Guyon rides five-year-old bay to upset win ahead of favourite and defending champion Al Ghadeer

Wathnan Racing's Lippo De Carrere produced a stunning upset to capture the HH The Amir's Sword, edging out defending champion Al Ghadeer on the final day of the prestigious HH The Amir's Sword Festival yesterday.

At Qatar Racing and Equestrian Club's Al Rayyan Racecourse, Lippo De Carrere surged past Al Ghadeer to claim the \$2.5mn showpiece for purebred Arabians, the highlight of the four-day festival. The Group 1 contest saw the five-year-old bay – ridden by Maxime Guyon and trained by Alban de Mieulle – deliver a performance worthy of the occasion, quickening in the home straight before holding on gamely to prevail by a length.

His Highness the Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad al-Thani presented the HH The Amir's Sword to HE Sheikh Hamad bin Tamim al-Thani, HE Sheikh Jassim bin Tamim al-Thani and HE Sheikh Joaan bin Abdullah bin Khalifa al-Thani, who received the coveted Sword on behalf of Wathnan Racing, owner of Lippo De Carrere, winner of the sword race.

His Highness the Amir also presented trophies to the winning riders of the Al Sabiq Championship, held on the sidelines of the festival. The first four places were secured, in order, by Abdulla Salem al-Mansoori aboard Kahilan Al Sakab, Majid Nasser al-Nuaimi with Dahess Al Sham, Mohammed Kamaan Saeed al-Hajri on Malzoom, and Faleh Faraj al-Otaibi riding Nawasi.

In HH The Amir's Sword race, the early stages unfolded at a measured tempo, with Al Ghadeer racing prominently and setting the pace while HM Alchahine held a close position among the leading group. Lippo De Carrere travelled comfortably within striking distance, always poised just behind the principals as the field approached the home turn.

Once in the straight, Lippo De Carrere was produced to challenge and surged to the front, asserting with a decisive change of gear. Al Ghadeer attempted to rally and close the gap in the final strides, but Lippo De Carrere found enough to hold him at bay and secure the sport's most prestigious Arabian title.

Al Ghadeer, owned by Al Shaqab Racing and trained by Francois Rohaut, stayed on strongly under Christophe Soumillon to take second, finishing three lengths ahead of HM Alchahine. The latter, representing National Stables and prepared by Helal and Tahnob Alalawi, kept on gamely to secure third. "I had a perfect race with Lippo De Carrere. Everybody knows it is difficult to beat Al Ghadeer. The race was good and it was easy. Lippo De Carrere is a very strong and good horse," Guyon said after the race.

quand. At eight he was the eldest member of the seven-horse field, but the son of Deep Impact staved off the persistent challenge of 2024 King George hero Goliath by a neck, with Marco Botti's Giavelotto staying on from off the pace into third a further length back.

It was a race the first and second dominated throughout, with Goliath and Christophe Soumillon leading until Deep Monster took his measure a furlong out. Race favourite Byzantine Dream was held up by Cristian Demuro but failed to menace.

"I am really impressed with how Deep Monster delivered. The Japanese contingent know how to prepare their horses. I was pretty confident he would not go down without a fight," Marquand said.

Trainer Ikee added: "It was my dream to win a big race overseas like today. The dream has come true."

Alhaarith captured the HH The Amir's

Silver Sword, the second race on the card and a Class 1 contest for four-year-old Purebred Arabians over 2,000m, contested by 14 runners. The Group-winning bay colt, carrying the colours of Al Wasmiyah Farm and trained by Rohaut, made a striking Qatar debut, travelling prominently before unleashing a decisive turn of foot in the home straight to draw clear for a commanding seven-and-a-half-length victory under Christophe Soumillon.

Basalt took the honours in the HH The Amir's Shalfa, a 2,000m Thoroughbred Handicap for ratings 85 and above, Class 2, contested by 15 runners. The four-year-old grey colt, racing for HE Mansoor bin Ebrahim al-Mahmoud and trained by Jassim al-Ghazali, continued his excellent campaign with a fourth victory from six starts this season, being produced at the decisive moment to prevail in a blanket finish under Maxime Guyon.

