will become as easy for us, as it is for a person who knows how delicious honey is, but leaves it if it contains poison.

Try to thwart any rising urge or incentive to be showy during worship, because though we may strive to cut off the roots of ostentation and pay no attention to any praise, or lack thereof, by others, Satan will not leave us and will cast pretentious thoughts in our hearts while we are busy in worship. Therefore, if the notion of people knowing of our obedience crosses our mind, we must dismiss it by reminding ourselves that it holds no importance as long as Allah The Almighty knows our intention and that we have no need for anyone to know. On the other hand, if we happen to long to bask in other’s approval, we must remember what it is that entices us toward ostentation and that its only outcome would be that we will be susceptible to the Wrath of Allah The Almighty and loss in the Hereafter.

Quitting obedience for fear of ostentation

Some people stop performing a good deed out of fear that it may be a pretentious act on their part; however, that is a mistake. Not only does it fulfil Satan’s wish, it is a pretext for laziness and abandoning what is good. As long as the motivation for a deed is sincere, sound and in accordance with Shari’ah, a person must not stop doing it because of fear of ostentation. Rather, he or she should counter such thoughts and humble him/herself in front of Allah The Almighty, replacing like of people’s praise with His love.

Al-Fudhail ibn ‘Iyadh, may Allah have mercy upon him, said: “Doing good deeds for the sake of people is Shirk and quitting [them] for their sake is ostentation; and sincerity is when Allah The Almighty protects you from both.” Someone else once said: “If a person abandons good deeds out of fear of pretension, he [or she] has renounced both good acts and sincerity.”

When US President Donald Trump took office a year ago with an “America First” agenda, many saw trouble for China’s sluggish economy, but Beijing has thawed frosty relationships with other trade partners to post a record trade surplus.

While Trump’s policies have strained ties with traditional US allies, China has turned its focus to fostering ties with key partners, including Canada and India, analysts say.

As a result, the world’s second-largest economy’s trade surplus hit a record \$1.2tn in 2025, monthly forex inflows touched \$100bn, the largest ever, and the global usage of China’s currency, the yuan, has expanded. Backed by its \$20tn economy and \$45tn worth of stock and bond markets, China is emerging as a “steady partner” for many countries, said Aleksandar Tomic, economics professor at Boston College.

“I think China has done a good job and rightly so to position itself as the reliable and stable trade partner,” said Derrick Irwin, co-head of intrinsic emerging markets equity at Allspring Global Investments.

“They basically said, look, you’ve got a massive trade partner in the US that’s become a little more uncertain. We can offer predictability and certainty. And I think that’s very fair.”

Starmer’s four-day visit to China is the first by a British prime minister since 2018 and follows that of Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney earlier this month, the first Canadian prime minister to visit Beijing since 2017. During Carney’s visit the two nations signed an

economic deal to tear down trade barriers and forge a new strategic relationship. Carney described China as “a more predictable and reliable partner”.

But China is not alone in eyeing new trade pacts to de-risk from the United States. India and the European Union struck a long-delayed trade deal earlier this week that will slash tariffs on most goods, boosting two-way trade to potentially double European exports to the South Asian country by 2032.

While the world’s two largest economies have been locked in geopolitical disputes for the past few years, Trump’s return to the White House in January 2025 sharply escalated tensions on multiple fronts, including trade and technology.

Trump raised tariffs on China to over 100% in April, before partially reversing and settling for a temporary truce, while Beijing boosted its exports to non-US markets and rolled out support measures for its private enterprises and markets.

Chinese shipments to the US fell 20% in 2025, but rose 25.8% to Africa, 7.4% to Latin America, 13.4% to Southeast Asia and 8.4% to the European Union last year.

“Many countries previously have not been China-friendly are now kind of pivoting to China ... because the United States is becoming a lot less predictable,” Tomic said. “The more the US gets difficult to deal with, the more it opens up for China.”

Despite the trade tensions with the US, China’s economy, under deflationary pressure at home due to weak domestic consumption and a long-term property sector slump, has met the government’s target of 5% growth in 2025.

In recent months China has taken a raft of measures to boost foreign investment, including pilot programmes in Beijing, Shanghai and other regions to expand market access in services such as telecoms, healthcare and education.

The country recorded the largest-ever monthly forex inflows of \$100.1bn in December, according to bank settlement data from its forex regulator. Its official forex reserves hit a 10-year high of \$3.36tn.

Its financial market has emerged robust from trade disputes with the Shanghai index climbing 27% over the past year, outperforming US equities, the market turnover hitting a record high and the yuan expanding its global usage.

With the dollar becoming less appealing to investors due to Trump’s erratic approach to trade and international diplomacy, Beijing is also pushing ahead with its ambition to bolster the global usage of yuan, said bankers with knowledge of the matter.

Some of the big global banks are scrambling to boost yuan liquidity in offshore hubs and put in place frameworks for faster payment settlements in yuan in trade corridors of China and Southeast Asia, the Middle East, and Europe, they added. — Reuters

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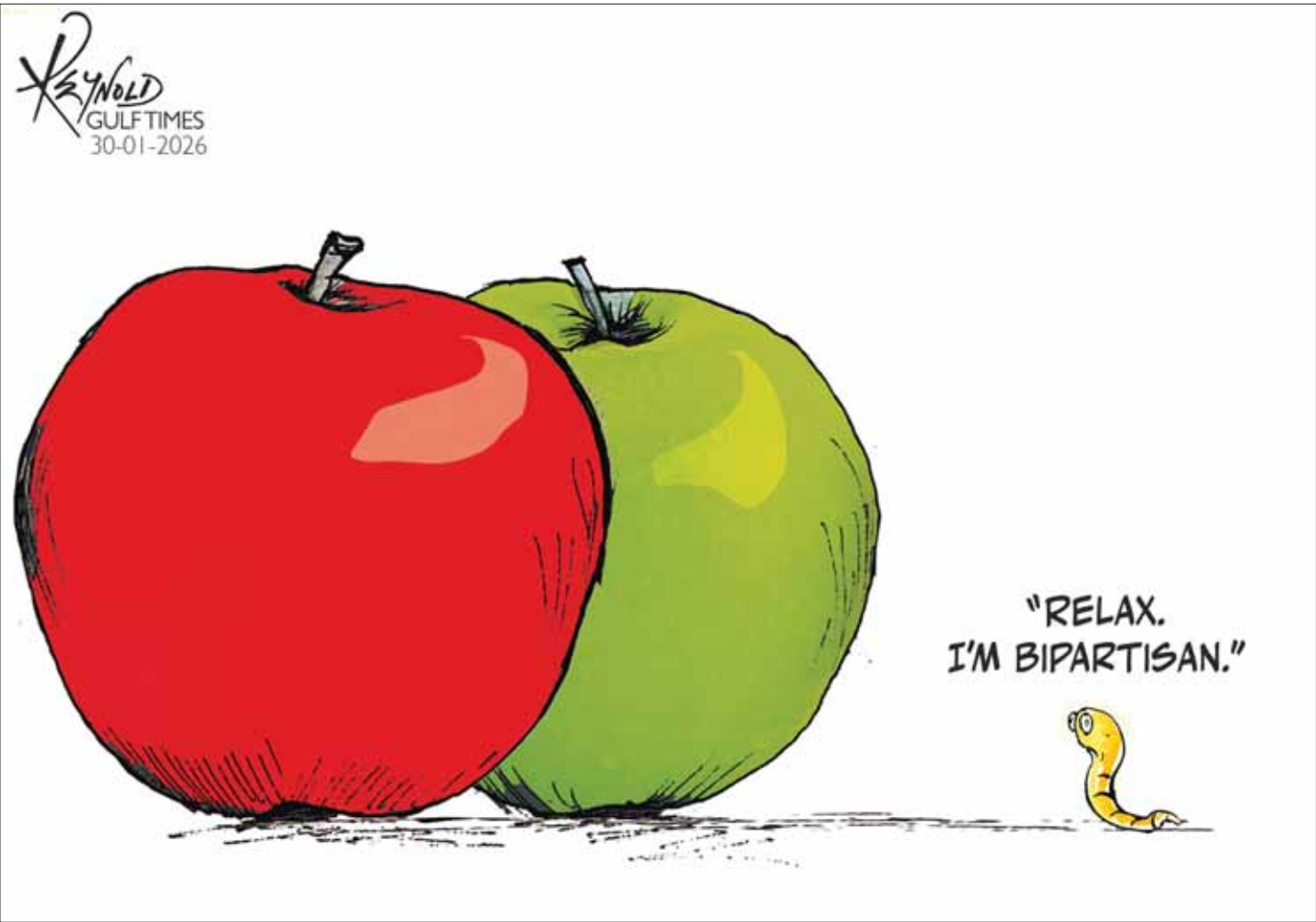
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Qatar key supporter of Arab and Islamic media: al-Leithi

Chairman of the Union of Radio and Television of the Organisation of Islamic Co-operation (OIC) Member States, Dr Amr al-Leithi, has said that the State of Qatar is among the most active and influential countries supporting all the Union’s activities.