Boycott averted, India and Pakistan set for blockbuster

India fret on opener Abhishek Sharma's fitness as Pakistan spinner Tariq's action intrigues fans

India and Pakistan will clash in the Twenty20 World Cup in Colombo today, still feeling the aftershocks of a tumultuous fortnight in which Pakistan's boycott threat - later reversed - nearly blew a hole in the tournament's marquee fixture.

With bilateral cricket a casualty of their fraught relations, emotions run high whenever the bitter neighbours lock horns in multi-team events at neutral venues.

India's strained relations with another neighbour, Bangladesh, have further tangled the geopolitics around the World Cup.

When Bangladesh were replaced by Scotland in the 20-team field for refusing to tour India over safety concerns, the regional chessboard shifted.

Pakistan decided to boycott the Group A contest against India in solidarity with Bangladesh, jeopardising a lucrative fixture that sits at the intersection of sport, commerce, and geopolitics.

Faced with the prospect of losing millions of dollars in evaporating advertising revenue, the broadcasters panicked. The governing International Cricket Council (ICC) held hectic behind-the-scenes parleys and eventually brokered a compromise to salvage the tournament's most sought-after contest.

Strictly on cricketing merit, however, the rivalry has been one-sided.

Defending champions India have a 7-1 record against Pakistan in the tournament's history and they underlined that dominance at last year's Asia Cup in the United Arab Emirates.

India beat Pakistan three times in that single event, including a stormy final marred by provocative gestures and snubbed handshakes.

Former India captain Rohit Sharma does not believe in the "favourites" tag, especially when the arch-rivals clash.

"It's such a funny game," Rohit, who led India to the title in the T20 World Cup two years ago, recently said. "You can't just go and think that it's a two-point victory for us. You just have to play good



Suryakumar: India v Pakistan 'not just another game'

COLOMBO: India captain Suryakumar Yadav admitted yesterday that no matter how much his team tried to prepare for today's T20 World Cup clash against Pakistan as "just another game", it would be much more than that. "It's a big platform, obviously," Suryakumar told reporters in Colombo, venue for today's massive Group A showdown. "No matter how much you say that it's just another game, it is a big game." The biggest and most lucrative clash in world cricket has sold out the 35,000-capacity R Premadasa stadium with hundreds of millions more expected to watch on television. The game was only confirmed as going ahead late on Monday night after the Islamabad government made a U-turn on its order to boycott the blockbuster Group A game. "We don't play them often, don't even play them regularly," said the Indian skipper. "But at the end of the day, we try to keep things simple and try to execute our best game. "There is pressure, but there is a big opportunity," said Suryakumar. "According to me, when you play an

India-Pakistan game, it's more about the occasion."

The Indian captain would not say whether his players would shake hands after snubbing the Pakistan team in three Asia Cup meetings in Dubai last year.

"I will break the suspense tomorrow," he said.

"Wait for 24 hours, let us play the game which is more important."

India achieved a hard-fought 29-run win against United States in their first match of their title defence in Mumbai a week ago, before crushing Namibia by 93 runs in Delhi on Thursday. But Suryakumar played down the hype around Pakistan spinner Usman Tariq and his unique sling-arm bowling action that has an exaggerated pause in the delivery stride.

"We have practised with similar types of bowlers and similar actions so we will try to execute what we are practising in the night sessions," said Suryakumar. Suryakumar said dashing opener Abhishek Sharma has recovered well from a stomach bug and was likely to play. Both Pakistan and India have won their opening two Group A matches and the winners will qualify for the Super Eight Stage.

cricket on that particular day to achieve those points."

Both teams have opened their World Cup campaigns with back-to-back wins, yet India still appear to hold a clear edge. Opener Abhishek Sharma and spinner

Varun Chakravarthy currently top the batting and bowling rankings respectively. Abhishek is doubtful for the Pakistan match though as he continues to recover from a stomach infection that kept him out of their first two matches.

Ishan Kishan has reinvented himself as a top-order linchpin, skipper Suryakumar Yadav has regained form, while Rinku Singh has settled into the finisher's role in India's explosive lineup.

Mystery spinner Chakravar-

thy and the ever-crafty Jasprit Bumrah anchor the spin and pace units, while Hardik Pandya's all-round spark is pivotal. For Pakistan, opener Sahibzada Farhan has looked in fine form but Babar Azam's strike rate continues to

polarise opinion. Captain Salman Agha will bank on spin-bowling all-rounder Saim Ayub, but the potential trump card is off-spinner Usman Tariq, whose slinging, side-arm action has intrigued opponents and fans alike.



Agha expects right spirit but unsure about handshakes

COLOMBO: Pakistan captain Salman Ali Agha expects today's politically charged Twenty20 World Cup showdown with bitter rivals India to be played in the right spirit but is unsure about whether the customary pre-match handshakes between the teams will happen. The sides will clash for the first time since last year's Asia Cup final, a tense event staged following military conflict between India and Pakistan that nearly escalated into a fully-fledged war between the nuclear-armed neighbours. The latest meeting comes after Pakistan, who were angered by Bangladesh's removal from the tournament for refusing to play in India over security concerns, threatened to skip the contest before abandoning that plan. "I expect game should be played in the spirit that it has always been played since its inception," Pakistan captain Agha told reporters in Colombo yesterday. India beat Pakistan three times in the Asia Cup, including in the September 28 final in Dubai, but refused to shake hands with their opponents before or after matches. "We'll find out tomorrow (if it happens)," Agha said.

Pakistan's boycott threat put at risk one of the sport's most lucrative fixtures, leaving

broadcasters fearing millions of dollars would be lost in advertising revenue. The International Cricket Council (ICC) held a series of negotiations before securing a compromise to ensure the match would go ahead as planned.

"India v Pakistan is a game of high magnitude ... Tomorrow's game is no different," Agha added.

"From our side, before heading into the tournament, we were prepared for all possible scenarios - whether the game would go ahead or not."

Agha said the captains carried much of the pressure.

"It's an added responsibility when you are the captain of your side and you're representing your country," he said.

"You can't run away from the responsibility. When you're representing your country and captaining a side, there will be pressure. You just need to find a way to deal with that."

With the threat of rain today looming large, Agha said Pakistan were ready to adapt.

"We cannot control that but we're ready to make adjustments if the game gets shortened," he said.

Both teams have won their opening two matches of the tournament.

Jensen, Markram shine as South Africa beat NZ

South Africa are on the brink of reaching the Twenty20 World Cup's Super 8 stage after captain Aiden Markram's storming half-century led them to a dominant seven-wicket victory over New Zealand yesterday, securing their third straight Group D win.

New Zealand suffered their first loss in the campaign after they posted 175-7, as South Africa's Marco Jansen took four wickets.

In response, opener Markram hit four sixes and eight boundaries in his unbeaten knock of 86 off 44 balls, the highest by a South African captain in the tournament's history, helping his team reach 178-3 with 17 balls to spare.

Last edition's finalists South Africa chose to bowl first in Ahmedabad, and it immediately paid off as player of the match Jansen (4-40) dismissed most of New Zealand's top order by the seventh over.

Finn Allen (31 off 17 balls) tried to mitigate the damage after Tim Seifert and Rachin Ravindra fell to Jansen. But Jansen got Allen caught at mid off in the sixth over, leaving New Zealand struggling at 58-3.

Mark Chapman (48) and Daryl Mitchell (32) turned things around with a 74-run partnership for the fifth wicket, until Jansen got Chapman caught by Ryan Rickelton at backward point in the 14th.

New Zealand scored only 17 runs in the next four overs, until James Neesham's unbeaten 23 off 15 balls got them to a fighting total.