In an exclusive interview with Qatar News Agency (QNA) on the sidelines of his visit to Qatar, Dr al-Leithi said that this visit reflects the depth of the relationship between the Union and the State of Qatar, and the active role Doha plays in supporting Arab and Islamic media.

He added that the State of Qatar is a member of the Executive Committee of the OIC Member States and is among the most active and influential countries supporting all the Union’s activities, noting that this support is manifested through several key areas, including Qatar’s membership in the Union’s various committees, its membership in the Executive Council and the General Assembly, in addition to its continuous support for all the Union’s activities and initiatives in the field of media work.

Chairman of OIC States Broadcasting Union said that during his visit to Doha, he met with HE the CEO of the Qatar Media Corporation (QMC) Sheikh Khalid bin Abdulaziz bin Jassim al-Thani. Several meetings were also held at various levels, both with His Excellency and with representatives of Qatari media institutions, during which numerous issues related to strengthening support and solidifying the strong and robust relations with the State of Qatar were discussed.

Dr al-Leithi affirmed that the State of Qatar has a long history in the field of media work and possesses distinguished media infrastructure and outputs, whether in visual, audio, electronic, or print media, including distinguished newspapers and publications. He emphasised that this media standing is clear and well-established.

He noted that an agreement was reached with officials of the Qatar Media Corporation on a number of important matters, most notably those related to 2027, which has been designated the Year of Arab Media, and the selection of Doha as Arab Media Capital for 2027.

In this context, Dr al-Leithi noted the Union intends to establish and launch a major media festival in 2027, celebrating innovators in various fields of media creativity. Through this festival, the Union seeks to encourage media works that support the thought and values of Arab and Islamic countries.

He added that it was agreed

that the State of Qatar would sponsor the festival of the Union of Radio and Television Organisations of the OIC, noting that the festival will encompass various forms of audio-visual media, in addition to electronic media.

Dr al-Leithi also addressed the topic of Qur’an radio stations, noting that the State of Qatar is chairing the seventh session of the committee dedicated to Qur’an radio stations. In this context, Qatar will host the next meeting of heads of Qur’an radio stations in September 2026. The meeting will also honour prominent Qur’an reciters from across the Arab and Islamic world, as well as leading figures in Qur’anic programming across Qur’an radio stations.

Scientific media forum

He pointed out that the meeting will be accompanied by a scientific media forum attended by the heads of radio and television authorities in member states, along with senior media figures in Arab and Islamic countries who enjoy widespread popularity and influence. He noted that the forum will witness a series of workshops specialising in artificial intelligence, the challenges of the age, media work in the digital age, and how to deal with artificial intelligence, in addition to discussing issues of verifying the accuracy of news in a complex media world where clear mechanisms for distinguishing true news from false news are not always available.

He noted that the Doha Forum is a continuation of the forum that was held in the Emirate of Fujairah in the United Arab Emirates last year.

Dr al-Leithi stressed that Qatar’s sponsorship and hosting of the Media Forum, the meeting of the heads of Holy Qur’an radio stations, and the Media Festival, reflect the State’s great interest in supporting Arab and Islamic media, and confirm the approach that Qatar is taking in promoting media unity and integration instead of competition, in light of the customs and traditions that unite Arab and Islamic countries.

Chairman of the Union of

Radio and Television of the Organisation of Islamic Co-operation (OIC) Member States, Dr Amr al-Leithi affirmed in an interview with Qatar News Agency (QNA) his keenness to enhance joint co-operation and develop the Union and its committees. He stressed that this development would not have been possible without the support of the member states, noting that among the most prominent supporters were the State of Qatar, the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, and the Arab Republic of Egypt, among others. Their support contributed to revitalising the Union and strengthening its media presence through its digital platforms, in addition to media production, including the production of a television series to teach Arabic to non-native speakers, which was gifted to the Qatar Media Corporation, he added.