Chasing 176, South Africa got off to a

fast start with Markram hitting three sixes and five boundaries to steer his team to 62-0 in four overs.

Losing fellow opener Quinton de Kock (20) did not affect Markram, who hit Mitchell Santner for a six down long on to reach his half-century in just 19 balls. By the time Rickelton (21) fell in the eighth over, South Africa had already crossed the 100-run mark.

With the required run rate falling below six, Markram did not hit a single boundary in the next seven overs, and focused on rotating the strike, getting South Africa within 28 runs of victory

with 30 balls left.

"It's about managing it through the right phases I guess, but up front you've seen how teams are taking on the power-play and we'd be silly not to try that. It's not always going to come off but when it does... we can get ahead of the game," said Markram.

David Miller, who scored an unbeaten 24, cleared the mid wicket boundary to bring up the winning runs.

South Africa will conclude their group campaign against the United Arab Emirates on Wednesday, a day after New Zealand play Canada.

Banton powers England to victory over Scotland

Tom Banton's unbeaten 63 led England to a five-wicket T20 World Cup victory over Scotland in Kolkata yesterday that kept Harry Brook's side on course for the Super Eights.

Victory in their final Group C match against Italy tomorrow at the same Eden Gardens stadium will see England safely into the next round.

After bowling Scotland out for 152, England racked up 155-5 in 18.2 overs, with Jacob Bethell scoring 32, Sam Curran 28 and Will Jacks (16 off 10 balls) hitting a six and a four to finish the job.

"I think our full focus was on tonight and then obviously on to Italy in two days' time," said Banton, who hit form after scoring just four runs in England's first two matches. "It's T20 cricket. It's a high-risk game. And you've got to keep backing yourself. At times it goes against you. And it's hard.

"You've got to keep coming back, keep trying hard, keep practising. Luckily, today's my day."

England wobbled at the start of their chase as the new white ball swung under the floodlights with the sun going down.

Phil Salt fell third ball to Brandon McMullen for just two and when Jos Buttler picked out McMullen off Brad Currie they were 13-2.

Scotland bowled tightly until Bethell broke the shackles by hitting McMullen for a six and two fours in the fifth over.

Spinner Mark Watt also came in for some punishment, conceding 22 off his first over as Banton took him for three huge sixes.



A 66-run partnership ended when the left-handed Bethell on 32 helped a leg-side delivery from Oliver Davidson into the grateful hands of Brad Wheel at short fine leg. Captain Brook did not last long, scooping Michael Leask over his shoulder to Wheel to make it 86-4 but England were always in control and got home with 10 balls to spare.

Resurgent Muchova beats Mboko in Qatar Open final

THE IN-FORM CZECH WINS HER FIRST TOUR TITLE SINCE 2019, GETS RICHER BY \$665,000

Karolina Muchova captured her first WTA 1000 crown and her first title since 2019 with an impressive 6-4, 7-5 victory over Canadian teen sensation Victoria Mboko in the Qatar Open final yesterday.

After battling back from a set and a break down in the semi-finals against Maria Sakkari the previous night, Muchova, 29, was in fierce form against Mboko to clinch the biggest title of her career.

"It's been a while since I won a tournament, so it's nice to get that feeling again, to be reminded of that victory feeling again," said Muchova during the trophy ceremony.

"I'd like to congratulate Victoria, you're still a teenager but you play with so much maturity. I'm sure you have many titles ahead of you."

A former French Open finalist, Muchova's career has been hampered by injuries but she has started 2026 in fine fashion, amassing a 12-2 win-loss record over the past six weeks.

Her title run in Doha will lift her from 19 to 11 in the world rankings, while Mboko guaranteed herself a

top-10 debut tomorrow by making the final. Muchova put together a clean opening set, landing an impressive 75 percent of her first serves, and dropping just three points behind that first delivery.

The Czech faced zero break points across the 43-minute set and showcased her prowess at the net to take a solid step towards the title.

Mboko made adjustments on return in the second set, and managed to decode her opponent's

serve to carve a 4-2 gap but her advantage was short-lived as Muchova broke twice and wrapped up the contest in 94 minutes.

The 19-year-old Mboko has the most match wins on the women's tour this season with 13 to just three defeats. She will rise to number 10 in the world tomorrow.

"It's not the outcome I wanted but I think there's many positives to take away," said Mboko, who was competing in her fourth WTA final, and second at the 1000 level.

DANILINA AND KRNIC WIN DOUBLES CROWN

Anna Danilina of Kazakhstan and Aleksandra Krunic of Serbia claimed the women's doubles title at the Qatar TotalEnergies Open 2026, after defeating Latvia's Jelena Ostapenko and China's Hsieh Su-wei in three sets.

Held on the main court at the Khalifa International Tennis and Squash Complex, Danilina and Krunic secured the final with a scoreline of 0-6, 7-6, 10-8.

ARCH-RIVALS ALCARAZ, SINNER SET FOR POTENTIAL FINAL IN DOHA

DOHA: The draw for the 2026 Qatar ExxonMobil Open was released Saturday, positioning top seed Carlos Alcaraz of Spain and second seed Jannik Sinner of Italy for a potential meeting in the final. Alcaraz, 22, enters the ATP 500 event as the top seed and will play his first match since winning the Australian Open last month. That victory made him the youngest man in history to complete the Career Grand Slam. The Spaniard opens his Doha campaign against Arthur Rinderknech. If the seeds hold, Alcaraz is projected to face 2023 champion Daniil Medvedev in the semi-finals. On the other side of the draw, Jannik Sinner is set to make his tournament debut. The 24-year-old Italian has not competed since reaching the semi-finals in Melbourne. He begins play against Tomas

Machac, an opponent he holds a 2-0 record against. Sinner's projected semi-final opponent is third seed Alexander Bublik. Bublik, who is currently

competing in the Rotterdam semi-finals, will face a qualifier in the first round. His path could include a second-round match against former World

No. 14 Arthur Fils, who is returning to the tour after an eight-month absence due to a back injury. The field also features several other Top 20 players in the PIF ATP Rankings, including defending champion Andrey Rublev, 2024 finalist Jakob Mensik and Karen Khachanov. Rublev is a two-time Doha champion, having also lifted the trophy in 2020 when the event was still an ATP 250. Khachanov claimed the title in 2024.

Alcaraz and Sinner lead the field as the top two seeds. Bublik is seeded third, followed by Daniil Medvedev in fourth and Rublev in fifth. Jakob Mensik, Khachanov and Jiri Lehecka complete the top eight seeds.

Three former champions are competing this year: Rublev, Medvedev and Khachanov.

Speed skating star Stolz blazes to 500m crown for his second Milano Cortina gold

American speed skating phenomenon Jordan Stolz once again stole the spotlight yesterday, rocketing to the men's 500 metres title at the Winter Olympics and securing his second gold medal of these Games. Stolz had already met the towering expectations by winning the men's 1,000m on Wednesday, the United States' first speed skating gold of Milano Cortina. He topped a 500m podium rounded out by Dutchman Jennings de Boo with silver and Canada's Laurent Dubreuil with bronze. The 21-year-old tore through the distance in an Olympic-record 33.77 seconds, finishing 0.11 ahead of De Boo.

Drawn in the 13th of 15 pairs and starting from the inner lane, Stolz once again lined up against his Dutch rival - the same head-to-head matchup from the 1,000m, where the American struck gold and De Boo took silver.

Stolz powered off the line before unleashing the explosive top-end speed that has become his trademark.

De Boo pushed hard to keep him within reach, clipping the barrier after crossing the line as Stolz saluted a raucous, Dutch-dominated crowd.