He explained that a news exchange sector had been established, along with the ASBU Academy, which includes a distinguished group of senior media professors and experts from Arab and Islamic countries. The academy has implemented a large number of in-person and remote training courses. He also noted that the Union has expanded the scope of its co-operation with Asian, African, European, and Chinese broadcasting and television unions.

Dr al-Leithi revealed that the Union has opened a number of offices, including its first office in Palestine in the city of Ramallah, followed by offices in Senegal, Chad, the Arab Republic of Egypt, and London. He announced that the Qatar Media Corporation has approved the opening of a Union office in Doha, which will focus on news and programme exchange and co-ordination with Qatari media institutions.

He emphasised that the presence of these offices, along with joint media production, contributes to removing political barriers and reinforces the concept of joint Arab and Islamic media co-operation.

Defining the Union, Dr al-Leithi explained that the Union of Radio and Television was established in 1975 during

a meeting of Arab and Islamic ministers of information. Its primary objective was to support the Palestinian cause, he said, noting that the Union’s first president was the late media figure Ahmed Faraj.

He added that the Union currently includes 57 broadcasting and television organisations from OIC member states, making it the largest media union of its kind. Dr al-Leithi reaffirmed that the Union remains committed to supporting the Palestinian cause and was the first organisation to open a media office in Palestine, noting that the office issues daily news broadcasts that are transmitted to all Arab and Islamic countries. He explained that the Union has directed its awards to support the martyrs of Palestinian journalism, to honour the best Palestinian film at the Cairo International Film Festival, and to support the Festival in Tunisia, which features dramatic works addressing the Palestinian cause.

Regarding digital transformation, Dr al-Leithi noted that the Union established a specialised AI sector more than two years ago, which provides round-the-clock news bulletins using AI-generated male and female presenters, while preserving the Arabic language and Arab-Islamic identity.

Code of ethics

On combating misinformation, he explained that the Union works to organise specialised workshops and, for the first time in its history, adopted a Media Code of Ethics after 50 years since its establishment. The code was prepared with the participation of media experts from Islamic countries and was officially approved by the Executive Council and the General Assembly in October 2025.

He noted that the code focuses on professional values, verification of news, reliance on official sources, and avoiding being driven by content circulated on social media, stressing that trusted traditional media will continue to exist and will not disappear.

He concluded his remarks by expressing great optimism about the future of joint media action among Arab and Islamic countries, affirming that the Union is moving in the right direction through events, forums, workshops, training, and international co-operation. These efforts aim to elevate the status of Arab and Islamic media, correct the image of Islam, and keep pace with technological development through a collective, integrative spirit among member states, thereby establishing a common ground for interaction and full co-ordination through the news and exchange sector.

He added that this co-ordination has already begun through World Radio Day, which falls on February 13 each year, noting that this year a joint one-hour broadcast will be allocated among Union members.

Bangladesh-Pakistan direct flights resume after 14 years

Direct flights between Bangladesh and Pakistan resumed yesterday after more than a decade, as ties warm between the two nations that have long had an uneasy relationship.

Bangladesh and Pakistan – geographically divided by about 1,500 kilometres (930 miles) of Indian territory – were once one nation. They split after a bitter war in 1971.

Since 2012, travellers between Bangladesh and Pakistan had to use connecting flights through Gulf hubs such as Dubai and Doha.

Yesterday national carrier Biman Bangladesh Airlines departed for the Pakistani city of Karachi, the first regular flight since 2012.

Mohammad Shahid, one of 150 Karachi-bound passengers on board, said he was happy to be able to travel more frequently than before, when he could only make the journey once every two or three years.

“We had been waiting for such an opportunity because

we travel continuously,” he told AFP in Dhaka.

“There are so many people waiting in Pakistan to come here, and some waiting here to go there.”

Direct flights will now operate twice weekly.

Biman said in a statement that their resumption would “play a significant role in promoting trade and commerce, expanding educational exchanges, and fostering cultural ties between the two countries”.

Ties with fellow Muslim-majority nation Pakistan have warmed since a student-led revolt in Bangladesh overthrew Sheikh Hasina in 2024, ending her autocratic 15-year rule. Over the same period, relations between Bangladesh and Hasina’s old ally India have turned frosty.