Among those rocking the stands were Stolz's compatriot and the most decorated gymnast in history, Simone Biles. Earlier, Dubreuil - skating in the 10th pair - briefly broke the Olympic record with a 34.26, before Stolz obliterated it minutes later.

Poland's Damian Zurek and De Boo were considered the strongest challengers to Stolz over the distance but neither could halt the American's surge as he once again rose above the field at his second Olympics.

Stolz has evolved into a world-beating sprinter in recent seasons, collecting seven

world championship titles and holding the 1,000m world record.

His latest triumph delivered the United States their fifth gold medal of these Games, joining Breezy Johnson's women's downhill victory, the figure skating team event title, Elizabeth Lemley's win in women's moguls and Stolz's own 1,000m success.

Both of Team USA's speed skating medals at these Olympics now belong to him.

CANADA OFF TO FLYING START IN WOMEN'S TEAM PURSUIT

Before the men lined up for their 500m final, the women contested their team pursuit quarter-finals yesterday.

Defending champions Canada pro-

gressed smoothly into Tuesday's semi-finals, joined by 2022 silver medallists Japan, the Netherlands and the United States as the four fastest teams.

Canada entered the event as favorites once again. The trio of Ivania Blondin, Valerie Maltais and Isabelle Weidemann - the same line-up that won gold at Beijing 2022 - arrived in Milano Cortina leading the 2025-26 ISU World Cup standings, reaffirming their status as the team to beat.

The opening quarters pair featured the Netherlands, bronze medallists four years ago, against Kazakhstan. The Dutch skated cleanly, while Kazakhstan's race unravelled early after a blade clash caused one skater to drop out, leaving them unable to finish.

Rahm, DeChambeau set for Adelaide title battle

Jon Rahm recorded a walk-off eagle on the 18th hole yesterday to pull into a tie with Bryson DeChambeau for first place after the third round of LIV Golf Adelaide in Australia.

The two stand at 19-under for the tournament, five strokes ahead of their nearest competitor.

Rahm's electric finish to his round of 6-under 66 at Grange Golf Club wasn't without questions, however.

The Spaniard's initial drive on the par-4 final hole sailed off course, however his ball was ruled to be impeded by infrastructure brought in for the event. He was given a free relief on a line near the fairway. Rahm then holed out from approximately 200 feet to join DeChambeau atop the leaderboard.

That spoiled an otherwise brilliant day for DeChambeau, who made nine birdies in an 11-hole stretch to highlight his round of 8-under 64 yesterday.

"Well, it was shocking, obviously. I didn't know that's what could happen, so that was most of what the shock was," DeChambeau said of Rahm's 18th hole. "It was like, what the heck, you can do that? I didn't know that. But ultimately, I didn't really know from my perspective that it was OK over there, so I was kind of shocked."

Rahm was asked if the final round at Adelaide will represent the closest thing to a Ryder Cup today singles tournament, given the big, loud crowds that have lined the course.

"Quite frankly, it's hard to replicate Sunday in Ryder Cup," the two-time



LIV individual season champ said. "It's hard to say it will be the same feel, especially we're not home or away for anybody. It should in theory turn into a two-man race. In that essence, it should have that feel. But I wouldn't put it past someone shooting 10-under (on Sunday)."

Anthony Kim (68 yesterday) resides in third place at 14-under, one stroke ahead of a three-golfer contingent that includes home favorite Cameron Smith. The Australian joined that group with a sizzling bogey-free round of 8-under 64 yesterday.

"Giving six shots to both Bryson and Jon is probably not where you want to be on the last day, to be honest," Smith said. "It's going to take a lot."

"If I went out there and played similar to what I did (on Saturday), I think I'm in with a chance. I don't think it's easy out there. I think you can definitely get on the back foot here quickly, particularly early in the round."

Lucas Herbert (67) also is included in that group at 13-under after reeling off a string of six straight birdies.

As for the team competition, Rahm's heroics have allowed Legion XIII to sit in first place at 45-under.