Cargo ships resumed sailing from Karachi to Bangladesh’s key port of Chittagong in November 2024.

Trade has risen since then and cultural ties have grown, with popular Pakistani singers performing in Dhaka, while Bangladeshi patients have travelled to Pakistan for medical care.

Portugal storm death toll climbs, 450,000 without power

Storm Kristin has claimed five lives and left nearly 450,000 clients without power yesterday, more than 24 hours after it barrelled through central and northern Portugal, authorities said. The storm brought heavy downpours and strong winds, reaching speeds of up to 178kmh (110mph), on the night from Tuesday to Wednesday. The fifth victim, whose death was announced yesterday, was a 34-year-old man who died in the centre of the country “as a result of the severe weather,” according to civil protection officials, who did not provide details. Almost 450,000 customers were still without power early yesterday, mainly in the centre of the country, according to E-redes, the electricity distribution network operator. The majority were in the Leiria district in central Portugal where the storm knocking down poles and high-voltage lines. Rail services remained suspended on several lines, including Lisbon to Porto, according to the state-owned rail company. (AFP)

‘I am a knight’: Paris’ last newspaper hawker gets top French award

Ali Akbar Akbar has been homeless, experienced extreme poverty and had been attacked.

On Wednesday, President Emmanuel Macron made Pakistan-born Akbar, believed to be the last newspaper hawker in Paris, a knight in the national order of merit in recognition of his service to France.

The French president praised Akbar’s “incredible destiny”, thanking the septuagenarian for arriving from Pakistan decades ago, selling newspapers for 50 years and carrying France in his heart.

“Dear Ali, thank you for bringing political news to our terraces at the top of your lungs, for warming the hearts of the Flore, the Deux Magots, the Lipp brasserie,” Macron said in his speech at the Elysee Palace, referring to

some of the French capital’s iconic cafes.

“You are the accent of the 6th arrondissement. The voice of the French press,” Macron told Akbar, who was surrounded by his family.

Akbar, who is known for inventing sensational headlines, sells his wares round the upmarket streets of Saint-Germain-des-Pres where he has become a neighbourhood legend.

French has “become your language”, Macron told the slim, sharply dressed man. “You have learned to play with it, making it your own.”

“You have carried, if I may say so, the world in your arms and France in your heart,” Macron added.

He praised Akbar as an example of integration which “makes our country stronger and prouder.”

“He is a magnificent example at a time when we so often hear bad news,” Macron said. “There are also many sto-

ries like Ali’s, of women and men who fled poverty to choose a country of freedom.”

Akbar said he was “deeply moved” and already knew what he would shout on the streets of Paris in the coming days.

“That’s it, I’m a knight! I’ve made it!” he said at the Elysee.

Akbar arrived in France, hoping to escape poverty and send back money to his family in Pakistan. He worked as a sailor then a dishwasher in a restaurant in the northern city of Rouen.

Then in Paris he bumped into French humorist Georges Bernier who gave him the chance to sell his satirical newspapers Hara-Kiri and Charlie Hebdo.

Akbar said last year he could not believe Macron wanted to give him France’s top honour.

“We often crossed paths when he was a student,” he said at the time.

Vietnam designer makes history as Paris Haute Couture wraps up

Vietnam’s Phan Huy became the youngest-ever designer to present a collection on the official Haute Couture calendar in Paris aged just 27 yesterday, rounding out a week of major fashion debuts and celebrity sightings.

Phan thrilled the fashion scene at a venue in western Paris, having had a whirlwind rise into the world’s most exclusive design club since creating his eponymous label in 2023.

His airy Spring/Summer 2026 collection of evening dresses made abundant use of light muslin and tulle fabric, as well as hand-stitched floral and beaded embellishments, all inspired by Vietnam’s former royal Nguyen dynasty.

“I’m very happy and very proud because I can represent and bring the culture and creativity of Vietnam to the world,” Phan told AFP earlier this week.

As well as being the youngest, he is the first Vietnamese designer on the programme.

Although Vietnam is well-known as a manufacturing hub for mass-market Western clothes, Phan’s business partner Steven Doan stressed that the duo “want to prove that we can do fashion as well”.

Phan has been fast-tracked into a field that is becoming increasingly diverse under the impulse of the French fashion federation, FHCM.