France's Lara Tryba produced a superb performance aboard Chageorge to win the CSI3*-W 150cm Grand Prix on the final day of the HH The Amir's Sword Showjumping Championship at Al Shaqab.

The feature class on the final brought together 38 combinations, with 13 progressing to the jump-off where precision and pace proved decisive. Tryba delivered a flawless round in 33.28 seconds to secure top honours. Fellow French rider Megane Moissonnier finished second aboard Qoup de Coeur de Muze in 34.12 seconds, while Germany's Hans-Dieter Dreher claimed third with Harley de La Cense after four faults in 40.72 seconds.

On Friday, Saudi Arabia's Abdullah Alsharbaty aboard the 13-year-old mare Diriyah had captured the CSI5* 160cm Grand Prix to claim the prestigious Amir's Sword. The blue-riband class, which carried total prize money of €1.5mn, attracted 44 combinations in a demanding two-round contest, with 13 advancing to a decisive jump-off.

Last to go, Alsharbaty produced a flaw-

less round in 36.29 seconds to seal victory. Fellow Saudi rider Khaled Almoby had set an early benchmark with a clear effort in 37.45 seconds on Diana du Plevau Z, while Belgium's Pieter Devos completed the podium aboard Casual DV Z in 39.20 seconds.

Yesterday, in CSI5* 150cm Faults and Time competition, Great Britain's Millie Allen guided Quick Diamant HR to victory with a clear round in 62.47 seconds. Spain's Sira Martinez Cullell finished second aboard Texas in 64.95 seconds, with France's Ines Joly third on Come On Z in 65.51 seconds. The class featured 27 combinations in a tightly contested battle against the clock.

The CSI3*-W 145cm Accumulator saw Britain's Oliver Fletcher take the win aboard E.T.'s Queeny Z after a clear jump-off round in 35.34 seconds. Saad Ahmed al-Saad secured second on Fashion des Douits, while Bahrain's Sultan Abdulaziz Mayoof Alromaihi took third with Grappa.

In the CSII* 130cm Grand Prix, Qatar's Khalid Jassim al-Suwaidi claimed victory aboard E.T.'s Queeny Z after a clear jump-off round in 35.34 seconds. Saad Ahmed al-Saad secured second on Fashion des Douits, while Bahrain's Sultan Abdulaziz Mayoof Alromaihi took third with Grappa.

Qatar's Ibrahim Yousuf al-Mahmoud topped the CSI3*-W 140cm Faults and Time class with a faultless effort aboard Perle Van Dorperheide in 63.73 seconds. France's Jean Francois Rondoux finished second on Inter-Larus, followed by Egypt's Abdallah Haitham in third with Consagros.

In CSII* 120cm Accumulator action, Qatar's Jassim al-Kuwari claimed victory aboard Cesar des Marquets, ahead of Saudi Arabia's Faisal Fahad Alodah and Halah Alrasheed.

The CSIY-B 130cm Group VII series qualifier was won by Sheikh Fahad Jassim al-Thani riding Lavesther, with Hend Abdulhadi al-Hajri second and Mohammed Jassim al-Thani third. The CSIJ-B 120cm qualifier saw Hadi Mansour al-Shahwani take top honours aboard Monopoly, followed by Nasser Hamad al-Maadheed and Mohammed Faisal al-Marri.

National classes also produced competitive finishes. Sultan Jassim al-Suwaidi won the Special Two-Phase 100cm class on Ardfry Apollo, while Saif Nasser Ali claimed the Optimum Time 60cm class aboard Roubignac, ahead of Sultan Mohd al-Suwaidi and a joint third for Sheikh Nasser Hamad Khelifa al-Thani and Nawal Bahamdan.

Earlier, defending champions Al Gharafa reached the quarter-finals with a 2-0 win over Al Kharaitiyat at Hamad Bin Khalifa Stadium. Dame Traore opened the scoring in the 22nd minute after converting a free kick delivered by Algerian Yacine Brahimi, while Spaniard Joselu added a second from a VAR-awarded penalty in the 33rd minute. Harry Kane scored twice in the first half as Bayern Munich cruised to a 3-0 win at Werder Bremen yesterday, restoring their six-point lead atop the Bundesliga table.