The last day of Haute Couture Week included shows by Saudi label Ashi Studio as well as Syrian designer Rami al-Ali, who joined

the official schedule for the first time last year.

Debuts

The most-followed events of the last four days have been the Haute Couture debuts of new Chanel and Dior designers Matthieu Blazy and Jonathan Anderson, who took over the labels last year.

The two 40-something contemporaries were promoted as part of a vast overhaul of creative director positions in the European luxury clothing sector in the last 12 months.

Seen as new generational talents, the Franco-Belgian and Northern Irish designers have the daunting task of modernising some of the most venerable and profitable labels in fashion.

Blazy turned to birdlife for inspiration for his collection, producing

Spain minister says opposition spreading false train crash claims

Spain’s transport minister yesterday accused conservative opposition parties of spreading false claims and fuelling public confusion after a high-speed train collision that killed 45 people.

The January 18 accident near the southern village of Adanmuz – one of Europe’s deadliest rail disasters this century – has raised questions about the country’s rail safety.

The main opposition conservative Popular Party (PP) has accused the Socialist-led government of misrepresenting how fully the line affected by the crash was renewed before the catastrophe.

Far-right party Vox has criticised the government for “criminal incompetence” and alleged underinvestment in maintenance and understaffing.

Addressing the Senate amid

shouts of “resign”, Transport Minister Oscar Puente defended the government’s management of the railway and said the investigation into the cause of the accident would be “absolutely transparent”.

He accused the PP and Vox of spreading what he described as false information about the authorities’ response and the government’s rail safety policies.

“I have read and heard outright absurdities,” the minister said, accusing the opposition of “spreading fear” and “fuelling chaos”.

A preliminary report released last week suggested the track was cracked before the catastrophe. The final conclusions are not expected for several months.

King Felipe VI and Queen Letizia are scheduled to attend a memorial Mass for the victims on Thursday evening in the southern city of Huelva, the final destination of the train involved in the disaster which suffered the most deaths.

Santaolalla’s art: Where pauses speak, melodies breathe

Two-time Oscar winner opens up on why restraint, imagination, and the unknown define his sound

Silence is a cornerstone of Gustavo Santaolalla’s music. A silence so loaded with meaning because of how and where it arises in his compositions that “sometimes it’s louder than the notes,” as he puts it.

At his recent special performance at QNCC with the Qatar Philharmonic Orchestra as part of the Doha Film Festival’s music line-up – and also a part of the Qatar-Argentina and Chile 2025 Year of Culture activities – that majestic silence of his music kept shining through like gentle sunbeams filtering through the leaves of trees. Often, Santaolalla’s signature ebbs and flows is described simply as music that “connects with the heart and with emotions” and his moving Doha debut show was instant proof.

The two-time Oscar-winning composer, songwriter, and producer’s iconic scores include *Brokeback Mountain*, *Babel*, *The Motorcycle Diaries*, *Amores Perros*, and most recently, *The Last of Us* (for both the video game and the web series). Towards the end of his visit to Doha, *Gulf Times* caught up with the 71-year-old Argentine multi-instrumentalist for an exclusive interview.

From winning two Oscars, two Grammys, a Golden Globe, and 17 Latin Grammy awards, to an almost six-decade-long musical career that shaped the soundscape of Latin rock music and world cinema, how do you look at your musical journey in its entirety?

Somewhere along the way, I realised that doing everything completes me. I love every aspect of making music; producing, composing by myself, composing with a group, composing for films, for animation, you name it. I love art and to be able to express my creativity. As an Argentinian, let me

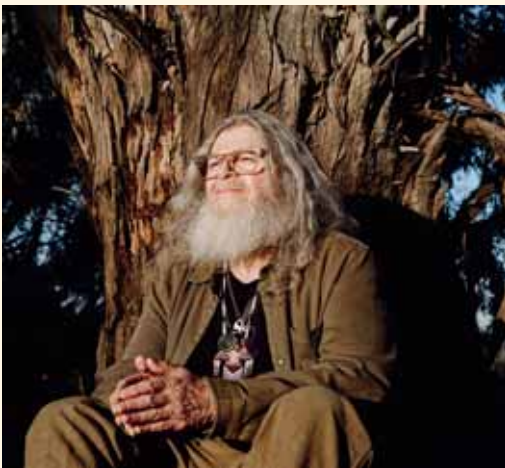

use a football analogy. Sometimes, I’m a striker scoring goals. Sometimes, I’m a midfielder strategising, or a goalkeeper, manager, coach. Sometimes I’m just cheering. But I’m always in the match. I have endless curiosity. I love to learn and expand my knowledge. Apart from making music, I run a book publishing company, a beverage company, and I am working on a perfume that we will be releasing next year. Doing different things allows me to keep learning and applying those learnings to the multiple interests that I have developed.