Borussia Dortmund's 4-0 victory over Mainz on Friday drew them within three points of the league leaders but Bayern sent a clear response. They were in control from start to finish in Bremen, with Leon Goretzka joining the England captain on the scoresheet in the 70th minute.

Kane has 26 goals in 22 Bundesliga games this season and 41 in all competitions, 13 of those from the penalty spot.

Kane's second strike brought

up 500 goals in his career for club and country and the striker told reporters: "500 is a great number - a lot of hard work and dedication has gone into it."

"All I can say is thanks to all of my teammates and managers over the years - and I look forward to the next 50, the next 100."

Bayern lined up without the suspended Michael Olise for the first time in 89 matches in all competitions since the France winger arrived from Crystal Palace in 2024. Bremen kept the league leaders at bay in the opening stages but Kane gave Bayern the lead with 22 minutes played,

converting a penalty after VAR found Lennart Karl was felled in the box. It was the third straight match Kane had given Bayern the lead from the penalty spot.

Bayern doubled their lead three minutes later when Kane snuck a low shot in off the right post from the edge of the box. Bayern captain Manuel Neuer was subbed off at half-time with a recurrence of a calf injury, but sporting director Max Eberl said it was "nothing dramatic" and "a precautionary measure."

Bremen's Marco Gruell hit the post shortly after the break but Bayern put the game to bed when Goretzka swept home with 20 minutes remaining.

Hoffenheim continued their turnaround this season, beating Freiburg 3-0 at home with goals from Fismik Asllani, Ozan Kabak and Valentin Gendrey as they tightened their grip on third spot.

Newcastle oust 10-man Villa from FA Cup, Man City beat Beckham's Salford

Newcastle beat 10-man Aston Villa 3-1 thanks to a double from Sandro Tonali to reach the FA Cup fifth round yesterday as Marc Guehi scored his first goal for Manchester City in a 2-0 victory over fourth-tier Salford. Both Villa and Newcastle have failed to win the competition since the 1950s and another opportunity for Unai Emery's men to end a 30-year wait for silverware vanished after a first half red card for goalkeeper Marco Bizot. Tammy Abraham had fired the home side in front with his first goal since returning to Villa last month. But the game swung in the Magpies' favour when Bizot charged off his line to wipe out Jacob Murphy and deny a clear goalscoring opportunity. Newcastle's fightback saved the officials from an embarrassing moment becoming more

controversial when Lucas Digne's handball, that was clearly inside the box, was given as a free-kick instead of a penalty. With VAR not in operation at this stage of the competition, the decision could not be reviewed. But Newcastle levelled from the resulting free-kick anyway as Tonali's strike deflected past the helpless Emi Martinez. Tonali has been linked with a move to Arsenal come the end of the season and the Italian showed why he is in-demand with a blistering strike from outside the box to turn the tie around. Nick Woltemade then netted his first goal in 15 games to take Newcastle, who last lifted the trophy in 1955, into the last 16. Owned by Manchester United legends David Beckham and Gary Neville, Salford were playing in the fourth round for the first time in their history. The League Two

side were humbled 8-0 when they faced City in the third round last season, but pushed Pep Guardiola's men far closer. City took an early lead through Alfie Dorrington's own goal, but there were only nine minutes left when England defender Guehi delivered the decisive blow with his maiden goal since signing from Crystal Palace in January. Third-tier Mansfield produced the upset of the day by winning 2-1 at Premier League Burnley to reach the fifth round for the first time since 1975. Ten-man West Ham edged through as the in-form Crysenicio Summerville clinched a 1-0 win at League One Burton after extra-time. Freddie Potts was sent off soon after Summerville's strike in the first period of extra-time, but the Premier League strugglers held on to survive a gruelling fourth round clash.