Your Doha performance was phenomenal. Would it be correct to say that your ongoing global Ronroco Tour is a tribute to your vast body of work?

Yes, the Ronroco Tour is my tribute to a 10-stringed, Andean instrument called Ronroco, my special relationship with that instrument, and

the music that the ronroco has inspired, including my album (Ronroco). This tour is my first such in my career where all my music is centred in one space, connected through the ronroco. My concerts have always been marked with incredible eclecticism. So the Ronroco tour is very different and it has really blossomed.

You like to experiment with various stringed instruments. Tell us a little about how this influences your approach to a film score.

For *Babel*, I wanted to find an instrument that can connect the three stories. I wanted it to sound like world music and yet one shouldn’t be able to tell from which part of the world it was. In *Oud* I found a wonderful Middle-Eastern instrument that could tie the story together. I’m not an oud player and it doesn’t have frets like a guitar has. I played it with my fingers without using a plectrum. What I like about playing a

new instrument is that it demands me to be minimalist and allows me to play with silence and space. It was playful but it had an element of danger too.

Your music is most often described as very visual and that it “touches the heart”. How does it play out deep inside you?

Sometimes, I feel that music is like scenes in a movie and the choice of instrumentation is like the set design. What elements would you put in the set and why? I like the idea of breaks and pauses in songs, which to me are like a movie’s editing where you can move to an entirely different shot or thought. So I think almost in film terms when I’m making music. It’s always about storytelling anyway. So the element of surprise is there. The moments of calm and action are at play. I’m always conscious about all of these things when composing and performing music.

Does this explain your usual approach where you read the film’s script and talk to the filmmaker and then dive into scoring music?

Yes. That’s because I haven’t been trained to read or write music. Although I have composed music to visuals too, I find it very inspiring to write or compose based on the script, the story, the characters, and from a conversation with the director so that I see his or her vision. Once the vision is clear, it helps define. Filmmaker David Lynch said that the more you define something, the less things that thing is. So by defining something more specifically and giving more information about something, you kill it. If there’s magic that you are to discover, it’s gone. When you see it already on screen, then you know how someone looks, walks, and talks. But when I work out of a script or a conversation, it’s all so abstract and can be musically interpreted in several ways. That’s why it’s important to retain the mystery that things have, and be wary of how much you define something.

Safe, easy, quick and comfortable: Main features of transportation within Qatar

“One of the things I love most about Qatar is that it is very easy and cost-effective to move around the country with multiple options of means of transport. You can even get a taxi ride for less than

QR10, and it is quick, easy and comfortable,” a journalist from one of the neighbouring countries stressed, as he frequently visits Doha.

He recalled that, many years

before the Metro entered service and the smart taxi application was not yet available, moving around in Doha was very slow, expensive, and exhausting. “It used to take hours waiting for a taxi or getting public bus services, and road congestion used to be the norm rather than the exception,” he recalled his experience more than 15 years ago.

However, he noted that compared to many countries in the region known for their sophisticated roads and transportation systems, Qatar can be ranked among the best in all respects, making it attractive for tourism, business and all aspects of life.

In the meantime, the various means of transport in the country are easily and safely accessible to people with special needs, enabling them to exercise their right to move.

Accordingly, all Doha Metro stations and the Lusail Tram network are easily accessible to people with special needs, with level-boarding platforms, wheelchair spaces, tactile paving for people with visual limitations, and dedicated seating and family areas. Mowasalat (Karwa) buses are equipped with wheelchair ramps and designated spaces, and Metrolink buses are equipped with the same. Further, people with disabilities can easily book a well-equipped taxi at a very reasonable fare.

The development of road networks and the transport sector is set to continue with the Qatar Transport Master Plan for Qatar 2050 (TMPQ 2050), launched in 2022, which entails various ambitious objectives, such as making Qatar’s transport sector ready for population and tourism growth and business diversification.
